In connection with other material regarding the activities in West Germany of a group known as Easter March of Atomic Weapons Opponents, the Intelligence Division, Headquarters, U. S. Army, Europe, furnished a report bearing the notice "Warning Notice - Sensitive Sources and Methods Involved" which stated that a source had furnished a copy of a letter in the English language addressed to Dr. [redacted]

[redacted] The letter was dated 4/17/66 and postmarked at Newark on 4/17/66. It read as follows:

"Dear Dr. [redacted]

"Thank you very much for your letter. However, it came to me too late and I was not able to come in time.

"You might be pleased to know that I have been granted permission to come to Germany. All that I must do is notify our attorneys in Washington about two weeks in advance of the trip.

"If there still is a reason for me to come to your country, I would be glad to spend about three days there whenever is best for you.

"We heard of your demonstrations over television. It was very moving. Only an international front of protest can end this terrible war.

PURPOSE:

On 11/11/67, a representative of the Assistant Chief of Staff for Intelligence (ACSI), Sergeant [redacted] telephonically contacted the weekend supervisor for any information concerning the subject. The subject came to the attention of ACSI when he acted as an intermediary for the release of three U. S. servicemen who were captured in South Vietnam. Sergeant [redacted] was orally furnished background information on Hayden. Subsequently, additional information regarding him was furnished to Lieutenant Colonel [redacted] by Liaison Representative Special Agent [redacted].

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BACKGROUND ON HAYDEN:

Hayden's name is included on the Security Index. He is a white male, born 12/11/39 at Detroit, Michigan. He received a A.B. degree from the University of Michigan in 1961. He was one of the founders of the Students for a Democratic Society and was a former national president of this organization which is self-described as "an association of young people on the left which seeks to put forth a radical democratic program." He has been since 1964 a leader of the "Newark Community Union Project," a community action program sponsored by the Students for a Democratic Society in Newark, New Jersey. He has been active in civil rights movements both in Mississippi and Newark. He worked with the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee and has been involved in several demonstrations. In 1965, he went through Czechoslovakia to Moscow, Peking and entered North Vietnam by way of Cambodia. In a press conference on his return, he pointed out that he had a 90-minute talk with Premier Pham Van Dong of North Vietnam. In September, 1967, he published a book on the Newark riots of July, 1967. This book placed much of the blame on public NOV 20 1967

officials and police. In September and October, 1967, he was one of 41 Americans who went to Czechoslovakia for a conference with the North Vietnamese and Viet Cong representatives.

RELEASED PRISONERS:

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Bufiles contain no information identifiable with the released prisoners of war. ACSI has furnished identifying information concerning these individuals. They are [redacted] born [redacted] of white race, and resides at [redacted]. He has Army serial number [redacted] and was captured 10/29/63.

[redacted], born [redacted] and of the Negro race who resides at [redacted]. He has Army serial number [redacted] and was captured 7/5/66.

According to ACSI representatives, these individuals will be hospitalized and debriefed by the Army. They are due to arrive in New York City from Beirut, Lebanon, at 6:30 p.m. 11/13/67.
