We already know in 1988, that I sat and I was given statements 8 9 from a prosecuting attorney such as this, Okay, 10 Mr. Howe (Phonetic), the night you went out there to 11 murder George Roden (Phonetic), did you ever stop to 12 think that what you was doing was wrong, yes or no? Now, I do need to explain. I -- no, I just want a yes 13 14 You see, that, that is a hanged statement, 15 and that, you know, that should not even be allowed in 16 a court of law. But it was in my case. 17 HENRY: Were you found innocent or guilty? 18 DAVID: What happened to me was, is that 19 according to the laws and precepts of the law, when a 20 jury is chosen, it is required that no member of that 21 jury is to be associated with either the defense or the 22 prosecution, right? 23 HENRY: Um-hum. 24 DAVID: They're to be strangers, aren't they? 25 HENRY: Um-hum.

Well, what happened was, after the decisions 4 were made and the acquittal of the seven others, we 6 threw a little party down at our studio. We had a 7 little music studio down off of 17th Street, and we invited the jury members to that party. 8 9 **HENRY:** Uh-huh. 10 DAVID: Huh? 11 I'm saying uh-huh. HENRY: 12 Okay. Well, what happened was, some DAVID: of the -- well, the man that was in charge of it, they 13 14 began to explain, they began to say, now, look, we don't know why, but there was an individual and another 15 16 individual that, which these people did not come to the 17 party, okay? 18 HENRY: Uh-huh. 19 DAVID: It was the two black members. 20 that no matter what we reasoned, what we said to them, 21 they would not admit that you were not quilty, and we 22 couldn't -- we worked on it for hours, we, you know, we talked to them, they said, but, but Mr. Howe, they 23 24 says, you know, -- So finally, what we decided to do, 25 is we decided to agree that we was going to, going to go ahead and acquit the other seven and they was going

to come back in again and vote on you, and then we was going to make you guilty. And so they agreed with that. So, we went ahead, and we gave our decisions on the seven, went back in on you and then we went ahead and it was a hung jury again.

HENRY: Uh-huh.

DAVID: But they had to do this, they had to, the people that heard the evidence on both sides, after the second they had decided what was taken place here, you know, originally, -- Well, you'd know, you should know at this time about the speculations of Vic Fazell (Phonetic) and his dealings with the, you know, you know, Waco is known for its methamphetamine, you know, that don't you?

HENRY: Um-hum.

DAVID: Okay, and it's drugs?

HENRY: Um-hum.

DAVID: I mean, you know, it's such a nice place around here and everything. Well, we came back on the property in 1988, that's what they were in the process of doing. Now, the sherriff's department knew about that. They knew completely about that. Especially with individuals such as Donny Joe Harvey, Roy Borwells (phonetic), you know, George Roden, you know. The thing of it was is that individuals who'd been saying that George was into the experimentation of

20 a little coke here and there, you know, all hearsay 1 2 stuff, but of course, the purposes of this is that when 3 he started digging up the cemetery, you know, the cemetery, the question was, what is this man doing? 4 Where is he coming from? Well, what did I do? I 5 simply went to the sherriff's department, and I 6 explained to, you know, the sherriff, Dickerson, who's 7 8 now, you know, he has Parkinson's Disease or something, off the force, I explained to him the situation and I 9 10 asked that he would go out to Mt. Carmel and look into 11 this and deal with it. It's called corpse abuse. 12 **HENRY:** Uh-huh. 13 DAVID: He wouldn't do nothing. Kept telling 14 me we had to have evidence. Well everybody could see 15 him out there anytime, digging in the cemetery with a, with a John Deere 1010 tractor. 16 17 HENRY: Uh-huh. 18 DAVID: Okay, well, what happened was, is it 19 was really kind of funny. So then, I'm down in 20

Palestine where we had to purchase a property down there because of all the people that originally were, had bequeathments and second tie rights for the property here, we had to re-locate them because George had, had ran them all off with a semi-automatic Uzi. When his mother, who was the director at that time, tried to talk to the people to give her time to work

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with them, they, in Christian faith, you know, went
ahead and didn't enact a restraining order against him,
'cause he had a restraining order against him since
1978, which, in allowing him to come back on the
property, that violated the rights to enforce the

HENRY: Um-hum.

restraining order.

people couldn't move back, and the law was not going to enforce it. Okay, so, we had, we had a waiting period there. Then all of a sudden this George guy calls me up and tells me that he's got this lady that was buried twenty, some twenty years ago, back in '88, and, you know, challenged me to a duel to resurrection. And I told him, I says, "George, not today." You know, George, like a lot of people, didn't understand where I was coming from.

George became upset when I first came here in 1981, because this little group of people were known for many years to be people who have ever accepted light as it unfolds. Okay, so naturally when God's going to do work, he's going to choose people and have ears to hear and eyes to see, right?

HENRY: Um-hum.

DAVID: So I began to come here and these people were considered to be one of the top bible

1 people in the whole world. I mean, that's, that's all 2 they've done ever since the '30s, is they've studied the prophecies. 3 4 Well, when I came, all of a sudden the mysteries unfolded. Well, this outraged George. George has this 5 6 idea that he's supposed to be the heir of this property 7 because his mother and father was the original originator of this association. 8 9 **HENRY:** Um-hum. 10 Well, things didn't work out so he 11 took the situation by force. Dickerson told us that if we would get pictures of the casket, then he would come 12 13 out here and deal with the situation. 14 HENRY: Okay. 15 I hired a guy that was allowed to DAVID: 16 come back and forth, his name was Sam Jones, you know, 17 who started a connection with George, and I hired him 18 and I gave him a little camera, a little Instamatic. 19 He came and he walked into the church. He took all 20 these pictures from all angles. So we had the pictures 21 developed, went back to the sherriff's department, and 22 did they move on it? No. You know what his reply to 23 me was? 24 HENRY: What? 25 DAVID: He looked through them, he looked

kind of worried. He says, well, I don't know that

1 there's a body in this casket. And -- goes, well, there's no bones, there's no picture of bones. And I 2 said, Sherriff Dickerson, it's a casket. He says, 3 Well, it's not against the law to have a casket in 4 5 church. I said, Look at the side there, it's the casket that came out of a crate, a steel crate. It's 6 been dug up. He goes, look. He says, I can't just 7 8 jump up and go out there because of a few pictures when, you know, we don't even know if there's a body in 10 it. And then we're like going, me and Dave's going, 11 unbelievable, what's going on here. 12 HENRY: Um-hum. 13 And I said, well, look, I'll go out DAVID: 14 there myself, and I'll personally take pictures of the 15 bones. So we was walking out, right, and he looked at 16 me real worried like, you know, well, actually, I looked back at him and he says, he says, he says, now 17 18 boys, and he was kind of like shaking, he says, be 19 careful. There's some rough customers out there. 20 HENRY: (Laughs) 21 DAVID: So I'm telling Dave as we walk out, 22 I'm saying, he knows something we don't know. 23 know, there's something funny about this. 24 something we don't know, so we better be careful. 25 that's when we went around, and you can check out, and that's when I went over here to Cogdool's (phonetic),

and I went to K-mart and I bought, you know, shot guns and stuff like that and the whole plan revolved around diversion. Diversion. We got eight guys together.

Some came up by the, by the lake. The others were out by the dump ground out here, where some of your guys are at right now. You know, it's in the back here.

HENRY: Uh-huh.

DAVID: And me and Dave and a guy named Mark, -- a van drove by, it was like 2 or 3 in the morning, real slow, we hopped out, we crawled across the road and crawled all the way over to the church, which is the front and foremost building, and we, you know, we watched and everything and, and Mark went inside to take the pictures.

Well, what happened was is that as we was standing there, or actually staying a good odd distance. There used to be an old trailer out here between the, where church building use to be, up towards the front, and to where the old, old truck trailer is, towards the back of the property there. You'll see it there on the right if you're looking towards the front of the building, in front of the property.

HENRY: Um-hum.

DAVID: And there was a trailer, a doublewide trailer, that was where George lived. I'd say
it's about a 150 yards away from the church.

1 | HENRY: Okay.

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DAVID: Well, so we're there and all of a sudden this dog comes walking up. He comes walking up on the road, he looks over and he sees me and he just turns around, he just walks real calmly, slowly, all the way back. When he walked back he went into the trailer kind of like, and all of a sudden there's barking everywhere. These dogs are from everywhere. So George's lights went on and, and where we're looking for him we saw him get up and look out his big window there and he was in his t-shirt and in his underwear. He grabbed this big spotlight and started shining everywhere. So, Mark came out of the church and says, you know, the casket's not there.

HENRY: Um-hum.

DAVID: The casket's been moved. So the dog's are hollering and running so, so we commenced to crawl all the all the way out to the, to the road there, Double E Ranch Road, and you'll notice where the two water towers is, between there and our entrance is that little barn down there, a little tin shed and a little -- block shed, where some of the agents right now are at.

HENRY: Um-hum.

DAVID: So we crawled on our bellies all the way down that ditch line, all the way over to that

building and ran way on out in Perry's field to circle 1 2 completely around the back of the property, all the way 3 to the back of the property. So we met with the other guys and then we went all the way back out towards the 4 power lines and we all re-met at the power lines. 5 Nothing happened. Okay? George wasn't shot at. George 6 7 wasn't killed. Nothing happened. Now we're all down there, and we're saying now, 8 9 look at this. He moved the casket. What's going on? 10 The old people are living in Palestine -- now, now 11 listen to this. 12 HENRY: Um-hum. 13 DAVID: They were living in Palestine, 14 ranging from ages of 40's, well actually 50's, up to 80 15 something years old, originally they possessed the 13 16 houses out here, but they were all moved off, and we 17 had to build little sheds down in Palestine, 8 X 16, 18 19 HENRY: Uh-huh. 20 -- all plywood, 2 X 2 framing, just DAVID: 21 as a standard housing thing. Most of these people been in religion for years and they've outlived their kids. 22 23 HENRY: Um-hum. 24 So anyway, so we're saying, we've got 25 to find that casket, what are we going to do?

HENRY: Um-hum.

DAVID: Well, what took place was we came in the morning, early in the morning. We slept outside that night. Early in the morning we re-gathered up around where the dairy barn is over here, where your agents are right now. Good locations, I have to admit.

HENRY: Okay.

DAVID: And we, we came up and I said, "This is what we're going to do. We need to wait until, you know, everybody leaves, if we can make sure everybody leaves the property and look around a little bit and, you know, stay out of sight, and see if George has dumped this casket somewhere.

HENRY: Uh-huh.

DAVID: So all the house -- but the place looked like trash. The houses, they were had -- they had had no paint on them for a year and a half, and you have to paint the houses out here at least once a year 'cause the way the humidity is and all that, it's just the paint cracks off. So, like I said, we were armed, that's true. But why we were armed, well, that was already, that was clearly made known, even after the so-called gun battle. The gun battle took place with lots of rounds being fired right into the ground.

HENRY: Okay.

DAVID: I mean there was no, there was no bullet holes in no houses, no bullet holes in no cars,

no bullet holes nowhere but in one tree. 1 2 Uh-huh. HENRY: 3 Now, you see, the people, the people DAVID: don't -- now there's bullet holes everywhere, it's 4 different now. 5 6 Yes, absolutely. HENRY: 7 DAVID: But here's the deal. The deal was, is that, you know, we started up, and I went into the 8 first house on the far side of the property, man, it 9 10 was trashy. It had trash in there, it had goat crap in 11 there, it was like, you know, old beds, like, someone had been in there doing some wrong things, you know, 12 13 you know how drug addicts do. 14 HENRY: Um-hum. 15 And, you know, and the second house, no one's there, and the third -- now, we waited. 17 took about, about, till about eleven, or so, o'clock, 18 'cause we had a, a zoom scope, and, and we was, we was 19 doing our little ATF work then ourselves, okay? You 20 understand? 21 HENRY: (Laughs) 22 So, you know, we were being very 23 cautious and everything, and so, we finally came up to 24 some houses, and we looked in one house and, you know, it was like, all these houses were trash and which we 25

got all the pictures to show that. And pornography

1 everywhere. I mean, Playboy, Penthouse, I don't know, 2 just, everything. Anyway, just a lot filthy stuff. 3 HENRY: Um-hum. 4 DAVID: And so we came to one house and we 5 looked, we looked in the door there and there was this 6 shotgun there, and we picked up a couple of weapons. 7 It was just like laying close to the doors, you know? 8 HENRY: Uh-huh. 9 DAVID: And they were confiscated along with 10 our weapons too, and they were saying they were ours, 11 but they really weren't. So what happened was, we 12 finally came up to this one house, we're behind this 13 house and like, two guys at a time, right? 14 HENRY: Um-hum. 15 DAVID: And two guys, like, move up behind 16 each house 'cause our, our plan is that if anything 17 happens, we want to divert, we want to get out of 18 there. 19 HENRY: Um-hum. 20 So finally we're there and all of a DAVID: 21 sudden, lo and behold, this girl comes out of this 22 house and she's, she's, you know, she's walking in these real short shorts, I've never seen them before, 23 24 and you know --25 Wait hold it, what? HENRY:

Short shorts.

DAVID:

1 **HENRY:** Oh, okay. 2 DAVID: Which, you know, this religion, we don't do that. 3 4 HENRY: Um-hum. 5 Of course, it was not a religion when DAVID: George Roden was occupying the place. 6 7 HENRY: Um-hum. 8 And I need to tell you also, his DAVID: mother had passed away too, while he was there. 9 10 HENRY: Um-hum. 11 DAVID: And so what happened was, is she had 12 her halter top off and she came around and she walked 13 right by two of those guys and, you know, she came by 14 and all that and, you know, she sees us there and 15 everything and we had bought some K-mart, you know, 16 those deer hunting suits? 17 **HENRY:** Oh, yeah. 18 DAVID: So she comes around and she says, 19 what, and I says, I says, come here. You know. 20 says, what are you? Are you all policemen or what? 21 And I says, look. I says George Roden's got a casket, 22 out here right? And she goes, yeah. You know, and I says, we're here to, to find out where this casket is. 23 24 She goes, I don't know where they put it. You know? 25 HENRY: Um-hum. DAVID: So right there we knew, okay?

1 then this, this other girl comes out and she's, she sees two guys there and, you know, like, they're face 2 to face, and she goes, who in the hell are you? 3 4 **HENRY:** Um-hum. 5 DAVID: You know, and this guy, he goes, we're here to, to try to find the casket that George 6 Roden's been digging out. And she curses him out, steps 7 on out the door, gets to her little car out there, you 8 know, and drives up to the trailer --9 10 **HENRY:** Um-hum. 11 DAVID: -- where George is residing. We're 12 going, oh no, what's going on now, right? 13 **HENRY:** Um-hum. 14 DAVID: So this girl, you know, she's standing there by us, and this is even her own 15 16 testimony, you know? She says, you know, I said, I 17 said, look, you know, you need to be going out of here, 18 you know, we may have some trouble, or something like 19 that. And she goes, no, I'll stay here. You know. 20 And she goes, she said something like she had worked at 21 the police department before or something like that. 22 So we're there and all of a sudden this George comes 23 walking down from the trailer, walking down the road, 24 and he's got, you know, his t-shirt, and he's got his 25 pants and he's got his black cowboy hat on and he's got this Uzi, side-strapped to his right shoulder.

1 | HENRY: Uh-huh.

I mean, just as strutting and as DAVID: proud as can be, you know. So he stands out there at the corner and he's right there in the middle of the road, you know, right in dead sight. Now tell me how eight guys, heavily armed, is what all of the t.v. shows say, how do eight guys heavily armed, miss a fat guy standing in plain sight, ranging from the distances of, oh, 40 yards to no more than 75 yards, how do they miss him?

HENRY: Good question.

DAVID: Okay, now, here's the deal. Stan had moved over from one house and, the building that's now here wasn't here. The old building had burnt down. And he had moved over towards the structure and George came up and says, you know, state who you are, you know? Show yourself, you know?

HENRY: (Laughs)

DAVID: And what happened was is Stan, Stan had been raised with George. This is what's really irony. Stan and George had been like, you know, known each other for years. And Stan, you know, he's moved back from Massachusetts and he says, he says, George, we don't want no trouble. What did you do with the casket? Put your gun down. And all of a sudden, you know, George steps back and fires in the direction of

1 Stan, and the bullet hit a part of the concrete and 2 ricocheted up and hit Stan in the leg. 3 HENRY: Um-hum. 4 DAVID: Now, when I was at K-mart and I was 5 buying one of these suits, some of the other guys were, 6 you know, buying some too, they had a sale on these 7 pocket knives where it has like a spoon, and a fork, a 8 little knife, you know, a pair of scissors in it. 9 HENRY: Uh-huh. 10 So we had bought a bunch of those and I bought him one. I bought two or three of the guys 11 12 13 14

one, and he had had that in his pocket and that's where that bullet, that bullet hit from a ricochet, it wasn't a direct hit, that bullet hit that knife and just, just dented the whole thing right up. You know, so, that's how luck ran. Okay, so at that time, the guys had been told before we was to create a diversion. We hadn't really, you know, really planned anything so all of a sudden here comes, you know, six or seven firearms, blasting away. It sounded, it sounded like Viet Nam, you know, bam, bam, right? So George, his eyes get real big, you know, I mean, real big.

> HENRY: (Laughs)

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And he starts back pedaling his little fat butt as fast as I've seen any, any, any fullbacker, you know, running back do it. I mean, this

1 guy, this guy is beyond NFL pro. 2 **HENRY:** (Laughs) He is back pedaling like everything 3 DAVID: -- he never in his life realized. But the thing of it 4 was is that, hey didn't drop because nobody was 5 6 shooting at him. Everybody was shooting right into the ground. Now, you know, 223, which, you know, we bought 7 8 some of these ruggers (Phonetic). We had some shotquns 9 and, you know, some had some .22s. Now, you know, those ruggers are loud. They're louder than the 10 shotguns were. But boy, it sounded like earth thunder. 11 12 This guy was back pedaling and, like I say , he, he, 13 you know, with all that firing at him, all those eight 14 lousy shots, you know, 'cause I, I hadn't fired yet, 15 I'm, like, thinking, oh, no, you know. He back pedaled 16 all the way from where he was standing which was closer to the, let me see, let me give you a point of 17 position, okay, do you know where our sandbox is? 18 19 **HENRY:** No. 20 DAVID: In the front of the property? If you 21 were standing right in front of our building, the far 22 left of our building there is a sandbox for the kids to 23 play in. Okay, you know where the water tower is? 24 HENRY: Um-hum. 25 Okay, if you were standing on the DAVID: road facing the water tower, that's where he was

standing. 1 2 HENRY: Okay. And, like I say, I was about 45, 3 DAVID: about 45 yards from him, I guess. Okay. And Stan was 4 5 about, oh, maybe, I don't know, twenty something or thirty yards away from him, from a side direction. 6 7 HENRY: Um-hum. DAVID: And of course there was each little 8 9 house had two or three guys standing behind it. So, 10 you know, everybody's just banging, banging, banging, 11 and this guy thinks he's dead a hundred times over, and 12 he back pedals and he goes behind these cars and he 13 keeps going, so I came from in the house and I told 14 him, and I says, throw your gun down, George. You 15 know, we don't want any trouble. Of course, you know, 16 yeah, he thinks that, right? 17 **HENRY:** Um-hum. 18 So anyway, so he runs around to the DAVID: 19 back side of the house that was where, where our bus is 20 right now. Okay, where our bus is right now on the 21 property, there use to be a house there. 22 **HENRY:** Okay. 23 DAVID: As a matter of fact, the foundation is still there. 'Cause that's where his mother use to 24 25 live.

HENRY: Oh, okay.

36 DAVID: And he ran back to that area and he stood to the side of it, the far side of it, --**HENRY:** Um-hum. DAVID: And what happened was is I was running out towards the back part of the field so I could come to the back side to see where he was going. Anyway, the two oldest men, Floyd and Stan, which, like I say, both of these guys are in their 50's, yeah, yeah, they're in their 60's -- they were in their 50's then, they had, they had gotten themselves out in the open and all of a sudden George re-emerges on the back side of this far house and I'm out there in the open and all of a sudden I, I hear this zap, zap, zap, and his Uzi, if I'm not mistaken, shoots .45s, and those things whistle. When they sound like, they sound like a jet coming through the air. And that's the first time I ever had an experience with a projectile coming close to my body.

> HENRY: Um-hum.

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DAVID: So I'm going like, whoa, God, you know, we need some help on this one. So I quickly ran out to a farther part of the field where there was an old car, and I jumped back behind this old car. It was an old, I forgot, one of those, like a Studebaker, but it was a different kind of a Studebaker, but anyway, I was back behind there and next thing is I hear this

rap, rap, rap, and I see these two older guys. 1 2 is a foundation out of the ground, out here they pour 3 -- they pour furrows, they pour foundations like a pair of beams? 4 5 HENRY: Uh-huh. 6 DAVID: And they were, they were back trying 7 to get down and there was still, you know, ashes and soot from where the building originally stood, that was 8 9 still settling into the soil, and this stuff was flying up like, big old clouds, smoke is -- George is actually 10 11 aiming to hit these two guys. And that's when it got 12 real serious. That's when everything was out of hand. 13 But what, what should have happened though, is that 14 these guys should have, you know, stayed back behind the houses. You know, they should have stayed back 15 16 behind the houses. But, you know, that's why I 17 understand, humans are humans. 18 HENRY: Sure. 19 DAVID: And they weren't shooting at George at all. 20 21 HENRY: Uh-huh. 22 DAVID: So then what happened was, where I 23 got involved is that, you know, here he's shooting so I 24 started shooting real, you know, real fast, so George 25 back-tracked again and got behind this tree. The tree

still stands over there near the, near the far right of

the property where the little boat shed is. HENRY: Okay. DAVID: And George got behind this tree, and so George starts shooting out behind, from behind this tree. And Stan and Floyd were still pinned down to the ground. All right. So I had to make decisions. I didn't really want to shoot directly into the air because what direction is that? (Tape ends.)

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1 (Tape 37) 2 MR. KORESH: -- shooting to the top part of the tree hoping that when the rounds hit the tree it 3 would make some kind of noise that George would say 4 hey, you know, they're shooting at me. 5 6 HENRY: Um-hum. 7 MR. KORESH: You see, and then he'd stay behind the tree -- let Stan and Floyd get up, which 8 9 that's what I started doing. Well, finally what 10 happened was he, he, he would, he would glance behind 11 the tree and he would put his Uzi out with his right 12 hand shoot it like a pistol. 13 HENRY: Uh-huh. 14 MR. KORESH: And he was still zapping off 15 these rounds and stuff. So I started, I started aiming a little bit lower still trying to keep above his head, 16 you know, so that he could realize, you know, just stay 17 behind the tree. Anyway, somehow some way he put his 18 19 hand -- he was flashing his hand -- he put his hand 20 around the tree and all of a sudden he pulled it back and he stopped firing. Well, I stopped firing, 21 everybody else stopped firing. So here we are in a 22 23 position nobody's firing. 24 HENRY: (Laughter) 25 MR. KORESH: Okay? And we hear these sirens off in the distance. And here I am thinking, oh,

praise the Lord, here comes (indiscernible), you know? 1 2 HENRY: Um-hum. 3 MR. KORESH: Here comes the, here comes the sirens and all that and here comes the Sheriff's 4 Department and I heard Dave say off in the distance, 5 6 you know, "Here comes the Sheriff's Department, you know, good, I'm glad for that." And George just kept 7 8 his good little self behind that tree and didn't do 9 nothing anymore. 10 HENRY: Um-hum. 11 MR. KORESH: So, finally the sheriffs came in 12 with several cars -- seven or eight cars came in the, 13 the, the front gate and I'm sitting over there. And 14 when they get towards the bend of the drive I, I stand 15 back away from the cars still kind of ducking and I 16 have my gun, a Ruger --17 Um-hum. HENRY: MR. KORESH: -- you know, in my right hand on 18 19 the strap. I have one of those real nice deer straps. 20 HENRY: Um-hum. 21 MR. KORESH: And I have it in my right hand 22 on the strap. And I'm kind of like walking crouched 23 My hand is not on the stock of the gun. The gun 24 is upside down being held by the strap. And the 25 Sheriff's Department guys got out and everything and

I'm trying to walk back towards the, the houses that we

1 just come from --2 HENRY: Um-hum. 3 MR. KORESH: -- so I can get on around to those guys. 4 5 HENRY: Um-hum. 6 MR. KORESH: And so the next thing, this guy 7 he's standing there and he's hollering at me and I, I look up and boy, he's zeroed down on me, you know, and 8 9 he's got a Ruger too but he's got a government model --10 HENRY: Uh-huh. 11 MR. KORESH: -- you know? And he goes, "Put 12 your gun down." And I'm going, "Oh, yeah, okay." 13 I, I put it down. And he says, "Now, move on over here." You know, and I says, "No problem, you know, 14 15 don't shoot, you know." So we moved all over and all 16 the guys too likewise, you know, moved over. And we 17 all came around, gathered around and they're like, you 18 know, I saw Sheriff Thorn over there. I've always 19 liked Mr. Thorn. And, you know, I, I said hello to him 20 and stuff. He, he looked at me kind of like disgusted, 21 kind of confused. 22 HENRY: Um-hum. 23 MR. KORESH: But he's known Dave for a long 24 time and, you know, you know, Dave says, "Hello, Bill," his name is Bill Thorn. And he goes --25

HENRY: Uh-huh.

1 MR. KORESH: -- and he goes, "Dave, I don't understand." 2 3 HENRY: Um-hum. 4 MR. KORESH: He goes, "Well, you know, we'll 5 explain it." He goes, "We want to know." So what 6 happened was we got all together and everything and 7 this one guy he's, he's, he's real nice, 8 everyone's real nice. He says, "Now, gentlemen," he 9 says, "Is this everybody now?" He says, "We need to talk about this, you know. And is everyone here now, 10 11 you know, look around, is -- " you know, and we're 12 looking around and yeah, everyone's there that was 13 There was another guy but, but we had sent him 14 back. You know what we had sent him back for don't you? To go back and to, and to inform the police that 15 16 we were still out there. 17 HENRY: Okay. 18 MR. KORESH: That we hadn't yet gotten the pictures, we haven't yet found the, the, the corpse. 19 20 HENRY: Um-hum. 21 MR. KORESH: And he was the guy that was 22 still way over in the back part of Perry's field that 23 Harwell's helicopter, you know, saw. 24 HENRY: Okay. 25 MR. KORESH: But, you know, so what happened

was is we're all standing around there. None of us are

armed. We're all standing there and, you know, talking and stuff. And some of the guys have their arms fold, you know, and they went over to George and, and they were bringing George up.

HENRY: Uh-huh.

MR. KORESH: And, you know, George is walking up towards us and it looks like he had some blood on his hand.

HENRY: Blood?

MR. KORESH: Yeah, blood on his hand. And so then all of a sudden I see these, these officers grab him and they kind of like wrestle with him and, and they pull something out of his hand. Well, you know what he had in his hand? A little .25 or a little .22 or something.

HENRY: Uh-huh.

MR. KORESH: A little pocket gun or something. Because, you know, he was -- they was going to come over by us and he was going to, I guess, finish whatever. But anyway, I -- you know, I guess to some degree he had all the right in his mind to retaliate.

HENRY: Um-hum.

MR. KORESH: You know, he didn't have a mind at that time to think well, I've been shot a thousand times but I ain't been hit yet.

HENRY: Uh-huh.

1 MR. KORESH: But anyway, the point of the 2 story was is that once we all got together and 3 everything, then this guy, you know, he says, "Now, 4 now, come on, boys, is this all of you now? Are you all around? Is -- okay, now look around. 5 6 anymore of you anywhere, you know?" "No, we're, we're 7 all here." And then -- all, all hell broke loose, Henry, all hell broke loose. 8 9 HENRY: What happened? 10 MR. KORESH: Oh, the expression of these 11 gentlemen, the kindness, the courtesy, the good ole boy 12 attitude changed. And they told us to get on the blank, blank ground, spread our legs. And this was 13 14 gravel, this was in the summertime. And we have red 15 ants out here that when they bite you, oh, you get a little white blister on you and it itches, it hurts. 16 17 HENRY: Um-hum. MR. KORESH: They nailed us to the -- I mean, 18 19 they, they -- and then more cars came in. And, 20 you know, a guy got out. Oh well, he got out just like 21 a, a sergeant general out of the military. He says, he says, "What in the hell is going on here?" 22 I mean, he's screaming. He goes, "This is, this 23 America." 24 25 HENRY: (Laughter)

MR. KORESH: "Things like this don't happen

1 in America." You know? 2 HENRY: Um-hum. 3 MR. KORESH: And oh boy, I mean, there was this guy there and he had -- I mean, you know, we, we 4 5 brought ear plugs. 6 HENRY: Um-hum. 7 MR. KORESH: You know, we brought ear plugs 8 because if we had to make any, any distractions the night before, you know, we wanted to make sure we 9 didn't hurt our hearing. 10 11 HENRY: Um-hum. 12 MR. KORESH: So some of these guys had their 13 ear plugs in. And this guy, this guy, this guy walks 14 over and he sees this one guy on the ground. And he 15 reaches down and he pulls this ear plug out of his ear and he puts his head down to his ear and says, "Did you 16 hear me?!" 17 18 HENRY: (Laughter) 19 MR. KORESH: I mean, you know, he tells, he 20 tells, he -- we're, we're on the ground. You know, we're like what's going on? And some of us have our 21 hands in front of us --22 23 HENRY: Um-hum. 24 MR. KORESH: -- on the ground --25 HENRY: Um-hum. MR. KORESH: -- and they're coming and

1 kicking our arms so that our arms will go down beside 2 us --3 HENRY: Um-hum. 4 MR. KORESH: -- instead of, you know, in front of us. 5 6 HENRY: Um-hum. 7 MR. KORESH: And I mean like, you know, would 8 you please leave your -- it's like kicking the arms and 9 the wrist. You know, like whoa, you know? 10 HENRY: Um-hum. 11 MR. KORESH: Oh boy, was that exciting. And 12 this one guy's walking around, you know. And, and like he's got his, he's got is hand on his pistol. He goes, 13 14 he goes, he goes, "Just go ahead and move one inch, 15 I'll blow your blank, blank heads off." 16 HENRY: (Laughter) 17 MR. KORESH: (Laughter) We thought we was going to have hamburgers and french fries with these 18 19 guys in the beginning. 20 HENRY: (Laughter) 21 MR. KORESH: But I'm telling you that -- and 22 anyway, so, so, you know, Thorn didn't do that, you know? But, but a lot of these guys -- like I'm -- they 23 24 weren't too informed were they? Okay. So what 25 happened was -- is that we all got arrested, we all got chained up, put in the cop -- put in the police cars.

I don't like calling them cops, but --1 2 HENRY: Uh-huh. 3 MR. KORESH: -- put them in the Sheriff's Department cars. 4 5 Um-hum. HENRY: 6 MR. KORESH: And one of my pictures they keep 7 showing there on the screen, you know. They take us 8 all -- now, we're driving down to the, to the Waco 9 County there. 10 HENRY: Uh-huh. 11 MR. KORESH: And this young guy, he's, he's 12 really kind of nice, you know, and I, I said to the 13 guy, I said, "You know, you know, these handcuffs are 14 kind of tight." He says, he goes, "Well, I'm sorry," he says, "You know, it's procedure." He says, You know 15 16 -- he says, Besides, he says, you know, we knew you 17 guys were out here. He says, "We've been talking about it all day." He says, "You guys will be out before 18 19 dark, just don't worry about it, you know?" 20 HENRY: Um-hum. 21 MR. KORESH: And I'm thinking, well, maybe 22 that was all just procedure or something just because 23 of George. But I mean, kicking of the arms and stuff 24 like that, you know. 25 HENRY: Um-hum.

MR. KORESH: It was, it was uncomfortable.

1 HENRY: Sure, sure. 2 MR. KORESH: But the thing of it was is that, you know, it was just -- I mean, this guy was riding in 3 4 the front driving. I mean, it was not two, it was just 5 only one guy taking two guys in --HENRY: 6 Um-hum. 7 MR. KORESH: -- you know? And he was just as pleasant as could be. Younger guy. 8 9 HENRY: Uh-huh. 10 MR. KORESH: And so we, we drove downtown and 11 they opened up that big thing and, and we drove in. 12 And the first thing -- we're, we're standing there and 13 they lined us all up, you know. And they, they made us 14 take these numbers or something and hold them in front 15 of us. 16 HENRY: Okay, yeah. 17 MR. KORESH: And --18 HENRY: Took the picture. 19 MR. KORESH: Yeah, taking pictures. And 20 there is -- all of a sudden there's Dickerson --21 Sheriff Dickerson standing over there. 22 Um-hum. HENRY: 23 MR. KORESH: And I'm like, oh, thanks, you 24 know. And I go, "Mr. Dickerson," and the guy says, 25 "Shut up."

HENRY: (Laughter)

I go, Well, there's Mr. --1 MR. KORESH: 2 he goes, he goes, I told you to be quiet. Uou know. 3 And they took us in and they, and they took us in the room and (indiscernible) in the room and had to take 4 all our clothes off and everything and, and you know, 5 6 put on these white britches and everything and these sandals. 7 8 HENRY: Um-hum. 9 MR. KORESH: And no, I'm sorry, I'm sorry, 10 they didn't do that yet. They, they put us in this one 11 tank --12 HENRY: Um-hum. 13 MR. KORESH: -- that had just a concrete 14 floor in it. 15 HENRY: Yeah. 16 MR. KORESH: And we stayed there for most the 17 night. And then they came and took us and, and gave us 18 these, you know, clothes and, and these mats and stuff 19 and took us down to these jail cells. 20 HENRY: Um-hum. 21 MR. KORESH: Now, that's the first time I 22 have ever been in a jail cell. Now, now what happened 23 was this. You can't say nothing yet. I mean, you, you can't find any sympathy yet. And no, no, before that 24 25 happened was they took us down and fingerprinted us.

HENRY:

Sure.

1 MR. KORESH: Now, I'm a quitar player. 2 HENRY: Um-hum. 3 MR. KORESH: And, you know, a lot of people, you know, they say that my ability in music is, is 4 5 quite above the norm. 6 HENRY: Um-hum. 7 MR. KORESH: And we've written a lot of 8 beautiful songs and stuff about the message and stuff. 9 But, you know, like I say it's just another prophecy 10 that gets kind of distorted because of the way the world's attitude is. But nevertheless, this guy grabs 11 my fingers and he's like he is breaking my fingers, my 12 13 -- you know, grabs my finger, sticks in this ink, 14 smash, you know, I'm "Ah." Grabs it and puts it on a piece of paper and smash. And I go, I go, "Sir, excuse 15 16 me, please." He goes, "What?" And I go, "Could you be 17 just a little more gentle?" He looks at me kind of 18 funny like, huh? You know, like aren't you a tough 19 guy? 20 **HENRY:** Um-hum. 21 MR. KORESH: But anyway, we went to this 22 Now, we go into the cell and like, you know, our 23 hearts are thumping, you know? 24 HENRY: Um-hum. 25 MR. KORESH: This is a new era.

HENRY:

Um-hum.

1 This is a new experience for me, MR. KORESH: 2 you know? No matter how many times you may or may not live, it's always new and exciting. 3 4 HENRY: Sure. 5 MR. KORESH: So we go into these big iron 6 things. And they sent some of those younger guys into 7 one. And we were in jail with these guys that were all 8 wearing yellow ribbons. Now, you know what a yellow 9 ribbon is, don't you? 10 HENRY: Not in Waco, no. 11 MR. KORESH: It's a felony. 12 HENRY: Okay. 13 MR. KORESH: And a felony is like murder --14 HENRY: Um-hum. 15 MR. KORESH: -- you know? Or attempted 16 murder or something to do with something bad, bad --17 HENRY: Um-hum. 18 MR. KORESH: -- okay? So there's guys in there, boy, and I'm talking about they, they are like 19 20 tough looking guys. 21 HENRY: Um-hum. 22 MR. KORESH: But they're all in there and we 23 They're like all like, you know, side-by-side come in. 24 down like this hallway, this run. And they're going, 25 Yeah, yeah, come on -- some black guys, Come on down here, we all, we all done cleared out a room just for

you guys, you know? 1 2 HENRY: Um-hum. 3 MR. KORESH: And they treated us with such respect and they treated us with such decency. 4 5 they were kind of like standing back from us, you know? 6 HENRY: Um-hum. 7 MR. KORESH: Well, we didn't know -- we 8 thought, well, you know, we was going to get in there 9 and get a lot of trouble, right? But these guys were 10 just so nice. What had happened was, on the news they 11 had played on the news that eight PLO terrorists had 12 assaulted Mount Carmel Center. 13 HENRY: Oh, okay. MR. KORESH: Now, that was on -- and, and 14 15 these guys were watching this and they thought we were 16 real professional killers --17 HENRY: Um-hum. 18 MR. KORESH: -- terrorists. 19 HENRY: Sure. 20 MR. KORESH: And they treated us with the 21 best of rest. If that had not been played you know 22 what would have happened to us? But anyway, what 23 happened was is that when we did get in there they 24 found out, you know, a couple of three days or so or in 25 the time that most of the guys stayed in there, that we weren't nothing but sincere individuals that were not

1 going to stand by and let somebody dig up grandma. 2 HENRY: Um-hum. 3 MR. KORESH: And we started giving Bible studies and those preachers down there started getting 4 angry because when, when they'd come in on Sunday 5 morning to, to make their little statements to the 6 preachers -- to the, to the prisoners --7 8 HENRY: Um-hum. 9 MR. KORESH: -- they were starting to meet 10 with questions from the Bible that they couldn't --11 HENRY: Answer. 12 MR. KORESH: -- answer. 13 HENRY: Yeah. 14 MR. KORESH: And so, you know, over in the 15 older cell there was a guy named Red. He was in there. 16 He, he had murdered two people. And, you know, 17 Floyd -- anyway, when we, when we left that facility, 18 and I also brought this up to the attention of some 19 people here --20 HENRY: Um-hum. 21 MR. KORESH: -- you know, that, you know, 22 that even if we end up going to prison that remember God could even work in the prisons too --23 24 Exactly. HENRY: 25 MR. KORESH: -- just like he did in Waco. HENRY: Exactly.

1 MR. KORESH: I told them, I said, Well, 2 look -- I said, When, when we left that prison some of the Sheriffs Department group there stated very clearly 3 that they had never had such an orderly conduct in 4 those jail cells than what they had when we were there. 5 6 HENRY: That's right. And that's probably 7 what's going to happen, you know, when, when you 8 walk out of there. That's probably what's going to 9 happen. 10 MR. KORESH: Well, there is a truth that, that sets men free even though they're, they're in 11 12 prisons or wherever they find themselves in. 13 HENRY: That's right. 14 MR. KORESH: And Jeremiah was put into 15 prison, Paul, I mean, you know, things appear to be one 16 way. 17 That's right. HENRY: 18 MR. KORESH: You know, David of old was a warrior but like I say, you know, he ended up being 19 20 exiled from his own country. These are realities of 21 life that while we're living we need to always 22 experience life as it presents itself --23 HENRY: Exactly. 24 MR. KORESH: -- and know where we're coming 25 from.

HENRY: That's right.

1 MR. KORESH: Now myself in these experiences, 2 I have had a direction, but in order to be a proper judge I also have to have an experience. 3 4 HENRY: Um-hum. 5 MR. KORESH: So that I can look at a man one 6 day and say, well, I know where he's coming from 7 because in my experience I have experienced thus and 8 thus. 9 HENRY: Exactly. 10 MR. KORESH: So, somebody can have all the 11 right intention in the world and it turn out to become 12 wrong and misjudged. 13 HENRY: Um-hum. 14 MR. KORESH: That's why the judgments of God 15 are far more sophisticated than judgments of men. 16 HENRY: Um-hum. 17 MR. KORESH: But anyway, so you see, when it 18 all came down to it when everything was said and done, 19 when they put a \$50,000 bond on each one of us -- can 20 you imagine that? 21 Yeah. Well --HENRY: 22 MR. KORESH: A person, \$50,000 bond a -- did 23 you know there were guys in there that was their second 24 time murder and do you know that their bond was \$12,000? 25

HENRY: Phew. That's --

1 MR. KORESH: Can you imagine that, Henry? 2 HENRY: -- that's amazing. That's really amazing. 3 4 MR. KORESH: I had to get \$5,000 apiece. 5 HENRY: Sure. 6 MR. KORESH: And the only reason why that we was -- even could find a bondman is because after 7 8 awhile people began to realize that we weren't what 9 people were saying we were. 10 HENRY: Sure, but it took time. 11 MR. KORESH: Huh? 12 HENRY: But it took time. 13 MR. KORESH: I'm sorry, I didn't understand. 14 But it probably took some time. 15 MR. KORESH: Oh, yeah. Well see, I had to 16 pay the \$5,000, Paul paid the \$5,000, another guy paid the \$5,000. Well actually, you know, we paid it. And, 17 you know, it's like, phew, \$15,000 already out the 18 pocket --19 20 HENRY: Um-hum. 21 MR. KORESH: -- and nothing's gotten done except we're outside, you know, trying to work on 22 23 getting the other guys out. 24 Um-hum. HENRY: 25 MR. KORESH: And we're trying to -- now see, I, I kept going down there to the, to the D.A.'s

office --1 2 HENRY: Um-hum. 3 MR. KORESH: -- because I wanted to know what 4 was going on. 5 Um-hum. HENRY: 6 MR. KORESH: They wouldn't let me talk with 7 Thorn or any of the Sheriff's Department. You know, I 8 wanted to know what was happening. 9 HENRY: Um-hum. 10 MR. KORESH: You know, and, and come to find 11 out, do you know -- when that took place do you know 12 where the casket was? 13 HENRY: Where? 14 MR. KORESH: Right beside that tree where 15 George had ran to in that (indiscernible) shed. 16 (Laughter) That's amazing, huh? HENRY: 17 MR. KORESH: You see? So, so they had moved 18 it. 19 HENRY: Um-hum. 20 MR. KORESH: Okay. So what happened was is 21 that all of the -- they, they charged us for attempted 22 murder and conspiracy to murder. And anyway, Gary 23 Coker wanted to take the case. He's a fine man here in Waco --24 25 Um-hum. HENRY: MR. KORESH: -- Mr. Coker. And he, he was

1 surprised. He thought it was going to be just a real 2 easy case. 3 Um-hum. HENRY: 4 MR. KORESH: So he -- I think he did it for -- I don't know, but it came out -- per person it 5 6 came out a very reasonable attorney's fee. 7 HENRY: Okay. 8 MR. KORESH: You know, very reasonable. he took the case and he came in and he wanted to talk 9 10 with me. And he didn't talk with many of the guys 11 because he figured that in all analogies he already 12 knew his plan of, of, of defense. 13 HENRY: Strategy? Um-hum. 14 MR. KORESH: Yeah. So, what happened was is that we went to court and, and, you know, our case took 15 16 two weeks? And even the, the D.A. would not -- okay, 17 for instance, this is some of the things that happened. 18 The judge was a visiting judge because during the same 19 time there was another trial that Vick Fasel was 20 doing --21 HENRY: Um-hum. 22 MR. KORESH: -- about a man that was accused of burning two of his children in a, a, a back garage. 24 Um-hum. HENRY: 25 MR. KORESH: Okay. So anyway, what happened was is that the District Attorney would, would, would

1 hire these professional analysts to analyze certain things. Like this one guy was a professional in 2 regards to paramilitary weaponry and tactics. 3 HENRY: Um-hum. 4 MR. KORESH: So object number one, they 5 6 presented to the jury some bailing wire. And what 7 happened was is that Shaba stands in front of the jury and says, now -- he's talking to this guy and says, 8 9 Now, now, possibly -- this was taken from the prisoners 10 here. Now, what was this used for do you think? What 11 was this intended for and its intended use?" And the 12 guy goes on to explain that in certain paramilitary groups it's known that, you know, such a wire is used 13 14 for strangling, for, you know, suppressing oxygen to 15 the person by wrapping around it's neck. And he goes, 16 Can you kind of illustrate how this might be done? So the guy gets up from the thing, walks down in front of 17 18 the jury, grabs this wire and puts it around Shaba's 19 neck and -- you know, this is, this is extreme, right? 20 HENRY: Right. 21 MR. KORESH: And so the jury's like going 22 (indiscernible) and their eyes are getting real big, 23 right? 24 HENRY: Uh-huh. MR. KORESH: And so anyway, they also, they 25

also had some -- a red piece of shirt --

1 HENRY: Um-hum. 2 MR. KORESH: -- several pieces of, of red checkered shirt there. 3 HENRY: Um-hum. 4 5 And Shaba is saying, Now, what MR. KORESH: might this possibly be used for? And he says, Well, 6 usually through different means whether simple or 7 8 complex, such things or items can be used as, as signaling devices, things to signal a, a movement or a, a preconceived intention, you know." And so the jury 10 11 is like well, wow, you know, all these neat paraphernalias here. So anyway, so I was there talking 12 13 to my attorney --14 HENRY: Um-hum. 15 MR. KORESH: -- and saying, Well, what is 16 going on here? 17 HENRY: Um-hum. 18 MR. KORESH: And so I was telling him what 19 these things were used for. So anyway, Shaba makes his 20 points and then it's time for the next lawyer --21 witness -- you know, witness -- examine the witness. 22 HENRY: Um-hum, um-hum. 23 MR. KORESH: And so what happened at that 24 time is that Paul Fatta is there on the, on the stand 25 and, and Shaba is asking him. He says, Well, Mr. Fatta, is it not true that, that you were using these

I know he wants to do that. 8 9 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 10 The Christian Broadcasting Network has 11 told us that 95% of the calls about David's radio 12 message were positive and the people were just very enthused about it. 1.3 RACHEL: Well, that was KBBW? 14 15 Yeah, uh-huh, and this guy Craig Smith? 16 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 17 And they were, he said there was a little waning, you 18 know, I mean, some doubt, I mean, of course after David 19 didn't come out, you know, which he said he would. 20 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 21 But I mean, I talked at length with 22 that, about that with David and he told me, he said 23 Jim, I didn't say I'm not coming, he said I'm just not 24 coming right now. 25 RACHEL: Right.

So, I understand that. But, I think

JIM:

one thing I want you to remember is about these events 1 2 that they need to be told, okay? 3 RACHEL: Right. 4 And, you know, if something was done by these agents or whatever, it needs to be investigated, 5 looked at, you know what I'm saying? So, people want 6 7 to hear your side, okay? 8 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 9 They do, they are interested, not only the media, but the public, okay? 10 11 RACHEL: Right. 12 So just keep that in mind. JIM: That's real 13 important. Okay? 14 RACHEL: Okav. 15 JIM: You know, I'm just, I wonder, I mean David has really talked to me at length about his Word 16 and I'm just, you know, he's told me so many things, 17 18 that I'm just curious if this isn't, if this thing isn't maybe one of God's ways of testing his resolve, 19 20 you know, to spread the Word, you know, beyond, beyond 21 that temple there, that church there, you know what I'm 22 saying? 23 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 24 Do you know what I mean? I know that David communicates and, and, has a lot inside, you 25

know, he's just a real, I don't know how you would

describe, I would say he's a holy man or a pious man and he's got a gift or something. But what I'm just saying is, it may be God's way of, so you know, God sometimes his messages may not be as, just like the Bible, you kind of, kind of, you know, catches and describes things a little different, if you know what I mean.

RACHEL: Uh-huh.

JIM: When I was a kid I remember at a sermon where they talked about the Red Sea, you know.

RACHEL: Yeah.

JIM: And the, and the preacher said that it wasn't exactly as the people walking out of Egypt over the ocean, but what it was, was the Israelites, walking through a swampy marsh on foot to get back to the Holy Land and the Romans on chariots got bogged down in this place actually, which was actually called the Reed Sea, you know, and they got stuck and, you know how the Bible talks about chariots of fire.

RACHEL: You mind repeating that story? That, I don't know if I quite follow you on that.

JIM: Well, I'm just saying, you know the way the Bible talks in symbols.

RACHEL: Yeah.

JIM: At least that's what I'm just getting around. Now I'm just wondering if this event isn't a

1 way where God's testing, you know, David's resolve to 2 spread his word beyond Mt. Carmel, you know, that's all 3 I'm saying. RACHEL: Yeah. 4 5 JIM: He knows more about that than me. You 6 know, I'm no theologian. 7 RACHEL: Me neither. 8 JIM: I'm just a policeman. 9 I'm not a theologian myself. RACHEL: 10 I'm a policeman, you know. You're a 11 mother, right? 12 Yeah, right. RACHEL: 13 But, so, but anyway, I think that those 14 are just some things -- you feel strongly about and I 15 know David feels strongly about and I think are positives that he will get his side out. Your side 16 17 will be heard. The public will know, the world will 18 know, and I think that's important. So, are you still 19 with David? Are you helping him or is he --RACHEL: Yeah, I think, well because I'm on 20 21 the phone with you right now, I think someone else is 22 trying to help him get up. 23 Oh, okay. JIM: 24 RACHEL: So. 25 Okay. Well two things I told him was

that there's a rancher who's chasing some cows out over

there off to the right, out in the field, his cows 1 2 haven't eaten. 3 RACHEL: To the right of the house here? 4 JIM: Yeah. Said his cows hadn't eaten, you know, in five days and David said he thought it was Mr. 5 Perry's ranch hand or something? 6 7 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 8 So just if you see anybody out there, 9 just tell everybody. And the second thing that 10 happened was some of your neighbors were without water. 11 RACHEL: Some of our neighbors what? 12 JIM: Are without water. 13 Oh, really. RACHEL: 14 Apparently there's a pump station right 15 at the end of Double E Ranch. 16 Uh-huh. RACHEL: 17 And some pump, water pumps or water 18 tower pumps or something, and that broke down. 19 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 20 JIM: And so the sheriff had called and asked 21 if could get some of these county engineers in there to 22 fix that water pump, so of course we're going to allow 23 them to do that. But, you should be, you should know 24 that there could be people around that water pump. 25 RACHEL: Oh. That's a pretty good way from you.

1 RACHEL: Down there at those two little 2 towers down there at the end of the road? 3 JIM: Exactly. RACHEL: Right. 4 5 But pass the word through. 6 RACHEL: Okay. 7 Because one of these mechanics might 8 have to climb up there or something, you know what I'm 9 saying? 10 RACHEL: Climb up on to the tower? 11 JIM: Yeah, I don't know. I mean they didn't 12 tell me they had to climb up there. 13 RACHEL: Yeah. 14 JIM: But I don't want some mechanic to climb up there with a wrench and, you know, somebody thinks 15 he's, you know, going to shoot or something. 17 RACHEL: Well I notice they feel pretty bold 18 in bringing their tanks onto our property. 19 JIM: Yeah. 20 RACHEL: When the agreement was, I mean this is coming from myself --21 22 JIM: Yeah. The agreement was made that, you 23 RACHEL: 24 know, nobody would come on to the perimeter. 25 Right. JIM: RACHEL: And it's just not being upheld.

1 Yeah. JIM: 2 RACHEL: I mean they were right here 3 practically in our back yard. I understand. I understand. 4 JIM: 5 So who's in charge of that? RACHEL: Well, there's a lot of commanders here 6 7 and you know, there's people on the ground out there 8 and, you know, I think some of the maneuvers they're 9 doing, they're trying to keep, you know, the police and 10 agents safe out there. They don't want to have 11 anything that anybody could hide behind. 12 RACHEL: Well, hey, we're not starting anything and we never have and we're not set on 13 starting anything. 14 15 JIM: I understand. 16 I mean, you start it then you start RACHEL: it. 17 18 JIM: Right, I understand. Well, we're not 19 planning on starting anything either. And, but those 20 vehicles, you know, will move around, but you know, 21 nobody's coming in there or anything. Did David say 22 who the next child was he wanted to send out. 23 No, he hasn't talked about it. He, RACHEL: 24 I think he's trying to go to the bathroom right now. 25 JIM: There was a little girl named Heather, I think that was, we talked about one time that was a

sister of Kevin and Mark, is that right? 1 2 RACHEL? Kevin and Mark, yeah, they have a 3 sister. 4 JIM: Is her name Heather? RACHEL: Possibly so. 5 6 Okay, I may be wrong in that, but I 7 thought it was Heather, and I think, I think they were 8 even asking for her. I think Mark had talked to her 9 when he came over here or something. I think you might just check with --10 11 RACHEL: Oh, I don't know. 12 There's so many children. JIM: 13 I talked to Kevin, that's all I RACHEL: 14 I didn't talk to Mark. 15 Yeah. Well, there's a lot of children JIM: 16 in there and I'm sure it's hard to keep up with every 17 one of them, huh? 18 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 19 But, how are you feeling today, okay? 20 RACHEL: Yeah, I'm kind of coming down with a 21 cold here, you know, got kind of chilly, sometimes late 22 at night. 23 Yeah, I have to check with David on 24 Heather, I think the boys want her, you know, they've 25 kind of been asking. See if that's who he had in mind. RACHEL: Okay.

1 JIM: You think you got a cold? 2 RACHEL: Yeah, I caught a cold. It's pretty chilly in here. 3 4 Through all this, you know, and then JIM: 5 you get a cold too, isn't that terrible? 6 RACHEL: Yeah, yeah. 7 Well keep your strength up and --8 RACHEL: Yeah, I'll get some vitamin C and 9 try to keep it from getting too bad. 10 Yeah, yeah, don't let it because it'll JIM: 11 drain you down, you know. 12 Sorry? RACHEL: 13 I said those colds will drain you. 14 RACHEL: Oh yeah. 15 You know you start to feel real weak. JIM: I mean you need to keep fluid in. 16 RACHEL: Yeah, they do. 17 18 Chicken soup, you know, they say, can't JIM: 19 hurt it. If it don't help, it can't hurt. 20 RACHEL: Yeah. Did I talk to you this 21 morning or was that Henry? 22 JIM: No, that was me. Well you might have 23 talked to Henry real early. 24 RACHEL: No, cause I remember now that I said 25 Jim, and then after I got off the phone, like it sure sounded like Henry to me.

1 JIM: Henry left, no I think it was you and 2 me because Henry left early. 3 RACHEL: Oh okav. Yeah. I think that was you and me. 4 JIM: That's when we were talking probably about Kevin. 5 6 RACHEL: Cause I think I mostly talked to him since this has been going on. I don't think I've 7 8 talked to you. 9 JIM: Not as much. 10 Before today or maybe --RACHEL: 11 Oh no, we talked. JIM: I talked to you yesterday, then, 12 RACHEL: 13 right? 14 JIM: Yeah, oh yeah we talked, we talked 15 Monday too, I think, briefly, briefly. 16 RACHEL: Well he was the one I guess I talked 17 to in the night. He's just, he's very persistent, 18 going about every angle to try to find some answers or something. 19 JIM: Well, he's concerned about you. I 20 21 mean. 22 RACHEL: I know. JIM: I mean, he's, he's a real good guy, I'm 23 24 telling you. I've, he's, he's just concerned. That's the reason. You know, he --25

RACHEL: Well, it's your job.

1 Yeah, well, we're concerned. JIM: I mean we 2 have kids and we have families and we want everybody to 3 be safe, you know. RACHEL: Uh-huh. 4 5 I know you do too. So that's all Henry. He's interested in your welfare. He's been 6 7 just real happy talking with the kids and stuff, you know. He's a good guy. 8 9 RACHEL: Yeah, he sounds like a pretty good 10 guy. JIM: He really is. He's a real gentle kind 11 12 of person. 13 Oh, I'm, I'm trying to remember RACHEL: 14 something I heard them say on the T. V., it's just now 15 coming back to my memory. He was talking about, oh, I 16 think I remember now, he was talking about Robert --17 JIM: Ro --18 RACHEL: -- the agent, well they didn't 19 mention any names, of course they wouldn't. Yeah. 20 JIM: 21 I take that back. RACHEL: 22 JIM: Right. 23 RACHEL: They just mentioned agents. 24 JIM: An agent. 25 RACHEL: What he said was, he said that we

never, we never told them that we thought that they

were agents and that is not true because before this 1 2 all happened, David had told me, it was like I think 3 the first time they came over they were standing out by 4 the horse, what is that thing called behind our front--5 UNIDENTIFIED CHILD IN BACKGROUND: Horse --6 RACHEL: Horse walker, anyway, and they were 7 asking about purchasing it, and David was out there talking to them. There was, I don't know how many out 8 9 there, three or four I'm not sure. 10 UNIDENTIFIED CHILD IN BACKGROUND: Two, two. 11 You don't know, be quiet. And, he RACHEL: 12 told, you know, them that when they first moved in, 13 that he thought that they were agents. 14 He did. JIM: 15 RACHEL: FBI agents, something of that sort. 16 Uh-huh, uh-huh, yeah. JIM: 17 RACHEL: So, it, you know, they're not, they don't have all the information. 18 19 No, that's right. I understand that. JIM: 20 But David did tell them that. RACHEL: 21 JIM: He told them that. 22 RACHEL: When they first came over, several 23 of them came over, he told them that he thought that 24 were when they first moved in. 25 JIM: Yeah, uh-huh. RACHEL: So.

1 JIM: Well, I understand, that's another part 2 of your story, I think in your side of the events that 3 needs to be told when you come out. You know, it's 4 important. You know, don't forget it. Write it down. You know, everybody needs to tell their part of the 5 6 events that occurred and I think it's important that it's not just agents telling what happened. 7 8 be you telling and David telling, you know what I'm 9 saying? 10 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 11 JIM: I'm concerned about that. I think that that is very important and so just keep that in mind. 12 13 I don't know, this is, wish things like this never 14 occurred, you know, I think maybe if you and I talked 15 or David had talked prior, you know, we could have done this differently. 16 17 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 18 But unfortunately it wasn't us, it was 19 some other people and you know, if we could've done --20 So you, yourself are with the FBI, RACHEL: 21 right? 22 JIM: No. 23 RACHEL: No? 24 JIM: No, I'm ATF. 25 RACHEL: And Henry's with FBI? Henry's FBI. JIM:

1 RACHEL: Right. 2 I want to tell you that there's great 3 interest in your side, your view of what happened, what you saw and your testimony and that's very important. 4 So I don't want you to think that that's being 5 6 discounted. The media is very interested in it. So --7 RACHEL: Oh yeah, they always are. 8 Well, you know, Rachel, but the thing 9 is, this is the problem that David and I have been 10 having with them all week inaccuracies. You know, just 11 like when they said there's twenty kids on the bus. 12 RACHEL: Right. 13 I mean, you know, whenever you're 14 telling one person who tells another person, who tells 15 another person, you know what I'm saying? 16 RACHEL: Uh-huh, it gets on the radio, and the news and --17 18 JIM: Yeah, and then by the time it's like 19 that, it's not even close to what happened. 20 RACHEL: That's right. 21 It's an old Texas saying, you know, the 22 horse's mouth. 23 RACHEL: Yeah. 24 Right? And the horse's mouth is the JIM: 25 person that was there. RACHEL: Right.

1 And you were there, David was there, 2 and I think that that, you know needs to be directly It will be, it will be, as it should be. Right? 3 told. RACHEL: It should. 5 That's right, absolutely and that's, 6 that's going to happen. So, you know, just remember that your day in court will come and your day with the 7 8 media will come and these things will all be told, you know. How's Sita doing? 9 10 RACHEL: Oh, she's fine. She's fine. She 11 was a little bit upset yesterday about the situation. 12 JIM: Oh listen, I just was passed a report 13 here from the newspaper, it said Treasure Secretary, 14 Lloyd Benston --15 Uh-huh. RACHEL: 16 -- whose department oversees ATF, said 17 there will be a full review of the operation that occurred at Mt. Carmel. 18 19 RACHEL: Lloyd Benston? 20 Yeah. He's the, he's the, well you 21 know him, don't you? The name is familiar. David or 22 Steve probably knows, you know, more, but the name is 24 familiar because I read it in the newspaper on Saturday when it first came out. 25

JIM: Well, he's the, he's over ATF.

1 RACHEL: Oh, okay. 2 He's over ATF, see. And, he used to be JIM: 3 a Senator from Texas. And, you know, they changed 4 administrations up there. He's the new Treasury 5 Secretary, so he's over all of ATF. 6 RACHEL: So how long have you been doing this 7 sort of thing? 8 JIM: Well, about nineteen years. 9 RACHEL: You like it? 10 Well, it, it's hard, you know. 11 RACHEL: I wouldn't like it. It's too 12 stressful. 13 JIM: Yeah, it's hard to see people in 14 difficult situations. That part I don't like. 15 RACHEL: I mean because, to me, it would be 16 hard to go home after the job was over and forget about 17 everything because you become involved and it's like 18 part of your life. 19 Well, you do, you know, you do. But, 20 you know, you want to try to help and see what you can 21 do. You know, it's always nice to see things resolve 22 peacefully. And, that's a real reward. I know you 23 feel the same. 24 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 25 When I was twenty-one I just started out as a uniformed policeman, you know?

1 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 2 JIM: But, I had to deliver a baby one time. 3 RACHEL: Oh really? JIM: Boy, that was a trip, I tell you what. 4 5 I pulled up in front of this house and these two ladies ran out and said, " oh, everything's okay now, the 6 police are here." I said, "oh gosh," there was a lady 7 8 inside on the couch having a baby. 9 Ooh. Now, why were you there, what? RACHEL: 10 JIM: Well, they called, the lady was in 11 labor. 12 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 13 JIM: And so they dialed the emergency dispatch, you know, and said send the police and an 14 15 ambulance, the lady's having a baby. Well, when they 16 put it on the police frequency, I was closer than the 17 ambulance. 18 RACHEL: Oh. 19 JIM: You see, cause I was out, you know, in 20 the neighborhood. So, I went there, and I got there, 21 you know before the ambulance ever came. 22 RACHEL: I didn't know they would send a 23 police --JIM: Yeah, yeah, they used to send us on any 24 25 emergency call, you know. RACHEL: Oh.

1 Any time there was an ambulance call. 2 RACHEL: My mother, my mother had to go in a ambulance once I think and I don't remember. 3 Well in different cities, you know --4 JIM: Yeah, that's true. 5 RACHEL: But that was kind of scary because here 6 JIM: 7 I was alone, you know and --8 RACHEL: And you had to deliver it, huh? 9 Well, you know, I think, I give the mother credit for that. I kind of, I kind of just 10 11 stood there and tried to help. Tried to look like I 12 knew what I was doing. 13 RACHEL: Did you catch the baby? 14 JIM: Yeah, uh-huh. 15 RACHEL: Did you cut the cord? 16 JIM: No. 17 RACHEL: Or did you wait. 18 What I did was I waited, because, got 19 the baby out and then just laid him on his mother's 20 side and left the cord, you know, because that's the 21 way they trained us in the police academy. I knew that help was just minutes away, you know. So then the 22 23 ambulance attendants came in and they cut the umbilical 24 cord, and you know, cleaned him up and, but I'm telling your, for, for a twenty one year old policeman who 25 thinks he's a big tough guy, you know, then here's, and

1 here's, lady having a baby. 2 RACHEL: Yeah. 3 Of course, my uniform, you can imagine what that looked like. 4 5 RACHEL: Yeah, (laughing). 6 Then I went back to the squad room and 7 of course all of the --8 RACHEL: Well, were you married yet at that 9 time? 10 JIM: No. 11 RACHEL: Oh, so you, you, that was a new 12 experience. 13 JIM: That was a new experience. 14 You never saw a birth before. 15 That's right. I didn't expect, you 16 know, and all the policemen down there, saying geez, 17 Jim, where you, where've you been? You look terrible. 18 But it was really neat, it was kind of neat. You get 19 thrown in those situations, but you, you know, there's 20 a lot of times when you'd find a lost kid or, you know, 21 something like that which would be real nice when you 22 help somebody. You've got people in there from all over the world, don't you? 23 24 RACHEL: Yeah. 25 Did they say New Zealand, somebody tell JIM: me or is that the --

1 I don't know. I didn't hear RACHEL: 2 anything of that sort. 3 Australia, maybe. I think there was JIM: some people from Australia. Maybe it was Nicole, I 4 think I talked to her. Do you know her? 5 6 RACHEL: Yes. JIM: Yeah, she had a accent, yeah she had an 7 8 Australian accent. I think, I'm trying to remember if 9 her children came out. RACHEL: If what? 10 11 JIM: If Nicole's children, did some of her 12 children come out? 13 RACHEL: I don't believe so. 14 Does she have any kids in there? JIM: No. 15 RACHEL: I think one of them talked to you. 16 JIM: Oh yeah, I think he did, yeah. Hey, you know what we were going to do before the prayer 18 service, was, you were going to run down to make a list of the kids and how old they were? 19 20 RACHEL: Oh yeah. JIM: Do you still have that handy? 21 22 RACHEL: Well I remember it and I also 23 remember what he told me to tell you at that time. 24 JIM: Oh, you didn't tell me though. And, 20 then the judge has to set the bail, you know. 21 have to appear before the magistrate, I mean, once you 22 walk out, I mean, you know, it's all in the hands of 23 the court. It's not in the hands of agents, you know. 24 (to child) Don't mess with that. RACHEL: 25 Well, I know one thing, back in '88, when we had the trial.

1 JIM: Right. 2 RACHEL: The amount that -- of bail, I mean 3 it was, I think it was fifty, fifty thousand? 4 JIM: Yeah. 5 RACHEL: I mean, there was other guys in the cell, you know, who were being charged with attempted 6 murder, or murder, or whatever was less than that. I 7 8 mean that was --9 JIM: Oh, I know. 10 RACHEL: -- that was something else. That 11 was unbelievable. 12 JIM: Well, listen, we know that everyone in 13 there was not involved and everyone in there is not 14 responsible. 15 RACHEL: Well who, how, well who would they consider involved and who would they consider not being involved? 17 18 JIM: Yeah, that I can't tell you. I don't 19 know. 20 RACHEL: Well, you should know, I mean just 21 as a personal conversation, not as telling me, you 22 know --23 JIM: Yeah, I --24 RACHEL: -- particular aspects, I'm just curious as to how that works. 25 JIM: Well, I think that the investigation,

1 you know, they'll have to ask a lot of guestions, I 2 mean, talk to you guys, you know, see what you say, and you know, see what whoever was on the scene says, you 3 know, I'm sure that's how it going to be done. normal way a case is done, you know. 5 6 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 7 JIM: And, of course, you know, it's got to 8 be proof. It can't be any, just like in witnesses, you 9 know, just like in that Roden case, in '88 when David 10 and the guys were acquitted, it's because the evidence 11 was lacking, you know. I'm sure some people will not 12 be charged, although I could tell you that initially 13 they will be held as material witnesses, I'm sure every 14 adult in there will be initially. And then some 15 attorneys will decide well, we're not charging this 16 person, this person, this person, and we're going to 17 charge these and anyone who was charged, you know, will 18 then appear for bail. You know how that works. 19 RACHEL: Yes. 20 And, I'm not going to lie to you. JIM: 21 know, if I was going to lie to you, I'd say "oh sure 22 come on out, you know, no problem," right? 23 RACHEL: (Laughing) Yes. 24 I'm, I'm telling you what's going to 25 happen.

RACHEL: Oh, I, I know that for sure. I mean

1 nobody gets, gets away free, you know if they've 2 committed a crime, they shouldn't. 3 JIM: Well, then not everybody in there might 4 have committed a crime, right? 5 RACHEL: No. Right. 6 JIM: Okay, so what I'm saying is everybody 7 8 RACHEL: If you are allowed to self defend 9 yourself, you know, --10 Exactly, exactly. That's what we want JIM: 11 you to know that you should be telling us. 12 RACHEL: I mean either you're going to be the 13 one dead or you're going to fire back and --14 JIM: Do you know that the law says and I 15 learned this nineteen years ago when I was a rookie, 16 that everyone has a right to defend themselves, and 17 their home and their property. 18 RACHEL: You know, before this ever happened, I used to, you know, think about, what if, you know, 19 20 just personal, personal lifestyle, what if someone 21 broke in my house and, you know, I mean it happens all 22 the time, you have people break in someone's home and 23 they, they'll you know, try to rob you, or rape you or 24 whatever. 25 Right, exactly. JIM:

RACHEL: You know, and if you were to defend

1 yourself, you know, you'd probably still go to jail. 2 JIM: No, no. 3 RACHEL: Do you know how that works? 4 JIM: No, because look at the '88 case with, '87 with Roden, okay? 5 6 RACHEL: Yeah. 7 JIM: The, the, David and the other guys were 8 arrested, right? 9 Uh-huh. RACHEL: 10 JIM: They were charged, right? 11 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 12 But there was no evidence, it was JIM: 13 The truth came out. In other words, David and the other men told what happened and because of 14 their testimony given by your folks in there, they were 15 16 acquitted. And, you may well have a self defense case here. And --17 18 But even on a self defense case --RACHEL: 19 JIM: Right. 20 RACHEL: -- you know, like they said that four ATF agents got killed --21 22 JIM: Right. 23 -- still even if you're self, you RACHEL: know, defending yourself, to me, I mean, I don't know, 24 25 I don't really know anything about the law. You know, very little, if you're self, you know, you're defending

yourself and you were to kill someone, then how does 1 2 that still stand? 3 JIM: Well, then you're innocent. 4 RACHEL: I just thought, you know, they might 5 still do something. 6 JIM: No, then you're innocent. Okay? 7 RACHEL: Cause, you know, I used to think 8 about those kind of things, you know, like what if, you 9 know, cause this is a wicked world and a lot of things 10 happen out there, you know, what if someone, you know, 11 I've had that concern as far as being, you know, 12 molested or raped or by someone out there that was just 13 to break in, you know? 14 JIM: Absolutely, absolutely, that happens 15 every day. But you have the right to defend yourself. 16 That's in the law. That's in the State law, that's in 17 the Federal Law, that every citizen has the right to 18 defend themselves. And certainly the sanctity of their 19 home. To repel an attack, to repel a rape as you say 20 or some type of injury. You have that right. That's 21 in the law. 22 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 23 JIM: You know a man in California, I remember, was -- killed a police officer. And, he was 24 25 acquitted on self defense grounds.

RACHEL: Oh, really.

Yeah, I can tell you a case I had in JIM: Nashville, Tennessee years ago. Okay? Let me tell you this story. A man was standing on the front store, step of his house and a policeman come up, and pulled out a gun and pointed it at him and shot toward him and this man killed the uniform policeman, killed him, with a .45 pistol and he was acquitted. The Grand Jury wouldn't even indict him for it. Never even got to the jury. The Grand Jury, you know, which is the ones who, you know, sit first.

RACHEL: Yeah. See if it's worth hearing the case.

JIM: See if there's fact, right, uh-huh. And, what I want you to realize is, you know, this isn't even at the Grand Jury. You know what I'm saying?

RACHEL: Uh-huh.

JIM: But first you have to have Grand Jury and that's like, you know, how many people they have in those allotment, twenty three people, they have to be citizens, you know, they're not police, they can't be police and they have to decide that there's grounds for a charge. And then it goes to the, if it reaches past there to a trial stage, then the jury has to decide, well, you know, was a crime committed or if it's self defense, then that's, that's a defense.

1 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 2 You know. And the burden, and you know JIM: this Rachel, the burden of proof is not on you, right? 3 RACHEL: Oh. 4 5 JIM: In other words, the citizen has to 6 prove nothing. Doesn't have to prove anything. 7 Doesn't have to present any evidence. In other words, you're innocent. You're presumed innocent. 8 9 RACHEL: Well, I know when they went to jail 10 back in '87 and the court was in '88, it, it was, the judicial system was, it was unreal. I learned a lot, 11 12 by going to that court case, how backwards things 13 really are. I mean --14 Like what, what do you mean? JIM: 15 The District Attorney's Office, Al 16 Shabob (phonetic), the things that he brought out, I 17 mean, things he said that weren't even true. I mean 18 David was talking to, I don't know if it was, it was 19 probably you because when this first started happening, 20 Henry wasn't involved yet. 21 JIM: Right. 22 And, you know, Shabob would ask, I RACHEL: 23 mean, I can't speak as well as he does, but, you know, 24 like, when you went out there to to shoot George Roden, did you not, I forget the rest of it, something or 25 another, and the questions they ask, you know, it's

like yes or no. You can't answer yes or no, cause 2 they're asking you --3 JIM: Right. -- you know what I mean? 4 RACHEL: 5 JIM: Yeah, I know exactly what you mean. Ι 6 know exactly what you mean, but, remember this now, the 7 way that happens is, that each side has an attorney and 8 each attorney gets to do that to the, to the other See what I mean? 9 side. 10 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 11 So the attorney for your side can get 12 up and say, Rachel, tell me what happened. See what I 13 mean? 14 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 15 JIM: He doesn't have to ask a yes or no. 16 Now the other side may get up and say, isn't it true 17 that you did this, yes or no? 18 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 19 See what I mean? JIM: 20 RACHEL: Uh-huh. 21 JIM: But the, you know, the Constitution of 22 the U. S. protects everyone. And, it say, you know, let's talk about that, I mean, freedom of religion, the 23 24 Constitution guarantees all these rights, search and 25 seizure, you have to have warrants and testimony in court and you have to appear in court and you know the

1 agents don't control that. I mean it's not, that's the court. 2 Are you from Texas or are you from a 3 RACHEL: different state? 4 5 JIM: No, I'm from New Jersey. 6 RACHEL? New Jersey? 7 JIM: Uh-huh. 8 RACHEL: So you probably, you wouldn't have 9 even known about that court case then. 10 JIM: No, I didn't know about it, uh-uh. Not 11 until, you know, David really started telling me about 12 it. 13 RACHEL: And then now they keep bringing it 14 up and they're not even bringing up the facts. 15 saying things that are totally off the wall. 16 I know and I've seen some accounts, 17 well I should say this. I live in Dallas now. I was 18 just a little boy in New Jersey. When you said where 19 are you from Jim, you know. Yeah, I live in Dallas. 20 RACHEL: So you never heard anything? 21 JIM: About, well I didn't hear anything 22 about that until, until David started really laying it 23 out for me and then I went and checked some of the 24 background. 25 So, then you know the facts. RACHEL:
