With respect to paragraph one above, NY 694-S* advised that the "11th hour" refers to a pamphlet by GUS HALL based on HALL's speech at the last CPUSA National Board meeting dealing with the CPUSA position with respect to the coming USA elections. The pamphet was published in the Cuban newspaper "Cuba Socialista." According to NY 694-S*, BEA JOHNSON was reporting that the said pamphlet, as published in "Cuba Socialista," had considerable effect in Cuba in that the Cubans have not been differentiating between the Democratic and Republican Parties in the USA. This pamphlet of HALL's reflects that the CPUSA tends to favor the Democratic Party.

Concerning paragraph two, NY 694-S* stated that the July 26 celebration was successful inasmuch as it was held in Oriente Province, which is where CASTRO initiated the revolution and which is the most radical of the Cuban provinces.

Regarding the reference to students selected by Progressive Labor, NY 694-S* stated that the JOHNSON letter reflected that the Cuban people considered the students a collection of beatniks and Trotskyites who caused a lot of trouble for the Cubans. This delegation, organized by the students of Cuba, cost the Cuban government \$4,000 for each American student visiting Cuba.

According to NY 694-S*, the reference to the "Chile action" in the 1st paragraph of above letter reflects that the defeat of the CP in Chile has isolated Cuba more than ever and that the only channels open for BEA JOHNSON to travel are those via Prague and Moscow. BEA JOHNSON was to have made an attempt to go to South America.

Dr. RENE VALLEJO, mentioned in paragraph 2, is CASTRO's confident, who "screens" anyone attempting to personally contact CASTRO.

NY 694-S* stated that attention should be directed to paragraph 4 which begins, "Have heard from GDR folks ..." Informant stated that in his opinion this signifies that the Cuban CP probably will take a position with respect to the international conference which may be in conflict with the position that the CASTRO Government may take.

The reference to "gal" in paragraph 6 refers to ADA DRITSAS, whom GUS HALL desires to remain in Cuba since he feels that she was associated with BILL ALBERTSON who is presently persona non grata to the Party.

ITIMS RAISED BY GUS HALL, GENERAL SECRETARY, COMMUNIST PARTY, USA, FOR FUTURE DISCUSSION WITH REPRESENTATIVES OF THE COMMUNIST PARTY OF THE SOVIET UNION

On September 27, 1964, GUS HALL, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), mentioned several matters that he desired be taken up personally as soon as possible with representatives of the CP of the Soviet Union (CPSU). - The first point he raised was regarding the CPUSA delegation to the editorial commission or preparatory meeting originally scheduled for December 15, 1984, in Moscow. In this connection, HALL wanted the Soviets informed that the CPUSA will send a strong delegation supporting CPSU's policies. Such delegation will include good Negro participants like JAMES JACKSON and HEMLY WINSTON. The CPSU should also in connection with this delegation be requested to allow the CPUSA to send a larger number of persons than normal to this meeting; however, all of such individuals do not have to be delegates and some could sit in as observers or alternates. In addition. MALL felt that the entire delegation would not have to participate in this meeting at the same time.

The second matter that HALL desired raised with the Russians dealt with the current trial which recently opened in federal court in New York City involving the BALTCHS. HALL remarked that the Russians should be told they are stupid idiots. According to HALL, one of the meeting places for this operation which was set forth in the case indictment identifies it as being half a block from HALL's home in Yonkers, New York. HALL felt that the Russians should have known better than to have "pulled a stunt like this."

Source further noted that it was agreed that he, with the agreement and assistance of HALL, would seek to formulate a message to be sent to the CPSU relaying the request for this money.

Based on the above and at CG 5824-S*'s request, the New York Office was alerted and requested to advise NY 694-S*, who had a meeting with the Soviet principal on 9/25/64, that GUS HALL was preparing an urgent message to the CC, CPSU. NY 694-S* was to be told that he should attempt to make arrangements with the Russians so that they could receive and transmit an urgent message to their CC with a day's notice.

On 9/27/64, there was additional discussion regarding this general matter between GUS HALL and CG 5824-S*. At this time HALL suggested that even if the message they planned to send to the CC, CPSU, can be delivered, CG 5824-S* himself should be ready to travel. HALL then noted that although there is some indication that the 12/15/64 editorial commission or preparatory meeting, which was to arrange for a world gathering of CPs, may be delayed for a time, he would still send a CP, USA delegation to the Soviet Union. He noted this delegation would represent the United States Party at the November 7 celebration. HALL noted that in addition there was still the need to negotiate for the annual budget and in this regard repeated again that this year the Russians should be asked for $1\frac{1}{2}$ million dollars for 1965. HALL further remarked that he wanted CG 5824-S* in Moscow for the purpose of shoring up the fences and preparing for CP, USA delegations.

In discussing the foregoing, CG 5824-S* advised he did not feel he could resist HALL on this order to travel and, therefore, must be prepared to start packing and available for travel by perhaps mid-October, 1964.

Chicago is following this matter very closely with CG 5824-S* and any further developments and information will be immediately furnished to the Bureau and New York.

INTERNAL SECURITY - COMMUNIST

During the period of 9/25-27/64, CG 5824-S* had a number of discussions with Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA (CPUSA). The following pertinent matters were discussed.

Baltch Trial

Hall instructed CG 5824-S* to take up with the Soviets, on the occasion of informant's forthcoming Solo mission to the Soviet Union in mid-October, the trial which recently opened in federal court in New York City involving the Baltchs. Hall indicated one of the meeting places for this espionage operation as set forth in the indictment was just half a block from Hall's home in Yonkers, New York. Hall emphasized that the Soviets should have known better than to have "pulled a stunt like this." Hall instructed CG 5824-S* to tell the Soviets that they are "stupid idiots."

Financial Subsidy for the CPUSA

Hall requested that CG 5824-S* leave immediately for the Soviet Union in order: to obtain \$100,000 from the Soviets to finance the CPUSA's election program. CG 5824-S* pointed out to Hall that if he went to Moscow to negotiate for the \$100,000 it might jeopardize later negotiations for the CPUSA 1965 subsidy. Informant suggested that a message be sent to the Soviets urgently requesting the \$100,000. Hall agreed with this suggestion and instructed informant to send a message to the Soviets pointing out that the CPUSA has placed all of its resources in the election fight to defeat the ultraright and has had to borrow tens of thousands of dollars for this purpose. Hall told CG 5824-S* that when informant goes to Moscow to negotiate for the CPUSA annual subsidy, he is to request one and one half million dollars for 1965. (The CPUSA requested one million dollars for 1964 and received, during 1964, the sum of \$630, 330.)

With regard to Hall's request of the Soviets for \$100,000, CG 5824-S* noted that the CPUSA has considerable reserve funds on hand and informant knows of no instance where the CPUSA has had to borrow any money. Informant is of the opinion that Hall and the control of the opinion that Hall are the control of the opinion that Hall is using the election issue as a basis for securing additional funds.

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
