On 10/31/64 NY 694-S* met with his Soviet contact, Yladimir A. Chuchukin, an official of the Soviet Mission to the United Nations. Chuchukin told informant to transmit the following information immediately to Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA. On 10/28/64 Chinese Premier CHOU En-lai advised the Soviet Ambassador to China that the Chinese have always desired unity with the Soviets. CHOU suggested that the Soviets invite a Chinese delegation to Moscow for the November 7th celebration of the Russian Revolution. CHOU indicated that he personally would head the Chinese delegation. CHOU suggested that all satellite countries be advised of the Soviets' invitation to the Chinese and that all satellite countries, except Yugoslavia, be invited to attend the celebration. CHOU indicated that if it was deemed unwise to invite a Chinese delegation to the November 7th celebration, the Soviets should invite a Chinese delegation to the Soviet Union as soon as possible thereafter. The Soviets advised all satellite countries as requested by CHOU and all agreed that a Chinese delegation should be invited to attend the November 7th cëlebration in Moscow. As a result, the Chinese have been formally invited to attend the celebration. The Soviets consider this to be the first step in re-establishing unity , with the Chinese and have indicated that they will do everything consistent with the Moscow Conferences of 1957 and 1960 to make peace with the Chinese. **OBSERVATIONS:** It will be recalled that this past summer the FBI was among the representatives at a meeting of the United States Intelligence Board at which one of the items under consideration was the Sino-Soviet dispute. 18-2-CCONTINUED--OVER 100-428091 💆 🗒 🏌 TENOV 5 1964

Memorandum to Mr. W. C. Sullivan Re: SOLO 100-428091

The question of whether or not the Soviet Union and Communist China would ever again establish unity was discussed in detail. The position advanced by representatives of CIA and all other members of the Board was that there never again could be unity on a substantial basis. The FBI disagreed fully with this flat, unequivocal declaration and pointed out that it was unwarranted on the basis of both the historical record and current facts. The FBI pointed out that under new leaders in the Soviet Union or Communist China a marked change could occur and a reconciliation could be effected which would have the Soviets and the Chinese Communists again standing shoulder to shoulder against the noncommunist world.

No one on the Board would agree to the FBI position, but we stood firm and insisted on taking a footnote disagreeing with the position taken by all the other members of the Board.

In light of the current information set forth in this memorandum, it now looks as if the FBI position was the only practical and sound one taken among all the members of the intelligence community.

On the evening of 10-15-64, Gibby Needleman, CPUSA attorney, contacted NY 694-S* and advised him that he had a package that he had received from his contact for NY 694-S*. Arrangements were made to pick this up on the evening of the 15th. The package contained undeveloped microfilm which contained the following message. ٠,۲ "Most urgent from Central Committee to Gus Hall. Committee of CPSU considered it necessary to inform you that Comrade Khrushchev asked Central Committee of CPSU to release him from the duties of the First Secretary and the member of the Presidium of Central Committee and (as) Chairman of Council of Ministers: "His request was motivated by his old age and by deterioration of his health. On October 14, Conference of Central Committee complied with the request of Khrushchev and released him from his duties. Conference of Central Committee designated Comrade Breznev . I. as the First Secretary of Central Committee, CPSU. Comrade Kosygin A. N. was nominated as the Chairman of the Council of Ministers by the decree of the Presidium of the Supreme Soviet. Official announcement will be made on October 16. Conference of Central Committee stressed unanimously that course of 20th, 21st and (22nd) Congresses, the programs of CPSU are firm guides for our Parties (Communist Parties). Leninist policy of peaceful coexistence of states with different social systems, the policy of strengthening world peace and friendship between peoples will be invariable course of our Communist Parties and state, now and in the future. As before, Central Committee of the CPSU will do everything possible for further development and strengthening of brotherly relations with the Communist Parties for coordination of communist movement on the basis Marxist-Leninist principles, declaration and statement of Moscow conferences. Dear Mr. McCone:

We have learned from a source which has furnished reliable information in the past that a Soviet official in the United States recently furnished the following information to Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA.

On October 28, 1964, Chinese Premier CHOU En-lai summoned the Soviet Ambassador to China and told the Ambassador that the Chinese have always desired unity with the Soviets. CHOU suggested that a Chinese delegation be invited to attend the November 7th celebration of the Russian Revolution in Moscow. CHOU indicated that if the Soviets agreed to this suggestion, he personally would head the Chinese delegation. CHOU further suggested that all satellite countries be advised of the Soviets' invitation to the Chinese and that delegations from all satellite countries, except Yugoslavia, be invited to the celebration. CHOU also stated that if the satellite countries deemed it unwise to invite the Chinese to the November 7th celebration, the Soviets should invite a Chinese delegation to the Soviet Union as soon thereaft as possible.



My memorandum dated October 27, 1964, captioned "Soviet Personnel Intelligence Activities" furnished information to you concerning the recent political uphcaval in the Soviet Union which resulted in the removal of former Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev from power.

Material contained in the enclosed memorandum, supplied by sources which have furnished reliable information in the past, sets forth the version of Khrushchev's removal which was furnished to the Communist Party, USA, by the Communist Party of the Soviet Union. It is noted that the version of Khrushchev's removal furnished to the Communist Party, USA, differs materially from that set forth in my memorandum of October 27, 1964, which contained information supplied by a different source.

Because of the sensitive nature of our sources, we have classified this communication and its enclosure "The Greet." This information is being furnished to other officials of the Government.

VERSION OF THE REMOVAL FROM POWER OF FORMER SOVIET PREMIER NIKITA S. KHRUSHCHEV FURNISHED TO THE COMMUNIST PARTY, USA, BY THE COMMUNIST PARTY OF THE SOVIET UNION

The following version of the removal from power of former Soviet Premier Khrushchev was recently furnished the Communist Party, USA, by the Communist Party of the Soviet Union.

The discrisfaction with Khrushchev's method of work was of long-standing. Contrary to press reports, Khrushchev chaired the two-day meeting of the Presidium and subsequent meeting of the Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union at which criticism of Khrushchev was voiced. Khrushchev replied to the meeting of the Presidium, expressing agreement that most of the criticism was justified. He cited his inability to cope with the "nature of his work" due to age and ill health. Khrushchev noted he was beginning to feel tense and nervous, which might account for his recent "silly" statements. He expressed confidence in the "cadre" to take his place and then wrote his resignation from positions as First Secretary, Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union, Chairman of Council of Ministers of the Soviet Union, and as a member of the Presidium of the Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union. Khrushchev pledged the dedication of the remainder of his life to work for the Communist Party of the Soviet Union and for communism.

The plenary session of the Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union, which followed the meeting of the Presidium, was attended by some four hundred members, alternates and control commission members. "Scores, if not hundreds," participated in the discussion and then voted to relieve Khrushchev of his duties as he had requested, but voted to keep him on the Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union.

The main criticism leveled at Khrushchev concerned the lack of "collective leadership" and, although this criticism was frequently discussed with Khrushchev, he paid less and less attention to it. Khrushchev not only replaced committees of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union, but even replaced departments of the Soviet Government. Foreign policy was made by Khrushchev without consulting anyone. For example, he had the reserves of the treasury at his disposal and made commitments for foreign aid which seriously depleted the treasury. Khrushchev took action in agricultural matters against the advice of experts which caused chaos and required the purchase of grain from abroad, further depleting the treasury.

Khrushchev was also criticized for his travels abroad in the midst of domestic problems. These actions by Khrushchev caused great discontent among the Soviet people. His latest scheme to form seventeen different economic divisions in the Soviet Union would have created complete chaos in the economy, especially in agriculture. Further criticism of Khrushchev was that those around him were beginning to build him into a "demigod."

The Communist Party of the Soviet Union affirmed that there would be no change in the Soviet political line affecting domestic or foreign policy. The general line of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union remains "fight for peace and peaceful coexistence with all countries."

The Communist Party of the Soviet Union will soon circulate a letter to all fraternal parties regarding Khrushchev's removal, but it will not contain all the details furnished to the Communist Party, USA, as some of the details will remain confidential to avoid distortions and misunderstandings.

It is to be noted that this version of Khrushchev's removal as furnished to the Communist Party, USA, stresses the fact that Khrushchev voluntarily resigned. This is in direct contradiction to information previously obtained from a different source and previously furnished to you by memorandum dated October 27, 1964, wherein Khrushchev's ouster reportedly was brought about against his will and over his objections. It may well be that the version furnished by the Soviets to the Communist Party, USA, is designed solely to constitute the line which the Communist Party, USA, is to advance publicly in this matter.

CG 5824-S*, accompanied by his wife, returned from the 16th Solo Mission on 10-29-64, after a stay in the Soviet Union from 10-24-64 to 10-28-64, in order to report to Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), the "inside story" concerning the removal of former Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev. Soviet Union, informant had discussions with several prominent members of the Presidium of the Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CCCPSU), including Leonid I. Brezhnev and M. A. Suslov.

KHRUSHCHEV'S REMOVAL AS REPORTED TO CG 5824-S*

The story of Khrushchev's removal as told to our informant by leaders of the current Soviet Government is as follows:

Contrary to press reports, Khrushchev was chairman of the two-day meeting of the Presidium and the subsequent meeting of the CCCPSU which led to Khrushchev's removal. Criticism of Khrushchev brought out at these meetings involved his independent actions which created dissatisfaction on the part of Presidium members. They cited as an example Khrushchev's direction of agricultural matters against the advice of experts which produced havoc and ultimately required the purchase of grain from abroad. This together with commitments made by Khrushchev for foreign aid placed a severe strain on the Soviet treasury. In addition, Khrushchev was criticized for traveling abroad at a time when problems at home demanded his attention. This caused great discontent among the Soviet people. It was further alleged that Khrushchev's latest scheme to form 17 different economic divisions in the Soviet Union would have created complete chaos in the economy, especially in agriculture. Further, there was fear among other members of the Presidium that those around Khrushchev were beginning to build him into a "demigod."

Our informant was advised that Khrushchev was not only chairman of the meetings but that he had agreed most of the criticism was justified and had written out his own resignation. Khrushchev's handwritten statement and minutes of the meetings were then shown to our informant as proof that Khrushchev voluntarily resigned and was 110-428091-L not ousted against his will.

FUTURE LINE OF THE SOVIETS

Our informant was told that the general line of the Soviets will remain "peaceful coexistence with all countries." He was also advised that the Soviets will soon circulate a lengthy document to all fraternal parties regarding Khrushchev's resignation. This document will not contain all the details which were furnished to our informant as some of this material must remain confidential to avoid distortion and misunderstanding. (The copy of this document which will be made available to the CPUSA undoubtedly will be transmitted through our Solo apparatus and will be available to us.)

SINO-SOVIET RELATIONS

CG 5824-S* was told that the meeting of the Editorial Commission to prepare for a conference of world Communist Parties will take place in Moscow on 12-15-64 as originally scheduled. He was told there will be a series of short conferences with intervening periods which will cover several months, therefore, it could be expected the world conference will not take place until the late Summer of 1965. No statement was made as to what the Soviet position would be with respect to the Chinese problems at this world conference. Our informant was advised that the Soviets have stopped polemics with the Chinese even though the Chinese have continued to attack the Soviets through mass organizations in China and other countries.

Our informant does not plan to return to Moscow until December, 1964, at which time he will participate in the initial meeting of the Editorial Commission mentioned above.

CONTRADICTIONS RE KHRUSHCHEV'S REMOVAL

We have received information concerning the change in Soviet leadership from two of our top informants, CG 5824-S* and Fedora. While the information furnished by these two sources is essentially the same with respect to the criticism levied against Khrushchev, there is an important difference. Fedora has reported that Khrushchev was dismissed, despite his strong efforts to maintain himself in power. CG 5824-S* was told by current Soviet leaders that Khrushchev was chairman of the meeting at which he was criticized, agreed with most of the criticism and then voluntarily wrote out his own resignation which was accepted.


The variations in the information reported by our two informants are probably due to the fact that Fedora got the legitimate details whereas CG 5824-S* was given a "whitewash" version for the comsumption of the CPUSA. This apparently will be the version which the Soviets will make known to the world.

COMMUNIST PARTY OF THE SOVIET UNION REACTION TO PROPOSAL OF GUS HALL FOR INTERNATIONAL COORDINATING BODY OF WORLD COMMUNIST HOVEHENT

It will be recalled that Gus Hall, General Secretary of the Communist Party, USA (CP, USA), in past communications with the CP, Soviet Union (CPSU), has raised the proposal that a new international coordinating body should be set up to coordinate the policies and activities of the various parties in the world communist movement. During the latter part of October, 1964, a representative of the CP, USA was in Moscov, USSR and met with Boris N. Ponomarev, a member of the Praesidium and a Secretary of the Central Committee, CPSU (CCCPSU) and Mikolai V. Mostovets, head of the North and South American Section of the International Department, CCCPSU. Upon requesting the reaction of the CPSU to this proposal by Gus Hall, the CP, USA representative was informed that the CPSU did not foresee the probability that any such permanent badies or conferences would be set up for some time to come.

During the latter part of October, 1964, a representative of the Communist Party, USA (CP, USA) who was then in Mcscow, USSE, received the following information during a discussion with Boris N. Ponomarev, a member of the Praesidium and a Secretary of the Central Committee, CP, Soviet Union (CCCPSU), and Nikolai V. Mostovets, head of the North and South American Section, International Department, CCCPSU:

Visiting in Moscow, USSR at that time was Jessica Smith, Editor of the "New World Review", a magazine published in the United States but concerning which it has previously been reported that it has in the past been both directly and indirectly subsidized by the CPSU. Smith was there to collect material for her magazine. The above representatives of the CCCPSU advised that she had raised the question of the CPSU subsidy of the "New World Review" and expressed the view that this subsidy should be sent to her directly as was formerly the case, instead of channeling the money through the CP, USA as is being done now in accordance with the desires of Gus Hall, General Secretary of the CP, USA. Smith was not successful in changing the existing arrangements.

During the latter part of October, 1984, it was learned that the Editorial Board of the "Problems of Peace and Socialism" (also known as "World Marxist Review"), the official theoretical journal of the world communist movement which is published in Prague, Czechoslovakia, has proposed to the Communist Party, USA (CP, USA) that Victor Perlo be mamed as a permanent correspondent to the "World Marxist Review" from the United States. This proposal had been transmitted to the CP, USA somewhat earlier through Daniel Rubin, Organizational Secretary of the CP, USA, who returned to the United States in early October, 1964.

During late October, 1964, when this matter was raised with Gus Hall, General Secretary, CP, USA, Hall stated that this proposal had not been communicated to him by Rubin. Hall them questioned Rubin on this matter and Rubin denied that the proposal had ever been discussed with him. In any event, Hall stated that he was not in agreement with this plan and indicated further that he did not have confidence in Perlo.

PROPOSED NEW RESEARCH CENTER ON PROBLEMS
OF WORLD COMMUNISM

During late October, 1964, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised as follows:

It was learned during the latter part of October, 1964, that A. M. Rumyantsev, a member of the Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU) and Editor-in-Chief of "Problems of Peace and Socialism" (also known as the "World Marxist Review") ("WMR"), official theoretical journal of the world communist movement which is published in Prague, Czechoslovakia, was then in Moscow, USSR, where he was working on a project. He is proposing the setting up of a new research body in Budapest, Hungary, or a similar place, which will hold regular sessions to discuss problems of the world communist movement. In time, this body could evolve into a coordinating body of the world communist movement. The "WMR" has outlived its usefulness for this purpose since the Communist Party of China (CPC) and the Albanian Party of Labor (APL) have withdrawn their representatives from the Editorial Board of the "WMR."

This document contains neither recommendations nor conclusions of the FBI. It is the property of the FBI and is loaned to your agency; it and its contents are not to be distributed outside your agency.

A source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, during late October, 1964, advised as follows:

In late October, 1964, Nikolai V. Mostovets, Head of the North and South American Section, International Department, Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU), advised that he would not visit the United States in late October-early November, 1964, as scheduled. Mostovets noted that because of the recent removal of Nikita S. Khrushchev from leadership positions in the CPSU and the Government of the USSR and because of the removal of other individuals from leading positions, it had been decided that for the present such travel on his part should be postponed until at least April, 1965. The reason for this postponement was that it was felt that by doing this they could avoid a number of embarrassing questions regarding the recent removals which had taken place in the USSR.

The following information, supplied by sources which have furnished reliable information in the past, is being brought to your attention as a matter of possible interest.

The Communist Party of the Soviet Union has recently advised the Communist Party, USA, that the meeting of the Editorial Commission to prepare for a conference of world communist parties will take place in Moscow, Russia, on December 15, 1964, as originally planned. The Soviets in the near future will circulate a letter to twenty-six fraternal parties requesting their views on the method of conducting the meeting of the Editorial Commission. The Soviets will suggest that the first session be of short duration, possibly three or four days. This will be followed by a recess of a month or two for Party consultations. A second short session will then take place followed by another recess of a month or more, prior to convening the third and final session. It is not anticipated that the world conference of communist parties will be held prior to the late Summer of 1965.

Because of the sensitive nature of our sources, we have classified this communication "For Feet." This information is being furnished to other officials of the Government.

COMMENTS OF LEADING PERSONNEL OF COMMUNIST PARTY OF THE SOVIET UNION ON SUBJECT OF CLOSER RELATIONS BETWEEN THE COMMUNIST PARTY, USA AND THE COMMUNIST PARTY OF THE SOVIET UNION

In their meetings with a representative of the Communist Party, USA (CP, USA) held on October 28, 1984, in Noscow, USSR, both Leonid I. Brezhnev, First Secretary, Communist Party of the Soviet Uplon (CPSU), and M.A. Suslov, a member of the Presidium of the Central Committee, CPSU, emphasized that the recent changes in the leadership of the CPSU would not affect the relations between their Farty and the CP, USA and such relations would remain unchanged.

In his comments on this subject, Suslov noted that "Relations between your Party and ours, we hope will be more harmonious in the future. We need to develop these relationships." He emphasized that Gus Hall should be told that "we" love your Party, love your Party spirit of internationalism, and that we know the position of your Party.

Brezhnev on this same subject stated "We must strengthen the relations between our Parties." He went on to note that often it is difficult to explain or carry on a close relationship between our Parties when it is on paper. The human contact is most important and, therefore, according to Brezhnev, you and other representatives of your Party should travel more often to see us and discuss Party matters.

Brezhnev, First Secretary, Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU), in a discussion held in Moscow, USSE, on October 28, 1964, was heard to comment on the recent death of Elizabeth Gurley Flynn, Chairman, Communist Party, USA (CP, USA), in the Soviet Union. In this connection, he noted that she could have lived if she had observed doctors' orders; however, Elizabeth resisted and violated the suggestions and rules for her treatment that the doctors had imposed. He had raised the foregoing for the purpose of making sure that the CP, USA knew that the CPSU had done everything possible in order to save Flynn's life.

He is already actively engaged in work in the International Department on problems and matters dealing with the United States.

CONFERENCE OF LATIN AMERICAN COMMUNIST PARTIES SCHEDULED LATE NOVEMBER, 1964, HAVANA, CUBA

A source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, during late October, 1964, advised as follows:

Nikolai V. Mostovets, Head of the North and South American Section, International Department, Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU), recently remarked that there was a good possibility that the scheduled Conference of Latin American Communist Parties tentatively set for late November, 1964, in Havana, Cuba, may not be held. He noted that a number of Latin American Communist Parties, like those major Parties in Argentina and Chile, have indicated that they were not in favor of such a conference and do not desire to be openly tied up with Cuba.

In addition, this same individual indicated, without so specifically stating, that the CPSU would like to discourage such international contacts between the Parties unless, of course, such contacts were initiated by them.

A source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, during late October, 1964, advised as follows:

In late October, 1964, M. A. Suslov, a member of the Presidium, Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU), had been released from the hospital and was observed in Moscow, USSR. When Suslov was observed, he was in obvious ill health, noticeably flushed, and continuously coughing, sometimes so violently that he was unable to carry on the conversation in which he was engaged. Throughout the period that Suslov was observed, it was noted that he was constantly sipping hot tea and taking medicine.

During late October, 1964, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised as follows:

It was learned during the latter part of October, 1964, that Timur Timofeev, Deputy Director, Institute of World Economy and International Relations, USSR Academy of Sciences, Moscow, USSR, was not then working at his regular office at the Institute. It was learned that Timofeev has been detached from his normal duties and has been secretly working out in the country, away from Moscow. His assignment is in the preparation of documents for the use of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU) at the December 15, 1964, meeting of the Preparatory Commission for the World Conference of Communist and Workers Parties now tentatively scheduled for mid-1965.

During the latter part of October, 1984, it was learned that a representative or the CP, WEA threed over to the CP, Soviet Union (CPSU) a letter from the CP, UEA to be transmitted to the Polish United Workers Party requesting that an invitation be issued to Eall's brother to visit Poland to take up this matter personally.

	Late evening, 10/28/64, CG 5824-S* advised by NIKOLAI MOSTOVETS, International Department, Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU) that examination of original WILLIAM ALBERTSON document completed by Security Department experts who concluded that document was a forgery. Detailed report being prepared and will be transmitted to CP, USA through Solo apparatus as soon as possible. CG 5824-S was furnished no details of the analysis.

10/31/64. CG 5824-S* stated he was extremely surprised at this message and honestly could not factually explain the "reversal of the Russians" on this matter.

CG 5824-S* then stated that on the evening of 10/28/64, after having concluded some extended discussions with LEONID I. BREZHNEV and other CPSU personalities, he made it known to MOSTOVETS that he would return to the U.S. during the early a.m. of 10/29/64 in order to brief HALL and the CP, USA leadership on his discussions with CPSU leaders. At this same time, CG 5824-S* told MOSTOVETS that it was extremely important that he be able to carry back with him the results of the handwriting examinations made by the experts of the Security Department in connection with the ALBERTSON document. He stated that he told MOSTOVETS that GUS HALL was personally waiting for this and demanded some answer. Although it was late in the evening, MOSTOVETS agreed that he would call the Security Department and orally get a statement from them on the ALBERTSON document. Later, MOSTOVETS returned and personally advised CG 5824-S* that he had talked to the Security people and they said that the ALBERTSON document was a "forgery." A detailed report on this matter, according to MOSTOVETS, would be furnished to the Party through apparatus channels.

Source then noted that he cannot explain the complete variance of the report received orally from MOSTOVETS on 10/28/64 and the written message received through channels on 10/30/64. He stated it was possible that MOSTOVETS had never, as he claimed, actually been in contact with the Security Department or perhaps was unable to make such contact on late 10/28/64. If this is true, MOSTOVETS may have felt he must come up with some answer for CG 5824-S* to carry back to the CP, USA. Since the Security Department was already on record that the ALBERTSON document was a fraud, based on a review of a photograph of the document, and this information already furnished to the CP, USA during earlier visit of DANNY RUBIN to Moscow, MOSTOVETS may have felt he could safely relay the message to CG 5824-S* that the ALBERTSON document was a Then it is also possible and more likely true that MOSTOVETS did contact someone in the Security Department and was given misinformation on the matter; that this is true is partially borne out by fact that MOSTOVETS remarked that a report would be forwarded through channels which was the situation. Source stated that he could only surmise that the above might have occurred, but he is absolutely certain, in his own mind, that the information he furnished was exactly what had been relayed to him by MOSTOVETS.

The enclosed letterhead memorandum has been shown as having been made at Washington, D.C., to further protect the identity of this source.

The following is set forth for the additional information of the Bureau:

CG 5824-S* and CG 6653-S arrived in Moscow, USSR, during the late afternoon of 10/24/64.

As usual, he was met by representatives of the International Department of the Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU). During the period from his arrival until the afternoon of 10/28/64, when he held discussions with LEONID I. BREZHNEV, First Secretary, CC, CPSU, CG 5824-S* had no formal discussions with any official of the CPSU or the Government of the USSR. He immediately prepared a letter requesting an interview with BREZHNEV and the time left was merely waiting for an answer to this request and arrangements for the interview. During this period he was in contact with a number of officials, including NIKOLAI MOSTOVETS, Head of the North and South American Section of the International Department, CC, CPSU, ALEKSEI GRECHUKHIN, assistant to MOSTOVETS, and TIMUR TIMOFEEV, Deputy Director, Institute for World Economy and International Affairs, Academy . of Sciences of the USSR. However, none of these officials would discuss matters of importance with CG 5824-S* until after he would have had his interview with BREZHNEV. quently, after the interview, which ended during the evening of 10/28/64, there was no time for him to engage in discussions with any officials since he then departed from his hotel at 6:30 a.m., 10/29/64, enroute to the U.S.


CG 5824-S* stated that in view of the acute interest and concern of the U.S. Government concerning this matter, he wished to waste no time before immediately conveying the contents of his discussions with BREZHNEV to the Bureau. Therefore, he departed Moscow at 9:15 a.m., 10/29/64 and by exerting all the influence at his command was successful in arriving in the U.S. that same evening, clearing U.S. Customs, NYC, at approximately 8:45 p.m., 10/29/64.

The information set forth in the enclosed letterhead memorandum contains the essence of all CG 5824-S*'s discussions on this important matter. While not set forth for obvious reasons of protecting the identity of the source, the following was the order followed in this discussion:

The discussion opened in the office of M. A. SUSLOV located in Bldg. #1, the Main Bldg. of the CC, CPSU, located on "Old Place" Street, Moscow, USSR. Present were: SUSLOV, PONOMAREV, ANDROPOV, RASHIDOV, and another member of the Presidium whose name CG 5824-S* couldn't recall. NIKOLAI MOSTOVETS and IGOR MICHAELOV, translator and member of the International Dept., specializing in trade union matters, were also present. PONOMAREV advised CG 5824-S* that SUSLOV had just come out of the hospital in order to participate in this discussion with CG 5824-S*. From CG 5824-S*'s own observations, SUSLOV was in obvious ill health; he was noticeably flushed, was continually coughing violently and throughout the discussion was sipping hot tea and taking medicine. Upon occasion during the discussion SUSLOV was so overcome by his coughing that he would request PONOMAREV to continue the discussion in his stead. The discussion was begun by SUSLOV who immediately stated that they would join BREZHNEV in his office later in the discussion. After approximately 15 minutes of the discussion, ANDROPOV, RASHIDOV and the other unidentified member of the Presidium excused themselves and left. After a period of discussion with the above-named individuals, SUSLOV suggested that they join BREZHNEV and they all proceeded to BREZHNEV's office. According to CG 5824-S*, BREZHNEV was very fit and healthy looking, with a fine tan. He was dressed in a black sport shirt and was wearing a jacket. He acted and spoke in a very vigorous and confident manner. CG 5824-S* was introduced to BREZHNEV, whom he knew well from previous meetings, by all CG 5824-S*'s titles in the CP. USA. including membership on the National Board and the National Committee and as International Secretary of the CP, USA. BREZHNEV made a point of telling CG 5824-S* that he was the first American whom BREZHNEV had seen, that he was glad to see him. After CG 5824-S* gave the usual comradely greetings of the CP, USA, BREZHNEV stated, "We love your Party and I hope you will give my greetings to GUS HALL and your leadership."

Following discussion for sometime with BREZHNEV, they bade him good-by and returned to SUSLOV's office where the discussion continued, led primarily by PONOMAREV in view of the fact that SUSLOV was now coughing so violently that he found it too difficult to continue.

While from the enclosed letterhead memorandum it might appear that all of these individuals were present during the entire discussion, the above summary sets forth the manner in which this discussion actually took place. In reading the letterhead memorandum, the identification of the speaker, we believe, denotes the various stages of the discussion.

During late October, 1964, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised as follows:

During late October, 1964, a discussion concerning the background and events surrounding the removal of Nikita S. Khrushchev from his positions as leader of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU) and the Government of the USSR was held in Moscow, USSR, and among the participants in this discussion were the following leading members of the Central Committee of the CPSU: Leonid I. Brezhnev, First Secretary and Member of the Presidium, Central Committee, CPSU; M. A. Suslov, Secretary and Member of the Presidium, Central Committee, CPSU; Yu. V. Andropov, Secretary, Central Committee, CPSU; Boris N. Ponomarev, Secretary, Central Committee, CPSU; and, Sh. R. Rashidov, Candidate Member of the Presidium, Central Committee, CPSU, and First Secretary of the Uzbek Communist Party.

At the outset of the discussion, Suslov noted that although discussion of dissatisfaction with the methods of work of Nikita S. Khrushchev had been going on for a long time and against some of Comrade Khrushchev's policies, it was not an easy matter to discuss some of these matters in the public because this would mean an open struggle which would affect the very fabric of Soviet society. Suslov continued that it was therefore necessary

for them to hold the cards close to their chests. In essence, Suslov's comments continued as follows:

First of all, we want to emphasize that there is no change in our political line affecting domestic policy or the line of our foreign policy. Our general line, our principles remain unshakeable. In fact, we did not even discuss these problems of policy at the last meeting of our Central Committee; we only confirmed them. These were not the things we discussed.

The principles of the unity of the communist movement remain and the discussion at this last meeting of the Central Committee and before this at the meeting of the Presidium centered around Comrade Khrushchev. We discussed his positive features, including his good general line which he had developed against Stalin, for peace and so on. But already a year ago, in the practice of these policies, to begin with on domestic questions, Comrade Khrushchev changed for the worse. When he worked collectively and consulted us, we supported him, but when he started to work in a bad way and all by himself, and was no longer able to work collectively, violating the rules of the Party, we tried to check him. But in many cases he resisted us and would not take our advice either on policy or on some practical questions. He began to think that he had a monopoly of the truth. So, we decided to discuss some of these things with Comrade Khrushchev.

In early October we called a meeting of the Presidium. All 24 members of the Presidium were present, even the alternates. This meeting lasted two days under the chairmanship of Comrade Khrushchev. We had a very sharp and critical discussion in a very democratic way. Any member who wanted to speak, did. Comrade Khrushchev listened attentively but every now and then objected to criticism. Everyone did speak and expressed his point of view.

At the end of the two-day meeting, Comrade Khrushchev made a speech in which he said he thought that





most of the criticism of him was correct. He said he did not think he could carry through his duties. He said perhaps it is his age and health making it difficult for him to cope with the all-sided nature of his work. He is beginning to feel tense and nervous and perhaps this may account for him very often of late saying some silly things.

In essence, Comrade Khrushchev said, "I understand all of you, and I have trust in you. On the one hand, it is very painful for me to hear this criticism. But, on the other hand, I see and am proud of the way this cadre has grown and this is the cadre that can take my place."

Comrade Khrushchev then wrote a statement addressed to the Central Committee, CPSU, the essence of which is as follows: In view of my advanced age and bad state of health, I ask the Central Committee to relieve me of my job as First Secretary of the Party, as Chairman of the Council of Ministers, and from my position in the Presidium. I pledge to the Party, the working class, and the people of the Soviet Union that I will work for the remainder of my life for the Party and for Communism."

Then, the Central Committee discussed this statement. They decided that they would hold a plenary session of the Central Committee to include all alternate members and control commission members. There were about 400 people present at this plenary session of the Central Committee. Scores of people, if not hundreds, participated in this discussion of the plenary session of the Central Committee. They took up the question of Comrade Khrushchev and they voted for a decision to relieve Comrade Khrushchev of his duties as requested by his letter but to keep him in the Central Committee, so in this way to keep his good merits in mind, because it is no small thing to be a member of the Central Committee.

The entire Party is informed of this decision, from the top to the bottom, even to the smallest group





on a farm or in a factory. We have eleven and a half million members in the CPSU. They, in turn, informed others, including non-Party persons. So, we can say that as of this time at least fifty million people know of the decisions made at this meeting of the Central Committee.

This decision was received very calmly by our people. These are not the times of Stalin. The people were not afraid. They have confidence in the Central Committee that works collectively. They have confidence in the Central Committee that when an individual of its leaders makes a mistake, he can be replaced because the collective supersedes the individual. This plenary session of the Central Committee, as well as the discussions on the decisions of these meetings, were organized in the most democratic manner, and this is why the decision expresses fully the will of the people. We want to stress that the essence of our line remains the same and we will pursue it without caprices or subjectivism.

We consider what we did and the manner in which we did it normal. This is our conception of democracy. It differs from bourgeois democracy, but this is our democracy. We are assured that the people in the Soviet Union are satisfied and confident. Although such differences existed for a long period, we are not too excitable by nature; however, we do discuss things. We had our differences and we discussed them. But it was difficult to discuss them because by that time Comrade Khrushchev was built into a demigod by some of his advisers, hangers-on, etc.

At this point, Leonid Brezhnev began to speak. He stated in essence as follows:

We are going to continue the fight for peace and co-existence with all countries. We are going to continue to develop our policy of fraternalism in our relations with all Parties and we are going to continue to give help as much as we are able to give.

Our Party received the decision of the Central Committee with unanimity. There were no difficulties after





Comrade Khrushchev was removed. We did not have to organize the rank and file of the Party for support. The rank and file was ready. This demonstrates the maturity of the CPSU and its Marxist-Leninist position and if there were some sharp differences in the past, in time these will be healed.

Comrade Khrushchev worked alone. He not only replaced committees in the Party, but he even replaced departments of the government. First of all, I am willing to bet that United States Secretary of State Dean Rusk was able to use more initiative than our Foreign Minister Gromyko could under Comrade Khrushchev. He carried our Foreign Office in his pocket.

For example, he would send Comrade A. I. Adzhubei (Editor of "Izvestia") out on trips. He would have discussions with Chancellors and Ministers of other countries. Now, you would think he would show us the notes upon his return, but he would not. They would remain the personal property of Comrades Adzhubei and Khrushchev. The latest example was the case of West Germany. We did not know of Comrade Adzhubei's trip to see Ludwig Erhard (Chancellor of the Federal Republic of Germany) or what agreements he reached. We were embarrassed and so was the Foreign Office when the Government of the German Democratic Republic asked what agreements were reached. We did not know. Adzhubei along with A Satyukov (Editor of "Pravda") became the private envoys of Comrade Khrushchev. They became policy-makers replacing the Presidium and departments of the government.

Or take his travels. The foreign newspapers kept a count of the great number of trips that he made out of the country, but he would organize these trips without consultations and just go. On these trips he would discuss policies or would make concrete decisions all by himself, even on foreign aid. He would promise foreign aid and send it to a country. He would have the reserves of our treasury at his disposal and he would use them up. We never knew what we would be confronted with next.





Then Suslov stated that on Comrade Khrushchev's trip to Egypt, 43 members of his family were supposed to have traveled with him, but the Party had no voice in the number of people to accompany him.

Brezhnev continued: We have had a hard time in agriculture, especially in the last two years of drought. We think that if Comrade Khrushchev would have listened to some of our scientists and to the local farm organizations, rather than accepting a crazy idea that we should plant corn from the Artic Circle to the Black Sea, we might not have had such shortages and we would not have had to take our currency and buy six million tons of grain abroad. Worse than that, some of this grain was sent directly to other countries, even Egypt. Our valuable reserves were being used up by the decisions of one man.

This last year, even during the grain shortage, Comrade Khrushchev made trips abroad and our people would watch him on television dedicating this or that, and here they were suffering from shortages and they began to resent this. How can a leader of our country spend a good part or most of his time abroad when we have such difficulties?

This is what we mean when we say that the people accepted our decision. They feel relieved. Every other day he would come up with some new scheme on organization or reorganization. The last thing he came up with was to form 17 different economic divisions in our country which would have created complete chaos, particularly in agriculture, and then do you know that the week of our plenum he had printed in our press an article by that rich farmer in the United States, Garst, aboutfarming which was not a Marxist approach to our problems. We might even say that Garst replaced some of our Marxian ideas in the mind of Comrade Khrushchev.

Brezhnev then cited other examples and mentioned how those around Khrushchev began to build up the cult of his personality. If photographs were being taken, it was always Khrushchev being featured. Brezhnev stated that the Party could not stand it any more.





Brezhnev continued: Comrade Khrushchev would set up special committees divorced from the Party and from the farmers and such a committee would set up quotas, etc., for farmers in a given area. As a result, some of the best people were demobilized. The collective farmers could not understand why they did not have a say on what they would raise on their farms. Comrade Khrushchev had schemes for special boards on egg production, cattle, dairy products, etc.

Brezhnev then commented upon Khrushchev's habit of talking off the cuff while abroad. He mentioned Khrushchev's famous "We will bury you" speech. Brezhnev stated that it is inconceivable that a leader of a country professing a policy of peaceful co-existence would then turn around and say "We will bury you." Brezhnev stated that that is not the policy of the USSR but that now they can't get rid of that statement. Brezhnev cited this as an example of the damage that Khrushchev had done to the Soviet Union with his off the cuff remarks.

Brezhnev concluded his remarks by emphasizing that the USSR is not going to depart from its principled stand in favor of peaceful co-existence.

Then Boris N. Ponomarev began to speak: I can also add that there were Parties abroad that could not see the negative side of Comrade Khrushchev. But the Soviet people knew, especially those in agriculture. The numerous reorganizations in agriculture affected our people. They felt that if there is a change today made by Comrade Khrushchev, there may be another one tomorrow. This affected each and every Soviet farm. When Comrade Khrushchev first said "corn from the North Pole to the South," the people began to call him "the corn man" and this was very harmful to our agriculture. Constantly, Comrade Khrushchev proposed new administrative measures to solve problems rather than concrete measures.

Now, we realize that the weather was a factor for the last two years, but some of these administrative measures only aggravated things. Because weather is such a large factor in our country, we need to think scientifically and we need to plan and measure. But Comrade Khrushchev thought he





knew agriculture more than all of the experts combined and despite their advice to the contrary. Some of his mistakes resulted in agriculture shifting to the private sector and this resulted in more shortages and neglect of agriculture.

Comrade Khrushchev, himself, criticized Stalin for commandism-from-the-top, but he did the same thing himself. The members of the Presidium and the Central Committee were for a number of years trying to change Comrade Khrushchev. Sometimes he listened, but it became more difficult and he listenedless and his negative side became more dominant. Finally, the leadership decided that we were not going to compromise any more. During the later period, Comrade Khrushchev's negative side became very obvious. Not only did he get material retyped and printed in the paper praising him, but he used to get letters from the ranks. A good number showed dissatisfaction with some of his suggestions, especially in agriculture. But he would only reprint the letters of praise and circulate them among the Party leadership.

We took all of these things into account when we made the change. The changes we made are the result going back to the 20th Congress decisions. The Central Committee made the change in a democratic way and demonstrated that it knows how to use the Leninist method and provided for a continuation of leadership.

Suslov then stated: You know Comrade Brezhnev is no accident. It was only last June that Comrade Khrushchev suggested that he be put on the Secretariat. Comrade Aleksei Kosygin was for many years the First Deputy Prime Minister and has a broad knowledge of industry and foreign affairs. The Presidium has known Comrade Kosygin for many years. And Comrade Khrushchev said that he knows of no better men to work in these capacities. After all, Comrade Khrushchev himself nominated them.

Ponomarev then continued: No doubt the bourgeois press will try to use this. They will continue the slanders. But these will disappear and the Parties even in the capitalist countries can show that this proves the strength of the CPSU. The general line cannot be the work of one man; it is the product of the collective.

Why did we not show open criticism earlier? Well, because that can be used by the enemy. They would try to develop these rifts and the imperialists would take advantage of this. Remember, our criticism is not just of a First Secretary. If we started open criticism earlier, we would have to criticize our own Premier and First Secretary, and the bourgeoisie would have received a false impression and misunderstood these criticisms.

There were critical discussions at plenary sessions of the Central Committee and at meetings of the Presidium. There was criticism in the past but it became more difficult to continue. Instead of calling a plenary session of the Central Committee limited to 400, Comrade Khrushchev would turn it into a session of 4,000 to 5,000 people. How can you criticize someone in front of that many people? It got so that those elected to the Central Committee actually lost their voice. We told him that the size of the plenary sessions he called was actually an effort to avoid criticism. Comrade Khrushchev finally admitted that he had lost the ability to listen.

But we do have an argument that the removal of an individual is not everything. We still have the line of the 20th, 21st, and 22nd Congresses. They continue unchanged. The Soviet Government has told all other governments that these policies will continue. In meeting arguments, we should explain to comrades that during these critical days Comrade Khrushchev, himself, was the chairman of these meetings. It was not done in his absence. It was democratic. The democratic majority did what they had to do. In the future we may talk more openly about some of these things. Right now, we are limiting some of these things to discussion within the Parties and we do not want some of the details to get out because they might be distorted by the capitalist press and cause misunderstanding. We are preparing a letter concerning the change in





our leadership which will be circulated among all the Parties, but this letter will not contain some of these details about which we have been speaking.

Concerning the question of strengthening the unity of the world communist movement and Sino-Soviet relations, we are going to continue and will hold the meeting of the preparatory commission for the World Conference of Communist and Workers Parties. At this time we expect that that meeting will still be held on December 15, 1964. We will soon send out a letter to the 25 other member Parties on the preparatory committee and it will ask the participants for suggestions on how this meeting should be conducted.

We do not believe that this meeting should be like the other meetings. The December meeting may extend over a period of two to three months. We will suggest that the committee meet for three or four days and then adjourn; then come back a month or two later for a short session; and, then come back a month or more later. We suggest that we do not have one continuous meeting for a long time. We expect the first session to last no more than four days. During the periods of adjournment, the delegates can then return to their countries for Party consultations. The delegations may also spend the time between sessions vacationing in the Soviet Union.

Concerning the polemics between the CPSU and the Communist Party of China (CPC), the CPSU proposed a long time ago to stop these polemics, but the CPC refused. They have stopped the campaign against us for the time being, but in the mass organizations in their country and in other countries they still keep attacking us. We will continue in the same principled line of Marxism-Leninism. This is our line. On this, also, the Presidium will once again confirm this line. I repeat, we are not going to give up our principles and we will reaffirm them as we will at the December meeting.

Ponomarev pointed out that the CPSU disagreed with the contents of the "memorandum" prepared by Palmiro Togliatti, former General Secretary of the Communist Party (CP) of Italy, just before his death in the USSR. According to Ponomarev, this memorandum was meant solely for discussion with the CPSU.





Following Togliatti's death, the CPSU was in contact with the CP of Italy but were unable to dissuade them from publishing the memorandum and accepting it as a principled program of the CP of Italy without first holding discussions concerning it with the CPSU. Ponomarev stated that they then had to publish Togliatti's memorandum in the Soviet press which they had not wanted to do.

Any of the alleged explanations that absolves United States imperialism for Cuban crisis (Item #1) can be disastrous to the cause of peace in USA and anti-imperialism. Any such explanation would turn world leaders into FALSIFIERS. Regarding Item #2, any alleged explanation that the ideological dispute became a personal feud between Khrushchev and Mao would undermine and undercut all forces who have fought for a Marxist-Leninist line and against the wrong principles of CP of China. Regarding Item #3, any explanation that would give credence to, and justify, aggressive actions on borders through military means would wreak havoc on peaceful settlements of disputes. URGE extreme care in the discussion of whatever weaknesses did exist in this area because they touch on very fundamental questions that would vitally affect policies in the future in our Parties.

As reported to me by Morris Childs none of these three specific points were discussed in your talks with him while in USSR.

While reports in the "New York Times" may be false or distorted I would again urge extreme caution and again clarity with regard to these specific points.

Heartfelt thanks for the extraordinary courtesy and speed in talking with Morris Childs which is of great importance to me and our Secretariat.

Your immediate answer clarifying these three points is eagerly awaited.

The following information was supplied by a source which has furnished reliable information in the past.

During the latter part of October, 1964, A. M. Rucyantsev, a member of the Central Committee of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union and Editor-in-Chief of the "World Marxist Review," official theoretical journal of the world communist movement published in Prague, Czechoslovalia, was known to have been working on a confidential assignment. Rumyantsev was endeavoring to establish a new research body, possibly in Budapest, Hungary, which would hold regular sessions to discuss problems of the world communist movement. Runyantsev hoped that in time this body would evolve into a coordinating body of the world communist movement.

According to Rumyantsev, the "World Marxist Review" has outlived its usefulness as a coordinating body of the world communist movement in view of the fact that the Communist Party of China and the Albanian Party of Lebor have withdrawn their representatives from the Editorial Board of the "World REG- 39/10-425091-1 Markist Review."

HALL further stated that when he was in Hawaii recently he learned that there was not a single CP member there. Ten years ago, he said, there were between 300 and 400 members of the CP residing in Hawaii. The situation there is so bad, he said, that only one copy of "The Worker," of "People's World," and of "Political Affairs" is delivered to the Hawaiian Islands. When he attempted to make contact with JACK HALL, leader of the Longshoremen's Union in the Hawaiian Islands, JACK HALL refused to see him. GUS HALL characterized JACK HALL as "a lousy opportunist." HALL stated that while he was in Hawaii, he conferred with people who are much more politically influential than JACK HALL, and he remarked that he and ARNOLD JOHNSON, who had accompanied him to Hawaii, had taken steps to set up the nucleus of a CP in Hawaii.

John Williamson, a former functionary of the Communist Party, USA (CP, USA) who departed the United States a number of years ago and is now a member of the Mational Executive Committee, CP of Great Britain, and resides in-London, England, during the latter part of October, 1964, advised as follows:

At the present time he is working on a research project for the CP of Great Britain. This research project, not described, will probably be concluded by the end of the present year. At this time he will also probably lose his Party position and since he holds no position will probably not be elected to the National Executive Committee of the CP of Great Britain.

Williamson also noted at this time that he was doing considerable writing for the "London Daily Worker," publication of the CP of Great Britain, and he has articles appearing in the paper on an average of perhaps one to two times a week.

In regard to the autobiography dealing with that portion of his life spent in the United States on which he has been working, Williamson noted that it is just about complete. He is sending two manuscripts of this book to the United States, one directly to "The Worker" in New York, and the other is being sent to a member of his wife's family in New York. He noted that he was sending the manuscripts in this manner so that if one was lost, the other would get through.

A leading official of the Communist Party, USA, was recently in contact with officials of the Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union. The Communist Party, USA, official expressed grave concern about an article which appeared in the October 30, 1964, issue of "The New York Times," written by Henry Tanner, Moscow correspondent of "The New York Times." Tanner's article reported that there was circulating in the Soviet Communist Party organizations, and among many foreign delegations in the Soviet Union, a 40-page "bill of particulars" against deposed Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev. The official of the Communist Party, USA, pointed out that, according to Tanner's article, the alleged 40-page document contained many damaging statements relative to errors committed by Khrushchev, in particular errors in Khrushchev's Cuban policy.

The Communist Party, USA, official urged that extreme caution be utilized in the discussion of whatever errors Khrushchev had committed since such weaknesses touch on very fundamental questions that vitally affect the policies of the Communist Party, USA. For example, the official of the Communist Party, USA, noted that criticism of Khrushchev's Cuban policy absolves "United States imperialism" for the Cuban cirsis and could be disastrous to the cause of peace in the United States.

CHUCHUKIN advised that on November 11, 1964, at 2:40 PM, at 120 Wall Street, NYC (Midland Trust Building, 7th floor), he will deliver the \$100,000.00 to NY 694-S*, and if they do not meet on that date, then the delivery will be made on November 18, 1964, at the same time and place. (NY 694-S* is contemplating changing the 11/11/64 date because of the holiday in the financial district.) Communist Party's National Committee -- an officer of the Brooklyn Party organization in her own right -- was employed until recently as a secretary by Mobilization For Youth. The article further reported that the BARTS had left the USA by plane for Moscow.

which was announced to the world only on 10/15/64, CG 5824-S*'s trip was most timely. The information which CG 5824-S* obtained was from the highest possible sources in the Soviet Union, including LEONID I. BREZHNEV, himself, First Secretary of the CPSU, and M. A. SUSLOV, Secretary and member of the Presidium of the Central Committee, CPSU. I believe that this information furnished by CG 5824-S* is the most authoritative account yet received concerning the briefings being given to representatives of the CPs of the world who have been flocking to the USSR for an explanation of the precipitous removal of KHRUSHCHEV.

CG 5824-S* considered this information of such import to the Government of the U.S. that he was absolutely unsparing of his own health, although he is not strong, in insuring as rapid a return to the U.S. as possible. These discussions with BREZHNEV and others were not completed until the evening of 10/28/64, but by utilizing great initiative, CG 5824-S* was back in the U.S. by the evening of 10/29/64, so that a summary of this information had been telephonically furnished to the Bureau by the morning of 10/30/64.

In addition to the importance of the information obtained, there are other factors which contribute to my recommendation that CG 5824-S* and his wife are deserving of special recognition. Every such trip is inherently dangerous and requires enormous courage. As the Bureau is well aware, CG 5824-S* is in chronically poor health and in subjecting himself to the strain and rigors of such a long trip and the tensions of dealing at firsthand with the leadership of our enemies within the confines of the Iron Curtain, CG 5824-S* once again displayed an utter disregard for his own health, well-being, and safety. Again, his precipitous return to the U.S. in order that the information obtained would be as timely as possible forced him to forego sleep for approximately 48 hours which was most difficult for a man in his physical condition.

Relative to CG 6653-S, the recommendation for special recognition is based upon her own particular contributions to the success of this arduous and hazardous undertaking. As you will recall, this is the first such mission behind the Iron Curtain by CG 6653-S that she has made with the full knowledge of the true nature of the Solo operation. Her full acceptance of the concomitant dangers bears testimony to her dedication to the Bureau, her country,

and to her husband. The rigors of this difficult mission were attested to by the personal observations of the contacting agents who have advised me that she returned to the U.S. in a totally exhausted condition.

CG 6653-S also made her own unique contribution on this mission. Her presence was of great value in increasing the security of CG 5824-S* during this trip. Intelligence agencies, both at home and abroad, are aware of the fact that communists from the U.S. may now travel (and particularly at this time of year in proximity to the Nov. 7th celebration) and the CPSU would expect them to be more alert to identities of travelers, especially those entering socialist countries. Therefore, the presence of CG 6653-S provided CG 5824-S* with additional cover, both in fact and also so as to satisfy the CPSU.

CG 6653-S also provided CG 5824-S* with assistance in the numerous travel arrangements which were required in travel of this nature which is of a more complicated nature than the normal direct trip. She was able to relieve CG 5824-S* of such additional burdens. Having CG 6653-S accompany CG 5824-S* was further of value in that she was able to be of assistance to him in the ministrations required by his health problems, shouldering whatever responsibilities and burdens she was able to, in order to free him of numerous worries and details during the course of the trip. also of assistance, both en route and returning, by aiding him in the concealment on her person of some of the numerous notes and documents which CG 5824-S* must bring with him on this mission. When CG 5824-S* was required to leave their hotel room while abroad but before entering the Bloc countries, CG 6653-S remained behind to keep watch over CG 5824-S*'s material, thus relieving him of the necessity of always carrying such items on his person.

Finally, since it was expected initially that this mission would be of long duration, CG 6653-S was required to present the excuse to her employer that herhealth required that she take a two-month leave of absence. This she did without hesitation and I believe it is pertinent to note that this has resulted in the loss of two months' wages amounting to over \$1,000. While she did this without expectation of being compensated by the Bureau for this financial sacrifice, I do believe it should be considered in the overall evaluation of

this request for special recognition of her contribution to the success of this operation.

Therefore, in light of the foregoing, I recommend that the Bureau approve an award to CG 5824-S* in the amount of \$1,000 and to CG 6653-S in the amount of \$500.

If the Bureau approves the above recommended awards, it is further recommended that letters from the Director to these informants be prepared as has been done in the past for CG 5824-S*. For the possible assistance of the Bureau, copies of recommended letters to these informants are being submitted as enclosures to this airtel.

In view of the fact that CG 5824-S* presently anticipates that he will again depart from the U.S. sometime in the vicinity of 11/20 or 21/64, it is requested that the Bureau give expeditious attention to this recommendation.

Reference is made to my letter dated October 21. 1984, captioned as above, concerning the meeting of Communist Parties of Latin and Central America scheduled to be held in Havana, Cuba, in November, 1904.

Sources which have furnished reliable information in the past have advised as follows:

There is a good possibility that this conference may not be held. A number of Latin-American Communist Parties, like the major Parties in Argontina and Chile, have indicated that they were not in favor of such a conference and do not desire to be "openly tied up with Cuba."

In addition the Communist Party of the Soviet Union would like to discourage such international contacts between the Parties unless such contacts were initiated by the Soviets.

INFORMATION REGARDING COMMUNIST PARTY OF THE SOVIET UNION VILLINGNESS TO ACCEPT JAMES MOORE OF VISCONSIN FOR MEDICAL TREATMENT IN SOVIET UNION

It will be recalled that several months ago the Communist Party. USA (CP, USA) directed an inquiry to the Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU) concerning their willingness to accept one James Moore for medical treatment and rehabilitation in the Soviet Union. Moore, a young CP member from Uisconsin, had been injured in an automobile accident and was financially unable to secure the necessary medical attention he needed in the United States. In view of Moore's financial situation and need for medical attention, the CP, USA had initiated their request of the CPSU.

In late October 1964 the matter of together with coming to the Soviet Union for medical treatment was personally discussed with representatives of the North and South American Section, International Department, Contral Committee, CPSU. At this time, these representatives of the International Department formally agreed that the CPSU would invite the Moores to the Soviet Union and give James Moore the necessary medical treatment. However, the CPSU first desired that they be furnished a complete medical history regarding Moore.

A number of mouths ago, the Communist Party, USA (CP, USA) made inquiry of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU) and of the Communist Party of Czechoslovakia (CP of CZ) regarding their willingness to accept Otto Wangerin, together with his wife Sylvia, for some medical treatment either in the USSR or in Czechoslovakia. This matter regarding the Wangerins was discussed in late October, 1964, with representatives of the International Department, Central Committee, of both the CPSU and the CP of CZ.

In regard to the possibility of Otto Wangerin coming to the USSR for medical treatment, representatives of the International Department, Central Committee, CPSU, stated that their Party was not at this time prepared to accept Wangerin but that they had forwarded the medical report on him to the CP of CZ.

In subsequent discussions with representatives of the International Department, Central Committee, CP of CZ, they denied that they had received the medical report on Otto Wangerin and declined to give any answer on their willingness to accept the Wangerins. This lack of any answer on the part of the CP of CZ concerning the Wangerin matter would indicate a definite unwillingness or, in fact, a refusal of that Party to accept Otto Wangerin for medical treatment. Accordingly, the CP, USA will therefore now proceed on the basis that there is no additional action it can take at this time to get the Wangerins abroad for the desired medical treatment.

It will be recalled that in mid-October, 1964, Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA (CP, USA), had been rather irritated and upset by the fact that there had been a Conference of Latin American Communist Parties scheduled for late November, 1964, in Havana, Cuba, and that the CP, USA had been the only Party in the Western Hemisphere not invited to this Conference. He instructed that the matter of lack of advice concerning and invitation to this Latin American Conference of Communist Parties be taken up with some responsible representatives of Latin American Communist Parties in Moscov, USSR, as soon as possible.

In late October, 1964, it was learned that Victorio Codovilla, Secretary of the Central Committee, Communist Party of Argentins, and Rodner Parishmendi, First Secretary. Communist Party of Gruguay, were then both in Moscow, USSI, and that Luis Corvalant eppe, General Secretary, Communist Party of Chile, was expected there soon. In view of this, a letter was drawn up by a CP, USA representative who was then in Moscov for the purpose of being delivered to one of the foregoing individuals. This letter requested information as to why the CP, USA had not been invited to the Latin American Conference of Communist Parties. After this letter was prepared, it was turned over to a representative of the North and South American Section, International Department. Central Committee, CP of the Soviet Union, who, although hesitant about being involved, agreed to transmit it to one of the proviously named Party leaders from South America. At this same time, this representative of the North and South American Section, International Department, Central Committee, CP of the Soviet Union, was requested to refrain from informing any representative of the CP of Cuba that such a letter of inquiry had been prepared or was being delivered on the subject matter of the Latin American Conference of Communist Parties.

Although no definite date has been set for the departure of Lightfoot and Green from the United States for travel to Canada, it is not expected that they will be leaving prior to November 22, 1964.

Observations and Comments Concerning Current Situation in Czechoslovakia

It is this reporter's opinion, based on his personal observations and long standing connection with the international communist movement, as well as from an interpretation of material currently appearing in the press, mostly that press of the Western world, that there may be some serious problems in Czechoslovakia today.

For example, at this moment the best evidence perhaps of this is the fact that Antonin Novotny, current First Secretary of the Communist Party of Czechoslovakia (CPCZ) as well as President of the Peoples Republic of Czechoslovakia, was not among those Party dignitaries and leaders who had assembled in Moscow for the November 7th festivities. Instead, appearing in Novotny's place as leading representative of the CPCZ at the Moscow celebration was Jiri Hendrych, a member of the Presidium of the CPCZ and a Secretary of the Central Committee, CPCZ. absence of Novotny from the Moscow line-up of leading CP personalities would appear to be significant. It could be the forerunner of changes in Czechoslovakia and perhaps an indication of intention to separate the leadership of state and Party there, a move similar to that which has already occurred in the Soviet Union. It could also possibly mean that Novotny has already been relegated to the less important state post of President alone and may have been replaced as the leader of the CPCZ. If this is so, it may be an attempt by the CPCZ, by following the example of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU), to return the leadership of the Party to a collective.

It does not appear to this reporter that the above is impossible since over a long period Novotny, as head of the CPCZ, was Nikita S. Khrushchev's chief man and cooperated down the line fully with him. With the removal of Khrushchev as First Secretary of the CPSU and as Chairman of the Presidium of the Soviet Union, there may perhaps already be a debate in progress in Czechoslovakia to determine whether there had been under Novotny's leadership errors committed which might be the basis for the serious problems existing in Czechoslovakia, many of which are similar, particularly in the field of economics faced by the Soviet Union and which led to Khrushchev's removal.



"The New York Times" of 10/30/64 contained an article written by its Moscow correspondent, Henry Tanner, which reported that there was circulating in the Soviet Communist Party organization and among many foreign delegations in the Soviet Union, a 40page "bill of particulars" against deposed Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev.

On 10/30/64 NY 694-S* at the instructions of Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), sent a message to the Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CCCPSU) expressing grave concern about the above-mentioned article. CPUSA urged that extreme caution be utilized in the discussion of whatever errors Khrushchev had committed since such weaknesses touch on fundamental questions that vitally affect CPUSA policies. For example, the CPUSA noted that criticism of Khrushchev's Cuban policy absolves "United States imperialism" for the Cuban crisis and could be disastrous to the cause of peace.

On 11/4/64 NY 694-S* received a message from the CCCPSU for transmittal to Gus Hall. In this message the CCCPSU replied that the 10/30/64 article in "The New York Times" was nothing more than the usual fabrication and falsification of the bourgeois press, and that there is no so-called 40-page document or any other such document which contains any discussion of errors committed by Khrushchev.

OBSERVATIONS:

On 10/31/64 Secretary of State Rusk called the Director to express appreciation for the material which was furnished to him concerning Khrushchev's removal. On that occasion, Secretary Rusk advised that he would be very desirous of obtaining a copy of the 40-page Soviet document dealing with Khrushchev's resignation or dismissal.

The information obtained by NY 694-S*, which discloses that officials of the CCCPSU have indicated that there is no such 40=page document or any other such document which contains any discussion of errors committed by Khrushchev, should be of vital interest to Secretary Rusk and other high-level officials. 100- 428091

SAC Johnson, Chicago, called today concerning the travel of Chicago #5824-S* to Moscow for SOLO mission #17. The informant spent a few days late in October in Moscow, but returned to the States in order to brief Gus Hall and also, of course, the Bureau concerning information he had received which related to the removal of Khrushchev from authority in Moscow. He was instructed by the Soviets to return to Moscow the early part of December for conferences there concerning arrangements for funds for the Communist Party, USA, for 1965, and to attend a meeting of the Editorial Commission in Moscow 12/15/64 to deal with Sino-Soviet relations.

The informant was instructed last week by Gus Hall to plan to be in New York to attend the National Board meeting scheduled for 11/18 and 11/19/64, and thereafter to proceed to Moscow to complete his Party business there.

Johnson advised this morning that the informant was preparing to proceed on this travel and would leave Chicago at noon, 11/17/64. He stated that it would be necessary to advance the informant \$1,825 to cover round-trip airfare from Chicago to New York and thence to Moscow and return, and that included in this amount are expenses for hotels, meals, excess baggage, and other costs. He will make a detailed accounting on his return, and return funds not expended. Johnson also requested authority to pay the informant prior to his departure from Chicago his December payment as an informant since he will not be returning to the States under present plans until at least the last part of December and possibly not until January.

I authorized Chicago to advance \$1,825 to the informant for the purposes indicated and also to advance him his December informant payment.

CPUSA-FUNDS IS-C (CO: NY)

The NYO has regularly been forwarding under instant caption a summary of results of efforts to trace ultimate use of Solo funds by the CPUSA and its allied organizations.

In this connection it has been reported for a period of years that invariably any deposit made to the account of the Committee For A Free Press (bank account of "The worker") in an amount exceeding \$1,000 in cash, consists or substantially consists of Solo funds. In this connection, it is noted that when said Solo money is made available to the Party, it is earmarked for "The Worker" and so reported to the NYO.

Inssauch as "The Worker" is largely supported by Solo funds, which fact has been definitely established through the tracing operation and NY 694-3. deposits consisting of from \$1,000 to \$9,000 are regularly made to the account in \$20.00 bills on the average of once each week.

Following the recording of the serial and series numbers of said bills, it is necessary for clerical personnel to march each bill through the card index file maintained by the NYO. This procedure is far more involved than, for instance, checking through alphabetical index cerds and requires extreme concentration. It is estimated that it 100-425000 requires one clerk a minimum of two to two and one half 100-425000 days to check a sum of \$9,000.00.

In view of the fact that the Solo pattern has now been definitely established in regards "The Worker" and that the channelization of such funds to the paper is regularly reported, it is recommended that, in the interests of economy, through the saving in clerical labor, that the tracing operation be suspended as regards deposits made to the account of the Committee For a Free Press.

It is contemplated that the NYO will continue to record the serial and series numbers of the deposits on an FD-302. In the event it should become necessary or desirable to trace these numbers through the Solo index, such could be accomplished at any time.

It is further pointed out that a stop maintained at the bank utilized by Afton Tours makes it necessary for a Special Agent to go to the bank sometimes twice each week to record the serial and series numbers of these deposits.

Of late, the check through the Solo file index has been negative concerning these deposits.

UACE, the NYO will discontinue monitoring Afton Tour deposits on a regular basis. Liaison will be maintained at the bank in the event it should become necessary or desirable to monitor the deposits during a specific period.

The Bureau's comments are solicited relative to the above recommendations pertaining to "The Worker" account.

My memorandum to you of 10/1/64 pointed out that the Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), had requested the sum of \$100,000 from the Communist Party of the Soviet Union (CPSU) to finance the CPUSA's election program.

This is to advise of the receipt of \$100,000 by the CPUSA on 11/18/64 from the CPSU.

On 11/18/64 Vladimir A. Chuchukin, an official of the Soviet Mission to the United Nations, delivered to NY 694-S* a package containing the sum of \$100,000, of which \$60,000 was in \$100 bills, \$24,000 was in \$20 bills and \$16,000 was in \$10 bills.

The grand total of all funds received by the CPUSA from the Soviets since 1958 is now \$2,379,991, of which amount \$730,330 was delivered by the Soviets to the CPUSA in 1964.

COMMUNIST PARTY, USA INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS

The Central Committee of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union recently furnished the following information to the Communist Party, USA.

The date of the meeting of the Editorial Commission scheduled to be held in Moscow, Russia, on December 15, 1964, has been postponed until March 1, 1965. The opinion of Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA, was solicited as to the advisability of making a public announcement concerning the postponement.

The meeting of the Editorial Commission has been postponed in view of the fact that Sino-Soviet representatives during their recent meeting in Moscow failed to reach any satisfactory agreement. The Chinese indicated that they would not attend or participate in any manner in the meeting of the Editorial Commission.

During the recent meeting between Sino-Soviet representatives, the Soviets proposed that open polemics be immediately ceased. The Chinese refused to agree to this, and insisted that the Soviets stop catering to the United States. The Chinese demanded that the Soviet Union remove from its policy the question of peaceful coexistence with all countries, particularly with the United States.





Informant also obtained \$500 from the Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), making a grand total of \$3,875 available. Informant has submitted an itemized accounting of the total expenses incurred during his mission which amounts to \$.31914.04 and leaves a balance of \$39.04 to be paid to informant. The question of why CG 5824-S* could not claim more funds from the CPUSA was taken up with informant. CG 5824-S* stated that the \$500 received from the CPUSA was claimed for his wife; that his not claiming funds from the CPUSA is an integral part of his strategy in maintaining his position as the official CPUSA emissary, and that it is only by portraying the image of a successful business-man of some means who is willing to donate his time and money to the CPUSA that informant is able to deter Hall from giving consideration to a using someone else on these Solo missions.

The valiant struggle of the Saigon workers is an eloquent expression of the growing resistance of the broad masses of South Vietnamese workers

against the policy of the General Khanh clique, which is no more than a puppet in the hands of the North American aggressors.

Concerning the last incidents in the Concerning the last incidents in the Tonkin Gulf, where U.S. destroyers opened fire against unidentified ships suspected of having hostile intentions, the WFTU once more strongly denounces these provocative acts against the Democratic Republic of Vietnam. It repeats its urgent demand that the aggressive and processive sets of the United States. vocative acts of the United States, which cause anxiety to the workers and peace loving peoples throughout the world, should immediately be ended, in the spirit of the 1954 Geneva, Agreements.

96th Trades Union Congress

Movement goes forward

In the British Trade Union Movement the most important annual event is the Trades Union Congress which met in Blackpool from September 7 to 15. This year the resolution adopted on exchange visits stressed that these could be a useful step towards re-establishing international trade union unity. We reprint here extracts from an evaluation by Jim Mortimer, of the Draughtsmen and Allied Technicians' Association, writing in the London TRIBUNE of Septem-

A CCORDING to most of the British press the Trades Union Congress need not have been held this year need not have been neid this year for all the good it did. The criticisms range far and wide. It registered lit-tle progress, it is said, on the re-form of trade union structure and it evaded the real problems of an incomes policy.

Well, I for one disagree with this assessment of the 1964 Congress, in my view it was a good Congress and in a number of respects marked a step forward for the movement.

Take, first of all, the main decisions. Here, for the record, is a brief summary of just a few of the successful resolutions:

- The General Council was asked to give assistance to the efforts of affiliated unions to secure a 35-hour working week and a minimum three weeks' annual holiday.
- Congress called for the development of industrial training schemes through a strengthened central train-ing authority with adequate funds raised from industrial levies and Government grants. Congress also called for day release for all young people
- Congress welcomed the Labour Party's proposals for a comprehensive scheme of wage-related national in-surance benefits and contributions and urged that existing national in-surance benefits should be substantially increased.
- Ongress urged that the Factories Act should be extended to pro-vide for the election of workers' sa-fety delegates and the setting up of safety committees in factories.
- Congress called for effective economic planning, including an exten-sion of public ownership, and ex-pressed opposition to any attempt to impose an incomes policy which aimed to restrain wage and salary increases. It said that an acceptable incomes policy must be based on so-cial justice and should take account of all forms of incomes including rent, interest and profit.
- Support was expressed for development of world trade, including East-West trade, and for assistance to underdeveloped countries.
- The policy of apartheid of the South African Government was condemned and the general council was requested to use their influence to secure an international boycoit of

The plain fact is that many of the commentators who have criticised the 1964 Congress would have preferred to report on divisions within the movement. They were disappointed that the delegates at the Congress stressed instead their common pur-pose on a wider number of issues and ave support to progressive motions. In the discussion on economic plan-

In the discussion on economic planning and incomes policy there were certainly differences of emphasis between one union and another, but there was also sufficient agreement to point the direction of trade union policy. The unions want economic planning and they want more public ownership to provide the means for effective planning.

The unions will measure the effectiveness of plans for economic devergences of plans for economic devergences of plans for economic devergences.

tiveness of plans for economic deve-lopment by the extent to which they remove the threat of unemployment, raise living standards and bring about a more equitable distribution of national wealth. This is the key to the attitude of the unions towards an incomes plicy. It must not be an euphemism for wage restraint. Its purpose should be to bring about an increase in real wages and salaries.

To stop rising prices

and money and the speculation and hoarding which are facilitated and abetted by the policies of the Govern-

These policies still continue, Prices continue to rise; speculators and hoarders continue to mint money out of the people's food, creating an arti-ficial scarcity and the Government refuses to take any effective action. Such half-hearted action as the Go-vernment has been forced to take has not resulted in improving the situa-tion as a whole but has worsened

ITALY

TIME FOR ACTION

On May 29 a National Assembly of workers on the land, peasants and representatives of agricultural co-operatives met in Rome. It exposed the failure of capitalist methods of farming with subsidies amounting to thousands of millions of lire to improve agricultural and livestock production under the "Green Plan" of the Common Market disappearing into the pockets of the big landowners. Here are extracts from an account of the assembly taken from the journal of the CGIL of May 30, 1964.

THE deficit in the foreign trade balance for agricultural and food products rose from 300-thousand milion lire in 1962 to 500 thousand milion lire in 1963. This year's harvest might give us a surplus of 5 to 10 million quintals of cereals for which there are no buyers and which in the end will be used either as fodder or sold abroad for 2,500 to 3,000 lire the quintal! . . In 1960 we were told that this was necessary to adapt our agriculture to the requirements of bigger home consumption and to competition within the Common Market. . .

"This deficit will be met", declared Vittorlo Foa, Secretary of the GGIL, out of the workers' contributions paid into the family and pensions fund. They are being deprived of what is due to them in the fear that large families, old and disabled persons might be consuming too much meat, butter and sugar." (The production of these primary essentials is showing a loss in Italy at the moment).

The failure of the agrarian and economic policy of the ruling class, which gave the development of agriculture a capitalist orientation, further shows itself in the stagnation in the south of Italy, particularly among the tenant farmers and the small farmers who find it extremely hard to make a living. The historical discrepancy beteen industry and agri-

culture became even more acute and brought about a complete subordination of the most powerful wholesale trade groups and the Federconsorzi (the employers' organisation).

The land reform, which was to modify the foundations of landed property and agrarian structures and direct investments towards new forms of agricultural co-operation, is therefore an objective not only of millions of peasants, small farmers, tenant fermers and agricultural workers as well as agricultural specialists, but also of the urban workers...

. The CGIL therefore declares [and a Bill to this effect has been submitted to Farliament] that if agriculture is to be re-organised on a democratic basis, regional institutions must be formed to encourage the development of institutions must have sufficient authority to plan agricultural production, readjust the property system, to organise the markets and the distribution of credits.

The results obtained as far as farming contracts are concerned were the outcome of a long and difficult economic battle, a united struggle waged by the peasants' trade union movement. Partial as they may be, these results are positive. Land reform and democratic planning of the development of agriculture are always the fundamental objectives of united mass campaigns organised by all the workers grouped in the CGIL, in the National League of Co-operatives, in the Agricultural Workers' Union, in the Tenant Farmers' Union and in the Association of Agricultural Co-operatives.

MOROCCO

COLONISATION MOROCCAN VERSION

The Moroccan Government makes much of its "land reform". Avant Garde, the organ of the Moroccan Labour Union (UMT — independent) of August 22, 1964, comments on this problem:

l'Avant.garde

AT least 3 million hectares (1 hectares — 2½ acres) are indifferently farmed by the feudalists and the 'colons' [mainly French settlers of this total, only the land belonging officially to the settlers, i. e. about 230,000 hectares roughly, are included in the land reform which is less than a quarter of the total belonging to the big landowners. Even this is being done by bits and pieces, and what is worse, this part of the national wealth is being bought back at high prices from those who had received it for less than nothing and enriched themselves from it for 65 years...

Heirs to colonialism

Let us look at the land belonging to the colonialists. Ever since 1958 we are demanding "its restitution. Since then, the owners have continued to exploit it, without, however, developing it. As fertilisers have been used only sparingly, the land is exhausted; farming squipment has no heen renewed. And these depreciations the State is going to reward with generous compensation. Thus, the reclaiming of such a small part of the national wealth results in the impoverishment of the country. Let us add to this that numerous farms have been sold by the colonialist owners to big Moroccan lendowners. In 1959 the Government of Abdallah Ibrahim forbade such sales, But since then open disregard of this ban has resulted in the piliage of the nation's wealth to the advantage of a few privileged persons linked with Government circles.

This continues in another form. The Government has appointed twenty administrators as overseers of 8,000 ha. The Government is buying back at the expense of the nation property that will allow privileged sectors to get rich. And this is called land reform, while at best 1/4 is a Moroccan variety of colonisation.

The peons of California

Extracts from a report by J. R. Robertson, Vice-President of the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen' Union (Independent) which appeared in the Dispatcher of May 15, 1964, official publication of this union.

L AST week I spent several days in a wonderland of productive wealth — where enough food is harvested to feed a large part of America, and even parts of the world. I travelled that great horn of plenty which Californians call "the Valley" and which produces more than 40 per cent of vegetables eaten in this country. From Porterville in the south to Chico in the north it is, acre for acre, the richest agricultural producer in the world.

Yet, by moving a few yards off the highway and the main street I saw appalling living conditions in the midst of plenty. I had no idea that there could be so much poverty in the vast valley that I had travelled so often — so much invisible poverty, just around the corner, yet just out of sight in hundreds of towns.

There are hundreds like this one — in this richest of states, in the richest country in the world.

A 12 to 15 foot boxlike room made of weather-beaten boards, and covered by stinking tarpaper — that's "home". No running water or toilet in the house. At times there is an outside tap. As often, there's just a barrel or drum of water outside the shacks. In some places there's a community bathhouse and a public toilet in the centre of shantytown.

Most families have cars, some have trailers. They must have wheels of some kind to follow the crops to earn a few bucks.

A sixty-year old farm worker described to me the kinds of people who work; these are his words: "There are the Anglos, the Mexicans, the Negros and the Filippinos."

It became pretty clear to me that these four major groupings stay pretty far apart — or are kept that way. In any case, I saw no signs anywhere that any of these groups had any realisation that they would have to

work together and pool their strength if they ever expect to got anywhere. If the trade unions ever hope to help the agricultural worker lift biuself, we'll have to work like hell to break down these national and racial barriers. It won't be easy — especially when there's such rough competition for a day's work

for a day's work.

So the first lesson is to learn not only to live together but to join forces and use their collective political and economic strength to pull them.

selves out of this modern day peonage. What can the labour movement do? For the 30 years I've been in the labour movement I've sen one attempt after the other to organise agriculture fall. When it does succeed, on occasion, it's because the people organised are really industrial workers, staying in one place, pretty much mechanised, and usually handling only one basic crop.

Despite all efforts mainland agricultural workers remain unorganised, hideously exploited, often undernourished, virtually unprotected, semiliterate, and almost outside the normal American scene.

The children of these farm work-

The children of these farm workers need an education, and have an equal right to learning. We owe it to these kids — and must demand that they get it, even if it means large appropriations for first-class mobile schools that will follow the children around.

We need the farm worker to produce the food we need in order to live. He needs the unions to give him a hand — to fight for him, to speak for him in legislatures, and congress, to bring his case to the public—and then to help him learn the ultimate lesson we too had to learn the hard way — to learn how to work together.

GREAT BRITAIN

One answer only

Under the above headline, the LAND WORKER of August 1964, journal of the National Union of Agricultural Workers, comments editorially on conditions in British agriculture.

BETWEEN 1950 and 1963 the number of male farm workers in Great Britain fell by 220,000. This represents nearly 34 per cant of the 1950 total. That loss . . . has not been evenly distributed throughout the age groups.

Over a half of the net loss is of those between the ages of 25 and 44 years. The total fall in this group is over 115,000.

These figures, culled from a table produced by the Minister of Labour in answer to a question from our Vice-President, effectively show why we are right to be concerned about the drift from the land. It is not just that the labour force is shrinking. . . It is that the industry is losing fastest the very men who should be the backbone of the agricultural labour force.

There is no difficulty about getting young people to enter agriculture. Indeed, 16 per cent of our workers are under 19 years old compared with only 10 per cent for the total work force of the country. But by the time they reach their early twenties they leave in their thousands. Just at the time when they should be at their most effective to the Industry.



To us the reason is plain. Farming does not offer them the pay, conditions or prospects that they can get eisewhere. In 1963/64 their average earnings were only £12.6.7d for 51½ hours worked. Which compares with nearly £17 for 47½ hours in industry.

Perquisites to fill the gap? As the General Secretary pointed out at Tolpuddle, these average only 6s.8d a week!

No, there is only one answer. That given by the Biennial Conference — a minimum rate of £12 a week on the farm.

COLOMBIA

Operation Marquetalia

To deprive them of their land, on July 14 the Colombian Government launched a large-scale military operation against small farmers in the Marque-talia region, throwing in almost 20,000 troops accompanied by U. S. advisers. BOLETIN, the organ of Trade Union Unity of the workers of Letin America, carries a report on this offensive in its August issue, from which we reprint some excerpts.

IN the darkest period of terror and dictatorship that the people of Co-lombia had to endure, some guerilla units started to clear the virgin forest in the Marquetalia region.1 After the overthrow of the military dictatorship in 1957, the new Government offered peace, and the guerilla fighters became farmers. They declared, hawever: "We took up arms to defend human rights against violence. If the offers of peace made to us are sincere, we shall remain peaceful workers. But as the experience of the last years has taught us that our only guarantee of safety against the enemy is our ability to defend ourselves, we will not lay down our arms. We will till the land in peace, without, however, giving, up our self-defence organisation."

The Government willy-nilly had to accept. During a longish period it encountered no difficulty in the region.


Self-defence

Marquetalia is no exception in Colombia. There are also peasant selfdefence organisations in the regions of Pato, Guayaber, Riochiquito, Sumpaz, Tequendama, and elsewhere.

In all these regions the civilian authorities and the Government representatives could always establish themselves when they came with peaceful intentions. The representatives of the authorities were often received in a spirit of co-operation. But the peasants have always resisted all and any form of military occupation, having had some bitter experience.

An American military spokesman admitted: "The U.S. army has trained Colombian officers in anti-guerilla warfare. We offered the Colombian

from



army experts and helicopters for special operations; in any case, the USA is going to maintain a special unit of troops in Colombia till July."

After the Government had publicly announced the operation in the hope of preparing public opinion, a wave of protest swept the country and the project had to be postponed. But following talks concluded in Washington, Colonel Fajardo Pinzon, from the Colombian Army Headquarters, de-

clared that the operation was "inevitable, since it was no longer possible to resist the pressure of the U.S. army agents."

The civilian population was mercilessly bombed, but soon army spokesmen had to admit that the expected results had failed to materialise.

Antonio Marin, peasant leader from Marquetalia, in a letter to the UNO condemned the crime of this warfare and the spraying of the crops with poisons in order to make the peasants surrender through hunger. The State Department denied this, as it had denied similar actions in Korea, 'Vietnam and Laos.

The Colombian Trade Union Confederation has started a campaign in defence of the Marquetalia peasants. It calls on all workers and people in Colombia to organise solidarity actions together with the campaign for demands.

To be honest is to describe a military "adviser' no longer as adviser as soon, as he actively intervenes — be it only as pilot of a troop transporter — in military operations. A pountry which supplies only hombers and material apart from advisers is also waging war. That country is as guilty for the loss of human lives as the soldiers who themselves do the killing.

To be honest means to call a dic-

To be honest means to call a dictatorship a dictatorship even when it is a friendly nation. To call an atrocity an atrocity even when it is committed by an ally. An injustice is an injustice also if it occurs in the western hemisphere.

To be honest means, all in all, to tear down the camouflage of propa-ganda, to unmask legends and illu-

Redundancy in the textile industry

Cushioning the impact

The Textile and Clothing Workers' Union has sent a press release to all public authorities in the German Federal Republic, parts of which are reprinted below from the weekly of the DGB.

DURING the past six years 89,000 textile workers, both men and women lost their jobs in the Federal Republic. Despite those dismissals and a reduction in hours of work by six hours a week, production in the textile industry has gone up. The rate of increase in production in the West German textile industry amounts to 5% per annum. Production per man 5% per annum. Production per man hour has more than doubled.

This is in the first place the result of the vast rationalisation measures . . . In the cotton industry a weaver who used to operate 20 looms, today has to operate 55 automatic ones on an average.

While affirming the need for technological advance, the social consequences arising from it, particularly for the older wage earners must from the outset be taken into account. It appears from trade union documentation that textile workers had to accept a loss of pay amounting to as much as 0.80 marks an hour and conFrom

sequently lower old age pensions. Since 1961 the Textile Clothing Workers' Union has done everything possible to introduce a clause in the collective agreements which would provide for the protection of the wage-earners in the event of rationalisation. lisation.

For the first time, in the spring 1964, such an agreement rationalisation was signed in West-phalia. The contracting parties under-took to set up a fund for the payment of additional insurance benefits in case of dismissal and a reduction in wages caused by rationalisation and to mitigate the adverse effects this might have for old age pensions.

The following points will now have to be negotiated throughout the tex tile industry:

- In the event of the closing of a factory, payment of a carry-over allowance to the redundant, ranging from three to twelve monthly salaries, depending on age. Together with this the introduction of retraining schemes to ensure a smooth adaptation of the workers to the new aptation of the workers to the new working conditions.
- 2 In the event of rationalisation, every effort must be made to offer the redundant workers vacanoffer the redundant workers vacan-cles in other departments of the same factory. Continued payment of the average wage for a minimum of six months. Should afterwards the in-come be lower additional contribu-tions will be paid into the old age pensions fund for employees over the age of 45, which will guarantee them a pension based on their previous higher earnings.

In the event of inevitable redundance as a result of rationalisation, a carry-over allowance of three to twelve monthly wages must also be

World's farm worke Square Deal

Whatever the specific nature of the agricultural problems in the different parts of the world, there is one feature common to all of them: monopoly control of the market. Low wages, in some countries grinding poverty, the flight from the land, alongside unchecked profits of Big Business, concentration of the land in fewer hands, and often a frantic clinging to colonial and feudal methods of ex-ploitation; these are some of the aspects of agriculture as shown by our following articles.

What bothers and frightens thes gentlemen is certainly not the suf-fering and hardship endured by the agricultural workers and peasants whom poverty obliges to leave their homeland in search of bread. What worries them is the scarcity of labour at certain times and the fact that the emigrants on their return are ready to strug-gle for what can be called European wages.

Real solution

Their real aim is to continue to ruin the peasants, to kill two birds with one stone: on the one hand, Tilling the soll

to take over what little of the land they still possess, thereby further-ing the already scandalous concen-tration of land ownership, and on the other hand, to create a new proletariat to replace those who have left.

This tends to become a double-edged weapon if the peasants struggle resolutely for a democratic regime that would be willing to take the measures that would put an end to this type of emilgration. The first of these should be real land reform giving back the land to those who till it. It is generally known that in Spain there are great plots of waste land or land insufficiently cultivated become no a minority of large landioning in a minority of large land-longing to a minority of large land-owners who have given sufficient proof of their bad husbandry. It would be enough to give this land to the agricultural workers and the peasants to bring about a consi-derable decrease in emigration, if not stop it altogether.

51.283 landowners, i. e. 0.85 per cent of the total landowners possess 53.51 per cent of the land, i. e. 22.382,100 hectars (one hectars = sprox = 2.4% acres) 8.59 per cent, i. e. 5.486,820 peasants posses 18.9 per cent of the land and 9.126,000 others have only lots smaller then one hectare. Small farmers ready to fight

THE French National Farmers' Union has published a leaflet stating: "French Farmers don't want to be the lowest category in France, the lowest in Europe ..."

The small and medium farers have reasons enough for their discontent. The main one is that they have to sell their agricultural produce to the distributers at a price dictated by the Government. Thus the prices of certain products, such as grain and meat, have not changed in years, while the peasants have to pay higher prices for industrial goods.

For beef, the price paid to the producer, called price of orientation, is so low, that little by little, the peasants have been deterred from raising beef; France has to import beef, while in 1950 the problem was the reverse; it had to find markets. find markets.

That is the result of an obstinate policy, allowing only the margins of the big distributors to increase on the big distributors to increase and weighing heavily on the earnings of the producers. Here we are meeting the other aspect of the so-called policy of stabilisation, meaning wage freeze...

It is known that the Government has officially set itself the objective of closing down in a few years hundreds of thousands of small "nonpaying" farms. This is yet another means it wants to use to fight the "shortage" on the labour the part of the strength of the stren market and to set up its reserve army, swelled by thousands of bands driven from the land.

fhe date was 28th September, 1864. The place was St. Martin's Hall, Long Acre, London. More than 2,000 people, most of them trade unionists, attended a meeting to hear a reply from representative French workers to a message sent to them some

earlier by a group of British trade unionists.

The immediate cause of this exchange of messages was the determination of leading British and French workers' representatives to express support for the Polish people who, in 1863, had risen in insurrection against the repressive rule of Tsarisi Russia. On both sides, however, there was a feeling that some more permanent form of organisation should be established to express the bond of friendship and common purpose between the workers. friendship and common purpose between the workers of different countries.

The St. Martin's Hall meeting had an international flavour. Not only were there British and French speakers but a number of songs were given by a German workmen's choir. Representative exiles from a number of other

men's choir, kepresentative exhibition a number of other European countries were also present.

Towards the end of the meeting a resolution was moved and adopted to the effect that an international association of working men should be formed. So was established the International Workingmen's Association, which ever since has been known as the First International . .

The First International lasted for about nine years. During this period it had an active life. A number of international congresses of workers' representatives were held and the committee of the international, known as the General Council, met regularly . . .

The guiding spirit in the International was Karl Marx. The guiding spirit in the International was Karl Marx. His task was a difficult one. The other representatives had all kinds of ideas, ranging, on the one hand, from what would now be described as anarchism to, on the other, narrow trade unionism. Marx drafted the important declarations of the International, including its famous Inaugural Address and Provisional Rules. That it achieved as much as it did and that it lasted for nine years, until wrecked by internal controversy and the temporary decline of the movement in Western Europe, was due considerably to the influence of Marx. To this was due considerably to the influence of Marx. To this day the declarations which Marx drafted and his method of work provide a guide for the theory and practice of the trade union and labour movement . . .

The existence of the First International was of historic significance. It expressed the common interests of workers of all countries. The emancipation of labour, said the Provisional Rules of the International, "is neither a local nor a national, but a social problem embracing all countries in which modern society exists..."

Secondly, the International expressed the need for an independent international workers' movement with both economic and political objectives.

Thirdly the International, through the guidance given by Mark, related the immediate struggles of the workers for higher pay and shorter hours of work to longer-term social objectives. Mark opposed those who dismissed as of no consequence the trade union efforts of the workers. He equally opposed others whose vision was limited to trade union objectives.


The Inaugural Address characterised the law on the ten-hour day in England as a victory of a principle, as a victory of the political economy of the workers over the political economy of the workers over the political economy of the workers over the political economy of the workers which rejected any legislative limitation of the working day by reference to the law of supply and demand, as well as against the views of many trade union leaders who wanted the movement to confine itself to reforms only.

Marx showed that the fight to improve the lot of the working class had to be linked with the fight to do away with exploitation, an idea which he developed with remarkable lucidity in a lecture before the general

away with exploitation, an loca which he developed with remarkable lucidity in a lecture before the general council of the International in lune 1865 [later published in the pamphlet "Wages, Price and Profit"] as well as in the resolution concerning the role of the trade unions which he had drawn up and which was adopted by the

1866 Geneva Conference.

The International gave aid to strikes everywhere and its solidarity actions often helped to decide the Issue in favour of the strikers. This was so with the strike of the Paris bronze workers and the Geneva building workers. Even where the workers and the Geneva building workers. Even where the workers where beaten, as in the strike of the cotton workers, of the North of France, the work of the International led to the setting up of trade unions. The International organised broad solidarity actions and collections of funds in Europe and the USA

Upon occasion, when being subjected to some of HALL's typical tirades, CG 5824-50 has reminded him of the fact that he performs these services vithout compensation for his time or expenses, and this has in the past served to mollify HALL and has further enhanced the informant's position.



HALL agreed with CG 5824-S*'s criticism and stated he had been led to believe that the editorial comment would not be published in the form in which it actually had appeared. He agreed that the arrogance of its approach and that the praise for KHRUSHCHEV which had appeared in the editorial comment could be damaging to the prestige of the CP, USA in the eyes of the CPSU. HALL agreed to take this matter up immediately upon his return to New York and see what could be done to repair some of the possible damage that this editorial comment might have done.

While CG 5824-S* was in New York during the period 11/17-22/64, this "Political Affairs" editorial comment came up for both private discussion and for discussion at the National Board, CP, USA meeting. At the National Board meeting, the "Political Affairs" editorial comment was criticized by some individuals present and LUMER, himself, admitted that in light of current existing facts and information presently available, he probably would have had some second thoughts regarding some of the language used in this editorial comment.

In private discussions with CG 5824-S*, which occurred after discussions with HALL, LUMER personally prepared for the source a handwritten note which is, in effect, a self-criticism and an apology for some of the false impressions which may have been created by the "Political Affairs" editorial comment. The text of the note which LUMER prepared at this time is set forth, in full, below and is to be turned over to the CPSU:

"Dear Comrades--

"We wish to offer an apology for the unfortunate appearance of the editorial in the November issue of Political Affairs. First, while it was written and was in the printers before we were informed of the details of the Khrushchev resignation, it appeared afterward and thus gave the erroneous impression that we were raising questions after we had received a report.

"Second, on reflection we realized that some of the language was unduly sharp and that demands were made that should not be made of a fraternal party.

"We wish to assure you that our profound respect and feeling of comradeship toward the CPSU remain unaltered, as does our appreciation of both its tremendous contribution to human progress and the problems it faces. We shall do what we can to correct any false impressions which may be created.

This memorandum recommends that information obtained by NY 694-S* concerning the current status of Sino-Soviet relations as well as the forthcoming Editorial Commission meeting in Moscow, Russia, be disseminated to the White House, Secretary of State Rusk, Director McCone of the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA), and the Acting Attorney General.

On 11/24/64 and 11/27/64 NY 694-S* met with his Soviet contact, Vladimir A. Chuchukin, an official of the Soviet Mission to the United Nations. Chuchukin told informant to transmit the following information from the Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union, to Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA.

The date of the Editorial Commission meeting to prepare for a world conference of communist parties scheduled to be held in Moscow on 12/15/64 has been postponed until 3/1/65. The opinion of Gus Hall was solicited as to the advisability of making a public announcement concerning the postponement. The meeting has been postponed because the Chinese, during their recent meeting with the Soviets in Moscow, indicated that they would not attend or participate in any manner in the Editorial Commission meeting.

During the recent meeting of Sino-Soviet representatives in Moscow, the Chinese refused to agree to a proposal by the Soviets that open polemics be immediately ceased. The Chinese insisted that the Soviets stop catering to the United States and demanded that the Soviet Union remove from its policy the question of peaceful coexistence with all countries, particularly the United States.

Subsequent request 10/13/64 by Internal Security Section, Domestic Intelligence Division, initiated further monitoring to determine possible future action. Attached is a listing of transmissions and messages intercepted the Midland radio station. It is noted that station WRN has been heard past three Fridays at 1315 GMT on 13355 Kc, usually sending traffic. Call is transmitted at slow speed but traffic is sent at 60 groups per minute. Station OKE transmits Monday through Saturday on 13330 Kc at 1525 GMT and again at 1545 GMT on 12685 Kc. He sends traffic at about 35 groups per minute. Cryptanalytic examination of listed messages indicated they wer enciphered with random keying and could not be deciphered at this time. No further identifying data could be developed for origin or intended destination of this traffic. It is pointed out that listed material constitutes but a small fragment of clandestine type transmissions over broad radio spectrum, interception and analysis of which is primary responsibility of National Security Agency (NSA). Latter is obliged to keep Bureau apprised through continuing liaison of communications intelligence items of interest to Bureau. Memorandum to Mr. Conrad Re: SOLO

Because of extreme sensitivity of SOLO case, which involves radio transmissions in code to NY 694-S*, and small likelihood of intelligence of real value to be forthcoming, it would not appear advisable to contact NSA at present time regarding this traffic which so closely approaches SOLO schedules and undoubtedly would draw attention thereto.

In view of negative results of our examination of representative sampling of clandestine radio traffic similar to SOLO transmissions, fact that listed transmissions involve only a small fragment of total radio traffic picture, and security sensitivity of our SOLO case, it would not appear profitable to continue monitoring coverage and cryptanalysis at this time.

ACTION:

Subject to review and concurrence of Internal Security Section and unless advised to contrary, special radio monitoring at Midland described above, and cryptanalysis associated therewith, will be discontinued.

The Communist Party, USA, recently advised the Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union, that it was in complete agreement with the decision to postpone until March 1, 1965, the meeting of the Editorial Commission, originally scheduled to be held in Moscow, Russia, on December 15, 1964. The Communist Party, USA, cautioned that any public announcement concerning the postponement must be extremely circumspect in order to guard against conveying the impression that a capitulation had been made to the wrong political concepts of the Communist Party of China. In this connection the Communist Party, USA, noted that the Chinese are promoting the idea that Khrushchev was removed because of his wrong concepts in the Sino-Soviet ideological struggle. The Communist Party, USA, strongly urged that whatever public announcement is made, it must not give credence to any belief that the Chinese, after all, had been correct in this struggle.

The Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union, informed the Communist Party, USA, that originally twenty-six communist parties had been invited to participate at the meeting of the Editorial Commission originally scheduled for December 15, 1964, and the communist parties of the following countries, in addition to the Soviet Union, had indicated that they would be willing to attend the meeting: Argentina, Australia, Brazil, Bulgaria, Cuba, Czechoslovakia, Finland, France, German Democratic Republic, Federal Republic of Germany, Hungary, India, Italy, Mongolia, Poland, Syria, the United Kingdom and the United States.

According to the Central Committee, Communist Party of the Soviet Union, Japan and Indonesia advised that before agreeing to attend the meeting of the Editorial Commission they desired additional information with respect to the meeting. Rumania advised that it would not send delegates to the meeting unless all of the other twenty-five communist parties agreed to attend the meeting. Albania, China, North Korea and North Vietnam refused to attend the meeting under any circumstances.

INFORMATION REGARDING PUBLIC SALE OF CROSSCURRENTS PRESS, INC., NEW YORK, NEW YORK AND REQUEST FOR DISCUSSIONS WITH REPRESENTATIVES OF CPSU

In discussion with GUS HALL, General Secretary, Communist Party (CP), USA, during the latter part of the week of November 15, 1964, that individual remarked that MYRON SHARPE, owner of Crosscurrents Press, Inc., New York City, was still willing to sell out and he, HALL, would like to see it sold to the right person. HALL however stated SHARPE was demanding approximately \$42,000 compensation for his interest in Crosscurrents Press and therefore before any final deal is made with him he would like the matter discussed with representatives of the CP, Soviet Union (CPSU), have them view the contract for sale that SHARPE has offered and secure some agreement and approval from them on the contract conditions and other problems.

At this same time, HALL made available a rough draft copy of the contract for sale which MYRON SHARPE was offering. The full text of this contract of sale is set forth below:
