During December, 1963, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised as follows:

During November, 1963, it was learned that George Lohr, an American citizen residing in the German Democratic Republic (GDR) where he is the correspondent for "The Worker," a Communist Party, USA (CPUSA) newspaper, is desirous of leaving the GDR to go to Africa. Lohr has an illness for which he needs to live in a warmer climate. Henry Winston, a Vice Chairman of the CPUSA temporarily residing in Moscow, USSR, has sent word to the CPUSA that consideration should be given to providing Lohr with money for the trip and finding him a job in Africa. Lohr has his wife, Helga Lohr, with him, who is not a member of the Communist Party, according to Winston, and further she cannot return to the United States. Winston has suggested that a (first name unknown) Aleksein (phonetic), a former refugee in the United States now in the GDR, could be appointed Lohr's replacement as correspondent for "The Worker" in the GDR.

During December, 1963, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised as follows:

During November, 1963, it was learned that Timur Timofeev, Deputy Director of the Institute for World Economy and International Affairs, Academy of Science of the USSR, Moscow, USSR, and the son of Eugene Dennis, the deceased former General Secretary of the Communist Party (CP), USA, has recently written a book entitled "The Program of the CPSU and the West". This book was published in the German language under the title Das Programm der KPd SU und der Westen" by the publishing firm Europa Verlag in Vienna, Austria, which, according to Timofeev, is a "capitalist publisher".

It is now planned that this book will be translated into the English language for publication by International Publishers, a CP, USA controlled publishing firm in New York City. The translation will be performed by Boris Burkov who is one of the chief editors of Novosti Press Agency (APN) which has the publishing rights to this book.

This document contains neither recommendations nor conclusions of the FBI. It is the property of the FBI and is loaned to your agency; it and its contents are not to be distributed outside your agency.

RESPONSE FROM NORTH AMERICA TO RADIO MOSCOW BROADCASTS

During December, 1963, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised as follows:

During November, 1963, Alekser Grechukhin, Assistant to the Head of the North and South American Section of the International Department, Central Committee, Communist Party (CP) of the Soviet Union, stated that Radio Moscow receives an average of 1600 letters per week in response to their broadcasts on the North America wave length. He noted that the CPSU is very surprised by the volume of this response and cannot quite understand why so many people are writing. Grechukhin did not specify whether the mail received was favorable or unfavorable.

INSTRUCTIONS TO CONITOR DECADEASTS DY RADIO COCCOT

During Novembor, 1963, Lorris Childs, a representative of the Communist Party (CP), USA, who was then in Moscow, USSR, for discussions with representatives of the Central Committee, CPCU, not with Aleksei Grechukhin, Assistant to the Head of the North and South American Section of the International Department, Central Committee, CPSU, who made the following comments concerning Radio Moscow:

According to Grochukhin, Tadio Moscow receives an average of 1000 letters per week in response to their broadcasts on the North America wave length. Grochukhin noted that the CPSU is very surprised by this and then asked who listens to these broadcasts, are the broadcasts any good, and why do the people write. Childs also expressed surprise at the volume of this response and stated he does not know anything about the content of the programs or who the listeners are. Therefore, Grochukhin instructed Childs to obtain a shortwave radio capable of picking up Radio Moscow and to listen to these broadcasts. Childs should then furnish his opinion of the broadcasts to the CPSU as they desire to know what people of a similar political frame of mind as Childs' think of these broadcasts.

A source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, in mid-December, 1963, advised as follows:

Vitaly Korianov, Chief Deputy to Boris N. Ponomarev, a member of the Secretariat and Head of the International Department, Central Committee, Communist Party (CP) of the Soviet Union, during his recent official visit to Uruguay met with and talked to Rodney Arishmendi, First Secretary of the CP of Uruguay. Arishmendi at this time informed Korianov that the current membership of the CP of Uruguay was approximately 8,000, which in Korianov's opinion was an extremely large Party, particularly for a country which has a deep democratic tradition and where the inhabitants number less than three million people. Korianov also noted that it was apparent in his discussions with Arishmendi that the CP of Uruguay is not in agreement with the views of Fidel Castro, but rather adhere to the policies of utilizing parliamentary procedures available in their country in order to come to power.



His illness at that time was being attributed to the "old thing," which reportedly is tuberculosis from which he suffered a number of years ago. At the present time he can not work extensively and with winter setting in is nearly incapacitated.

F. R. Kozlov, also a member of the Presidium and of the Secretariat, Central Committee, CPSU, as of mid-November, 1963, was also reported to be still quite ill and as a result presently is not functioning on a daily basis in any political activities of the Party.

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MISCELLANEOUS REQUESTS AND INQUIRIES BY REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NORTH AND SOUTH AMERICAL SECTION, INTERNATIONAL DEPARTMENT, CENTRAL COMMUNIST PARTY OF THE BOVIET DEIGN, RAISED DURING HOVEMBER. 1963

During the course of conversation with representatives of the North and South American Section, International Department, Central Committee, Communist Rarty of the Soviet Union, namely Aleksei A. Grechukhin and Igor Hikhailov, in a series USS of both formal and informal meetings held during November, 1963, some miscellaneous requests were made and inquiries raised by them which included the following:

The North and South American Section of the International Department would like to receive the current "Labor Fact-Book" published by Labor Research, Incorporated, New York City.

In connection with the current situation in Puerto Rico, they would like some concrete facts and would like to know definitely whether there are people from the pro-Chinese Rosen group actively working there.

Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA, should be told that they have some question in connection with. some of his writings where he uses the terms "left" and "left wing." He should know that these are not words in the Marxist-Leninist nomenclature.

Who are the people in the Fair Play for Cuba Committee with whom Lee Harvey Oswald might have been in contact? Did these people have contact with Cubans or pro-Chinese individuals like Hilt Rosen or Freddy Merome? Are there any threads leading from these people to people like Robert Williams who has now gone over to the Chinese?

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REACTION OF THE COMMUNIST PARTY OF THE SOVIET UNION TO REQUEST OF THE COMMUNIST PARTY, USA TO THE SENDING OF A REPRESENTATIVE TO DISCUSS THE JEWISH QUESTION

It will be recalled that in late October, 1963, Gus Hall, General Secretary of the Communist Party, USA (CP, USA), directed that a communication be sent to the Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU) concerning the possibility of a representative of the CP, USA, namely Jack Hing, proceeding to the Soviet Union to talk to responsible individuals on matters relating to the Jewish question in the USSR.

Subsequently, Gus Hall, on November 1, 1963, instructed a CP, USA representative scheduled to personally travel to the Soviet Union for dealings with the CPSU to discuss with them the same matter, pointing out at this time to the CPSU that the CP, USA was not looking for a fight on this matter but were raising it only from a tactical point of view.

In mid-November, 1963, the request concerning the possible setting up of discussions between responsible representatives of the CPSU and the CP, USA on problems relating to the Jewish question was presented to the Central Committee, CPSU, both in written and oral form. However, in neither case was there any official response from the CPSU to the question raised. Since at every occasion where this matter was raised responsible CPSU representatives sought to avoid discussion of it, it was not pushed beyond initial stages of inquiry. As a result, there was no formal, direct response, negative or positive, to this request.

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INFORMATION CONCERNING TRANSMISSION OF DOCUMENTARY FILM PREPARED BY THE COMBUNIST PARTY OF THE COMBUNIST UNION ON LIFE OF WILLIAM E. FOSTER TO THE COMBUNIST PARTY, USA

In late November, 1963, a representative of the North and South American Section, International Department, Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU), advised that both copies of the documentary film prepared in 1961 by the CPSU in the Soviet Union on the life and death of William Z. Foster had now been transmitted to the Communist Party, USA (CP, USA). It was noted at this time that one of the copies had been brought into the United States from the Soviet Union by Rose Weinstock, wife of a CP, USA functionary, during the latter part of summer or early fall of 1963 following that individual's visit to the Peoples Republic of Hungary and to the Soviet Union. The representative also noted that the second copy had been sent to the United States but did not comment on the manner by which this film had been transmitted to the Party in the United States.

BEATRICE SISKIND JOHNSON, NEWLY ASSIGNED "THE WORKER" CORRESPONDENT, HAVANA, CUBA

A source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, during mid-December, 1963, advised as follows:

Prior to her departure for Havana, Cuba, in the early fall of 1963 where she was to take on the assignment as correspondent for "The Worker," an East Coast communist publication, Beatrice Johnson stopped off in Moscow, USSR. In Moscow, she met with representatives of the International Department, Central Committee, Communist Party (CP) of the Soviet Union, and with Henry Winston, a Vice Chairman of the CPUSA who was then temporarily residing in Moscow.

During her contact with representatives of the International Department, she received a briefing and was also furnished with \$500 which had previously been left in Moscow by the CPUSA to be given to Johnson at the time of her departure in order that she might have some funds to cover her initial living expenses in Cuba.

In discussions with Winston, Johnson was briefed on the current CPUSA line, as well as on the line she herself was to follow while serving as "The Worker" correspondent in Cuba. She was given instructions that she was to see to it that all news was eventually sent to the CPUSA on developments occurring in Cuba. Specifically, she was given the task of writing an expose of Robert Filliams, the American Negro who fled to Cuba to avoid United States prosecution and, if possible, she was to attempt to have this expose published in Cuba in an official organ of the United Party of the Socialist Revolution.

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
BEATRICE SISKIND JOHNSON, NEWLY ASSIGNED "THE WORKER" CORRESPONDENT, HAVANA, CUBA

At this same time, Winston passed on to Johnson a suggestion for transmittal to the Cubans to the effect that perhaps it would be wise for Premier Fidel Castro of Cuba to issue a manifesto. In such a manifesto, Castro could point out to the American people that if they were paying a big price for sugar, paying a big price for cigars and the like, it was because there was no trade with Cuba. If there was no trade with Cuba, it was the fault of the United States for they failed to follow a good neighbor policy with Cuba; however, Cuba is willing to pursue a good neighbor policy with the United States.

After her briefing by Winston, Johnson accompanied Winston to the Cuban Embassy in Moscow. At the embassy, she and Winston were cordially received by the ambassador and at this time it was pointed out to the ambassador that Johnson would soon be leaving for Havana where she would represent the CPUSA as correspondent for "The Worker." The ambassador was provided with a credential from the CPUSA indicating Johnson's official assignment. The ambassador indicated that he would transmit the information concerning Johnson's pending arrival in Cuba and her credential to his government, and he was certain that she would be most welcome in Cuba.

Subsequently Johnson did go to Cuba, but on her arrival she was met with extreme coolness and a lack of cooperation of any nature from both the Cuban Government and the Party.

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JAMES WEAVER, CORRESPONDENT FOR "AFRO-AMERICAN." NOW ASSIGNED MOSCOW, USSR

During conversations with Honry Winston, a Vice Chairman of the Communist Party, USA (CP, USA) who is now temporarily residing in the Soviet Union, during the period November 20-22, 1963, in Moscow, Winston made the following remarks:

At the present time there is an individual in Moscow by the name of James Weaver acting as a correspondent for the "Afro-American." Reaver is a teacher by profession and his permanent home is in Harlem, New York City. He was accompanied to Moscow by his wife and child. While in Koscow, officially working as a journalist, he is also working on his Doctorate Degree. Initially he came here as a correspondent last year and was to stay only a few months in the Soviet Union. Subsequently, however, he got a new contract and remained over.

Weaver came to interview Winston and spont an hour and a half with him. At the time, Winston did not know what this interview would result in so he was careful in talking to Weaver. According to Winston, in talking to Weaver he could tell from the discussion that this individual was leaning towards the Kuslims although he tried to deny it but they did have a little rapport, and he did give him an article from "Political Affairs" by Claude Lightfoot on the Kuslims. He read it and indicated he liked it.

However, from all this Winston is suspicious. is of the opinion that it could be that this Negro correspondent returned to the Soviet Union in order to effect some penetration. No cannot figure out how come whon all Negro newspapers are declining in circulation and how the "Afro-American," which comes out twice a week and has a circulation of 170,000, can afford to have a person like this in Noscow.

Ho would like the matter of suspicions and questions which arise in his mind taken up with the CP, USA and followed through. For example, how come the entire Negro press has no one here but the "Afro-American" press has one here? Why would they agree to this several months after they said they did not ENCLOSTING have money to do it? Now come a Negro coming here was not used in a press pool?

In accordance with Winston's wishes, the same information as noted above was provided to the Soviets.

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MIECELLANEOUS DISCUSSION WITH REPRESENTATIVE OF INTERNATIONAL DEPARTMENT, CENTRAL COLLUTTEE, COLLUNIST PARTY OF THE COVIET UNION, CONCERNING REMUDURSEMENT TO COLLUMIST PARTY, USA FOR TRAVEL EXPENSES OF INDIVIDUALS TO SOVIET UNION

In mid-November, 1963, Korris Childs, a representative of the Communist Party, USA (CP, USA), while meeting with Aleksei Andreevich Grechukhin, Assistant to the Head of the North and South Actrican Cogtion, International Department, Contral Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU), Honcow, USSA, raised with that individual the matter of reinburgements to the CP, USA due from the CPCU for menies paid out for travel expenses of individuals invited to the Soviet Union during the past year. Grechukhin, with whom this same matter had been raised by a CP, USA representative a few months proviously, stated that the CP, USA had previously been informed that funds to cover these expenses were not available and that the same situation now existed because of tight budget problems of the various responsible inviting Soviet organizations. Grochukhin then proposed that in order to settle this matter concerning the fares once and for all, that perhaps Childs would be willing to accept for the Party the following proposition:

Grochukhin proposed that in lieu of all unpaid fares that he would immediately provide Childs with \$500 out of International Department funds, technically charging this money to their Department as reimburgement to Childs for his own fare to the Soviet Union. For this \$500, the CP, USA should consider all previous outstanding, unpaid fares an being canceled. In the future such fares and expenses for individuals traveling to the Soviet Union should not be submitted individually but held in abeyance until the time when the overall annual budgetary requests are presented to the CPCU. At this time they should be listed individually and incorporated into the overall amount of money being requested.

Childs accepted Grechukhin's offer in this matter and accordingly was furnished \$500 from CPSU funds which were available to Grechukhin. Subsequently from this sum of money Childs dispersed the following sums:

It was intended that these documents be delivered to the various embassics of the socialist countries located in Moscow. The documents also identified Weinstein as a member of the CP, USA and requested that visa arrangements be made to facilitate his travel in connection with his projected business.

As of late November, 1963, plans for travel to other socialist countries were as follows:

First, he was to travel to Sofia, Bulgaria; then, to Budapest, Hungary; to Prague, Czechoslovakia; and, finally to Warraw, Poland. After visits in these countries, he planned to attempt to proceed to Yugoslavia, then Italy, and then possibly some other capitalist countries. At all of these places he would be looking for possible import items.

For the first portion of his trip from Moscow to Soria, the CPSU had agreed to foot the transportation cost. From Soria on it was hoped that the previously prepared documents would induce other CPs to afford similar cooperation in specing that Weinstein moved to his next stop.

As of November 26, 1963, was still in Moscow but then in the process of preparing to travel to Sofia. His wife was still also in the city but expecting to leave in the very near future for the United States. As of this date it was also learned that had up to that time been entirely unsuccessful in locating any specific trade the United States and nothing that he had done so far represented any prospects of great financial gain for the CP, USA.

Zonik Wagner, an official of the International Department, Central Committee, Communist. Party of Czechoslovakia, who specializes in Latin-American affairs, furnished the following comments to most sensitive sources. of this Eureau concerning the caches of arms recently discovered on the beaches of Vonozuela.

The Communist Party of Czechoslovakia has, verified that the arms shipments discovered on the beaches in Venezuela vere, in fact, shipped from Cube. This matter was handled in a clumby, uncoordinated way and, as a result, millions of dollars worth of arms were lost. The Cubans did not consult with the Czechs or the Russians on these shipments and, as a matter of fact, the Czechs and Russians do not know whom the Cubans were negotiating with among the Venezuelans. The Czechs and the Russians are very disturbed concerning the handling of these shipments of arms by the Cubans to the communist terrorists in Venezuela.

Because of the sensitive nature of our sources, which have furnished reliable information in the past, we have classified this communication "Top Secret." This information is being furnished to other interested officials of the Government.

You will recall that on 11/1/63, a number of caches of arms were discovered by Venezuelan Government authorities on the beaches of Venezuelan authorities have alleged that the Cubans had shipped these arms. The Cubans have steadfastly denied having anything to do with this matter, indicating that it is a frame-up. CG 5824-S* learned from Zenik Wagner, who specializes in Latin-American affairs, that the CP of Czechoslovakia has verified that these arms shipments discovered on the beaches in Venezuela were, intfact, shipped from Cuba. Wagner stated that this matter was handled in a clumsy, uncoordinated way and, as a result; millions of dollars worth of arms were lost and wasted. According to Wagner, the Cubans did not consult with the Czechs or Russians on these shipments and, as a matter of fact, the Czechs and Russians do not even know whom the Cubans were negotiating with among the Venezuelans. The Czechs and the Russians are very disturbed concerning the handling of these shipments of arms by the Cubans. OBSERVATION: The fact that the CP of Czechoslovakia has reportedly verified that the shipment of arms discovered on the beaches of Venezuela was, in fact, shipped from Cuba should be of vital interest to top officials of the United States Government. 

Panushkin, the Soviet Ambassador to the United States in 1947 and subsequently Head of the International Department, Central Committee, CPSU, is presently engaged in organizational work for the CPSU. Panushkin was relieved of his duties with

During the meeting, the Uruguayan CP official indicated that the current membership of the CP of Uruguay is approximately 8,000. The Soviet CP official regarded this as being an extremely large CP membership for a country where the inhabitants number less than three million. It was brought out during the meeting that the CP of Uruguay is not in agreement with the views of Cuban Premier Fidel Castro, but rather adheres to the policies of utilizing parliamentary procedures availparamable in its country in order to come into power.

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

According to an official of the Central Committee, Communist Party of Czechoslovakia, the domestic situation in Czechoslovakia is greatly improved. Hillions of dollars worth of consumer goods have been purchased and stores are now completely stocked with these goods. As a result, there are no longer "lines or queues" outside stores as has been the case in the past.

The above official stated, however, that the political situation is a "moss." 

During late November, 1963, a meeting took place between representatives of the Communist Party, USA (CPUSA),

and the United Party of the Socialist Revolution of Cuba. During this meeting the following matters were discussed.

CPUSA Literature

The CPUSA was disturbed over the fact that, while literature of every type of "renegade left group" in the United States is able to get into Cuba, the CPUSA has been insuccessful in getting its literature into Cuba in spite of all its efforts to do so. It was not believed that this was the result of the United States Government action in withholding this literature since literature from pro-Chinese groups had been getting into Cuba without trouble.

CPUSA Aid to Cuba

result of the recent hurricane which devastated Cuba. In this regard it was noted that several issues of "The Worker," east coast United States communist newspaper, contained articles detailing the CPUSA relief drive in behalf of Cuba.

Communications

It was decided that communications from the CPUSA to the United Party of the Socialist Revolution of Cuba be sent through the Communist Party of Canada representative to the "World Marxist Review," theoretical organ of the international communist movement, in Prague, Czechoslovakia, and thence to Cuba. It was also decided that communications in the other direction, from Cuba to the CPUSA, should follow the same route:

General Relations

It was agreed that relations between the CPUSA and the United Party of the Socialist Revolution of Cuba were in need of improvement. One of the subjects of concern was the position of Beatrice Johnson, the Havana, Cuba, correspondent for "The Worker" and official spokesman for the CPUSA in Cuba, who has been experiencing a great deal of difficulty in Cuba obtaining cooperation. It was brought out that the United Party of the Socialist Revolution of Cuba was chagrined over the fact that Joseph North, former Havana, Cuba, correspondent for "The Worker," had not indicated when he left Cuba several months ago that he would not be returning. It was explained that North would have lost his passport and perhaps his United States citizenship if he had not returned to the United States when he did. It was further explained that Beatrice Johnson is North's replacement and she should be afforded all proper courtesies and cooperation.

Zenik Wagner, an official of the International Department, Central Committee, Communist Party of Czechoslovakia, who specializes in Latin-American affairs, furnished the following comments to most sensitive sources of this Bureau concerning the caches of arms recently discovered on the beaches of Venezuela:

The Communist Party of Czechoslovakia has verified that the arms shipments discovered on the beaches in Venezuela were, in fact, shipped from Cuba. This matter was handled in a clumey, uncoordinated way and, as a result, millions of dollars worth of arms were lost. The Cubans did not consult with the Czechs or the Russians on these shipments and, as a matter of fact, the Czechs and Russians do not know whom the Cubans were negotiating with among the Venezuelans. The Czechs and the Russians are very disturbed concerning the handling of these shipments of arms by the Cubans to the communist terrorists in Venezuela.

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

ANNA LOUISE STRONG

During December, 1963, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised as follows:

During November, 1963, Boris N. Ponomarev, Head of the International Department, Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union, recounted the following story which he prefaced with the comment, "You'll never believe it."

Anna Louise Strong, a former long-time resident in China and the Soviet Union who is currently a resident in China, was formerly married to General Michael Borodin, who was sent by V. I. Lenin in 1923 to China to help SUN Yat-sen. Borodin and Strong had a son who lived in Moscow who went by the name of Borodin also. The Russians did not know that he was the son of Anna Louise Strong. Subsequently young Borodin became a colonel in the NKVD. In the mid-1940's, upon the order of Stalin, Strong was arrested and deported from the USSR to Poland. Strong used to travel in and out of the Soviet Union (the source does not know whether this refers to the period before or after her deportation). After Strong was thrown out of the USSR, the Russians discovered that she had a secret apartment in Moscow. No one ever lived there except Strong or her son, Borodin. No one ever went to the apartment or questioned the occupancy of this apartment because everyone thought that the apartment was being kept by the NKVD. When the apartment was discovered, there were found in the apartment a number of diaries belonging to Strong. The question was immediately raised concerning the manner in which Strong was able to obtain visas for her travels in and out of the Soviet Union. It was then discovered that she was gaining entry to the USSR by means of the influence of the young Colonel Borodin. When this was discovered, Stalin had Colonel Borodin executed.

The part of this whole story which intrigued Ponomarev was that in reading Strong's diaries, it was discovered that in the 1940's she had predicted the current Soviet-Chinese split. She had characterized this split as inevitable. According to Ponomarev, this apartment had been in existence for more than 20 years and what bothered the Russians was what contacts she had with the Chinese and the possibility presented itself that some intrigue with the Chinese might have been going on for decades. Ponomarev was pondering whether Strong's current activities in behalf of the Communist Party of China are related or unrelated to these activities in the past.

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NOVEMBER 25, 1963

On Movember 25, 1963, in the company of a representative of the interactional Department, Central Committee, Conminist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU), Morris Childs, a representative of the Communist Party, UBA (CP, USA), who was then in Moscow, made contact with the Polish Embassy in Moscow. The CPSS representative accompanied Childs on this visit for the purpose only of waking an official introduction to the First Secretary of the Embassy and thereafter took no part in any of the ensuing matters. The discussion occurring with the First Secretary of the Embassy, name unrecalled, was generally as follows:

According to the First Secretary of the Embassy, the Polish United Workers Party (PDWP) and recently received a note or letter in which the CP, USA complained or said that the PUNP was not placing emphasis on the Negro question in the Polish press and had not shown the proper solidarity on this matter. He noted that the Central Committee of his Party had studied the problem and feel that they have paid a lot of attention to the Negro question. Anyone, he noted, who studied the Polish press would immediately see that we popularize the struggle of the Negro. Our own Central Committee reviewed its policy and found it to be correct on this matter and in line with Marxist-Lenintst thinking and international solidarity. There was, however, one case of wrong emphasis-a small one. This had been picked up by the West German press and used by the bourgeois press generally. A paper in Chana also had picked up this item and it was exaggerated by them. So, tell the Central Committee of the CP, USA that we received this criticism attentively and that our Central Committee has told the press to correct their mistakes and never repeat this type of mistake again. We also made a representation to Chana as to how this thing had been picked up by the bourgeois press and exaggerated and we believe this was done to Chana's satisfaction.

Regarding Stanley Nowak, the First Secretary noted that the CP, USA had recently sent in some question regarding him. This matter was taken very seriously and we do not treat him as a Party person. So, hereafter, if the PUNP has Party matters to take up, they will be taken up with Childs or his representative.

The First Beeretary then raised the natter regarding the accoptance of the gift stallion which the PUWP had effered to Con Hall of the CP, USA. He noted that they initially could not understand why a request had not been mide for two horses as undoubtedly the intent on the part of Conrade Hall was to use the horses for broading purposes. In response, Childs stated that after considerable thought had been given to the offer of the Polish Party, it had been decided that it would be best to postpone shipment at this time of the gift stallion to Hall. In the spring, when a new and therough review has been made of the new tax law relating to such natters, the final decision as to whether this stallion should be shipped will be transmitted to the Polish Party. Comrade Hall further desired that the PUWP be advised that he was not at this time cure whether further arrangements for chipping this stallion resuld be made; however, he wanted to thank the Contral Committee of the PUWP for their generous offer and he premised that they would hear from him in the future.

At this point, Childs commented that he recontly noted that "your man"in Chicago had recently been called back for reassignment in Poland. The First Corretary responded by noting that this was correct and that this individual was assigned to the Foreign Ministry Office in Varcay, Poland. However, they have another good man there in Chicago now. this point Childs mentioned that they have a person in Chicago who goes to the Consulate and participates in cocial affairs. At this point Childs noted on a small place of paper the name Jack aling and indicated that this was the man to whom he was referring. He then went on to point out that this individual was well acquainted with the former man at the Consulate who had just returned to Poland. Presently the Party in Chicago was a kit hesitant concerning who at the Consulate should be contacted on Party hatters and they were tendering who the person to deal with an Party matters should be. Secretary at this point indicated that the new replacement in Chicago would be the proper person. Accordingly, Childs informed this individual that in the future if Kling should come to the Consulate he is the ene who should be dealt with on Party matters and when he openies, he openies for the Party leadership. The First Operatory agreed that Kling would be a satisfactory person for utilization in the situation noted.

At this point, the First Secretary suggested that Childs might desire to go into Warpaw for some further discussion. While stating that he would like very much to do this, it would be impossible for him at the present time to make such a trip.

However, he did advise the First Secretary that the Party was, in fact, sonding a representative to Warrow. ropresentative of the Party was named and he would be going to Poland to look into opportunities and conduct possible negotiations regarding items from which the CP, USA could possibly gain some financial benefit from the import and solo thoroof. He requested that a visa be prepared for to facilitate his travel, that all possible cooperation be extended so that Weinstein might was to be treated as one of "our people." It was pointed out to the First Secretary specifically what would be looking for but that the CP, USA realized that his ordeavors may not result in anything spectacular. The First Secretary agreed to cord through a request for a to travel for the purpose vice which would camble Childs had noted.

Dill Gebert, an old acquaintance of Childs in Chicago. The First Secretary indicated he did know this individual and that he was still corving as Polish Ambassador to Turkey. Childs then requested that the next time the First Secretary had contact with Gebert that he pass on Childs' regards to him.

The entire meeting was most cordial and throughout the meeting honey wine, coffee, and Polish chocolate were served for refreshments. After the completion of the discussion, Childs and the representative of the International Department, Contral Committee, CPCU, returned to Childs' apartment.



In mid-December, 1963, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised as follows:

(First name unknown) Chernik, Deputy to the Head of the International Department, Central Committee, Communist Party of Czechoslovakia (CP of CZ), during late November, 1963, made some comments concerning the domestic situation as it existed in the Peoples Republic of Czechoslovakia, the essence of which is as follows:

"As you know, we have been confronted with some problems; however, as you see, we have now satisfied our population and we have no lines or queues. We have purchased millions of dollars of consumer goods and have filled our shops and stores.

"Politically, we have found a bigger mess than we had anticipated. The bureaucracy in the government was big but we are now cleaning this mess up. You should know that everyone was involved from the top to the bottom, including the highest.

"In regard to Antonia Novotny, First Secretary of the CP of CZ and President of the Peoples Republic of Czecho-slovakia, he is not too secure and there is a lot of talk. If you want to, you can say he is on probation. The leader-ship of the Party is, however, cleaning house and they are bringing new people into the leadership. For the time being, the situation seems to be resolved and we have drawn more from the coalition parties in the country and we are trying to establish more democratic norms of relations with these

"In regard to the United States, we want to establish better relations with that country."

DISCUSSION WITH REPRESENTATIVES OF THE INTERNATIONAL DEPARTMENT, CENTRAL COMMITTEE, COMMINIST PARTY OF CZECLOSLOVÁKIA, PRAGUE, CZECLOSLOVÁKIA, NOVELBER 28, 1963

On the morning of November 23, 1963, Korris Childs, Communist Party, USA (CP, USA) representative, while staying in his room in the Central Committee, Communist Party of Czechoslovakia (CP of CZ), hotel in Prague, was not by (first name unknown) Chernik, Deputy to the Head of the International Department, Central Committee, CP of CZ, and Zenick Wagner, the individual in charge of the Latin American Dection of the International Department. These individuals then subsequently accommanded Childs to the Prague airport where Childs was to secure transportation for ultimate return to the United States.

During the period the above individuals were together general discussion occurred and among the various matters which came up during this period were the following:

According to Chernik, the CP of CZ would like and wants to exchange articles with the CP, USA. For example, the CP of CZ would like to submit articles for "Political Affairs", the CP, USA theoretical organ, and even perhaps with "The Worker." In turn, the CP, USA could submit articles for publication in "Rude Prayo," the organ of the Central Committee, CP of CZ, and in the publication "Nova Bysl," the theoretical and political journal of the Central Committee, CP of CZ.

Chernik also noted that the CP of CZ was still interested in buying books and other material printed or issued by the CP, USA if this were possible and to secure such material in a businesslike way. Upon raising this matter, Childs informed Chernik that such material was available and that all the CP of CZ would have to do to secure it would be to write to New Era Dook and Subagency, New York City, and their request would be handled.

Chernik also indicated that it was a definite desire on the part of the CP of CZ to establish a better working relationship with the CP, USA. He noted that the matter concerning stops that could be taken in regard to establishing a better relationship had been raised by Antonia Novotny, First Secretary of the Party and President of the Peoples Republic of Czechoslovakia, himself, in high Party discussions. When

3 700-428091-3508 ENCLOSURE-3508 this matter vas raised, Childs took the opportunity and turned over to Chernik a copy of the recent report of Cus Mall, General Cogretary of the CP, USA, which had been delivered at the October, 1963, neeting of the Mational Executive Committee of the CP, USA. He also informed these individuals that the Movember, 1963, issue of "Political Affairs" was scheduled to carry an article by Elizabeth Curley Flynn, Chairman, CP, USA, dealing with current Sire-Coviet differences.

There them followed a very general discussion participated in by all parties related to the recent assassination of President Ecanody. Both representatives of the International Department, Central Committee, CP of CS, present indicated that their attitude regarding this act was one of shock and grief. They both noted that it was their's as well as the Party's position that the assassination had been a part of a conspiracy in the United States to destroy the policies projected by the Kennedy Administration for the developing of trade and for peaceful coexistence with the socialist states.

As Childs was about to board his departing plane which was bound for Zurich, Epitzorland, he raised with Chornik problem relating to matters of securing vicas into Chechooloyakia for tripa similar to the one he was just completing. Chernik at this point stated that it would be simpler for Childs if he just got on a plane and came to Czochodlovakia rather than attempting to pick up any typo of vica. Lowover, at this point, Chornik told Childs to vait a pinuto and Chornik valked away for a talk with tho eath accurity can at the airport. After coveral micutes, Chornik returned noting to Childs that hereafter it would be all right for him just to come into the country without a vice and that when he arrived without such a vice, he skould check in with the recurity man and tell him to call the Central Committee and everything would be handled. emphasized that no longer would you need a vira for entry into the country.

An Childs pinne was prepared for boarding, Chernik and Wagner proceeded to the boarding area sheed of him, held hack other individuals who very to beard this same plane, and noticed to Childs to care forward. Childs was thus given the opportunity to board the plane sheed of other passengers and to select the seat he desired.

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LITERATURE PROBLEMS TAKEN UP WITH REPRESENTATIVES OF THE COMMUNIST PARTY OF THE COVIET UNION, NOVELBER, 1963

It will be recalled that in the past months a number of efforts had been made by Hyman Lumer of international Publishers, New York City he well as by a number of other persons connected with Communist Party, USA (CP, USA) literature outlets and publishing houses to work out arrangements with the Soviet publishing and literature organizations in order that business could be conducted on an open and legitimate basis and also to make arrangements with the Soviets that could financially benefit the CP, USA. In part, to achieve this it was suggested that the Party attempt to arrange that the CP of the Soviet Union give certain exclusive rights to print Soviet publications in the United States to World Books and other Party outlets; that royalties be paid by the Soviet Union for material reprinted in the Soviet Union, etc.

These problems were taken up by a CP, USA representative during the course of personal contact with representatives of the International Department, Central Committee, CP of the Soviet Union in Moscow during November, 1963. Memoranda were also prepared and submitted at the time and subsequently sent by the International Department to the Coviet governmental agencies responsible for such matters.

In late November, 1963, a partial response from the Soviet agencies in connection with the matters brought up was relayed by Aleksei Andreevick Grechukhin, Assistant to the Read of the North and South American Section. International Department, Control Committee, CP of the Soviet Union. At this time, Grechukhin noted that he had been told to relay the following:

On the question of royalties, The Coviet publishing organizations were not going to pay them to the CP, USA for material reprinted in the Coviet Union. This, they noted, was based on the fact that the USSR does not recognize the copyright laws and therefore if they paid the CP, USA such royalties and such were found out, it could set a serious precedent. However, as in the past, they would at their discretion pay certain royalties on certain material and they would reserve this right.

100-427091_ FNCLOSURD On the patter of exclusive rights to the publication of Coviet books and other material being turned over to Party organizations in the United States, it was noted that this could not be done at the predent time. Possibly it could be done gradually on the basis of some future legal agreements with International Publishers, World Dooks, etc., that there could be an exchange of rights between Coviet printing organizations on a limited book-for-book tasis and in regard to some certain selected material. However, at the present time governmental relations between the Coviet Union and the United States as well as Party relations between the CPSU and the CP, USA must be considered. They feel it would be inadvisable to do saything at this time on the basis of a narrow agreement with the CP, USA on such exclusive rights which could hamper inture relations with the United States on a broader business basis.

HENRY WINSTON, A VICE CHAIRMAN OF THE COMMUNIST PARTY, USA

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In mid-December, 1963, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised as follows:

Several months ago, Gus Hall, General Secretary of the Communist Party, USA (CP, USA), indicated that he felt it would be a good idea if Henry Winston, a Vice Chairman of the CP, USA, who was then temporarily residing in the Soviet Union, would give consideration at the time of his scheduled return to the United States in late February, 1964, to stopping off in Cuba. Hall felt that this could be of benefit in restoring good relations between the CP, USA and the United Party of the Socialist Revolution of Cuba.

In late November, 1963, in discussing such a trip to Cuba, Henry Winston stated that he had now decided that he would not stop off in Cuba when he returned to the United States probably in late February, 1964. Winston remarked that although he recently had been to and spoken before an audience of approximately 400 people, consisting of Cuban governmental officials and students in the Soviet Union, at the Cuban Embassy in Moscow and had been warmly received and that the greetings he had prepared in connection with the anniversary of the 26th of July Movement had been reprinted in the Cuban press, he had never received an official invitation to visit that country. Although he had made his desires known that he would like to visit the country, the most he had received was an unofficial, informal, open invitation to come to that country.

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
