2 STEVE: -- was that while here there was
3 numerous times where the phone would ring where he was
4 right in the phone room where the phone was, and he saw
5 and heard about the death threats right while he was
6 there. Seriously.

7 DICK: Again, I'm not going to question that.
8 But I'll tell you, part of the newspaper articles that
9 I saw today where there was something that DeGuerin had
10 mentioned about David's reluctance to come out, because
11 he's fearful of what might happen to a child molester
12 in prison.

13 STEVE: I -- that's nonsense. He's never
14 even said --

15 DICK: Well, it was -- I'm telling you what
16 was read in the -- said in the paper.

17 STEVE: He's never said anything like that.

18 DICK: Well, all I'm telling you --

19 STEVE: You know what I, I think --

20 DICK: -- now hold it. He said something
21 about Bubba to me himself.

22 STEVE: Well, no, that was me. That's a word
23 that I used.

24 DICK: Well, it was a used -- word David used
25 also.

STEVE: Well, that's news then, Dick.

1 | Because I don't, I don't know that.

2 | DICK: You ask him about it. Because I, I
3 | remember very distinctly him mentioning that.

4 | STEVE: Okay, I -- it's not that I disagree.
5 | I mean I don't know. I'm -- I was -- I'm saying I
6 | never heard that before.

7 | DICK: Well --

8 | STEVE: But I mean I have talked to you about
9 | that or one of you, I don't remember who. Because when
10 | you were talking about coming out. And that even
11 | doesn't change my decision about coming, that's --

12 | DICK: It may not change yours, but it has an
13 | impact on what David does. And there's no question --

14 | STEVE: I don't believe it. No.

15 | DICK: Well --

16 | STEVE: Knowing him I don't believe that.
17 | Because I've been traveling with him already.

18 | DICK: Steve, I've been doing this job --

19 | STEVE: He's gone into --

20 | DICK: -- for 22 years, okay?

21 | STEVE: But Dick, he's gone into an arena
22 | many times where it's nothing but you're taking your
23 | life into your own hands. Seriously. Or putting in,
24 | in someone else's.

25 | DICK: You know, let me ask you a question.
You know --

1 STEVE: Sure.

2 DICK: -- you've got all this faith in David
3 Koresh, okay, and this belief in what he has to say.
4 But yet here's a man who -- here's a man that involves
5 himself sexually with children. Now you tell me.

6 STEVE: That's not true.

7 DICK: A 12-year-old or, or --

8 STEVE: It is not true.

9 DICK: -- okay, a 14- or 15-year-old if we
10 can all I think deal with that. Because we've all
11 dealt with that number in the past, okay? How, how can
12 you -- I don't understand how you can accept what he
13 has to say as it relates to religion but yet on the
14 other hand you live the way you do in there and give
15 all your assets, your worldly assets to include your
16 wife --

17 STEVE: I have not given my worldly assets.

18 DICK: Well, many others have in there.
19 Maybe you haven't.

20 STEVE: No they, they really haven't.

21 DICK: Oh.

22 STEVE: Do you want us to give our bank
23 accounts of all the individuals here? They wouldn't
24 even mind doing that. My bank accounts, my credit
25 rating, my -- seriously.

DICK: Well, how about, how about the wives

1 of some, several of the people in there then.

2 STEVE: What about the wives of the guys
3 here?

4 DICK: Well, are they not -- do they not make
5 them available for David --

6 STEVE: Not, not so.

7 DICK: -- and David's desires?

8 STEVE: Not so.

9 DICK: Not so. Not at all.

10 STEVE: So that's what I'm telling you. All
11 of this came -- what about animal sacrifices? Children
12 sacrifices? What about abuse to children, about
13 beating children? All of this came from a guy by the
14 name of Mark Broe (phonetic sp.), and we totally ignore
15 it for the first 2 years. I discussed in the early
16 days when Mark was doing this about -- with David, I
17 wanted to personally go after him for slander. I
18 wanted to get a libel suit against him. I talked to
19 Wayne about it and David says no. Leave it be. God
20 has not directed, so let Mark do what Mark needs or
21 wants to do.

22 DICK: If I remember David making a comment,
23 he said what woman wouldn't want to be with the Lamb of
24 God or be the wife of the Lamb of God? If I remember I
25 think those were pretty much his exact words.

STEVE: Oh, yeah. He's mouthed that over and

1 over again.

2 DICK: And, and such things as I love all my
3 wives, whoever they are. I mean things of that nature.

4 STEVE: Right.

5 DICK: Now that really tells me that this man
6 is deeply religious and all the things that he does
7 are, you know, that that, those kinds of things are
8 acceptable to you, Steve?

9 STEVE: Dick, what you need to understand is
10 maybe it's a stumbling block of words to find out how
11 honest people are to begin with.

12 DICK: Oh, okay.

13 STEVE: Well, no, wait now. Wait now. I
14 mean let's take a look at the facts of the Bible those
15 that did do the, the very writings. Like you can go
16 back to Moses. Moses was a murderer before anything
17 else and he --

18 DICK: Steve --

19 STEVE: Wait, wait, wait, wait.

20 DICK: Let's, let's deal with the here and
21 present, okay?

22 STEVE: That's what we are dealing with.

23 DICK: No, let's deal with the present.

24 STEVE: No, no, no. You're talking about
25 David. So Isaiah is a prophet and --

DICK: Well, relate it to what's going on

1 now.

2 STEVE: -- and almost 2 bil-- I am.

3 That's -- I am going to. But just let me give you a
4 couple examples, not to get off in an extreme, detailed
5 thing.

6 But, but to say that Isaiah ran around nude
7 and barefoot for 3 years as it says in Isaiah 20.
8 You've got -- you can look all the way through the
9 Bible, Micah did the same thing in chapter 1. You can
10 take a look at Hosea. He's told by God to marry not
11 one but two prostitutes. Who's going to ever accept
12 him as a prophet? So this is weird behavior.
13 Extremely weird behavior.

14 Let, let me start giving you example after
15 example about even Christ and his not being too cool.
16 If you look in John chapter, I believe it is -- I
17 should know it right off. I think it's chapter 2.
18 You'll find out about Christ casting out the money
19 changers. Goes right into a church or let's say a
20 religious building and starts doing something with
21 violence. Read about it. With violence.

22 I mean when you stop to take some time to
23 really look at the Bible and even in the, the language
24 employed by God to the prophets, you'll find words like
25 shit used frequently. But you know, in the old archaic
English it's dung. But what is dung? But all the way

1 | through the Bible you've got in Ezekiel, chapter 23 it
2 | talks about women in the final days having a love for
3 | men that have dicks the size of horses. Do you know
4 | that's in the Bible, Dick?

5 | DICK: No, I didn't know that.

6 | STEVE: It is. I mean I'll give you
7 | references. You go back and read that.

8 | DICK: But I'm not going to quarrel with
9 | that. I'm not going to quarrel with that. You say
10 | that it's true --

11 | STEVE: But why, why is the Bible so -- okay,
12 | now look. So the, the whole thing of what I'm really
13 | saying is here God's always done things contrary to
14 | what man thinks that God should be or how God should
15 | work. And it's always to find out who has a love for
16 | truth to begin with.

17 | Second Thessalonians talks about everybody is
18 | going to be damned or perish if they didn't have a love
19 | for truth. So God will send strong delusion that
20 | they'll believe a lie instead of the truth. And that,
21 | that they all might be damned that did not love the
22 | truth. That's exactly what it says there. Or
23 | paraphrasing.

24 | DICK: Well, you know, let me tell you
25 | something. David --

 STEVE: Sure.

1 DICK: -- Koresh has -- David Koresh is a
2 manipulative person that is, is very strong in his
3 religious beliefs. And he has surrounded himself with
4 a number of people that have not or, or for years have
5 looked for something other than what they found, and
6 they found something in him that they've looked for.
7 Some people that are not strong willed, most of them, a
8 lot of them.

9 STEVE: You don't know me then.

10 DICK: Well, I'm not saying you. I'm saying
11 a lot of those folks.

12 STEVE: I've been a debater all my life. I
13 mean I love to debate. When I even met him, I'm a type
14 of person that you lay out what you have, but then you
15 give me opportunity to jump all over you. And that's
16 the way I am --

17 DICK: Okay, I'll lay out --

18 STEVE: -- to this day --

19 DICK: Let me lay out something for you.

20 STEVE: I'm very --

21 DICK: You can jump all over this.

22 STEVE: These people are the same way. Very
23 independent. Very self-centered. Very -- seriously.

24 DICK: You want a challenge. You know you've
25 mentioned a challenge. I'll give you a challenge.

 STEVE: Okay, what's that?

1 DICK: Get yourself out here, go in court and
2 support and, and defend yourself in court against the
3 charges.

4 STEVE: That's coming.

5 DICK: You can do that.

6 STEVE: Dick, that's coming. But I --

7 DICK: When, when does this
8 (indiscernible) --

9 STEVE: You fail to understand I fear -- I
10 honestly can tell you. It's no joke. It's not a lie.
11 It's not an exaggeration. I fear the God that David
12 has exposed through the writings of the prophets and
13 all the writers, the apostles, all of that. I see a
14 very plain, clear picture. But you or no one else that
15 I've ever talked to since this happened has allowed me
16 to develop the picture that I see. And I think that
17 you would understand me better that I'm not -- it's not
18 an exaggeration. It's not an excuse. It's not a lie.

19 You can tell that when I come stand out there
20 unarmed, and there's a Bradley there, and Byron Sage is
21 inside the Bradley. I don't even see his face. Or
22 like distraction grenades are thrown at me. I didn't
23 give a damn if they were hand grenades. I really
24 didn't. It doesn't -- when you believe in something,
25 seriously, I do, Dick. I do. That is the reason I
haven't walked out. Not because I don't trust or

1 | believe in the system.

2 | DICK: No, let me, let me offer something.

3 | STEVE: That's secondary, that's, that's
4 | irrelevant to me.

5 | DICK: I've done this job for 22 years,
6 | and --

7 | STEVE: Okay.

8 | DICK: -- I've heard every excuse for not
9 | confronting the truth that can be offered, okay?
10 | And --

11 | STEVE: Okay.

12 | DICK: -- I'm hearing one from you, and I'm
13 | hearing one from David. Now I, I know you have strong
14 | religious convictions, okay? But you couple that with
15 | this reluctance to come out and this fear of, of going
16 | before the court, and that's what puts you where you
17 | are.

18 | STEVE: I don't have a fear of going before
19 | the court.

20 | DICK: Yes, you do. Yes, you do.

21 | STEVE: I do not.

22 | DICK: You --

23 | STEVE: Dick, I don't.

24 | DICK: -- absolutely do.

25 | STEVE: Okay, say what you will. You will
find out that's not true at all. You will find that

1 out.

2 What I do fear is the God of the Bible.
3 That's what I fear. And if it wasn't for that, if it
4 wasn't for that whole, what I understand, what I see
5 clearly. I mean no question there is some fear and
6 apprehension like I've told you with the court system.
7 But nowhere near in measurement to what I see -- wait,
8 wait, no --

9 DICK: Well, I can, I can understand that. I
10 can understand that.

11 STEVE: Okay, that's what I'm saying.

12 DICK: Most of us fear --

13 STEVE: The one -- Dick, the one overpowers
14 the other. Obviously.

15 DICK: Fine. But you've got to deal with
16 this. You've got to deal with reality first, okay?

17 STEVE: Well, to me this is reality. That's
18 what I'm trying to explain to you.

19 DICK: You've got to deal with the present,
20 okay? The present is that you have to come out and,
21 and get this issue resolved.

22 STEVE: But, but you, you -- I don't have to
23 come out.

24 DICK: Oh, you don't. Well, now that's --

25 STEVE: That's the point.

 DICK: -- now we're getting down to the

1 bottom line. You don't have to come out. That's,
2 that's what you're saying.

3 STEVE: No, let's, let's be real here. You
4 know. Let's say -- now he says, his God says we're
5 coming out.

6 DICK: Um-hum.

7 STEVE: And I believe that too. I really do.
8 I believe we are coming out. I believe that well
9 and --

10 DICK: Why do you keep --

11 STEVE: -- carnally -- wait. Carnally I
12 choose --

13 DICK: -- saying his God? Isn't that your
14 God also?

15 STEVE: Yes.

16 DICK: Well, why do you keep referring to it
17 as his God?

18 STEVE: Because to let you know clearly
19 that's where the information that I have, right from
20 the beginning what's been shown to me from that Bible
21 has been so beyond anything that a scholar has shown.
22 And I've asked him where have you got this information,
23 David? Where did you get this from? Did you get it
24 from Oxford, Harvard? What school of learning did you
25 go to? What institute? Well, well, he didn't. Well,
that's interesting. So where did you get it?

1 I believe there is two powers in this world.
2 I believe there is the forces of Satan with his fallen
3 evil angels, and I believe on the other end there's God
4 by the Holy Spirit and the good angels. Spiritual
5 beings that inter-react with you and myself. I believe
6 this.

7 So I believe that he's either inspired by one
8 side or the other. There's no in between. Either he's
9 totally deluded, he's a pawn of Satan, and Satan has
10 done a lot of harm through and by this man, or he is of
11 God. There's no in between for me, Dick.

12 DICK: It's either or there, right?

13 STEVE: Pardon?

14 DICK: It's either or.

15 STEVE: Yeah. That's, that's clear. So for
16 me because I've listened and taken him back to the test
17 of Scripture again and again and again and ad
18 infinitum. I mean I am -- that's why I am here. I see
19 the information clearly. I don't see another source in
20 this world, religious or non-religious, that has shown
21 me how I got here, where I'm going, why all the
22 troubles in the world, why death, why, why some
23 innocent children die of AIDS or this disease, that
24 disease, hit by a car. Why the unfairness of the world
25 of man to man and, and some have all the amenities
and creature comforts that there are and others don't.

1 | Why? I don't know. But the best answers for me, Dick,
2 | have come from that book. And especially the way he
3 | has shown it. And I've asked him where did you get it.
4 | Well, from his God.

5 | See, I don't know God, Dick. I can tell you
6 | right now I don't know Jesus Christ of 2,000 years ago.
7 | I don't know God who sits on a throne. I do know
8 | there's a book here that says something about that God.
9 | I don't know him personally. I don't know if he's ever
10 | heard my prayers.

11 | DICK: Well, how is God going to react or
12 | judge you and others in connection with this event of
13 | the 28th?

14 | STEVE: How is he going to judge us for that?

15 | DICK: Yeah.

16 | STEVE: I could start right now giving you
17 | chapter after chapter of the Bible that God --

18 | DICK: I'm not going to --

19 | STEVE: I'm talking about defending one's
20 | life --

21 | DICK: Well, you can defend -- okay. But
22 | how, how is God going to look at this event in the
23 | death of not only the agents but the people inside?
24 | How, how is God going to look at that event?

25 | STEVE: Well, number one, God wants you to
understand his will. And his will -- there are people

1 that are dying every day that are being shot, that are
2 being run over by automobiles, that are dying of
3 disease. God hates it all. He would like everybody in
4 this world to take note of a way to get out of this --

5 DICK: No, what do you mean he hates it all.
6 I've always understood that that was God's will if, if
7 somebody died in that fashion. Isn't that God's will?

8 STEVE: Well, definitely God is in control of
9 even the devil himself. So all that is happening is,
10 is most certainly allowed by God. And what is the
11 purpose and reason for that? That's what we've been
12 wanting to show to you. Not to tell you, giving an
13 opinion or a theory.

14 DICK: Well, do you have any confidence in
15 man's law at all?

16 STEVE: I still do to a very small degree.
17 But like I was telling I believe it was Rick today I've
18 already seen by my own experience in life many judges
19 who, it's like their decision depends upon what they
20 had to eat that breakfast or that morning. I, I have
21 seen many that are actually jokers that are sitting in
22 that seat. I'm serious.

23 I've -- not for myself. I had a friend that
24 had a ticket. I went in with him. He went to take --
25 before it came up to his time I saw the judge handling
other cases, certain judges in California. And the way

1 he responded, I mean I was not impressed. I've seen it
2 time and time again.

3 Man, they -- just like myself I'm fallible.
4 All of us are fallible. So there are many criminals
5 that have gotten away, and there's many innocent people
6 that have been fried.

7 And so I mean what would happen to me? I
8 don't know. But I mean I -- that's all in God's hands
9 also. But first of all, if God says don't leave at
10 this point of time, then I can't do that. I will not
11 do that. But if he said that we are coming out, and
12 that's exactly what the statement is and, and from the
13 beginning but it's been a time element, well that -- I
14 myself am waiting. I really am.

15 And I realize that it would have been easier
16 for me if I'd have come on out, come out the first day,
17 Dick. But it's because I fear God that I haven't. I
18 mean --

19 DICK: Steve --

20 STEVE: -- ultimately I have to face it,
21 don't I? Don't, I? But I --

22 DICK: Well, certainly you do. But you know
23 what, Steve? Listen.

24 STEVE: Yes. I agree. Dick, I agree.

25 DICK: Let, let me tell you something.

STEVE: Go ahead.

1 DICK: You know, you're talking to law
2 enforcement officers here that have --

3 STEVE: Okay.

4 DICK: -- been here for, have been on this
5 job for many, many, many years, okay?

6 STEVE: Okay.

7 DICK: Again, I will give you that you're a
8 strong, religious person, okay. You have these
9 convictions, and so does David. However, my belief is
10 that this reluctance to come out, this whole thing is
11 driven primarily by your fear of facing the court
12 system and having to answer to the events of the 28th
13 of February. Okay, that's my personal belief.

14 STEVE: It won't work, Dick. You can say
15 what you want and I'm going -- number one, that's,
16 that's not a truth. And number two, your saying that
17 to me does not change anything.

18 I am telling you for a fact whatever I am or
19 not or whatever I have been from birth, one thing is
20 for sure that it's not because I am afraid of the
21 system. Oh, I'm apprehensive. And I suspect the
22 worst. I really do. I hope for the best, but I expect
23 the worst.

24 DICK: Didn't your lawyers -- I don't know
25 what your lawyers told you --

 STEVE: Oh, I think they think they can win

1 | it and get me out scott free. Seriously, I think they,
2 | they believe that. They've more or -- they've just
3 | about come out and said so. So I, I believe that
4 | that's how they see it.

5 | But at the same time, I've told them that
6 | even though I think that they're probably right because
7 | especially in my case being where I was, what happened
8 | and my knowledge at that time and so forth. I don't, I
9 | don't know what I'd get out of it. But I can't imagine
10 | unless the system is so corrupt and, and the agency of
11 | the ATF and some of these other agencies are so
12 | powerful that they want to make an example of us which
13 | could be possible.

14 | I mean whatever, I mean if I -- if there is a
15 | God, if he can't take care of me, or if he does want me
16 | in that situation, if the, if the worst thing ever
17 | happened where I being innocent of, of February 28th,
18 | got some kind of a death sentence at the very worst
19 | even for some reason or another that I could never
20 | understand, well then so be it. Because there -- if
21 | there is a God that's what he would have willed. If
22 | there's not one, well I would have died anyway in this,
23 | this crazy world.

24 | DICK: Well, again --

25 | STEVE: So as far as I'm concerned --

 DICK: -- that same challenge to you. I

1 offer you the challenge and everybody else that's
2 talked to you has offered that same challenge to you
3 repeatedly over these many days. That is to come out
4 and tell your story, go to court and get resolved.

5 STEVE: I'm planning on doing that, Dick.

6 DICK: I know you're planning on doing it.
7 I'm planning on doing a lot of things too. But I want
8 to deal with the present not down the line --

9 STEVE: But I -- that's where you and I
10 differ. Because all through the Bible -- all the Bible
11 is prophecy. It deals in the future.

12 My life is based upon not something that
13 happened 2,000 years ago. That's history, Dick. I'm
14 talking about the future. It's called prophecy. The
15 spirit, the testimony of Jesus it says in the Bible is
16 the spirit of prophecy. What is hope until, unless,
17 when something has not happened?

18 Like in Romans 8 it talks about what true
19 hope is. You can't hope for something that's already
20 taken place. So my hope is based on what all the
21 prophets say is taking --

22 DICK: Steve, on this, on this earth at this
23 point in time you have to deal with this issue. You
24 cannot deny that it happened.

25 STEVE: I know I do. Dick, I know it. And I
haven't --

1 DICK: You can't deny that it's happened.

2 STEVE: -- I haven't denied that it -- I know
3 there are four agents dead and that there are six dead
4 on our side and four wounded and that there were a
5 number of wounded on that side. I -- and it's
6 extremely regrettable. And I know that it's got to be
7 taken care of.

8 And I, and I know that it's not a fair
9 system, because that's why you've still got ATF agents
10 out running around, and they can cuss us out still like
11 they did the day they showed up here. A lot of these
12 people in this building heard the language, the foul
13 language come out of their mouths. And it was clear
14 that they meant to do harm and business when they came
15 here. And, and I know that for a fact.

16 Whether it ever comes out or it's believed or
17 not, I -- to me, I know that God knows. And I know
18 what I heard. And I know that some of these inno--
19 all these innocent, like especially even the children
20 and so forth, they got to see and hear. And, and it --
21 believe me, I don't want to even get into that whole
22 thing.

23 But the whole thing is it does -- I know that
24 it's not a fair system. I'm hoping to get some
25 fairness, and I plan on meeting the system. But
irregardless, number one, before February 28th, I'm

1 here for a reason, and that reason is totally based on
2 God's word.

3 DICK: Yeah, but nobody's quarreling with
4 that.

5 STEVE: No, but at the same time the one that
6 showed it to me I didn't have the ability on my own,
7 Dick, to learn and understand the Bible. I really
8 didn't. I have spent -- my, my family has spent on my
9 behalf from a small child on between myself and them I
10 have spent at least with them \$60,000 for my education.
11 So that's a lot of money that has gone into education.
12 And what I learned from him in just a matter of days
13 surpassed what I learned all those years from men in,
14 in different schooling situations --

15 DICK: Steve, if you, if you believe all
16 that, then you know what? I really I -- you know,
17 you're not a -- you know, you're a bright guy. Put
18 some money into education. You obviously have some,
19 some good thoughts. And if you can believe that this
20 man is what you say that he is, then friend, you know
21 you better re-examine some of these things. Because
22 this man is a manipulative, he's a con-man.

23 STEVE: How -- well, how so? Give me some
24 examples.

25 DICK: How so? Ah, man. You know --

STEVE: I mean what do you have --

1 DICK: How so.

2 STEVE: -- for facts? No, let's -- facts.
3 Now you're a person that deals with facts.

4 DICK: He's tried to manipulate this whole
5 thing since the outset of this thing.

6 STEVE: How do you see that?

7 DICK: Well, how do I see it? On the first
8 occasion, okay?

9 STEVE: Okay.

10 DICK: First of all, we were to play this 45-
11 minute tape -- 48-minute tape, I'm sorry.

12 STEVE: Fifty-six or fifty-eight --

13 DICK: Fifty-seven, fifty-eight is what it
14 actually ended up to be.

15 STEVE: Right.

16 DICK: And then people were coming out. But
17 then, --

18 STEVE: Right.

19 DICK: -- that is done. We took him at his
20 word.

21 STEVE: So did I.

22 DICK: And so did you. We did as he asked
23 and as he agreed. He didn't, he didn't follow up on
24 his agreement. Okay?

25 STEVE: Can I, can I respond to that just
real quick? And it's, it's in your --

1 DICK: I know. You're waiting for his God.

2 STEVE: -- favor. No, no. No, no. It's in
3 your favor. It really -- I'll be -- I'm going to tell
4 you the way I think and work. Even then it unsettled
5 me also, Dick.

6 But -- and the only thing that I grabbed onto
7 at that time when it comes to well, how do I perceive
8 it, what I grabbed onto is how I remember and have seen
9 him work in the past. I mean with that same God in
10 other situations when the word has been wait, and it
11 has always come out better than I've ever dreamed.
12 Seriously, even though it might be a day later or it
13 may be a couple hours later. That's the only -- that's
14 what I had to base my --

15 But I was as a human you must understand I
16 was annoyed when he said one thing and even for myself.
17 What's going on here? I don't want to be embarrassed.
18 I'm used to, you know, when you give your word to
19 someone I'm used to following through on that myself.
20 And so has he --

21 DICK: But he, he apparently is not.

22 STEVE: No, no. But he has been. That's
23 what I'm saying. So --

24 DICK: Oh, this is the first time that that's
25 ever happened? Is that what you're saying to me?

 STEVE: Yes, it is. In a, in a situation --

1 DICK: What do you suppose caused that?

2 STEVE: Pardon?

3 DICK: What do you suppose caused this
4 reluctance?

5 STEVE: I don't know. Because I -- you got
6 to remember I was there when he was praying when the
7 stretcher was brought in. I'm telling you, everybody
8 here was convinced for a fact, they were dressed, ready
9 to go out. I was. I was to be the last one walking
10 out. He was the, you know, he was to go out remember,
11 first --

12 DICK: Um-hum.

13 STEVE: -- or something like that. I mean I
14 was ready. I was one of the guys that walked up and
15 got the stretcher or the -- yeah, the stretcher and
16 brought it back even. I was ready to go out.
17 Everybody here was. And then he started praying. He
18 wanted to be clear. He started to pray and went on and
19 on. And it was extremely agonizing. I mean it's
20 something like you read what happened to Christ of
21 2,000 years ago and --

22 DICK: Well, now hold it. Listen. You know,
23 that's not -- let's don't talk about what happened to
24 Christ in the same breath with David Koresh, okay? You
25 know, that's -- he didn't come out for his own reasons,
okay? Now you can put it down to prayer. You can put

1 | it down to God speaking to David, whatever it is you
2 | want to put it down to.

3 | However, the fact of the matter is he gave us
4 | his word, and he reneged on that word as a flat-out
5 | lie. And there's no other way to characterize it. It
6 | is a flat-out lie. In fact, David told me as much when
7 | I asked him that very same question while I was talking
8 | to him on the first --

9 | STEVE: When you say he told you as much,
10 | what do you mean? What did he tell you?

11 | DICK: That, that he, that he flat-out did
12 | not keep his word. He broke his word. He broke his
13 | promise.

14 | STEVE: He, he said that to you?

15 | DICK: Absolutely.

16 | STEVE: I've never heard him say anything
17 | like that.

18 | DICK: Well, I'll be happy to play it for
19 | you. I would be happy to play it for you.

20 | STEVE: Please do. Please do.

21 | DICK: He did. He admitted that he did not
22 | keep his word.

23 | STEVE: I've never heard that before.

24 | DICK: Well --

25 | STEVE: I wish you would play it for me.

 DICK: You're not -- are you, are you calling

1 | me a liar? I don't think you are. You're just not
2 | sure that you heard it.

3 | STEVE: No, no. You said you, you just said
4 | you would play it for me.

5 | DICK: Well, I, I have it. Whether I will
6 | play it or not I don't know. But I'm telling you that
7 | he admitted to me in the conversations that he in fact
8 | did not follow up on his word. That is only one
9 | occasion. All right?

10 | This man is a master manipulator. He does
11 | things in there because he feels that he can control
12 | what happens in this situation to, to his benefit. You
13 | think we don't understand that? I mean you're not
14 | dealing with --

15 | STEVE: I believe you --

16 | DICK: -- rookies here.

17 | STEVE: No, no. I know that. And I believe
18 | you believe that, Dick. I believe that. And I think
19 | that from your vantage point that's the way it does
20 | seem from your vantage point.

21 | DICK: Yeah, it certainly does seem from my
22 | vantage point.

23 | STEVE: But that's what I mean. If you were
24 | a listener you would, you'd get to hear something. And
25 | then you could evaluate and judge it. But you'll never
 | be able to.

1 DICK: I have listened to it, and I have
2 talked to him specifically --

3 STEVE: You really haven't, Dick. Come on.
4 You really haven't.

5 DICK: Steve, listen. You know what? You
6 can say that I haven't listened. But we have listened,
7 more than myself, many of us have listened for days on
8 end to this man.

9 STEVE: Well, okay. One thing that I'm
10 interested in is that conversation between himself and
11 Clint. Listen to that. Listen to the, the dialogue
12 back and forth. And give me a reaction to it.
13 Seriously. I'd, I'd really be interested. Tell me
14 where the manipulative parts or points are about the
15 conversation or what you detected --

16 DICK: No, I'm not talking about that
17 particular -- I didn't listen to it, okay?

18 STEVE: No, no. But, but that's what
19 David -- every time he talks to any one of you people
20 that's what he wants to do. How, how do you see he --
21 do you see he is using the Bible there even to -- I
22 mean why do you think he spends so much time talking
23 with you about those issues? Can you sincerity in what
24 he's doing? Do you -- how do you see that like that
25 whole conversation?

DICK: I just told you how I saw it. Not

1 | that conversation. I'm talking about other
2 | conversations we've had.

3 | STEVE: But I wish you would listen to it so
4 | you'd give --

5 | DICK: Okay, let me talk --

6 | STEVE: -- it might help me to get --

7 | DICK: -- let's talk about other
8 | conversations.

9 | STEVE: Okay.

10 | DICK: I see him as a manipulator. He
11 | manipulates people the way he's manipulated people
12 | inside there.

13 | STEVE: Well, what do you think he's gaining
14 | by it? I mean if you look at this, look at this lousy
15 | building --

16 | DICK: I'll tell you what he's gaining. He's
17 | keeping himself out of jail.

18 | STEVE: Look at this --

19 | DICK: Clearly.

20 | STEVE: -- no, no. I'm talking before that
21 | even. I'm not -- he -- where's the brand-new
22 | automobiles? Where's all the -- where's the wardrobe?
23 | Where's the beautiful building?

24 | DICK: It's called one -- it's called --

25 | STEVE: Paul Fatta (phonetic sp.) --

 DICK: -- power. Power.

1 STEVE: Paul Fatta offered him --

2 DICK: P-O-W-E-R.

3 STEVE: Paul Fatta offered him in Hawaii his
4 business which grossed \$6 million a year.

5 DICK: Fine.

6 STEVE: And he turned him down.

7 DICK: Hey, a lot of people offered a lot of
8 things --

9 STEVE: Why do -- okay. What, what do you --

10 DICK: -- to Jim Jones too, didn't they?

11 STEVE: -- think he -- what -- where are his
12 motives? What do you think he's after? What does he
13 want?

14 DICK: Power. The ability to --

15 STEVE: Power?

16 DICK: -- the ability to --

17 STEVE: When he has sent people out of here
18 over the last 6, 7 years that wanted to be part of
19 this, and he sent them out?

20 DICK: Well, maybe they were backsliders just
21 like Oliver and some of those fellows that you sent out
22 of there were. Okay? Maybe they didn't --

23 STEVE: Right from day one I mean this, this
24 whole -- if he wants power, what a strange way to --
25 he's got the ability to be a more charismatic preacher
than Jimmy Swaggert or Falwell or any of these guys.

1 If Swaggert can bring in \$250 million a year by
2 preaching the Lord Jesus and all that they do. I mean
3 this guy here, he could leave out all these stumbling
4 blocks that are found in the Bible and just hit on the
5 nice little appealing things and, and I could see that
6 about the power thing. I'm here to tell you, Dick,
7 it's not true.

8 DICK: What --

9 STEVE: I wish you could sit -- I wish
10 seriously you --

11 DICK: His agenda is one of --

12 STEVE: -- could sit down in a room with just
13 the both of you --

14 DICK: I'll be happy to.

15 STEVE: -- and, and ask him anything you want
16 and, and --

17 DICK: I'll spend time over with him in the
18 jail.

19 STEVE: -- analyze, analyze morning, noon and
20 night. Ask him all you want. Put him through any kind
21 of a test.

22 DICK: I'll be happy to. Send -- we'll go
23 over to jail, and I'll sit outside. He sit inside.
24 We'll go over this thing, you know, just as, as long as
25 you, you know, the two of you want to frankly. I'll be
happy to do that. The point of the matter is here you

1 | got to come out of there and get it done before we can
2 | move on.

3 | And you know, we can talk about these
4 | religious convictions from here until doomsday. It
5 | isn't going to, it isn't going to get the problem
6 | resolved. You've got to come out --

7 | STEVE: It is in the mind --

8 | DICK: -- and get it resolved.

9 | STEVE: -- of God, Dick. That's the whole
10 | thing.

11 | DICK: Listen --

12 | STEVE: God's got a will, and that's the will
13 | that I've understood. And it's laid out very clearly
14 | in the Bible. And that's what I'm following. And
15 | more --

16 | DICK: Steve, I'm sitting here looking --

17 | STEVE: Listen.

18 | DICK: -- at your picture and you know what?
19 | You can -- you know what would we call this if you
20 | weren't --

21 | STEVE: Wait. Can I ask you where you ever
22 | got the picture in the first place?

23 | DICK: Oh, I've got, I've got a good picture
24 | here of you and Judy and --

25 | STEVE: No, where did it come from? I'm
curious.

1 DICK: You know what? I don't know where it
2 came from. I frankly do not know. But we, we've got a
3 picture here with Judy leaning on your, on your left
4 shoulder, and you've got your tie on and your short
5 hair --

6 STEVE: Yeah, I know. You went through that
7 with me before.

8 DICK: You look, you look -- and I'm trying
9 to make some sense out of what you're saying. And I'm
10 listening to a guy that's obviously got some
11 intelligence, some belief in God, a decent education --

12 STEVE: Who knows. Maybe I don't.

13 DICK: -- and you're sucked in by this guy?
14 I mean my God. That doesn't -- I don't understand
15 that.

16 STEVE: I understand what you're raising as
17 questions. I really do. Because I've gone through the
18 same thing with so many other people that were caught
19 up in the Moonies, the Hare Krishnas, the Children of
20 God, the this, the that. And don't you think that all
21 through my life in comparing religion and philosophies
22 that red flags in everybody's brain go up.

23 When I first met him I -- listen to what I
24 had to say to Rick today. I think it's Rick 2. And
25 really got into details about like how and why and what
I did go through. Because I did. It's like when I

1 first started listening and so forth it's like well,
2 what is this?

3 DICK: You know, if you were truthfully with
4 me, if you were truthful right here and now, you would
5 flat tell me that you wish you'd never, ever heard of
6 David Koresh.

7 STEVE: Oh, I have carnally --

8 DICK: Carnally. Listen, don't say carnally.

9 STEVE: No, no. But I'm a spiritual being
10 also. I really believe that, Dick. I mean there's --

11 DICK: You got involved with this guy that's
12 going to --

13 STEVE: If you believe in the Bible -- Dick,
14 if you --

15 DICK: -- and have ruined a great deal of
16 your life.

17 STEVE: No, listen. All of Christians
18 believe that, that we're both a flesh, a carnal being
19 and a spiritual being.

20 DICK: I understand.

21 STEVE: Okay, that's the vein I'm talking
22 about. But no, I would agree --

23 DICK: Well, your carnal self is the one
24 that's going to have to go to court to answer to these
25 charges.

STEVE: Truly. Truly.

1 DICK: Not your spiritual self, okay? And
2 that is what we're talking about here. We're talking
3 about your carnal self if that's the way you want to
4 put it.

5 STEVE: I understand. And I, and I agree.

6 DICK: And you, you -- if you were truthful
7 with me, you'd say boy, I wish Judy and I had never
8 heard of that guy.

9 STEVE: Oh, I've -- many times -- when day by
10 day as every day is a new day for making decisions as
11 to where one's at, where they're going.

12 DICK: Be truthful with me. Don't you wish
13 you'd never, ever heard of this man?

14 STEVE: There are times even --

15 DICK: There are times every day.

16 STEVE: -- there are times -- oh, yeah. No
17 question about that.

18 DICK: Every day.

19 STEVE: No question. Because once I'd been,
20 seen and I'm still convicted, it's like I can't walk
21 away.

22 DICK: Well, you could. All you have to do
23 is open the door and walk out of there. But the fact
24 the matter remains --

25 STEVE: But I fear the unknown power --

 DICK: You fear. Exactly.

1 STEVE: -- that I've found in the Bible.

2 DICK: You fear. That's exactly. Fear --

3 STEVE: I fear God.

4 DICK: -- and fear is something we all have,
5 okay?

6 STEVE: Revelation 14 says --

7 DICK: We all fear God.

8 STEVE: -- the first angel's message is fear
9 God and give him glory. For the hour of his
10 judgment --

11 DICK: Fine.

12 STEVE: -- has come.

13 DICK: But that's not the fear we're talking
14 about.

15 STEVE: God sat in judgment which all of his
16 word was going to come to pass was laid out by the
17 prophets. And I fear what's coming upon this world.
18 You know, if it says in Isaiah that God can have you
19 live for 100 years and you can't die. But in a, in a
20 terrible condition of this world where there's no
21 intercession of the Holy Spirit or good angels, men are
22 going to do to men what they want, and there's going to
23 be nothing one can do about it. That's what I fear,
24 Dick.

25 DICK: Well, there is something you can do
about this.

1 STEVE: There, there is going to be -- those
2 things that are right around the corner. That is a
3 reality as I see it. You see the reality of going into
4 the system, getting involved in the system and I do
5 too. I know that that's something that is very real --

6 DICK: You're putting it off at a day at a
7 time.

8 STEVE: Pardon?

9 DICK: You're, you're putting it off a day at
10 a time.

11 STEVE: You'll get to see what I'm all about
12 one day. You're going to see that that's --

13 DICK: Well, I'm not going to be here for
14 that, for that period of time. Because frankly --

15 STEVE: Oh, you will be. Everybody is going
16 to get to stand one day. All those that have died,
17 they're going to come up --

18 DICK: Well, I'm talking about here.

19 STEVE: I'm talking about the resurrections
20 and how everybody stands in the judgment.

21 DICK: Steve, nobody's --

22 STEVE: Whether bad or good --

23 DICK: -- nobody's going to, nobody's going
24 to quarrel with that. But you're talking about your
25 coming out --

 STEVE: Well, but that's what, that's what I

1 face every day though, Dick. That's the, that's the
2 first cause. That's the first principle.

3 DICK: Have you got, have you got chapter 1
4 edited yet?

5 STEVE: Chapter 1.

6 DICK: The first Seal.

7 STEVE: Does he have?

8 DICK: Has he --

9 STEVE: I don't even know because --

10 DICK: No, see -- you know, I'll bet you 5
11 bucks, and you'll have to come out to, to get this
12 resolved --

13 STEVE: David just came down. He just, he
14 just came --

15 DICK: I'll bet he hasn't written 10 words.

16 STEVE: He, he says I bet he hasn't written
17 10 words. He just came into the picture just now.

18 DICK: Great. I'm happy for him. Listen.

19 STEVE: On the first Seal.

20 DICK: Yeah, he's on the first Seal now?

21 (David's voice in background not discernible.) I
22 thought you guys had gotten, you know, through the
23 fifth Seal or some such thing.

24 STEVE: No. No, not at all.

25 DICK: No, where are you now --

STEVE: That was never stated.

1 DICK: -- the first Seal?

2 STEVE: No, here's what happened.

3 DICK: I mean listen. You know, truthfully
4 where are you?

5 STEVE: Clint, Clint is the one --

6 DICK: Pardon me?

7 STEVE: Clint was the one that asked
8 questions about --

9 DICK: No --

10 STEVE: -- where in regards are we in
11 relation to time with the Seals? Like what, what Seal
12 are we in.

13 DICK: No, I understand that.

14 STEVE: Okay, okay.

15 DICK: We've talked about that. But I was --

16 STEVE: Right.

17 DICK: -- talking about the manuscript, the
18 writings. What Seal are you currently reviewing and
19 writing?

20 STEVE: I believe he's still working on the
21 first.

22 DICK: He's working on the first Seal.

23 STEVE: Yes. (David's voice in background
24 not discernible.)

25 DICK: How long --

STEVE: Oh, he says no. He said he's on the

1 second.

2 DICK: He's on the second Seal.

3 STEVE: Yeah.

4 DICK: Has the first Seal been edited yet? I
5 mean is this --

6 STEVE: No, it hasn't.

7 DICK: -- a rough draft?

8 STEVE: Not that I'm aware of. Because I,
9 I'm the one that is probably going to be doing that.
10 And that's not been done.

11 DICK: Well, can you give me any kind of time
12 frame at all?

13 STEVE: Well, from, from my part? From my
14 part it will take no time at all.

15 DICK: No, I'm not talking about your part.
16 I'm talking about David's part.

17 STEVE: I -- he can't give you -- I really --
18 can you give him a time frame as to when the Seven
19 Seals will be finally in manuscript form? (David's
20 voice in background not discernible.) Considering the
21 Bradleys running into the building and all the --

22 DICK: They may never get done, right?

23 STEVE: Listen. With all those -- no, it, it
24 slows the process. No, he's doing it, Dick. But you
25 know the noises and all that, you know, of course, it's
harder to concentrate. It's harder to get the very

1 | language down on paper. It, it makes --

2 | DICK: Steve, Steve, listen. Do you think
3 | you're talking to some kind of a dummy? I mean let me
4 | ask -- answer me truthfully.

5 | STEVE: Dick, Dick thinks I'm, Dick thinks
6 | I'm treating him as a dummy and as he, he -- really,
7 | let me put it in words. You think I'm insulting you,
8 | right? I mean he's implying I'm insulting him.

9 | DICK: You, you are insulting me. You
10 | absolutely are insulting me when you offer up that kind
11 | of rhetoric. You are insulting me, okay? I take that
12 | as an insult.

13 | STEVE: I don't know. He's wondering why
14 | can't we reach you, Dick, I mean from our realm? Why?
15 | I mean I wish you could have listened to the
16 | conversation with Clint. Seriously. And give me your
17 | honest evaluation, opinion. That's what we're all
18 | about. That's totally why we're here. Whether you
19 | believe in God or not Dick --

20 | DICK: Now, hold it. Let's don't get in -- I
21 | told you I believe in God, okay.

22 | STEVE: Well, no, no, no. But do you -- I
23 | can tell you for a fact between Dave and myself, every
24 | individual here, we want to see you live forever. I
25 | don't want any harm to you, to me. I want to see you
 | have quality life that never ends. There's no reason

1 | why it should.

2 | DICK: Well, I'm, I'm --

3 | STEVE: That's what I'm into number one.

4 | DICK: -- truthfully I'm, I'm happy, I'm glad
5 | that you think that way. Because I appreciate that.
6 | But, but let's, you know, we've got other issues that
7 | we have to handle, Steve.

8 | STEVE: Can I -- do you, do you want to talk
9 | with David or --

10 | DICK: Put him on. I'll be happy to talk to
11 | him.

12 | STEVE: -- David, you want to talk with him?
13 | He'd be happy to talk with you. But try to give him at
14 | least a little time to, to answer and develop something
15 | there, Dick. At -- try to understand why I'm here.

16 | DICK: I understand why you're there. I've
17 | heard you tell me over and over again why you're there.
18 | My question to you is when are you coming out of there?

19 | STEVE: I know. And I, I can't give you a
20 | definitive answer just yet.

21 | DICK: (Laughing.) I know. You have never
22 | given us a definitive answer.

23 | STEVE: Well, no. Because I, I don't want to
24 | be lying to you. I don't want to be, you know, pulling
25 | you on. I've never made -- I've never come right out
and said this or that, because I feel that if I do I've

1 got to do it (indiscernible) --

2 DICK: That's because you can't make a
3 decision on your own. You, you're not in a position --

4 STEVE: No, I can make a -- no, I make a --
5 listen. Dick, am I not making a decision every day
6 just by being here when the easier thing for me to do
7 is to come out. That is the easier thing. I mean
8 listen to what I had to say to Rick today. Please do
9 that. And you'll understand a little bit more about me
10 and why I'm still here.

11 DICK: Well, I understand enough about you to
12 understand why you're there.

13 STEVE: I don't think you really do. I don't
14 think you do.

15 DICK: Steve, I understand fully why you're
16 there. I mean I really do.

17 STEVE: Well, here, here's David. Hang on.
18 Here he is. (Steve's voice in background not
19 discernible.)

20 DAVID: Hello, Dick.

21 DICK: David, how are you?

22 DAVID: How you doing?

23 DICK: Been a while since I've talked to you.

24 DAVID: Did you get a good vacation?

25 DICK: Well, no, in fact it wasn't a
vacation. I got some things handled that needed to be

1 | handled in my personal life. And my understanding was
2 | that after the, the Easter season there that you folks
3 | would be considering coming out. And so I came back
4 | to, to be here when that happened. But unfortunately,
5 | I got here a little early I guess.

6 | DAVID: (Chuckling.)

7 | DICK: It appears at least, doesn't it?

8 | DAVID: Oh, yeah.

9 | DICK: Huh?

10 | DAVID: Yeah.

11 | DICK: How you working -- you doing well on
12 | your manuscript? Are you, you moving along on that?

13 | DAVID: Yeah. The, the first one's been
14 | completed, and as Steve was trying to tell you, you
15 | know, that so many of us seem to, to be totally
16 | detached from the facts of the, of the Scripture. I
17 | mean the extreme persecutions that were received by
18 | Christ 2,000 years ago. I mean everybody thought he
19 | was a nut. Everybody.

20 | And no matter what he did -- they thought the
21 | miracles were of the devil. You know, he doeth the
22 | works by the power of Beelzebul -- I mean they were,
23 | they were directed then. I mean they were in a
24 | situation where they had to make decisions right then
25 | and there. And most of them didn't have time to. Most
 | of them had their lives to attend to. They were

1 wrapped up. They had to pay taxes to Rome.

2 (Unidentified voices in background not discernible.)

3 Here.

4 DICK: What do I hear in the background?

5 DAVID: Yeah, they're -- wait a second.

6 (Unidentified voices in background not discernible.)

7 Sledgehammer's brother. The, the generals are
8 serenading us I believe.

9 DICK: (Laughing.) The generals are
10 serenading you, huh?

11 DAVID: Yeah, they're doing their own
12 personal announcements now of all their strange and
13 unique sounds.

14 DICK: Really?

15 DAVID: Yeah --

16 DICK: I can hear part of them, but I can't
17 hear them clearly.

18 DAVID: He just got through saying well,
19 hello all you people out there, he says this is --
20 anyway some -- they're trying to make some kind of
21 radio station or something or -- and he goes we thought
22 you might have a lot of sleep in there, so this is
23 Sledgehammer's brother, you know.

24 DICK: (Laughing.)

25 DAVID: You know, there's a sledgehammer --

DICK: Well, I'm glad that you can maintain

1 | your sense of humor in there.

2 | DAVID: Well, what are you going to do, cry?

3 | (Laughing.)

4 | DICK: Well, you're right. There's not much
5 | you can do about it.

6 | DAVID: I mean when you got the truth, you've
7 | got something that is always consistent. It's, it's
8 | foundation. It's, it's as solid as a rock and
9 | you've --

10 | DICK: David, let me tell you something. You
11 | know what? You missed your calling. You would have
12 | been one hell of a salesman, you know that? I mean you
13 | really would have been a great salesman. You -- I know
14 | it's, it's a carnal interest. But you could have been
15 | a wealthy man, you know that? Because you have got a
16 | gift of what some people might call bullshit. But I'm
17 | not going to say that. I'm going to say you have a
18 | gift of gab that is probably as good as anybody I've
19 | ever heard. And that, you know, and I've been doing
20 | this job for a long time.

21 | DAVID: Um-hum.

22 | DICK: You are very good at what you do.
23 | However, you know, my belief is that what you do is, is
24 | a very deliberate thing and is a very manipulative.
25 | You know, it really is. I mean let's face it. You're
 | good at what you do, aren't you? I mean will you admit

1 | to that?

2 | DAVID: Well, being -- if you'll go and check
3 | my records all through my school days, being a child
4 | basically with forms of dyslexia, learning
5 | disabilities, not knowing how to read --

6 | DICK: You compensated --

7 | DAVID: -- failing, failing in 9th grade,
8 | quitting school in 9th grade --

9 | DICK: Because of what? Lack of motivation
10 | though? I mean is that probably --

11 | DAVID: No, no. What it was is that I, I had
12 | a stuttering problem. I had a speech problem.

13 | DICK: But you overcame all of that.

14 | DAVID: Well, in 1985 everything just turned
15 | upside down. And when the knowledge and information
16 | was thoroughly given to me then the ability and talent
17 | to deal with my peers also was given to me.

18 | In other words, I never lost the ability to
19 | talk to the common man, but at the same time I had to
20 | confront theologians and men of great learning and
21 | great education. So seeing that they themselves had
22 | professionally learned to evade answers when
23 | questioned, I had to also meet them to bring them back
24 | around to the questions. Because you know, basically
25 | what's a negotiator? You know, he's a professional
 | well, you tell me.

1 DICK: Well, we're here to try to work with
2 you obviously. And --

3 DAVID: Yes.

4 DICK: -- we talk back and forth and try to
5 influence one another to, to act in an appropriate
6 manner. I mean --

7 DAVID: Right.

8 DICK: -- that's basically what we're doing,
9 trying to iron out this, this impasse. And you're
10 trying to use your, your ways and your powers and your
11 skills in the same fashion that we're trying to, to use
12 our skills in order to influence you to come out of
13 there on a timely basis. And it --

14 DAVID: Right.

15 DICK: -- and you have elected not to come
16 out and --

17 DAVID: Well, that's not the case. See what
18 you're, what you're stating, Dick, is that I have no
19 connection whatsoever to God.

20 DICK: No, I'm not saying that.

21 DAVID: Now wait. That's exactly what you're
22 saying, because if I'm revealing the Seven Seals either
23 I'm giving my opinions on it or it's by the direct
24 spirit that revealed the seals to the prophets from
25 Moses to Malachi. Now remember, the Bible is a very
peculiar and strange book. And there are men who have

1 | made multi-billions on it.

2 | DICK: And they continue to do so today.

3 | DAVID: And that's going to stop. That's
4 | going to come to an end.

5 | DICK: Well, I mean you've used it to your
6 | advantage in some respects --

7 | DAVID: Never have. Never have.

8 | DICK: You haven't.

9 | DAVID: On the contrary, you'll find there
10 | are many, many people that I have turned away, and I
11 | never have used any form of means or money and
12 | promotion of this message. The individuals who receive
13 | the knowledge of the Seven Seals are peoples who become
14 | partakers of the work. When it says in Revelation 22,
15 | Christ says I come. My reward is with me to give to
16 | every man, it means just that.

17 | God the Father gives to Christ a Seal. A
18 | book. There's knowledge in that book. Christ comes to
19 | give it to men. That's how the 144,000 are sealed.

20 | DICK: Yeah, but David why, why do people
21 | disagree with your interpretation of the Seals?

22 | DAVID: No one ever has.

23 | DICK: They haven't?

24 | DAVID: No.

25 | DICK: Well, they have, they've indicated
that to me personally.

1 DAVID: Who?

2 DICK: Well, I'm not going to tell you who at
3 this point --

4 DAVID: Well --

5 DICK: -- in time but --

6 DAVID: -- there's no way --

7 DICK: -- I'm going to tell you that I have
8 been in touch with religious leaders, religious people
9 of note who tell me that your interpretation of the
10 Seven Seals is certainly different than anybody else's
11 interpretation of the Seven Seals.

12 DAVID: Well, that's true. But Dick, the
13 main key point is, is that when someone is directed to
14 Psalms 45 and then shown the first Seal, it's so
15 obvious, no one's ever contradicted me. No one has
16 ever tried to state that Psalms 45 is not the first
17 Seal.

18 DICK: David, but would you accept anybody
19 else's interpretation? I, I don't think so. I --

20 DAVID: Well --

21 DICK: -- I would doubt that.

22 DAVID: Well, now here's the thing. In my
23 experience with most theologians and most scholars, we
24 always try to make the bridge on what we do agree on.
25 That's the Christian thing anyway.

 They agree that God sits on a throne. And

1 | they agree that God has a book in his right hand. And
2 | they agree that it's sealed. They also agree that it's
3 | a revelation of Christ that God gives to him. They
4 | always agree on that, because that's the obvious. Some
5 | may not have looked at it that way before, but when
6 | it's presented in that light sure enough Revelation 4
7 | and 5 clearly reveals that.

8 | So the question remains then is, is this an
9 | event which must be hereafter? And of course that's
10 | also -- no one disagrees on it.

11 | DICK: Nobody will disagree with that.

12 | DAVID: Okay. Now what happens next is in
13 | Revelation 10 the next point we bring to their
14 | attention is that when the mighty angel comes down with
15 | this little book opened, and the seven thunders are
16 | uttered, then we realize that according to Scripture
17 | when there's time no longer this mystery of God is to
18 | be finished. But the context states is to be finished
19 | as God has declared to his servants, the prophets. So
20 | this is where we get our foundation to --

21 | DICK: I understand. And no theologian's
22 | going to argue with that particular point. However,
23 | what, what the argument is I think is that at some
24 | point in time that's all going to come to, to pass.

25 | DAVID: Exactly.

 DICK: But how do we deal, David, how do we

1 | deal with the present?

2 | DAVID: Well, the present since 1985 has been
3 | after the theologians and scholars and ministers and
4 | teachers do agree upon these points, then what happens
5 | is I bring them to 22 where it says, I come, my reward
6 | is with me.

7 | And I ask them the question what is this
8 | reward that Christ brings with him? And of course, the
9 | most general answer is well, heaven, power, glory,
10 | eternal life, you know. And I go well, that's true.
11 | But did not the Father give him a book that no other
12 | person in heaven or earth was worthy to receive? And
13 | they go huh.

14 | I go this is exactly what Isaiah says.
15 | Isaiah says in chapter 40 the Lord will come with a
16 | strong hand. His reward will be with him and his work
17 | before him. He'll gather his flock like a shepherd. I
18 | also state when Christ comes will he not gather his
19 | flock like a shepherd? Will he not gather all those
20 | that belong to him together into one?

21 | Well, then I ask them the question about how
22 | are the 144,000 sealed. Well, Revelation 7 says
23 | they're sealed by the angel from the east with the seal
24 | of the living God. Then the question goes back to
25 | well, who is the living God? The one on the throne?
Yes. The one had the book in his hand that was sealed?

1 Yes. The one who gives it to Christ? Yes. Okay. So
2 with all these points of reasoning, then we lay a
3 foundation to be able to say well, where in the
4 prophecies is the first Seal found?

5 It's kind of like, you know, when you're
6 watching TV there will be a preview of a movie that's
7 fixing to come up, you know? And they'll just show you
8 a few action-packed scenes, right?

9 DICK: Okay.

10 DAVID: Before the main movie comes. Well,
11 so also is the Seals.

2 DAVID: -- miniatures of the more exposed
3 version what's contained in the prophetic writings.
4 Now this is something that scholars go well, well, show
5 me. Good. That's where I come in. That's where my
6 work is.

7 So for instance, in the first seal the man on
8 the white horse with the crown and a bow we first go to
9 Psalms 45 which brings to view this very prophecy and
10 gives you the details. Then it talks about the
11 marriage of the Lamb. Christ and the marriage
12 divine --

13 DICK: Well, tell me, David, how does this
14 event fit into this thing. Let's talk about the carnal
15 self, not the spiritual self. Let's talk about the
16 present.

17 DAVID: The reality.

18 DICK: The reality.

19 DAVID: Okay.

20 DICK: What is going on today here.

21 DAVID: Okay.

22 DICK: And how that's going to be resolved.
23 Is it not true that you're somewhat at least at this
24 point in your life answerable to man's law --

25 DAVID: Oh, definitely.

DICK: -- as well as God's law.

1 DAVID: Definitely.

2 DICK: Doesn't that have to be an issue
3 that's dealt with --

4 DAVID: Well, it is. See I am definitely in
5 the world. No doubt about it.

6 DICK: Okay, then --

7 DAVID: Okay. Let me explain how this all
8 got started now, see. The, the situation we're now
9 dealing with is something that began actually back in
10 1985 or the first part of '86. When I came back from
11 Israel and started teaching these things, what happened
12 was is that most of all the people that I began to show
13 it to, they rejoiced. I mean it was like wow.

14 I mean there had always been interpretations
15 of the seals. Every theological department in the
16 world has somewhat an interpretation or theory on the
17 seals. But because scholars will always clearly state
18 that they do not readily agree on all points pertaining
19 to the seals, they still consider it as a mystery. And
20 they'll tell you well, this is still a mystery. We're
21 not really sure pertaining to the actual meaning of the
22 seals.

23 DICK: Okay, but in the real world, in 1985
24 and in that time frame, you had to deal with issues
25 like George Roden (phonetic sp.) and those kinds of
things.

1 DAVID: Not in, not, not in '85 in
2 particular.

3 DICK: Well, but I mean that's when, when,
4 you know, when you came back and when there was some,
5 you know, George thought that he was going to be head
6 of the Davidians and you thought that, you know, that
7 you were in a position to do that --

8 DAVID: Well --

9 DICK: -- and this whole thing started that
10 actually culminated in --

11 DAVID: That's not what it started on. See
12 Dick, that's not how it started.

13 DICK: Well, I mean there was that concern.
14 When you, when you first came up here and hooked up
15 with Lois Roden, okay, and after the death of, you
16 know, the original founder, I mean this whole thing had
17 to flow from those events, did it not?

18 DAVID: No, it's totally separate.

19 DICK: Well --

20 DAVID: See the opening of the seals is,
21 is -- okay, let me explain again. In the 15th century,
22 there was a Roman Catholic named Martin Luther. Now
23 Martin Luther began to study, and he found something in
24 Scripture that was different than what the papacy was
25 teaching. So he began to study more thoroughly, and by
1530 he had several documents proving that from

1 Scripture the papacy was not established thoroughly on
2 the rise of the apostles.

3 DICK: Okay, so what's the analogy with you?

4 DAVID: So he began to protest.

5 DICK: Tell me the analogy, the analogy here
6 is that --

7 DAVID: Well, I'm building up to it now.

8 DICK: Okay.

9 DAVID: Dick, see I'm building up. And so he
10 began to reform the Catholic church. Of course, they
11 called him a heretic and they prescribed him and --

12 DICK: As you began to reform the Davidians.

13 DAVID: Well, now let me, let me build up.

14 And then when the Lutheran Protestant movement began,
15 people heard his points, and they agreed with him. And
16 then there was basically a war that started. Well,
17 then came from the Lutherans came the Presbyterian.
18 Then from the Presbyterian came the Methodist. From
19 the Methodist came the Baptist and the, you know. And
20 the, and the uncovering of truth because of the
21 widespread availability of Scripture as printing began
22 to start and men began to hunger and thirst for the
23 knowledge of Scripture themselves, when they wanted to
24 search themselves so that they would not be under the
25 theories of men pertaining to God. Then what happened
was it began to progress. And it's been progressing

1 | ever since.

2 | Well, in the 1800s a phenomenal message came
3 | by a man named William Miller who was the first founder
4 | to teach the second coming of Christ. Before the
5 | 1800s, no one really taught the second coming of
6 | Christ. They taught when you died you went to heaven
7 | or hell or purgatory, and that was it. Well, he missed
8 | understood prophecy, but he got the portion of Christ
9 | coming correct. And so by 1844 when Christ didn't
10 | come, they were disappointed. And so those who
11 | continued to study found out the sabbath was Saturday,
12 | and they have continually progressed.

13 | In 1929, there was a man named Victor Hattas
14 | (phonetic sp.) who saw in Scriptures prophecies about
15 | the last days, about a kingdom being set up, the
16 | restoration of Israel. People told him he was crazy.
17 | They said Israel will never become a nation again. He
18 | says on the contrary, the Bible says opposite. Which
19 | it did. In 1948, it became a nation. It became its
20 | own nation.

21 | Well, in the '60s, Benjamin Roden which was
22 | Lois Roden's husband.

23 | DICK: Um-hum.

24 | DAVID: He saw in Scripture that the feast
25 | days were a part of the sabbath just like the seventh
day sabbath. Of course, he was trying to convince the

1 Adventists, and they kept saying no. And it seems like
2 every step that people make forward in truth is always
3 met by opposition. Just like with Christ trying to
4 reform the Jews. It's just one of those hard things
5 that somebody has to take the initiative to stand out
6 and honk a horn.

7 Well, the people in 1977, Sister Roden, she
8 said she had a vision about an angel who came to her
9 window, and the angel was female. Then she had these
10 dreams, and she started teaching that God's image is
11 male and female based on the story of creation. God
12 said let's make men in our image. And God made male
13 and female. So she began to explain about being born
14 again and the nature of Christ and, and femininity is
15 also a part of the godhead and, and this kind of stuff.
16 Kind of like ERA, equals right for religious women.
17 Okay.

18 Well, in '81, I came on the scene, and I came
19 to observe and to listen. Because on all the place of
20 the United States of America there's very few groups
21 who make their religion to study and to learn and to
22 search. Okay.

23 So I worked here in '81, '82, '83, and in '84
24 what happened is I started presenting a subject called
25 the serpent's root based on Isaiah 14. Well, George
Roden when he saw people coming to listen and he saw

1 | his father also listening, he started a great big
2 | shebang. Making up stuff, accusing things. Because
3 | he, he did this before with his father.

4 | DICK: Which culminated in the shooting and
5 | exchange and the digging up and --

6 | DAVID: Absolutely, absolutely not. So what
7 | happened was is that finally I left. And I went back
8 | to Dallas. Okay? And so see what I used to do, I used
9 | to go and work and, and gather money and stuff. And
10 | then I'd, I'd start, you know, teaching again.

11 | So what happened was is that as I was gone,
12 | George kicked the old people off the property with his
13 | semi-automatic Uzi.

14 | DICK: Um-hum.

15 | DAVID: But of course, George had always had
16 | mental problems anyway. This is something that he had
17 | been, actually a court order was put against him back in
18 | 1978. Yeah, '78. So he already had a restraining
19 | order on him. Well, when he did this he was supposed
20 | to go to jail.

21 | But his mother asked the people if they would
22 | give her time to work with him so he wouldn't have to
23 | go to jail. Well, of course, the Christians being that
24 | they were, they did so. But in turn, it violated the
25 | restraining order. So once it was known that they had
permitted George to come back on the property, no one

1 | could get him off. So he would go in and, and do mean
2 | things and stuff and just kick the older people off.

3 | Well, I came back into the picture, and we
4 | got a house off of Fourth Street on Herring Street,
5 | Herring and Fourth Street in Waco and put, well, matter
6 | of fact it was like thirty something people in one
7 | large house. Now that made us look stupid. Okay.

8 | Then what comes, what comes to pass is that I
9 | finally got some property in Palestine, and we started
10 | moving the people down to Palestine. And all along,
11 | we're trying to work in a way to get George taken back
12 | off the property. Even his mother was trying to, to
13 | get that done.

14 | Well, it finally happened that George began
15 | to start digging up corpses out of the cemetery.

16 | DICK: Right --

17 | DAVID: At the front of the property here.

18 | DICK: I'm familiar with that.

19 | DAVID: Okay.

20 | DICK: And that whole process. But so
21 | that -- I understand that, David.

22 | DAVID: So I went to the Sheriff's
23 | Department.

24 | DICK: I understand.

25 | DAVID: Talked to Sheriff Dickerson.

 DICK: And you wanted to get a photo and talk

1 to the prosecutor --

2 DAVID: And no, he told me to get pictures,
3 because he couldn't go out there just on hearsay.

4 DICK: Um-hum.

5 DAVID: Of which I hired someone who got the
6 pictures. We bought the pictures back to him, me and
7 David Jones. And he looked at the pictures. He looked
8 kind of concerned and worried. And he says well,
9 there's no bones here. Now I -- what do you mean no
10 bones? You can clearly see that it was a casket, one
11 that had been dug up. It was in the church.

12 DICK: Um-hum.

13 DAVID: Well, so he says I got to have
14 pictures of bones. I said well, I'll go out there and
15 get pictures of it myself then. And as we were walking
16 out, Dickerson says now boys, be careful. There's some
17 dangerous customers out there. And he looked real
18 serious like he knew something.

19 And things had not been working out since the
20 beginning anyway with the Sheriff's Department, because
21 they're supposed to check into that stuff. Especially
22 corpse abuse.

23 DICK: Um-hum.

24 DAVID: Well, so then that's when we went
25 down here, and we started thinking about well, what did
he mean by this? So that's when we got the plan for

1 diversion. And we went down to Cogdal's (phonetic sp.)
2 down here and, and you know, we bought some, some guns
3 and stuff. You know, I didn't even own a gun until
4 then. I've been raised with firearms but, but you
5 know, for several years I never even had one. You
6 know.

7 DICK: I like the way you say that diversion.
8 I like that --

9 DAVID: That's exactly what it was. You
10 can't have eight men firing that many rounds into the
11 ground when everything did happen and George Roden not
12 being dead. I mean it's just, it was just absolutely
13 obvious.

14 So in the three groups of people that we
15 bound together, two were down at the tank, two were
16 back and the junkyard, and me and two other brothers,
17 we're the ones who climbed up to the church from the
18 front of the property, went in to take the pictures.
19 And what happened? The casket had been moved. George
20 had been tipped off.

21 Well, the dogs started barking so we got out.
22 Not a single shot was fired. No, no confrontation.
23 George was standing there in his trailer house in his
24 underwear looking out the window with a spotlight. We,
25 we crawled down the ditch from the front of the
property all the way down there to that barn. Close to

1 | where the water towers are.

2 | DICK: Um-hum.

3 | DAVID: Okay. So, so no problem. Well, we
4 | stayed out all night that night, and we finally
5 | rendezvoused together and, and we was out there until,
6 | until noon the next day. We sent one guy back, Mark
7 | Wendel back to, to check and, and to call to tell them,
8 | you know, the Sheriff's Department, we were still out
9 | there.

10 | Well, what happened was as we was down by
11 | the, the barn back down here where the guys are at
12 | right now. The, the (indiscernible) black barn.

13 | DICK: Um-hum.

14 | DAVID: We were talking, and we decided well
15 | look, what we can do we're just going to start checking
16 | the houses. The place looked like, like a cyclone hit
17 | it. The, the place was dumpy. The houses had been
18 | kind of torn up real bad. It was junk everywhere. And
19 | you know, most all the people that were here that we
20 | could see had left. And so we went from house to house
21 | one by one.

22 | And then what happened was finally there was
23 | someone in the house. And there was like some -- the
24 | people that were living here were all into drugs. So
25 | we didn't even know that then. We didn't know that
 | they were making methamphetamine out here. We all

1 | discovered that later. All the information we turned
2 | in to the Sheriff's Department. It never came up in
3 | the trial. But they took all of it. All the
4 | documentation, all the needles, all the pornography. A
5 | lot of the pornography we, we burned up afterwards.

6 | But come to find out when George finally came
7 | and confronted, you know, two of the people, he
8 | confronted Stan Silva which had grown up with George in
9 | the earlier days and Floyd Haupman (phonetic sp.). And
10 | he's the one that, that as again he fired the first
11 | shot too. He didn't know there was eight of us. He
12 | just thought there was one or two of us.

13 | And so what happened was he was standing
14 | there right out in the middle of the road. Did anybody
15 | shoot at him? No. Did he drop dead? No. But, but I
16 | mean how many -- they picked up probably, I don't know,
17 | maybe three or four hundred cartridges, you know.
18 | Shotgun shells, .22 shells, 223 shells, you know. And,
19 | and hey, George wasn't hit once. That was not a part
20 | of the plan. But it -- when he heard the firing, he
21 | sure ran like a, like a cowardy (sic) backwards.

22 | DICK: (Chuckling.)

23 | DAVID: You know. I mean you know --

24 | DICK: Well, hey, I tell you what. A lot of
25 | people run when they're shooting at you --

 DAVID: Well, I don't blame them.

1 DICK: I don't either.

2 DAVID: I don't blame them.

3 DICK: I don't either. David --

4 DAVID: And they're burning their britches
5 too.

6 DICK: Well, I understand that. But let, let
7 me ask you something, David, while we're here. I just
8 returned here, okay --

9 DAVID: Uh-huh.

10 DICK: -- a couple days ago. It's my first
11 opportunity to get back on the phone with you. But
12 there's been some talk of this, of the seven seals and
13 your, and your reducing them to some, some form of
14 written word.

15 DAVID: Right.

16 DICK: And what, what are we looking at,
17 David, in terms of time here? I mean let's be truthful
18 now. Let's, let's be truthful with one another. What,
19 what kind of time element we talking about?

20 DAVID: Well, the first, the, the first seal
21 in, in -- okay, okay, truthful. Let's, let's be
22 truthful now. That's a word that you want to use.
23 Let's really, let's really lay that word out like we
24 would peanut butter on bread.

25 DICK: Okay.

DAVID: Okay. The first seal incorporates

1 the Mosaic writings, Deuteronomy 32 and the Psalms
2 pertaining to Isaiah. Isaiah is the major prophet.
3 Micah, Hosea, Obadiah and Zephaniah are the minor
4 prophets. They were, they were contemporary with
5 Isaiah.

6 DICK: Okay. Have you written that -- have
7 you reduced that to writing?

8 DAVID: Yes, yes. I've put it into --

9 DICK: How long is that --

10 DAVID: -- a form, digestible form.

11 DICK: Okay.

12 DAVID: It's, it's -- like I say it's the
13 first chapter. Each of the seals is going to be
14 additional chapter.

15 DICK: Okay, how -- this first chapter, how
16 long is it, David? It's finished now.

17 DAVID: How many --

18 DICK: Is that correct?

19 DAVID: -- how many pages?

20 DICK: Yeah. I mean how long we, is this
21 thing?

22 DAVID: It's probably -- the first chapter is
23 probably about, I don't know, anywhere from 25 to 28
24 pages.

25 DICK: Okay. And that needs to be edited by
Steven I understand. Is that, is that correct?

1 DAVID: Well, I've, I've got three or four
2 different people here that can --

3 DICK: Okay.

4 DAVID: -- that can take care of it pretty
5 good. I am not a --

6 DICK: And how long have you been working on
7 that?

8 DAVID: Is this the third -- this is the
9 fourth day.

10 DICK: Fourth day on, on the one. But my
11 talking to you on the phone is probably holding up this
12 process. How many hours a day do you spend on that?

13 DAVID: Oh, it's been, it's been basically
14 night and day. I mean I got to sleep sometimes.

15 DICK: Right.

16 DAVID: Well, I had, I had a lot of
17 motivation here a while back, because I had so much
18 noise at night.

19 DICK: Now are you telling me, David, I want
20 to get this clear in my own mind. Are you telling me
21 here and now that as soon as you reduce the seven seals
22 to a written form that you're coming out of there? I
23 don't mean --

24 DAVID: Then I have no reason --

25 DICK: -- two days later or --

 DAVID: -- I have no reason not to --

1 DICK: I know what you're saying. But answer
2 my question if you would, please. Definitely. I mean
3 I want to get an answer to this. Are you coming out as
4 soon as you're done, or are --

5 DAVID: I'm coming out.

6 DICK: -- you saying I'm coming out
7 afterwards at some point in time.

8 DAVID: After I get the thing -- see, Dick,
9 you don't seem to understand. We are going to fulfill
10 our commitment to God. Now if you would allow me to
11 show you what has been pre-written by the prophets, you
12 would know what I'm doing.

13 DICK: Well, I'm asking you --

14 DAVID: You see.

15 DICK: -- a simple question though --

16 DAVID: And I'm giving you the simple answer.
17 Yes, yes, yes. I never intended to die in here.

18 DICK: I know that, David.

19 DAVID: Never intended --

20 DICK: But, but --

21 DAVID: -- to be held up in here. Although
22 it's also foretold in Scripture too. Now remember back
23 in 1985 like I was telling you.

24 DICK: Um-hum.

25 DAVID: There's nothing -- now look at it
from a real secular point of view. Okay?

1 DICK: Okay.

2 DAVID: Let's pretend you're a priest. Or
3 let's -- no, let's -- better yet, my worst enemies.
4 Let's pretend you're a Seventh Day Adventist minister.
5 Have you ever met with a Seventh Day Adventist before?

6 DICK: No.

7 DAVID: Okay. Well, they believe that they
8 are the cream of the crop, mister. You know, and they
9 keep the seventh day sabbath, the day of the Lord, thy
10 God, and if you're a Sunday keeper, they say you have
11 the mark of the beast. You're worshipping the papal
12 Rome. And they really, you know, that's their key.
13 They're going to heaven because they keep the day of
14 the Jews.

15 DICK: But that appealed to you at one point
16 in time.

17 DAVID: Huh?

18 DICK: That did appeal to you at one point in
19 time.

20 DAVID: No, well, see the truth of it is the
21 seventh day sabbath is the sabbath. But the point of
22 it is, is that Armstrong keeps that day. The Seventh
23 Day Baptists kept it before the Seventh Day Adventists
24 ever did. I mean you know. They go back for hundreds
25 of years, Seventh Day Baptists.

But the point I'm making is, is that I've

1 | always mingled amongst those groups who claim to have a
2 | higher perception of God's will according to Scripture.
3 | Doctrine. Do you understand?

4 | DICK: Um-hum.

5 | DAVID: Now here I come, Mr. Nobody, no
6 | credentials. You know, a dropout in school or whatever
7 | it may appear to be. And I sit before these gentlemen,
8 | and I bring up the subject of the most concerned
9 | interest.

10 | For instance, New Testament believers believe
11 | that Christ took up the position of the levitical
12 | priesthood. Christ is now the high priest in heaven.
13 | Christ is the one who is to mediate the New Testament.
14 | In other words, the Father is to give to Christ the New
15 | Testament is, is to reveal it to his servants on earth.
16 | That's what Hebrews is all about.

17 | DICK: Can I interrupt one more time?

18 | DAVID: Sure.

19 | DICK: Okay. You know, you're very skillful
20 | at doing this. You have --

21 | DAVID: Well, it's my subject.

22 | DICK: -- once again evaded my question.

23 | DAVID: No, I didn't.

24 | DICK: Yes, you have.

25 | DAVID: What I was -- no, I didn't. What I
 | was stating was back to the literality (sic) of what

1 | this means, how this position that I'm in now came
2 | about. What I was stating was is I'm sitting before a
3 | minister whose -- well, like for instance, Loma Linda
4 | University, we're talking about fifty and sixty
5 | thousand dollars collected in one sabbath. Now that's,
6 | that's some lettuce, man. You know what I mean?

7 | DICK: I understand what you're saying.

8 | DAVID: Okay. Now here I come, and I sit in
9 | front of them, and I bring them a challenge. I
10 | challenge their credentials to teach the gospel. And I
11 | start showing them the seven seals, and they begin to
12 | see that I know what I'm talking about. And I'm
13 | pointing right there in their Bible out of their
14 | Scriptures and showing them word for word, comparison
15 | to comparison, and it's developing a picture.

16 | Well, then they begin to look at me, and they
17 | begin to say what does this mean? Well, if I was
18 | Christ, right?

19 | DICK: Um-hum.

20 | DAVID: Who does their church belong to?
21 | Huh?

22 | DICK: Okay. I understand what you're
23 | saying.

24 | DAVID: Okay. Now who should they be giving
25 | that tide money to?

 DICK: I understand.

1 DAVID: Uh-huh. So see, it is a definite
2 threat on their economic and political system as a
3 church.

4 DICK: Well, can't you write those seven
5 seals from jail, David?

6 DAVID: Well, you see so far you've got to
7 realize there's more involved then just write them in
8 jail. First of all --

9 DICK: I mean you got --

10 DAVID: -- I'm -- look, you're not --

11 DICK: -- this is in your mind.

12 DAVID: -- I'm not going to have that
13 privilege. I'm not going to have that privilege in
14 jail.

15 DICK: Why?

16 DAVID: You know it and I know it.

17 DICK: No, I don't know that.

18 DAVID: Because it is a lying, damned (sic)
19 system and you know that.

20 DICK: So what are you suggesting, that
21 you're not going to have the opportunity to do that?

22 DAVID: I'm saying that when I get through
23 writing these, and they're given to my attorney.

24 DICK: Um-hum.

25 DAVID: And my attorney hands them over --
what's the two theologians name?

1 STEVE: Phillip Arnold --

2 DAVID: Phillip Arnold --

3 STEVE: -- Tabor (phonetic sp.).

4 DAVID: -- and Jim Tabor --

5 DICK: Okay.

6 DAVID: -- which have shown that they have a
7 sincere interest in these things.

8 DICK: Um-hum.

9 DAVID: You see. Then I can spend all my
10 time in jail, and people can go ahead and ask me all
11 the stupid questions they want. Because they're not
12 going to ask me about the seals. They're going to say
13 do you molest young ladies? Have you eaten babies? Do
14 you sacrifice people? Do you make automatic weapons?
15 Do you have bombs? That's what they're going to be
16 interested in, sensationalism.

17 DICK: Okay, so that's your -- that's why you
18 need to get it done before you leave there then.

19 DAVID: That's why I am --

20 DICK: Okay.

21 DAVID: -- going to complete it. Because you
22 see, you know as well as I do that people in this
23 world, they want something dramatic and sensational.
24 They don't want to have to sit -- no one's going to sit
25 there and let me sit there in front of a camera and
read Psalms 40 to them to prove the first seal. Dick,

1 | it's a real world. And that's why I'm sympathetic with
2 | your position. I realize you're frustrated. And I
3 | agree with you.

4 | DICK: I'm not frustrated. I went home and
5 | I'm, I'm, in fact, I'm no longer frustrated. I never
6 | was frustrated.

7 | DAVID: Did you take a shower for me?

8 | DICK: Well, yeah. I took a couple of them
9 | for you.

10 | DAVID: Thank you. I appreciate it.

11 | DICK: Well, you know, that's, that's one of
12 | the things that's available. But listen, let's go back
13 | to my original question. My understanding is that
14 | you're going to write these seals. And originally it
15 | was going to take you a couple days. But now, you
16 | know, given all these other things that you haven't --

17 | DAVID: I never said a couple of days.

18 | DICK: Okay.

19 | DAVID: No one ever said a couple of days.

20 | DICK: Okay. Well, whatever the time frame
21 | is, we're looking at 4 for this one, for the first, for
22 | the first seal.

23 | DAVID: First seal.

24 | DICK: Okay. And then say it took you --
25 | what do you expect for the others? I mean totally
 | we're talking about a good deal of time, are we not?

1 DAVID: It's not that long. You don't
2 seem --

3 DICK: No, I know it's not in terms of
4 eternity. But let's talk about --

5 DAVID: No, in terms of literality. It's
6 going to take, it's going to take probably a year or
7 two or three just to get this court case settled out.
8 You know, the -- be more, be more realistic in this
9 fact.

10 DICK: I don't disagree with that.

11 DAVID: You're going to have -- you're,
12 you're going to go through this place, and you're going
13 to fine comb it. You know, you're going to bring the
14 best professionals in. You're going to have to look at
15 every gun hole.

16 DICK: Well, you've got one of the best -- my
17 understanding is Dick DeGuerin is a terrific attorney.

18 DAVID: Well, I realize that. I'm talking
19 about the, the Sheriff's Department, the, the ones that
20 are going to be in charge of the, what they call the
21 crime scene. You know.

22 DICK: Texas Rangers, right.

23 DAVID: Texas Rangers.

24 DICK: Right.

25 DAVID: And they're going to have to collect
all the information, and they're going to probably, you

1 | know, do all kinds of, of taking samples and
2 | fingerprints and, and all that kind of stuff, you know.
3 | And it's going to take them some time.

4 | They're going to go through all these files.
5 | We've got files and files in here of, of receipts and
6 | papers and documents. And there's -- and I've, I've
7 | got just thousands of tapes. I'm sure they're going to
8 | want to listen to every last one of them, you know.
9 | And just who knows. You're not dealing with just four
10 | or five people here.

11 | DICK: I understand that.

12 | DAVID: You know, you're dealing with, you
13 | know, goodness, a large number of --

14 | DICK: Well, see you're saying --

15 | DAVID: -- a hundred and sixty some, a
16 | hundred and seventy some people.

17 | DICK: So you're saying that in comparison --

18 | DAVID: So I'm going to sit in jail a long
19 | time. You going to let me get out on bond? I doubt
20 | it.

21 | DICK: Well, again, you know, we don't set
22 | bonds. And you know that. I'm sure your attorney told
23 | you that.

24 | DAVID: Well, he told -- well, I'm not
25 | supposed to say what he told me. But the thing of it
is, is that it's just very highly unlikely. I'm such a

1 | hot item right now, although my life in this world is
2 | basically ruined, you know, that, that, you know, I'm
3 | going to, I'm going to be sitting there a long time.

4 | DICK: Have you ever heard the saying a
5 | legend in your own mind?

6 | DAVID: I don't want to be a legend. Look,
7 | if I wanted to be a legend, I'm one of the hottest
8 | guitar players LA ever saw.

9 | DICK: Well, you play -- you don't play any
10 | classical guitar, do you?

11 | DAVID: Yes, I play classical guitar.

12 | DICK: Yeah, what --

13 | DAVID: I can do Aldo Miola (phonetic sp.)
14 | stuff all day long.

15 | DICK: What's a good, what's a good classical
16 | guitar to buy?

17 | DAVID: Well, it --

18 | DICK: Brand name.

19 | DAVID: A brand name?

20 | DICK: Um-hum. How about an Alvarez. Is
21 | that a good, is that a good classical --

22 | DAVID: Well, Alvarez is --

23 | DICK: Or Yamaha?

24 | DAVID: -- is well (laughing). Your Guild
25 | (phonetic sp.) guitars are really nice today. Your
 | Yamahas.

1 DICK: I'm, I'm looking on the low -- I'm
2 looking at the low end though. I'm not looking at a,
3 at a concert.

4 DAVID: No, well, this -- I'm talking about
5 low end. See what happened was several years ago Japan
6 bought the top woods and stuff.

7 DICK: Ayari (phonetic sp.), is that a good
8 one?

9 DAVID: Huh?

10 DICK: One that is customized by --

11 DAVID: Aki (phonetic sp.).

12 DICK: Pardon me?

13 DAVID: You mean Aki?

14 DICK: No, no. I know what Aki --

15 DAVID: Well, see --

16 DICK: But there's supposed to be a guy by
17 the name of Ayari that, that does some custom, he and
18 his family, a Japanese that does some custom guitar --

19 DAVID: I'm not familiar with that.

20 DICK: Okay --

21 DAVID: But normally Martins, your older
22 Martins were, were some of the better classical
23 guitars. But Alvarez is a very good guitar.

24 DICK: Is it?

25 DAVID: It's -- when it first came out back
in the, in the '70s when he went into the electric

1 | guitar markets, you know, a lot of people liked them.
2 | Of course, you know, people got them confused with the
3 | Ivanez (phonetic sp.) Japanese guitars.

4 | DICK: Yeah, now again, I'm just talking
5 | about -- I'm not talking about I'm, I'm, the acoustic.
6 | I'm talking about just a classic acoustical guitar,
7 | right?

8 | DAVID: Yeah.

9 | DICK: Yeah.

10 | DAVID: Well, you know, Greco and stuff. A
11 | lot of the earlier -- even Honer (phonetic sp.) made,
12 | made an excellent guitar for a while there. You know,
13 | those are, those are cheap, cheap guitars. You know,
14 | \$99, \$150.

15 | DICK: Yeah. What do you got to go to about
16 | \$450, \$500, \$600 before you get a decent one?

17 | DAVID: Well, not so much in regards to the
18 | acoustic type, you know, catgut or nylon string
19 | guitars.

20 | DICK: Uh-huh.

21 | DAVID: Because your resonance is totally
22 | different than what it would be with a steel string
23 | guitar.

24 | DICK: Yeah.

25 | DAVID: And that's what you want. You want,
 | you want low ambience when you have actual classical

1 guitar. And so, you know, but see I build guitars
2 myself too. And --

3 DICK: Will you send me out an autographed
4 copy? Huh?

5 DAVID: Come on, Dick.

6 DICK: Listen. I don't want to get into
7 this. But I just wanted your opinion on that.

8 Now listen. Let's get back to the point at
9 hand. This, you know, the writing of the seals. Okay,
10 you've got to do that from in there, and it's going to
11 take you X amount of time. But just tell me this,
12 David. Are you saying that when you finish that
13 manuscript --

14 DAVID: Then I'm not bound any longer to
15 make --

16 DICK: No, but see that doesn't answer the
17 question.

18 DAVID: -- amendments to resist you. Then
19 I'll be out. Yes. Definitely.

20 DICK: I know you'll be out. But that could,
21 couldn't -- excuse me. I've got a cold. That could
22 mean a lot of things, David. That could mean in, in
23 July --

24 DAVID: I'll be in custody in the jailhouse.
25 You can come down there and feed me bananas --

DICK: No, I know, I know at some point in

1 | time that's true. But I'm, I'm getting from you, I'm
2 | asking you that when that is finished are you then
3 | telling me that you are coming out the next day or 2
4 | hours after you send that out or what?

5 | DAVID: Well, I'll probably when I, when I
6 | bring it out -- see my attorney is going to get the,
7 | get to the copy.

8 | DICK: Right.

9 | DAVID: Okay. And as soon as he hands it
10 | over to the scholars, the theologians.

11 | DICK: Um-hum.

12 | DAVID: Right? That's when he's going to
13 | come back, and that's when I'm going to go out with
14 | him. Because he said point blank that, you know, one
15 | of the guarantees of me arriving down there is that
16 | he's going to go with me.

17 | DICK: Okay. I understand that.

18 | DAVID: And so -- and I, and I believe him on
19 | that. I mean I, I actually I have a lot of faith in
20 | Dick DeGuerin and respect that, you know, he's not only
21 | just a professional from a professional's point of
22 | view, he's also a decent person. You know, he has -- a
23 | lot of attorneys like I say are all business and no
24 | reason.

25 | DICK: Um-hum.

 DAVID: They forget how to communicate with

1 | human beings.

2 | DICK: Okay, let me, let me pose the question
3 | here, David. The response when we, back on the 2nd of
4 | March was that God told you to wait. I mean how do you
5 | know that God is not going to tell you to wait, or how
6 | do we know that God is not going to wait --

7 | DAVID: Because --

8 | DICK: -- after that manuscript leaves.

9 | DAVID: -- because the waiting period has
10 | something to do with the judiciary system in regards to
11 | how God's going to deal with the situation here.

12 | DICK: Um-hum.

13 | DAVID: You see, you don't understand. I've
14 | prayed day and night to hold something back. Remember,
15 | in Revelation during the sixth seal when the sixth seal
16 | is opened, the sun, moon and stars is darkened, right?

17 | DICK: Um-hum.

18 | DAVID: Okay. In Matthew 24, Christ was
19 | telling the disciples that where the carcass is the
20 | eagles be gathered. And after that of it, right after
21 | that of it of the carcass and the eagles.

22 | DICK: Well, what does it mean --

23 | DAVID: The sun, moon and stars --

24 | DICK: -- in today's day. In today's day.

25 | DAVID: The carcass is a dead body.

 DICK: Okay.

1 DAVID: You see, the events of Matthew 24
2 entails the same fulfillment of prophecy amongst the
3 gentiles that took place 2,000 years ago.

4 DICK: Yeah, but put it -- David, David,
5 please. Put it in, in language here and now today,
6 today's date. What -- you're suggesting that as soon
7 as you get these seven seals written down in manuscript
8 form that --

9 DAVID: Then it will be your
10 responsibility --

11 DICK: -- it's been resolved.

12 DAVID: -- your responsibility to get the
13 book and read it. It's not going to be, it's not going
14 to be something that has to be paid for. It's your
15 responsibility to look into it and see it.

16 DICK: That's fine.

17 DAVID: And this way you can call me mud and
18 dirt and everything you want to --

19 DICK: Well, nobody's going to do that.
20 Nobody's going to do that.

21 DAVID: Well, now wait a minute.

22 DICK: I'm not here to do that.

23 DAVID: Now, now Dick, let's get back to the
24 earth again now. That's all people see about me. Is
25 they see what they see through their carnal eyes
through what they consider to be obvious. And you're

1 right. From their point of view, all they've heard is
2 one side of the story.

3 DICK: Well, that's exactly right. And of
4 course --

5 DAVID: Now and so when, when it comes down
6 to it, people know me more about what they don't know
7 about me than what they do.

8 DICK: Well, then you're going to be able to
9 correct all that.

10 DAVID: Well, I'm going to have the
11 opportunity as a prisoner. As someone that is pictured
12 as a prisoner which that in itself is deflative to
13 one's nature to be able to defend myself only in a
14 court of law where an attorney speaks in my behalf.
15 Now you know how that goes too, Dick.

16 DICK: Certainly.

17 DAVID: In other words, I'm not going to be
18 able to, be able to talk to the, to the people like I
19 talk to you. Yes or no. Answer the question. Yes or
20 no. I went through that in '88.

21 DICK: No, that's true. That's --

22 DAVID: The night you went out there --

23 DICK: -- that's 100 percent true.

24 DAVID: -- to murder George Roden. Now, now
25 Vernon, the night you went out there to murder George
Roden, did you have any thoughts of remorse in your

1 heart? Yes or no.

2 DICK: And your -- well, and your answer
3 obviously they wanted it framed in a yes or no answer.
4 But that's what your attorney --

5 DAVID: And my attorney kept saying I object.

6 DICK: Well, but then he gets up and ask you
7 another form of the question to counter what was said
8 before. I mean --

9 DAVID: But it was --

10 DICK: -- that's the way it's done, Dave.
11 You know that.

12 DAVID: It was -- yeah, but you know it's
13 wrong.

14 DICK: Well, you know, you can say that. But
15 that's the way it's done. You know, we've got to deal
16 with reality here. So, so you're telling me that --
17 you know what, I'm probably keeping you from doing your
18 writing then. I, I probably should let you go and get
19 back to that. Because I know we're all, we're all
20 eagerly awaiting that date. And, and you know we are
21 and you are too.

22 DAVID: And see with the written form what,
23 what happens, okay, first of all, the beauty and the
24 power of this message is that I have always stood
25 before my opponents and my students face to face. And
that way no matter what presentation or point they try

1 | to bring to counteract what I've stated, I've always
2 | been able to listen and say well, okay then. And then
3 | I go over to another prophecy. And another and
4 | another. And this is what either makes somebody
5 | respect me, because they cannot gang say what's being
6 | taught, or hate me because they know I'm right.

7 | DICK: Well, David, David, if you want
8 | respect, you've got to come out of there and get, get
9 | on with things. You know? That's what you have to do
10 | to get respect from us. All right. If you want the
11 | respect of those of us that are here talking with you,
12 | then you come out. You're, you know, you're, you're
13 | convinced --

14 | DAVID: You're not going to respect me one
15 | way or the other, Dick.

16 | DICK: You're -- well, if you can put these
17 | things down in some intelligible form in a timely
18 | fashion, I'll tell you, I'll be the first one to read
19 | it. Okay? I'll guarantee you that. But what I hear
20 | is this continually looking for more time and pressing
21 | for time in order to --

22 | DAVID: Look.

23 | DICK: -- the inevitable is, is going to come
24 | as you have suggested.

25 | DAVID: You've been, you've -- your generals
here have been banging against our walls. You know, we

1 don't have any time. Do you understand, Dick? Every
2 breath that we take day by day makes us stop and wonder
3 about our position with God.

4 Now me it's different. I don't tell people
5 that God talks to me. That's not my point of argument.
6 But when it comes to opening the book, the Bible, and
7 letting the Bible speak on its own, I have never lost.
8 Never.

9 DICK: Well --

10 DAVID: And the reason being is in 1985, when
11 those Russian cosmonauts said they saw seven angels
12 flying towards the earth, that's what they said. They
13 had no message to back it. That's just from their
14 political, scientific observation. And I don't think
15 they'd be up there --

16 DICK: Well, I've never heard that before
17 but --

18 DAVID: Well, you need to research it.

19 DICK: -- I'll take your word for it.

20 DAVID: You need to research it.

21 DICK: I'll take your word for it.

22 DAVID: Because it went into some magazines.
23 It went around the world.

24 DICK: Really?

25 DAVID: And -- yes, it did. And the thing of
it is, is that I don't think that the Russian

1 | government would appreciate their cosmonauts wasting
2 | important communicative time on telling them a joke.

3 | DICK: No.

4 | DAVID: But on the contrary --

5 | DICK: They certainly --

6 | DAVID: On the contrary. When I talk about
7 | the seven angels, I begin to open up the messages that
8 | I received from God. And as I said before, my God goes
9 | a little more deeper than what most traditional
10 | religion goes into.

11 | You see, when the creation story says that
12 | the spirit of God move on the face of the waters. And
13 | the earth was without form and void and darkest on the
14 | face of the deep. Well, clearly something was here
15 | already. But it had been destroyed. And when God says
16 | for man to reproduce and replenish the earth, clearly
17 | God tells man to put back something that was already
18 | here before.

19 | And we know that God destroyed the world
20 | again in the days of Noah. And we know that in every
21 | generation there are a few of mankind just as a harvest
22 | there are a few whose intelligence and whose desire to
23 | look into the heavens becomes so dramatic and so strong
24 | they begin to ask the question of who is there? What
25 | is there? Why is it there?

 DICK: Well, didn't -- wasn't there a

1 prediction by Roden or maybe it was his predecessor
2 that the world was coming to an end in what was it,
3 1975? And that's how a lot of Davidians gathered in
4 this area. Was that not true in --

5 DAVID: 1955 Florence Hadiff (phonetic sp.)
6 made a prophecy of the resurrection --

7 DICK: Okay, Florence. That was Florence.
8 Okay.

9 DAVID: Of Victor Hadiff. But that was not a
10 prophecy of the end of the world.

11 DICK: Well, I thought it was. I thought
12 they moved out here to Texas. That's not true?

13 DAVID: No. No --

14 DICK: What I read in the magazine was not
15 true.

16 DAVID: -- what happened was, no, what
17 happened was is that that was when they said Brother
18 Hadiff would be resurrected. And Benjamin Roden was on
19 the scene to tell them that was not so.

20 DICK: Okay.

21 DAVID: Now what happens is, is that it's the
22 actual, it's the Catholic church and the Lutherans and
23 Presbyterian and Methodist and Baptist and Church of
24 Christ and all the other denominations who tell you
25 that Christ is coming soon which is the end of the
world. They preach that every Sunday.

1 DICK: Um-hum. That's right. Be ready --
2 DAVID: And they're always telling you to be
3 ready.
4 DICK: Be ready. Well --
5 DAVID: They're wrong every Sunday.
6 DICK: Okay.
7 DAVID: You got it, Dick?
8 DICK: I've got it. Listen. Can I --
9 DAVID: So don't pay. Don't pay.
10 DICK: I, I can go on paper here and said
11 that David Koresh told me that as soon as he finishes
12 this manuscript, the seven seals of which you've
13 finished the first chapter dealing the first seal --
14 DAVID: The seal, right.
15 DICK: -- that you're going to make that
16 available --
17 DAVID: I'll be splitting out of this place.
18 I'm so sick of MREs, Dick, that --
19 DICK: Well, I just want to make sure that I
20 have this right, that you're coming out as soon as
21 that's finished.
22 DAVID: That's what was said by me --
23 DICK: Well, I know.
24 DAVID: -- by the attorney that --
25 DICK: I know.
DAVID: -- that I'm saying --

1 DICK: Okay.

2 DAVID: -- it's clarified. Lock, stock and
3 barrel it.

4 DICK: I mean I've heard you say that you're
5 coming out after. But that is not specific. You know,
6 that's a game that we all can play.

7 DAVID: It's -- look. I know, Dick.

8 DICK: But I'm asking you for your word.
9 You're saying --

10 DAVID: You're writing the script.

11 DICK: -- that your coming out as soon as
12 that's done. And you gave up the manuscript to
13 DeGuerin who's going to make copies available for
14 Arnold and the other, the other fellow.

15 DAVID: Right.

16 DICK: The other Biblical scholar. And then
17 you are coming out --

18 DAVID: I'm out of here.

19 DICK: -- with that manuscript.

20 DAVID: And he's, he's going to come, and the
21 way the procession is to be, I'm to go out first with
22 him. And then I think you're last, right, Steve.

23 STEVE: Um-hum.

24 DAVID: With his attorney.

25 DICK: Okay.

DAVID: And the other people, the other

1 | people in between.

2 | DICK: And you know what? I'm keeping you
3 | from getting back to work. So I'm -- you know what I'm
4 | going to do? I'm going to let you go so that you can
5 | get back to work. Because David, frankly I'm eagerly
6 | awaiting this manuscript and --

7 | DAVID: Well, I'll tell you what. It's going
8 | to blow your socks off.

9 | DICK: Well, I'm, I'm perfectly willing to,
10 | to read it. And I'm looking forward to it as a
11 | number --

12 | DAVID: You'll either hate me or love me
13 | then.

14 | DICK: Well, I want to read it. And then
15 | I'll, I'll, you make a decision then. And we'll see
16 | how it goes. In the meantime, you know, let's, let's
17 | get that thing written. Let's get --

18 | DAVID: And you know what the nicest thing
19 | about it is, Dick?

20 | DICK: What's that?

21 | DAVID: You can't interrupt yourself reading.

22 | DICK: I can't. (Laughing.)

23 | DAVID: You can't argue with yourself.

24 | DICK: Really?

25 | DAVID: Yeah. You see, when the people try
to talk with me, they argue with me.

1 DICK: Well, you know --

2 DAVID: (Indiscernible.)

3 DICK: -- what? You're a difficult guy to
4 talk to sometimes. Because you want to -- you don't
5 want to talk about issues that we want to talk about.
6 You want to talk about other issues.

7 DAVID: I talk about one thing. And that is
8 I don't want you to have to live 100 years in a world,
9 a prison house of people that are far meaner, far
10 bigger. You know, I don't want you to have to live
11 with Bubbas.

12 DICK: Well, I appreciate that.

13 DAVID: That are bigger than you.

14 DICK: Well, you know, and can I, can I say
15 that I think that's one of your big concerns is Mr.
16 Bubba.

17 DAVID: I'm not worried about Bubba.

18 DICK: You've mentioned it on several
19 occasions.

20 DAVID: (Laughing.)

21 DICK: Have you not? Well, why, why does it
22 come to mind then if you're not at all concerned about
23 it?

24 DAVID: It's a, it's a part of concern in
25 respect to where I always present to people how do you
feel about doing to others what you would not want them

1 to do unto you?

2 Now you see, here, here you came into my
3 world, you know. I came out to you. You tried to stop
4 my world. And the thing of it was is that you did it
5 strictly on a hearsay.

6 DICK: No, no. No, let's, let's separate
7 ourself a little bit. You're, you're talking about the
8 collective government is what you're saying.

9 DAVID: We're talking about, we're talking
10 about the ATF.

11 DICK: Okay.

12 DAVID: Okay.

13 DICK: Not the FBI but the ATF.

14 DAVID: No, the ATF. Of which you have --

15 DICK: Okay.

16 DAVID: -- you have raised the right hand of
17 the FBI ever since day one. And so, you know,
18 basically you and the ATF are in brotherhood together
19 in the position that now you're calling us to come out
20 to your justice. Well, even though --

21 DICK: It's not our justice. It's a
22 constitutional guarantee --

23 DAVID: Well, now wait a minute. Our
24 constitutional rights according to the Bible have also
25 been infringed right and left.

DICK: Okay, then deal with those issues.

1 DAVID: And that's exactly what we're coming
2 out to do.

3 DICK: Okay. Good.

4 DAVID: But, but in all reality is, is that
5 we also understand clearly that once being brought into
6 the limelight is going to be like jailhouse Hollywood.

7 DICK: Well, you're going to --

8 DAVID: You know.

9 DICK: -- benefit from that. Your -- I --

10 DAVID: Actually, you know --

11 DICK: You haven't considered that at all I
12 bet, have you? The, the --

13 DAVID: There's no benefit in having your
14 family taken away from you, Dick. Now come off of it.

15 DICK: Nobody said that. Nobody said that at
16 all. And I certainly wouldn't suggest that.

17 DAVID: Hey, well, that's, that's the reality
18 of it. I'm giving up everything.

19 DICK: But there is some benefit that's going
20 to be derived by a lot of people from this thing. I'm
21 not talking about you, David.

22 DAVID: Spiritually in that they receive a
23 knowledge to save their soul.

24 DICK: Well, spiritually perhaps yes. But
25 I'm talking about materially also.

 DAVID: Who?

1 DICK: Well, I'm talking about their, you
2 know, the books that are going to be written and, and
3 those kinds of things.

4 DAVID: Who's going to benefit from that? My
5 children.

6 DICK: Your children are going to benefit
7 from that.

8 DAVID: That's if, if you don't get me on
9 some kind of racketeering like you was bragging about
10 the other day.

11 DICK: Well, what I'm saying, no, now I --

12 DAVID: Let's get him on racketeering.
13 We'll, we'll (indiscernible) that.

14 DICK: No. Now listen, I didn't say anything
15 like that --

16 DAVID: You didn't. But the, but the, the
17 press, the press conferences did.

18 DICK: Well, I don't know, because I didn't
19 hear that. But, but at least let's -- Dave, let's
20 get -- I guess again I'm tying you up here. Let's get
21 this thing moving. And I'm going to let you go back to
22 your --

23 DAVID: All right.

24 DICK: -- to your, to your writing.

25 DAVID: But haven't I spoken logical to you
tonight, Dick?

1 DICK: Well, yeah, at times. But let me tell
2 you something.

3 DAVID: In other words, every time I talk
4 about God, you say that's crazy talk.

5 DICK: No, I have never once.

6 DAVID: I'm going to hold you to that now.

7 DICK: Now never once did I ever say it was
8 crazy.

9 DAVID: If you ever have to sit before me, if
10 you ever have to stand before me, and I'm on a throne
11 pointing a finger at you, I'm going to bring that back
12 to your attention.

13 DICK: Well, you know, please give it some
14 due consideration if you're sitting over there. Now
15 would, would you quarrel with me if I, if I said I
16 might doubt that? Or, or would you be disgusted with
17 me if I said that?

18 DAVID: We'll just have to see, won't we?

19 DICK: Well, I'm just saying. Now if I
20 offered that as an opinion, you would respect that,
21 wouldn't you?

22 DAVID: Well, sure, I have to respect that.
23 Because like I say, you know, 2,000 years a lightning
24 bolt has never hit anybody for an opinion, has it?

25 DICK: No, it hasn't. And I'm glad you
appreciate that. Because I --

1 DAVID: Be sure and read Jeremiah 30 though.

2 DICK: Jeremiah 30.

3 DAVID: Yeah. It says the fierce anger of
4 the Lord shall not return until he's performed the
5 intents of his heart. In the latter days you shall
6 consider it perfectly.

7 DICK: All right. I'll consider that.
8 Listen, get that done if you will. And let's, let's
9 continue to march --

10 DAVID: I'm back on it.

11 DICK: -- let's continue to march here. And
12 I hope you're making some, some good progress here.
13 Because we're all eagerly awaiting --

14 DAVID: What was you telling Steve, I hadn't
15 written 10 words?

16 DICK: No, that's what I said. I bet you
17 haven't written 10 words.

18 DAVID: (Laughing.) Okay.

19 DICK: Why don't you -- you want to send out
20 a copy of what you've written now?

21 DAVID: Sure. Let me put it on my --

22 DICK: (Laughing.)

23 DAVID: -- where's our copy machine at,
24 Steve? Could you turn the lights back on real quick?

25 DICK: Well, that's -- I'm going to note this
date. What date is this anyhow? This is the --

1 DAVID: This is the 16th.

2 DICK: This is the 16th at what time is it in
3 the morning here?

4 DAVID: What time is it?

5 DICK: And I'm going to say you have one
6 chapter written in your epistle there.

7 DAVID: 3:30 or 4.

8 DICK: Yeah. You've got one chapter written,
9 and again we're going to await the rest of them. And
10 I'm going to, I'm going to let you go. And you get,
11 you get on that. Truthfully I am waiting to, to read
12 that. Because there are a lot of us that are going to
13 be interested in what --

14 DAVID: Well, I hope you do.

15 DICK: -- what you have to say there. And
16 then we'll make some decisions based on, on what, what
17 we see and what we hear.

18 DAVID: Okie doke.

19 DICK: Is that fair enough?

20 DAVID: Hey, that's, that's the last fairness
21 we can possibly ever exercise.

22 DICK: All right. Well, you, you tell Steven
23 that he better get on with his editing job or whoever
24 is doing that. And, and --

25 DAVID: You want to talk to Steve here now?

 DICK: Yeah, put him on for a minute.

1 DAVID: Okay. See you later, Dick. Bye.

2 DICK: Bye.

3 STEVE: Hello, Dick.

4 DICK: Get in there with, and get that
5 editing done, will you?

6 STEVE: Well, I've been trying. Honestly.

7 DICK: All right. Well, I don't want to hold
8 you up any longer to keep, to keep you going here. But
9 use some of those skills that, and manipulate some of
10 those of words that David's got there on the paper, you
11 know. And take a look at --

12 STEVE: Well, what did you think, Dick? I
13 mean what you heard or what --

14 DICK: Well, you know, I've always been
15 interested in talking to both you guys, you know. I'd
16 love to be able to talk to you not under these
17 conditions.

18 STEVE: I mean is he as bad as the picture
19 that's developed? Do you really, you think he is
20 manipulating all of us though, huh?

21 DICK: Oh, yeah. Absolutely.

22 STEVE: Okay. Well --

23 DICK: Absolutely. Very strong-willed man.
24 Very, very -- and obviously he's got very strong
25 convictions and he, he sells those convictions very
well. And then -- and that's not a derogatory remark

1 | at all.

2 | STEVE: Yeah, I know. I, I believe that. I
3 | believe that.

4 | DICK: He, he does very well what he does.
5 | And that's not to say I believe him.

6 | STEVE: Right.

7 | DICK: And you know, obviously given the
8 | numbers you have out there are a lot of other folks
9 | that probably don't believe him either. There may well
10 | be a lot more that will believe him when he's done with
11 | this. I don't know. But the fact of the matter is,
12 | Steve, just in summary we've got to resolve that, you
13 | know --

14 | STEVE: Yeah, I know.

15 | DICK: -- the events. And, and we, we can't
16 | do anything else until --

17 | STEVE: I know.

18 | DICK: -- that's done. And that's what we've
19 | got to do. That's what I'm here to do. And, and
20 | that's what you're going to have to do at, at some
21 | point in time.

22 | STEVE: Right.

23 | DICK: And you know, to delay it isn't going
24 | to --

25 | STEVE: Well --

 DICK: -- accomplish anything.

1 STEVE: Well, you can know I'm not trying to
2 go out of my way to delay it. I am not --

3 DICK: Well, I hear what you're saying.

4 STEVE: -- amused. I'm not.

5 DICK: I hear what you're saying. Listen.

6 STEVE: Because I, I believe -- listen. I
7 really do agree with like Jack Zimmerman and so forth
8 that it would be to my advantage to come out sooner.
9 It would have been to my advantage even, even now
10 versus say a week from now. And I totally agree with
11 the guy. And that's why on one side I was telling you
12 I am anxious to do it and get it done. On the other
13 hand I still -- well, you got to hear him. And I'm
14 still convinced he has something there. I do.

15 DICK: Well --

16 STEVE: But so you -- but you know, at the
17 same time I'm hoping that this is it and that it will
18 be done.

19 DICK: Well, I don't know what he's told you.
20 But I, my guess is that he's convinced that, that he
21 can represent you very successfully in court.

22 STEVE: Yeah, he does. He believes he can.

23 DICK: And you know, that's the kind of
24 attorney you need and you want. Again, I have not
25 heard what he said, and I have not been here while some
of these things have gone on.

1 STEVE: Right. Um-hum.

2 DICK: But you know, your attorney is the guy
3 that ultimately you're going to have to listen to.

4 STEVE: Um-hum.

5 DICK: And you're going to have to make
6 judgments based on the information he provides to you.
7 And my guess is that he probably told you a lot of the
8 same things that we did in terms of constitutional
9 guarantees and those kinds of things.

10 STEVE: Oh, yeah. Oh, yeah.

11 DICK: So you know, we have, we've tried to
12 be, to be truthful with you. And, and for whatever
13 reason you've rejected a lot of what we've had to say.
14 And, and I would guess that your attorney --

15 STEVE: Like, like what do you mean? Like
16 what?

17 DICK: Well, I mean obviously we weren't a
18 lot of influence on you in terms of, of these
19 proceedings that are going to follow at least --

20 STEVE: Well, no, you -- on the contrary,
21 that's not really true. What you've said I have not
22 really disagreed. I, I have believed, and I never had
23 a problem with really what you are saying, what your
24 intents are and what you believe is going to happen.
25 I, I believe you believe. And I think to some degree
that's true.

1 I, I -- like what I said about judges. I'm
2 not so sure personally, you know, how right on the
3 money they always are. But that's neither here nor
4 there. I mean one still has to do like going through
5 the system like you have to do it. But at the same
6 time, you know, it's always been this time element with
7 me believing in what I see presented from that Bible by
8 David. So you know, there's never been any other thing
9 there but that. That time --

on it and get over there and try to assist him as best

2 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: Well, I did, before, you
3 | know, before I talked to you about it. That's -- I
4 | think it was like 10:00 tonight. I'm losing track of
5 | time. But I think it was around 10. I again
6 | suggested, as Rick did to me earlier in the day, as I
7 | had thought from the beginning, you know, why not just

18 HENRY: Okay.

24 HENRY: Okay. And who else?

25 STEVE SCHNEIDER: That's the guy who was
laying with his head against that wall.

1 HENRY: Okay. And who else?

2 STEVE SCHNEIDER: And then there was the
3 chi-- and Cyrus himself.

4 HENRY: Okay. And, and tell me the --

5 STEVE SCHNEIDER: He say -- do you know that
6 -- and -- that he -- Cyrus, he was --

7 HENRY: In order for me to --

8 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Listen. Cyrus was going to
9 actually -- he had two pictures he wanted to go out to
10 you yesterday with that cassette.

11 HENRY: In order for me to address this, I
12 have to be very specific with the bosses. Give me as
13 much specific information so that I can deal with this.
14 Please.

15 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Well, that all he's said so
16 far is that he is very sore. Appar-- I don't know how
17 -- he had his head against the wall and his shoulders
18 and so forth. I mean, you know, that's where his head
19 was laying in the bed that he was in. And Cyrus, I
20 don't know where at the time he was, but I don't -- I,
21 I think he's more shaken than -- you know, more being
22 afraid and all that than anything.

23 HENRY: Okay.

24 STEVE SCHNEIDER: But I don't, I don't
25 believe that he was hurt bad.

HENRY: Okay. And it -- and Graham, the same

1 | thing? How, how much --

2 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: I think he's --

3 | HENRY: -- of an injury?

4 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: -- bruised. I think, you

13 | I was going to wake him up minutes ago just to see how,
14 | how he is now.

15 | HENRY: Okay. I want to follow up on this,
16 | Steve, because we're not --

17 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: When that happened I was
18 | sitting --

19 | HENRY: -- and this -- and --

20 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: I want to tell you
21 | something though, Henry. When that happened, you know,
22 | I, I would have thought maybe something major was going
23 | to take place all around. I mean, not, not just -- you
24 | know, I just mean by everybody that was inside and all
25 | of it. You know, doing that kind of thing might end
this thing like real quick.

1 HENRY: Well --

2 STEVE SCHNEIDER: I'm hoping not myself, you
3 know, but if that's the way it's to be -- you know, I
4 accept anything.

5 HENRY: Well, you know -- well, part of the
6 problem here is the length of time that this thing has
7 gone on.

8 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Well, that's -- you know,
9 from day one I told you, Henry, you guys can bring in
10 the Abrams and right -- run right on through the
11 building. Seriously. You can do that.

12 HENRY: Well, I understand --

13 STEVE SCHNEIDER: We don't --

14 HENRY: -- that, that that can --

15 STEVE SCHNEIDER: We don't even object.

16 HENRY: Steve, I'm -- you know, I'm not, I'm
17 not discussing any of that and, and -- in terms of who
18 wants to do what. What I am saying is this is a
19 problem, you know, for us in terms of we're over here
20 trying to be spokespeople on your behalf --

21 STEVE SCHNEIDER: You know, I want to -- you
22 know, I'm trying to be real kind and, and nice and
23 courteous to you right now, but, you know, when you
24 call all the time about seeing someone out on the roof
25 and all that, you know, that means diddly when you're
doing those -- the kind of things like you're doing.

1 | You know, I'm -- do you want us to put a banner out
2 | before this all ends, I mean, really ends just so the
3 | public can see one last statement maybe? I mean, you
4 | know, it's up to you, like you said. I --

5 | HENRY: Well, I, I'm not, I'm not --

6 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: -- want to make some --

7 | HENRY: I'm not really sure --

8 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: -- kind of a statement --
9 | yes, I know. You, you try to detect or read whatever
10 | into it you want.

11 | HENRY: Is this a threat or, or, or something
12 | that you're going to do something? You're not --

13 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: You read it how you'd --

14 | HENRY: -- thinking of doing --

15 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: -- like, Henry.

16 | HENRY: I'd like to read it the way that you
17 | mean₁ it.

18 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: I'm going to leave it --
19 | let's leave it as a riddle for you, if that's the way
20 | it is.

21 | HENRY: You, you know, it's very difficult
22 | for us, as the people that are in touch with you --

23 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: Here's, here -- let me just
24 | say it this way. I'm, I'm making -- I'm talking to you
25 | in behalf of, let's say, Craddock.

 HENRY: Okay.

1 STEVE SCHNEIDER: And when you're doing those
2 kind of things, you know, everything that we've talked
3 about -- so far, I have tried to do this in a civilized
4 way until the day -- that I've told you from the
5 beginning that we all -- the majority, except for some
6 that have gone out, have waited upon David as we had
7 before you -- before -- not you, before the ATF came to
8 murder us. And since that day, we have stilled
9 continued to do the same thing believing, as in the
10 past, and he's always come through, always has. When
11 he has said wait, wait, wait with other things, always
12 it's come through.

13 HENRY: Well --

14 STEVE SCHNEIDER: It's never been that long.
15 This has been pretty close to about some of the times
16 like in the past that he ha-- we have waited or he has
17 waited on answers. And we have seen like the beginning
18 of those answers. But if at the same time you want to
19 hurry the process up, I'm afraid it's going to have the
20 opposite effect.

21 HENRY: Well, I -- you know, I, I agree with
22 you in that, in that we are not trying, from this, from
23 this side, to do anything. If that happened, I am not
24 aware of what it is that took place. I will, you
25 know --

 STEVE SCHNEIDER: I --

1 HENRY: -- talk to the commanders --

2 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Okay. I would --

3 HENRY: -- to try to find out what --

4 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Let me tell you this, let
5 me tell you this, though. I'm not -- you know, and
6 that time of night, when something like that happens,
7 I'm not in control of anybody. I mean, they're able
8 and willing and -- they, they may just up and start
9 something and I will know nothing about it till already
10 it's in, in the process. There's nothing I could have
11 done. Seriously. I myself had already laid down, just
12 started to go to sleep, when that took place.

13 HENRY: Okay. I just, I just got a note
14 here. Apparently, this was not an intentional
15 situation. Now, you know, why it happened, I don't
16 know. It should not have happened. That's the only
17 thing I can tell you. This was not an intentional
18 thing. In other words, there was no instructions, you
19 know, for any of the tactical people to do anything.
20 And this is not a situation to try to hurry anybody up
21 or to, or to incite or to cause any problems.

22 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Well, I'll try to pass that
23 around here. But at the same time, you know, as I came
24 over to the phone here, a number of these guys said,
25 you know, you weren't here to tell us, so we're, we're
leaving it upon ourselves. Something like that happens

1 | again, we'll just have to use our judgment. I'm going
2 | -- I'm -- what do you do -- I mean, seriously, what do
3 | you do in a situation like that usually? I mean, I'm
4 | just --

5 | HENRY: I understand what you're saying.

6 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: -- surprised.

7 | HENRY: I understand what you're saying. You
8 | know, I'm hoping that --

9 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: I mean, I'm just one person
10 | here --

11 | HENRY: But the longest --

12 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: -- trying to do it your
13 | way, which I know you want it done yesterday, and I
14 | told you I don't blame you. I can see it myself. But,
15 | again, I --

16 | HENRY: You're --

17 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: It still comes down to we
18 | believe in a God that you people don't understand.

19 | HENRY: Well, I, I, I, I don't think that
20 | that's what it is. A -- if you're saying if you
21 | believe in a God that we don't understand, we believe
22 | in the -- in a God, and I don't think that there's --

23 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: No, no. Look at --

24 | HENRY: -- more than one God.

25 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: No -- oh, Henry, just
take --

1 HENRY: Now, you may belie--

2 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Henry --

3 HENRY: -- believing in David --

4 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Henry --

5 HENRY: -- and --

6 STEVE SCHNEIDER: -- no, no, no.

7 HENRY: And --

8 STEVE SCHNEIDER: No. No. Look --

9 HENRY: -- one of the things --

10 STEVE SCHNEIDER: -- two things.

11 HENRY: -- that has happened here, Steve --

12 let, let me just say this. Let me just say this. One
13 of the things that has, that has happened here is you
14 have used a lot of, a lot of good judgment and
15 restraint and that -- you know, and we appreciate that.
16 We have tried to do the same thing on this end from,
17 from the --

18 STEVE SCHNEIDER: I, I think so.

19 HENRY: -- from the point of the negotiators.
20 The fact that this thing has gone a long time, you
21 know, we're no-- it's not a situation of blaming
22 anybody or anything. It's a matter of fact. You know,
23 as a result of, of David's indecision initially not to
24 come out -- first he said he was going to come out, and
25 then for whatever reason he decided to wait, that's
fine. Okay. But -- and everybody has tried to use the

1 best, you know, judgment possible in terms of trying to
2 defuse any potential situations. You know, you, you've
3 told me about some of the things that, that have
4 happened with people, you know, giving fingers and, and
5 doing stuff like that, none of which is professional
6 and we don't condone that.

7 STEVE SCHNEIDER: I believe that.

8 HENRY: Okay? Now, we would like very much
9 to see a very peaceful resolution to this thing.
10 Honestly, we would. Okay?

11 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Well, if you could have
12 told -- if you could have -- like the reaction of
13 Zimmerman. I was surprised to read that paper to
14 DeGuerin on the phone the other day.

15 HENRY: What, what, what, what are you
16 talking about?

17 STEVE SCHNEIDER: You know, I'm talking about
18 the paper whereas he said now, finally got -- finally,
19 he knows what he's doing or what he's waiting for,
20 meaning that he's to write these manuscripts out and
21 send them out.

22 HENRY: Um-hum.

23 STEVE SCHNEIDER: And that's the first thing
24 I had heard about it. So, at least for me, I see -- I
25 mean, I've been waiting here also upon his God,
wondering what it is I'm waiting for. None of us have

1 | really known.

2 | HENRY: I see.

3 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: But it's been like that in
4 | the past also. But it's always been like right around
5 | the corner from where you get -- like the waiting gets
6 | tiring. You can hardly --

7 | HENRY: Sure.

8 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: -- take it. It's like
9 | right around the corner. There's always in the past --

10 | HENRY: Um-hum.

11 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: -- from him been some
12 | awesome Bible studies or very clear answers.

13 | HENRY: Um-hum.

14 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: So, that's why I'm saying,
15 | for the waiting thing, for us it's not something new or
16 | unusual. I do understand that in this very odd,
17 | bizarre situation it would be to you. But like I'm
18 | saying, if you ever -- if you have a concordance there,
19 | sometime just look up the word "wait" throughout the
20 | Bible. It's quite -- especially in a place called
21 | Zephaniah, and then Chapter 3, verses 5 on, and you'll
22 | see something very plain and clear that you can
23 | associate to this period of time. Also, how has God
24 | always worked? Second Peter, Chapter 1, verses 19
25 | through 21. He chooses men and women, inspires them by
his spirit. They're able to write under divinity and

1 | they'll be able -- they're able to reveal. So, I --
2 | associate that together when you're thinking about us
3 | and why we're waiting here. But just take a
4 | concordance. Look up the word "wait" and --

5 | HENRY: Um-hum.

6 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: -- you'll be amazed at --
7 | all the prophecies talk -- wait, wait, wait. So, it's,
8 | it's not unusual to us. It's something we've looked at
9 | and we've been preparing for for a long time.

10 | HENRY: Um-hum. Steve, let me ask you
11 | something.

12 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: Sure.

13 | HENRY: Is there any chance that anybody else
14 | would want to come out? The reason that I'm asking you
15 | that is because now we're in a waiting posture for him
16 | to write the -- this manuscript. If -- it would really
17 | help, I'm telling you, it would really help if we could
18 | get some people to come out. You know, we would say,
19 | look, this is a, this is a show of, of good faith on
20 | their part. They're sincere in what they're saying.
21 | Everybody in there may not know exactly what they're
22 | waiting for, but they're waiting for David, whom they
23 | believe in, to give them a final word. It's been well
24 | over two weeks and we've had -- we've seen nothing from
25 | that end. Is there any chance that, that you could
 | make a, you know, a --

1 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Well, I could ask --

2 HENRY: -- and take a renewed interest --

3 STEVE SCHNEIDER: I can ask a number of --

4 HENRY: -- in trying to see if --

5 STEVE SCHNEIDER: -- people --

6 HENRY: -- there's some way that we can, that
7 we can make something happen that it, it -- you know,
8 from our perspective, it would really help, you know,
9 but --

10 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Well, you know, like I, I
11 can't -- there -- the other day, like yesterday,
12 someone did something that I did not like at all. I --

13 HENRY: Okay.

14 STEVE SCHNEIDER: -- said if that -- anything
15 like that happened again that that -- any individual
16 would definitely be going out. And like even today, I
17 can't -- I haven't for a few days asked anyone, but --
18 like I used to frequently --

19 HENRY: Sure.

20 STEVE SCHNEIDER: -- daily ask people --

21 HENRY: Sure.

22 STEVE SCHNEIDER: -- if they want to go out.
23 They, they know that.

24 HENRY: Um-hum.

25 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Like those three
individuals that ended up deciding because -- that once

1 | those letters came out -- they never said no, but what
2 | they said is they want to wait a little longer now.
3 | So, I never ended up pushing it. In fact, one of them
4 | told me to back off, so I decided just to leave him be.

5 | HENRY: Um-hum.

6 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: But they had -- one or two
7 | of them had -- I had detected something and I heard
8 | three people talking, and from that, that's what I had
9 | to do, it's that maybe they wanted to go out and so I
10 | was going to encourage it. But since then I really
11 | haven't asked anybody if they want to go out, but I
12 | sure can do that again and again.

13 | HENRY: Okay. Now, do me one more favor,
14 | Steve.

15 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: Um-hum.

16 | HENRY: Tell me exactly where in the -- in
17 | what portion of the building or where it was that, that
18 | the Bradley hit.

19 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: Let's see. As you're
20 | looking to the front of the building where the
21 | entrances, where we go in and out at --

22 | HENRY: Right.

23 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: From there, to your left as
24 | you're looking at the building, it would be -- let's
25 | see, how many feet down? I'm a poor judge of distance,
but I would guess --

1 HENRY: Do you know where the cars are
2 parked?

3 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Yes. It --

4 HENRY: Is it beyond that?

5 STEVE SCHNEIDER: -- probably, probably --

6 HENRY: Beyond that?

7 STEVE SCHNEIDER: I haven't -- I didn't look
8 outside in relation to where the cars are, but it seems
9 like it's -- must be somewhere where the last car, the
10 black one on the left is, somewhere straight on from
11 there.

12 HENRY: Okay. And he -- the Bradley just
13 came straight or was it making a turn or does anybody
14 know?

15 STEVE SCHNEIDER: I can't -- it, it seems
16 like it came straight into the building.

17 HENRY: And went right in?

18 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Well, you know, it came in
19 enough to -- at least -- I should really go take a look
20 at it, but --

21 HENRY: Yeah. Go take a look at it.

22 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Hang on a minute.

23 HENRY: Okay.

24 (Pause.)

25 HENRY: Go ahead.

STEVE SCHNEIDER: Yeah, it's -- I would say

1 | it was probably about 80 to 100 feet from the entrance
2 | to the left, and I just looked and it was knocked in at
3 | least a foot.

4 | HENRY: How, how mu-- how much of the wall?

5 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: It appears it was probably
6 | about as wide as the Bradley is. I don't know.

7 | HENRY: And it, and it pushed it right in?

8 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: Yeah.

9 | HENRY: About a -- did, did it actually break
10 | the --

11 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: It's hard to te-- you know,
12 | because it's got -- there is whatever it's called,
13 | plyboard or whatever else, of --

14 | HENRY: Um-hum.

15 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: -- course, that's broke.

16 | HENRY: Hmm.

17 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: And it seems like some of
18 | the wood was moved.

19 | HENRY: Okay. Okay. Well, I will -- I, I
20 | appreciate the information. Believe me, we will, we
21 | will take this to the commanders and the commanders
22 | will, you know, will deal with it, because this is not
23 | something that we're -- that we want. Believe me,
24 | Steve. I'm --

25 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: Okay.

 HENRY: -- I'm being as sincere with you as I

1 can be. We don't want, we don't want this to happen.
2 We don't want things like that to, to occur. It was
3 not intentional. It should not have happened.

4 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Okay. I believe you.
5 Okay. I'll leave -- it's, it's the daily now, so --

6 HENRY: Oh, okay.

7 STEVE SCHNEIDER: -- I'll get off the phone
8 for now and be in contact.

9 HENRY: Okay.

10 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Okay?

11 HENRY: I appreciate your, you know, your
12 offer on this and I am going to hold you to this.
13 Please make a sincere effort to see if we can get some
14 people out. It really will make a big difference.
15 Believe me.

16 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Well, as always, when you
17 request I've always --

18 HENRY: I know you have.

19 STEVE SCHNEIDER: -- done that because, you
20 know, I --

21 HENRY: I know you have.

22 STEVE SCHNEIDER: -- for myself, of course,
23 you know, I've got to make my decision. But for them,
24 I'll always encourage or ask.

25 HENRY: Okay. And I appreciate your calling
in.

1 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Okay.

2 HENRY: Okay?

3 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Sure.

4 HENRY: I'll talk to you later.

5 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Okay. Bye.

6 HENRY: Bye-bye.

7 *****

8 [Telephone dialed, then ringing.]

9 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Hello?

10 HENRY: Steve?

11 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Yes.

12 HENRY: Henry.

13 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Henry.

14 HENRY: How are we doing?

15 STEVE SCHNEIDER: I'm doing fine. How is
16 yourself?

17 HENRY: Okay. We're trying to do some things
18 at our end, you know, to kind of facilitate some -- you
19 know, a couple of situations. We addressed the issues
20 that we spoke about this morning.

21 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Um-hum.

22 HENRY: And let me ask you a few questions,
23 because it'll help our, our situation, you know, from
24 this end.

25 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Okay.

HENRY: Is, is David -- is it your perception

1 that David has finished the first seal?

2 STEVE SCHNEIDER: I -- you know, he was --
3 well, you know, what happened last night, as you
4 probably already are aware, first he spent three, three
5 hours on the phone with Clint. And then that incident
6 happened. I went to bed, I think -- I believe it was
7 like about midnight, somewhere around there. I'm
8 trying to remember. And I said to you this morning I
9 thought the incident happened at 3, but I was mistaken.
10 It was 1:30. I remembered --

11 HENRY: Okay.

12 STEVE SCHNEIDER: -- after I told you. And
13 then we came down and talked with Dick for some time.
14 I got -- I think that it was like 3:30. I, I don't
15 remember exactly the time. I know I didn't go to bed
16 till after 4. But after the incident happened, they
17 came and got me, so I had to go down and, of course,
18 look at it and see how Graham was and --

19 HENRY: Um-hum.

20 STEVE SCHNEIDER: And I've rechecked since
21 then. I, I -- the child, you know, Cyrus, I, I, I
22 found out, you know, he wasn't hurt other than his
23 feelings and --

24 HENRY: Good.

25 STEVE SCHNEIDER: -- all that kind of
business. So.

1 HENRY: Good.

2 STEVE SCHNEIDER: But he -- what's his name
3 -- Graham's got a head-- a pretty good headache. He's
4 got a few bruises, but that's about it. It hit right
5 where his bed and head was. His head is like inches
6 from the wall itself. So, it, it moved him for at
7 least a foot.

8 HENRY: So, he got conked on the head.

9 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Yeah.

10 HENRY: Yeah.

11 STEVE SCHNEIDER: But I -- it's nothing
12 major. So --

13 HENRY: Okay.

14 STEVE SCHNEIDER: In fact, the funny part is
15 -- I found out later. I went back after I talked to
16 you and I went and talked to him and others and, and I
17 guess he, he slept right through it until his name,
18 name was called.

19 HENRY: (Laughter.)

20 STEVE SCHNEIDER: So, I mean, I couldn't help
21 but laugh about that myself. I mean, some people --

22 HENRY: Did you call him a hard-head?

23 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Yeah, I think so. So, I
24 guess he's -- more than anything, I think -- I can't
25 even say the guy was surprised, other than the person
that was calling him.

1 HENRY: Um-hum.

2 STEVE SCHNEIDER: But --

3 HENRY: Do you think that David is working on
4 the first seal or the second seal?

5 STEVE SCHNEIDER: I, I haven't -- you know,
6 that's what I was -- that's right. You asked me that.
7 And what happened was then -- so, I turned in. It was
8 sometime after 4. I don't know when he turned in. I,
9 I went to bed and he was still up. So, I don't know if
10 he started working on it then -- or I haven't seen him
11 yet. This is the latest, you know, where the day's
12 gone by where I've not seen him. So -- and I, I just
13 went up there about, oh, 15 minutes ago, listened by
14 the door. It was very, very quiet. So, I don't think
15 that he's awake right now.

16 HENRY: Okay.

17 STEVE SCHNEIDER: But, you know, last night,
18 between the one conversation, the other one with Dick,
19 the incident, you know, it took a lot of time where he
20 would have been working, I know, for sure.

21 HENRY: Okay. Well, let's do this then.

22 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Okay.

23 HENRY: Do me a -- do me some favors. Okay?

24 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Okay. Let's hear them.

25 HENRY: Okay. First of all, find out where
he is. Is he working on the first -- is he still on

1 | the first seal? Is he working on the second seal?
2 | Okay. And, secondly, do you -- see what your
3 | perception is or, or, or ask him: does he believe that
4 | each seal, the second, the third, fourth, fifth, sixth,
5 | and seventh, are they going to take about the same
6 | amount of time and is he going to -- you know, are they
7 | going to be as long -- that is to say --

8 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: I don't think so, Henry,
9 | because --

10 | HENRY: Okay.

11 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: -- you know, what I already
12 | know myself with the seals, like, say, one, two, three,
13 | four, five, they're all different. And I think -- like
14 | the fourth seal, as you'll learn, is a very deep seal.
15 | It's, it's one of the deepest of the first four, in
16 | fact, is the deepest. The first one, I -- it would
17 | seem like he's got his done. He hasn't handed it to
18 | me. I don't know why yet.

19 | HENRY: Um-hum.

20 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: And I think he said there
21 | was like somewhere around -- I, I don't know if he
22 | counted real carefully, but he said it's between 28 and
23 | 30 pages or something like that, he told me, and --

24 | HENRY: Uh-huh.

25 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: And I know I saw the papers
all over the place and --

1 HENRY: Yeah.

2 STEVE SCHNEIDER: -- I asked him when he
3 wanted to give them to me. He says, well, just, just
4 not, just not yet. Apparently, he wants to make sure
5 that it's, it's real clear, I mean, his thoughts are
6 down, and --

7 HENRY: Um-hum.

8 STEVE SCHNEIDER: He said he was already
9 work-- he's already working on the second one.

10 HENRY: He did say that?

11 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Yeah, he did.

12 HENRY: Okay.

13 STEVE SCHNEIDER: I don't know if he, he
14 means he's, he's just begun it or what, but he said he
15 started working on the second. I heard him say that.

16 HENRY: Okay.

17 STEVE SCHNEIDER: And I, I've been waiting to
18 get in there this morning. And now, of course, here it
19 is five after two and I still haven't seen him. So,
20 I'm waiting to hear -- or see if he's going to give it
21 to me or whatever else.

22 HENRY: Okay. Additionally -- well, you said
23 that the fourth seal is probably the deepest one, so
24 that's probably going to be the longest one.

25 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Well, that -- I wonder
myself what he's going to do with that. In the past

1 | when he's given studies on that -- I mean, I know
2 | basically where he goes, what he does. And -- but
3 | something like that is very -- going to be very
4 | difficult. I would have difficulty in putting that
5 | together. But, of course, if it's originally, like
6 | everything else that he's given us, he's -- he does --
7 | honestly, he gets very deep. If you ever got into --
8 | if you had some -- a good background in the Bible and
9 | you sat down with him, he -- he'll go beyond things
10 | that you've ever dreamed possible. But that -- in
11 | saying that, I guess how I'm reacting to that is that
12 | I'm not sure what he's going to do to elaborate on
13 | paper.

14 | HENRY: Okay.

15 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: You know, because you can
16 | always express in words and respond to people's
17 | reactions, questions. So, that's why I'm not, I'm not
18 | certain either just how he would go about that.

19 | HENRY: Okay.

20 | STEVE SCHNEIDER: But he's never seemed to
21 | have difficulties if he's directed to do something.
22 | You know, I mean, it happens. Like that -- for
23 | instance, those letters came out actually pretty
24 | quickly.

25 | HENRY: Yes, they did.

 STEVE SCHNEIDER: I went upstairs. I came

1 back. And here he, here he hands me the things. What?

2 HENRY: Um-hum.

3 STEVE SCHNEIDER: I was, I was quite
4 surprised.

5 HENRY: Okay. One of the things that we, you
6 know, would like, you know, from our end to try to
7 facilitate, and I'm not, I'm not, I'm not promising you
8 anything on this, Steve. It's just, you know --

9 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Okay.

10 HENRY: -- something that we'd like to, to
11 try to work on, okay, from our end. It's, you know,
12 it's the ribbon for the typewriter --

13 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Okay.

14 HENRY: -- for that manual typewriter that
15 you got.

16 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Right. Right.

17 HENRY: Okay. What kind of a typewriter is
18 it?

19 STEVE SCHNEIDER: It belongs to Wayne Martin,
20 and I haven't actually even seen it.

21 HENRY: Do me a favor.

22 STEVE SCHNEIDER: But -- okay.

23 HENRY: Go over there and look at it, get me
24 the, get me the make --

25 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Okay.

HENRY: You know. Get me everything about

1 the typewriter that you can get for me.

2 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Henry, what, what's
3 happened is -- remember I told you we had one that
4 operates on batteries? I think it's six C -- D-sized
5 batteries. Graham worked on it all yesterday, last
6 night, and he says it's not working properly. So,
7 that, it would seem like, would go the fastest. So, I
8 think Judy would prefer -- or whoever else would be
9 doing the typing -- would probably prefer to use that
10 one.

11 HENRY: But if, but if it's not working --

12 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Well, that's true. That's
13 true.

14 HENRY: What, what about the, what about the,
15 the other one, the manual one?

16 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Okay. That I can go -- I
17 don't know anything about it. I mean, I don't know
18 what brand -- I just know that when I was asking --
19 when he first, you know, came up with this thing about
20 that he's going to publish these things, well, the
21 first thing that came into my mind is what do we have
22 around here still --

23 HENRY: Um-hum.

24 STEVE SCHNEIDER: -- for typewriters,
25 because --

 HENRY: Yeah.

1 STEVE SCHNEIDER: -- of course, we're heavy
2 into computers here. And the computers we have, we've
3 always used those, you know --

4 HENRY: Um-hum.

5 STEVE SCHNEIDER: -- with WordPerfect --

6 HENRY: Um-hum.

7 STEVE SCHNEIDER: -- and all that.

8 HENRY: Yeah.

9 STEVE SCHNEIDER: But now -- that's why I, I
10 started looking around, and I found out that we have, I
11 believe, about four typewriters. I think -- I was told
12 two manuals, but --

13 HENRY: Okay.

14 STEVE SCHNEIDER: -- the only one I know for
15 a fact is that there is one here. I don't know about
16 the second. I have it -- but I think Wayne knows where
17 the one is.

18 HENRY: Okay. Well --

19 STEVE SCHNEIDER: So.

20 HENRY: -- do some research.

21 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Okay.

22 HENRY: And, and when you have the answers to
23 that, call me back.

24 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Okay.

25 HENRY: And, and if you can, if it's
possible, let me know where he is with, with that first

1 seal.

2 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Yeah, I'll try to do that,
3 because --

4 HENRY: And --

5 STEVE SCHNEIDER: -- of course, I'm curious
6 myself.

7 HENRY: Yeah. And then, and then, you know,
8 give me all the information on the ribbon and let me
9 work on that from this end. But, but get all of that
10 ready for me so that --

11 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Okay.

12 HENRY: -- I can work on it, you know,
13 completely.

14 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Sure. Okay. I'll get back
15 to you.

16 HENRY: You give me a call.

17 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Yeah.

18 HENRY: Thanks.

19 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Okay. Bye.

20 HENRY: Bye.

21 *****

22 HENRY: Hello?

23 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Hello. Henry?

24 HENRY: Um-hum.

25 STEVE SCHNEIDER: Yeah. Judy's right here.
She'll give you, oh, something about the typewriters.

1 I guess it's down to two of them that she would be
2 using.

3 HENRY: Okay.

4 STEVE SCHNEIDER: We checked them all over
5 here real quick. And, and here she is.

6 HENRY: Okay.

7 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Hello?

8 HENRY: Hi, Judy.

9 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Hi. Who's this?

10 HENRY: Henry.

11 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Henry. How are you doing?

12 HENRY: Just fine. How are you?

13 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Good.

14 HENRY: How's the finger?

15 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Good. What I have is a
16 Sharp word processor. The number is PA --

17 HENRY: Hold on. Hold on. PA --

18 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Dash W1410.

19 HENRY: W1410?

20 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Yeah. That's the name of
21 the machine.

22 HENRY: Okay.

23 JUDY SCHNEIDER: It's a Sharp word processor,
24 PA-W1410.

25 HENRY: Now, is that a, a manual?

JUDY SCHNEIDER: A manual? No. It's

1 | electric. But we've got it hooked up to batteries.
2 | HENRY: Okay. And what do you need with
3 | that?
4 | JUDY SCHNEIDER: I need -- I just -- I had a
5 | Smith Corona before and I just traded it for this one.
6 | So, I need a couple of ribbon cassettes.
7 | HENRY: Okay.
8 | JUDY SCHNEIDER: And it's ZX dash --
9 | HENRY: Hold on. Hold on. V --
10 | JUDY SCHNEIDER: No, ZX.
11 | HENRY: Okay. Z --
12 | JUDY SCHNEIDER: Zebra.
13 | HENRY: -- X --
14 | JUDY SCHNEIDER: Dash 3CS2.
15 | HENRY: 3CX --
16 | JUDY SCHNEIDER: S.
17 | HENRY: S.
18 | JUDY SCHNEIDER: Sam. 2. Yeah.
19 | HENRY: 2?
20 | JUDY SCHNEIDER: Yeah. A couple of those
21 | ribbon cassettes --
22 | HENRY: Okay.
23 | JUDY SCHNEIDER: -- and I'd like two
24 | printwheels, an Orator and a Script.
25 | HENRY: Two printwheels?
 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Printwheels, yeah. So, I

1 | could be able to change the font. Orator, which is
2 | large, and the Script, which is -- you know what script
3 | is.

4 | HENRY: Um-hum. Let me make sure. Let's
5 | see. We need two ribbon cassettes. That's a, a ZX --

6 | JUDY SCHNEIDER: Um-hum.

7 | HENRY: -- 3C --

8 | JUDY SCHNEIDER: Um-hum.

9 | HENRY: -- S2.

10 | JUDY SCHNEIDER: Um-hum.

11 | HENRY: Okay.

12 | JUDY SCHNEIDER: And then I don't know what
13 | the number of the printwheels are for, for that
14 | machine, but they'll know at whatever store you go to.

15 | HENRY: Okay. The, the ribbons should
16 | correspond to the Sharp --

17 | JUDY SCHNEIDER: Machine, yeah.

18 | HENRY: -- machine. Okay.

19 | JUDY SCHNEIDER: Yeah, everything. They
20 | might change the numbers, but they'll know the machine.

21 | HENRY: Okay.

22 | JUDY SCHNEIDER: And, then, the lift-off
23 | correction tape, I'd need --

24 | HENRY: What now?

25 | JUDY SCHNEIDER: Lift-off correction tape.

 HENRY: Okay.

1 JUDY SCHNEIDER: For the -- I think it says
2 PA-3100 series.

3 HENRY: 3--

4 JUDY SCHNEIDER: 3100.

5 HENRY: 3100.

6 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Yeah.

7 HENRY: Series?

8 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Yeah.

9 HENRY: Okay.

10 JUDY SCHNEIDER: And it's, I think -- I have
11 an old box of ZX --

12 HENRY: ZX.

13 JUDY SCHNEIDER: -- dash 4LF.

14 HENRY: 4LS (sic).

15 JUDY SCHNEIDER: 4LF, yeah. For --

16 HENRY: Now, what is this last thing?

17 JUDY SCHNEIDER: That's the number for the
18 correction tape.

19 HENRY: Oh, okay. Okay.

20 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Okay. So, that takes care
21 of that machine. Then there's another one. It's a
22 Casio-- it's called a Casiowriter.

23 HENRY: Okay. Let me ask you this. Which
24 one are you going to use? Do you --

25 JUDY SCHNEIDER: I'm going to use the Sharp.

HENRY: -- prefer one or the other?

1 JUDY SCHNEIDER: I'm going to use the Sharp,
2 but we are -- that one's, you know, hooked up to
3 batteries. So, if our batteries get messed up or
4 something --

5 HENRY: Okay. And the second one is a
6 manual?

7 JUDY SCHNEIDER: It's a, it's a battery-
8 operated typewriter.

9 HENRY: The second one?

10 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Yeah.

11 HENRY: Okay.

12 JUDY SCHNEIDER: It's a battery-operated
13 typewriter and I, I may need somebody to help me out,
14 you know.

15 HENRY: Oh, I see what you're saying. Have
16 somebody else type --

17 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Yeah.

18 HENRY: -- at -- be typing something --

19 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Yeah.

20 HENRY: -- else. Okay.

21 JUDY SCHNEIDER: And it's just a typewriter.
22 It's not a word processor. So.

23 HENRY: A typewriter.

24 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Yeah.

25 HENRY: Okay.

JUDY SCHNEIDER: And the number is CW-16.

1 HENRY: Okay.

2 JUDY SCHNEIDER: And I need -- oh, boy, those
3 ribbon cartridges are real small. Maybe about four
4 ribbon cartridges.

5 HENRY: Four ribbon cartridges.

6 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Um-hum.

7 HENRY: Okay.

8 JUDY SCHNEIDER: And some correction ribbon.

9 HENRY: And correction ribbon.

10 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Uh-huh. And 12 D batteries.

11 HENRY: Twelve D --

12 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Yeah.

13 HENRY: -- batteries?

14 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Um-hum.

15 HENRY: How much does it take?

16 JUDY SCHNEIDER: How many does it take?

17 HENRY: Um-hum.

18 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Four.

19 HENRY: Okay.

20 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Okay. And, then, here's
21 another request. Since we don't have electricity and I
22 was trying to type last night in the dark, and a candle
23 is not real good on my eyes. If you could get a, a
24 battery-operated lamp? I know they have them at Wal-
25 Mart. They're like six dollars or something with a
battery. They're these little tiny plastic lamps and

1 | you put a big square battery in them. I don't know
2 | what size the battery is called. Otherwise, if you
3 | can't handle that, get me a six-inch by two-inch
4 | candle.

5 | HENRY: Okay. Six-inch by two-inch candle.

6 | JUDY SCHNEIDER: Or a battery --

7 | HENRY: Or a --

8 | JUDY SCHNEIDER: -- operated lamp.

9 | HENRY: Or a battery-operated lamp.

10 | JUDY SCHNEIDER: Yeah.

11 | HENRY: Okay.

12 | JUDY SCHNEIDER: They're camping lanterns
13 | that they -- they're, they're not a lantern. They're
14 | just -- they look like a little lamp.

15 | HENRY: Okay. Okay.

16 | JUDY SCHNEIDER: I meant to get one before,
17 | but --

18 | HENRY: Okay. Now, you know, I want you to
19 | understand and I want -- you know, as I, as I told to
20 | -- as I said to Steve --

21 | JUDY SCHNEIDER: Um-hum.

22 | HENRY: -- you know, this is something that
23 | we're -- you know, the negotiators are initiating.

24 | JUDY SCHNEIDER: Oh, okay.

25 | HENRY: You know, we're going to try to sell
this to the bosses --

1 JUDY SCHNEIDER: I see.
2 HENRY: -- but, you know, you know --
3 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Oh, whatever.
4 HENRY: -- we'll, we'll, we'll do the best
5 that we can.
6 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Yeah. I just realized after
7 he asked me that that I, I thought I had a bunch of
8 ribbons for the machine that I have, but I don't,
9 because it's from my old machine and I just traded it,
10 you know. It --
11 HENRY: Um-hum.
12 JUDY SCHNEIDER: -- sold it, the, the other
13 one.
14 HENRY: Okay. Okay. Now, tell me this. Do
15 you have a manual typewriter?
16 JUDY SCHNEIDER: I wouldn't be using a manual
17 typewriter.
18 HENRY: No. Okay.
19 JUDY SCHNEIDER: I'd rather handwrite it.
20 And --
21 HENRY: Okay. Okay. I just wanted --
22 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Yeah.
23 HENRY: -- to check, just to make --
24 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Yeah.
25 HENRY: -- sure if you --
JUDY SCHNEIDER: We have one, but --

1 HENRY: -- if you wound up with some kind of
2 a problem, you know.

3 JUDY SCHNEIDER: I don't want to mess with
4 it.

5 HENRY: Okay. Now, do you know how far David
6 is with the, with the seals?

7 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Well, I, I don't know how
8 much there is to go. You know?

9 HENRY: No, no.

10 JUDY SCHNEIDER: I don't know where he's on
11 the seals.

12 HENRY: I mean on the first one, on the first
13 one.

14 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Do I -- I just know what he
15 -- you know, what I've been doing already. So, I don't
16 know --

17 HENRY: Okay.

18 JUDY SCHNEIDER: -- how far he is. I haven't
19 talked --

20 HENRY: And, and --

21 JUDY SCHNEIDER: -- to him yet today.

22 HENRY: And have you, have you been typing?

23 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Yeah.

24 HENRY: Okay. How far are you?

25 JUDY SCHNEIDER: How -- well, that's what I'm
telling you. I don't know how far I'm into anything,

1 | you know.

2 | HENRY: No. But I'm saying, you know, have
3 | you typed half a page, three pages, ten pages?

4 | JUDY SCHNEIDER: I've got some things on
5 | disk, yeah.

6 | HENRY: Okay. But would you say you have ten
7 | pages, five pages?

8 | JUDY SCHNEIDER: Let's see. One, two, three
9 | -- I've got a couple -- maybe a couple pages.

10 | HENRY: Oh, okay. Okay. Okay. Well, let me
11 | see what I can do from this in. Okay?

12 | JUDY SCHNEIDER: And what I'm doing too is
13 | I'm trying to get some of the scriptures that I know
14 | he's going to be using, even though he hasn't told me,
15 | I'm trying to get them on disk so I can just pull them
16 | up.

17 | HENRY: Oh, okay. I see what you're saying.

18 | JUDY SCHNEIDER: And then I'll insert what
19 | his manuscript --

20 | HENRY: Okay. So, you're typing some of that
21 | ahead?

22 | JUDY SCHNEIDER: Yeah. I'm just going ahead
23 | on my own right now for -- till --

24 | HENRY: Okay.

25 | JUDY SCHNEIDER: -- till he gives the word.

 HENRY: Okay.

1 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Okay?
2 HENRY: Okay. Is --
3 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Good idea, huh?
4 HENRY: Is, is Steve there?
5 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Is Steve here right now?
6 HENRY: Hmm.
7 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Well, it's worship hour
8 right now. Do you --
9 HENRY: Oh, I thought it was --
10 JUDY SCHNEIDER: 3:00.
11 HENRY: Oh, yeah. Okay. Three.
12 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Yeah.
13 HENRY: Okay. Okay. Now, how, how --
14 JUDY SCHNEIDER: (indiscernible)
15 HENRY: -- is your hand? Are you still able
16 to type even though --
17 (Unidentified voice in background not
18 discernible.)
19 JUDY SCHNEIDER: I, I need to get off the
20 phone right now. I want to go study.
21 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER (BACKGROUND): Don't
22 talk right (indiscernible).
23 HENRY: Fine.
24 JUDY SCHNEIDER: It's worship time right now.
25 HENRY: Fine.
JUDY SCHNEIDER: Okay?

1 HENRY: Okay.

2 JUDY SCHNEIDER: Appreciate it. Thanks.

3 HENRY: Um-hum. Bye.

4 *****

5 [Telephone ringing.]

6 RICK-1: Is it ringing now?

7 UNIDENTIFIED AGENT: 10:56.

8 PHIL HENRY: (Indiscernible.)

9 RICK-1: Yeah. Who is this?

10 PHIL HENRY: This is Phil Henry, Philip
11 Henry. I guess you're requesting for Steve or David?

12 RICK-1: Yeah. Is Steve there?

13 PHIL HENRY: Yeah. Well, he, he gave me a
14 note about over an hour ago and he, he told me he
15 turned in. And he says if anyone rang that he'd ask
16 for you to ring first thing in the morning, like
17 quarter to nine. That's the time he gave.

18 RICK-1: Okay. What did the note say again?

19 PHIL HENRY: He said to ring -- if, if, if
20 you guys could ring in the morning at quarter till
21 nine, he'll be available then. He's gone to bed. He
22 went over to bed about over an hour ago

23 RICK-1: Uh-huh.

24 PHIL HENRY: And with it being sabbath, but I
25 understand there's things we may need to talk tomorrow.

RICK-1: Okay. Well, maybe you can --

1 PHIL HENRY: No, the -- really, there isn't
2 anything I can give you. Who, who's speaking, anyway,
3 by the way?

4 RICK-1: Rick.

5 PHIL HENRY: Rick?

6 RICK-1: Yeah.

7 PHIL HENRY: Okay.

8 RICK-1: I think Steve has referred to me as
9 Rick-1. I'm not sure.

10 PHIL HENRY: Okay. Yeah. Well, there's a --

11 RICK-1: I think he had something about he
12 wanted to talk to me. He's been --

13 PHIL HENRY: Yeah.

14 RICK-1: -- asking to talk to me for several
15 days now, from what I understand.

16 PHIL HENRY: I see. Would you be able to
17 speak to him in the morning?

18 RICK-1: Well, I'm going to be leaving at
19 midnight tonight, as a matter of fact, so --

20 PHIL HENRY: I see. Well, nothing I can do
21 about that. But I hope the questions you have can, can
22 be passed on to the next negotiator.

23 RICK-1: Yeah. Well, one of the reasons why
24 I called, I just heard on the news that, that they were
25 reporting that the manuscript that David's working on
had been finished.

1 PHIL HENRY: See, well -- actually, I don't
2 know anything about that right now. I know that
3 they've been working on it a lot --

4 RICK-1: Yeah.

5 PHIL HENRY: -- but I don't know exactly
6 where they're at right now. I don't think we've put
7 anything outside the windows but -- which, which could
8 indicate to the press that it's been finished.

9 RICK-1: Yeah.

10 PHIL HENRY: But as far as I know, it's not
11 being said. I think we'd be the first to know.

12 RICK-1: Who, who else is in the room with
13 you there?

14 PHIL HENRY: Pardon?

15 RICK-1: Who else is in the room with you
16 there?

17 PHIL HENRY: There's no, no one around right
18 now.

19 RICK-1: Nobody is?

20 PHIL HENRY: With (indiscernible) being
21 sabbath night. So --

22 RICK-1: Um-hum.

23 PHIL HENRY: -- today we were just trying to
24 keep our minds on the word and --

25 RICK-1: Um-hum.

 PHIL HENRY: -- that's it.

1 RICK-1: So, so, you want us to -- he wanted
2 us to call back in the morning, about what time?

3 PHIL HENRY: Yeah, that's right. Quarter to
4 nine.

5 RICK-1: A quarter to nine in the morning?

6 PHIL HENRY: Yeah.

7 RICK-1: Okay.

8 PHIL HENRY: All right.

9 RICK-1: Did you want to maybe knock on his
10 door just to tell him who's on the phone. Just since
11 I'm going to be leaving at midnight, I won't be able to
12 talk to him in the morning. I didn't know whether he
13 had something in particular that he wanted to discuss
14 or what. Just, you know, if he doesn't want to talk,
15 that's fine, but you might at least let him know that I
16 was calling and would be leaving.

17 PHIL HENRY: Yeah. Well, you see, he told
18 me, actually twice, see, because I, I'm in this general
19 area here.

20 RICK-1: Uh-huh.

21 PHIL HENRY: And -- and I -- if I could --
22 you know, see, he's been up all day. He's been trying
23 to get a lot of things out. He's been running up and
24 down the place and I know he's, he's really tired.
25 So --

 RICK-1: How about Judy? Is she there?

1 PHIL HENRY: Judy? If anything, I guess
2 she'd be here working on -- if she's not sleeping,
3 she'd probably be working on the, on the seals.

4 RICK-1: Yeah. So, she's working, working on
5 it with David still?

6 PHIL HENRY: Pardon?

7 RICK-1: She's working on it with David
8 still? Is that --

9 PHIL HENRY: I'm not sure right now. But,
10 actually, see, I've just been told just to -- just this
11 basic message, you know. If you could ring -- well, I
12 guess see if you could pass the message on to the next
13 negotiator, about those, those questions you're -- that
14 are on your mind.

15 RICK-1: Are you one of Zilla's sons?

16 PHIL HENRY: Zealous (sic)? I, I believe I
17 should follow, you know, according to what I see. You
18 know.

19 RICK-1: Um-hum.

20 PHIL HENRY: So --

21 (Unidentified voice in background not
22 discernible.)

23 RICK-1: You don't, you don't have the, the
24 ability to speak for yourself? Is that what you're
25 saying?

 PHIL HENRY: No. When I say -- that I

1 | believe in myself I should form my conscience, whatever
2 | I perceive, according to the truth.

3 | RICK-1: Uh-huh.

4 | PHIL HENRY: I believe that's what I should
5 | follow and that's what I do. I mean --

6 | RICK-1: So --

7 | PHIL HENRY: -- the mystics in the past or
8 | anything like that -- (Unidentified voice in background
9 | not discernible) -- but --

10 | RICK-1: No, I wasn't clear on what that had
11 | to do with the question that I had as to whether --

12 | PHIL HENRY: Well, you said am I one of the
13 | zealots? Yeah.

14 | RICK-1: You kind of confused me there a
15 | little bit.

16 | PHIL HENRY: Yeah. Well, you know, I'd like
17 | -- actually, with -- you're, you're Rick-1, right?

18 | RICK-1: Right.

19 | PHIL HENRY: Right. Tonight I've been asked
20 | not to go into a lot of debate, but I would like to
21 | talk to you on another occasion.

22 | RICK-1: Uh-huh.

23 | PHIL HENRY: And are you, are you -- we've
24 | got -- will you be on the phone tomorrow evening?

25 | RICK-1: No. I'm going -- see, I'm with the
Austin Police Department, so I've got to go back

1 | tonight.

2 | PHIL HENRY: Yeah. And -- well, the question
3 | was am I a zealite (sic), zealot?

4 | RICK-1: No, no, no. No. Zilla's son.
5 | Zilla Henry. Is that your mother?

6 | PHIL HENRY: Oh, sorry. Yeah. I thought you
7 | said zealot.

8 | RICK-1: No, no, no. Just --

9 | PHIL HENRY: Sorry. Yeah, yeah. I'm Zilla's
10 | son here.

11 | RICK-1: Yes. I guess, I guess you were one
12 | of the ones in the video that we saw?

13 | PHIL HENRY: That's right. I didn't say much
14 | in the video.

15 | RICK-1: Okay.

16 | PHIL HENRY: If I'd -- I just said hello at
17 | the beginning and --

18 | RICK-1: Yeah.

19 | PHIL HENRY: -- I was at the back with my
20 | brother Steven and -- yeah. I'm surprised you guys --
21 | well, of course, you guys are very in tune with those
22 | that have gone out.

23 | RICK-1: Well, no. I mean, we've talked to
24 | Zilla off and on, I guess, a couple of times over
25 | the --

 PHIL HENRY: I see.

1 RICK-1: -- over the past and --

2 PHIL HENRY: Yeah.

3 RICK-1: That's why the, the name came to
4 mind.

5 PHIL HENRY: Okay.

6 RICK-1: And then I think at some point in
7 time in the past somebody else -- relatives outside
8 were inquiring about you.

9 PHIL HENRY: Yeah. Yeah.

10 RICK-1: Because I think you were here from
11 where -- from United Kingdom?

12 PHIL HENRY: That's right. Manchester.

13 RICK-1: Yeah.

14 PHIL HENRY: Yeah.

15 RICK-1: So --

16 PHIL HENRY: Yeah.

17 RICK-1: And I was kind of curious about
18 that.

19 PHIL HENRY: Yeah. Anyway --

20 RICK-1: What's your, what's your opinion of
21 all this?

22 PHIL HENRY: Well, I am -- I -- it's hard to
23 believe everything that's been shown so far and -- see,
24 I can understand on the outside it's very difficult to,
25 to probably compromise or to, to see where David's
coming from, and I -- you know, we've been here for

1 | like three or four years off and on, going back from
2 | England, and we've heard him over a number of years.
3 | And I think it's time before we drew our conclusions,
4 | but we were very hesitant to until we'd seen the words.
5 | You know, you hear a lot of rumors and stuff.

6 | RICK-1: Um-hum.

7 | PHIL HENRY: So, I can understand there are a
8 | lot of people out there, you know, thinking this guy is
9 | crazy. But our hope is that, you know, God will do
10 | something so that people will be able to see.

11 | RICK-1: Um-hum.

12 | PHIL HENRY: You know, clearly, there's a,
13 | there's a lot of confusion around with so many
14 | different religions, so many churches. But these
15 | things -- you know, I believe, it's beyond myself.
16 | It's not a small thing here. It must grow. But all I
17 | can say really is wait and see, you know, and --

18 | RICK-1: Yeah.

19 | PHIL HENRY: -- don't make any, any -- come
20 | to any conclusions till you've seen the evidence.
21 | Right now he's writing the seals --

22 | RICK-1: Yeah.

23 | PHIL HENRY: -- and -- and --

24 | RICK-1: Well, I think probably where, where
25 | our confusion is from is, you know, from the, the
 | standpoint of Christianity --

1 PHIL HENRY: Yeah.

2 RICK-1: -- it's always been taught that,
3 that Christ was very honest, aboveboard, was always
4 willing to share.

5 PHIL HENRY: Um-hum.

6 RICK-1: In it's, in it's entirety, his
7 belief was anyone that was interested in listening.
8 And, and not so much just giving his point of view, but
9 to really explain and answer their questions outright.

10 PHIL HENRY: Um-hum.

11 RICK-1: And --

12 PHIL HENRY: Yeah.

13 RICK-1: -- it seems like there's been so
14 much deceit and evasion in this, I guess. It -- and
15 thi-- it just kind of confuses from that standpoint --

16 PHIL HENRY: Yeah.

17 RICK-1: -- you know.

18 PHIL HENRY: Yeah. Well, you know, as I say,
19 you know, I've been here for like four year-- four or
20 five years, going back and forth, and I've seen him
21 work. But, as I say, I can only give my experience.
22 You fellows in there outside, that's what you see right
23 now. So --

24 RICK-1: Yeah.

25 PHIL HENRY: -- you know, maybe that's all
you need to know for right now. Okay?

1 RICK-1: No, I understand. You know, it's --

2 PHIL HENRY: So, you know, I wouldn't -- I'm
3 not really worried right now of the --

4 RICK-1: There's just been throughout this
5 whole thing a lot of prevarication and, and it's
6 been --

7 PHIL HENRY: Yeah.

8 RICK-1: -- been rather confusing --

9 PHIL HENRY: Yeah.

10 RICK-1: -- to us, you know --

11 PHIL HENRY: Right.

12 RICK-1: -- in that standpoint.

13 PHIL HENRY: Yeah.

14 RICK-1: And I understand y'all, you know,
15 y'all have been concerned about things that you see as
16 being contradictory from our standpoint. But I think
17 pretty much from the negotiators that everyone's spoken
18 to, we've been pretty straightforward all the way
19 through. And that's why it has kind of confused us.
20 We don't -- of course, we don't hold ourself out to be
21 godly either, so that's -- even if we hadn't been --

22 PHIL HENRY: Yeah.

23 RICK-1: -- a little less than truthful,
24 then --

25 PHIL HENRY: Um-hum.

RICK-1: -- I think probably from that

1 | standpoint, it --

2 | PHIL HENRY: Yeah.

3 | RICK-1: -- it would be a little different
4 | category there of, of --

5 | PHIL HENRY: Yeah.

6 | RICK-1: -- of understanding.

7 | PHIL HENRY: Um-hum.

8 | RICK-1: Why, why did it take David so long
9 | to begin writing his manuscript? Hadn't this been
