MR. KORESH: -- shooting to the top part of the tree hoping that when the rounds hit the tree it would make some kind of noise that George would say hey, you know, they're shooting at me.

HENRY: Um-hum.

MR. KORESH: You see, and then he'd stay behind the tree -- let Stan and Floyd get up, which that's what I started doing. Well, finally what happened was he, he, he would, he would glance behind the tree and he would put his Uzi out with his right hand shoot it like a pistol.

HENRY: Uh-huh.

MR. KORESH: And he was still zapping off these rounds and stuff. So I started, I started aiming a little bit lower still trying to keep above his head, you know, so that he could realize, you know, just stay behind the tree. Anyway, somehow some way he put his hand — he was flashing his hand — he put his hand around the tree and all of a sudden he pulled it back and he stopped firing. Well, I stopped firing, everybody else stopped firing. So here we are in a position nobody's firing.

HENRY: (Laughter)

MR. KORESH: Okay? And we hear these sirens off in the distance. And here I am thinking, oh,

praise the Lord, here comes (indiscernible), you know? 2 HENRY: Um-hum. 3 MR. KORESH: Here comes the, here comes the sirens and all that and here comes the Sheriff's Department and I heard Dave say off in the distance, 5 you know, "Here comes the Sheriff's Department, you 6 know, good, I'm glad for that." And George just kept 7 his good little self behind that tree and didn't do 8 nothing anymore. 9 10 HENRY: Um-hum. MR. KORESH: So, finally the sheriffs came in 11 with several cars -- seven or eight cars came in the, 12 the, the front gate and I'm sitting over there. And 13 when they get towards the bend of the drive I, I stand 14 back away from the cars still kind of ducking and I 15 16 have my gun, a Ruger --17 HENRY: Um-hum. MR. KORESH: -- you know, in my right hand on 18 the strap. I have one of those real nice deer straps. 19 20 HENRY: Um-hum. MR. KORESH: And I have it in my right hand 21 on the strap. And I'm kind of like walking crouched 22 down. My hand is not on the stock of the gun. 23 is upside down being held by the strap. And the Sheriff's Department guys got out and everything and I'm trying to walk back towards the, the houses that we

just come from --1 2 HENRY: Um-hum. 3 MR. KORESH: -- so I can get on around to 4 those guys. 5 HENRY: Um-hum. 6 MR. KORESH: And so the next thing, this guy he's standing there and he's hollering at me and I, I 7 look up and boy, he's zeroed down on me, you know, and 8 he's got a Ruger too but he's got a government model --9 10 HENRY: Uh-huh. 11 MR. KORESH: -- you know? And he goes, "Put your gun down. " And I'm going, "Oh, yeah, okay." So 12 I, I put it down. And he says, "Now, move on over 13 here. " You know, and I says, "No problem, you know, 14 don't shoot, you know." So we moved all over and all 15 the guys too likewise, you know, moved over. And we 16 all came around, gathered around and they're like, you 17 know, I saw Sheriff Thorn over there. I've always 18 liked Mr. Thorn. And, you know, I, I said hello to him 19 and stuff. He, he looked at me kind of like disgusted, 20 21 kind of confused. 22 HENRY: Um-hum. 23

MR. KORESH: But he's known Dave for a long time and, you know, you know, Dave says, "Hello, Bill," his name is Bill Thorn. And he goes --

HENRY: Uh-huh.

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1 MR. KORESH: -- and he goes, "Dave, I don't 2 understand. " 3 HENRY: Um-hum. 4 MR. KORESH: He goes, "Well, you know, we'll explain it. " He goes, "We want to know." So what 5 happened was we got all together and everything and this one guy he's, he's, he's real nice, everyone's real nice. He says, "Now, gentlemen," he 8 says, "Is this everybody now?" He says, "We need to talk about this, you know. And is everyone here now, 10 you know, look around, is -- " you know, and we're 11 looking around and yeah, everyone's there that was 12 There was another guy but, but we had sent him 13 back. You know what we had sent him back for don't 14 you? To go back and to, and to inform the police that 15 16 we were still out there. 17 HENRY: Okay. 18 MR. KORESH: That we hadn't yet gotten the pictures, we haven't yet found the, the corpse. 19 20 HENRY: Um-hum. 21 MR. KORESH: And he was the guy that was still way over in the back part of Perry's field that 22 23 Harwell's helicopter, you know, saw. 24 HENRY: Okay.

MR. KORESH: But, you know, so what happened

was is we're all standing around there. None of us are

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armed. We're all standing there and, you know, talking and stuff. And some of the guys have their arms fold, you know, and they went over to George and, and they were bringing George up.

HENRY: Uh-huh.

MR. KORESH: And, you know, George is walking up towards us and it looks like he had some blood on his hand.

HENRY: Blood?

MR. KORESH: Yeah, blood on his hand. And so then all of a sudden I see these, these officers grab him and they kind of like wrestle with him and, and they pull something out of his hand. Well, you know what he had in his hand? A little .25 or a little .22 or something.

HENRY: Uh-huh.

MR. KORESH: A little pocket gun or something. Because, you know, he was -- they was going to come over by us and he was going to, I guess, finish whatever. But anyway, I -- you know, I guess to some degree he had all the right in his mind to retaliate.

HENRY: Um-hum.

MR. KORESH: You know, he didn't have a mind at that time to think well, I've been shot a thousand times but I ain't been hit yet.

HENRY: Uh-huh.

1 MR. KORESH: But anyway, the point of the story was is that once we all got together and everything, then this guy, you know, he says, "Now, now, come on, boys, is this all of you now? Are you all around? Is -- okay, now look around. Is there anymore of you anywhere, you know?" "No, we're, we're all here. " And then -- all, all hell broke loose, Henry, all hell broke loose.

HENRY: What happened?

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MR. KORESH: Oh, the expression of these gentlemen, the kindness, the courtesy, the good ole boy attitude changed. And they told us to get on the blank, blank ground, spread our legs. And this was gravel, this was in the summertime. And we have red ants out here that when they bite you, oh, you get a little white blister on you and it itches, it hurts.

HENRY: Um-hum.

MR. KORESH: They nailed us to the -- I mean, they, they -- and then more cars came in. And, you know, a guy got out. Oh well, he got out just like a, a sergeant general out of the military. He says, he says, "What in the hell is going on here?" I mean. he's screaming. He goes, "This is, this America.

25 HENRY: (Laughter)

MR. KORESH: "Things like this don't happen

in America." You know? 1 2 HENRY: Um-hum. MR. KORESH: And oh boy, I mean, there was 3 this guy there and he had -- I mean, you know, we, we brought ear plugs. 5 6 HENRY: Um-hum. 7 MR. KORESH: You know, we brought ear plugs because if we had to make any, any distractions the 8 night before, you know, we wanted to make sure we 9 10 didn't hurt our hearing. 11 HENRY: Um-hum. MR. KORESH: So some of these guys had their 12 ear plugs in. And this guy, this guy, this guy walks 13 over and he sees this one guy on the ground. And he 14 reaches down and he pulls this ear plug out of his ear 15 and he puts his head down to his ear and says, "Did you 16 17 hear me?!" 18 **HENRY:** (Laughter) MR. KORESH: I mean, you know, he tells, he 19 tells, he -- we're, we're on the ground. You know, 20 we're like what's going on? And some of us have our 21 22 hands in front of us --23 HENRY: Um-hum. MR. KORESH: -- on the ground --24 25 HENRY: Um-hum. MR. KORESH: -- and they're coming and

kicking our arms so that our arms will go down beside 2 us --3 HENRY: Um-hum. 4 MR. KORESH: -- instead of, you know, in 5 front of us. 6 HENRY: Um-hum. 7 MR. KORESH: And I mean like, you know, would you please leave your -- it's like kicking the arms and 8 the wrist. You know, like whoa, you know? 9 10 HENRY: Um-hum. 11 MR. KORESH: Oh boy, was that exciting. this one guy's walking around, you know. And, and like 12 he's got his, he's got is hand on his pistol. 13 he goes, he goes, "Just go ahead and move one inch, 14 15 I'll blow your blank, blank heads off." 16 **HENRY:** (Laughter) 17 (Laughter) We thought we was MR. KORESH: going to have hamburgers and french fries with these 18 19 guys in the beginning. 20 **HENRY:** (Laughter) MR. KORESH: But I'm telling you that -- and 21 anyway, so, so, you know, Thorn didn't do that, you know? But, but a lot of these guys -- like I'm -- they 23 weren't too informed were they? Okay. 24 So what happened was -- is that we all got arrested, we all got 25 chained up, put in the cop -- put in the police cars.

I don't like calling them cops, but --2 HENRY: Uh-huh. 3 MR. KORESH: -- put them in the Sheriff's 4 Department cars. 5 HENRY: Um-hum. MR. KORESH: And one of my pictures they keep 6 showing there on the screen, you know. They take us 7 all -- now, we're driving down to the, to the Waco 8 9 County there. 10 HENRY: Uh-huh. 11 MR. KORESH: And this young guy, he's, he's really kind of nice, you know, and I, I said to the 12 guy, I said, "You know, you know, these handcuffs are 13 kind of tight." He says, he goes, "Well, I'm sorry," 14 he says, "You know, it's procedure." He says, You know 15 -- he says, Besides, he says, you know, we knew you 16 guys were out here. He says, "We've been talking about 17 it all day." He says, "You guys will be out before 18 dark, just don't worry about it, you know?" 19 20 HENRY: Um-hum. 21 MR. KORESH: And I'm thinking, well, maybe that was all just procedure or something just because 22 of George. But I mean, kicking of the arms and stuff 23 24 like that, you know. 25 HENRY: Um-hum.

MR. KORESH: It was, it was uncomfortable.

1 HENRY: Sure, sure. 2 MR. KORESH: But the thing of it was is that, 3 you know, it was just -- I mean, this guy was riding in the front driving. I mean, it was not two, it was just only one guy taking two guys in --5 HENRY: 'Um-hum. 6 7 MR. KORESH: -- you know? And he was just as pleasant as could be. Younger guy. 8 9 HENRY: Uh-huh. 10 MR. KORESH: And so we, we drove downtown and they opened up that big thing and, and we drove in. 11 And the first thing -- we're, we're standing there and 12 they lined us all up, you know. And they, they made us 14 take these numbers or something and hold them in front 15 of us. 16 HENRY: Okay, yeah. 17 MR. KORESH: And --18 HENRY: Took the picture. MR. KORESH: Yeah, taking pictures. 19 there is -- all of a sudden there's Dickerson --20 Sheriff Dickerson standing over there. 21 22 HENRY: Um-hum. 23 MR. KORESH: And I'm like, oh, thanks, you know. And I go, "Mr. Dickerson," and the guy says, 24 25 "Shut up."

HENRY:

(Laughter)

MR. KORESH: I go, Well, there's Mr. -- And 1 he goes, he goes, I told you to be quiet. Uou know. 2 And they took us in and they, and they took us in the 3 room and (indiscernible) in the room and had to take all our clothes off and everything and, and you know, 5 put on these white britches and everything and these 7 sandals. 8 HENRY: Um-hum. 9 MR. KORESH: And no, I'm sorry, I'm sorry, they didn't do that yet. They, they put us in this one 10 11 tank --12 **HENRY:** Um-hum. MR. KORESH: -- that had just a concrete 13 14 floor in it. 15 HENRY: Yeah. MR. KORESH: And we stayed there for most the 16 night. And then they came and took us and, and gave us 17 these, you know, clothes and, and these mats and stuff 18 and took us down to these jail cells. 19 20 HENRY: Um-hum. MR. KORESH: Now, that's the first time I 21 have ever been in a jail cell. Now, now what happened was this. You can't say nothing yet. I mean, you, you 23 can't find any sympathy yet. And no, no, before that 24

happened was they took us down and fingerprinted us.

HENRY: Sure.

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1 MR. KORESH: Now, I'm a guitar player. 2 **HENRY:** Um-hum. 3 MR. KORESH: And, you know, a lot of people, you know, they say that my ability in music is, is 4 5 quite above the norm. 6 HENRY: Um-hum. 7 MR. KORESH: And we've written a lot of beautiful songs and stuff about the message and stuff. 8 But, you know, like I say it's just another prophecy 9 that gets kind of distorted because of the way the 10 world's attitude is. But nevertheless, this guy grabs 11 my fingers and he's like he is breaking my fingers, my 12 -- you know, grabs my finger, sticks in this ink, 13 smash, you know, I'm "Ah." Grabs it and puts it on a 14 15 piece of paper and smash. And I go, I go, "Sir, excuse me, please." He goes, "What?" And I go, "Could you be 16 just a little more gentle?" He looks at me kind of 17 18 funny like, huh? You know, like aren't you a tough 19 guy? 20 HENRY: Um-hum. 21 MR. KORESH: But anyway, we went to this Now, we go into the cell and like, you know, our 22 cell. hearts are thumping, you know? 23 24 HENRY: Um-hum. 25 MR. KORESH: This is a new era.

HENRY:

Um-hum.

1 MR. KORESH: This is a new experience for me, you know? No matter how many times you may or may not 2 live, it's always new and exciting. 3 4 HENRY: Sure. 5 MR. KORESH: So we go into these big iron 6 And they sent some of those younger guys into one. And we were in jail with these guys that were all 7 wearing yellow ribbons. Now, you know what a yellow ribbon is, don't you? 9 10 HENRY: Not in Waco, no. 11 MR. KORESH: It's a felony. 12 **HENRY:** Okay. MR. KORESH: And a felony is like murder --13 14 HENRY: Um-hum. 15 MR. KORESH: -- you know? Or attempted murder or something to do with something bad, bad --16 17 HENRY: Um-hum. 18 MR. KORESH: -- okay? So there's guys in there, boy, and I'm talking about they, they are like 19 20 tough looking guys. 21 HENRY: Um-hum. MR. KORESH: But they're all in there and we 22 They're like all like, you know, side-by-side 23 come in. down like this hallway, this run. And they're going, Yeah, yeah, come on -- some black guys, Come on down 25 here, we all, we all done cleared out a room just for

you guys, you know? 1 2 HENRY: Um-hum. 3 MR. KORESH: And they treated us with such respect and they treated us with such decency. And 4 they were kind of like standing back from us, you know? 5 6 HENRY: Um-hum. MR. KORESH: Well, we didn't know -- we 7 thought, well, you know, we was going to get in there 8 and get a lot of trouble, right? But these guys were 9 just so nice. What had happened was, on the news they 10 had played on the news that eight PLO terrorists had 11 assaulted Mount Carmel Center. 12 13 HENRY: Oh, okay. MR. KORESH: Now, that was on -- and, and 14 these guys were watching this and they thought we were 15 16 real professional killers --17 HENRY: Um-hum. 18 MR. KORESH: -- terrorists. 19 HENRY: Sure. 20 MR. KORESH: And they treated us with the best of rest. If that had not been played you know 21 what would have happened to us? But anyway, what 22 happened was is that when we did get in there they 23 found out, you know, a couple of three days or so or in 24 the time that most of the guys stayed in there, that we 25

weren't nothing but sincere individuals that were not

going to stand by and let somebody dig up grandma. 2 HENRY: Um-hum. 3 MR. KORESH: And we started giving Bible studies and those preachers down there started getting angry because when, when they'd come in on Sunday 5 6 morning to, to make their little statements to the 7 preachers -- to the, to the prisoners --8 HENRY: Um-hum. 9 MR. KORESH: -- they were starting to meet with questions from the Bible that they couldn't --10 11 HENRY: Answer. 12 MR. KORESH: -- answer. 13 HENRY: Yeah. 14 MR. KORESH: And so, you know, over in the older cell there was a guy named Red. He was in there. 15 He, he had murdered two people. And, you know, 16 Floyd -- anyway, when we, when we left that facility, 17 and I also brought this up to the attention of some 18 19 people here --20 HENRY: Um-hum. 21 MR. KORESH: -- you know, that, you know, that even if we end up going to prison that remember 22 God could even work in the prisons too --23 24 HENRY: Exactly. MR. KORESH: -- just like he did in Waco. 25 HENRY: Exactly.

1 MR. KORESH: I told them, I said, Well, 2 look -- I said, When, when we left that prison some of 3 the Sheriffs Department group there stated very clearly that they had never had such an orderly conduct in 5 those jail cells than what they had when we were there. 6 HENRY: That's right. And that's probably 7 what's going to happen, you know, when, when you walk out of there. That's probably what's going to 8 9 happen. MR. KORESH: Well, there is a truth that, 10 that sets men free even though they're, they're in 11 prisons or wherever they find themselves in. 12 13 HENRY: That's right. 14 MR. KORESH: And Jeremiah was put into prison, Paul, I mean, you know, things appear to be one 15 16 way. 17 HENRY: That's right. 18 MR. KORESH: You know, David of old was a warrior but like I say, you know, he ended up being 19 exiled from his own country. These are realities of 20 life that while we're living we need to always 21 experience life as it presents itself --22 23 HENRY: Exactly. 24 MR. KORESH: -- and know where we're coming 25 from.

That's right.

HENRY:

MR. KORESH: Now myself in these experiences, 1 I have had a direction, but in order to be a proper 2 3 judge I also have to have an experience. 4 HENRY: Um-hum. MR. KORESH: So that I can look at a man one 5 day and say, well, I know where he's coming from 6 because in my experience I have experienced thus and 7 8 thus. 9 HENRY: Exactly. 10 MR. KORESH: So, somebody can have all the right intention in the world and it turn out to become 11 wrong and misjudged. 12 13 HENRY: Um-hum. MR. KORESH: That's why the judgments of God 14 are far more sophisticated than judgments of men. 15 16 HENRY: Um-hum. 17 MR. KORESH: But anyway, so you see, when it all came down to it when everything was said and done, 18 when they put a \$50,000 bond on each one of us -- can 19 20 you imagine that? 21 HENRY: Yeah. Well --MR. KORESH: A person, \$50,000 bond a -- did 22 you know there were guys in there that was their second 23 time murder and do you know that their bond was 24 25 \$12,000?

HENRY: Phew. That's --

MR. KORESH: Can you imagine that, Henry? 1 2 HENRY: -- that's amazing. That's really 3 amazing. MR. KORESH: I had to get \$5,000 apiece. 5 **HENRY:** Sure. 6 MR. KORESH: And the only reason why that we 7 was -- even could find a bondman is because after awhile people began to realize that we weren't what 8 9 people were saying we were. 10 HENRY: Sure, but it took time. 11 MR. KORESH: Huh? 12 HENRY: But it took time. 13 I'm sorry, I didn't understand. MR. KORESH: 14 But it probably took some time. HENRY: MR. KORESH: Oh, yeah. Well see, I had to 15 pay the \$5,000, Paul paid the \$5,000, another guy paid the \$5,000. Well actually, you know, we paid it. And, 17 you know, it's like, phew, \$15,000 already out the 18 19 pocket --20 HENRY: Um-hum. 21 MR. KORESH: -- and nothing's gotten done except we're outside, you know, trying to work on 22 23 getting the other guys out. 24 HENRY: Um-hum. MR. KORESH: And we're trying to -- now see, 25 I, I kept going down there to the, to the D.A.'s

office --1 2 HENRY: Um-hum. 3 MR. KORESH: -- because I wanted to know what 4 was going on. 5 HENRY: Um-hum. 6 MR. KORESH: They wouldn't let me talk with Thorn or any of the Sheriff's Department. You know, I 7 wanted to know what was happening. 8 9 HENRY: Um-hum. 10 MR. KORESH: You know, and, and come to find out, do you know -- when that took place do you know 11 12 where the casket was? 13 HENRY: Where? 14 MR. KORESH: Right beside that tree where George had ran to in that (indiscernible) shed. 15 16 (Laughter) That's amazing, huh? HENRY: 17 MR. KORESH: You see? So, so they had moved 18 it. 19 HENRY: Um-hum. MR. KORESH: Okay. So what happened was is 20 that all of the -- they, they charged us for attempted 21 murder and conspiracy to murder. And anyway, Gary 22 Coker wanted to take the case. He's a fine man here in 23 24 Waco --25 HENRY: Um-hum. MR. KORESH: -- Mr. Coker. And he, he was

surprised. He thought it was going to be just a real 2 easy case. 3 HENRY: Um-hum. 4 MR. KORESH: So he -- I think he did it for -- I don't know, but it came out -- per person it 5 came out a very reasonable attorney's fee. 6 7 HENRY: Okay. MR. KORESH: You know, very reasonable. 8 he took the case and he came in and he wanted to talk 9 with me. And he didn't talk with many of the guys 10 because he figured that in all analogies he already 11 12 knew his plan of, of, of defense. 13 HENRY: Strategy? Um-hum. MR. KORESH: Yeah. So, what happened was is 14 that we went to court and, and, you know, our case took 15 two weeks? And even the, the D.A. would not -- okay, 16 for instance, this is some of the things that happened. 17 The judge was a visiting judge because during the same 18 time there was another trial that Vick Fasel was 19 20 doing --21 HENRY: Um-hum. 22 MR. KORESH: -- about a man that was accused of burning two of his children in a, a, a back garage. 23 24 **HENRY:** Um-hum. 25 MR. KORESH: Okay. So anyway, what happened was is that the District Attorney would, would, would

hire these professional analysts to analyze certain 2 Like this one guy was a professional in 3 regards to paramilitary weaponry and tactics. HENRY: Um-hum. 5 MR. KORESH: So object number one, they 6 presented to the jury some bailing wire. And what happened was is that Shaba stands in front of the jury 7 and says, now -- he's talking to this guy and says, 8 Now, now, possibly -- this was taken from the prisoners 9 here. Now, what was this used for do you think? What 10 was this intended for and its intended use?" And the 11 guy goes on to explain that in certain paramilitary 12 groups it's known that, you know, such a wire is used 13 for strangling, for, you know, suppressing oxygen to 14 the person by wrapping around it's neck. And he goes, 15 16 Can you kind of illustrate how this might be done? So the guy gets up from the thing, walks down in front of 17 the jury, grabs this wire and puts it around Shaba's 18 neck and -- you know, this is, this is extreme, right? 19 20 HENRY: Right. 21 MR. KORESH: And so the jury's like going (indiscernible) and their eyes are getting real big, 22 23 right? 24 HENRY: Uh-huh. MR. KORESH: And so anyway, they also, they 25

also had some -- a red piece of shirt --

1 HENRY: Um-hum. 2 MR. KORESH: -- several pieces of, of red 3 checkered shirt there. 4 HENRY: Um-hum. 5 MR. KORESH: And Shaba is saying, Now, what might this possibly be used for? And he says, Well, 6 usually through different means whether simple or 7 complex, such things or items can be used as, as 8 signaling devices, things to signal a, a movement or a, a preconceived intention, you know." And so the jury is like well, wow, you know, all these neat 11 paraphernalias here. So anyway, so I was there talking 12 13 to my attorney --14 HENRY: Um-hum. 15 MR. KORESH: -- and saying, Well, what is 16 going on here? 17 HENRY: Um-hum. 18 MR. KORESH: And so I was telling him what these things were used for. So anyway, Shaba makes his 19 points and then it's time for the next lawyer --20 witness -- you know, witness -- examine the witness. 21 22 HENRY: Um-hum, um-hum. MR. KORESH: And so what happened at that 23 time is that Paul Fatta is there on the, on the stand 24 and, and Shaba is asking him. He says, Well, Mr. 25 Fatta, is it not true that, that you were using these

things for signaling devices? Isn't -- the way you communicated to everybody in regards to the way you'd 2 move on the property and, you know, you would flank Mr. 3 Roden and, and kill him? And he goes, No, sir, that is not true. He goes, Well, just what is the 5 truth about this then? And Paul goes, Well, do you 6 really want to know? And the jury kind of like -- I 7 mean, the judge kind of like, you know, looked at him and says (indiscernible) you know (indiscernible) made 9 a statement to him and Shaba goes, Oh yes, I would like 10 to know. And he goes -- Paul goes, Toilet paper. 11 12 HENRY: (Laughter) 13 MR. KORESH: And Shaba looks at him kind of funny. He goes, Would you, would you explain that? 14 And Paul says, We were down at the barn, we'd been out 15 all night. Some of the guys needed to relieve 16 17 themselves --18 **HENRY:** (Laughter) 19 MR. KORESH: -- and all we found down there was an old shirt. So we tore the shirt up and we gave 20 it to the different guys in case they had to relieve 21 22 themselves for toilet paper. 23 HENRY: Uh-huh. 24 MR. KORESH: And he goes, Toilet paper. he's got the thing and he's holding it up in front of 25

Paul, right?

1 HENRY: Um-hum. 2 MR. KORESH: And he just -- like a comedy 3 show, he just like -- he goes, Toilet paper. And he just drops it like yech. 5 HENRY: Yeah. MR. KORESH: I mean, but you know, this is, 6 7 this is life and death stuff here. So then what happens was is now, he -- so he, he questions about 8 the, the, the wire there, what was it used for? 9 Why would this stuff be found? And so then what 10 happened was is Mr. Gary Coker says, you know, he, 11 12 he -- he intervened. 13 HENRY: Um-hum. 14 MR. KORESH: And they asked Stan Silva which 15 is a real, real short guy --16 HENRY: Um-hum. 17 MR. KORESH: -- to stand up. 18 HENRY: Um-hum. MR. KORESH: And he, and he said, Mr. 19 Silva -- because they had all of our hunting -- they 20 call them army fatigues but they're not. They're K-21 Mart, you know, some of them were just green. They're 22 for like weather. They're, they're just jump suits is 23 24 what they are. 25 Uh-huh. **HENRY:**

MR. KORESH: Some of were camouflage, some of

them were just straight green.

HENRY: Um-hum.

MR. KORESH: And he goes, Mr. Silva, can you identify from this collection of garments here which garment you were wearing on the night of this — or the day of this thing that took place? And, yeah, because, you know, he, he saw and he, he had the, the thing on the back of it, you know. Plus there was a tear he got from — the barbed wire. He says, Well, would you please put this on? So Stan — and this, this jump suit was borrowed. Stan put it on and he looks at the jury and he says, Now, is there something interesting or unique about the sizing of this garment? The thing was like four or five inches longer in the legs than what this guy needed.

HENRY: Um-hum.

MR. KORESH: He says, Well, what could you possibly use this barbed wire here for -- I mean, this, this wire here for? And he goes, Well -- he says, for the reasons I used it. And he, and he says, Can you, can you show me? And the same piece of wire which had, which had been wrapped around and around, Stan pulled up the bottom of the pants like he had them before, tucked them over and wrapped the wire around and around them to make them short so they wouldn't fall down below his shoes.

1 HENRY: Oh, okay. 2 MR. KORESH: You see, now all of this took place. And, and the judge started getting furious 3 because Shaba never would -- everything that they questioned us we answered. 5 6 HENRY: Um-hum. 7 MR. KORESH: And it was just, it was just so 8 You know, oh, Dickerson, he looked like a obvious. ghost. For being a black lieutenant --9 10 HENRY: Um-hum. MR. KORESH: -- when he came to the, to the, 11 12 to the witness stand --13 HENRY: Um-hum. MR. KORESH: -- you could tell he was, he was 14 sick, you know, because he knew what our conversation 15 was, he knew what was happening. Anyway, we finally 16 did get an injunction against George and we finally did 17 move on to the property. 18 19 HENRY: Um-hum. 20 MR. KORESH: Now, when we got on this property all the pornography that was on here -- oh, 21 that wasn't the big thing. The big thing was is where 22 Donny Joe Harvey, which he fled when, when all the 23 sheriffs and all them came in. 25 HENRY: Um-hum.

MR. KORESH: Donny Joe Harvey, he had like

1	Coke machines out here
2	HENRY: Um-hum.
3	MR. KORESH: that had been stolen from
4	Waco.
5	HENRY: Um-hum.
6	MR. KORESH: Well, I didn't know then, but
7	Coke machines, some part of them are used for making a
8	certain kind of drug.
9	HENRY: Drug?
10	MR. KORESH: Right.
11	HENRY: Uh-huh.
12	MR. KORESH: Something to do with the
13	condenser or anyway but anyway, he also had
14	they had just lots and lots of needles, syringes. See,
15	we went though the whole place, had to clean it up.
16	HENRY: What not?
17	MR. KORESH: Huh?
18	HENRY: I didn't hear that part.
19	MR. KORESH: We had to go through the whole
20	place and clean it up when we
21	HENRY: Okay.
22	MR. KORESH: first got back on the
23	property.
24	HENRY: Um-hum.
25	MR. KORESH: Okay, because see, some of us
	were already released because we paid the, we paid

the --1 HENRY: Posted the bond? 2 3 MR. KORESH: Posted the bond, right. 4 HENRY: Uh-huh. 5 MR. KORESH: Okay. I turned in at least a, a catalog of at least 30 to 40 sheets of notebook paper 6 7 typed and, typed and handwritten that had nothing but the subject matter of how to make illegal drugs. And the main one was the, the process and 10 manufacturing of methamphetamine. 11 HENRY: Okay. 12 MR. KORESH: And I turned it in to the 13 Sheriff's Department. 14 HENRY: Um-hum. 15 MR. KORESH: And, you know, none of that 16 stuff came up? 17 HENRY: You're kidding? MR. KORESH: It -- no, I'm not kidding. Not 18 any of that stuff came up in our trial. Well, 20 afterwards, after the case, after they went two weeks which they were saying was about a week and a half too 21 22 long --23 HENRY: Um-hum. 24 MR. KORESH: -- for our case --25 HENRY: Sure. MR. KORESH: -- we got out and people from

all over Waco came up to me and they were telling me that the reason why they was trying to hook us was 2 3 because the District Attorney's office and certain people in the bureaucracy downtown, now this is just 5 hearsay --6 HENRY: Um-hum. 7 MR. KORESH: -- except for the investigations of, you know, some of Vick Fasel's secretaries and 8 stuff like that that got busted? 9 10 HENRY: Um-hum. MR. KORESH: You remember all that I'm sure. 11 12 HENRY: Um-hum. 13 MR. KORESH: He's always been under (indiscernible) investigation -- remember the cocaine 14 15 deal --16 HENRY: Oh, okay. MR. KORESH: -- where he was caught with coke 17 18 and all that? 19 HENRY: Um-hum. MR. KORESH: You know, he gets paybacks and 20 stuff from the drug manufacturers out through here for 21 22 not hassling them. 23 HENRY: Oh, okay. 24 MR. KORESH: So, you know, that was one of the things that we messed up when we came out and did 25 all that --

1	HENRY: Okay.
2	MR. KORESH: was that we, we messed up
3	HENRY: I see what you're saying.
4	MR. KORESH: another, another place for
5	them to make these drugs.
6	HENRY: Sure. I see what you're saying.
7	MR. KORESH: You know, and they were saying
8	the place is perfect out here because
9	HENRY: Sure.
10	MR. KORESH: you know, you can see all
11	around and all that and
12	HENRY: Um-hum.
13	MR. KORESH: and the houses and
14	everything.
15	HENRY: And it's far enough away I guess.
16	MR. KORESH: Yeah.
17	HENRY: Yeah, that makes sense.
18	MR. KORESH: So, you know
19	HENRY: Um-hum.
20	MR. KORESH: that, that was the whole
21	thing.
22	HENRY: Um-hum.
23	MR. KORESH: So, you know, we expected in the
24	minimal that all of that actually we actually hoped
25	to have been heroes.
	HENRY: Um-hum.

1	MR. KORESH: I mean, you know
2	HENRY: Well, you know, as, as bad as the
3	MR. KORESH: But we were bad guys though.
4	HENRY: Yeah, well, bad as the judicial
5	system is, it's, it's the best that there is in the
6	world and thank
7	MR. KORESH: Not, not the judicial system
8	HENRY: and thank God that, you know
9	MR. KORESH: the people misusing the
10	system
11	HENRY: Well, that's true
12	MR. KORESH: in some degree.
13	HENRY: that's true, that's true. But,
14	you know, justice was, was served in this case. Okay.
15	Let me ask you this: what time are you going to give me
16	Kevin?
17	MR. KORESH: Well, I think, I think what
18	time is it now?
19	HENRY: I think it's like 1:25.

They, they left their firearms here. 6 7 HENRY: Firearms? 8 MR. KORESH: Yeah, their, their pistols. 9 HENRY: What are you talking about? MR. KORESH: Well, I'm saying some of the, 10 some of the agents Sunday when they took them away --11 12 HENRY: Uh-huh. 13 MR. KORESH: -- they left their firearms 14 here --15 HENRY: Okay. 16 MR. KORESH: And then I was going to send the 20 lowers with like another kid. 21 HENRY: No, no, no, don't do that. 22 23 MR. KORESH: All right. HENRY: Don't do that because --24 25 MR. KORESH: No problem. HENRY: -- you know, people, you know,

they'll, they'll say see, his intention was this, his 2 intention -- just leave them there. 3 MR. KORESH: All right. HENRY: Just leave them there and then when 4 we clear the place we'll clear it. 5 6 MR. KORESH: No problem. 7 HENRY: Okay. HENRY: I mean, some of the, some of the,
some of the stuff that -- but everybody -- a lot of the
arrests that I've been involved in have been earlymorning arrests. You know, by the time you process the

individual and what-not he's hungry, he has anything to

10 -- you know, had anything to eat. They're still human

beings, they still need to eat, they still need to be

12 taken care of. So --

MR. KORESH: Right.

HENRY: So, you know, I try to treat everybody -- and I feel that this is something not that comes from me, you know, but that it comes from God, so that people can be treated in a -- the right way. So that because, you know, as he said, whatever you do the least of my brothers you do unto me. So --

MR. KORESH: That's what he says isn't it?

HENRY: Exactly. So, I feel that it's important to treat people -- you know, or even like if you see somebody that drinks or whatever and he hasn't had anything to eat, it's difficult for me in any case to say no to him if he comes and asks me for money. I, I, I have a -- not that I have difficulty: I don't like

to say no to anybody. 1 2 MR. KORESH: Well, that's good 3 (indiscernible). 4 HENRY: If they're in need, if, if they're in need, you know. So, I think that that's what we need 5 6 to do. 7 MR. KORESH: Well, like I say, give me a call in the morning then we'll get this underway. And I'll 8 just, like I say, put these things out of the way, all 9 10 right? 11 HENRY: Well, you know, one of the things that, that we want to do is we want to follow his path. 12 We want, we want to do the right thing. 13 MR. KORESH: You mean the path of the just in 14 15 Isaiah 26 --16 HENRY: Right. 17 MR. KORESH: -- which is of rightness --18 HENRY: Um-hum. 19 MR. KORESH: -- where the most high ways -and the path -- in the way of God's judgments? 20 21 HENRY: Yes. MR. KORESH: That's those seven seals. 22 23 HENRY: Um-hum. See, and that word needs to get out. And I think that you have been primed and you 24 are ready to come out and let everybody know or let 25 everybody hear the word that you need to convey to

everybody just like you convey to everybody there and 1 just like we've talked about. This is not the -- this 2 is in a simple fashion, this is in simple terms so that 3 everybody can understand. MR. KORESH: Yeah. It is simple for those 5 6 that have ears to hear. 7 HENRY: Yes. MR. KORESH: We're learning something tonight 8 aren't we? 9 10 HENRY: Yes, we certainly are. MR. KORESH: And we don't want God's chariots 11 to come and burn us do we? 12 13 HENRY: I'm sorry? MR. KORESH: We don't want God's chariots to 14 15 come and burn us do we? 16 HENRY: That's right. You know --MR. KORESH: It's kind of like, you know, 17 you'd, you'd think that -- you know, it's neat how that 18 these, these tanks can zero right in on a target --19 20 HENRY: Um-hum. MR. KORESH: -- with a 25 millimeter. **HENRY:** Um-hum.

1 MR. KORESH: That's neat. 2 HENRY: Well, you know, God can inspire me 3 and he can inspire you and he can inspire both of us and in talking to each other I think we come to, to not just understand one another, but understand other 5 things that are important and significant and that we 6 7 need to understand. I don't -- you know, I 8 don't -- you've alluded to at, at certain times that, you know, that we're enemies and things of that type. 9 MR. KORESH: Well, it's just a natural course 10 in regards to regards to the spirit and flesh. 11 12 HENRY: Um-hum. 13 MR. KORESH: And those that are born of the spirit are those who are both of the truth of God. 14 15 HENRY: Um-hum. 16 MR. KORESH: Now, you cannot know in the flesh where I come from, you cannot know me in the 17 18 flesh. 19 **HENRY:** Um-hum. MR. KORESH: You can't look into my head and 20 know where I'm coming from, so therefore you're of the 21 22 world, you're carnal. 23 HENRY: Um-hum. MR. KORESH: But if you will open your eyes 24 and open your ears and receive of the spirit of words, 25 then you'll see by words, another form of communication

1 2 **HENRY:** Um-hum. 3 MR. KORESH: -- and by sight looking in scripture --5 HENRY: Um-hum. 6 MR. KORESH: -- you'll see that where I come 7 from. I come from an understanding --8 HENRY: Um-hum. 9 MR. KORESH: -- that's higher than what you ever perceived. 10 11 HENRY: Right. 12 MR. 	before that just to make sure that we get everything

squared away. MR. KORESH: Yeah well, you know, we, we got the procedure already down. HENRY: Okay. Okay. MR. And you, you are considered 13 14 a leader, I think. 15

JIM: Do you know what I mean? I know that David communicates and, and, has a lot inside, you know, he's just a real, I don't know how you would



describe, I would say he's a holy man or a pious man and he's got a gift or something. But what I'm just saying is, it may be God's way of, so you know, God sometimes his messages may not be as, just like the Bible, you kind of, kind of, you know, catches and describes things a little different, if you know what I mean.

RACHEL: Uh-huh.

JIM: When I was a kid I remember at a sermon where they talked about the Red Sea, you know.

RACHEL: Yeah.

JIM: And the, and the preacher said that it wasn't exactly as the people walking out of Egypt over the ocean, but what it was, was the Israelites, walking through a swampy marsh on foot to get back to the Holy Land and the Romans on chariots got bogged down in this place actually, which was actually called the Reed Sea, you know, and they got stuck and, you know how the Bible talks about chariots of fire.

RACHEL: You mind repeating that story?

That, I don't know if I quite follow you on that.

JIM: Well, I'm just saying, you know the way the Bible talks in symbols.

RACHEL: Yeah.

JIM: At least that's what I'm just getting around. Now I'm just wondering if this event isn't a



way where God's testing, you know, David's resolve to 1 spread his word beyond Mt. Carmel, you know, that's all 2 3 I'm saying. 4 RACHEL: Yeah. 5 JIM: He knows more about that than me. sister of Kevin and Mark, is that right? 1 2 RACHEL? Kevin and Mark, yeah, they have a 3 sister. 4 JIM: Is her name Heather? 5 RACHEL: Possibly so. 6 Okay, I may be wrong in that, but I JIM: 7 thought it was Heather, and I think, I think they were even asking for her. I think Mark had talked to her 8 when he came over here or something. I think you might 10 just check with --11 RACHEL: Oh, I don't know. 12 JIM: There's so many children. 13 RACHEL: I talked to Kevin, that's all I 14 I didn't talk to Mark. know. 15 JIM: Yeah. Well, there's a lot of children in there and I'm sure it's hard to keep up with every 16 17 one of them, huh? 18 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 19 JIM: But, how are you feeling today, okay? 20 RACHEL: Yeah, I'm kind of coming down with a cold here, you know, got kind of chilly, sometimes late 21 22 at night. 23 JIM: Yeah, I have to check with David on Heather, I think the boys want her, you know, they've 24 kind of been asking. See if that's who he had in mind. 25 RACHEL: Okay.

1	JIM: You think you got a cold?
2	RACHEL: Yeah, I caught a cold. It's pretty
3	chilly in here.
4	JIM: Through all this, you know, and then
5	you get a cold too, isn't that terrible?
6	RACHEL: Yeah, yeah.
7	JIM: Well keep your strength up and
8	RACHEL: Yeah, I'll get some vitamin C and
9	try to keep it from getting too bad.
10	JIM: Yeah, yeah, don't let it because it'll
11	drain you down, you know.
12	RACHEL: Sorry?
13	JIM: I said those colds will drain you.
14	RACHEL: Oh yeah.
15	JIM: You know you start to feel real weak.
16	I mean you need to keep fluid in.
17	RACHEL: Yeah, they do.
18	JIM: Chicken soup, you know, they say, can't
19	hurt it. If it don't help, it can't hurt.
20	RACHEL: Yeah. Did I talk to you this
21	morning or was that Henry?
22	JIM: No, that was me. Well you might have
23	talked to Henry real early.
24	RACHEL: No, cause I remember now that I said
25	Jim, and then after I got off the phone, like it sure
	sounded like Henry to me.

1	JIM: Henry left, no I think it was you and
2	me because Henry left early.
3	RACHEL: Oh okay.
4	JIM: Yeah. I think that was you and me.
5	That's when we were talking probably about Kevin.
6	RACHEL: Cause I think I mostly talked to him
7	since this has been going on. I don't think I've
8	talked to you.
9	JIM: Not as much.
10	RACHEL: Before today or maybe
11	JIM: Oh no, we talked.
12	RACHEL: I talked to you yesterday, then,
13	right?
14	JIM: Yeah, oh yeah we talked, we talked
15	Monday too, I think, briefly, briefly.
16	RACHEL: Well he was the one I guess I talked
17	to in the night. He's just, he's very persistent,
18	going about every angle to try to find some answers or
19	something.
20	JIM: Well, he's concerned about you. I
21	mean.
22	RACHEL: I know.
23	JIM: I mean, he's, he's a real good guy, I'm
24	telling you. I've, he's, he's just concerned. That's
25	the reason. You know, he
ı	

RACHEL: Well, it's your job.

1 JIM: Yeah, well, we're concerned. I mean we 2 have kids and we have families and we want everybody to be safe, you know. 3 4 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 5 JIM: I know you do too. So that's all 6 Henry. He's interested in your welfare. He's been just real happy talking with the kids and stuff, you 7 know. He's a good guy. 8 RACHEL: Yeah, he sounds like a pretty good 9 10 guy. JIM: He really is. He's a real gentle kind 11 12 of person. 13 RACHEL: Oh, I'm, I'm trying to remember something I heard them say on the T. V., it's just now 14 coming back to my memory. He was talking about, oh, I 15 think I remember now, he was talking about Robert --16 17 JIM: Ro --RACHEL: -- the agent, well they didn't 18 mention any names, of course they wouldn't. 19 20 JIM: Yeah. 21 RACHEL: I take that back. 22 JIM: Right. 23 They just mentioned agents. RACHEL: 24 JIM: An agent. 25 RACHEL: What he said was, he said that we never, we never told them that we thought that they

1	were agents and that is not true because before this
2	all happened, David had told me, it was like I think
3	the first time they came over they were standing out by
4	the horse, what is that thing called behind our front
5	UNIDENTIFIED CHILD IN BACKGROUND: Horse
6	RACHEL: Horse walker, anyway, and they were
7	asking about purchasing it, and David was out there
8	talking to them. There was, I don't know how many out
9	there, three or four I'm not sure.
10	UNIDENTIFIED CHILD IN BACKGROUND: Two, two.
11	RACHEL: You don't know, be quiet. And, he
12	told, you know, them that when they first moved in,
13	that he thought that they were agents.
14	JIM: He did.
15	RACHEL: FBI agents, something of that sort.
16	JIM: Uh-huh, uh-huh, yeah.
17	RACHEL: So, it, you know, they're not, they
18	don't have all the information.
19	JIM: No, that's right. I understand that.
20	RACHEL: But David did tell them that.
21	JIM: He told them that.
22	RACHEL: When they first came over, several
23	of them came over, he told them that he thought that
24	were when they first moved in.
25	JIM: Yeah, uh-huh.
	RACHEL: So.

1 Well, I understand, that's another part 2 of your story, I think in your side of the events that needs to be told when you come out. You know, it's 3 important. You know, don't forget it. Write it down. 4 You know, everybody needs to tell their part of the 5 events that occurred and I think it's important that 6 7 it's not just agents telling what happened. It should be you telling and David telling, you know what I'm 8 9 saying? 10 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 11 JIM: I'm concerned about that. I think that that is very important and so just keep that in mind. 12 I don't know, this is, wish things like this never 13 occurred, you know, I think maybe if you and I talked 14 or David had talked prior, you know, we could have done 15 16 this differently. 17 Uh-huh. RACHEL: But unfortunately it wasn't us, it was 18 some other people and you know, if we could've done --19 20 So you, yourself are with the FBI, RACHEL: 21 right? 22 JIM: No. 23 RACHEL: No? 24 JIM: No, I'm ATF. 25 RACHEL: And Henry's with FBI? JIM: Henry's FBI.



RACHEL: Right.

JIM: I want to tell you that there's great interest in your side, your view of what happened, what you saw and your testimony and that's very important. So I don't want you to think that that's being discounted. The media is very interested in it. So --

RACHEL: Oh yeah, they always are.

JIM: Well, you know, Rachel, but the thing is, this is the problem that David and I have been having with them all week inaccuracies. You know, just like when they said there's twenty kids on the bus.

RACHEL: Right.

JIM: I mean, you know, whenever you're telling one person who tells another person, who tells another person, you know what I'm saying?

RACHEL: Uh-huh, it gets on the radio, and the news and --

JIM: Yeah, and then by the time it's like that, it's not even close to what happened.

RACHEL: That's right.

JIM: It's an old Texas saying, you know, the horse's mouth.

RACHEL: Yeah.

JIM: Right? And the horse's mouth is the person that was there.

RACHEL: Right.





JIM: And you were there, David was there, and I think that that, you know needs to be directly told. It will be, it will be, as it should be. Right?

RACHEL: It should.

JIM: That's right, absolutely and that's, that's going to happen. So, you know, just remember that your day in court will come and your day with the media will come and these things will all be told, you know. How's Sita doing?

RACHEL: Oh, she's fine. She's fine. She was a little bit upset yesterday about the situation.

JIM: Oh listen, I just was passed a report here from the newspaper, it said Treasure Secretary, Lloyd Benston --

RACHEL: Uh-huh.

JIM: -- whose department oversees ATF, said there will be a full review of the operation that occurred at Mt. Carmel.

RACHEL: Lloyd Benston?

JIM: Yeah. He's the, he's the, well you know him, don't you?

RACHEL: The name is familiar. David or Steve probably knows, you know, more, but the name is familiar because I read it in the newspaper on Saturday when it first came out.

JIM: Well, he's the, he's over ATF.

1 RACHEL: Oh, okay. 2 JIM: He's over ATF, see. And, he used to be a Senator from Texas. And, you know, they changed 3 administrations up there. He's the new Treasury 4 Secretary, so he's over all of ATF. 5 6 RACHEL: So how long have you been doing this 7 sort of thing? 8 JIM: Well, about nineteen years. 9 RACHEL: You like it? 10 JIM: Well, it, it's hard, you know. 11 I wouldn't like it. It's too RACHEL: 12 stressful. 13 JIM: Yeah, it's hard to see people in difficult situations. That part I don't like. 14 RACHEL: I mean because, to me, it would be 15 hard to go home after the job was over and forget about 16 17 everything because you become involved and it's like 18 part of your life. 19 JIM: Well, you do, you know, you do. you know, you want to try to help and see what you can 20 do. You know, it's always nice to see things resolve 21 peacefully. And, that's a real reward. I know you 22 23 feel the same. 24 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 25 JIM: When I was twenty-one I just started

out as a uniformed policeman, you know?

1	RACHEL: Uh-huh.
2	JIM: But, I had to deliver a baby one time.
3	RACHEL: Oh really?
4	JIM: Boy, that was a trip, I tell you what.
5	I pulled up in front of this house and these two ladies
6	ran out and said, " oh, everything's okay now, the
7	police are here." I said, "oh gosh," there was a lady
8	inside on the couch having a baby.
9	RACHEL: Ooh. Now, why were you there, what?
10	JIM: Well, they called, the lady was in
11	labor.
12	RACHEL: Uh-huh.
13	JIM: And so they dialed the emergency
14	dispatch, you know, and said send the police and an
15	ambulance, the lady's having a baby. Well, when they
16	put it on the police frequency, I was closer than the
17	ambulance.

19	JIM: You see, cause I was out, you know, in
20	the neighborhood. So, I went there, and I got there,
21	you know before the ambulance ever came.

JIM: Any time there was an ambulance call.
RACHEL: My mother, my mother had to go in a
ambulance once I think and I don't remember.
JIM: Well in different cities, you know
RACHEL: Yeah, that's true.
JIM: But that was kind of scary because here
I was alone, you know and
RACHEL: And you had to deliver it, huh?
JIM: Well, you know, I think, I give the
mother credit for that. I kind of, I kind of just
stood there and tried to help. Tried to look like I
knew what I was doing.
RACHEL: Did you catch the baby?
JIM: Yeah, uh-huh.
RACHEL: Did you cut the cord?
JIM: No.
RACHEL: Or did you wait.
JIM: What I did was I waited, because, got
the baby out and then just laid him on his mother's
side and left the cord, you know, because that's the
way they trained us in the police academy. I knew that
help was just minutes away, you know. So then the
ambulance attendants came in and they cut the umbilical
cord, and you know, cleaned him up and, but I'm telling

your, for, for a twenty one year old policeman who

thinks he's a big tough guy, you know, then here's, and




That's what the human services people told me. 1 2 RACHEL: I mean, I don't know. 3 JIM: Like, well, I think Kevin and Mark. 4 RACHEL: Oh yeah, but they're not bottled 5 children, so --6 JIM: Oh, no, right, but I think they had a 7 mother. 8 RACHEL: Yeah, but they're not going to let them go to their mother, are they? 9 10 JIM: No, I don't know. I don't know. RACHEL: I was under the impression that they 22 23 were going to put them in a foster home. 24 JIM: I'm sure some of them will be. That's fairly normal, you know.

RACHEL: Why's that, if they have immediate



1 family? 2 JIM: Well --3 RACHEL: I mean, they are not involved with this. 5 JIM: It's just temporary. 6 RACHEL: You know, the child would feel more comfortable being with, you know, a relative. 7 8 JIM: Oh, I agree with that one hundred percent. I think it's just temporary till this is 9 10 resolved, yeah, you know. Once we contact some relatives, I'm sure those arrangements will be made. 11 It's just --12 13 RACHEL: Are they, are they contacting the 14 relatives of the children --15 JIM: Yes. RACHEL: -- that are there and telling them 16 17 that they have them? 18 JIM: Yes, absolutely, uh-huh. Yes they are. Now whether or not, I don't, I'm not telling you that 19 they've released them to those people --20 21 RACHEL: Yeah. -- I didn't say that. I don't know 22 that that's the case, but they are contacting them. 23 They're here. I understand some parents or 24 grandparents or whatever relatives are here, okay, and 25 they're getting to see the children, but I can't tell

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probably have any bail or release till everyone comes 1 2 out. I mean, you know, I mean, I'm sure that's the case. I'm sure that's the case. You know once 3 everyone's out, like those two ladies who are being held as material witnesses, well that's kind of something that just, you know, it's kind of indefinite until everybody comes out.

RACHEL: Well, I can understand that, as being held as material witnesses --

JIM: Yeah.

RACHEL: -- otherwise they may not be able to contact them.

Right, but I mean, but I think what's going to happen is once everybody walks out then, you know, the attorneys are going to decide, okay, you know, like this person's a material witness, this person's a material witness, you know, this person were going to charge with something, this person we're going to charge with something and here's the bail. then the judge has to set the bail, you know. have to appear before the magistrate, I mean, once you walk out, I mean, you know, it's all in the hands of the court. It's not in the hands of agents, you know.

RACHEL: (to child) Don't mess with that. Well, I know one thing, back in '88, when we had the trial.



JIM: Right.

2 RACHEL: The amount that -- of bail, I mean
3 it was, I think it was fifty, fifty thousand?

JIM: Yeah.

RACHEL: I mean, there was other guys in the cell, you know, who were being charged with attempted murder, or murder, or whatever was less than that. I mean that was --

JIM: Oh, I know.

RACHEL: -- that was something else. That was unbelievable.

JIM: Well, listen, we know that everyone in there was not involved and everyone in there is not responsible.

RACHEL: Well who, how, well who would they consider involved and who would they consider not being involved?


JIM: Yeah, that I can't tell you. I don't know.

RACHEL: Well, you should know, I mean just as a personal conversation, not as telling me, you know --

JIM: Yeah, I --

RACHEL: -- particular aspects, I'm just curious as to how that works.

JIM: Well, I think that the investigation,

normal way a case is done, you know.

JIM: And, of course, you know, it's got to be proof. It can't be any, just like in witnesses, you know, just like in that Roden case, in '88 when David and the guys were acquitted, it's because the evidence was lacking, you know. I'm sure some people will not be charged, although I could tell you that initially they will be held as material witnesses, I'm sure every adult in there will be initially. And then some attorneys will decide well, we're not charging this person, this person, this person, and we're going to charge these and anyone who was charged, you know, will then appear for bail. You know how that works.

RACHEL: Yes.

JIM: And, I'm not going to lie to you. You know, if I was going to lie to you, I'd say "oh sure come on out, you know, no problem," right?

RACHEL: (Laughing) Yes.

JIM: I'm, I'm telling you what's going to happen.

RACHEL: Oh, I, I know that for sure. I mean



nobody gets, gets away free, you know if they've 1 2 committed a crime, they shouldn't. 3 Well, then not everybody in there might JIM: 4 have committed a crime, right? 5 RACHEL: No. Right. 6 JIM: Okay, so what I'm saying is everybody 7 8 If you are allowed to self defend RACHEL: 9 yourself, you know, --10 JIM: Exactly, exactly. That's what we want 11 you to know that you should be telling us. 12 I mean either you're going to be the RACHEL: one dead or you're going to fire back and --13 14 JIM: Do you know that the law says and I 15 learned this nineteen years ago when I was a rookie, that everyone has a right to defend themselves, and 16 17 their home and their property. RACHEL: You know, before this ever happened, 18 I used to, you know, think about, what if, you know, 19 just personal, personal lifestyle, what if someone 20 broke in my house and, you know, I mean it happens all 21 the time, you have people break in someone's home and 22 they, they'll you know, try to rob you, or rape you or 23 24 whatever.

JIM: Right, exactly.

25

RACHEL: You know, and if you were to defend

1	yourself, you know, you'd probably still go to jail.
2	JIM: No, no.
3	RACHEL: Do you know how that works?
4	JIM: No, because look at the '88 case with,
5	'87 with Roden, okay?
6	RACHEL: Yeah.
7	JIM: The, the, David and the other guys were
8	arrested, right?
9	RACHEL: Uh-huh.
10	JIM: They were charged, right?
11	RACHEL: Uh-huh.
12	JIM: But there was no evidence, it was
13	lacking. The truth came out. In other words, David
14	and the other men told what happened and because of
15	their testimony given by your folks in there, they were
16	acquitted. And, you may well have a self defense case
17	here. And
18	RACHEL: But even on a self defense case
19	JIM: Right.
20	RACHEL: you know, like they said that
21	four ATF agents got killed
22	JIM: Right.
23	RACHEL: still even if you're self, you
24	know, defending yourself, to me, I mean, I don't know,
25	I don't really know anything about the law. You know,
	very little, if you're self, you know, you're defending



yourself and you were to kill someone, then how does that still stand?

JIM: Well, then you're innocent.

RACHEL: I just thought, you know, they might still do something.

JIM: No, then you're innocent. Okay?

RACHEL: Cause, you know, I used to think about those kind of things, you know, like what if, you know, cause this is a wicked world and a lot of things happen out there, you know, what if someone, you know, I've had that concern as far as being, you know, molested or raped or by someone out there that was just to break in, you know?

JIM: Absolutely, absolutely, that happens every day. But you have the right to defend yourself. That's in the law. That's in the State law, that's in the Federal Law, that every citizen has the right to defend themselves. And certainly the sanctity of their home. To repel an attack, to repel a rape as you say or some type of injury. You have that right. That's in the law.

RACHEL: Uh-huh.

JIM: You know a man in California, I remember, was -- killed a police officer. And, he was acquitted on self defense grounds.

RACHEL: Oh, really.



JIM: Yeah, I can tell you a case I had in Nashville, Tennessee years ago. Okay? Let me tell you this story. A man was standing on the front store, step of his house and a policeman come up, and pulled out a gun and pointed it at him and shot toward him and this man killed the uniform policeman, killed him, with a .45 pistol and he was acquitted. The Grand Jury wouldn't even indict him for it. Never even got to the jury. The Grand Jury, you know, which is the ones who, you know, sit first.

RACHEL: Yeah. See if it's worth hearing the case.

JIM: See if there's fact, right, uh-huh. And, what I want you to realize is, you know, this isn't even at the Grand Jury. You know what I'm saying?


RACHEL: Uh-huh.

JIM: But first you have to have Grand Jury and that's like, you know, how many people they have in those allotment, twenty three people, they have to be citizens, you know, they're not police, they can't be police and they have to decide that there's grounds for a charge. And then it goes to the, if it reaches past there to a trial stage, then the jury has to decide, well, you know, was a crime committed or if it's self defense, then that's, that's a defense.

1 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 2 JIM: You know. And the burden, and you know this Rachel, the burden of proof is not on you, right? 3 4 RACHEL: Oh. 5 In other words, the citizen has to prove nothing. Doesn't have to prove anything. 6 Doesn't have to present any evidence. In other words, 7 you're innocent. You're presumed innocent. 8 9 RACHEL: Well, I know when they went to jail back in '87 and the court was in '88, it, it was, the 10 judicial system was, it was unreal. I learned a lot, 11 by going to that court case, how backwards things 12 13 really are. I mean --14 Like what, what do you mean? JIM: 15 RACHEL: The District Attorney's Office, Al Shabob (phonetic), the things that he brought out, I 16 17 mean, things he said that weren't even true. I mean David was talking to, I don't know if it was, it was 18 probably you because when this first started happening, 19 Henry wasn't involved yet. 20 21 JIM: Right. 22 RACHEL: And, you know, Shabob would ask, I mean, I can't speak as well as he does, but, you know, 23 24 like, when you went out there to to shoot George Roden, did you not, I forget the rest of it, something or 25

another, and the questions they ask, you know, it's

like yes or no. You can't answer yes or no, cause 1 they're asking you --2 3 JIM: Right. 4 RACHEL: -- you know what I mean? 5 Yeah, I know exactly what you mean. I 6 know exactly what you mean, but, remember this now, the way that happens is, that each side has an attorney and 7 each attorney gets to do that to the, to the other 9 side. See what I mean? 10 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 11 JIM: So the attorney for your side can get 12 up and say, Rachel, tell me what happened. See what I 13 mean? 14 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 15 JIM: He doesn't have to ask a yes or no. Now the other side may get up and say, isn't it true 16 that you did this, yes or no? 17 18 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 19 JIM: See what I mean? 20 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 21 JIM: But the, you know, the Constitution of the U. S. protects everyone. And, it say, you know, 22 let's talk about that, I mean, freedom of religion, the 23 24 Constitution guarantees all these rights, search and seizure, you have to have warrants and testimony in 25 court and you have to appear in court and you know the



RACHEL: So, then you know the facts.

Yeah, I know the facts and what they



1 RACHEL: Uh-huh. Well, they probably try to 2 talk to him too. 3 JIM: Yeah, you know how the reporters, they 4 try to talk to everybody. 5 RACHEL: Oh, yeah, anybody. 6 JIM: Anybody. 7 RACHEL: I mean anybody answer. JIM: Well they don't really want to talk to 8 9 They want to talk to you and David. 10 RACHEL: Yeah, well. 11 JIM: That's who they want, that's who they 12 want to talk to. 13 -- you guys do to find out things. RACHEL: 14 JIM: Yeah, they don't care -- listen Rach, nineteen years, I've been doing this. They don't want 15 16 to talk to policemen. 17 RACHEL: Oh really. JIM: They could care less. The only --18 19 RACHEL: Well that's because they've been hearing, they've been hearing things already and they 20 want the other side, I guess. 21 That's, that's exactly what I'm saying. 22 JIM: I mean a policeman, they can go find him anywhere. 23 24 RACHEL: Yeah. 25 I mean, they're only talking to ATF and JIM: the police because that's who, the only ones they can



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talk to.

2 RACHEL: Right.

JIM: See what I'm saying?

RACHEL: Uh-huh.

JIM: So, just remember that. You know when this thing goes to court, okay, I've seen a lot of cases where judges even throw them out before they go to a jury. I've had that happen. Do you understand?

RACHEL: Yeah, I was listening kind of half, half heartily there because I was telling my daughter something.

JIM: Yeah.

RACHEL: You said something about they sometimes throw it out, excuse me, it doesn't make it to court.

JIM: Well, the judge throws it out.

RACHEL: Yeah.

JIM: And, and also you got to remember that when a jury is seated, it's got to be you know, local people from the community, the peers. You know a jury has to be made up of peers.

RACHEL: Uh-huh.

JIM: So, you know, in your case the people of Waco and the ranchers and you know what I'm saying.

know, that's who's, that's who decides what happened.

And the judge would be bound by their decision. It's

not his decision. He could throw it out if he wants,

RACHEL: I want to tell you something funny.

JIM: All right.

It was really funny in the court RACHEL: case back in '88. There was a, I believe it was a red flannel piece of cloth. What happened was they ripped up a shirt into you know, little pieces and you know, like little squares or whatever and Shabob had this flannel red cloth and you know, he would watch about his procedure and he was saying I think he was trying to tell the guys, you know, that they were you know, using it to strangle, if I have that correct, I'm not positive on that, but, to use it some way like that. Anyway but I think it had to do with strangling. And it was really funny because when he asked one of, you know, one of our guys, you know what it was used for, well he was trying to tell him that what it was used for. You can deal with it. 13 Everybody out there's strong and has a lot of character 14 and I think that you can deal with it. Don't you? 15 16 RACHEL: What, the the --17 The court. The courtroom or the, you JIM: know, whatever, the hearings and all that stuff. 18 19 RACHEL: Yeah. 20 Don't you think so? JIM: 21 RACHEL: That people can handle it, is that 22 what you said? 23 Yeah, I think you can handle it. JIM: 24 RACHEL: Well, yeah, I guess. JIM: Well, I think you're strong and I think 25 -- I know you --





1 RACHEL: Just tell the truth, I mean, what 2 happened. 3 JIM: Well, that's what, that's what's 4 important. I know you're concerned about it. It's all going to work out and you're going to get in there, I 5 mean, it takes courage to get up in front of those 6 courts and, I know it's like that, but come on out and 7 get the process started, you know, I think that's the 8 best thing to do. I really do. I'm being honest with 9 10 you. 11 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 12 I don't want to see nobody else get JIM: 13 hurt. You don't either. 14 RACHEL: I sure hope they, you know, don't try anything because I hate to see any more blood shed 15 16 I don't want to see any move violence. either. 17 JIM: I don't either, Rachel. I really --RACHEL: So, I just hope, they don't, you 18 know try to come up in the middle of the night and 19 sneak up on everybody or you know, try to get into the 20 house because, you know? 21 22 JIM: Well, they won't, they won't. 23 Something's going to happens. RACHEL: I mean they'll be risking their lives, that's for sure. 24 I know it. But I appreciate you saying 25 JIM: that you want everybody to be safe.





RACHEL: Yeah, I do.

JIM: And you take my word. Nothing's going to happen like that. But I think one way to diffuse anything, the whole situation is for you and me and David to agree that now's the time to come out peacefully. Come out, there'd be no more of this armored cars out there. No more guns on either side, and now that the event goes into court process and the, the, television news process, and the public process and all that stuff is over, you know what I mean.
