**ULLYNOTHERWISE** This is to advise of the return of CG 5824-S\* from his mission to the Soviet Union and to acquaint you with the high lights of his mission as concerns the reaction of the Soviets to the assassination of President Kennedy.

You will recall that informant departed on Solo Mission 14 to the Soviet Union on 11/1/63 in behalf of the Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), for the purpose of negotiating for funds of the 1964 CPUSA hudget and-to ascertain the latest developments in the international demmunist movement. SAC Simon of Los Angeles called this morning to advise that CG 5824-S\* had arrived in Los Angeles very late on 12/2/63 and was not feeling well due to a back ailment. However, at the present time informant is feeling much better. SAC advised that the debriefing of informant has started and the high lights and details of informant's Vipission will be expeditiously furnished the Bureau. SAC further advised that in view of the importance of the matter pertaining to the assassina-Stion of President Kennedy, the high lights of the Soviets reaction to the assassination were immediately obtained from informant and are as

The news of the assassination of President Kennedy was flashed to the Soviet people almost immediately after its occurrence. It was greeted by great shock and consternation by the Soviet Government, as well as the population at large. Soviet officials either communicated with informant or came directly to him to express their condolences. Their expression of grief was characterized by a sentimentality rarely seen among such officials, a number of whom actually wept.

Boris N. Ponomarev, a member of the Presidium, Central Committee; Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU), stated that President Kennedy had won the sympathy of the Soviet people because during the Kennedy administration both Governments were able to talk even though they did not solve all their problems.

After the first few days radio and television stations gave complete and sympathetic coverage to the assassination. Respectful and objective coverage was given of even such observations as the tolling of church bells and the offering of prayers in the memory of President Soviet officials expressed disgust at the disrespect\_to the Kennedy.

President's memory displayed by some other European radio stations that continued to broadcast light entertainment and they described the anti-Kennedy propaganda emanating from Communist China as "contemptuous."

From informant's conversations with officials of the CPSU, informant furnished the following information relative to the analysis of Soviet officials to the assassination.

The Soviet Union actually believes that there is some large well-organized conspiracy on the part of the ultraright in the U.S. to effect a coup. They were convinced that the assassination was not the deed of one man but that it arose out of carefully planned campaign in which several people had a part. Ponomarev noted that those elements interested in utilizing the assassination and playing on anticommunist sentiment in the U.S. would then utilize this act to stop negotiations with the Soviet Union; attack Cuba, and thereafter spread the war. As a result of these feelings on the part of Soviet officials, the USSR immediately went into a state of national alert. They were fearful that without leadership some irresponsible general might launch a missile at the Soviet Union. It was the further opinion of Soviet officials that only maniacs would think that the left forces in the U.S. represented by the CPUSA would assassinate President Kennedy in view of all the abuse the CPUSA has taken from the ultraleft as a result of its support of peaceful coexistence and disarmament. However, with the passage of time and with the assurances received from President Johnson, these fears of a coup have receded, although the conviction remains that the assassination was the work of an ultraright conspiracy.

Relative to Lee Harvey Oswald, the Soviets disclaim any connection with him whatsoever. Ponomarev described Oswald as a neurotic maniac who was disloyal to his own country and everything else. He stated Oswald thought he had a "soft touch" in the USSR and wanted to stay. The Soviets believed he might have ideological motivations and permitted him to stay. Oswald soon found it was not a "soft touch" and wanted to go home. The Soviets permitted him to leave and said "good riddance." The Soviets feel their disassociation with Oswald is proven by the fact that they did not take him back.

On 11/26/63, Ponomarev informed CG 5824-S\* that the CPSU was preparing to turn over to the U.S. its entire file on Oswald and that the content of this file would prove their contention that Oswald was no responsibility of theirs. Ponomarev wanted this fact communicated to the CPUSA so that they would know that the CPSU was cooperating with the U.S. Government and that this would be beneficial to the CPUSA.

#### ACTION:

For information. These are only the high lights of the Soviets' reaction to the assassination of President Kennedy. As soon as the details are received appropriate dissemination will be made. Details expected shortly.

#### Current Status of Sino-Soviet Differences

In mid-November, 1963, Boris N. Ponomarev, Head of the International Department, Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union, gave on behalf of the Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union, a report dealing with the current status of Sino-Soviet differences. The essence of Ponomarev's remarks is as follows.

Although some efforts are being made to improve relations, it is highly unlikely that any complete agreement will be reached. The Communist Party of China has just published another book, "Lines of War and Peace," which is diametrically opposed to the Soviets' concepts of international developments as related to peaceful coexistence and disarmament.

The strategic plan of the Communist Party of China is to split all fraternal parties and establish parties under its own leadership. The Communist Party of China is endeavoring to accomplish this by splitting off from five to ten people from each fraternal party and thereafter recognizing this splinter group as a bona fide Communist Party. munist Party of China has already taken this action in Brazil, Chile, Belgium, Switzerland and other countries. In the event an international conference of all fraternal parties is called, the Communist Party of China will undoubtedly argue that these small splinter groups represent the real Communist Party of the country involved.

At the same time, the Communist Party of China is establishing closer relations with capitalist countries. is happening in Japan, England, France and West Germany. United States interests are also establishing closer ties with the Chinese through establishments in Japan which are negotiating with the Chinese seeking to sell complete factories that originate in the United States.


Summary of Letter from Soviet Premier Khrushchev to MAO Tse-tung, Chairman, Communist Party of China, dated November 29, 1963

The Communist Party of the Soviet Union, as well as many fraternal parties, is concerned with the fact that differences between the Communist Party of the Soviet Union and the Communist Party of China are growing deeper and the polomics sharper. As a result, those fraternal parties which are compolled to wage a struggle against imperialism are being placed in a very difficult position. The Communist Party of the Soviet Union desires that steps be taken to remove the differences which have arisen and believes there are vast possibilities for strengthening the ties between China and Russia in economic. scientific, technical and cultural cooperation. Khrushchev proposed that during the next few years steps be taken to expand Russian exports to China of vital materials and at the same time stops be taken to expand imports from China for the mutual beneflit of both countries. Khrushchev stated that in accordance with a protocol signed May 13, 1962, by both countries, Russia in 1964 will reopen negotiations on delivery to China of complete sets of equipment, the production of which was delayed for two years in accordance with a request made by the Chinese.

Khrushchev reaffirmed his readiness to send to China specialists, if the Chinese so desire, to aid in the construction of industrial enterprises, particularly in developing the oil and mining industries. He indicated that China, Russia and the entire socialist camp would gain from such cooperation.

With regard to the abnormal border situation between Russia and China, Khrushchev proposed that friendly consultations be held which will eliminate the existing misunderstandings. He noted that the border dispute can be traced back to the times of the Russian czars and Chinese emperors, who relied on their will in setting the frontiers. Khrushchev suggested that by denouncing the reactionary action of the exploiter clique which was in power at that time, both countries can face the reality of the existence of historically established frontiers.

Khrushchev also called Kor an end to open polemics, noting that the Communist Party of the Soviet Union had previously made this appeal on October 25, 1963, and November 7, 1963. In this connection, he noted that the Soviet press had

stopped publishing articles of polemic character. Khrushchev proposed that hereafter exchanges of opinions should be carried out by means of mutual consultations, negotiations and exchange of letters.

With regard to the holding of an international conforence of all fraternal parties, Khrushchev noted that the Communist Party of the Soviet Union and the Communist Party of China, as well as many other fraternal parties, are in favor of such a conference. However, at the same time, he emphasized that it is the duty of all fraternal parties to promote the atmosphere which will make such a meeting most fruitful in order that such a meeting would not result in a split in the world communist movement.

In conclusion, Khrushchev noted that although Russia and China differ in understanding of some ideological problems, "time will correct those who are mistaken." He stated that the Communist Party of the Soviet Union is determined to do its best to achieve the change toward strengthening the unity of the world communist movement and of friendship between the peoples of China and the Soviet Union.

Oswald had no connection whatsoever with the Soviet Union. He was a neurotic maniac who was disloyal to his own country and everything else. Oswald requested permission to reside in the Soviet Union and since it was felt that his request was ideologically motivated, he was permitted to stay. He was sent to work in Minsk, where he subsequently married a Soviet national. He thought he would have a "soft touch" in the Soviet Union, but when he found he did not, he wanted to return to the United States. His departure from the Soviet Union was regarded as "good riddance." Oswald was considered to be a very "peculiar" person with no class consciousness. He was never in any organization in the Soviet Union and was nover accorded Soviet citizenship. Oswald subsequently expressed a desire to return to the Soviet Union and upon learning that it would take considerable time for action to be taken on his request, he became belligerent.

Officials of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union regard President Lyndon B. Johnson as a reasonable man, but are waiting to observe his deeds to see whether they match his words. The Soviet Union has recovered from the condition of the first few days following the assassination when it was in a state of national alert, but Soviet officials are worried that the assassination might lead to a worsening of relations between the United States and the Soviet Union. While Soviet officials feel that the situation has now improved somewhat, they believe there are dangers ahead unless a mobilization of opinion against the ultraright in the United States can be effected.

The following information was supplied by sources which have furnished reliable information in the past.

#### Shipment of Arms by Communist China to Iraq

When the Baathist regime recently came into power in Iraq, it began to pursue the war against the Kurds. As a result, the Soviet Union stopped furnishing to Traq materials for the use of the military forces of Iraq. The Soviets believed that this would have the effect of slowing down the war in Kurdistan. However, shortly thereafter, the Baathist regime accepted an offer of armaments from Communist China.

The Chinese had on hand a supply of obsolete Soviet arms which had been subsequently replaced by newer weapons purchased primarily from Great Britain. The Chinese sent their obsolete armaments, which bore Soviet markings, to Iraq

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Callahan Conrad DeLoach Gale

The Soviet Union considered this an act of provocation on the part of the Chinese designed to give the impression that the Soviet Union had supplied the weapons which were used to fight the Kurds. The Chinese are also shipping obsolete Soviet armanents to revolutionary groups in other parts of the world and this action has resulted in considerable embarrassment to the Soviet Union.



China. This is being done in order to determine if there might be a possibility of the establishment today in Communist China of an opposition to the present leadership of the Communist Party of China (CPC).

The debriefing of the Soviet technicians who had been among the last to leave Communist China seemed to point out that there was no possibility of the establishment of opposition to the present leadership of the CPC. In view of this, the CPSU intends to pursue the tactical line of "lefting the Chinese yell themselves hearse and be labeled the splitters."

#### Soviet Aid to Communist China

The Soviet people, while helping Communist China set up its national industry, denied themselves very many prime necessities of life. The operating large-scale enterprises in China erected with the technical cooperation of the Soviet Union include the Anshan Steel Works, Wuhan Steel Works, Changchien Automobile Plant, the tractor, bearing and mining equipment plants in Loyang, the electrical engineering turbine and boiler plants in Marbin, the synthetic rubber factory and oil refinery in Lanchov, the nitrate fertilizor plants in Kirin and Talyuan, the shale-processing factories in Fushun, the heavy engineering works in Fulaerhchi, and a number of high capacity power stations, aircraft factories and other specialized plants.

The production capacities of enterprises built with the help of the Soviet Union and put into operation by the beginning of 1981 amounted to the following:

The aggregate capacity of turbines put into operation at power stations equaled 3,259,000 kilowatts.

In 1960 the share of enterprises built up with the technical assistance of the Soviet Union in total volume of industrial output in China accounted for 30 per cent in pig iron; 39 per cent in steel; 51 per cent in rolled metal; 80 per cent in lorries; 91 per cent in tractors; 30 per cent in synthetic amonium; 25 per cent in electric power; 55 per cent in steam and hydraulic turbines; 19 per cent in generators; 25 per cent in aluminum; 11 per cent in heavy engineering, of the aggregate production of Communist China.

In the period 1950-1950, 8,500 qualified Soviet specialists were sent to Communist China to render technical aid. In the same period, 1,500 specialists were sent to Communist China to give a helping hand in science, higher education, public health and other fields. The Soviet Union did this although in dire need of such specialists. About 10,000 Chinese engineers, technicisms, skilled specialists and researchers received practical training at Soviet factories, construction sites, design offices and research institutes.

Of great importance were the Soviet technical and scientific assistance in nuclear physics research and the erection in 1953 with Soviet aid of China's first experimental atomic reactor and cyclotron. The Soviet Union supplied China with the very first models of unique equipment which even some Soviet enterprises had not as yet received.

The Soviet Union granted Communist China loans adding up to 1,774,000,000 rubles (in new currency) on favorable terms. Because of economic difficulties in China, the Soviet Union

deferred debt and interest payments for five years. On its own initiative, the Soviet Union provided China interest-free loans of 500,000 tons of raw sugar valued at 41,600,000 rubles, with 100,000 tons to be returned in 1964 and 1965 each, and 150,000 tons in 1966 and 1967 each. In 1961, also on its own initiative, the Soviet Government proposed providing Communist China with 1,000,000 tons of grain at a time conventent for China. Of this amount, 300,000 tons were shipped in the Spring of 1962 at the request of Communist China.

No is reported as having been a member of the Communist Party, USA, in the 1940's, as well as having been a member of or associated with communist front organizations in the 1940's and In late 1052, according to Hall, Baldwin was placed on the pay roll of the Party in view of his important contacts with "liberal and progressive people." His job was to sold various "political alliances" designed to influence the direction of foreign policy in the United States and the Party considered that to be the most important activity it had undertaken in some time.

Between 1933 and 1943 Aubrey Willia Williams was employed by the Federal Emergency Relief Administration, Works Progress Administration and the National Youth Adminintration. No is President Emeritus of the Southern Conference Educational Fund, Incorporated, the successor organization of the Southern Conference for Human Welfare which was cited by the Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives, as a communist front. Williams has been associated with a number of communist fronts in the past.

11/21/63, at the invitation of JAMES JACKSON, Editor of "The Worker". During the course of their visit, these "journalists", including NICKOLAY MOSTOVETS, met BEN DAVIS, who happened to be at "The Worker" office at the time.

After a dinner party at the headquarters of the Soviet Mission to the UN on the evening of 11/21/63, MOSTOVETS went to the apartment of ELIZABETH GURLEY FLYNN at the Chelsea Hotel, NYC, N and there conferred for about an hour with ELIZABETH GURLEY FLYNN and BEN DAVIS. N

BEN DAVIS, reporting to several members of the CPUSA National Board at CP Headquarters within the past few days, stated that among the comments made by MOSTOVETS during his conference with ELIZABETH GURLEY FLYNN and DAVIS were the following:

The CCCPSU, at this time, is not interested in, and will not convene, an international meeting of all the Communist Parties of the world regarding the dispute between the CPSU and the Communist Party of China (CPC). However, as a "follow up" to the July, 1963, meeting between representatives of the CPSU and the CPC, there will be another such meeting that will take place either at the end of 1963, or in early 1964.

As concerns FIDEL CASTRO, CASTRO does not disagree with the foreign policy of the Soviets, particularly as such policy concerns the CPC, but because of pressure exerted upon him by individuals in his own leadership, he cannot "act as he would like to act" in this regard. Those around CASTRO are of "pro-Chinese left thinking" and therefore CASTRO's actions and statements are subject to the influence of these individuals and the pressure exerted by them.

NY 694-S\* stated that as JOHNSON described the meeting between FLYNN, DAVIS and MOSTOVETS, it was not "an official meeting" at which MOSTOVETS was making any kind of "official report" to the CPUSA. The information that MOSTOVETS disclosed to DAVIS and FLYNN was apparently such as he would report to high ranking members of the CPUSA.

BRIEFING DISCUSSION BY VITALY KORIANOV, DEPUTY TO HEAD OF INTERNATIONAL DEPARTMENT, CENTRAL COMMITTEE, COMMUNIST PARTY OF THE SOVIET UNION, NOVEMBER, 1963

A source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, in early December, 1963, advised as follows:


During mid-November, 1963, Vitaly Korianov, Rosson, Deputy to Boris N. Ponomarev, a member of the Secretariat question and Head of the International Department, Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU), met with a representative of the Communist Party, USA (CP, USA) for the purpose of general discussion and a limited briefing on matters pertaining to Soviet-Sino differences. The essence of some of Korianov's remarks at this time is as follows:

"The CP, USA should understand that it will know the day that any letter is sent to the Communist Party of China (CPC) suggesting a resumption of bilateral talks between the CPC and ourselves. That you will be notified, you can rest assured. They, the CPC, as you know, asked to recess the meetings of July and since that time have used no initiative to reconvene them. We will give them a hint that we are ready to resume discussions and will base ourselves on the 1960 statement of the 81-Party Conférence. Let them, if they desire, interpret this as a weakness, but we shall not give them the opportunity to say that we prevented such discussions.

"You should also note that we are considering the preparation of another confidential letter to the fraternal Parties on this matter of our differences with the CPC. When this letter comes in, it will be based on the 1960 statement where it was agreed by all in writing that there should be no friction among the Parties.

"When we suggested the stopping of polemics, we also suggested that they, the Chinese, similarly discontinue. However, if they continue and attack other Parties—violate the rights of these Parties—there can be no objection on our part to such Parties resuming the polemics nor obligation on their part to discontinue such polemics.

"Recently the 'Australia Herald' in one of its editions of November, 1963, carried an interview with CHEN Yi, Foreign Minister of the Peoples Republic of China (PRC). CHEN Yi is the most outspoken, anti-Soviet of the Chinese leadership today. All of his moods are anti-Soviet. interview reflected that someone had asked him if it was not true that the Soviets were committed to defend the PRC. In response to this question, CHEN Yi said that the talk of the Soviet Union defending China is a lot of nonsense, the Soviet Union cannot defend anyone. This is why there can not be any coexistence. On the test ban treaty, CHEN Yi, in this same interview, stated that it was a conspiracy against China. Britain had joined in with this conspiracy and what it amounted to was three powers playing poker and each allowing the other to look at its cards, and China was not even allowed to play.

"In West Germany there is the government organization known as Organization for Defense of the Constitution, the West German version of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. This organization has been discussing for a long time what their attitude should be on Chinese printed matter coming into West Germany. That agency has now finally come to the conclusion that they will now help-circulate this Chinese matter.

"A few weeks ago I was in Algeria as part of an official delegation. We were there as guests of Premier Ahmed Ben Bella and the Republic of Algeria.

"It appears that the big problem there is the getting of one Party together. The CP has not been illegalized and no one has been arrested. The newspaper in Algeria with the largest circulation, 'Alger Republicain,' is the CP publication. The problem originated over the fact that the communists in Algeria had originally been against Ahmed Ben Bella's fight in Algeria and this has not been forgotten by the National Front of Liberation (FLN). Yet, the FLN does not oppose the CP. If the CP members want to be a part of the FLN, they can but they cannot act independently. The CP, however, does want to act independently and this is the problem.

"The Algerian revolution is at a lower stage than the Cuban revolution. In Cuba there is already a group of revolutionaries like Fidel Castro, Raul Castro, and Osvaldo Dorticos. In Algeria it is different. Premier Ahmed Ben Bella is not a Fidel Castro in makeup or in leadership qualities and is not surrounded by revolutionaries. Yet, we must say that Algeria is one of the most promising areas in Africa. Among the objective factors creating this situation are the following:

"Independence was secured after nine and one-half years of fighting. The country is rich in natural resources and already has a developed agriculture. The French fled the country, in the real sense of the word, and the OAS has left in total. The bulk of the French, including the reactionary part of the Algerian society, whosfled the country left behind their private property. Then, the youth is emerging into the new leadership and women are appearing in the leadership for the first time.

"From this, we can conclude that the revolution in Algeria is developing in depth and width and in addition they are working under the slogan of socialism."

During mid-Movembor, 1963, Morris Childs, Communist Party, USA (CP, USA) representative, who was then in Moscow, USSE, for the purpose of carrying out discussions with leading representatives of the Communist Party of the Covict Union (CPCU), not with Aloksoi Androevich Greekukhin, Assistant to the Read of the North-and South Agerican Section, International Department, Contral Committee, CRIV, at which tino he carried on discussions relative to financial matters. One phase of these discussions on financial matters related to certain "charity-typo cases" to which the CP, USA has been committed gid to a request for reinbursement of transportation costs incurred by the CP, USA upon authorization of the CPSU. As a result of these discussions, Greekskin in late Revenber, 1063, just prior to Childs' departure from Moseow for Prague, Carchoslovakia, turnod over to that individual a sun of money totalling \$0,003. \$1,000 which was to be a reimbursement to the CP, USA for the fare paid by the CP, USA for Max and Religioustein who had been officially invited to the Soviet Union and other socialist states for the purpose of looking into measy-making business opportunities for the CP, USA.

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


#### LETTER DATED LOYELDER 10, 1003, FROM GIL GREEN TO HENRY WINSTON

During November, 1863, Korris Childs, a representative of the Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), then in Moscow, USSA, for the purpose of holding discussions with leading members of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU), not with Alekset Grechukhin, Assistant to the Read of the North and South American Section of the International Degistment, Contral Committee, CPSU.

On that occasion, Grochukhin turned over to Childs a letter dated November 10, 1933, from Gil Groem, a current member of the CPUMA from Chicago, Illinois, to Henry Winston, a Vice Chairman of the CPUMA temperarily residing in Esseew, USCR. This letter had been intercepted in the mail by the CPCW before it had reached Henry Winston, but Childs was not advised whether Winston had in fact over received this letter. Grechukhin expressed some surprise that Green had sent such a letter expressing such thoughts through the open mails. The letter was furnished to Childs for the purpose of transmitting it to Gus Hall, General Decretary of the CPUMA.

The text of this letter is as follows:





"Chicago, Illinois "Fovember 10, 1933

"Dear Vinnio:

"Since I came off of parole I've sought for an opportunity to write you. But I just didn't want to write you a formal note. I wanted to write you a real letter of some length. It is this desire on my part that forced no to put off the netual writing from day to day for I had to see so many people when I hadn't talked with for over twelve years that I just couldn't find the time to write. Please forgive so for the delay.

"Let no thank you for the sentiments expressed in your letter of greetings. I do not think, however, that you let your enthusiann carry you away, for you exaggerated my little role-hill of contributions into a gigantic mountain of achievements. You should know that I have not sent your letter to the Korker for publication only because I would bo catarracced by ito publication and also because I think it would not be in keeping with the nature of the problems we face today. We can and should be proud of what we did contribute and of our volo, but at a time when we are still greatly irolated and have so much to do to break out of this state I think any exaggoration of even our past contributions would be haraful. The reason I say this is because here and there comrades think that our role yesterday, in and by itself, will be enough to regain positions lost in the mass governent over recent years. We still have a long and difficult climb aboad; in como respecta canter than the period we just went through; in other respects, nore difficult, for the new complicated problems that are just emerging will require a deeper probing and a richer, creative application of our thoory to American life than over before.

"Secondly, let me toll you comothing about how I have nissed you as a comrade and friend, and how I look forward to your return. I have always found you staunch and firm on matters of principle and at the same time exceedingly flexible in your approach to new problems and to the application of Marxism-Leninism to life itself. I wish you were here. There are so many questions we could kick around—questions relating to both policy and perspective. But that'll have to wait.

"There is one question I'd like to mention here just to got your thinking on it. It has to do with the international controversy with the Chinose conrades. I am quite disturbed by some aspects of it. Not that there is a controversy. I think differences are inovitable; even exceedingly sharp differences. For the world situation is extremely complicated, conditions in different parts of the world so completely different, that it would be something of a miracle if all were to view them in exactly the same way. Furthermore, there are contradictions also within the coclalist system and in the relations between socialist states -- not antagonisms -- but contradictions, as in all life, and those have to be faced openly, analyzed objectively, or else they could become transformed into antagonisms. Also; even when there is basic agreement on analysis, I can ace where the difference in specific geographic location, or other such difference; could call for a different kind of tactical approach. Therefore any tendency to say that similarity of basic analysis must necessarily produce a similar tactical approach could likewise exaggerate a tactical difference into a more profound difference of basic analysis. Let me cite an example. I, for one, do not believe that Cuba's non-signing of the test ban treaty is necessarily a mistake, given, of course, her correct evaluation of the significance of the test ban agreement as a whole. But, in a situation where Washington has refused to consider a nuclear free zone in the Caribbean, and Cuba has been denied nuclear wcapons, why should Cuba unilaterally give up its right to these weapons until such a free zone is agreed to?

"I mention this, because I have met commides greatly disturbed because Cuba has not signed the test ban agreement, but yet I cannot feel that way. I do not believe that unity of the socialist camp procludes differences in tactical approach arising out of difference in national interest and position.

"On the major issue of dispute I, of course, believe the Chinese comrades basically wrong. How they can view every step to reduce world tensions as some kind of act of betrayal is simply out of this world. The criticism of the western parties is also dognatic and wrong and their attack on the Soviet comrades completely irresponsible. And yet, after saying all this I, for one, hope that no irrevocable break takes place. When I first read of various parties urging an immediate world conference to act against the Chinese I believed it a mistake and associate myself with the resolution adopted

"by the Italian party which urges delay and points to the need of a great deal of preparatory work. To my mind that means preparatory work with the Chinese, or else no conference should be held at this time. Whether the differences can be reconciled in the near future I do not know, but certainly nothing should be done to bring on a break. While the Chinese position does carry considerable Trotskylsm in it; there is however one difference we cannot forget: it is the position of a party leading a state with one-fourth of world mankind. Quite a difference!

"The question that disturbs me is how the differences were permitted to reach the stage of vitriolic name-calling that they have, particularly on the side of the Chinese, at least as far as public statements are concerned—for both sides could have been guilty of name-calling in more private discussions. I think that the main reason it reached this sorry state is that it was permitted to fester so long behind closed doors, until differences of shading and emphasis became differences in fundamental outlook. In other words, I believe the main fault is not to be found in the fact that the dispute came into the open, but that it came into the open only when it could no longer be kept quiet, only when it had reached a point of explosion.

"From reading the voluminous material published recently it is clear that the differences date back to the 20th Congress -- possibly even before then. Why wasn't there an airing of these differences in public? Certainly there were dangers; certainly it was going to tell the enemy that differences existed. But in my opinion a public, comradely discussion; could have checked certain tendencies before they became hard and fast lines. Nor do I have any fear as to how the party and non-party masses would have reacted. I have confidence that they would have responded to the corrections made in the Soviet Party and certainly responded in support of the policy of peaceful cooxistence. I think that it was a mistake to just brand the Molotoys, etc., as an anti-party group without ever presenting their views openly for discussion and rejectionfor I'm sure they would have been rejected. And let us recall that the Chinese comrades have done the same-they have branded those in their leadership who disagreed with their policies as anti-party, but without permitting their views to be presented to the party.

"What I'm saying is this; Was thore not a deformation during the Stalin period in the entire approach to inner party

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Is it not necessary to permit differences of opinion in the party, even though we demand that the party act as one when a decision is made? In the days of Lenin there were real inner party discussions and debates, but since the defeat of the Trofskyites and the Eucharinites there have roally been no such discussions. I think it is this failure to establish a real normal inner-party democracy and real meaningful party congresses where differences are thrashed out and resolved, which makes inevitable periodic explosions, for what happens is that contradictions that can be resolved and overcome become smothered until at some point an explosion occurs. With all the progress that the Soviet party has made in democratization, in gotting away from the dintortions of the Stalin period, it has still, in my opinion, not openly faced up to this need for a real inner-party democracy based on democratic contralism. For example, the speeches at the 22nd Congress refer to some letter from Molotov. But who, outside of the Central Committee or the Congress, knows what was in that letter? Certainly the present leadership does not have to fear its position to that extent. I think that there could be a great deal more confidence in the masses and their ability to react correctly to basic policy. I also think that this is the only way by which real cadre can be developed, for people must wrestle with ideas, must think thom through, must find their way by gotting all the facts of a situation and especially both sides of a basic disputo. Without this new cadro are dwarfed in their thinking, do not have self-confidence to solve questions for themselves and this reflects itself in initiative and responsibility, Only whon people think through questions do they have the confidence to act on their own; to make independent judgments and not to wait for orders from above. Otherwise we have a situation in which there is a spoon-feeding of the masses from above and in turn these masses expect more spoon feeding before they can digest things for themselves. In such an atmosphere it is hard to fight tendencies toward bureaucracy even when there is the best will in the world to do so.

I have written at too great lenth on this already. But I would like to get your view. I think this same tendency has reflected itself in the world movement and to one degree or another in various parties. I think that the Italian party is especially conscious of this danger and has developed a real inner democratic life and a real atmosphere of real discussion over basic questions. I note, for example, that a recent edition of the Italian theoretical magazine carried a debate over the whole question of whether fundamental structural changes are possible before capitalism as such has been done away with. And it conducts this debate without name-calling and vitriol of any kind. Likewise is it most objective in the way it debates with the Chinese comrades—



"never calling them names, always indicating respect for them and their party and people, and yet giving not an inch on fundamental questions. I, for one, an for more of this kind of inner-life in the communist neverent. I hope I haven't bored you.

"I saw your mother, sister and brother. Your mother is as youthful in appearance and spirits as she was when I first not her some 25 years ago. She is a remarkable woman. In fact, she looks younger than your sister.

"Write when you have time. I hope this finds you wall and that you'll be back home before long. Of course; do stay as long as you have to for reasons of health.

#### NATHAN GREGORY SILVERMASTER

However, such officials would not meet with him or even acknowledge his presence in Moscow. In view of this, Silvermaster made contact with Henry Winston, a Vice Chairman of the Communist Party, USA (CP, USA), who is now temporarily residing in the Soviet Union, for the purpose of seeing whether that individual could utilize his influencein setting up a meeting with CP representatives for him. Winston did attempt to set up such a meeting for Silvermaster but met with no success and, as a result, was greatly per-In Winston's opinion, here was a man, Silvermaster, who had devoted much of his life to the Party and now could not even see a responsible CPSU representative when he visited Mescow.

#### HARRY CARLISLE

In early December, 1963, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised as follows:

MEMBER OF C,P. OF GLEAT BRITHIA Harry Carlisle, a former member of the Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), who was deported from the United States to Great Britain in mid-1962, after a previous stay in the USSR, now resides in Budapest, Hungary, where he is an accredited correspondent for "The Worker," a CPUSA newspaper. It was learned during November, 1963, that Carlisle had expressed his intention of traveling to East Berlin, in the E. berl German Democratic Republic, at his own expense though as a AISTRIApartial guest of the Writers Union. Carlisle expected to remain there from September 27 to October 14, during which time he could be reached in care of Deutcher Schriftstellarband, Friedrichstrasse 169, Berlin 8, German Democratic Republic. Subsequent to his stay in East Berlin, Carlisle then expected to spend two or three days in Prague, Czechoslovakia, and then will travel to Vienna and Paris, following which he expected to return to Budapest at the end of October, 1963. Carlisle expressed the hope that in the spring of 1964 he hopes to visit Moscow, USSR, for a week or two and make a short trip to London, England.

It was further learned that during November, 1963, a representative of the CPUSA directed a communication to the Central Committee of the Hungarian Socialist Workers Party. This communication indicated that Carlisle has been constantly seeking advice concerning his activities from Henry Winston, a Vice Chairman of the CPUSA who is currently residing in Moscow, USSR. The Hungarian Socialist Workers Party was advised that Carlisle is not a member of the CPUSA,

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

A source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, during early December, 1963, advised as follows:

Cesar Escalante, Head of Ideological Department of the United Party of the Socialist Revolution of Cuba, returned to Cuba during late November, 1963, after a visit to the Soviet Union. During his stay in the Soviet Union, Cesar visited with his brother, Anibal Escalante, deposed Communist Party of Cuba leader. In addition, Cesar underwent a medical checkup and as a result of this checkup, according to a highly placed Communist Party of the Soviet Union representative; it was determined that Cesar has cancer and that at the most, he has a few months to live. Soviet doctors had initially hoped to be able to perform an operation on Cesar, but came to the conclusion that there would be no benefit from such action. Reportedly Cesar is not yet aware of the extent of his illness, but Soviet physicians have informed his wife, who accompanied him to the Soviet Union, of the full details.

# REORGANIZATION OF THE COUNCIL OF MUTUAL ECONOMIC ASSISTANCE

During early December, 1963, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised as follows:

During November, 1963, it was learned that the Council of Mutual Economic Assistance (COMECON) is being reorganized in such a manner that participants in this organization for economic coopereration among the socialist countries will be grouped according to their respective industrial levels. According to representatives of the International Departments of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU), and the Communist Party of Czechoslovakia (CPCZ), the purpose of this reorganization is so that those countries who have reached an industrial level near that of the Soviet Union can cooperate on more of the same level so that they do not lose ground by reason of their cooperation with the less developed socialist countries. According to these representatives of the CPSU and CPCZ, Czechoslovakia, the German Democratic Republic and Poland have reached such a level of production and trade where they can really cooperate with the Soviet Union in their integrated economic plans. It would appear that the Soviet Union has given up the idea that all socialist countries will catch up to the Soviet Union in industrial capacity at the same time.

BURLINSON: On the evening of 12/4/63, NY 694-S\* conferred with GUS HALL at the latter's home in Yonkers, NY. During the course of the discussion, NY 694-S\* told HALL that he would meet with his Soviet contact on the evening of 12/6/63. Referring to HALL's previous instructions to the informant to the effect that the latter should suggest to the Soviets that they contact the wife of LEE OSWALD and ascertain from her information concerning OSWALD's possible contact with the ultra-right, the FBI and JACK RUBY (see NY teletype captioned "CPUSA, IS-C; ASSASSINATION OF PRESIDENT JOHN F. KENNEDY, dated 11/25/63, P. 2) NY 694-S\* told HALL that as yet he had not delivered HALL's message to the Soviets and suggested that it might be inadvisable to do so, in that a security problem might be involved. 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The informant stated that undoubtedly Mrs. OSWALD would be under surveillance by Secret Service and the FBI and that for the Soviets to attempt to contact her might be dangerous. HALL replied that there was no problem in that Mrs. OSWALD is a Soviet citizen and the Soviets are within their rights to talk to one of their own citizens. HALL said that if need be the Soviets would contact her "officially". He reiterated his instructions that NY 694-S\* advise the Soviets pursuant to HALL's previous instructions.

HALL stated that he would furnish to NY 694-S\*, on 12/6/63, for transmittal to the Soviets and prior to the informant's meting with the latter's Soviet contact, a document reflecting HALL's evaluations of President LYNDON JOHNSON.

(It should be noted that by NY airtel dated 11/26/63 to the Bureau captioned, "CPUSA, POLITICAL ACTIVITIES; IS-C", it was reported that according to ARNOLD JOHNSON, CPUSA Legislative Secretary, JOHNSON, on 11/25/63, had been instructed by GUS HALL to contact C. B. BALDWIN, either in Connecticut or in Washington, in order that BALDWIN might provide JOHNSON with a personal and political evaluation of President LYNDON B. JOHNSON. According to ARNOLD JOHNSON, C. B. BALDWIN knows President JOHNSON "very well".)

The Bureau will be furnished a copy of the aforesaid document as soon as same is made available to the NYO.

HALL instructed NY 694-S\* to thank the Soviets for the manner in which they "reacted" to the news of President KENNEDY's assassination. He stated that their attitude of sympathy was "the correct one". He commented that a terrible situation would have existed if the Soviets had reacted to the news of the President's assassination as did the Chinese.

HALL then stated that the Soviets must be requested to cease making attempts to recruit people, especially those in the CP youth movement, for study in Moscow without first "checking with us". He stated the CPUSA would like to have something to say with respect to the advisability of any individuals

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going to Moscow to study. He stated that the Soviets were too lax with respect to letting "all kinds of persons go to Moscow." He stated that if the Party, at the time when OSWALD went to Moscow, had been advised in advance of OSWALD's contemplated trip to Moscow, the Soviets possibly could have been advised, as a result of CPUSA investigation of OSWALD, that he was not the type of person to invite to Moscow. HALL expressed the opinion that at the time when OSWALD went to Moscow, the latter was operating in behalf of the FBI. He further stated that "he could have been a nut, too".

HALL also stated that on November 29, 1963, the Party had received a letter written by OSWALD postmarked November 1, 1963. He said that the Party was very much puzzled with respect to where this letter had been between November 1st and November 29th.

With regard to President KENNEDY's assassination, HALL further stated that the Party has engaged "two private outfits", who are "left progressive", to study, investigate and report upon the matter of President KENNEDY's assassination. He stated that so far the only information available is that which has "come out of Dallas". He indicated that it might be "years" before the facts of the case may be ascertained.


HALL furnished no further information identifying whomthe Party had engaged to investigate the assassination of the President. NY 694-S\* will be alert to obtain such information, if possible.

HALL stated that during this very serious period following the assassination of President KENNEDY, the thinking of the people, including the government officials, was that the Communists are not a dangerous, anarchistic, violent group. As proof of this, he pointed to the fact that, whereas the Trotskyite offices in NYC and the pro-Castro headquarters in NYC were well guarded at that time by the police, the CPUSA headquarters was not guarded by the police. He stated that the

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public thinking with regard to the Party has changed and such current thinking is undoubtedly due to the "correct line" which the Party has pursued in the past few years.

HALL further stated that, with the exception of the "NY Daily News" that editorially called for violence against the Communists, no other newspapers throughout the country attacked Communists as having been instrumental in the assassination of President KENNEDY.

INTERNAL SECURITY - COMMUNIST

This is to advise you of the high lights of Solo Mission 14. As you are aware. CG 5824-S\* arrived in Los Angeles during the late evening of 12/2/63.

Source was in a state of near exhaustion due to lack of sleep. His physical condition is not good due to extensive hemorrhaging from an old wound during a 10-day period while in the Soviet Union which source said will require hospitalization for treatment upon return to Chicago. Source did, however, furnish the following summary of items of principal interest resulting from this mission.

#### (1) Soviet Reaction to Assassination of President Kennedy

You will recall memorandum Baumgardner to Sullivan 12/4/63. set forth this information which indicated leading officials of the Soviet Government and Communist Party (CP) were shocked and grieved. They reacted with an outpouring of sentiment and emotion rarely displayed in source's experience. The initial reaction of the Soviets was a state of national alert. Soviet officials are convinced the assassination was the work of the ultraright.

### (2) Sino-Soviet Dispute

Central Committee, CP of the Soviet Union (CCCPSU), and V. Korianov, his Deputy, advised there has been no resumption of Sino-Soviet discussions and none is now planned. Resumption of such discussions now rests upon a request of the CP of China, which has made no such request to date. No international conference of communist and workers parties is scheduled and if such is to be held, it will be in the distant future. While Chinese polemics continue unabated, the CPSU follows the policy of allowing the Chinese to cause the split.

## (3) Reorganization of the Council for Mutual Economic, Assistance (COMECON)

The COMECON is the communist version of the European Common Market. Korianov advised that participating countries in COMECON are being grouped according to the level of industrial production and trade.

Integrated industrial cooperation will be limited to the Soviet Union, Czechoslovakia, German Democratic Republic and Poland as they are the only countries which have reached the level near that of the Soviet Union and thus other less advanced socialist countries will not cause them to lose ground.

#### (4) Cuban-Venezuelan Activities

Alexi Grechukhin, Assistant to the Head of the North and South American Section, International Department, CCCPSU, advised that the CPSU has reaffirmed continuing support of Cuba, although the CPSU is disappointed with the Cuban behavior, which the Soviets believe is the result of Chinese pressure. The CPSU disagrees with the Cuban thandling of shipments of arms to Venezuela. (CIA has previously furnished information that arms used by Venezuelan terrorists originated in Cuba.)

#### (5) Chinese Arming of Revolutionary Groups

Grechukhin advised that Russia is being embarrassed in many parts of the world by the shipment of old spare parts and arms of Russian manufacture to revolutionary groups by Red China. He cited as an example that revolutionaries in Iraq are using Soviet equipment furnished by Red China.

#### (6) "World Marxist Review"

The "World Marxist Review" is the theoretical organ of the international communist movement prepared and edited in Prague, Czechoslovakia. Source met with representatives of this publication in Prague and learned that the CP of France has walked out of the magazine editorial board. (No details are yet available re this meeting.)

#### (7) Funds

Source negotiated with the CCCPSU for funds to support the Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), for 1964. Request by source was for \$1,295,000.

#### Miscellaneous

In addition, source met with Cesar Escalante, ideological head of the United Party of the Socialist Revolution of Cuba; one Jandik, replacement of Ladislav Kotzman as a member of the International Department, CP of Czechoslovakia; Pavel Lukianov, member of the Secret Service Department, CCCPSU; Henry Winston, Vice-Chairman, CPUSA, currently residing in Russia, and others but no details yet available re these meetings.

Hall desired that NY 694-S\* furnish to informant's Soviet contact a message, among which was the following. In two weeks Hall plans to make a "rounded out report" on developments. Included in this report will be some "dialog" concerning the relationship of "objective developments and related questions of tactics and strategy." In the report Hall intends to take issue with what "we" consider wrong and harmful tactics by some forces in Venezuela. It is "our" opinion that "they" are nothing less than the activities of petty-bourgeois anarchistic political juvenile delinquents. Hall said it was his feeling that silence on "our" part on these kind of questions does great harm to the developments of Marxist-Leninist policies in our country, as well as on a world scale. Hall requested that if at all possible he would appreciate having "your" reactions to this question, as well as "our" publicly taking issue with it. He said he was appreciative of the problem that "we" are a Party of an imperialist country that exploits and enslaves the people of Venezuela but that he could not "see us remaining silent because of this relationship." obśervations: The CPUSA plans an enlarged meeting of the National Executive Committee December 19 through 22, 1963, in New York City. It is probable that at that time Hall desires to discuss the situation in Venezuela. It is interesting to note that despite the claims of the CPUSA that it is a domestic Party, Hall is awaiting instructions from Moscow before taking to task "some forces in Venezuela." On Novembor 6, 1033, Horrin Childs, a representative of the Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), arrived in Hoscow, USER, for the purpose of holding discussions with leading members of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU). On that name date, Childs not with Nikolai Vladimirovich Hostovets, Head of the North and South American Section, International Department, Central Committee, CRSU, and his assistant, Alchiel Grechukhin.

At this time, these individuals turned over to Childs for transmittal to Cus Hall, Ceneral Secretary of the CPUBA, a letter dated Movember 2, 1933, to Hall from Henry Winston, a Vice Chairman of the CPUBA temporarily residing in Moscow, USSR. Enclosed with this letter were a letter dated September 24, 1933, to Henry Winston from Harry Carlisle, a former number of the CPUBA who was deported from the United States to Great Britain in mid-1932, and a letter dated Hovember 2, 1933, to Carlisle from Winston. This letter from Winston dated Movember 2, 1933, with its enclosures had been turned ever by Henry Winston to the CPSU to be mailed to Gus Hall, but the CPSU had not done so. It was considered more expedient by the CPSU to have such letters hand carried to the United States by Childs.

The texts of these letters are as follows:

"Loseow, Novembor 2, 1933

"Doar Gus.

"Tarmost greetings and very best wishes for the holidays.

This is a brief note in which are enclosed two letters, one from Earry and the one sent to him.

"In my judgment, he acts like a maverick, frustrated individual and not an an organised person. The plain fact is that I am sick and tired of this type of behaviour. I think that it was a mistake for the Forker to issue him a correspondent's card.

"I should like to get an answer as soon as possible. Warmest regards,

LETTER DATED OCTOBER 24, 1963, FROM HENRY WINGTON TO GUS HALL, ENCLOSING LETTER DATED OCTOBER 18, 1963, FROM DEATRICE SISKIND JOHNSON TO HENRY WINSTON

On November 6, 1933, Forris Childs, a representative of the Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), arrived in Moscow, USSR, to hold discussions with leading representatives of the Communist Party, Soviet Union (CPSU). On that date, he met with Mikolai Vladimirovich Mostovets, Head of the North and South American Section, International Department, Central Committee, CPSU, and Aleksei Grechukhin, assistant to Mostovets.

At this time, these individuals turned over to Childs for transmittal to Gus Hall, General Secretary of the CPUSA, a letter to Hall dated October 24, 1933, from Henry Winston, a Vice Chairman of the CPUSA who is temporarily residing in Mescow, USBR. Also enclosed with this letter was another letter dated October 18, 1963, to Henry Winston from Deatrice Siskind Johnson, "The Worker" correspondent in Havana, Cuba. This letter from Winston dated October 24, 1963, with its enclosure had been turned over to the CPSU by Henry Winston to be mailed to Gus Hall, but the CPSU had not done no. It was considered by the CPSU more expedient to have such letters hand carried to the United States by Childs.

The texts of these letters are as follows:

"Moscow, October 24, 1953

"Dear Gus,

"Warmest greetings and best wishes to you and all my friends.

"I have been giving a great deal of thought to the question of how best I can help to implement the correct mass line of our Party. The medium of letter-writing is the only way in which I can pass on some rough thoughts and thereby participate in discussions with my comrades. I shall raise no new questions but limit myself to several thoughts which may be helpful in implementing the correct policy of the Party. Why is this so?

"Events continue to move in a more favourable direction. The opportunities are ripening for developing struggles based on a policy geared to the building of the anti-monopoly coalition. The present struggle within the two old parties, the Democratic and Republican, are but reflections of happenings taking place within the ranks of all classes in society, but especially the movement within the ranks of Labour, the Negro people, the Middle Class, the youth in general and the students in particular.

ing of the Party in your analysis of the two-party system. I gather from the press that preparations in general and in the ranks of our Party in particular for 1934 have already begun. The year 1964 will be a major event in the life of the Party and in the history of the world. Naturally it would be a matter of honour to be able to participate in helping to shape the outcome of that struggle. Meanwhile let me limit such a contribution to several thoughts which you may find helpful in thinking. In any case, I will get them off my chest.

"1) The issue of Communism is on the lips of millions. This thought was developed by you in a number of reports. This means that growing sections of the population are beginning to discuss the best ways of developing the day to day struggle in defence of their inmediate interests and the differences between social systems as well. This points up the need of undertaking to build our Party among the decisivo sections of the working class, the Negro people and the youth so that it can fully participate in the thinking and action shaping up among the masses. Naturally, this means that we will undertake todevelop selected recruiting among the employed and the unemployed young and old, and the building of shop, industrial, community and institutional clubs. It is clear that the building of the Party along those lines cannot be done in the same way as it was done in the past. Yet we must build the Party. (This is a process that has to take into account the existence of the McCarran Law, Taft-Hartley, Landrum-Griffin Bill, trade union resolutions in respect to communism, FBI stool-pigeons and company spice.) This point is

well understood by our Party and does not need development. Meyertheless my concern is to find the main link in the chain which, if tackled decisively in a concentrated way can result in a qualitative improvemont in our work on all fronts. I believe that the Worker is the link in the chain which provides the basis for unfolding in the country a massive ideological and political campaign in which the viewpoint of the Party can be brought to the masses. At the same time it will be possible to develop new cadres, which must include comminists and non-communists. To do an effective job on Party building means that the No. 1 problem before it must be the question of the Worker both from the standpoint of content, makeup and its circulation as well. This means that the Worker must be a major item on the agenda of all Party organisations and become the contral feature of its work. But this has meaning only if the Party itself gave its primary attention in Party building to that of the press. It seems to me that as we approach 1934 that such an approach can become most offective in helping to fight for the general line of our Party. It is my opinion that the time has arrived when we should place as a practical question the undertaking of steps aimed at the creation in the immediate period of a daily newspaper in the country. I think that the re-establishment of a doily Worker is dictated by the needs of the moment: the growing socialist consciousness, new developments in the labour and the Negro people's movement, the new thinking among the masses about concrete issues in the day to day struggle and about communism as well.

"It seems to me that if such a political orientation is agreed upon that one of the main organisational conclusions that should be drawn is the creation of a network of worker clubs. Such a form will provide an additional basis for Party recruiting and enlarge the number of Party sympathisers as well for such a club should consist of Communists and non-communists. The aim of such clubs should be limited in character and there should be no limit placed upon the size of these clubs. For example, a club could begin with as few as 5 people and there does not have to be any limit as to its numerical growth. These clubs should be in character primarily educational.

They would come togother to discuss the contents of the paper and the significance of the contents internationally, nationally and locally. These clubs will help to stimulate reader interest and the building of the paper by establishing a steady readership based upon subscription by mail or delivery, bundle orders and the building of routes by house-to-house convass-These clubs, consisting of Party and non-party workers interested in becoming better acquainted with the ideas of Communism should organise weekly forums in which national, state and local speakers. participate. It can organise debates and symposiums as part of its activities and all of this can be part and parcol of offorts to lay the groundwork for a daily paper if and when such an idea is acceptable. I believe that the year 1934 would be an excellent tine to begin such a massive undertaking. Even to suggest such an idea poses the very difficult problem of finances. That is, the weekly deficit that comes to a very large sum. Perhaps even before that is the question of a printing press. But it seems to me that those problems can be successfully solved if tackled. It will not be easy. The objective situation, on the other hand, presents no danger that should prevent such an undertaking. The contrary is true. The objective situation seems to demand such a paper which can be decisive in turning the tide in favour of peace, democracy and socialism. I think that our Party cadres will equal the task which is so urgently needed at the present time. This is individual thinking, but it seems to me that it is correct and we will find eager hands reaching for the paper once that is begun and, lastly, the fight for such a paper will be carried on under the main slogan the Freedom of the Press. Let me know your thinking about this proposition.

"Some time ago Betty asked me for an article. I agreed to write it and in fact drafted it. The title of the article was the indispensable necessity of the Communist Party in the United States. I never sent the article because I felt that the question of the main link in building the Party today was very very weak. I feel that the approach to building the press provides the answer. If such an approach is agreed upon or your thinking about the matter is given to me, the article will be completed post-haste.

"2) It seems to me that another concrete question that could very well be considered by the Party relates to the struggle of the Negro people. I have in mind of emphasising anow the slogan of Representative Government. This slogan has general validity but has a special meaning when applied to the South. The Blogan of Representative Government quite unlike the slogan of Colf-Determination, does not necessarily raise the question of changing the political structure (this slogan would, however, include the fight against Jorry-mandering). The slogan of Colf-Poternination raised the slegan of the political unity of the black bolt. This slogan does not. It sharply raises the question of equal representation of Nogroos in the city, county, state and Federal govornment. This means elected and appointed reprocentatives. The slogan Representative Government is a fighting denocratic slogan which can unite the popular mass, Hogro and white, in the fight against Dixiocratica. The fight against Dixiocratica that is white supremacist rule, means a firm democratic front against the unjust laws, statutes and ordinances which is expressive of the main content of the fight now being waged in the South for the right to vote. It is a slogan designed to rally as active allies democratic forces among the white masses, neutralisation of other sections in advancing the fight and completely putting to rout the most rabid white sup-This means as the December 1962 Declararomicists. tion of the Party puts it, to develop the fight for this slogan as part and parcol of a gonoral crusado for decocracy in the South and in the country as a whole. Side by side with this a positive approach should be taken to enforce the 14th amendment to the Constitution. It would be extremely useful if some Congressman or some Denator could, on the floor of the House or the Sonate propose a resolution to uncoat overy single Dixiecrat, because they occupy these seats illogally. It would be well to investigate whether logal action against such mon in the Sonate and Louse can be taken only by these bedies. Laybe sees other legal forms of action could be instituted through the courts, (I have never heard of it) and if this is possible, should be done. But in any case a resolution or a speech on this specific question could become a tremendous inspiration to those forces that

are vaging such a courageous struggle that is now impriring the world. Our Party should advance this slogan so that the rais movement will be able to more clearly see the role of our Party and draw further conclusions about that.

"Lastly, aren't there any possibilities of taking a Federal action to reenforce the mass actions of the Hogro people to guarantee that the year 1034 bring about a doubling of the Negro registration. It may be possible to select a few cities for concentration where the full potential of all allies in the democratic fight can be brought into play and holp make the beginning. ACTIVITIES OF LORDIS CHILDS, COMMINIET PARTY, USA, REPRESENTATIVE, PRACUE, CZECEOSLOVAKIA, KOVEMBES 4-6, 1963

Lorris Childs, a representative of the Communist Party, USA (CP, USA), travoling under the identity of Uarold M. Jules, arrived in Prague, Czechoslovakia, during the afternoon of Rovember 4, 1963, by air from London, England. On arrival in Praguo it was noted that there were no recognizable Intornational Department, Control Committee, Communist Party of Czechoslovakia (CP of CZ) reprezentatives on hand to greet him and, accordingly, Childs contacted a known security representative at the airport. As a result of this centact with the occurity representative, that individual placed a call to the International Department and received instructions that Childs should be immediately supplied with transportation to the Central Committee, CP of CE, hotel in Prague where ledging and other needs had been arranged for him. Childs was also to be told that he would be not by one (first name unknown) Jandik, International Department representative, shortly after his arrival at the hotel. Shortly thereafter, Childs' luggage was picked up for him and he was taken by auto to the Central Committee hotel and provided with a room and other needs. After being cottled in his quarters, Jandik arrived and a friendly exchange of greeting occurred. Jandik explained to Childa that he had taken over the responsibilities for dealing with the CP, USA which Ladislav Kotzman had formerly hold and that Kotzman was now applicated to the Foreign Hinistry Offico.

Childs informed Jandik that he was just passing through Prague and that he was on route to Messeev on important business and therefore requested that travel arrangements be made in order that he could depart from Prague on Svember 5, 1993. Childs also requested that Jandik contact the Coviet Embassy in Prague and inform them that he was in the city and en route to Messeev. Jandik agreed to do these things for Childs.

Childs then advised Jandik that on his return from Moscow he would step ever in Prague and would like very much to see some representatives of the Central Committee of the CP of CZ. Jandik indicated that such meetings would be arranged. Jandik also indicated he was extremely happy to see Childs at this time and was pleased that this individual intended to stop ever in Prague upon his return from Moscow.

No noted he was particularly interested in getting information on the CP, USA since he was now primarily responsible for dealing with this Party. Jandik pointed out that he wanted to establish in the future closer relationships with the CP, USA. At this point Childs expressed appreciation for the courtesies which Jandik and the Party had already extended to him and particularly for the prompt action he had received on his vica request in London. Jandik then went into a very brief discussion of political matters in Czechoslovakia.

Since Jandik had another appointment that evening, he could not stay for an extended period. However, before he departed he informed Childs that if there was any need to contact him or need for him services, he would be available through the Central Committee offices. Prior to actually departing, Jandik left instructions with the hotel officials that any requests for services made by Childs including an automobile, chauffeur, or the like, should be henored.

After Jandik had departed, Childe, with authority and knowledge of Jandik, telephonically contacted Forman Freed. Communist Party (CP) of Canada representative assigned to the "World Harrist Review," and requested that individual come to the Party hotel for the purpose of discussion. Freed agreed to do this.

On Freed's arrival at the hotel and after an exchange of friendly greetings between the two individuals, Freed asked Childs if he had seen or heard of Nelson Clarke, a CP of Canada functionary, at any point within the last few days. Freed mentioned that Clarke had been scheduled to be in Prague to participate in a symposium under the spensorship of the "World Marxist Review" scheduled for late October or early Nevember, 1963, but that this symposium had been canceled. Freed noted that if Childs should happen to run into Clarke in Nescow or any other place, he wants that individual told that he should stop off in Prague to see him, Freed, as he had some information for the CP of Canada which he could not transmit to that Party except via the oral word. The matter which Freed was interested in relaying to the CP of Canada related to some existing difficulties at the "World Marxist Review" involving staff members from various countries.

After the above, Freed and Childs engaged in general discussion. It was at this point in their discussion that Childs raised the question relating to the poor nature of the

recent review appearing in the "World Marxist Review" of Gus Nall's parablet. Freed, in defense of the review and himself, noted that this review had been the work of the editor of the publication and that he had no part in its preparation. Childs then noted that except for the emission in the review of Mall's description of the Chinese as "bourgeois nationalists," the review of the parablet was generally good.

After completion of their discussions and Childs having informed Freed of his plans to depart Prague during the a.m. of November 5, 1963, Freed left the hotel.

During the early a.m. of the following Larming, November 5, 1963, Childs proceeded to the Prague Airport; however, upon arrival he found that due to the weather conditions which existed at the time, there was no presently available transportation to Loscow at that time. While waiting for a possible change in weather conditions which would permit such travel to Loscow, A. Mobelov, Associate Editor, "World Marxist Review," personally contacted Childs at the airport. Solotov was accompanied at this time by his assistant, one (first name unknown) Pospelov, who is responsible for the coordination of all of the work of the Carely people on the "World Marxist Review" staff.

At this time, Eobolov indicated he was quite upset and hurt by the fact that he had learned that Childs had considered passing through Prague without making any contact with him. He scolded Childs for his failure to even let him know that he was in town and for the fact that he had to learn of Childs' presence through Norman Freed. After the so-called "bawling out," Sobolov invited Childs to cat and have a drink with him at the airport which they did. All charges for the food and drink at this time were taken care of by Sobolov who had them placed on the account he maintained at that facility.

After it had been determined following the wait of a number of hours that there would be no flights to Hoscow on that date, Sobelov insisted that Childs accompany him to his home for a social evening. Accordingly, they proceeded in Sobelov's auto to that individual's home. On arrival at Sobelov's residence, Pospelov was dispatched by Sobelov to go out and locate Horman Freed and his wife and several other "Norld Harrist Review" staff members who were acquainted with Childs and bring them back to the Sobelov residence. As a

recult of this, a number of individuals did gather at Cobelov's residence that evening which was catiroly speat as a social gifair.

The following a.m. of November C, 1983, Childs was picked up at the Central Committee hotel and taken by autoto the Prague Airport in order that he night then proceed to Noscow. At the airport avaiting his arrival at that time were Jandik and one Zenick Wagner, leading representatives from the International Department, and Sobolov, Pospolov, and Freed, all of the "Vorld Marxist Review." All of these individuals desired to give Childs an official gond off from Prague.

At the airport Childs again had an opportunity to speak privately with Freed and at this time left with Freed \$100 which Freed agreed to get to Destrice Sie ind Johnson, "The Verior" correspondent in Havana, Cuka, through CP of Canada channels. Freed also at this time informed Childs that he had speken to Johnson prior to her departure for Cuka and that she had told him that Aleksel Andreevich Grechukhin, Assistant to the Head of the North and South American Section of the International Department, Central Committee, CPCU, had given her \$500 to carry with her. In connection with this \$500, it is known that it had been left in Koscow by a representative of the CP, USA in August, 1963, for the purpose of such transmittal to Johnson.

Also at this time during convergation with Freed it was learned that he does not now plan to return to Canada until approximately January 1, 1964, and that he hopes to be able at that time to stay for approximately three months in Canada. Freed, however, has a problem if he does this because he will have to finance his wife's return and their joint stay in Canada and presently has no funds available for this.

During the early afternoon, Childs departed Prague by air for Loccow.

INTERNAL SECURITY - FRANCE

The following information was supplied by sources which have furnished reliable information in the past.

There is presently a serious internal struggle taking place within the Communist Party (CP) of France. is due to the fact that Maurice Thorez, General Secretary of the CP of France, and his wife, who control the Party's leadership, refuse to allow any youth to move into leading positions within the Party. In addition, there is considerable resentment within the Party over the fact that while the French CP supports the policies of the CP of the Soviet Union, it does not get the same "international play" in this regard as does the Italian CP.

There has also been a severe internal struggle taking place in Prague, Czechoslovakia, at the headquarters of the "World Marxist Review," the international theoretical organ of the world communist movement, between representatives of the CP of France and the CP of Italy. The differences have arisen over the fact that the French CP opposes, and the Italian CP supports, in part, some of the actions of the Common Market. The differences are also based on the fact that the Italian Party pursues a policy of utilizing "flexible tactics" whereas the French CP does not. As a result, the Italian CP has labeled the French CP as "Stalinists."

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

The Editor in Chief of the "World Harrist Review" is disturbed over this development and has requested various fraternal parties to write letters to the CP of France requesting it to reconsider its action on the basis that it will further split the international communist movement.

The French delegation to the "World Marxist Review," although not officially severing its connection with this publication, is planning to go on an indefinite leave of absence. The opinion is also held by the French CP that the "World Marxist Review" may turn into the type of organ which dictates policy for the various fraternal parties. As a result of the rivalry between the Italian CP and the French CP and because the Italians have "become strong" on the staff of the "World Marxist Review," the French CP feels that the Italian CP could thus exert some influence on their inner-Party matters.



The purpose of this reorganization is to enable those countries which have reached an industrial level near that of the Soviet Union to cooperate on more of the same level so that they do not lose ground by reason of their cooperation with the less developed socialist countries. Czechoslovakia, the German Democratic Republic and Poland have reached levels of production and trade where they can cooperate with the Soviet Union in their integrated economic plans. The Soviet Union has reportedly given up the idea that all socialist countries will catch up to the Soviet Union in industrial capacity at the same time.

The following information was furnished by sources which have furnished reliable information in the past.

Cesar Escalante, Head of the Ideological Department of the United Party of the Socialist Revolution of Cuba, returned to Cuba during late November, 1963, after a visit to the Soviet Union. During his stay in the Soviet Union, Cesar visited his brother, Anibal Escalante, former Executive Secretary of the People's Socialist Party of Cuba, also known as the Communist Party of Cuba. In addition, Cesar underwent a medical examination in the Soviet Union. As a result of this examination, it was determined that Cesar has cancer and, at the most, has a few months to live. Soviet doctors had initially hoped to be able to perform an operation on Cesar, but came to the conclusion that there would be no benefit from such action. Cesar is reportedly not aware of the extent of his illness, but Soviet physicians have informed his wife, who accompanied him to the Soviet Union, of the full details.

The following information was supplied by sources which have furnished reliable information in the past.

Vitaly Korianov, Deputy to the Head of the International Department, Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU), as part of an official CPSU delegation, recently visited Algeria at the invitation of Premier Ahmed Ben Bella and the Republic of Algeria. According to Korianov, the big problem in Algeria is that of getting one Party together. The Communist Party (CP) has not been illegalized and no one has been arrested. The newspaper in Algeria with the largest circulation, Malger Republicain," is the CP publication. The problem originated over the fact that the communists in Algeria had originally been against Ahmed Ben Bella's fight in Algeria and this has not been forgotten by the National Front of Liberation (FLM). FLN does not oppose the CP and CP members can become a part of the FLN as long as they do not act independently. however, wants to act independently and this is the problem.

Korianov described the Algerian revolution as being at a lower stage than the Cuban revolution. He noted that in Cuba there is already a group of revolutionaries like Fidel Castro, Raul Castro and Osvaldo Dorticos. However, in Algeria things are different. Premier Ahmed Ben Bella is not a Fidel Castro in make-up or in leadership qualities and is not surrounded by revolutionaries. In spite of this, Korianov described Algeria as one of the most promising areas in Africa.

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

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

I want to take this opportunity to express our deep appreciation to the very correct and timely lead you gave in your reactions to the events during the critical days we have just passed. There did exist a very real and a critical danger that the reactionary forces would be able to initiate and enflame an anti-Communist hysteria after the dastardly assassination of President Kennedy. There were important forces that did everything to take advantage of the assassination to create such a hysteria. For the time being we have been able to block this development. Your timely and prompt reaction was very helpful in holding back such a tide.

On the other hand the impossible and irresponsible action of the Chinese comrades again proves that if a Party is following a wrong line on fundamental questions, it is bound to land on its head every time it reacts to specific developments.

About the new President. As you know, much about our politics is unpredictable, but we do have some basis of judging the possible course of this Administration. It is our view that President Johnson has been in that section of our political spectrum that takes a more sane view of the relationship of world forces and will reflect this in his policies and attitudes. It is also our feeling that he may be even more responsive to the movements, pressures and moods of the masses than was Kennedy.

Johnson is a man who has less of an eye for history and long-range viewpoints and is more moved towards the solution of the immediate problems and questions on hand.

But one cannot compare him with Truman because Truman had the mentality and outlook of a village political hack, while Johnson has a much broader viewpoint of political struggles. Johnson has retained throughout the years a close personal friendship with many of the old New Deal core, like Beanie Baldwin and Aubrey Williams. This may have some significance in the coming period of the Administration.

So we feel he will continue in the direction of the policies of the Kennedy Administration and will possibly even try to utilize the newness of the Administration to get around some difficulties

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and binds that the Kennedy Administration had worked itself into. We are proceeding on the premise that this Administration, while representing American capitalism and imperialist interests, can be influenced by mass struggles and mass movements.

In two weeks I am going to make a rounded-out report on these developments. Included in this report will be some dialogue about the relationship of objective developments and related questions of tactics and strategy. In this report, which will be public at a later date, I am going to take issue with what we consider wrong and harmful tactics by some forces in Venezuela. It is our opinion that they are nothing less than the activities of petty-bourgeois anarchistic political juvenile delinquents. It is my feeling that silence on our part on these kind of questions do great harm to the developments of Marxist-Leninist policies in our country as well as on a world scale.

If at all possible, I would very much appreciate having your reactions to this question as well as our publicly taking issue with it. I am appreciative of the problem that we are a Party of an imperialist country that exploits and enslaves the people of Venezuela, but I cannot see us remaining silent because of this relationship.

CUBAN SHIPMENT OF ARMS TO VENEZUELAN TERRORISTS

During December, 1963, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised as follows:

During discussions held during November, 1963, with representatives of the International Departments of the Central Committees of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU) and the Communist Party of Czechoslovakia (CPCZ), it was learned that the governments and Communist Parties of the Soviet Union and Czechoslovakia are very disappointed with the behavior of Fidel Castro of Cuba and are particularly disturbed concerning the Cuban and Venezuelan handling of shipments of arms by the Cubans to the communist terrorists in Venezuela, a number of caches of which were recently discovered by government authorities on the beaches of Venezuela.

Zenik Wagner, a representative of the International Department, Central Committee, CPCZ, who, specializes in Latin American affairs, reported that the CPCZ has verified that these arms shipments discovered on the beaches in Venezuela were in fact shipped from Cuba. But they did it in a clumsy, uncoordinated way and, as a result, millions of dollars worth of arms were lost and wasted. According to Wagner, in one batch they lost over one million dollars worth of arms. The Cubans did not consult with the Czechs or the Russians on this and as a matter of fact, the Czechs and Russians do not even know with whom the Cubans were negotiating among the Venezuelans.



#### STATUS OF CUBAN-SOVIET RELATIONS

During December, 1963, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised as follows:

During the course of confidential discussions in November, 1963, with representatives of the Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU), it was learned that the CPSU is very disturbed with the behavior of Fidel Castro of Cuha. The CPSU believes that Castro had been completely wrong in not accepting the offer of aid from the United States and the American Red Cross immediately after the recent hurricane which devastated Cuba. Later Cuba was made to look foolish in the eyes of the world when they admitted four Quakers for the purpose of furnishing aid to the Cuban people.

According to this source, there are no good words for Cuba among the leadership of the CPSU. However, diplomatically the USSR cannot cease their assistance to the Cuban regime, much as they disagree with Castro. Nevertheless, among the Soviet people as a whole there is a great deal of sympathy for Cuba which is a result of Soviet Government sponsored demonstrations. In the USSR there are regularly held Evenings of Latin American Solidarity," at which support is stressed for Latin American countries "oppressed by United States imperialism." These demonstrations are for Latin American solidarity in general rather than for any one country and they do not endorse concrete acts of particular Latin American Communist Parties.

It is the assessment of the CPSU leadership that at the time of the revolution, the Cuban CP was not a real Marxist-Leninist party strong enough to seize the opportune

moment and take over the governing power of Cuba. Now the USSR has been placed in the position where they have to "worship Fidel" in order to retain any position at all in Cuba.

The Russians are to be told that in the opinion of Hall this whole thing followed a pattern which clearly indicated it could have been done by no one other than the ultraright and that Hall feels that Oswald was killed by the ultraright-in order to prevent him from talking of Informant demurred, advising Hall that it might be inadvisable to deliver such a message in that a security problem might be involved. Informant cited the fact that Mrs. Oswald undoubtedly is under surveillance by Secret Service and the FBI and for the Soviets to attempt to contact her might be dangerous. Hall replied there is no problem since Mrs. Oswald is a Soviet citizen and the Soviets are within their rights to talk to one of their own citizens. Comment: Mrs. Oswald has indicated a recent desire to remain im the United States. She has claimed she knew of no connection between Oswald and the ultraright or Ruby. Hall's message to the Soviets could make him look stupid since the Russians have been inclined to shy away from any connection between them and Oswald. (\$ Hall stated that the Soviets must be requested to cease making attempts to recruit people, especially those in the Communist Party youth movement, for study in Moscow without first "checking with us." 100-428091 TG: kmi

The CPUSA would like to have something to say with respect to the advisability of any individuals going to Moscow to study and the Soviets are too lax with respect to allowing "all kinds of persons go to Moscow." If at the time Oswald went to Moscow the CPUSA had been advised in advance of his contemplated travel, the Soviets might have been advised as a result of CPUSA investigation that Oswald was not the type of person to invite to Moscow. Hall expressed the opinion that at the time Oswald went to Moscow, the latter was operating in behalf of the FBI. Hall further stated Oswald "could have been a nut, too."

According to representatives of the International Department, Central Committee, Communist Party of Czechoslovakia (CP of CZ), a conference was being held at Leipzig, German Democratic Republic (GDR), during late November, 1963, on the subject of the Common Market. Attending this conference on behalf of the International Department, Central Committee, Communist Party of Czechoslovakia was (first name unknown) Jandik who is in charge of relations with CPs in the important Western European capitalist countries such as Great Britain, France, and West Germany.

The source was unable to secure any further details regarding the above-noted conference.

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### ACTIVITIES OF LORRIS CHILDS, LONDON, ENGLAND, NOVEMBER 2-4, 1963

Oi arrival in London, England, from Now York City on EOAC Riight #500 during late a.m., Saturday, November 2, 1903, Eorris Childs, Communist Party, USA (CP, USA) representative, on route to the USSE, picked up his luggage and proceeded by cab to the Piccadilly Entel, Piccadilly and Regent Street W 1, London, where he registered under the name of Earold W. Jules. After the completion of his registration at this hotel, Childs departed on foot and after traveling goveral blocks secured a cab which took him to the entrance of Queen Kensington Park Cardens, London, a two-block long street on which many diplomatic establishments are located. From this point he again proceeded on foot to #6 Queen Kensington Park Cardens, the location of the Czech Embassy.

On arrival at the Embacsy, it was found that the front doors were closed, locked, and barred and that no amount of boll ringing or knocking got response. As a result, Childs proceeded to the rear of the embacsy where he found an open door and located soveral serub women working on the presises. Eswever, neither were able to understand English and he was therefore unable to communicate with them.

Dhortly thereafter goveral embassy clerks vere observed coming down a stairway on route home. One of these individuals spoke English and accordingly Childs informed this individual that he was an American businessman and wanted to peo the person in charge. At the name time Childs pointed out that his business was urgent. The Englishcocaking cabaccy clork thea took Childs into an inner embassy room at which time Childs told the clork that he wanted to sed Cenrado August. Childs was informed that August was not there and could not be contacted at the time. Childs then explained he needed a visa and if necessary they should tolephono Prague. Thereafter, the clork contacted the Consular representative and explained the situation to that individual. After an extended talk with the Consul, the clork came back and informed Childs that remeans with authority to incue a yica to Prague would be up the embassy coon. Finally, after approximately 45 minutes, this individual arrived. This individual noted that they had been informed of Childs' posding arrival but had not propared as yot the visa for his travol to Pragio. Es indicated he could propare such a viça

and asked Childs whether he desired a stamped-type visa or a loose visa for his passport. When Childs indicated he had no preference, the employee stated that a loose visa night be the best for his and that such a visa created no problem and was not unusual in Critain. In addition, this employee stated that all individuals departing from London via DEA utilize the same departure gate and, therefore, unless asked the specific destination, do not have to show a visa or a passport. This, he noted, was no because no American needs a visa for departure from Great Critain to travel to MATO countries of Europe.

At approximately 4:00 p.m., November 2, 1963, the embassy employee had finished the preparation of the vica and turned it ever to Childs. Childs thanked the embassy employees for the time they had spent and the competation they had given him and shortly thereafter returned by an indirect route to the Piccadilly Estel, where he remained there for the nights of November 2 and 3, 1963.

During the early a.m. of November 3, 1963, Childs confirmed recorvations for DEA Flight #018 scheduled to depart London at 11:15 a.m., Monday, November 4, 1953. Upon contact he was informed that much reservations were being held for him. Early a.m., November 4, 1963, Childs checked out of his hotel and proceeded by cab to the London Airport. At the airport it was learned that Eritish Customs officials now on a regular basis check the departures from Creat Britain in compliance with currency regulations forbidding the taking from the country an excess of fifty English Pounds. While the amount of funds being carried out of the country was the only matter checked, and was no concern to Childs since he had loss than that amount, it did cause him some concern because it represented a dual check by Eritish authorities both on arrival and departure from the country. However, no dolays resulted from this departure check by Eritish officials and Childs loft Konday for Pragic at approximately 11:15 a.m.

ACTIVITIES OF LORRIS CHILDS, COMMUNIST PARTY, USA REPRESENTATIVE, LOSCOW, USER, NOVEMBER 6-9, 1963

After departing Prague, Czechoslovakia, by air during the afternoon of November 6, 1963, Morris Childs arrived in Moscow on the evening of the same date. On hand at the airport in Moscow to meet him and extend cordial greetings were Nikolai Vladimirovich Mostovets. Hend of the North and South American Section of the International Department, Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU); Aleksei Andreevich Grechukhin, his assistant; and, Igor/Mikhailov, an employee of the North and South American Section. While exchanging such greetings, Mostoveta noted that this same group had been at the airport on the previous evening in hopes that Childs would arrive at that time. All were extremely happy that Childs had finally arrived but expressed disappointment over the fact that he was not accompanied by his wife Eve who is affectionately referred by them as "Pat."

After the completion of formalities of greetings, all individuals then proceeded to the private VIP section at the airport and after a brief stay at this point they all proceeded by automobile to the area of the Central Committee hotel in Moscow. In the area of the Central Committee hotel it was found that a new, small apartment building had been erected by the Central Committee of the CPSU for the housing of certain special guests. Childs was taken into this new apartment building and assigned to apartment 5. All facilities were prepared for him in advance including a short wave radio, a safe, library, television, as well as full-time maid service and attendents.

After having been settled in this apartment, general conversation occurred in which all individuals were involved. At this point, Nostovets noted that the pre-holiday meeting of the Presidium of the CPSU had been scheduled for that evening, November 6, 1963, at the Kremlin. However, since Childs was late in arriving in Moscow, they would all necessarily have to miss the affair. It was stated that they were hopeful that Childs would have arrived on November 5, 1963, and therefore had available a special invitation for him to attend this meeting of the Presidium. This pretting is one held annually on the eve of the November 7th celebration at which a main Party policy address is given by an important Party leader. This

year N. V. Podgorny of the Central Committee was scheduled to deliver the address and First Secretary, Nikita S. Khrushchev, was to be on hand. Subsequently, it was learned from Grechukhin that Henry Winston, a Vice Chairman of the Communist Party, USA (CP, USA) who is now temporarily residing in Moscow, had been to this special meeting of the Presiding and that he had spoken to Khrushchev at the time.

Other general matters discussed included plans of Mostovets to depart for the United States as a member of an unofficial tourist group. Childs, in this connection, furnished Mostovets with the telephone number of Jack Kling, a person known to Mostovets, in Chicago in order that either he or Aron Wergelis, Editor of "Sovietish Heigland," the bimonthly Yiddish publication in the Soviet Union and who was to be a member of the tourist group, could contact if the need arose. At this same time, lostovets noted that their tourist group had been delayed in leaving Moscow because of certain vica problems encountered at the U.S. Embassy in Moscow. Mostovets inquired as to the possibility of a visit to "The Worker" office in New York during his U.S. trip and as to how he night contact Elizaboth Gurley Flynn, Chairman of the CP, USA; with whom he is acquainted, After their general discussions, Mostovets noted that arrangements had been set up and a special ticket secured for Childs to attend the parade on November 7th and that Mikhatlov would be at the apartment building to accompany him to this function on November 7th. It was also pointed out that a three-day holiday would occur during the period November 7-9, 1963, Thursday through Saturday, and that arrangements would be sot up to socially entertain Childs. Since this was a holiday period, no work or official discussions would be considered or desired. However, Sunday, November 10, 1963, was being scheduled as an official work day in the Soviet Union in order to make up for some of the lost time.

On the morning of November 7th, as had been previously arranged, Mikhailov arrived at Childs' apartment with an automobile for the purpose of transporting and accompanying that individual to the parado. Accordingly, they proceeded to the reviewing area in Red Square where it had been arranged for the protection of Childs that he and Mikhailov be assigned positions among a group of Soviet nationals which was located come 400 yards to the left and above rear of the main body of reviewing Soviet officials which included Nikita S. Khrushchov, The military portion of this parade was extremely brief, possibly lasting not in excess of ten minutes. According to Mikhailov,

the only new item displayed at this time was the anti-missilo missile recently reported as having been developed by Soviet military forces. The military portion of the parade was followed by an extensive parade of civilian groups which lasted for approximately several hours.

Following the events in Red Square, November 7th, Childs was later joined by Mostovets and Grechukhin and together these individuals spent the evening at supper.

During the following two days, November 8-9, 1963, a general social program was set up for the purpose of providing entertainment for Childs in order to occupy his time. Arrangements were made for him, and he did attend in the company of Mikhailov, a seccor game in Moscow. Later, he attended the theatre as a guest of Mikhailov and his wife. Also during this same period Greekukhin and his wife accompanied Childs to the ballet in Moscow. During his various contacts during this period, Childs presented gifts brought with him as tokens of appreciation from the CP, USA and himself. To Mostovets he gave a Cross pen and pencil set; to Greekukhin he made a similar presentation and to that individual's wife he presented a sweater which he had brought on behalf of his wife.

It was also during this same period that Childs arranged through the Central Committee of the CPSU to contact Timur Timofeev, Deputy Director, Institute of World Economy and International Affairs, Academy of Sciences of USSR, Moscow, and to visit with him and his family. During this visit, it was learned that Timur was disturbed by the fact that his mother, Poggy Dennis, San Francisco, California, never writes to him and he cannot understand the reason for this. It was also learned that Timur's wife is now engaged in the advance study of the English language at the Moscow University.

HENRY WINSTON, VICE CHAIRMAN, COMMUNIST PARTY, USA, TEMPORARILY RESIDING MOSCOW, USSR

In early December, 1963, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised as follows:

Henry Winston, a Vice Chairman, Communist Party, USA (CP, USA), who now is temporarily residing in Moscow, USSR, has made plans to travel to the German Democratic Republic (GDR) in early December, 1963. In the GDR, Winston intends to make contact with Paul Robeson, Sr., who is now in a sanitarium near Berlin. It is also possible that while in the GDR Winston may attend an assembly sponsored by the Socialist Unity Party of Germany (SUPG) which was scheduled to commence on December 8, 1963.

After completion of his visit to the GDR, Winston will travel to Prague, Czechoslovakia, where he will be the guest of the "World Marxist Review," official theoretical organ of the international communist movement. In Prague, Czechoslovakia, Winston, with the aid of the staff members of the "World Marxist Review," will prepare an article for publication in the magazine entitled, "National Independence, U.S. Imperialism and Neo-Colonialism." The "World Marxist Review" already has assigned research people to this matterand in fact Winston's only task will be generally to review the material and have it placed in proper order for publication.

As of late November, 1963, Winston planned that he would be finished with his work in Prague and be back in Moscow by the New Year holiday, 1964.

Zenik Wagner, an official of the International Department, Central Committee, Communist-Party of Czechoslovakia, who specializes in Latin-American affairs, furnished the following comments to most sensitive sources of this Bureau concerning the caches of arms recently discovered on the beaches of Venezuela.

The Communist Party of Czechoslovakia has verified that the arms shipments discovered on the beaches in Venezuela were, in fact, shipped from Cuba. The following information, supplied in December, 1963, by sources which have furnished reliable information in the past, is being brought to your attention as a matter of possible interest.

Officials of the Central Committee, Communist ? Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU), are very disturbed with the behavior of Cuban Premier Fidel Castro. They believe that Castro had been completely wrong in not accepting the offer of aid from the United States and the American Red Cross immediately after the recent hurricane which devastated Cuba. In the opinion of these CPSU officials, Cuba was made to look foolish in the eyes of the world when Castro subsequently admitted four Quakers for the purpose of furnishing aid to the Cuban people.

DY COURIER SVC.

There are no good words for Cuba among the leadership of the CPSU. However, diplomatically the Soviet Union cannot cease its assistance to the Cuban regime, much as it disagrees with Castro's policies. Nevertheless, among the Soviet people as a whole there is a great deal of sympathy for Cuba which is a result of Soviet Government sponsored demonstrations. In the Soviet Union there are regularly held "Evenings of "MCLICE" Latin American Solidarity," at which support is stressed for Latin-American countries "oppressed by United States imperialism." These demonstrations are for LatinffAmerican solidarity in general rather than for any one country and they do not endorse concrete acts of particular Latin-American Communist Parties.

President of the USSR LEONID I. BREZHNEV from Iran, it became evident that KHRUSHCHEV would not be able to meet with the source prior to the source's return to the United States. Therefore, urgent discussions were arranged with the above members of the CCCPSU, who would subsequently apprise KHRUSHCHEV of their contents.

CG 5824-S\* was kept fully informed of all dispatches in this matter as soon as they were received in Moscow. IGOR MICHAELOV, a member of the International Department, CCCPSU, brought to the source the teletype accounts of the assassination and the subsequent slaying of LEE HARVEY OSWALD soon after their receipt. MICHAELOV informed the source that these accounts were being made available only to the highest levels of the CPSU, the Soviet Government and the press, and in fact cautioned the source that after reading them, he was to place them in his safe and that not even HENRY WINSTON, Vice Chairman of the Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), residing in Moscow, was to be allowed to see them.

The enclosed Letterhead Memorandum has been classified to Secret since it sets forth information furnished by CG 5824-S\*, a most highly-placed sensitive source, who is furnishing information on the highest level concerning the international communist movement, the disclosure of which would tend to identify this source and thus adversely affect the national security.

The enclosed Letterhead Memorandum has also been shown as having been made at Washington, D.C., in order to afford further protection to this source.

Soviet Reaction to the Assassination of President of the United States. John F. Kennedy on November 22, 1963

During early December, 1963, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised as follows:

On November 22, 1963, the date of the assassination of the President of the United States John F. Kennedy, the source was in contact with officials on the highest levels of the Central Committee, Communist Party, Soviet Union (CCCPSU). The source advised that the news of this assassination was greeted by great shock and consternation among these officials, who expressed their grief, which was characterized by a sentimentality rarely displayed among such officials, a number of whom actually wept. Initially, complete dispatches being received by teletype describing the events in Dallas, Texas, were confined to the highest circles of the Communist Party, Soviet Union (CPSU), the Soviet Government, and the press. After the first days, Soviet radio and television gave complete and sympathetic coverage to broadcasts carried over Telstar and Eurovision. They gave respectful and objective coverage of even such observances as the tolling of church bells and the offering of prayers in the memory of President Kennedy. Soviet officials expressed extreme distaste at the disrespect to the President's memory displayed by the fact that some other European radio stations continued to broadcast light entertainment and jazz programs. They characterized this in such terms as "Horrible! Horrible!" and "Such disrespect!"

According to the source, high Soviet officials were worried about what would be future developments in the world situation resulting from this act and expressed the belief that the assassination was the spark that was going

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to initiate a coup in which the ultra-right element and all those reactionaries who disagreed with the Kennedy policies, that favor some sort of detente on disarmament, and the settlement of disputes by negotiations, would take power and if they did take power, there would be some in the military or high places in the United States who would set off a world conflagration. They expressed the thought that the assassination was an effort by President Kennedy's opponents in the ultra-right and those whose interests would profit from military disputes, including the "new millionaires of Texas," to accomplish "another Reichstag fire" frame-up. Several officials recalled that when Adolph Hitler pulled his coup in Germany, his group took one Vanderlubbe out of a lunatic asylum, said he was a communist, set the Reichstag on fire, and blamed the communists. They started a roundup and smashed their opposition under the guise of an anticommunist campaign. Soviet officials were convinced that the assassination of President Kennedy might be the beginning of the same type thing by the fascist pro-war element to use the anti-communist sentiment in the United States.

Officials noted that the United States armament interests, the oil trusts, the banks, etc., who would be interested in utilizing such a thing as the assassination of the President, might move to stop negotiations by the United States with the Soviet Union and other socialist countries, attack Cuba, and then spread the war. As a result of this analysis by these officials during the first few days following the assassination, the USSR was in a state of national alert. Everyone, both Party and Government, was working night and day and orders were given for everyone to be ready for a state of war. Officials called the assassination the beginning of a coup or a new Vanderlubbe conspiracy.


On November 25, 1963, a representative of the Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), then in Moscow, USSR, met



with Boris N. Ponomarey, a member of the Secretariat and head of the International Department, CCCPSU. According to Ponomarev, the entire situation of relations between the Soviet Union and the United States had changed as a result of the assassination of President Kennedy and the policies of the CPSU and the CPUSA had to be completely redefined. Ponomarev's immediate and chief concern was what kind of a man is the new President of the United States, Lyndon B. Johnson. He expressed concern as to whether Johnson would be able to carry through any policies which might depart radically from the policies of President Kennedy. A prime worry was that Johnson might embark on some adventurous policy and make concessions to this ultra-right group which had assassinated Kennedy.

Calling attention to the statement concerning the assassination which was issued by Fidel Castro of Cuba, Ponomarev observed that even if the CPSU does not agree with some parts of this statement, in the main, it is correct. Calling attention to the anti-Kennedy tone of the statement issued by the People's Republic of China on this matter, Ponomarev observed that the People's Republic of China (PRC) publications had carried the most contemptuous stories and cartoons. Specifically, he mentioned a cartoon showing Kennedy falling head first onto the ground, bearing the caption to the effect, "So another one hit the dust" and stated that this is beneath contempt but that nothing better can be expected from the Chinese.

Turning to the effect of the assassination upon the CPUSA, Ponomarev indicated that it was his opinion that the CPUSA may face some serious trouble as a result. He observed that the United States press is trying to connect Lee Harvey Oswald, who was arrested for the assassination, with the Fair Play for Cuba Committee, with Marxists, and may even say Oswald was a communist. In his opinion, there is going to be some kind of panic in certain circles in the United States. They may start a big anti-communist campaign in which they will use the attack against the CPUSA as a prelude to a foreign policy change. Ponomarev stated that





it is important that the CPUSA do everything possible to find ways to fight back against this anti-Party, anti-Soviet, anti-Cuban campaign.

Recalling that on November 24, 1963, there appeared in the United States press a statement issued by the United States State Department that the assassination was in no way connected with any foreign government, although this statement was buried in the back pages of the newspaper, Ponomarev stated that no matter how little attention it received, it was important that the United States Government made such a statement.

Ponomarev observed that when President Kennedy was assassinated, it must have been clear for all to see and the entire world must know that he was killed by some reactionary maniac and not by communists. Only maniacs would think that the left forces in the United States as represented by the CPUSA would assassinate Kennedy, especially in view of all the abuse the CPUSA had taken from the ultraleft as a result of their support of the Kennedy policies of peaceful coexistence and disarmament. Ponomarev asserted that the assassination of President Kennedy was evidently caused by those circles who are against the easing of tensions in the world and who are against peace and disarmament. He stated that the Soviet Government is convinced that the ultraright had a hand in the assassination. He observed that at first it was possible to assume that there would be a wave of revulsion against the ultra-right but then it became apparent that the Dallas, Texas, Police Department was cooperating with the very same people who killed Kennedy, and possibly the same is true even of the FBI.

Ponomarev raised the question whether it is possible to turn the tide against the ultra-right in the United States today. He commented favorably upon the fact that the CPUSA has made a major contribution over the past few years in taking the lead in denouncing the dangers from the ultra-right.



Ponomarev was incredulous and was completely puzzled as to the motivation behind the slaying of Lee Harvey Oswald. He could not understand why it was done but expressed the opinion that Oswald was slain because the legal authorities had no case against him. What he could not understand in regard to Oswald was why he was killed since thus was destroyed the only evidence the authorities had.

Turning his attention to the investigation into the assassination of the President and the slaying of Oswald, Ponomarev wondered aloud whether the blood relationship to the President of Robert Kennedy, the Attorney General of the United States, would lead him to take a genuine interest in the investigation. Ponomarev expressed some doubts whether there are forces in the United States who are really interested in such an investigation. However, if there are, it would be possible for left forces to deliver a real blow against reactionaries and war mongers. He stated that it must be understood by all, even those who do not understand jurisprudence, that the police were involved in this whole thing. He expressed the hope that there are trade union forces in the United States that will be willing to show after the investigation that the ultra-right was really responsible, in the last analysis, for this crime.

According to Ponomarev, it is very important now for the CPUSA to mobilize all its forces, to point to the ultra-right, and to show the connection between the ultra-right and the assassination of the President, if not in fact, at least that the actions of the ultra-right do lead to violence and assassination. He noted that if the CPUSA can take the lead in this, it would be very good. If a united front can be developed on these issues, especially for peace, it would involve many elements not limited to progressives and this also would be good. Contacts among the people working in peace organizations should be made, even if they are not communists, to show them the seriousness of the situation. They should be reminded of the past history of frame-ups in the United States. He particularly cited.



the Tom Mooney case in California, the Haymarket Riot case, and the Sacco-Venzetti trial. The CPUSA must show this past history of frame-ups in the United States for their own protection. It is now necessary to utilize every possibility that arises out of this event to broaden the democratic impulses of the people. An effort must be made to locate a Senator who could take the lead to prevent a cover-up of this dastardly crime. A motion must be made in Congress to set up a committee to investigate and get all the facts. Ponomorey expressed uncertainty as to whether or not Oswald was actually the killer. He observed that this care is not precisely like the case of Vanderlubbe because the Nazis saved the life of Vanderlubbe, put him up on the stand as a witness, and then later executed him for the crime, but in this case the forces behind the assassination killed Oswald and destroyed the only evidence they had. According to Penomarev. Jack Ruby was obviously told to commit this murder of Oswald and Ponomarev described Ruby as "this cheap cabaret owner with Chicago hoodlum connections."

Returning to the subject of the late President Kennedy, Ponomarcy observed that during the Presidency of John F. Kennedy, he won the sympathy of the Soviet people. During that time, both governments had a great deal of contact and were able to sit down and talk. Even if they did not solve all of their problems, they were able to try. Kennedy's assassination has created a serious situation for the Soviets, for the United States, and for the entire world. Ponomarcy exclaimed that he just cannot understand why the United States has not passed a law to keep people like Oswald from getting guns. In obvious agitation, Ponomarcy expressed his perplexity, stating, "I can't understand it. DeGaulle gets away with it but how could this happen in a country like the United States where there is an orderly transition of government. If this had happened in Latin America, we could understand it but not in the United States."

Ponomarev then turned to the question of the correct tactic for the CPUSA. He said the task is to



think things out in light of the new situation. He again emphasized the mobilization of the democratic-minded masses against the ultra-right. The CPUSA tactic of denouncing the ultra-right is more correct now and their tactic of mobilization of the masses is more true now than ever before. Ponomarcy expressed the hope that President Johnson would continue like President Kennedy to attempt to reach some understanding in United States relations with the USSR. Nevertheless, the CPUSA must mobilize opinion against the ultra-right because he will be under severe pressure. As a result of this assassination, some people in high places might push a policy of an immediate attack against Cuba. On the basis of the CPUSA correct policy, the effort must be made to see if even President Johnson can be pressured into a correct policy for peace.

The essence of the above discussion with Ponomarev was that the USSR is hoping that President Johnson will continue along the same line as that pursued by President Kennedy so that the CPSU will not be required to develop an entirely new line in its international relations. Ponomarev stressed the fact that the CPUSA should continue to attack the ultra-right and leave alone those who favor peace.

On the following day, November 26, 1963, in a subsequent discussion with this representative of the CPUSA, Ponomarev displayed the CPSU file concerning Lee Harvey Oswald. Quoting extensively from this file, Ponomarev disclaimed any connection whatsoever between Oswald and the USSR. Ponomarev described him as a "no good, neurotic maniac, disloyal to his own country and everything else." Reading from the file, Ponomarev described how Oswald had requested to be allowed to live in the Soviet Union. The Soviets, believing that he might be ideologically motivated, allowed him to stay and sent him to work in Minsk, the administrative capital of the Republic of Byelorussia, where he subsequently married a Russian girl. He thought he would have a soft touch in the Soviet Union but when he found it was not a soft touch, he wanted to go home. Therefore, they said to Oswald, "Goodbye" and "Good riddance." Subsequently he expressed his desire to return to the Soviet Union. He went to the USSR Embassy and



requested a visa but was informed that there would be a long delay. He became belligerent, acted like a "hooligan," and cursed and swore at the Embassy personnel. They had to literally throw him out. Then he went to the Cuban Embassy and requested a transit visa to the USSR. The Cubans informed him that they could not issue a transit visa unless he had a visa from the country of his destination and in any event there would be a three world delay in obtaining his visa. Once again he acted like a "hooligan" and the Cubans also had to literally throw him out.

Ponomarev advised that the USSR was then preparing to turn over their entire file concerning Oswald to the government of the United States. This was being done in order to prove to the United States that Oswald had no connection whatsoever with the USSR. It was Bonomarev's belief that the very fact that the USSR would not accept him back again is proof that they have completely dissociated themselves from him. According to Ponomarev, the contents of the CPSU file on Oswald will prove to the United States that Oswald was no responsibility of theirs. Ponomarev stated he wished this information to be communicated to Gus Hall, General Secretary, CPUSA, so that he will know that the CPSU is cooperating with the United States Government on this and that this action was good for the CPUSA. Ponomarev stated that they considered Oswald a very "peculiar" person with no class consciousness and that he is only called a Marxist by the United States press because he was in the Soviet Union. Ponomarev stated that Oswald was never in any organization in the USSR, was never accorded Soviet citizenship, and as far as the USSR is concerned, they consider Oswald a deserter from the United States Marine Corps.



On November 26, 1963, the representative of the CPUSA held a discussion concerning the assassination of President John F. Kennedy with V. Korianov, Chief Deputy to Boris N. Ponomarev. According to Korianov, it is not important who killed President Kennedy. What is important, is who master minded it. This crime was certainly a blow against the Kennedy policies and administration. also a blow against the CPUSA, against the CPSU and against Cuba. Korianov also went into the resemblance of the assassination of Probident Kennedy to the Reichstag fire. He stated that we are possibly witnessing the beginning of the drive to put the ultra-right in power in the United States. He exclaimed that there is no example in history comparable to such a scene as the killing of Lee Harvey Oswald. He commented that when the Nazis set fire to the Reichstag, there was no television, but this happened in Dallas, Texas and was witnessed by millions of people on television. According to Korianov, this crime was obviously well thought out. The object, in the opinion of the U.S.S.R. was to terrorize those who stand in the way of a take over by the ultra-right and the most reactionary forces in the United States.

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In the first days following the assassination, the United States was obviously in a state of shock. Everything looked disorderly and wild. It was a scene without precedent in the history of the United States. But those who thought out this crime figured on Just this type reaction. But now this shock is over. According to Korianov, perhaps it is correct to say that a mass campaign can be developed on this matter. Korianov observed that when he would speak about the difficult days ahead for the CPUSA, he did not want to be too pessimistic. In his opinion, this unprecedented act of terror is not an indication of the strength of reaction. It is quite possible that if American public opinion is developed correctly, this big plot that was master minded by the reactionaries can be stopped.

Korianov continued, there are objective reasons





as to why this crime took place and why it can be stopped. It is easy to explain how this would happen in Latin America, in the Congo or in South Vietnam, but when it happens in a country such as the United States with a long democratic history and many traditions of democracy, it is another story. This is an act that is a "spit in the face of humanity", "an insult to American humanitarianism". The country that gave the world Abraham Lincoln and Franklin Delano Roosevelt, such people cannot stand calmly by in the face of such monstrous crimes.

Korianov noted, there are avenues where a possible campaign can be carried on against these terrorists despite the activities of the fascists. Obviously those who believe in democracy are not united in a central organization. However, keep in mind that despite all the reactionary laws that perpetuate Jim Crow, there is an upsurge in the United States. There is a force that would fight reaction. The Soviet Union says that the unknown assassin was shooting not only at President Kennedy, but at the forward movement of history. It is clear that the assassination of President Kennedy was to have created a pallor of fear over the United States, but the correct policy of the CPUSA when it raised its voice and pointed to the danger of the fascists and rightists must now remind millions of people of this fact and even if these millions would not listen to the CPUSA before, life itself is a great teacher. Life proves that the communists are always correct.

Korianov pointed to the example of Algeria, from which country he had recently returned. He stated that when the war started in Algeria only the Communist Party of France was against it and the Communist Party in France was pictured as a group of scoundrels and traitors, holding allegiance to a foreign government, i.e., the Soviet Union. History showed that even Charles de Gaulle had to recognize this war for what it was and had to stop the war in Algeria. Although de Gaulle is the man in power, millions of Frenchmen learned who had projected this correct policy



of stopping the war in Algeria. As in the Algerian situation, so in the American situation, life is the greatest teacher. Who knows? Some historians in the future will discover that even John F. Kennedy took a position against the ultra-right because he too perhaps had learned from the Communist Party. Millions who heard the shots in Dallas will remember who first raised its voice against the ultra-right.

According to Korianov, there is another objective reason why the events in the United States can be turned against the ultra-right. He noted that there are serious differences among the ruling class in the United States. It is a fact that Kennedy promoted people into high positions that were more democratically-minded. Therefore, if President Johnson would want to change things very rapidly, he could not do it. Robert Kennedy would have his word to say also, and there would be good reasons with which to start a fight. In addition, there are personal interests involving Robert Kennedy. After all, the murdered man is his blood brother and does not this call for revenge? He would never stand for the covering up of the true murderer. Also there are some very influential people in Government and, while they may be anti-communist, they recognize that the deeper interests of the nation are at stake and they too would fight a cover up.

Therefore, in Korianov's words, there are objective reasons for a campaign in the United States against the ultra-right. The election is less than a year away. The Democratic Party's chances are reduced, but they are not hopeless. Korianov stated that if he were an American, he would vote for the Democratic Party. He noted that there are some basic reasons to look forward hopefully. If President Johnson tried to break with the traditions of Kennedy, he can't, because the world won't let him. But the democratic forces must be alert for the ultras in all countries who will push for a change in policy. The Germans are already pushing for such a change, having their own interests in mind. Also, it is no accident that



de Gaulle came to Kennedy's funeral, but the people in these countries have a different opinion. For example, the people and government in Great Britain will not agree if the United States policy should make a drastic change.

Korianov summarized: Now the reaction will try to turn the fight against the Soviet Union, against the CPUSA, and against Cuba. They may make a desperate attempt. This does not prove the strength or firmness of their position. On the contrary, it may prove their weaknesses. Also, there are objective conditions in the United States to turn events into the opposite of what the ultras expect. The international climate in the world is not favorable to gangsters. The events can be changed from an anti-communist campaign into a campaign for democracy and peace and the Communist Party will play its glorious role.

In summarizing his impressions gleaned from discussions with the above officials of the CPSU and with others in the Soviet Union, the source made the following observations:

Soviet officials were terribly shocked by the assassination of President Kennedy to the point of emotional upset. They were shocked to the point where they actually believed that there is some large well-organized conspiracy on the part of the ultra-right to effect a coup. With the passage of time and after receiving a message from President Johnson in reply to the Soviet letter of condolences, they have now changed their mind a little bit. They have the idea that Johnson is a reasonable man, but being practical men they are waiting to observe his deeds to see whether they match his words.

soviet officials are convinced that there is an organized conspiracy on the part of the ultra-right and they are convinced that the assassination of President Kennedy was not the deed of one man, but grows out of a certain well calculated compaign. They believe that others had part in the planning of this crime. They were also of the opinion that the planners of the assassination figured on taking





advantage of the initial shock of the United States because people would unthinkingly give way to hysteria. The ultraright, the generals, the admirals, etc. would utilize this to press for a drastic change of policies leading to war, for example an attack on Cuba. Such an act of aggression would result in a de facto state of war before the people of the United States have time to even think about it.

Many functionaries in the CPUSA; in the government of the U.S.S.R., as well as the population at large, were affected by the assassination of Kennedy to the point of extreme sentimentality. They believe that the United States, like the U.S.S.R., is that power that to a large extent. like the U.S.S.R., controls the destiny of humanity. That is why they are worried. Now they are waiting to see what President Johnson will do. Soviet officials expressed very great interest concerning Johnson's policies, his politics, his connections and the interests from which he They have somewhat recovered from the condition of the first few days when they were in a state of emotional shock and in a state of national alert and were also afraid that someone might push the wrong button. They were worried about the possibility of a military attack unfolding and about an anti-Party campaign taking place in the United States, but they were particularly worried that this might lead to a worsening of relations between the United States and the U.S.S.R. and the other socialist countries. They would then have to start all over building up contacts and understandings built up over the last year of the Kennedy administration. While Soviet officials do feel that the situation has now improved somewhat, nevertheless they think there are dangers ahead unless a mobilization of opinion against the ultra-right can be effected.

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KOLOBASHKIN stated that on the evering of Wednesday, 11/27/63, he had gone to the Helen drop and became quite concerned and apprehensive when he determined that there had been nothing left there for him. He returned to the Helen drop later on the same evening and ascertained that no package had been left for him. He stated that in view of the assassination of President KENNEDY, the Soviets were extremely worried about the fact that the informant had not left any package at the Helen drop as he had indicated he would, and felt that there was possibly "something wrong."

NY 694-S\* explained to KOLOBASHKIN that after having sent the message to the Soviets earlier in the evening on 11/26/63, he had returned to his home and awaited a message from the Soviets which he never did receive. Informant stated that for that reason, he felt that the Soviets, in view of the general, tense situation, had decided not to go the the Helen drop on the evening of 11/27/63. The informant stated that he therefore waited until the evening of November 28th, when he again sent a message by "walkie talkie" to the Soviets indicating that he would utilize the Helen drop on the evening of November 29th. He stated that he had again awaited acknowledgement of this signal later on the evening of November 28th, but had received no message from the Soviets.

KOLOBASHKIN stated that again on November 28th, the Soviets had received the informant's signal "loud and clear", and again had gone to the area of the informant's home where they sent him a message by "walkie talkie" indicating that they had received his message.

In discussing this situation, informant and KOLOBASKHIN agreed that there was apparently something "mechanically wrong" with their "walkie talkie" operation and that apparently it involved reception in the informant's home area of Soviet "walkie talkie" signals. It was agreed that the "walkie talkie" operation be tested on Wednesday, evening, 12/11/63, at 10:00 p.m.

and again on Thursday morning, 12/12/63, at 10:00 a.m. when the Soviets would go to the informant's neighborhood and attempt to send him a message by "walkie talkie". It was agreed that whether or not the informant received said signals he would go to the area of the Soviets' headquarters at 7:00 p.m. on Thursday night, 12/12/63, and send a message indicating whether or not he had received the aforementioned signals from the Soviets.

In the event that the informant does not receive the Soviet signals, it was agreed that should the Soviets find it necessary to contact him again in December, the informant would be notified to that effect by radio from Moscow. It was further agreed that in any event, the informant and KOLOBASHKIN meet again at the Armstrong rendezvous on Wednesday, 1/6/64.

KOLOBASHKIN then asked NY 694-S\* whether the informant retained his radio at one place or whether he "moved it around". NY 694-S\* replied that he periodically moves the radio from place to place and that at the present time it is "locked up tight in an office". KOLOBASHKIN repeatedly emphasized the necessity of security in this operation, stating that the Soviets were constantly concerned about the fact that "something might happen" to the informant.

NY 694-S\* assured KOLOBASHKIN that he constantly is aware of security hazards. He further told KOLOBASHKIN that in the event that something should happen to him, the Soviets should know that he has "second and third reserves ready to move up into position when the occasion should so require". He told KOLOBASHKIN that the informant's organization was "experienced, well trained and well disciplined" - that his potential successor "knew his stuff", and that although his successor is highly trusted, he as yet has no knowledge of the precise nature of NY 694-S\* operations.

NY 694-S\* stated that he gave KOLOBASHKIN, on 12/6/63, a role of microfilm containing a number of messages which included the following:

1. A partially coded-ciphered message, the plain text of which reads as follows:

"Disregard black gamma ciphers numbers 33464 to 07952, 43 lines. Best that I did not contact you during this time because of serious situation. Contents of these messages are now obsolete.

"Jack Brooks"

The above message accounts for ciphered-coded messages which had previously been prepared for transmittal to his Soviet contact by NY 694-S\*. These obsolete messages concerned CG 5824-S\* date of departure from the United States on his last Solo mission and an inquiry from GUS HALL with respect to the anticipated date of CG 5824-S\* return to the United States. It is noted that this Solo mission of CG 5824-S\* was completed prior to the time NY 694-S\* met his Soviet contact on 12/6/63.

The obsolete messages also included information to the effect that GEORGE MEANY of the AFL-CIO would head a delegation to Kenya, Africa, for an independence celebration to be held in December, 1963. The intended message was set forth in NY airtel, 11/6/63. It was not sent since the "NY Times" issue of 12/5/63, includes a UPI article datelined 12/4/63, at Washington, D.C. captioned, "Johnson Names Delegates to Two African Celebrations". The article states that Secretary of the Interior STEWART L. UDALL had been designated to head the delegation to Kenya. GEORGE MEANY is not mentioned in this article as a participant in this delegation.

2. A ciphered-coded message, the plain text of which reads as follows:

"Central Committee, Communist Party of Soviet Union.
Most urgent. Circumstances compel me to ask you if
it would be possible to rush to us an emergency amount

"of \$50,000 before the first of the year. Morris Childs was not apprised of this emergency amount previously.

"Gus Hall"

- 3. A document dated December 5, 1963, setting forth GUS HALL's evaluation of President LYNDON B. JOHNSON, as well as HALL's expression of gratitude for the manner in which the Soviets reacted to the news of President KENNEDY's assassination. Copies of this document were furnished to the Bureau and Chicago as enclosures to NY airtel dated 12/6/63, captioned, "SOLO; IS-C", ASSASSINATION OF PRESIDENT JOHN F. KENNEDY". NY 694-S\* also furnished a cophered-coded prefatory statement with the above document as set forth in NY airtel of 12/6/63.
  - 4. A plain text document dated December 5, 1963:

"Regarding the delegation of Negro leaders to the Soviet Union, there are now 7, or possibly 8, very important individuals who are very anxious to make the trip.

"We would like to suggest the following procedure -- that the organization dealing with Soviet-American friendship and cultural relations (I do not recall the exact name now) send a letter to: Rev. Milton A. Galamison, 1494 President, Brooklyn 13, N.Y. asking him if he would not be kind enough to organize a delegation of Negro spokesmen to visit the Soviet Union. He is waiting for such a letter now, and as soon as he receives it he will proceed to make the official arrangements.

"The delegation will include leaders of Negro peoples organizations, two people elected to state offices, and a trade union leader. We will send you a complete description before they arrive.

"It is our thinking that they should not be treated as people who are only interested in national minorities. They are interested in general questions of life and the construction of

"socialism, and a visit to the areas of national minority republics should only be one of the features of the trip. As you know, well-meaning efforts to show areas which we think such delegations will be interested in can be very easily misunderstood, and the truth is that these are people whose interests encompass the whole political and social spectrum of the building of a new way of life.

"We consider this, possibly, one of the most important delegations that we have had anything to do with for some time.

"We also urge that if possible no time should be lost because they are now very anxious and excited about going at this moment. Any postponement would create some unnecessary problems.

"Gus Hall, CPUSA"

Appended to the above document was a partially coded message, the plain text of which reads as follows:

"We will appreciate your answer in advance when above letter is sent to Rev. Milton A. Galamison. Please bear in mind to again notify the Embassy, Washington, D.C. that we will pick up the 7 or possibly 8 visas for Moscow there as well as round trip tickets for the suitable dates."

(RenYairtel, 11/15/63, which states that on 10/23/63, KOLOBASHKIN furnished NY 694-S\* with a message concerning an invitation to the USSR for a group of Negro leaders for approximately one month.)

5. A partially coded message concerning ABE CHAPMAN's report with respect to Chinese intelligence activities. The substance of this message is set forth on pages 2, 3 and 4 of NY airtel, 11/7/63, captioned, "SOLO; IS-C". In addition to the information set forth in referenced airtel, the messages noted that in the last several weeks, SUE WARREN was organizing a committee which will be called Committee for the Admittance of China to the UN". Through this committee sheuwill have access

to many peoples and many organizations for her pro-Chinese ideological activities. This message was signed Jack Brooks.

NY 694-S\* advised that he had secured this information concerning SUE WARREN organizing a committee from ARNOLD JOHNSON, CPUSA Legislative Director, and that he, NY 694-S\*, did not know, as of 12/6/63, whether WARREN had in fact succeeded in organizing this committee.

6. A plain text message reading as follows:

"The following leaflet was distributed in large amounts to the people on the street hours after the death of President KENNEDY."

- 7. A flyer issued by "The Worker", dated November 23, 1963, and captioned, "Defend America! Punish the Assassin, Unite for Democracy." Copies of the flyer have previously been furnished to the Bureau.
- 8. A partially coded message, the plain text of which reads:

"Sister Helen next; Armstrong next."

The above refers to the next drop and the next meeting place through which NY 694-S\* may make contact with KOLOBASHKIN.

discovered on the beaches of Venezuela.


The Communist Party of Czechoslovakia has verified that the arms shipmonts discovered on the beaches in Venezuela were, in fact, shipped from Cuba. This matter was handled in a clumsy, uncoordinated way, and, as a result, millions of dollars worth of arms were lost. The Cubans did not consult with the Czechs or the Russians on these shipments and, as a matter of fact, the Czechs and Russians do not know whom the Cubans were negotiating with among the Venezuelans. The Czechs and the Russians are very disturbed concerning the handling of these shipments of arms by the Cubans to the communist terrorists in Venezuela.

The Peoples Republic of China was recently preparing to give to the Nation of Ghana a loan of ten million dollars, which loan was to be without interest. The purpose of the loan was to enable Ghana to establish a modern publishing house with all the necessary equipment to turn out modern publications. The entire deal was all set and the necessary papers drawn up. The only thing remaining was the signing of the papers. The Chinese delegation arrived in Ghana and, just prior to the actual signing of the papers extending the loan, the Chinese inquired as to where Ghana intended to obtain the printing equipment. Upon learning that Ghana intended to purchase the equipment from the German Democratic Republic, the Chinese cancelled the agreement and immediately terminated the entire negotiation.



The following information was supplied by sources which have furnished reliable information in the past.

During November, 1963, a delegation from the Communist Party (CP) of South Africa visited Hoscow, Russia. The leader of this delegation was reportedly one Joe Matthews, who is also the leader of the CP of South Africa. (In view of the outlawed status of the CP of South Africa, the name Joe Matthews may be a pseudonym.)

Matthews reported that the CP of South Africa is now based in Basutoland and considers this an effective base from which to strike at the Union of South Africa. He indicated that the CP of South Africa is receiving support from all of "black" Africa and vowed that someday the CP of South Africa will wipe the present government of the Union of South Africa off the face of the map. According to Matthews, the South Africans are pouring large amounts of investments into Basutoland because practically all the labor is concentrated in that area. It is the assessment of the CP of South Africa that the Union of South Africa will eventually collapse because, without labor, foreign investments in that country will cease.

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



Henry Winston, a Vice-Chairman of the Communist Party, USA, who has been residing in Moscow, Russia, is currently in the process of making arrangements to return to the United States. Winston must be back in the United States by Harch 9, 1964, to participate in pretrial discussions and examination related to a civil action which he has presently pending against the United States Government. In the course of our investigation of the Communist Party, USA, a source which has furnished reliable information in the past advised that during November, 1963, an official of the International Department, Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU) stated that Radio Moscow receives an average of 1,600 letters per week in response to its broadcasts on the North American wave length. The Soviet official noted that the CPSU is very surprised by the volume of this response and cannot understand why so many people are, writing. The Soviet official did not indicate whether the mail received was favorable or unfavorable.

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COMMENT OF REPRESENTATIVE OF THE COMMINIST PARTY OF THE COVIET UNION REGARDING OFFICIAL INVITATIONS TO AMERICANS TO VISIT THE COVIET UNION

In late November, 1963, Aleksei Andrewich Grechukhin, Assistant to the Head of the North and South American Section of the International Department of the Central Committee of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU), made the following comments:

The CPSU will not officially invite any Americans to the Soviet Union unless the Communist Party, USA (CP, USA) feels that it is in a position to unequivocally state that such people are loyal communists and that the Party knows all about the activitics of such people for at least the past ten or twelve years. Any such person coming to the Soviet Union and expecting to be accepted by the CPSU must come with a detailed history of all of his activities.

The above attitudes of the CPSU developed subsequent to the assassination of United States President John F. Konnedy on November 22, 1963, and were being instituted for their own protection. Obviously, the Soviets were embarrassed and afraid that it night be possible in the future that they would once again have on their hands another Lee Harvey Oswald.

In line with the foregoing, Greenukhin noted that the CPCU will not, therefore, look up such people as Felix Greene, the author of "Awakened China," or William J Romeroy, the former Euk fighter in the Philippines, in an effort to have them come to the Soviet Union for a visit as had been requested by the CP, USA.

During December, 1963, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised as follows:

During late November, 1963, Cesar Escalante, Head of the Ideological Department, United Party of the Socialist Revolution of Cuba, met with a representative of the Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), while both were in Moscow, USSR.

The CPUSA representative took this occasion to complain to Cesar Escalante that while the literature of every type of renegade left group in the United States is able to get into Cuba, the CPUSA has been unsuccessful in getting its literature into Cuba inspite of all its efforts to do so. The CPUSA has tried direct shipments, shipments through Canada and through Prague, Czechoslovakia, but nothing seems to work. The CPUSA representative stated that he did not believe that it was the result of United States Government action in withholding this literature because the literature of the anti-Soviet, anti-CPUSA, and pro-Chinese groups gets through without trouble. Escalante did not answer this complaint directly, but stated that he would check into this matter upon his return to Cuba and find out why CPUSA literature is not getting into Cuba.

Next the CPUSA representative brought up the matter of what he termed "slanders" against the CPUSA to the effect that the CPUSA is not doing anything to aid Cuba in that country's difficulties as a result of the recent hurricane

which devastated Cuba. He stated that certainly the CPUSA was interested in Cuba and had been making a concerted drive to render aid. The CPUSA representative exhibited a copy of "The Worker," a publication of the CPUSA, which contained stories detailing the CPUSA relief drive. Then he and Escalante discussed CPUSA-Cuban relations in general, during which they agreed that these relationships were in need of improvement. One of the subjects of concern in this conversation was the position of Beatrice Johnson, Hayana, Cuba, Concernspondent for "The Worker" and official spokesman for the CPUSA in Cuba, who has been experiencing a great deal of difficulty in Cuba obtaining cooperation.

The next topic of conversation was the need to improve communications between the CPUSA and the United Party of the Socialist Revolution of Cuba. While Escalante could not offer any method to improve contacts between the two Parties, he did suggest that communications from the CPUSA to Cuba should be sent through the CP of Canada to Norman Freed, CP of Canada representative, to the "World Marxist Review" in Prague, Czechoslovakia, and thence to Cuba. While Escalante also indicated such communications could be sent to Canada and then direct to Cuba, he considered communication via Prague to be preferable. Also, communications in the other direction, from Cuba to the CPUSA, should follow the same route.

Escalante inquired regarding Joseph North, former correspondent for "The Worker" in Havana and currently editor of the CPUSA publication "Mainstream." He registered a complaint about the manner in which North had left Cuba. Escalante stated that when North left Cuba, he had not advised them that he was not returning to Cuba. The CPUSA representative answered that North would have lost his passport and perhaps his United States citizenship if he had not returned to the United States when he did, and in fact had just beaten the deadline for his return by one day when he had arrived in the United States. During December, 1963, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised as follows:

During November, 1963, a delegation from the Communist Party (CP) of South Africa visited Moscow, USSR, to which they traveled via Prague, Czechoslovakia. While on this trip, in Prague, a brief meeting took place between a representative of the CP,USA and the leader of this delegation who is also the head of the CP of South Africa, Joe Matthews (which may only be a pseudonym utilized by this individual in view of the outlawed status of the CP of South Africa).

Matthews stated that the CP of South Africa is now based in Basutoland and the CP of South Africa considers this a base from which to strike back at the Union of South Africa. He indicated they are getting support from all of black Africa and he vowed that some day they will wipe the present government of South Africa off the face of the map. According to Matthews, the South Africans are pouring large amounts of investments into Basutoland because that is where all the labor is now. It is the assessment of the CP of South Africa that the Union of South Africa will eventually collapse because without labor, foreign investments in that country will cease.

Matthews commented that the CP of South Africa believes that their Party has been infiltrated to a large extent by government spies. He came to this conclusion when, in the course of a recent trial, a witness appeared for the government whom the CP of South Africa did not expect.



Immediately after the conclusion of the celebration of the October Revolution which extended over the period of November 7-9, 1963, Kerris Childs, Communist Party, USA (CP, USA) representative then in Moscow, met with Aleksei Andreevich Grechukhin, Assistant to the Head of the North and South American Section of the International Department, Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPCU), and Igar Hikhailov, an employee of the North and South American Section, at International Department, Central Committee, CPCU offices in Mascow. Mikhail Victimirovich asstovets, the Head of the North-and-South American Section, who normally would have been present for such a meeting, had departed at this time for the United States as a member of a tourist group.

As this initial, formal mooting opened, Childs explained that he had been instructed to trayel to Mescow for two main reasons. The first reason was political and was related to determining factual information concerning the current situation existing in the international movement. Secondly, he was in Moscow to discuss some more practical problems including that matter raised annually regarding funds. In regard to the latter, he hesitated as usual to: raise this problem but as Gun Mail, General Secretary of the CP, USA, had given him instructions to do no, to was prepared to make such requests. In addition, he hoped that he would be able to set up arrangements to meet some "other friends" Then, too, he on matters of importance to the CP, USA. pointed out that he would like to see Timur Timofeev again and Henry Winston, a Vice Chairman of the CP, USA, who is now temporarily residing in Hoscow. Then, after he had finished preparing in writing cortain essential documents dealing with the points he desired to raise, he would like to have it arranged for him so that he could meet with represontatives of the Central Committee and Presidium of the CPSU.

After Childs outlined the purpose of his visit, as noted above, Grechukhin noted that they would seek to handle his requests and make all necessary arrangements. Lowever, he pointed out that because of the fact that there was then in Roscow a number of representatives of other Parties

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who had been in for the colebration and who also desired meetings with leading CPSU personnel, there might be some delay.

After the conclusion of this meeting, which was believed to have occurred on or about November 10, 1963, the following days were spent in seclusion by Childs in his Moscow apartment in the proparation of specific documents dealing with the matters which he desired to take up. Among these documents was one of 14 legal size, handwritten pages dealing with political matters and another was an eight-page, legal size, handwritten document dealing with the request for financial assistance to the CP, USA. Each of the documents, originally being written; was rewritten a number of times in order to be certain that all matters were clearly framed and properly presented. All documents propared during this period were addressed to the Central Committee, CPSU and to Nikita S. Khrushchev, First Secretary.

The 14-page item was opened with a preamble reflecting "Greetings on the greatest event in contemporary history, the October Revolution. Greetings to the leadership of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union. I repeat I am sorry that we must give regards in this form, but our leadership, because of the infamous McCarran Act, cannot travel to render them personally, but I assure you I bring their warmest, personal regards."

The document then went into the political situation in the United States from the point of view of the CP, USA and incorporated the effects of the test ban treaty, an analysis of the forthcoming elections, and current position of the CP, USA on domestic matters. Also set forth was a paraphrased version of Gus Hall's recent main report to the chlarged National Executive Committee, CP, USA meeting held in October, 1963. Reference was made to the Caribbean crisis of October, 1962, in which the Soviet Union was described as "the saver of the peace." The document concluded with the statement regarding the Communist Party of China (CPC), how its position was wrong, and the effect of that Party's action on the CP, USA and how the CP, USA supports the correct position of the CPSU on this matter.

After completing the political document, Childs commenced work on the second main document which was to deal with the request for funds on behalf of the CP, USA, Hore, again, the document bore a political introduction which was followed by the remarks that while the request for funds may be large, Comrade Hall desired to point out that the CP, USA

was not equandering the money it was receiving but was care-fully considering every cent spont. The amount which was being requested had been carefully considered and discussed. Nowover, the Central Committee, CPSU, was not being burdened with a detailed itemization which furnished the basis for this request. It was noted that "We, in the CP, USA, did a lot of soul-searching to see if we could avoid a request for funds but have found it impossible." However, proof that we are trying to avoid the need for such further requests is evident by the fact that we have a business delegation in the Soviet Union seeking opportunities which will financially assist our Party in raising funds in the future. Then, in brief detail, it was pointed out how 36 people in the national leader-ship of the Party have now been arrested or cited and are involved in legal proceedings for which a vast financial defense need exists. Then, it was noted that the plans are still under consideration for the establishment of a daily paper, an expensive item. In total, it was noted that the plans related to the forthcoming election of 1964, the legal defense of the Party, the making up of the deficit of the Party press, the operation of the American Institute for Marxist Studies, 111ness and charity cases, expanded work in the South, and assistance to the Comminist Party of Puerto Rico, would require financial assistance to the CP, USA in the amount of \$1,295,000.

There followed an addendum to this document which noted that the money requested represented only the deficit in the contemplated 1964 budget. This \$1,295,000 would be required over and above the larger amounts which the CP itself raises on its own. The document then was concluded with the comment "We, in the CP, USA, did not want to ask you for this but we have had to do it."

When the above documents and the other shorter, miscellaneous documents were completed during the latter part of the week of November 10, 1963, they were turned over to Grechukhin of the North and South American Section for handling. Childs and Grechukhin went over each of the items individually. Following this, Grechukhin advised that he would transmit them to the CPSU for further handling and would inform Childs immediately when a meeting had been arranged to discuss any or all of these matters with Boris N. Ponomarov, a member of the Secretariat and Hoad-of the International Department.

Central Committee, CPSU.

In going over the documents at this time, Grechukhin stated that recently they had received a report sent by the CP, USA dealing with the subject matter of Puerto Rico. He explained they had been disappointed in the type of report received and suggested that in the future they desired more fact and nothing again like that which had been received.

Grechukhin then noted that the CPEU used to give large sums of money to Cuba for the Party in Puerto Rico. He inquired now whother they, the Puerto Ricans, continue to get any such funds from the Cubans. In this regard, Childs advised him that the Puerto Ricans presently get nothing from the Cubans and this has been a situation which has existed for a number of years. For this reason, the CP, USA had found it necessary to place in their financial request an item relating to Puerto Rico.

Shortly thereafter and during the period of November 18-21, 1963, information was received that an appointment had been set up for a discussion relating to financial matters with Poris N. Ponomarcy of the Contral Committee, When this necting was held, it was obvious that Ponomarcy had read the documents which had been previously prepared and was acquainted with the detail contained therein. In discussing this matter, Ponomarcy agreed that the Central Committee would give to the requests submitted by the CP, USA for funds its nost serious consideration. He pointed out, however, that no decision as to how much the CPSU would give the CP, USA could be made until December 15, 1963. Here, Ponomarey pointed out that December 15th represented the deadline by which all Parties must submit financial requests and at that time formal action would be taken on these items. He noted that the CP, USA would be advised through channols as coon as a decision was made concerning the financial aid for 1964.

At this same meeting Childs, when talking to Ponomarov, pointed out to him that because of certain emergency situations existing within the Party, particularly dealing with defense matters, the Party would need an emergency fund of \$25,000 before the first of the year.

Subsequently, during the meeting with Ponomarcy on November 26, 1963, he informed Childs that the request made carlier for the emergency funds would be forthcoming and transmitted immediately to the CP, USA, since it had been approved.

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## PLANS OF HERRY VINSTON TO TRAVEL TO THE GERMAN DELOCRATIC REPUBLIC

In the latter part of November, 1963, Kerris Childs, representative of the Communist Party, USA (CP, USA), while in Poscow made contact with a representative of the German Democratic Republic (GDR) Embassy in Moscow for the purpole of requesting that a visa be made available for Henry Winston, a Vice Chairman of the CP. USA who is now temporarily residing in Koscow, USSR, in order that this individual right travel to the GDR. The purpose of Winston's trip to the CDR was to handle several matters of interest to the CP, USA. First, the CP, USA desired that Wington visit Paul Robeson, Cr., who is in a CDR canitarium, in order that the Party in the United States could have a current up-to-date evaluation of the situation involving Lobecon's current physical and mental state. The second purpose of Winston's trip was to take up with the Socialist Unity Party of Germany (SUPG) representatives the question of Robert Lumor's admission to the Erecht School of Dramatics, a matter which the CP, USA had previously raised with the SUPG but had not received a satisfactory answer. If plans regarding Winston's travel materialize, he would plan to depart the Covict Union for the CDR on December 5, 1963.

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INFORMATION CONCERNING ARRANGEMENTS AND DISCUSSIONS regarding printing equiphent desired by the communist

When Morris Childs departed for the Soviet Union in early Movember, 1963, he carried with him instructions from Gus Hall, General Secretary of the Communist Party, USA (CP/, USA), that he should attempt to make some inquiry into the possibility of the CP, USA securing from the German Democratic Republic (GDR) through the cooperation of the Socialist Unity Party of Germany (SUPG) some new printing equipment.

Accordingly, in mid-Movember, 1963, Childs made contact at the GDR Embassy in Moscow, USSR, and met with a (first name unknown) Abrams (phonetic), the Consul and the person in charge of SUPG affairs. At this time Hall's instructions regarding new printing equipment needed by the CP, USA were raised by Childs and the fact made known that the CP, USA would like to take this matter up in the GDR with representatives of the SUPG. Initially, Childs indicated that porhaps a visa should be prepared for him in order that he, himsolf, might carry on such negotiations; however, he subsequently advised the Embassy that he personally was unable to make this trip and would arrange to have some other individual go to the GDR to conduct the negotiations.

In late November, 1963, while in Prague, Czechoslovakia Childs was in contact with Norman Freed, CP of Canada represontative to the "World Marxist Review," the international theoretical organ of the world communist movement, with headquarters in Prague. At this time, Freed noted that he was going to the CDR for an assembly sponsored by the SUPG on December 8, 1963. In view of Freed's contemplated travel, Childs made arrangements with him that when he was in the GDR he would take up with SUPG and GDR representatives the matter of possibly making available German printing equipment to the CP, USA. In order to facilitate Freed's negotiations in the GDR, Childs prepared a credential bearing the seal of the CP. USA, which noted that Freed did represent the CP, USA and it was desired that he take up the matter of negotiations regarding printing equipment. Freed agreed to handle this matter for the CP, USA and when he had completed it he would advise Childs through channols arranged between then the official results 1-12-421091 3467 of his negotiations.

In connection with discussions relating to the above, Freed commented that the Canadian Party a few years ago had opened a new print shop as well as a bindery. He noted that all equipment utilized in both the print shop and the bindery had been received from the GDR and that all equipment had been supplied free by the SUPG. Freed made this known to Childs as a possible indication that perhaps the SUPG might be willing to do the same for the American Party.

## CANCELLATION OF LOAN TO GHANA BY THE PEOPLES REPUBLIC OF CHINA

During December, 1963, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised as follows:

During November, 1963, members of the Central Committees of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU) and the CP of Czechoslovakia cited the following example of the lengths to which the CP of China is going in its dispute with the CPSU and those countries of the socialist camp who side with the CPSU in this dispute.

According to these sources, the Peoples Republic of China was recently preparing to give to the nation of Ghana a loan of ten million dollars, which loan was to be without interest. The purpose of the loan was to enable Ghana to establish a modern publishing house with all the necessary equipment to turn out modern publications. The entire deal was all set and the papers were all prepared and only the signing remained. The Chinese delegation arrived in Ghana and just prior to the actual signing of the papers extending the loan, the Chinese asked where Ghana intended to obtain the printing equipment. They answered that they intended to purchase the equipment from the German Democratic Republic (East Germany) since this country makes the best printing equipment. Upon learning this, the Chinese cancelled the agreement and called off the entire negotiation.

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

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In mid-December, 1963, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised as follows:

Henry Winston, a Vice Chairman of the Communist Party, USA (CP, USA), now temporarily residing in Moscow, USSR, is currently in the process of making arrangements relating to his return to the United States. Winston, it is to be noted, must be back in the United States by March 9, 1964, to participate in pre-trial discussions and examination related to a civil action which he has presently pending against the United States Government. While Gus Hall, General Secretary of the CP, USA was of the opinion that Winston should return some weeks or perhaps even a month before his scheduled pre-trial discussions and examination in order to cover any possible change in legal arrangements, Winston feels there is no such need and there will be no change in arrangements. Therefore, he will not depart from the USSR any earlier than necessary and at the earliest such departure will probably not be before the end of February, 1964.

The meeting was informal and the first matter of business was an exchange of greetings between the representatives of the "World Harrist Review" and the visiting CP, USA official. After such greetings had been concluded, Sobolov, acting as spokesman for the "World Harrist Review" representatives, opened up the discussion and at this time the following natters were raised:

According to Sobolev, the CP, USA is the favorite Party of the "World Markist Review"; however, they have problems getting from the CP, USA certain articles in time for publication in the magazine. As a recult, the staff has drawn up a list of desired articles specifying the topics on which the magazine would like the CP, USA to submit material for publication. This list was as follows:

- 1. The policy of the CP, USA at present (major tendencies in the Party's policy)
- 2. Culture and Masses (certain problems of the content and dissemination technique of modern mass culture)

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- 3. Inter-relation of the political and economic struggle in the USA
- 4. Forms of class struggle
- 5. USA the world exploiter
- 6. Middle classes in the USA (structure, composition, role in the economic and public life, relations with the working class, CP's policy towards the middle classes)
- 7. Unemployment in the USA (reasons and problems that stem from it)
- 8. USA and economic integration of the West (plans of the USA, Canada and 18 European member states of the EECD to achieve a 50 percent increase in the overall national product in these countries by 1970; the government plan to cut tariffs by 50 percent, aims of this policy, its consequences for the popular masses in the USA and West European countries, attitude of the working class)
- 9. Modorn capitalism and the problem of markets
- 10. Prospects of economic competition between the USSR and USA
- II. The US menopolist bourgeoisie (structure, composition, policy, internal contradictions)
- 12. Fascist organizations in the USA (class basis and aims, links with financial oligarchy and ruling circles, political and social aims, role in the struggle against Communism)
- 13. Report on the struggle between memopolies (using vivid examples and concrete facts to show the fight between two memopolies)
- 14. The problems of war and peace and the US public opinion

- 15. Strength and weaknesses of the trade union movement in the USA
- 16. USA major bulwark of modern capitalism
- 17. Froudianism, its social meaning and purposes

Sobolov mext mentioned that the publication would like the CP, USA to submit a commentary on the assassination of President Kennedy. They would like to print such an article in the magnaine's January issue but to do so they must have the article in their possession by December 3rd or 4th and it must be edited and in final form for printing by the 20th. In addition, the migraine also would like to publish in the near future an article by Cm Lall, Ceneral Decretary of the CP, USA, on the subject "The U.S. After the Kennedy Assassination."

Sobolov mentioned that in many instances the magazine did not have room for the publication of all articles it received from the various Parties throughout the world. Cometimes, also, certain articles received by the magazine were of the nature that night cause dispute and discussion. As a result, the magazine has now commenced the publication of a new bulletin or parablet as a separate and distinct arm of the publication. This new bulletin gives the magazine a way out to publish certain articles which if proviously were to be published in the magazine would have had to have near unanimous approval of the Parties. If wever, since this new bulletin is not petting forth official policy but is more informal in nature, articles can be published in that bulletin where consent is less than unanimous and on the decisions of the editors. Articles appearing in the bulletin while not official can be of informational and policy value.

Inquiry was then made of the CP, USA representative as to how he felt such a kulletin would go ever in the United States. The CP, USA representative noted that he was not in a position to definitely say; however, in the past any item published abroad was not well received in the United States. The suggestion was then made that perhaps the body of the pumphlot could be shipped to Canada where a cover could be printed and the pamphlot distributed. The CP, USA representative on this point noted that this would prohably be very difficult since both in Canada and the United States there are strict union regulations which would prohibit insuing an item which bore only a printed cover over imported material.

The next question raised with the CP, USA representative was how many copies of such a pamphlet the CP, USA night use. The CP, USA representative noted he was not in a position to speak for the book stores but suggested that perhaps up to 200 copies be sent to either World Dooks or New Era Publishers in New York City.

Coboley then stated that the magazine desired an article on the topic of Freud and Marxien and he suggested that Comrade Den Davis be requested to communicate with philosopher (first name unknown) Wells. At this time, Wells should be asked to prepare and send to the "World Marxist Device" such an article for publication.

In regard to Comrado Gub Halles suggestion that the "World Harrist Lovier" send 2, 200 copies menthly of the magazing to World Doolis in New York City and that the CP, USA, if reinturced by the magazine, would see to it that the ragazine is sent out to colleges and universities and gotten into the proper hands, Coboley noted that this natter had been discussed by the magazine. As a result of such discussion, it was decided that the magazine would soid up to 2,000 copies a month hereafter of the magazine to World Doolis in New York City; that World Dooks chould remail the magazino to colleges and universities as well as to leading professors and educators. If the cost for such mailings is not found to be excessive, the "Morld Harxist Review" will foot the entire bill for the mailing and work out in the near future detailed financial arrangements on this matter with World Looks in order to see that they are properly roigbursed.

The CP, USA representative then raised the matter of possible royalties which might have accumulated at the "World Marxist Review" for Americans whose articles had recently been published in the magazine. The matter was immediately checked into and it was found that the only royalties due to any American at this time totaled \$200 and were payable to Jacoby Ludish. As a result, \$200 was turned ever to the CP, USA seprepontative at this time for transmittal to Eudish.
