During conversations held with various individuals in Moscow, USSR, during the period of August 13-21, 1963, which included Henry Winston, a Vice Chairman, Communist Party, USA (CP, USA); John Williamson, a functionary of the CP of Great Britain; and, representatives of the International Department, Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU), it was learned that all of these individuals were quite unhappy with some of the activities of Isadore Meedleman while in the Soviet Union during July and August, 1963.

Both Winston and Williamson complained that Needleman had "talked out of school" and meddled in improper areas. The representatives of the International Department, Central Committee, CPSU, those assigned to the North and South American Section in particular, complained that Needleman was not acting with propriety in the Soviet Union and had even insisted that they should attempt to arrange and pay for a trip to Italy for him. They did not desire to do this and made inquiry of a representative of the CP, USA who was them in Moscow to determine if the CP, USA would, in anyway, object to their requesting that Needleman return to the United States. The CP, USA representative advised these representatives of the International Department that the American Party would have no objection to this desire and that he felt it would be wise to recommend that Needleman be returned to the United States.

Subsequently, it was made known by these same individuals that Meedleman was to leave the USER and would be back in the United States by August 24, 1963.

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INFORMATION REGARDING PRINTING EQUIPMENT SECURED BY CLAUDIA JONES FROM GERMAN DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC

Based on discussions held in Moscow, USSR, with John Williamson, a member of the Mational Committee of the Communist Party (CP) of Great Britain, during August, 1963, the following was learned.

Claudia Jones, a former functionary of the CP, USA, who was deported to Great Britain and who is now a member of the CP of Great Britain, recently concluded arrangements to buy a printing press valued at \$10,000 from the German Democratic Republic. Actually she will pay a purchase price of \$4,000 for this printing press, which will be paid to the German Democratic Republic under a long-term credit contract arrangement. She will use this printing equipment in Great Britain for the publication of her magazine. However, in completing her negotiations with the Germans, she made one big mistake and that was in not telling the British CP what she was doing. Now she has no place to put the press when and if it is shipped to Great Britain. She cannot rent a place of her own to house this press because her present publication does not yield enough money, nor does she personally possess such financial resources. The British Party has agreed to help her get the press into Great Britain and house it for her if she will give up her property rights to it, but this she refuses to do. So as of mid-August, 1963, the printing press remained in East Germany awaiting Jones' solution to her delivery problem and also a solution to the raising of the duty which would be required of her to import this equipment into Great Britain.

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RESPONSE OF THE COMMUNIST PARTY OF THE SOVIET UNION REGARDING SENDING OF NEGRO DELEGATION TO THE USSE

It will be recalled that in early August, 1963, when Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA (CP, USA), was briefing a representative of the CP, USA on possible matters which should be taken up abroad with representatives of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU), that he complained of the policy of the CPSU regarding Megro delegations. He wanted an inquiry to be made of CPSU representatives as to why they had not invited any Megro delegation from the United States to the Soviet Union.

During discussions in mid-August, 1963, in Moscow, USSR, with Aleksei Andreevich Grechukhin, Assistant to the Head of the North and South American Section of the International Department, Central Committee, CPSU, the matter regarding Negro delegations was raised. As a result, Grechukhin advised that any Negro delegation, if decent and good, can be sent to the Soviet Union at any time. Mowever, they felt it would be unadvisable to send such a delegation after Nevember since Moscow at that time is extremely cold and the United States Negro would probably suffer unbearably from the effects of such weather.

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MISCELLANEOUS INFORMATION REGARDING STAY OF MORRIS CHILDS, COMMUNIST PARTY, USA (CPUSA) REPRESENTATIVE, MOSCOW, 8/13-21/63

Moseow by air on 8/13/63, he was met by a representative of the International Department, Central Committee, CPSU. After his arrival, he was not taken to the Central Committee Hotel in Moseow, as had been the practice in the past, but instead he was taken to a large building located near the Foreign Ministry where he was provided with a suite of many rooms, possibly including up to four or five bedrooms, several baths, a kitchen, living room and library area. There is actually some uncertainty as to exactly how many rooms comprised this suite as there never was any occasion, or need, to use all of them. The suite occupied bore number 216 and was located on the fifth floor of the thirty story building situated on Red Gate Street.

For the assistance and comfort of CMILMS, he was supplied with a cook, who came in at regular intervals and prepared all his meals, and a full-time housekeeper.

With the exception of the meeting held on 8/14/63 with BORIS M. PONOMARIY, a member of the Secretariat and Head of the International Department of the Central Committee, and V. KORIANOV, his Chief Deputy, which was held at the Central Committee Building Number 3, Old Square, Moscow, and the meeting of 8/15/63 with KORIANOV held at the International Department Building, CHILDS did not have to leave the suite assigned to him. Arrangements were made by representatives of the North and South American Section of the International Department to bring any and all individuals CHILDS might need to see directly to the suite, thus avoiding any necessity for CNILDS to have to go out and meet with them. This specifically applied to such people as JOHN WILLIAMSON, member of the Mational Committee, CP, Great Britain, who was then visiting in Moscow; HENRY WINSTON, Vice Chairman, CPUSA, who is temporarily residing in Moscow; ALEKSRI ANDREEVICE GRECHURHIN, Assistant to the Head of the North and South American Section, International Department; IGOR MIKHAILQV, an 100-12-8071-31

employee of the International Department and VLADIMIR BARKOVSKY, who is a high official in the Secret Service Department.

Any written material or documents that the Central Committee, CPSU, wanted CHILDS to see in order that he might be fully briefed were personally delivered to him at his suite. When he was not reviewing or utilizing such documents, they were maintained in a locked wault which had been especially provided to him by the International Department for his use.

During CHILDS' entire stay in Moscow, he utilized the above suite. Many days passed without his even leaving this building. For example, on 8/18-19/63, HENRY WINSTON was brought to him for conferences. A total of over twenty hours was spent during these two days in discussion, excluding the time for breakfast, dinner and supper. WINSTON would arrive at approximately 8:00 AM and remain until late that same evening when representatives of the International Department would pick him up and return him to his place of residence.

Any official or personal needs of CHILDS which arose during this period of time were handled personally by GRECHUEHIN, who is the Assistant to the Head of the North and South American Section of the International Department.

MOSTOVETS, who actually heads this section of the International Department normally would have handled these matters but was out of Moscow on vacation at this time.

On 8/21/63, when CHILDS was preparing to leave Moscow by air for Prague representatives of the International Department met with him at his suite, picked up all documents which had been brought to him and returned them to the International Department building. The same representatives supplied him with transportation to the airport and were present at the time of his departure.

Pursuant to the instructions of the Communist Party, USA, CG 5824-S* departed on Solo Mission 13 to the Soviet Union on 8/7/63 in order to hold confidential discussions with Soviet officials relative to matters of international interest. Informant returned from this Mission on 8/25/63. En route to the Soviet Union, informant

stopped in Prague, Czechoslovakia, and held discussions with Czech officials. By airtel 8/29/63 New York has furnished the following pertinent information.

Comments of a Czech Official Concerning Czechoslovak Interest in the United States

Dr. Karel Duda, Ambassador-designate to the United States from the People's Republic of Czechoslovakia, advised CG 5824-S* that in its desire to win the good will of Czech citizens in the United States, as well as those of Czech or Slovak origin who reside in the United States, the Czech Government is going to increase its drive in the United States for tourism to Czechoslovakia. It plans to increase its assistance to travel agencies in the United States and may even establish its own travel agency in the United States. The Czechs feel that relations between the United States and Czechoslovakia may be improved through an exchange of labor delegations. The Czechs are most anxious to improve trade relations with the United States and would like to get United States trade-union delegations containing some labor leaders of Czech descent to visit Czechoslovakia.

OBSERVATION:

Plans of the Czech Government to increase its drive in the United States for tourism to Czechoslovakia and its plans to improve relations with the United States through an exchange of labor dele-100 - 42 8091 - 3196 gations should be of interest to top Government officials.

BEATRICE OUNSON, FORMER U.S. CITIZEN, AND PREPARATIONS FOR HER HAVANA, CUBA ASSIGNMENT AS WORKER CORRESPONDENT

As of mid-August, 1963, BRATRICE SISKIND JOHNSON, a former U.S. citizen who had previously resided in East Berlin, German Democratic Republic, had already departed that city in connection with final plans to move to Havana, Cuba where she was to take over the position as correspondent for "The Worker". As of mid-August, she was in Warsaw, Poland visiting her brother, GEORGE SISKIND. From there she was to proceed to Czechoslovakia and then to the Soviet Union. When she finally departs the Soviet Union for Havana, Cuba, she will be accompanied by She has already shipped all of her "worldly belongings" to Cuba in care of the publication "Hoy".

During her stopover in Czechoslovakia, it has been arranged for JCENSON to meet with LADISLAV KOTZMAN, fermerly a member of the International Department, Central Committee, Communist Party (CP) of Czechowlovakia and the new ambassador designee of Czechowlovakia, to Cuba. KOTZMAN desired such a meeting in order to arrange for subsequent contacts between himself and JCHNSON in Cuba.

In the USER, JOHNSON will talk to representatives of the International Department, Central Committee, CPSU and receive a briefing. This briefing is a task which these representatives very happily took over since they feel that JOHNSON will add one more individual favorable to them in Cuba who they can use to surround FIDEL CASTRO to protect that individual from views and influences of those individuals they do not consider reliable.

Already, as of mid-August, 1963, a representative of the CPUSA, who was at that time in Moscow, met with representatives of the International Department, Central Committee, CPSU, and turned ever credentials for JOHNSON which the CPSU will submit to Cuba. It was also pointed out to these International Department representatives that HENRY WINSTON, Vice Chairman, CPUSA, who is now temporarily residing in the Seviet Union, will meet with JOHNSON and accompany her at some period during her Moscow visit to the Cuban Embassy there. WINSTON as

b6 b7C an official representative of the CPUSA will advise the Cubans formally that JOHNSON will be proceeding to that country to act as "The Worker" correspondent and official representative of the CPUSA. The Seviets felt that it was a good idea for WINSTON to accompany JOHNSON to the Cuban Embassy for initial introductions and in this way they could completely stay out of the picture. In fact, they stated they had such little contact with the Embassy that they did not, in fact, know who handled Party relations in this Embassy.

There were also discussions held in mid-August, 1963, with HENRY WINSTON at Moscow at which time it was emphasized to him that he should talk to JOHNSON before the visit to the Cuban Embassy and her departure from Cuba. During these talks it was emphasized it would be very important for him to instruct JOHNSON, who at times has a bent for the leftists and has some tendency to react emotionally under certain circumstances, that she must not deviate in any way whatsoever from the CPUSA line when she arrives in Cuba.

When JOHNSOM arrives in Cube she will carry with her formal regards from the CPUSA as well as a complete recording of Beethoven's composition, "Fidelius" (PM), which are to be turned over to Premier CASTRO.

It has also been learned that prior to JCHNSON's departure for Cuba the Soviets will turn over to her \$500 which had been left for her in Moscow by the above noted CPUSA representative.

This money was left for her in order that she will have enough funds available to cover her immediate living expenses in Cuba.

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Chairman, CP, USA, who is temporarily residing in the Soviet Union; and, JOHN WILLIAMSON, a member of the National Committee, CP of Great Britain, who was visiting in the Soviet Union during 8/63. Source stated he was not specifically able at this time to attribute any information to a particular individual.

The enclosed letterhead memorandum has been classified "TOP SEAST" since it sets forth information furnished by CG 5824-S*, a most highly placed sensitive source who is furnishing information on the highest level concerning the international communist movement, the disclosure of which could tend to identify this source and thus adversely affect the national defense interest.

The enclosed letterhead memorandum has been shown as having been made at Washington, D. C., in order to further protect the identity of this source.

The submission of the above-captioned letterhead memorandum completes the dissemination of all information received from CG 5824-S* in connection with the 13th Solo Mission. On 9/9/63 CG 5824-S* advised that on the basis of what limited notes he did possess and current personal recollections, he felt that all information which he had secured had been reported to the Bureau. However, he stated that there was the possibility that he might recall some minor details and if such matters do come to his mind, they would be immediately made available to the Bureau. It is also possible, he noted, that there could be action upon inquiries he made while abroad which will subsequently come to his attention and which will be reported.

In reviewing the information he had furnished concerning the 13th Solo Mission, CG 5824-S* felt convinced that he had not missed reporting any significant item of intelligence value to the Bureau or any other branch of the government.

Chicago also desires to point out at this time that the targets set forth for the 13th Solo Mission and outlined in Buairtel of 7/26/63 were again reviewed with CG 5824-S* following his return. At this time CG 5824-S* advised that all information pertinent to the points outlined in this list of targets had been reported by him.

Since it is felt that the following may be of interest to the Bureau, the complete itinerary and schedule of CG 5824-S*'s activities for the period 8/7-9/6/63, which encompasses the

initiation of the 13th Solo Mission through the final debriefing session, is set forth below:

A source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, in early September, 1963, advised as follows:

Based on comments of and opinions rendered by a number of individuals holding leadership positions in the Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU), as well as by other individuals active in the international communist movement, the following has been learned:

The overwhelming majority of the Communist and Workers Parties throughout the world are now supporting the ideological position of the CPSU as against the position of the Communist Party of China (CPC). In Europe, for example, the Albanian Workers Party is the only Party echoing the CPC viewpoint. While most European Parties do have some individuals and/or small factions who support the Chinese, none of these individuals or factions represent a threat to the existing leadership. Some Parties, like the CP of Great Britain, do not enter openly into the present controversy but they support the CPSU down the line.

All Parties in Africa are organizationally at this stage anti-Chinese and endorse the CPSU program. Recently a delegation from the CP of Sudan visited and toured the Soviet

Union. They openly criticized the Chinese and called them crazy for attacking the CPSU. The CPs of Senegal, Algeria, and the Union of South Africa are one hundred percent behind the CPSU efforts.

In Latin America, all of the Parties support the CPSU, although there do exist some dissident elements in some of the Parties. The Party coming closest to supporting the CPC is the CP of Venezuela. In this Party there is a large minority who are in favor of armed rebellion.

In Asia and the Far East the CPC has the support of the CPS of Malaya and Burma. Obviously, the situation in regard to these Parties could not be different since both maintain their headquarters in exile in Peking, China. The Korean Party of Labor and the Workers Party of Vietnam are also lined up with the Chinese but neither have, to a great extent, vocally supported the Chinese. The CP of New Zealand is also in the Chinese camp but it has been "bought out." The CP of Japan is inclined toward the Chinese but is still wavering.

The vast majority of the Parties in the international movement desire that the CPSU and the CPC continue to meet in an effort to resolve their differences but few Parties see any possibility that this can be accomplished. The majority of the Parties also favor an international gathering of all Parties but ask that there not be any compromise on the principles involved. If such a conference is held in the near future, the CPSU presently believes that all Parties now lined up behind them would support them at such a conference.

A source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, in early September, 1963, advised as follows:

In mid-August, 1963, Laurence Sharkey, General Secretary, Communist Party of Australia (CPA), while visiting in Prague, Czechoslovakia, was heard to remark that one (first name unknown) Hill, a member of the Political Bureau, CPA, had lined up with the Communist Party of China (CPC) in their ideological dispute with the Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU). Because of his stand, Hill received and accepted an invitation to visit Peking, China. After his arrival in Peking, Hill made public statements of support of the CPC and as a result of his lining up with the CPC and making these statements, the CPA took action and expelled him from the Party. According to Sharkey, Hill's expulsion subsequently resulted in approximately fifty to sixty other members leaving the Party and joining up with Hill's faction.

Based on comments and opinions of persons holding leadership positions in the Communist Parties of the Soviet Union and Czechoslovakia as well as comments and opinions of other persons in the Soviet Union who have had recent contact with individuals or delegations from a number of Latin American Communist Parties, the following was learned concerning the below-enumerated Communist Parties:

Communist Party of Argentina

This Party, according to its present leadership, fully endorses the Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU) in its ideological struggles with the Communist Party of China (CPC). The leadership of this Party, particularly Victorio Cordovilla, played an important role in influencing a change in the position of Premier Fidel Castro of Cuba which occurred during that individual's trip to the Soviet Union in May, 1963.

Communist Party of Brazil

The Communist Party of Brazil fully supports the CPSU but does have within its ranks some dissident elements. This Party in the eyes of the CPSU has played a very important role and was the main go-between in lining Castro up behind the CPSU.

Communist Party of Chile

The Communist Party of Chile is lined up on all ideological matters with the CPSU.

Communist Party of Mexico

The Communist Party of Mexico supports the CPSU one hundred percent.

Communist Party of Peru

By far, a large majority of the Communist Party of Peru is lined up behind the CPSU although there are a few individuals in the Party advocating armed revolt and, as such, support the CPC line. The President of the Peasants Union of Peru while on a recent trip to the Soviet Union stated he felt that they had won important electoral victories in that country on the basis of the Soviet Union's line of peaceful coexistence.

Communist Party of Uruguay

This Party backs the present CPSU position one hundred percent and (I's speaking out openly against the CPC.

Communist Party of Venezuela

The Communist Party of Venezuela is split with a small majority endorsing the CPSU and a large minority calling for armed rebellion. The split is so significant that even famous families like the Macholdos are supporting opposite positions. For example, Gustavo Macholdo does not believe in

Armed uprising and supports the CPSU, but his brother Edwardo Macholdo is calling for armed rebellion. While the majority of the Venezuelan Party is against armed rebellion, there is little they can do concerning the elimination of the minority view.

The Soviets compare Edwardo Macholdo and those like him who advocate armed rebellion to the social revolutionaries in the Soviet Union in the days of the Czars. However, the CPSU will not intervene in inner-Party matters of the Communist Party of Venezuela.

They still repeat the story of the alleged remarks of Comrade Nikita S. Khrushchev, First Secretary, CPSU, made to Edwardo Macholdo a number of months ago which were to the following effect:

If you want rifles, tell us how many. If you want machine guns, tell us how many. If you want cannons, tell us how many. All we ask is that it be requested by a majority from your Party.

Vitaly Korianov, the Chief Deputy to Boris N. Ponomarev, a member of the Secretariat and Head of the International Department, Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU), in mid-August, 1963, advised that Dipa N. Aidit, a leading member of the Communist Party of Indonesia (CPI), had visited the Soviet Union recently following a trip which had taken him to Cuba, the German Democratic Republic, and Czechoslovakia.


While Aidit was in the Soviet Union, he had a four-hour meeting with Nikita S. Khrushchev, First Secretary of the CPSU. The meeting was devoted to a discussion of ideological matters and the current differences existing between the CPSU and the Communist Party of China (CPC). It was held primarily for the purpose of convincing Aidit of the correctness of the current CPSU position. As it turned out, this meeting was a very one-sided affair with Comrade Khrushchev doing all of the talking and Aidit not saying one word.

In addition to his meeting with Comrade Khrushchev, Aidit was also taken out in the field to observe some tactical maneuvers of Soviet military forces.

It is the opinion of Korianov and other leading CPSU representatives at this time that they cannot see how Aidit could possibly support the CPC ideological policies in the future. They base this opinion primarily on the fact that Aidit is a Minister, without portfolio, in President Sukarno's Cabinet in Indonesia and on the fact that Sukarno has already initialled the treaty banning nuclear tests which was recently concluded between the Soviet Union, Great Britain, and the United States of America. They feel that if Aidit should follow in any manner or enunciate in any way a pro-Chinese policy, he would jeopardize and do harm to his own government and would also jeopardize his own political position.

Re Chicago teletype 8/26/63 captioned as above, advising that CG 5824-S* had returned to this country on 8/25/63 and was in New York following the 13th successful Solo mission to the USSR and Prague, where he was sent on specific instructions of GUS HALL for the sole purpose of securing first-hand information for HALL and the Communist Party (CP), USA, leadership concerning the results and significance of the Soviet-Sino discussions which were terminated in Moscow on 7/20/63. Re also subsequent airtels captioned above setting forth the outstanding results accomplished by this latest mission.

Recommendation is being made in connection with this mission and based upon results and extraordinary risks involved, for an award for CG 5824-S* in the amount of \$1,000. This recommendation is based upon the unusual risks involved in any trip behind the Iron Curtain and particularly because of the courage displayed by this informant in accomplishing the 13th Solo mission trip behind the Iron Curtain for the Bureau.

This was a most difficult trip for this informant for three reasons: First, because of its suddenness, in that HALL instructed the informant initially to be on his way within a week; Secondly, because of his health in that his health was so delicate up to the very time of his departure and thirdly because

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the informant's wife, for the first time since their recent marriage, knew of his assignment and was fearful of the effect it would have on his health and insisted on going with him, if for no other reason than to help him physically to move around. The informant was placed in the difficult position of having to refuse to permit his wife to go with him because he knew that from the standpoint of the CPUSA and the CPSU, her presence could not be explained.

As was stated in retel, the informant left Chicago on 8/7/63 and returned after air travel involving thousands of miles, on the evening of 8/25/63, in a state of physical and mental exhaustion. Nevertheless, on the very night of his return and for three succeeding days, he insisted on meeting the contacting agents in New York for lengthy debriefing sessions before he made his presence known to the CPUSA and before he engaged in any meetings with HALL. For the next two days he engaged in lengthy debriefing sessions involving as many as 18 hours a day with GUS HALLand ELIZABETH GURLEY FLYNN. The informant returned to Chicago on the evening of 8/30/63 where he was again met by the SAC and contacting agents and spent over four hours in detailing the results lof his trip. Over-all, he spent approximately eight days in the Soviet Union and four days in Czechoslovakia. The remainder of the time involved was for travel purposes and making arrangements for entry behind the Iron Curtain, which involved ingenuity and aggressiveness, particularly in London at the Czech Embassy where the informant appeared unannounced. The informant's dedication, loyalty and patriotism in the face of the demands of the CPUSA to the detriment of his health are certainly most noteworthy and worthy of recognition.

The results of the informant's information from this trip again have been outstanding both from the standpoint of intelligence information for the Bureau and to the other interested intelligence agencies and the President himself. Some of the information developed, in fact, could form a basis for future foreign policy. The results of this mission have been submitted to the Bureau in detail and for this reason only a few items of outstanding importance are being detailed in justification for this recommendation.

In addition to this recommendation there is attached herewith a copy of a proposed personal letter to be sent by the Director to CG 5824-S* which, if approved, will be exhibited to the informant and then retained in Chicago files.

Recommendations for responsible agent and stenographic personnel will be the subject of a separate communication.

One copy of this letter is being designated for the New York Division because it is felt that recommendations for this bonus payment cannot be made without considering the outstanding and extraordinary services to the over-all operation of CG 5824-S* and the Solo mission itself, which were rendered by NY 694-S*. This informant operation is considered a package operation which could not exist without the combined services and constant attention of both informants. Preceding the mission in question, CG 5824-S* met with NY 694-S* and NY 694-S* was instrumental in making what arrangements were possible to facilitate this informant's trip, with the Soviet Embassy in Washington. NY 694-S* was also heavily relied upon by CG 5824-S* for frequent contacts with GUS HALL and the CP immediately prior to this trip. In addition, the New York infattant has serviced CG 5824-S* through the handling of the drops and atthrough the submission of coded messages and through all through the submission of coded messages and through all the work and duties incidental to personal contacts with the Soviet principal involved in this operation. Again, upon the return of CG 5824-S* from this mission, the services of NY 694-S* were relied upon to make arrangements for the briefing by the informant of ELIZABETH GURLEY FLYNN as well as GUS HALL. It is therefore the feeling of the Chicago Office that consideration should be given to a bonus award for NY 694-S* in an amount of lesser proportion. inasmuch as the New York informant was not involved in the physical risk of the Solo mission.

New York is requested to submit is comments on this matter as well as its comments with regard to a personal letter from the Director to the New York informant.

New York is further requested to make recommendations with regard to the utilization of agent and stenographic personnel by the Chicago agents on special assignment to the New York Office for the debriefing of CG 5824-S*.

Following are some of the more outstanding results from this recent Solo mission:

SUMMARY OF RESULTS OF THE 13TH SOLO MISSION

The 13th Solo mission began on 8/7/63 at Chicago, Illinois and was terminated upon the informant's arrival in New York on the evening of 8/25/63 after spending approximately eight days in the Soviet Union and four days in Czechoslovakia. He made transit stops in England and Zurich, during the course of this trip. Detailed information has been furnished the Bureau concerning the outstanding results of this trip, some of which are summarized below:

1) The informant conferred at length with BORIS N. PONOMAREV. member of the Secretariat and Head of the International Department of the Central Committee, Communist Party, Soviet Union (CPSU), and with V. KORIANOV, Deputy to PONOMAREV and other high Soviet officials. As a result of these conferences source, just prior to his departure from Moscow, was provided with a 24 page typewritten text for viewing and study purposes only, of a document entitled "Information Letter of CC, CPSU, on the Results of a Meeting of Representatives of the CPSU and the CPC which is Directed to Fraternal Parties". The original text of the document had been approved by the Presidium of the CPSU on the previous Monday and the informant is certain that he was one of, if not the first, CP representative of another country to view this document. The informant was not permitted to retain the document and it was thus necessary for him to copy the text of the document at night on thin paper in longhand at the risk of being detected. He furnished his almost complete notes of the text of the document which he subsequently filled in during interview, thus affording the Bureau with the most reliable first-hand information of the Sino-Soviet conflict available. This document confirms China's attitude of hostility during the entire period of the conference. It details charges made by the Chinese against the USSR and it indicates no offer by the Chinese in the way of ideas for and the settlement. It reaffirms the Chinese position enunciated by MAO Tsetung that the annihilation of one-half of the population of the earth can be justified in a nuclear war in the interests of socialism. It also confirms published statements of the CPSU on its position that thermonuclear war is unacceptable to the victory of communism.

On the question of national liberation, the CPSU rebuffed the CPC charge that the Soviet Union's aim is to abolish the national liberation revolution when the CPSU cited the furnishing of arms to Algeria, Indonesia, Laos, Yemen and other Arab states. The CPC rejected CPSU proposals for improving relations between the two countries. The document concluded by stating that the CPC is out to

split the international communist movement by substituting adventuristic nationalistic disruption policies. It predicts that the CPC will link up with Trotskyism and that the CPC will not stop its open polemics against the CPSU.

In addition to this most important document, the source was able to provide the essence of the contents of speeches of the most important leading Soviet and Chinese delegates to this conference, including SUSLOV and TENG Hsiao-ping, General Secretary of the CPC. The informant again, while provided with the original documents, was not permitted to transport them and his notes were lengthy and detailed, affording him the opportunity to reconstruct the almost total essence of these key speeches.

- 2) The source through PONOMAREV learned that the CPSU is setting up a future International Communist Conference in about six months and does not feel that the Chinese can be left out.
- 3) On the atomic ban treaty the source was able to provide information that the Soviet leaders view the signing of the treaty as a most serious move. The leaders however are distressed by press dispatches concerning debate in the United States and particularly in the Senate regarding approving of this treaty and this debate is causing the Soviets to question whether the U.S. can be trusted and whether they, the Soviets, should have driven a harder bargain to prevent the Chinese from using the treaty against them, the Soviets.
- 4) Informant met and had contact with Dr. KAREL DUDA, newly appointed Czech Ambassador to the USA. These discussions were held in Prague prior to the departure of DUDA for the U.S. where he will take his official assignment. The discussion concerned Czech interests in the U.S., the contemplated policy of the Czech Government of attempting to encourage tourism to Czechoslovakia and of the Czech intent to use particular groups in the U.S. to improve Czech-American relations. Moves are also contemplated by the Czechs to encourage the exchange of labor delegations between countries.
- 5) Informant was able to obtain plans of the CPSU to refute charges of the CPC on the ideological dispute. CPSU is to publish 16 articles in which they will polemize with CPC and refute charges publicly made by the CPC to appear in "Pravda" and "Izvestia".
- 6) Source furnished information concerning an international cadre school and learned that there has been a deluge of students particularly from Latin America passing through Prague en route to this school. Informant himself witnessed 24 people from Brazil and 12 from Columbia in transit to the Soviet Union for this school.

- 7) Source obtained information that the CPC is subsidizing the CP of New Zealand.
- 8) Source furnished information that ALFRED and MARTHA STERN, former espionage agents, departed for Cuba from Prague in August, 1963. Their son registered for the U.S. draft at the U.S. Embassy in Prague.
- 9) Source, through his high official Russian contacts, obtained the statement that the CPSU is sold on the HALL leadership of the Party and is full of gratitude for the support the American Party has given in its ideological dispute. This information was considered excellent because it affords the informant the opportunity to build himself up in the eyes of HALL for the selling job he has done with the Soviets.
- 10) Source furnished extensive information and details concerning the de-Stalinization efforts on the part of the Czech Party. Also, this information confirms the efforts of Czech officials to liberalize democratic ideas in Czechoslovakia.
- 11) Source received the instruction that the CP of Puerto Rico is being reassigned to the American Party having prior to this time been the responsibility of the CP of Cuba.
- 12) Source furnished information concerning the CPSU view of Premier CASTRO and some details concerning CASTRO's visit to the USSR. He furnished details to the effect that KHRUSHCHEV had lengthy conversations with CASTRO to convince him of the need to make Cuba a showplace for communism for display to other Latin American countries in order that these people could be won over. KHRUSHCHEV stressed the need for CASTRO's building of a solid economy and for him to work hard so that the glow of the Cuban revolution would not wear off on other Latin Americans.
- 13) Source also furnished information concerning ROBERT WILLIAMS, an American Negro in Cuba, and of the difficulties Cuba was having with WILLIAMS because of his nationalistic enunciations in Cuba and his arrogance.
- 14) Furnished information concerning subsidization of the publications "Ludovy Noviny" and "Nova Doba" by the Czech CP.

- 15) Furnished detailed information concerning the fate of three American women who went to the USSR many years ago, became the wives of officials, were victims of the STALIN purges and who were being rehabilitated currently by the CPSU.
- 16) Source made arrangements with NORMAN FREED, Canadian representative to the World Marxist Review for the utilization of new drop in Canada for the handling of confidential matters.
- 17) Scurce furnished information concerning the presence of communist leadership from Australia in the Soviet Union and Prague and was able to furnish information to the effect that the CP of Australia is supporting the CPSU ideological dispute and this support is based on issues of war and peace as well as on issues of race.
- 18) Identified IGOR MIKHAILOV as an important English and Spanish translator for communist dignaturies who traveled to the USSR.
- 19) Informant had personal contact with VLADIMAR BARKOVSKY, former principal of NY 694-S*, who was attached to the Soviet mission and is currently a member of the Secret Service Department of the Central Committee, CPSU. Informant discussed the present communications apparatus involving NY 694-S* and his new Russian principal and perfected additional arrangements. He also discussed additional coded radio communications and verified the continued existence of the Mexican apparatus of which CG 5824-S* is a part. Informant attempted to arrange a "fast reserve" apparatus and BARKOVSKY promised the CPSU would look into this matter in the immediate future.

BARKOVSKY briefed informant as to the desires of the Soviets for information concerning Chinese sympathizers and received assignments from BARKOVSKY in this regard. BARKOVSKY in conclusion indicated complete satisfactions of the Soviets with the apparatus headed by CG 5824-S* and NY 694-S****

- 20) Informant furnished information concerning possible sending by the Soviets of HENRY WINSTON to Viet Nam for the purpose of softening the communist influence in South East Asia. WINSTON was also permitted to remain an additional six months in the Soviet Union. Considerable information concerning WINSTON's marital status and contemplated marital efforts was obtained.
- 21) Informant was able to obtain information concerning GEORGE LOHR, Berlin correspondent of "The Worker", who is negotiating to travel to other countries.

22) Informant furnished information concerning the Soviet suspicions of ALBERT KAHN and subsequently learned from GUS HALL that KAHN is "not one of us" and that the Party dees not utilize KAHN for trips to the Soviet Union.

23) Informant obtained information that the Seviets are permitting HENRY WINSTON, to study in the USSR.

24) Informant furnished information that WILLIAM L.

PATTERSON now studying in Russia, centemplates visiting either through a trip to Mexico or Canada. Subsequently these plans were changed and she visited the U.S.

- 25) Informant identified a new publishing house called "Foreign Literature" which is operated by the Soviets. Informant also negotiated with the Soviets concerning present CP publishing houses in the U.S.
- 26) Informant obtained information to the effect that.
 ABE CHAPMAN and wife are returning to the U.S. fer Party assignment in this country.
- 27) Informant furnished current information concerning travels of JOHN WILLIAMSON to the Seviet Union, his health and possible future plans which might include his being assigned as CPUSA representative to the staff of the World Marxist Review.
- 28) Informant furnished information that the Seviets have agreed to accept LEM HARRIS as a student in Mescow.
- 29) Informant was told by the Soviets that they are in a position and desired to provide GUS HALL with a pure-bred stallien worth thousands of dollars but that the transaction will have to be handled in a legal manner.
- the alleged border incidents occurring between the USSR and China, including a mass migration of 60,000 starving Chinese into the Soviet Union. It is noted that this migration, with twisted explanations, was publicized in the China press within the last few days.

The contents and details of your reports, particularly the speeches of key leaders and the official report which you obtained under such trying circumstances demenstrated that your patriotism and dedication to duty go far beyond those expected of a human being. All of the materials are being appropriately analyzed and placed in the hands of our most responsible officials having interest in these matters.

I continue to be deeply concerned with reports I receive on your physical condition and caution you to conserve your energies wherever possible while at the same time seeking the best medical attention obtainable to improve your general health. I would hope that you and your wife can find time in the immediate future to visit with your fine son.

Kindly convey my warmest regards to your dear wife.

The enclosed letterhead memorandum has been classified "Dor Sherber" since it sets forth information furnished by CG 5824-S*, a most highly placed sensitive source who is

INFORMATION CONCERNING AMIRIT SHRIPAT DANGE, CHAIRMAN, COMMUNIST PARTY OF INDIA

A source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, in early September, 1963, advised as follows:

It is the opinion of some leading representatives of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU) as well as other individuals holding leadership positions in other Communist Parties that Amirit Shripat Dange, Chairman of the Communist Party of India, is presently playing into the hands of the Chinese. They all base their opinion on the fact that Dange, as a long-time trade union person, has developed a tendency to compromise and will not stand on principle. To illustrate their point, they cite his complete lack of criticism of the administration of Prime Minister Jawaharlal of India even though there are hundreds of Communist Party of India members languishing in Indian prisons.

This document contains neither recommendations nor conclusions of the FBI. It is the property of the FBI and is loaned to your agency; it and its contents are not to be distributed outside your agency.

Reurairtel 9/10/63 enclosing letterhead memorandum (LHM) captioned "Discussions with Representatives of the International Department, Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union, Concerning Reimbursement of Fares and Other Matters Regarding Delegations to the Soviet Union."

Referenced LHM discloses that CG 5824-S*, while in the Soviet Union on his recent Solo Mission, received from Soviet officials the sum of approximately \$2,600 as reimbursement to the Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), for expenses in connection with travel of CPUSA delegations to the Soviet Union.

On the occasion of your next contact with CG 5824-S* it should be determined if the funds informant received from the Soviets on his recent Solo Mission are to be considered a part of Solo funds. The Bureau should be promptly advised with respect to this matter.

NOTE:

CG 5824-S*, while in the Soviet Union in August, 1963, on a Solo Mission, discussed with Soviet officials the fact that the CPUSA had not been reimbursed for the expenses of CPUSA delegations which had visited the Soviet Union. After much deliberation, the Soviet officials gave informant the sum of approximately \$2,600 as reimbursement to the CPUSA for the expenses of the CPUSA delegates. A question has arisen as to whether this sum informant received from the Soviets is to be considered in our accounting of the total amount of funds the Soviets have supplied to the CPUSA and Chicago is being requested to contact CG 5824-S* in order to resolve this.

Jessica Smith, a long time member of the Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), is the wife of John Abt, CPUSA Attorney. "New World Review" is a monthly communist propaganda organ devoted to the Soviet Union and satellite countries. It is published in New York City and was formerly known as "Soviet Russia Today."

In the way of background, CG 5824-S* returned to the United States on 8-25-63 from a Solo Mission to Moscow where he held confidential discussions with Soviet officials on matters relating to the CPUSA. Prior to departing on this Solo Mission, CG 5824-S* was instructed by Gus Hall, CPUSA General Secretary, to take up with the Soviets the matter of a financial subsidy for the "New World Review." Hall indicated that Jessica Smith had told him that due to lack of funds it was impossible to continue this publication. Smith claimed that in the past funds for the "New World Review" were furnished by Soviets to who acted as a go-between. However; due to a consolidation of news agency in the Soviet Union about a year ago, Smith had completely lost contact with the Soviets and her

requests for funds have been ignored.

OBSERVATION:

This is another example of the extent to which the Soviets will go to insure that communist propaganda in the United States is kept functioning.

DISCUSSIONS WITH REPRESENTATIVES OF THE INTERNATIONAL DEPARTMENT, CENTRAL COM-MITTEE, COMMUNIST PARTY OF THE SOVIET UNION, CONCERNING REIMBURSEMENT OF FARES AND OTHER MATTERS REGARDING DELEGATIONS TO THE SOVIET UNION

During discussions with representatives of the International Department, Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU), including Aleksei Andreevich Grechukhin, Assistant to the Head of the North and South American Section of the International Department, the matter regarding the reimbursement to the Communist Party, USA (CP, USA) for the fares of individuals and groups invited to visit the Soviet Union by that country was raised. One matter specifically dealt with at this time related to the reimbursement of the fares for a trade union delegation which had been sent to the Soviet Union earlier this year at the request of a Soviet trade union organization.

Specifically in regard to this trade union delegation, these representatives of the International Department advised that they had not invited the trade union group as guests of their Department and, as a result, it was the responsibility of the trade union group in the Soviet Union which had issued the official invitation. Since they issued this invitation, the expenses for this CP, USA trade union delegation belonged to that organization. They had, however, checked with the trade union organization in the Soviet Union and the people who had invited the CP, USA delegation and had been advised that at this time they had no funds available to reimburse the CP, USA for the fares of the trade union delegation but that they would pledge that after their new budget is approved and that money becomes available, they would pay the fares for four of the individuals who participated in the trade union delegation. However, Grechukhin volunteered the information that in their Department they did have a little extra money "to play around with" and if the CP, USA representative, then carrying on the discussions, would not make any further financial requests, they would approve three fares for this trade union delegation at the rate of \$500

each. To accomplish this, they would add to their list as invitees of their Department three additional names. Since they had allegedly invited such individuals, they would then be responsible for handling the expense. In this manner the CP, USA would get immediate reinbursement for at least three members of that trade union delegation which had, in fact, exceeded the total number invited. Among the names they subsequently added to their list were that of Buth Davidow, who was already in the Soviet Union traveling on a ticket provided to her by the Cubans, and a Mr. X, who was, in fact, Morris Childs. The third name they added to the list was not mentioned. As a result, Grechukhin subsequently turned over a sum of money totaling \$1,500 to be transmitted to the CP, USA as reimbursement for travel expenses.

In addition, Grechukhin also provided another amount of money totaling \$1,099.40 which he stated was to cover the payment of the fares for Isadore Meedleman and wife in connection with their recent visit to the Soviet Union. It is to be noted that the CP, USA had previously paid the fares of these individuals to the Soviet Union.

After the above-noted financial settlement had been made. Grechukhin informed, as well as warned, that in the future if an invitation is received by the CP, USA to send a delegation. to the Soviet Whlon, they must first find out who invited such delegation and what department or organization was to be the host. If such an invitation originated with the CPSU, then the International Department should be dealt with and it would handle matters relating to reinbursement for fares and other expenses. However, if it is a trade union organization or the like which invites the Party to send a delegation, then someone from the Party should go to the Soviet Embassy in Washington, B.C., and negotiate with them on money. If it is a writers? organization, for example, let them argue in Washington with the Cultural Attache's office. Grechukhin then noted that it must be remembered that the trade union organizations, writers' groups, and even they, themselves, operate on a budget basis and the currency they possess is strictly allocated. Therefore, if the trade union or writers' organization says it is inviting so many people and no more, they are limited to reinbursement of fares for that number of people. So, if the trade union people say send five, don't send seven or eight as they do not have the money to reimburse you.

Millen On the evening of 9/6/63 a pocket-sized radio transceiver was brought by courier from the New York Office to the Electronics Section for analysis. This transceiver had been received by the New York Office from an informant who had been given same by Soviet agents. Instructions (copy attached) given the informant advised him regarding the method in which the equipment was to be used. The transceiver was identified as a commercial-type citizens band transceiver manufactured in Japan. No name was indicated on the unit; however, similar types have been observed in the Laboratory previously. The equipment was subjected to various tests. The device transmits and receives signals at a frequency of 27.065 MC/s and also has provisions to receive, via a tunable dial, regular broadcast stations (500 to 1600 KC). The unit was well constructed and appeared to be efficient for its purpose. Tests showed that the receiver in the unit had good sensitivity and that the frequency of operation was accurate as compared to the frequency marked on the crystals in the unit. Along with the transceiver, the informant was given a small hand-held signal source having markings as depicted in the attached photographs. When the unit was received by the New York Office, the switch shown in the photograph was set at a marking of 1.40. Tests showed that this signal source transmitted a signal on 1.40 MC when a small "button" on the side of the device was pressed. The/signal from this device could also be heard on radio receivers at half the above frequency of .725 Mc/s. Both the above signals could be received on the broadcast portion of the transceiver tested. As can be learned from the instructions given the informant, the signal source was meant to be used to mark a point on the broadcast dial of the transceiver where signals from the signal marker is heard loudest. During the course of Solo Mission 13 in August, 1963, CG 5824-S* had occasion to hold confidential discussions with representatives of the International Department of the Central Committee of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU) concerning Henry Winston, National Vice-Chairman, Communist Party, USA (CPUSA). The following pertinent information regarding Winston was obtained by CG 5824-S*.

In the way of background, Winston's 8-year prison sentence for violation of the Smith Act of 1940 and contempt of court was commuted by President Kennedy and Winston was released from Federal custody on 6/30/61. Winston has been in the Soviet Union since September, 1961, where he has been given medical treatment in an effort to improve his eyesight. He has been put on exhibition by the Soviets in Russia and other socialist countries as an example of "capitalist sadism."

Boris N. Ponomarev, Head of the Soviet International Department, and V. Korianov, Ponomarev's Chief Deputy, advised that? the CPSU regards Winston as the greatest living example of United States imperialistic brutality. In an effort to counteract the Chinese racial line, the CPSU had planned to send Winston to North Vietnam. The CPSU feels that Winston, a Negro, could exert influence on the North Vietnamese toward having them change their position in support of the Chinese. However, in traveling to North Vietnam it would be necessary for Winston to stop in China, and the CPSU feels that the Chinese might influence Winston to the extent which would cause him to support the Chinese line. Therefore, the CPSU has not taken any further steps to formalize its plans to send Winston to North Vietnam.

This is to recommend that the Attorney General be advised of comments conveyed by Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), to the Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CCCPSU), in answer to the CCCPSU's request for his suggestions relative to Sino-Soviet relations.

You will recall that CG 5824-S*, while on a Solo Mission in the Soviet Union during August, 1963, was told by officials of the CCCPSU of the Soviets' plans to hold a conference of all fraternal parties in the immediate future. CG 5824-S* was requested to have Gus Hall furnish the CCCPSU his opinion relative to the holding of such a conference, as well as any suggestions he might have for enabling the Soviets to more successfully "fight" the Chinese.

On 9/5/63, NY 694-S* had a meet with his Soviet contact. On this occasion, NY 694-S* gave his Soviet contact a cipher-coded message from Gus Hall addressed to the CCCPSU in which Hall expressed his complete agreement with the Soviets' plan to hold a conference of all fraternal parties. Hall suggested that prior to the convening of the conference a discussion should be held among all fraternal parties on such issues as disarmament, peace and the liberation movement. Hall also suggested to the CCCPSU that the Chinese be kept on the defensive by continually "blasting away at them."

OBSERVATIONS:

 $\mathcal{B}_{\mathrm{By}}$ letter dated 9/4/63, we advised the Attorney General of the fact that the CCCPSU had solicited Gus Hall's opinion and suggestions concerning Sino-Soyiet relations. It is believed that Hall's answer to the CCCPSU would also be of interest to the Attorney General in portraying the close relationship that exists between the CCCPSU and the CPUSA. The fact that the Soviets plan to hold a conference of all fraternal parties in the immediate future was previously disseminated to top Government officials seminated to top Government officials.



A source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, during early September, 1963, advised as follows:

In mid-August, 1963, Henry Winston, Vice Chairman, Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), who is presently temporarily residing in Moscow, USSR, commented that he had learned from his contact with various individuals from Latin American Communist Parties who had recently visited the Soviet Union, that Robert Williams, the former official of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People from Monroe, North Carolina, who fled the United States to avoid prosecution on an outstanding warrant and is now in Cuba, is always quick to grab hold of differences existing in the international communist movement. It was because of such differences that Williams recently wrote his two letters to MAO Tse-tung, Chairman of the CP of China, which dealt with the racial issue.

Winston also noted that Williams had been planning a trip to the Soviet Union but now he, Winston, is of the opinion that Williams will go to Peking instead. In Peking, Winston feels that Williams will have the platform that he needs and desires in order to attack President Kennedy as well as the United States in general.

Winston also complained at this time that Williams in all of his speeches attacks the CPUSA in a vile manner but always fails to mention the Dixiecrats in the United States. However, Winston feels that Williams should be handled with kid gloves and no effort should be made by the CPUSA to polemize with him. It is his feeling that should the CPUSA attempt to polemize with Williams at the present time it would only give further ammunition to the Chinese. Winston stated that at the present time he is certain that Williams is either a Central Intelligence Agency plant and/or a misguided Trotskyist, however, he is not sure which category Williams falls into.

At that time, among other things, Kolobashkin remarked that the Soviets are trying to arrange a "Walkie-Talkie System" whereby they and informant can advise one another when it is desired contact be made. ... On the night of 9/5/63, NY 694-S* met with Kolobashkin. At that time Kolobashkin gave informant a box which contained equipment and a message of instructions. The equipment consisted of a two-way unit walkie-talkie (receiver and transmitter) and also an item described as a "tuner." The instructions for NY 694-S* were that he should connect the walkie-talkie unit to his car radio and to the aerial of that radio on Saturday, 9/7/63, at 1 P.M. informant was to drive from Third Avenue and East 66th Street toward Lexington Avenue, New York City. It is noted that this area is in the vicinity of the Soviet United Nations Mission. Informant at that time was to turn on his automobile radio set and should set the dial at about the middle of the band. He was then to hold the "tuner" near to the set and move the receiver dial until he got a peak hum from the "tuner." He was to put a mark on the radio dial at this frequency. In order to make this system effective, the informant was to be sent three signals on 9/7/63 to be used in connection with this "tuner." On Monday at 7°P.H., with his radio set at the desired frequency, informant was to drive over the same route mentioned above, at which time he was to send three signals. This equipment was brought to the Laboratory and examined 9/6/63: The results were set forth in a separate memorandum Millen to Conrad 9/9/9/63. Informant hooked up the walkie-talkie and followed the walkie instructions, which he had received from Kolobashkin which were somewhat ambiguous. equipment as instructed, he received no response on the walkie-talkie. On the night of 9/9/63 he again traveled over the prescribed route and sent three signals. However, he received no response that the signals had been received. The New York Office attempted to cover these contacts. However, there was so much traffic on the air during the pertinent time no sending or receiving signals could be made out.

Informant was also instructed on 9/5/63 to meet Kolobashkin on 9/12/63 at 3 P.M. at the Circus Bar meeting spot at which time informant is to return the "tuner." Informant is to keep the walkie-talkie. Kolobashkin stated that in the event informant had any difficulty in sending signals or receiving them this matter would be taken up during the 9/12/63 meet.

Informant was also instructed to have with him on 9/12/63 a small notebook so that he could take a rather long message for "Birch" (Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA).

Informant raised the question as to whether he could be equipped with a recorder mounted on his person or clothing in a hidden fashion in carrying out the meet on 9/12/63. In evaluating the risks involved in allowing informant to be equipped with this recorder, it was felt that the dangers coutweigh the benefits and the New York Office was telephonically instructed that the informant is not to use a recorder for this meet.

COMMENTS OF GUS HALL, GENERAL SECRETARY, COMMUNIST PARTY, USA, (CPUSA) REGARDING UTILIZATION BY SOVIETS OF HENRY WINSTON BEFORE THAT INDIVIDUAL'S RETURN TO U.S.

According to GUS HALL, General Secretary, CPUSA, on 9/13/63, the U.S. Government has now started legal action to bring HENRY WINSTON, Vice Chairman, CPUSA, who is now temporarily residing in the Soviet Union, back to the United States. Since this is the situation and because the U.S. Government undoubtedly will pick up WINSTON's U.S. passport at the time of the return, efforts should new be made to use WINSTON to the greatest possibility before such return actually occurs. Accordingly, HALL suggested that the Soviets be advised as follows:

If the Soviet Union can guarantee to get WINSTON to North Viet Mam and back again safely to the Soviet Union, without any stopovers in the People's Republic of China, they have his authority to use WINSTON for the purposes they suggested. In addition, WINSTON can go to Cuba, if he and the Soviets desire on his way back to the United States.

A confidential source which has furnished reliable information in the past recently learned from an official of the Communist Party of Australia (CPA) that one (first name unknown) Hill, a member of the Political Bureau, CPA, had supported the Chinese position in the Sino-Soviet ideological dispute. As a result, Hill received and accepted an invitation to visit Peking, China. After his arrival in Peking, Hill made public statements in support of the Communist Party of China. Because of his endorsement of the Chinese position, the CPA expelled Hill from the Party. Hill's expulsion subsequently resulted in approximately fifty to sixty other members' leaving the CPA and joining with Hill's faction.

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

The following information supplied by a source which has furnished reliable information in the past is being brought to your attention as a matter of possible interest.

The Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), in an effort to derive financial gain, is planning to secretly rent an exhibition booth at the International Pavilion of the forthcoming New York World's Fair. Gus Hall, CPUSA General Secretary, has remarked that he feels this will be a very profitable venture since none of the communist countries will be renting booths at the Fair. Hall anticipates that toys and handicraft products from the Soviet Union and satellite countries will be sold at the exhibition booth to be operated by CPUSA personnel.

Present plans call for the renting of an exhibition booth at the Fair in the name of an import-export company which will be covertly organized by the CPUSA. Hall plans to send two trusted CPUSA members abroad to make the necessary arrangements with the Soviet Union and satellite countries for the importation of products to be sold at the Fair.

KOLOBASHKIN, the latter gave to NY 694-S* a "walkie-talkie" outfit, together with a tuner, and also a note reflecting that on Saturday, 9/7/63, at 3:00 p.m., KOLOBASHKIN would attempt to send a radio signal to NY 694-S*, and that on Monday, 9/9/63, the informant was to attempt to send a radio signal to KOLOBASHKIN, using the aforementioned "walkie-talkie" outfit. The referenced airtel further reflected that on 9/12/63, at the 'Dann' rendezvous, KOLOBASHKIN would give to NY 694-S* some important information for GUS HALL, and he should be prepared to make notes thereon.

In anticipation of the probability that the information to be furnished to NY 694-S* by KOLOBASHKIN on 9/12/63 would be the content of the letter of the Central Committee, Communist Party, Soviet Union, (CCCPSU), on the results of the meeting of representatives of the CPSU and the CP of China (CPC), a copy of which was furnished to the Bureau by NY airtel 8/26/63, having been furnished by CG 5824-S*) the NYO made available to NY 694-S* a copy of the said Soviet letter in order that he might

know whether the information furnished by KOLOBASHKIN was identical with the content of the said Soviet letter.

On 9/13/63, NY 694-S* furnished the following information to SA ALEXANDER C. BURLINSON:

At 3:00 p.m. on 9/12/63, NY 694-S* met KOLOBASHKIN at the 'Dann" rendezvous and walked with the latter to Forest Park which is in the neighborhood. After seating themselves on a rock in an isolated part of the park, they first discussed the results of their respective attempts to contact each other by use of the walkieltalkie outfit mentioned above. NY 694-5* advised KOLOBASHKIN that he did not receive the latter's radio message on Saturday, 9/7/63, but was not certain whether his failure to do so was owing to an operative defect of the walkietalkie set or the fact that he had attempted to receive the signal in the wrong area. He told KOLOBASHKIN that the latter's instructions with respect to the place of reception had been ambiguous, in that KOLOBASHKIN had indicated that the informant was to send a signal to KOLOBASHKIN on 9/9/63 from the area of 66th Street and Third Avenue but had not stated where the informant was to be when KOLOBASHKIN sent his signal on 9/7/63.

KOLOBASHKIN stated that on 9/7/63, he had gone to the area of the informant's home in Long Island and therefore it was perfectly clear why the informant had not received his signal.

KOLOBASHKIN then told NY 694-S* that on 9/9/63, he had received a "very clear" signal from the informant when the latter sent the signal from the area of 66th Street and Third Avenue. KOLOBASHKIN admitted that his instructions to the informant with regard to where the informant was to receive his signal had been ambiguous and were responsible for the informant's not having received the signal.

It was then agreed between NY 694-S* and KOLOBASHKIN that KOLOBASHKIN would go into the area of the informant's home at 48th Street in Sunnyside, New York, on 9/13/63 at 10:30 a.m. and broadcast a signal to the informant. (The informant advised that he received this signal of KOLOBASHKIN's "loud and clear.")

It was also agreed that on Monday, 9/16/63 at 7:30 p.m., NY 694-S* should again attempt to send a signal to KOLOBASHKIN from the area of 66th Street and Lexington Avenue in New York City.

Upon completion of the discussion concerning the radio signals, KOLOBASHKIN handed to NY 694-S* a miniature magnetic wire recorder, 4-inches wide and 6-inches long, attached to which was a spool 1-inch in diameter. Attached to the recorder was a volume control and ear piece, which operated with a play-back unit. KOLOBASHKIN instructed the informant to put the recorder in his lap beneath a magazine and to insert the ear piece in his ear. He stated that the informant was about to hear a very important report, on which NY 694-S* was to make notes, and that it would be approximately an hour and a half before the informant would finish listening to the recording of the report.

After listening to the report for a short time, the informant became aware of the fact that the said report was identical with the letter of the Soviet Union mentioned above and already furnished to the Bureau by CG 5824-S*. To be consistent, the informant, who was being watched closely by KOLOBASHKIN, listened to the entire report and made notes thereon. In view of the fact that the above-described apparatus did not have a regulator for control of the speed of the voice, NY 694-S* stated he could not possibly make adequate or comprehensive notes on the report. He told KOLOBASHKIN that since he was not a stenographer or a speedwriter, it would be impossible for him to do other than to make brief notes on the content of the report. He further asked KOLOBASHKIN whether it would not be possible to furnish GUS HALL with the walking apparatus so that the latter personally might listen to the Soviet report. KOLOBASHKIN

NY 100-134637

stated that his instructions were that only NY 694-S* be permitted to listen to the report and that although he recognized the difficulties involved in the situation, there was nothing he could do about it. NY 694-S* stated that he continued for a while to make notes on the report, but that by reason of the fact that a thunder and lightening storm arose while they were sitting in the park, he and KOLOMSHKIN had to leave the area, lest they be struck by lightening. They feared that by reason of being in the area of trees, such could happen. From the park, they walked out onto the streets in the area, NY 694-S* continuing to listen to the recording and occasionally stopping in doorways to make a few notes on what he heard.

NY 694-S* advised that the only difference between the report as he heard it from the recorder and the report submitted by CG 5824-S* was that the introduction in the recorded report differed in the following respect from the introduction in the report obtained by CG 5824-S*: The introduction in the recorded report was addressed to the National Board of the CPUSA and to GUS HALL. It contained the language, "Greetings to you, dear Comrade Birch (GUS HALL). We transmit this confidential message to you so as to inform you and leaders such as you in all fraternal parties throughout the world concerning the outcome of the meeting of representatives of the CPSU and CPC held July 5-20 in Moscow."

NY 694-S* further stated that there were some other minor variations, in that the speaker occasionally would digress from the main report to excoriate the Chinese, using such language as "the sinister, dishonest Chinese delegation." When the speaker referred to the Bucharest Congress, he referred to it as "the beginning of the crusade against the leadership of the CPC." Also, in referring to Stalin, and the cult of the personality, the speaker, in quoting the Chinese, referred to Stalin as "not being such a bad person" and included language to the following effect: "Why should you pick on him when he made some isolated mistakes of which the masses of your people did not know and would not know had you not brought them to your people's attention."

KOLOBASHKIN told NY 694-S* that in future all important documents will be taped in this fashion and that NY 694-S* would have to rely on his memory and his notes for transmission of the information contained in the tapes to the CPUSA. NY 694-S* argued with KOLOBASHKIN regarding the impracticality of this method, stating that he could not possibly take adequate notes by reason of the fact that he is not a stenographer or a speedwriter. He pointed out to KOLOBASHKIN that fortunately, while in Moscow, he had received some information similar to that contained in the Soviet report, and that therefore, with regard to this particular document, he was able to understand it sufficiently to report the general content thereof to GUS HALL. He stated that in the future, however, as regards reports concerning which he had no previous information, he most likely would not be able to adequately summarize them for transmission to the EPUSA. KOLOBASHKIN nevertheless was adament and stated that NY 694-S* would have to abide by KOLOBASHKIN's instructions regarding the transmission of the reports to the CPUSA.

With regard to the signals which NY 694-S* is to send to the Soviets in the future, it was agreed that his signal should consist of "four beeps."

KOLOBASHKIN then told NY 694-S* that as yet he had not received a reply to be transmitted to HALL regarding the latter's request that BERNARD KOTEN be released and that his arrest be explained to the Soviet press as "a mistake." He said that he hoped to have the said reply available for transmittal to the informant on Wednesday, 9/18/63, at which time the informant should go to the "Mary" drop. The informant advised KOLOBASHKIN that he felt certain that he would also have some messages to transmit to KOLOBASHKIN on Wednesday at the "Mary" drop.

KOLOBASHKIN then told NY 694-S* that with regard to their operation on Wednesday at the 'Mary' drop, NY 694-S* should make his deposit at the drop at 6:00 p.m. At 6:15 p.m., KOLOBASHKIN would clear the drop. After clearing the drop at 6:15 p.m., KOLOBASHKIN

would walk to a phone booth on the outside and place a black tape sticker next to the telephone receiver to indicate that he had cleared the drop. He stated that in the event that he should leave at the drop a message for NY 694-S* (that is, at the time when he cleared the drop), he would place a red tape sticker next to the telephone receiver which would indicate to the informant that the latter was to go back to the drop and pick up the message which KOLOBASHKIN had left there. At 6:30 p.m., NY 694-S* should go to the aforesaid telephone booth to ascertain whether the tape is black or red and in the event that it should be red, to go back to the drop to remove the message left by KOLOBASHKIN.

KOLOBASHKIN, before terminating his meeting with NY 694-S*, stated that the latter would be advised, probably by radio, with respect to when the walkie-talkie operation would be in effect with regard to transmittal of messages. The informant at this time returned to KOLOBASHKIN the "tuner" which KOLOBASHKIN had requested be returned to him.

After his contact with KOLOBASHKIN, NY 694-S* contacted GIS HALL at the latter's home and furnished him with a report concerning NY 694-S*'s meeting with KOLOBASHKIN. HALL agreed that the report furnished by KOLOBASHKIN to NY 694-S* was identical with the report which CG 5824-S* had obtained from the Soviets in Moscow.

NY 694-S* described to HALL the difficulties encountered by him with respect to attempting to record the content of the report by use of the instrument furnished to him by KOLOBASHKIN. He told HALL that what he really needed in this situation, and in similar situations in the future, is a recording device which would permit him to obtain the entire content of a document. HALL stated that he would have no objection to NY 694-S*'s use of such a device. He and the informant agreed, however, that the problem remained that inasmuch as the Soviets would not permit the informant to give HALL the wire recorder, they would not permit the use of any other device which they might consider would become a security hazard.

Captioned case involves the Bureau's highly valuable confidential informant NY 694-S* who has been receiving communications transmitted to him by radio.

On 9/16/63, transmissions were heard by the Bureau's radio station at Midland at scheduled times and frequencies at which time two messages were transmitted. The messages were identified as NR 374 GR 65 and NR 247 GR 100.

Set forth below are our decipherments.,

As the Bureau is aware, GUS HALL, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA (CP, USA), arrived in Chicago on Friday, 9/13/63, and remained here until late p.m., 9/15/63. During this trip of HALL's, as has been the case in most previous ones, all arrangements for HALL's stay in Chicago were made by CG 5824-S* and the source was in constant contact with HALL during this period.

Shortly after HALL's arrival on 9/13/63, and in their first general discussion, HALL brought up the matter related to the need for another trip abroad by CG 5824-S*. HALL noted at this time that the Party needs for money will have to be handled shortly and that there were also some secondary needs for negotiations with the Soviets on matters related to business investments which should be taken up. HALL noted that in his opinion he felt that such a trip should be made soon, possibly no later than 11/63.

After HALL had raised this matter concerning another trip, CG 5824-S* inquired of HALL whether such trip could not be delayed a bit since the Soviets had indicated the possibility of an international conference being forthcoming and perhaps within the next six months. He told HALL that it might be possible to combine attendance at the conference with the negotiations for HALL's 1964 budget needs. It was further suggested to HALL that perhaps in the meantime he could prepare an emergency request for limited funds and that this could be transmitted through the apparatus to the Soviets and they may respond. The same might be done regarding HALL's desires concerning the business negotiations. 3

HALL advised CG 5824-S* that he could try this maneuver if he so desired but "you know darn well nothing gets done over there unless you go there first." However, HALL indicated that whatever transpires, CG 5824-S* should lay some preliminary plans now so that if necessary he could make a trip by 11/63 and that also he should tentatively plan on a second trip early next year. HALL again on late Sunday, 9/15/63, reiterated to CG 5824-S* that he should be giving thought and attention to some very early discussions with the Soviets.

On 9/16/63 CG 5824-S* advised that he necessarily must give HALL's suggestion some definite consideration although at this time he is not physically prepared to even consider engaging in a 14th Solo Mission. He further noted that without a doubt he would of necessity be making at least one trip within the next 6 months but he did not know if it would be humanly possible for him to make two separate trips, one for money negotiations and a second to attend an international conference, within such a brief span of time.

The Chicago Office is following this matter closely with CG 5824-S* and the Bureau will be kept advised of the results.

It will be recalled that CG 5824-S* was abroad on Solo Mission 13 from 8/7/63 to 8/25/63. Pertinent information received from him in debriefings has received appropriate dissemination.

On 9/16/63, CG 5824-S* furnished the following information to our Chicago Office.

Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), was in Chicago from 9/13/63 until the late afternoon of 9/15/63. During that time Hall brought up the matter related to the need for another trip abroad by CG 5824-S*. At that time Hall noted that the Partys need for money must be handled shortly and that there were some secondary needs for negotiations with the Soviets on matters related to business investments which should be taken up. (It is to be noted that CG 5824-S* and NY 694-S* are presently custodians of more than \$400,000 of Solo funds for the CPUSA.) Hall felt that such a trip should be made soon, possibly no later than November, 1963.

∠ CG 5824-S* inquired of Hall whether such a trip could not be delayed since the Soviets had indicated the possibility of an international conference within the next six months. CG 5824-S* suggested to Hall that it might be possible to combine attendance at the conference with negotiations for the Party's 1964 budget needs. He also suggested that in the meantime Hall could prepare an emergency request for limited funds which could be transmitted through the (Solo) apparatus to the Soviets and they might respond. The same could be done regarding Hall's desires concerning business negotiations.

Hall advised CG 5824+S* that CG 5824-S* could try such a move if he so desired but noted that in nothing gets done over there unless you go there first." Hall indicated that regardless of what transpires, CG 5824-S* should lay some preliminary plans, now so that if necessary informant could make a trip by November, 1963, and that informant should tentatively plan on another trip early next year.

This is to advise you of a recent meeting between NY 694-S* and his Soviet contact, Aleksei Kolobashkin, at which time a new walkie-talkie contact system was discussed. The Soviets also inaugurated a new technique of having informant listen to a recording device rather than giving informant a document to read as had been the practice in the past.

My memorandum of 9/12/63 advised that the Soviets were endeavoring to arrange a walkie-talkie system whereby NY 694-S* and Kolobashkin could advise one another when it is desired that personal contact be made. Informant was given a walkie-talkie unit by Kolobashkin and instructed to attach the unit to his car radio. Informant was told to drive in the vicinity of the Soviet United Nations Delegation on 9/9/63, at which time test signals between informant and Kolobashkin would be exchanged via the walkie-talkie unit. Informant followed Kolobashkin's instructions on 9/9/63, but did not receive a signal from Kolobashkin nor did informant receive any indication that his signal had been received.

In accordance with previously arranged plans, informant met with Kolobashkin on 9/12/63 to discuss results of the walkie-talkie test signals. Informant was advised that his signal had been received but due to a misunderstanding no signal had been sent to informant. It was agreed that another test run would take place on 9/13/63.

(Informant advised that on 9/13/63 he had received a clear signal from Kolobashkin on the walkie-talkie unit attached to his car radio.)

Upon completion of discussion concerning the walkie-talkie system, Kolobashkin handed informant a miniature magnetic wire recorder equipped with an ear piece. Kolobashkin instructed informant to place the recorder on his lap beneath a magazine and to insert the ear piece in his ear. Kolobashkin told informant he was about to hear a very important report on Sino-Soviet relations which would run about an hour and a half in duration. Informant, after listening to the report for a short time, became aware of the fact that the report, was identical to one which? CG, 5824-S* had received from the Soviets in Moscow while on a recent Solo Mission and which had already been furnished the Bureau by CG 5824-S*. Since NY 694-S* was being watched closely by

Kolobashkin, he listened to the entire report and made notes concerning it. Informant complained to Kolobashkin that since he could not take shorthand it was impossible for him to take other than very brief notes on the content of the report. Informant inquired if it would be possible to furnish Gus Hall, CPUSA General Secretary, with the recording device. Kolobashkin stated this was not possible since his instructions were that only NY 694-S* was to listen to the recording. Kolobashkin told informant that in the future all important documents would be recorded in this fashion and NY 694-S* would have to rely on his memory and notes for the transmission of the information to Hall.

Following his meet with Kolobashkin, NY 694-S* contacted Gus Hall and furnished him with a report. INTERNAL SECURITY - COMMUNIST

You will recall that CG 5824-S* was on Solo Mission 13 from 8/7/63 to 8/25/63. While in Moscow, Russia, during this Mission, informant held confidential discussions with leading members of the Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CCCPSU). Informant has supplied us with the following information concerning his stay in Moscow which is most interesting since it shows the extreme security precautions taken by the Soviets.

Arrival in Moscow

Informant arrived at the Moscow Airport on 8/13/63, where he was met by an official of the CCCPSU. Informant was advised that in order to afford him complete security, he would not be given his usual accommodation at the Central Committee Hotel in Moscow which had been the practice in the past. Instead, informant was driven to a large 30-story building located near the Soviet Foreign Ministry,(where he was provided with a suite of rooms on the fifth floor.

Living_Quarters

Informant's suite consisted of many rooms, including five bedrooms; several baths, a kitchen, living room and library. Informant never ascertained how many rooms comprised his suite as there was never an occasion to use all of them. For the assistance and comfort of informant, he was supplied with a housekeeper and a cook who came in at regular intervals to prepare all of his meals.

With the exception of two occasions when informant was_taken to conferences at buildings housing the CCCPSU, informant did not have to leave the suite assigned him. Arrangements were made by CCCPSU officials to bring all individuals informant desired to confer with directly to his suite, thus precluding the necessity for informant's having to appear on the street in Moscow. As a result, many days passed without informant's leaving his suite. For example, a total of two days was spent in conference with Henry Winston, Vice-Chairman,

Communist Party, USA, who has been residing in Moscow since September, 1961. Winston was brought to informant's suite at approximately 8 a.m. each day and remained there until late in the evening when representatives of the CCCPSU would pick Winston up and return him to his place of residence.

Documents

Any written material or documents that the CCCPSU wanted informant to see were personally delivered to him at his suite. When he was not reviewing these documents informant was instructed to maintain them in a locked vault which had been especially provided to informant by the CCCPSU representatives. When informant was preparing to leave Moscow, representatives of the CCCPSU met with him at his suite, picked up all documents which had been brought to informant and returned them to the International Department Building of the CCCPSU.

Departure from Moscow

When it was time for informant to leave Moscow on 8/21/63, representatives from the CCCPSU supplied him with transportation from his suite directly to the Moscow Airport.

My memorandum of 9/20/63 pointed out that Gus Hall advised NY 694-S* that in an effort to derive financial gain the CPUSA is planning to secretly rent an exhibition booth at the forthcoming New York World Fair.

OBSERVATION: Plans of the CPUSA to rent an exhibition booth at the forthcoming New York! World Fair has been previously disseminated to the Attorney General.

ACTION: We are following this matter closely and you will be kept advised of all developments.

INFORMATION CONCERNING THE DESIRE OF GUS HALL, GENERAL SECRETARY OF THE COMMUNIST PARTY, USA, TO SEND INDIVIDUALS ABROAD TO NEGOTIATE REGAIDING POSSIBLE PARTY BUSINESS AT 1964 WORLD'S FAIR, NEW YORK CITY

When Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA (CP, USA), was in Chicago, Illinois, September 13-15, 1963, he discussed a business proposition which had been raised with him and discussed in New York City. Based on Hall's comment, the main people suggesting and who favor this business proposition are Doctor Valentine Gregory Burtan.

and a person in New York, unnamed, who is already in the glassware business. The business being suggested by these individuals is one involving the opening of a gift shop at the New York World's Fair scheduled for 1964. This shop would deal in unique items from socialist countries including the Soviet Union as well as with items from other places throughout the world. For example, Burtan is planning another trip to Africa and has said that when he is in Kenya and Somalia he would negotiate regarding the possibility of purchasing leopard skins which might be sold by the gift shop.

Space for this gift shop at the New York World's Fair can be rented from the fair authority for the run of the entire fair for an amount of \$38,000. The Party would not operate the business in its own name but there are already suitable individuals in New York who are willing tooperate such a business in their own name in the Party's behalf. The people who are pushing this business claim there are substantial profits to be made and Hall has been partially convinced of this also.

However, Hall meted that he would not go shead with the lease for such a shop at the World's Fair in 1964 without some commitment for a financial subsidy as well as the agreement to some favorable terms on items to be sold from the various socialist states. Therefore, he would like to see someone like Merris Childs, who has dealt with the Soviets in the past, travel to the Soviet Union to see if the Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU) will commit themselves for providing the CP, USA with some subsidy to cover the lease cost for the shop. If this could be achieved, then he would like

to send a small business group to the Soviet Union and other list states consisting of perhaps individuals like from New York, Max Weinstein of Chicago, and may be one other, to negotiate with business organizations in the Soviet Union and other socialist states. The purpose of such megotiation would be to attempt to arrange some favorable terms under which gift items could be purchased, imported, and then sold at their shop.

Hall noted he would like the discussion held with the CPSU representatives regarding the subsidy to cover the lease for the shop by early November, 1963, at the latest, and, if possible, he would like to send his business group abroad for their negetiations just thereafter.

officials were very courteous to him and told him that he would
receive a renewal of his passport in several weeks. However,
inasmuch as he was anxious to return to the USA, NEEDLEMAN did
not wait to obtain a passport, but was given instead a travel
document which permitted him to return to the United States.

Although he had wanted to return to the USA by way of Poland, Czechoslovakia and Italy, he was instructed by the Soviets that "the law required that he return straight home." Upon his arrival in the USA, he notified his attorney in Washington to institute proceedings to obtain for him a new passport. It is NEEDLEMAN's opinion that there will be no trouble involved in securing the said passport.

While in Moscow, NEEDLEMAN spoke to NIKOLAI MOSTOVETS, previously mentioned, who instructed him to inform GUS HALL, General Secretary, CPUSA, that the official CP in Haiti is "The Popular Entente Party of Haiti."

According to NEEDLEMAN, while in Moscow, he also conferred with the widow of the Iraq CP General Secretary and also with the wife of the General Secretary of the Indian CP. NEEDLEMAN stated that as regards the Iraq CP, this party is "outlawed" and it desires the cooperation and assistance of the American CP. The Iraq CP particularly desires publicity in the working-class press in the USA. NEEDLEMAN stated he desired to discuss the Iraq Party with GUS HALL. He stated also that he desires to discuss with HALL matters of interest to International Publishers and Sovfoto.

NEEDLEMAN stated that before arriving in Moscow, he did not fully understand the Soviet-Chinese dispute, but that now he realizes the correctness of the Soviet position in the said dispute. He stated that he attended "The Women's Federation Convention" and observed "how the Chinese sat on their hands when the woman astronaut was given a standing ovation." He stated that while in Moscow, he saw ARTHUR SHIEIDS, "The Worker" correspondent in Moscow, and that SHIEIDS gave him \$150.00 to be given to "The Worker" in New York as a donation from SHIEIDS.

Referring to the Soviet-Chinese dispute, NEEDLEMAN stated that his friends, and HARRY MAGDOFF, are pro-Chinese and he indicated that by reason of this, he and they may no longer be friends.

NEFDLEMAN made no comments regarding activities in Moscow. except to say that

For over 30 years he has been in the forefront of the struggle for the USA working class and for the correct Marxist-Leninist position.

We also request that on September 7, 1963, the day before Davis' birthday, the CCCPSU send Davis a cable greeting him on the occasion of his 60th birthday and the completion of his 30th year in the struggle for the propagation of Marxism-Leninism

"in the USA. This, to us, will be most important as one of the first steps in our answer to the attacks upon us by the Chinese CP and an endorsement of the position of the CCCPSU.



The most outstanding leaders active in Soviet-American friendship and I, after most careful consultations and meetings, wish to call to your attention the gravity of the arrest of Bernard Koten and the adverse effect it will have on Soviet-American friendship should the charges against him be further published in the U.S. press

"and should a trial be held reflecting that these charges are true. We refer to stories printed in the American press and further to a statement from an Intourist official.

"Bernard Koten has been a most ardent fighter for Soviet-American friendship in the U.S.A. during a most adverse period. He has been a leader in the struggle for Soviet-American friendship for over 30 years. During World War II he was decorated with the highest military award as a result of his participation in the initial contact between the American and Soviet troops at the River Elbe. Koten has given his life to the improvement of friendship between the United States and the U.S.S.R. While the charges against him may or may not be true, years of work in the advancement of friendship between the United States and the U.S.S.R. would be lost as a result of any prosecution of Koten in the USSR. Our opinion is that unless a much more serious crime is involved the charge against Koten should be quietly dropped and if possible a statement should be made to the press that a mistake had been made with regard to Koten. Some action must be taken which will save all concerned.

"Hall"

With regard to the above message, NY 694-S* stated that he discussed the KOTEN matter with KOLOBASHKIN at his meeting with him on 9/5/63. NY 694-S* told KOLOBASHKIN that regardless of the charges against KOTEN, KOTEN must be released.

KOLOBASHKIN informed NY 694-S* that a delegation was in the USSR Embassy at Washington, D.C. that same day asking

for KOTEN's release. KOLOBASHKIN stated he did not know what action will be taken since the Soviet Union considers homosexuality a most heinous crime. NY 694-S* insisted that he had instructions from GUS HALL, the General Secretary of the CPUSA, to inform the Soviets that unless they wanted to lose whatever friendship had been built up over the last 40 years, the Soviets must release KOTEN.

NY 694-S* further advised KOLOBASHKIN that KOTEN is a popular and leading figure in this group promoting Soviet-American friendship. KOLOBASHKIN said he did not know KOTEN nor did he know the full details concerning the charges against KOTEN. However, KOLOBASHKIN stated that he would see to it that the CPUSA requests regarding KOTEN would be immediately submitted to the Soviets and that this matter be thoroughly investigated.

16. A 31 page document entitled, "A Review of Some Developments in Puerto Rico."

NY 694-S* advised that the above document, a copy of which is enclosed for the Bureau and Chicago, respectively, is a report prepared by PAT TOOHEY, CPUSA functionary.

KOLOBASHKIN informeddNY 694-S* that their next meeting would take place on 9/12/63, at 3:00 p.m. at the "DANN" rendezvous, at which time KOLOBASHKIN would make available to NY 694-S* a document containing very important information from the CCCPSU regarding the Soviet-Chinese dispute. He told the informant that the latter would have to memorize the contents of this document inasmuch as, by mason of the nature of the document, it would not be in the interest of security for him to allow the informant to take the document with him.

At this point, KOLOBASHKIN delivered to NY 694-S* a shoe box containing \$15,000 in \$10 bills and a "Walky-Talky" outfit together with a tuner.

(Renyairtel, 8/15/63, page 10, reflecting that KOLOBASHKIN, at his last meeting with the informant, advised the latter that the Soviets would arrange a "Walky-Talky" system whereby the Soviets and the informant could advise each other when it was desirable to make contact either by drop or in person.)

With regard to the \$15,000 mentioned above, reference is made to NY airtel of 9/4/63, which states that the Soviets were to deliver \$15,000 on 9/5/63 for JESSICA SMITH's magazine, "New World Review".

With respect to the above money, the NYO will check the numbers of the bills thereof against lists of currency issued to Soviet establishments in Washington, D.C. and in New York City. In the event that any identification thereof is made the Bureau will be advised.

With respect to the "Walky-Talky" and the tuner, referred to above, this equipment is being examined by technicians at the NYO and the Bureau will be advised by separate communication regarding the results of the said examination.

KOLOBASHKIN also furnished to NY 694-S* a match book within the cover of which was concealed a strip of microfilm containing the following message:

For you

"I gave you Walky-Talky and small tuner to prepare making signals using radio.

"1. It is necessary for you next Monday at 7 p.m. to give me 3 short test signals by 'W T'. You will take your car connect 'WT' with your inside car antenna and make 3 short signals while driving your car from the corner 3d ave. and 66 st. towards the Lexinton ave. and please repeat the signal twice.

"2. The small tuner intended for tuning your radio set. Switch on your radio on the middle bands and bring to it the tuner as close as you can. Then push small button which is on the right side of the tuner and try to get the loudest volume possible on the radio set. Make a mark on this place.

"I shall give you 3 short test signals this Saturday at I p.m. The tuner must be returned to me on September 12.

"3. If you do not understand anything as regards the new signals we shall discuss it at our next meeting which will take place on Sept. 12, place 'DANN', time 3 p.m. Besides I shall have important information for 'BIRCH' from our referee. Please have a <u>little</u> notebook for making notes."

At this point informant and KOLOBASHKIN terminated their meeting, each going his separate way.

With respect to paragraph "3" above, NY 694-S* advised that "BIRCH" refers to GUS HALL, "Referee" refers to the CCCPSU, and "DANN" refers to a rendezvous for personal contact.

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

Reference is made to New York letter, 9/9/63, captioned "WILLIAM JOSEPH POMEROY, aka, SM-C" (Bufile 100-170294), Paragraph 5 of which states:

"The 'National Guardian' issue of 8/8/63, Page 3, contained an article entitled 'How a Passport Was Won for Celia Pomeroy.' This article related that on 8/1/63, WILLIAM JOSEPH POMEROY contacted the 'National Guardian' to tell them he had received a cablegram from his wife in Manila reading 'Passport Granted.'"

GUS HALL further informed NY 694-S* that FELLY GREENE a writer, has become widely known, especially because of his last book on China. According to HALL, some of the Party people had some discussions with GREENE during the past few days and considered him to be an "honest progressive." While GREENE still has leanings towards China, he now has many questions about the Chinese problems. The Chinese have invited GREENE to return to China and GREENE desires to go back; however, he also wishes to go to the Soviet Union in the course of his return to China. GREENE is considering writing a book on the differences between the Communist Party of China (CPC) and the Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU). Party people here in the United States have suggested to GREENE that he stop in the Soviet Union both on the way to China and in the course of his return to the United States from China. GREENE has now left for London, where he will request a travel visa through the Soviet Union to China. It is GUS HALL's opinion that GREENE should be invited to the Soviet Union and while in the Soviet Union, efforts should be made to convince him of the incorrectness of the position of the CPC. HALL is sure that this will have an effect upon GREENE's writings subsequent to his mturn to the United States from China.

FELIX GREENE (Bufile 105-88988) resided as of 3/4/63 at 1765 Fulton Street, Palo Alto, California. During February, 1962, CSSF 2279-S* advised that FELIX GREENE's book, "Awakened China," had finally reached Peking during the latter part of January, 1962, at which time it was described as a "Red Letter Day" in the above cities, since the English-speaking people residing there thought so highly of GREENE's book. Source advised that an individual known only as "KP" who was so instrumental in arranging GREENE's interview with CHOU En-lai spoke very highly of GREENE's book and recommended this book to correct the various misconceptions which certain people have concerning China.

Numerous apologists for Red China currently residing in that country, but who are citizens of both the United States and England, have stated, in essence, that GREENE has made a significant contribution to strengthen relationships between the people of China and the United States, not only through the publication of his book, but also through the numerous lectures which he has given in the United States since his return from Red China.

NY 694-S* stated that upon the instruction of GUS HALL, he is to send a message to the Soviets regarding FELIX GREENE at the time of his next contact.

RADIO MONITORING CURRENT ESPIONAGE COMMUNICATIONS

Current information being reported from the New York Office in SOLO case reveals that the Soviets have arranged for this informant to communicate with the Soviet United Nations Delegation Headquarters in New York by using a Citizens Band Transceiver which is tuned to operate on 27.065 Mc/s. According to this informant's current instructions he is to drive from 66th Street and 3rd Avenue toward Lexington Avenue at a specified time and just key his transmitter four times. This informant has now advised that the tests conducted were successful and that the Soviets report that they heard his transmissions. would appear at this time that this means of communications is designed only as a signaling device in accordance with a preplanned arrangement such as signaling for a meet or indicating that a drop has been cleared, etc.

Considering the above, it is suggested that other Soviet contacts or illegal agents may have been issued similar equipment operating on this same frequency. If such would be the case, it may be possible to identify them by monitoring this frequency in the immediate vicinity of the SOVDEL in New York and the Soviet Embassy in Washington.

The equipment for such monitoring is currently available in the Laboratory. In order to verify if such other signals are present in these neighborhoods the equipment could be run for a reasonable period of time unattended with automatic recording equipment. If such signals are once detected it would then be necessary to man the equipment and employ visual observation in order to identify the automobile used for the transmission. REC 3Z

That the above information be routed through the Ep 27 1963 Espionage Section of the Domestic Intelligence Division for their information and consideration. If that division concert the Laboratory can provide the necessary equipment and assistance setting up the monitoring equipment.



GUS HALL himself has endorsed this idea and plans to notify the Russians that the purpose of establishing such an exhibition booth is not only to sell goods, but to display products and provide favorable "propaganda."

While this would be private enterprise on the part of BURTAN, who is putting up his own money, and who is getting money from other sources, the profits will go to the CP. BURTAN and are in a position to rent a double booth for \$38,000 annual rental. The Russians are to be advised that the representatives who will arrange for purchase and shipment of goods from other countries will be "two loyal businessmen."

GUS HALL contemplates having MAX WEINSTEIN and as representatives who will tour the socialist countries arranging for the products to be sold at this exhibition booth at the World Fair. At the same time, BURTAN will go to Africa and arrange for African products to be sold at this exhibition booth.

HALL advised that he is not angry with BURTAN and thinks the Russians are wrong in suspecting BURTAN. HALL is concerned lest the Russians not understand why BURTAN would be considered as a participant in such a venture as the exhibition booth, and HALL would prefer that BURTAN's name not be brought up with the Russians in this connection if at all possible. The exhibition booth will be arranged for in the name of an import-export company, with private entrepreneurs renting the space at the World Fair. An import-export company is being organized which will be the parent firm.

At the instance of GUS HALL, NY 694-S* prepared the following message to be delivered to his Soviet contact on 9/18/63 through the "MARY" drop:

"Initial steps being taken by a group of loyal businessmen to lease exhibition booths at the New York Worlds Fair, International Pavilion, which opens April 1964 to sell and to exhibit products from socialist countries and from some of the new African countries. The objective of this exhibition is to create good will between the peoples of USA and USSR and the socialist countries since there will be no official exhibits of USSR and other socialist countries at this Worlds Fair. exhibit will serve a twofold purpose--to publicize the products of socialist and new African countries and to obtain from sales a profit which this group of loyal businessmen will secretly give to CPUSA. We will send two representatives of this group to USSR to consult with representatives of your Commercial Ministry in order to arrange for purchases of these products. The two USA businessmen are MAX WEINSTEIN. Please arrange with your Embassy in Washington that they secure their visa within next few days. Cooperation in this matter will be deeply appreciated for the success of this project will obviously be beneficial to you and to us. We respectfully request that upon completion of their talks with you you arrange contact for them with Embassies of Poland, East Germany, Czechoslovakia, Bulgaria, Rumania and Hungary to obtain visa and travel arrangements for similar talks. Please be advised that these two USA businessmen are CP members and trusted friends of MORRIS CHILDS and mine."

Consideration is being given to the utilization of counterintelligence measures in view of the efforts to establish an exhibition at the Worlds Fair, and the Bureau will be advised, under the caption "CPUSA - COUNTERINTELLIGENCE MEASURES, IS-C," of specific proposals of the NYO in this regard.

Bernard Koten Case Koten, a United States citizen, is the Director of the Library of Intercultural Studies, the successor organization to the American Russian Institute (ARI). The ARI has been designated as subversive pursuant to Executive Order 10450. Koten was recently arrested in Moscow, Russia, on a homosexual charge. NY 694-S* gave his Soviet contact a cipher-coded message from Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA, addressed to the Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union. In this message, Hall expressed grave concern over the arrest of Koten and indicated that the arrest will have an adverse effect on Soviet-American friendship in the event a trial is held and it is disclosed that the charge against Koten is true. Hall urged that the charge be quietly dropped and a statement made to the press that a mistake had been made in arresting Koten. Hall emphasized that unless Koten is released, the Soviets will lose the benefit of the Soviet-American friendship that Koten has been instrumental in establishing over the years. NY 694-S* questioned his Soviet contact concerning this matter and although the Soviet claims to know nothing about the case; he mentioned that the Soviet Union considers homosexuality a most heirous crime. ෆ් **OBSERVATION:** Koten is included in Section A of the Reserve Index. It is not known why the Soviets are holding Koten since he has been promoting Soviet interests in the United States for many years. ACTION: This is only a partial picture. I thought you would be interested in learning of the plans of the Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), to secretly rent an exhibition booth at the International Pavilion of the forthcoming New York World's Fair for the purpose of deriving profit through the sale of products from Soviet and satellite countries.

you will recall that in May, 1963, a "businessman's conference" was held by the CPUSA for the purpose of discussing methods for the Party to derive profit through the investment of Party funds in certain business situations. Gus Hall, CPUSA General Secretary, announced at the conference the need for a program that would bring the Party an annual income of a million dollars.

on 9-16-63, NY 694-S* advised that he had been informed by Gus Hall that plans are being made for the CPUSA to secretly rent an exhibition booth at the International Pavilion of the New York World's Fair which is scheduled to open in April, 1964. Hall indicated that he is of the opinion that considerable profit can be derived from this venture since none of the "socialist countries" and only a few of the European countries will be renting booths at the Fair. Hall stated that two trusted CPUSA members will put up \$38,000 of their own money to rent the exhibition booth as a private enterprise, but the profits will go to the CPUSA. Hall anticipates that toys and handicraft products from the Soviets Union and other socialist countries will be sold at the exhibition booth.

NY 694-S* was instructed by Halluto send a message to the Soviets notifying them of the CPUSA's plans to rent an exhibition booth at the New York World's Fair in order to derive profit through the sale of products from Soviet and satellite countries. He indicated that the Soviets should be told that the objective of this operation will be to create good will between the people of the United States and Soviet and satellite countries; that the exhibit will provide a means of publicizing

products of Soviet and satellite countries; that profits from this venture will secretly be given to the CPUSA; that two trusted CPUSA members will soon visit the Soviet Union and satellite countries to arrange for the purchase of suitable products to be sold at the Fair; and requesting that the Soviets make the necessary arrangements to expedite the travel abroad of these two Party members.

Dr. Gregory Burtan, and Max Weinstein. (All are on the Security Index.) According to Hall, the exhibition booth will be arranged for in the name of an import-export company with private entrepreneurs Burtan and renting the space at the Fair. In this connection, Hall said an import-export company is being organized which will be the parent firm. Hall plans to send and Weinstein to tour the Soviet Union and satellite countries arranging for products to be sold at the exhibition booth. At the same time, Burtan will be sent to Africa to arrange for African products to be sold at the Fair. Hall, noting that the Soviets do not trust Burtan, instructed NY 694-S* to keep from the Soviets the fact that Burtan is to be connected with this venture.

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He joined the CPUSA in 1943, and has recently been very active in CPUSA fronts.

Dr. Gregory Burtan has admitted joining the CPUSA in 1923. He has recently made a trip to Africa in behalf of the CPUSA and has been furnishing information to the CPUSA relative to labor leaders in Africa. The Soviets do not trust Burtan but have not given their reason for this.

Max Weinstein resides in Chicago, Illinois. He has a long history of activities involving the raising of funds for the CPUSA.

OBSERVATION:

Consideration is being given to the utilization of counterintelligence measures in view of the efforts of the CPUSA to rent an exhibition booth at the New York World's Fair.

ACTION:

That the attached letter classified *Top Secret* to protect our source be sent to the Attorney General.

The captioned case involves the Bureau's highly valuable confidential informant, NY 694-S* who has been receiving communications transmitted to him by radio.

On 9/30/63, on scheduled times and frequencies, a transmission was heard by the Bureau's radio station at Midland at which time a message, NR 377 GR 280 was sent.

The plain text of the message is set forth below. The cipher text is attached.

TRANSLATION FROM RUSSIAN

FIGHTER FOR THE HAPPINESS OF THE PEOPLE

Today, all progressive America honors Benjamin Davis, the distinguished leader of the communist and workers' movements in the United States.

Davis belongs to that glorious cohort of people, who once adopting a revolutionary path, do not change it, despite the threats and cruel persecutions of the reaction. His name is inseparable from the courageous struggle of the Megro people against racial discrimination and for the civil rights.

Benjamin Davis was born in Dawson, Georgia. He was graduated from Amherst College, and later from Harvard University. He received the Doctor of Law Degree.

Davis became first known when at the beginning of his law career, saved the life of a young Negro from 20 years of imprisonment, which threatened him for organizing a demonstration of the unemployed white and Negro workers in the State of Georgia during the depression years of 1930. Davis also defended nine Negro youths during a sensational court trial at Scottsboro, Alabama; he helped to save them from death in the electric chair. Benjamin Davis's actions, made 30 years ago created a precedent in the courts of the Southern states.

Benjamin Davis has been taking an active part in the social life of the country as one of the leaders of the Communist Party during a quarter of a century. Between 1943 and 1949 he was twice elected to the Muncipal Council of New

York. Davis is a fervent orator and an able debater. He is tirelessly occupied with journalistic activity.

In 1949, Benjamin Davis was put in prison together with other leaders of the Communist Party, and was treacherously sentenced to five years of imprisonment for "violation" of the notorious Smith Act. But the years of imprisonment have not broken the spirit of this staunch fighter since his release from a prison, he has continued the Farty work with new vigor.

At present, a long prison term is threatening him again for his refusal to register the Communist Party in accordance with the McCarran Act.

As a great friend of the Soviet people, Benjamin Davis tirelessly strives for strengthening friendship between the American people and the peoples of the USSR.

Today, on his 60th birthday, all Soviet people convey their congratulations to Benjamin Davis, wishing him good health and great success in his courageous struggle for the happiness of the working people.

Employment, Residence and Intelligence Status:

KOLOBASHKIN is Second Secretary at the SMUN, 136 E. 67th St., Manhattan, New York, where he also resides.

On 9/10/62, KOLOBASHKIN was identified as a member of the Political Branch of the KOB, New York residency, by

On 3/7/63, Identified KOLOBASHKIN as the postman for the Security Branch of the KGB, New York residency who has the code name SCHIRJAEV. This informant stated that in addition to being postman for the Security Branch, KOLOBASHKIN is also actively engaged in intelligence work beyond the scope of his duties as postman.

on 4/24/63. identified KOLOBASHKIN as a member of the KOB.

On 7/31/63, advised that KCLOBASHKIN would replace VLADIMIR CHUCHUKIN as postman for the Political Branch of the KOB, New York residency, when CHUCHUKIN returned to the Soviet Union on vacation. The informant advised that CHUCHUKIN was scheduled to depart the US on 8/1/63.

KOLOBASHKIN's Return to the U.S.:

The records of INS, NY, reflect that KOLOBASHKIN departed the US, at New York City, on 5/31/63, destined to Europe. The INS records reflect that he returned to the US at New York City on 7/11/63. This trip, according to NYO sources, was for the purposes of a vacation in the Soviet Union. KOLOBASHKIN was accompanied by his wife, EKATERINA, and their two sons; however, his wife and sons did not return to the US with him, but arrived in New York City on 9/7/63.

Investigation Performed During the Past 90 Days:

As stated above, KOLOBASHKIN was out of the US from 5/31/63 until 7/11/63. Since his return to the US, he has been scheduled for spot fisur coverage on several days and was under spot fisur but he was not observed to leave the SMUN during most of the fisur periods. When he was observed, nothing of an intelligence significance was noted.

It was noted that KOLOBASHKIN spent more time in the SMUN during the last one and one-half months than he had in the prior months. This was probably due to his added duties as postman for the Political Branch of the KOB, and also due to the fact that telephone signals replaced the need for some of KOLOBASHKIN's personal appearances in signal areas.

KOLOBASHKIN's Mobil Oil Company credit card account, as monitored by the Philadelphia Division for the months of June-August, 1963, reflected several purchases made in the immediate vicinity of New York City, however, no information of intelligence significance was acquired from the review of this data.

During the past 90 days, only one drop was filled by the Soviets for NY 694-S*, on 8/7/63. No drops were filled by that informant for the Soviets during that period. The NYO

has continued its efforts to obtain suitable lookouts for coverage of several of these drop areas at time of the drops but these efforts have been hindered due to a change in drop sites by the Soviets which went into effect as of an 8/14/63 personal meeting between KOLOBASHKIN and NY 694-S* in NYC.

At the above mentioned 8/14/63 meeting, Kolobashkin advised NY 694-S* that new procedures for signalling for drops and meets would be established involving the use of radio. At a 9/5/63 personal meeting between Kolobashkin and NY 694-S*, Kolobashkin gave the informant a Walky-Talky radio, and a tuner to tune same, and instructed that the informant test it out by connecting it to his (informant's) car antenna, and making three short test signals while driving a block away from the SMUN, at a specified date and time. Kolobashkin advised the informant that he would give the informant short test signals with this equipment on 9/7/63.

During KOLOBASHKIN's vacation period in the Soviet Union, only one personal meeting, on 7/2/63, was had with NY 694-S*. The informant was met by VALENTIN A. ZAITSEV, known KGB agent, SMUN, NYC, who was handling the operations with NY 694-S* during KOLOBASHKIN's absence from the US. In June, 1963, \$300,000 was transmitted to NY 694-S* for the CP, USA, and that transmittal was handled by ZAITSEV in KOLOBASHKIN's absence.

In connection with the above mentioned transmittal
of funds, advised on $7/31/63$ that on $7/30/63$ he had
learned that ZAITSEV had been successful in 'transmitting
something' to a person in the CP. USA whom he met on behalf

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on 7/30/63, that KOLOBASHKIN and ZAITSEV had just received a communication containing personal congratulations from SEMICHASTY, the head of the KAB in Moscow, and the informant believed that the communication from SEMICHASTY was due to ZAITSEV and KOLOBASHKIN having successfully handled this CP, USA contact. The informant advised that this matter was most important since this personal congratulation is very much like receiving an order.

On 8/6/63, advised that he had learned from conversations with other KGB employees in the SMUN, that KOLOBASHKIN and VLADIMIR CHUCHUKIN (known KGB agent, SMUN, who has in the past assisted KOLOBASHKIN in the operations with NY 694-S*) are now working exclusively with representatives of the CP, USA. advised that he considered this to be a very significant and important assignment, and that he also felt that it was of extreme importance to the FBI to thoroughly cover the activities of these two persons in view of their liaison with high ranking officials of the CP in the US.

The NYO has continued its attempts to identify the individual who signed his name as 'IRVING' in correspondence with KOLOBASHKIN on 1/6/63. The NYO requested that handwriting comparisons be made between the 'IRVING' handwriting and available handwriting of the several known or suspected illegal Soviet agents who have been uncovered in the New York, New Jersey and Connecticut area. Several handwriting comparisons have been made by the FBI Laboratory, but no information to further identify the writer of the 'IRVING' letter has been developed to date. Upon receipt by the Laboratory of additional handwriting concerning these known or suspected illegal Soviet agents, further comparisons will be made with the 'IRVING' handwriting in an attempt at an identification.

Investigation Planned for the Next 90 Days:

The NYO plans to afford KOLOBASHKIN spot fisur coverage, on a limited and irregular basis, in an effort to uncover data regarding his social and intelligence activities. It has been pointed out above that KOLOBASHKIN works exclusively with representatives of the CP, USA, and while his operations involving NY 694-S* are known and can be covered adequately, it is possible that he may have other contacts within the CP, USA as well. The NYO is in the process of making surveys of the new drop locations which have been established for NY 694-S*, and it is planned that several of the future drops will be observed from suitable safe lookouts, in order to determine whether additional Soviet personnel may become active in these operations.

Evaluations and Observations:

As previously mentioned, KOLOBASHKIN has been recently spending more time in the SMUN. This is probably due to more administrative paper work which he has been engaged in because of his duties as postman for both the Security and Political Branches of the KOB, New York residency. There is no definite indication that he is engaged in other intelligence activities other than the handling of NY 694-S*, and it would still appear from all available information that he personally handles all activities in his operations with NY 694-S*.

It would appear that if the above mentioned Walky-Talky signals are satisfactory, that this method will be used to signal for future meets and drops, and that personal, and telephone, signals will not again be used between the Soviets and NY 694-S*. This new signal method will eliminate the necessity for KOLOBASHKIN to leave the SMUN to receive the pre-arranged signals which have been in operation up to this time.

All pertinent data has been furnished the Bureau by previous communication.

Special Agent in Charge Johnson, Chicago Office, called me to say he believes a great deal of walue for the Bureau can be derived from analyzing the materials which have been furnished to us by the Solo operation during the past ten years. Johnson believes the following two worthwhile results can be secured from such an analysis and review:

- (1) We can find material which, while once classified, no longer need be. This material, Johnson believes, might be considered for counterintelligence purposes. It could be released to friendly newspapermen. For example, Johnson said that Mao in 1957 mentioned the Chinese could afford to lose two hundred million people in a war and still not suffer in population and that the United States could not do this. Johnson thinks such statements as this and others can now be publicized safely.
- (2) Johnson believes that this analysis will show trends and related developments which could be disseminated to the Department of State and the White House and would be of interest to them at this time. While such information may have been disseminated in the past, no trends could be ascertained at the time. Over a ten-year period, such could be determined and attention called to it.

SAC Johnson wanted to put Special Agent Carl Freyman on this work for a few weeks. The analysis and review would be done in conjunction with the assistance of Chicago 5824-S.

I told Johnson that unless he was advised to the contrary, to go ahead and see what can be developed of value.

From the total of the \$14,890.00 (1489 notes) consisting of \$10.00 notes, the NYFRD was highest with 640 \$10.00 notes originally issued from that Federal Reserve District (42.9%). The Chicago FRD was the/highest with notes issued with 213 (14.3%).

When the \$10.00 notes were compared against the list of money known to have been issued to the Soviets in NY and washington Field, no identification was effected.

When the above money was compared against the index of CP and Soviet bloc espionage money maintained in captioned case, there was no evidence of patterns of serialization formed when placing the \$10.00 notes in the index from any of the 12 FRD's.

Mention is also made to the fact that there were no identical notes among the 1489 \$10.00 notes when inserting said notes into the NYO index.

Information concerning comparison against the index is not to be set forth in report form or dissemination memorandum without Bureau authority.

ROSEN according to KRUMBEIN, has designated a woman named (Bufile 100-94243) to open a store in and handle the distribution of Chinese periodicals. ROSEN advised KRUMBEIN that had been at one time a member of the CPUSA, but had dropped out at the time after the 17th Congress when the first ultra-left group was formed. She is/present, he stated, a member of the Progressive Labor group.

KRUMBEIN stated that, according to ROSEN, he will receive a stipulated amount of money to advertise Chinese periodicals throughout the United States, the said advertising to be done in newspapers and magazines, particularly in the "National Guardian" and "Progressive Labor." in effect, will be a "dummy" operating in behalf of MILTON ROSEN.

KRUMBEIN also advised ARNOLD JOHNSON that the Chinese intend to "help out" the Negro magazine, A"Liberation." The editor of this publication is one WATTS (believed to be DANIEL WATTS, NY file 100-143654). Contact was made by the Chinese with WATTS through an African publication which is distributed in the USA.

ARNOLD JOHNSON told NY 694-S* that MARGARET KRUMBEIN is basically pro-Soviet and anti-Chinese, and does not care whether or not she loses her agency for the distribution of Chinese publications in the USA.

As regards the Soviet message above that NY 694-S* had been given two films containing 72 "shots," this allegation is erroneous in that the aforesaid film, which was removed from its container in the photo laboratory of the NYO, consisted of only one role of film containing not 72, but 41 "shots." This material has been retained as an exhibit in the NYO. As reported in Solo airtel dated 8/8/63, only the reports of PONOMAREV and SUSLOV, and instructions regarding how these reports were to be handled, were contained on the above-mentioned film.

The Soviet message above regarding the colt is a reply to HALL's message of 9/5/63 requesting that the delivery of Arabian stallions be postponed. (See Solo airtel 9/6/63, page 7, paragraph 3.)

While Killy is not of Polish origin and does not speak the Folish language, he has been accepted and is trusted by the Poles at the Consulate because he, KLIMS, can be of assistance to them in keeping them informed and abreast of developments in certain areas of mutual interest, particularly as it regards activities among nationality groups and in the overall field relating to the fight against the resurgence of German fascism. Within the past several weeks, KLIM attended, by special invitation from the Consulate, both a public and a private affair being given in honer of TURBANSKI, who is scheduled to return to Poland in the very near future for re-assignment by his government.

In view of the foregoing development of KLING's relationship with the Polish Consulate in Chicago, MORNIS CHILDS of Chicago, who is the secretary of the Foreign Affairs Committee, CP, UMA, and the Party individual who acts as the official CP, UMA representative to various Communist Parties throughout the world, contacted JACK KLING on September 28, 1963, At the time of their meeting on September 28, 1963, CHILDS instructed KLING to make contact with TURBANSKI at the Polish Consulate prior to that individual's departure from the country and inform him that relations and contact between the Pelish Heited Workers Party and the CP, USA are not at this time the best. KLING was then to attempt to determine from TURBANSKI the identity of the person who is responsible here for handling Party affairs since there has been occasion from time to time in the recent past to transmit certain materials and matters from here by the CP, USA to the

Polish United Workers Party. If TURBANSKI should be unable to supply the answer to this matter at the time of his departure, it was suggested that KLING request that he take this matter up upon his return to Poland and that the information requested be sent back to Chicago for transmission to KLING.

through a drop, he is to transmit two dashes three times. These transmissions are to be effected during the course of his driving from Third Avenue west to Lexington Avenue on 66th Street.

Confirmation of the receipt of NY 694-S*'s transmissions on Tuesday or Thursday will be accomplished by the Soviet in the following manner:

The Soviet will locate himself in the neighborhood of NY 694-S*'s residence at 10:00 p.m. on the Tuesday or the Thursday on which day NY 694-S* has previously initiated contact at 7:00 p.m., as described above. The Soviet will transmit the same signal at 10:00 p.m. in NY 694-S*'s neighborhood as had been transmitted earlier by NY 694-S*; that is, four dashes three times to indicate a personal meeting, or two dashes three times to indicate contact through a drop.

The transmission by the Soviet in NY 694-S*'s neighborhood will acknowledge receipt of NY 694-S*'s message and confirm that contact is to be made on the day following such transmission; that is, on Wednesday if the transmission is made on Tuesday, or on Friday if the transmission is made on Thursday.

The personal meetings will take place at the rendezvous "Armstrong," "Berkman" or "Dann," in this sequence. For example, on 10/2/63, NY 694-S* met KOLOBASHKIN in the vicinity of the "Armstrong" rendezvous, consequently, the next personal meeting will take place at the "Berkman" rendezvous.

The drops will be made through 'Margaret," 'Mary" or "Helen," in that order. For example, on 9/18/63, NY 694-S* filled the 'Mary" drop, so that the next drop to be used is "Helen."

In the event the Soviet wishes to contact NY 694-S*, he will cause a transmission to be made in the neighborhood of NY 694-S*'s residence at 10:00 a.m. on Wednesdays, using the same signals as above; that is, four dashes repeated three times

to indicate the desire for a personal meeting on the following day, or two dashes repeated three times to indicate the desire that contact be made through a drop on the following day. NY 694-S* will verify receipt of this signal by transmitting the same signal at 7:00 p.m. in the vicinity of the Soviet Mission to the United Nations, as explained above.

With respect to regularly scheduled Soviet CW radio transmissions to NY 694-S*, the Soviets on 9/25/63 sent a ciphered-coded message, the plain text of which is as follows:

"Your test signals sent on September 16 received 0.K."

This message, which began with gamma 16110, was received through Bureau radio facilities, but was not received by NY 694-S*. The message referred to a transmission made by NY 694-S* by means of his "walky-talky." Arrangements for this "walky-talky" transmission were made between KOLOBASHKIN and NY 694-S* when they met on 9/12/63, as stated in NYairtel 9/13/63, pages 2 and 3.

On 9/30/63, NY 694-S* did receive a ciphered-coded radio message from the Soviets beginning with gamma 89753, the plain text of which message is set forth in NYairtel 9/30/63.

On 10/2/63, NY 694-S* purposely asked KOLOBASHKIN whether he received his, NY 694-S*'s, "walky-talky" transmission on 9/16/63. KOLOBASHKIN said that he himself had heard NY 694-S*'s signal on 9/16/63, that the signal was clear, and that he, KOLOBASHKIN, had monitored it in the Soviet Mission to the United Nations. NY 694-S* then told NY 594-S* that he must have missed 20 groups in the beginning of the message on 9/30/63, which message started with gamma 16110. KOLOBASHKIN said that he would see that the Soviets were notified that NY 694-S* had missed these 20 groups.

KOLOBASHKIN questioned NY 694-S* about the unit being used by NY 694-S* in transmitting his signal on the "walky-talky."

NY 100-134637

NY 694-S* advised KOLOBASHKIN that he uses a small, battery-powered escillator made in Japan. He explained that he tightens the set screw so that the key is depressed and the oscillator emits a steady signal. NY 694-S* then uses the transmitting button on his "walky-talky" as a key in sending his signals. NY 694-S* told KOLOBASHKIN that in this manner he is able to drive his car and transmit at the same time with a minimum of difficulty. KOLOBASHKIN expressed his appreciation of NY 694-S*'s ingenuity in this matter. KOLOBASHKIN asked NY 694-S* if he could secure a similar oscillator for him. NY 694-S* told KOLOBASHKIN that he would do so.

It is noted that the oscillator referred to above is a "Model CP 250 Code Practice Set" distributed by the Philmore Manufacturing Company, Inc., in New York City. The item is manufactured in Japan and it is equipped with a one-and-a-half volt "D" cell battery.

ReBulet 8/1/63, instructing that all safety deposit boxes utilized by NY 694-S* and CG 5824-S* for maintenance of SOLO funds be rented under the informants' code names, with the exception of the safety deposit box utilized by CG 5824-S* at the Michigan Avenue National Bank in Chicago.

NY 694-S* has advised that he and CG 5824-S*, who is currently in New York City, have rented a safety deposit box at the main branch of the Chemical Bank - New York Trust Company at 20 Pine Street, New York City. The box - No. 1271 - was rented in the names of JACK BROOKS and HAROLD M. JULES, the pseudonyms of the informants.

NY 694-S* intends to keep the bulk of SOLO money in this box.

Informants, however, decided that NY 694-S*, like CG 5824-S*, should maintain in the true names of the informants a second safety deposit box in a Chemical Bank branch in the immediate vicinity of NY 694-S*'s Broad Street Office. The purpose of such box is to retain therein sufficient money to permit NY 694-S* to comply expeditiously with any immediate demand by GUS HALL for funds. It is anticipated that not more than \$10,000 or \$15,000 will be retained in such a box.

NY 694-S* already has such a box - No. 483 - at the 67 Broad Street branch of the Chemical Bank - New York Trust Company, and the box is rented in the true names of both informants. Unless the Bureau advises to the contrary, the above-mentioned two safety deposit boxes will be maintained as depositories for SOLO funds.

"I am writing this personal note as a result of a discussion in our Secretariat concerning the position of the comrades of the CP of New Zealand in the conflict between the Central Committee of the Chinese Party and the majority of the parties of our world movement. As you know, I attended a national convention of the New Zealand Party during April of this year. While it was easy, there, to sense the fact that a number of the most influential members of the National Committee favor the position of the Chinese Party, it was not made evident or even suggested in the report nor in any public way during the convention.

When it was reported in the Hsinhua, very shortly after the convention, that Comrade Vic Wilcox had joined the Central Committee of the Chinese Party in declaring adherence to a political position that had not been even hinted at in his report to the Party convention and certainly hadnot been discussed in its public sessions, I exclaimed spontaneously, 'but the New Zealand Party hasn't even discussed the position.'

'My exclamation was spontaneous but it was with good cause. Among the comrades in New Zealand with whom I had discussed sharpening ideological conflict, a number who had agreed with my estimation of the 81-Party Statement continued to accept the ambiguity of their Party's position because they were quite confident that no public action would be undertaken which would involve the New Zealand Party in the controversy. Now it is on the way to active participation in an attempt to split the world communist movement.

"It goes without saying that decisions concerning the policy of the New Zealand Party, as of every party, are the prerogative of its members. There must be no equivocation on that. There is no contradiction between that, however, and a comradely expression of opinion by fraternal party leaderships to the leadership of the New Zealand Party, and exchange of opinions if the New Zealand comrades agree.


"The British, Australian and Canadian parties all share some traditions with the comrades of New Zealand and the conditions under which every party works have many similarities. Because of this I believe that we are obligated to submit our opinions to the comrades in New Zealand and request them to consider them. I am of the opinion that the most effective way to make such a submission is jointly; i.e. a letter to the National Committee of the New Zealand Party expressing the collective point of view of our three parties.

"Because U. S. imperialism is penetrating New Zealand rapidly, I think it would be good that Comrade Gus Hall be invited to join in sending such a collective letter to the New Zealand Party. This letter is to inquire whether you will join with us in sending such a letter or if you consider some other form of fraternal action preferable. In addition to this letter, I am sending a similar text to Comrades John Gollan and Lance Sharkey.



At the same time we would like to advise our friends, formally not changing their attitudes toward Koten and letting him participate in progressive movements, to exercise a certain degree of caution and avoid him as far as possible in performing confidential or other informant actions."

- 3) "We would like to see you October 2nd at 'Armstrong.'"

"Bernard L. Koten, a 50-year-old Russian-language instructor at New York University who was arrested in Kiev Aug. 26, was released today and was reported en route to Vienna.

"Officials of Intourist, the Soviet travel organization, reported Mr. Koten's release but declined to comment on the reasons and circumstances of his arrest.

"Earlier the Soviet Foreign Ministry had told the United States Embassy in Moscow that Mr. Koten had been detained and would be tried on a morals charge. Embassy requests to see him were turned down by the Soviet authorities.

'Mr. Koten was in the Soviet Union as leader of a group of American tourists. They left the country when the tour ended in Kiev."


My letter to you dated September 24, 1963, contained information pertaining to the arrest of Bernard Koten in the Soviet Union on a homosexual charge.

A most sensitive source of this Bureau has advised that the Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CCCPSU), recently conveyed to Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA, the following information concerning Koten.

Koten was arrested for the offense of homosexuality, punishable in accordance with Soviet law by up to eight years of imprisonment. However, taking into account Gus Hall's request that Koten be released, plus Koten's sincere repentance, the CCCPSU has requested the legal authorities not to put him on trial and to let him return to the United States. The CCCPSU desires that a certain degree of caution be exercised in allowing Koten to continue to participate in the progressive movement. The CCCPSU also desires that Koten not be used in performing confidential assignments.

Messages intended for NY 694-S* are preceded by five minutes of transmission consisting of a series of three V's, the call letters 6N6, and a numeral to indicate the number of messages. After five minutes of the above, a series of E's is transmitted followed by the message itself. A similar procedure was followed in the transmission of the 25-group message set forth above.

station identified with the call letters XDU, which transmitted the message at 11:25 a.m., was approximately the same level of the station identified with the call letters 6N6, which transmitted at 11:36 a.m.

On the basis of his past experience, and the similarity between the 11:25 a.m. message and messages sent to NY 694-S*, EMT suspects that the 11:25 a.m. broadcast originated at a source identical or similar to the source transmitting messages be to NY 694-S* and that the 11:25 a.m. message was intended for a person operating in behalf of the Soviets in a manner similar to that in which the Soviets operate NY 694-S*.

The NYO is calling the above to the attention of the Bureau with the thought that it may supplement other information available to the Bureau, which information may provide a basis for evaluating the signal of the 25-group message set forth above.
