Telephone number 597-7846 has been disconnected, and LEAA now uses phone number 597-9440. "597" is the Federal Government exchange at Philadelphia. "


Telephone number (717)-838-1209, listed for Palmyra, Pa., is an exchange in the Lebanon Area of Pennsylvania. Officials at the telephone company advised telephone records for this area are under water from their recent disastrous floods in Pennsylvania. The Philadelphia Office of the FBI will be advised upon recovery of these records; however, a considerable period of time is anticipated before this can be done. w

Indices search was conducted on 6/23/72, at the Philadelphia Division of the FBI on all above subscribers and no reference could be found to any of them. w

It is to be noted that 302's concerning interviews in this case have not all been completed at the date of the writing of this report. Gaps in continuity occasioned by the absence of these 302's are filled in certain instances by notations made in investigative inserts.

Investigation at Philadelphia involved interviews with managers of bank branches receiving shipments of \$100 bills from the Girard Bank on 4/3/72. In certain instances, managers were able to provide names of individuals who had made withdrawals of \$100 bills around that time. Indices searches at the Philadelphia Division of the FBI were conducted concerning these individuals on 6/26/72, and the following information was developed:

DAVID DECKER owns the Piquet Protective Agency, 292 Montgomery Avenue, Bala Cynwyd, Pa. He has telephoned the Philadelphia Office of the FEI on a number of occasions and offered the services of his business to the FBI.

william D. MC cum advised he sold walkie-talkies and certain accessories to James W. MC CORD, Jr., in April 1972. MC CUIN does not know MC CORD other then on a business basis. Kenneth F. Wren, Security Office, Third Federal Reserve, Philadelphia, advised certain \$100 bills found on MC CORD and his associates at time of arrest were dispersed through Federal Reserve Bank, Philadelphia, 2/1/72. Federal Reserve Bank, Philadelphia, advised above bills were included in shipment to Girard Bank, Friladelphia, Pa. 4/3/72. MICHAEL B. DAVIS, Security Officer, Girard Bank, advised Girard did receive above shipment but made no record of the serial numbers and stated it would be impossible to determine which branch of his bank or other corresponding banks the bills were dispersed to, inturn. w

DETAILS:

Investigation of the burglary of Democratic Headquarters, Washington, D.C., on June 17, 1972, including the discovery of certain transistorized microphones on subjects arrested, was predicated upon receipt of the following information: w

On June 17, 1972, at 5:15 p.m., SA ANGELO J. LANO, Washington Field Office (WFO), FBI, telephonically advised SA J. ROBERT PEARCE, Philadelphia Office of the FBI, that WFO is investigating the case involving the placing of electronic equipment in the Democratic Headquarters, Washington, D.C. Three devices were "discovered" plus two Bell and Howell "walkietalkies", model 247B, serial numbers 4900 and 4971.

An individual identified in the above telephone call is JAMES MC CORD, who is said to be in charge of security for the Republican Convention. Other individuals are as follows:

BERNARD L. BARKER, 5229 N.W. 4th Street, Miami, Fla.

EUGENIO R. MARTINEZ, 444 North Medrian Avenue, Miami, Fla.

VIRGILIO R. GONZALES, 930 N.W. 23rd Avenue, Miami, Fla.

FRANK ANTHONY RIORINI, also known as Frank Sturgis, Miami, Fla.

In addition to these individuals, JAMES WALTER MC CORD, mentioned above, is listed as living at 143 West 73rd Street, New York City. His alias is EDWARD J. MARTIN. Also listed was EVERETT HOWARD HUNT, Potomac, Md. w

It was stated that Washington, D.C. Metropolican Police, ascertained that MC CORD had purchased the "walkie-talkies" from WILLIAM MC CUINN Associates, Box 776, Havertown, Pa., phone number (215) 449-6555. w

The Delaware County Directory lists WILLIAM D. MC CUIN, 350 Strathmore Road, Havertown, Pa., with residence at same address. Business telephone is listed as HI 9-6555. Residence phone is listed as SU 9-3111. w

Mr. LANO said he needed to ascertain from MC CUIN details concerning the sale of the "walkie-talkies" to MC CORD and the same or distribution of any of the devices to MC CORD, particularly "bugging" devices. w

The results of the above inquiry was to be sent to the Bureau and WFO by teletype. w

The above information was furnished by SA PEARCE to SA HARRY PLUMMER who telephonically advised SA WILLIAM C. FIELDS, III, to immediately contact WILLIAM D. MC CUIN, 350 Strathmore Road, concerning above. SA PLUMMER also advised SA FIELDS of the provisions of Title 18, United States Code, Sections 2511 and 2512 regarding Interception of Communications.

Mr. WILLIAM D. MC CUIN, 350 Strathmore Road, Havertown, Pa., doing business as SIC, Inc., PO Box 803, Havertown, Pa., 19083, telephone number (215) 449-6555, was advised of the identity of the interviewing agent and informed him that he would be questioned regarding the sale of Bell and Howell Transceivers, Model 247B, serial numbers 4900 and 4971. He furnished the following information:

He had been contacted earlier by Officer GARY BITTENBENDER, Metropolitan Police, Washington, D.C., regarding the same matter. He sold the company transceivers plus other equipment to JAMES MC CORD doing business as Mc Cord Associates, Inc., 414 Hungerford Plaza, Suite 220, Rockville, Md., 20850. MC CUIN is a representative of Bell and Howell Communications Company, for the entire East Coast, with the exception of New England. It was in this capacity that MC CUIN sold to Mc Cord Associates, Inc., the following equipment on May 25, 1972:

- 1. Four Kel Com III Transceivers, serial #4940, 4961, 4971, 4900, complete with operating crystals, antenna, leather case and belt clip, dual channel, nicab batteries, operable on frequency FITx156.260, Rx161.9725; F2TxRx161.9175.
- 2. Three A-7 antennas (for use on automobiles).w
- 3. Two model 98 earphones. w
- 4. Two standard Loop (receivers that are mounted in lapel and are able to transmit to above-mentioned earphone. •
- 5. Two H-10 C Microphone ( to be used with above Kel Con Units). •
- 6. Two H-10 microphones. w
- 7. Four C-10 shoulder harnesses.

In addition to the above, MC CUIN leased to MC CORD one home-made sixty watt repeater with a General Electric (GE) base, it is not to be used in conjunction with above transceivers.

These are the only items sent to MC CORD from MC CUIN. MC CUIN is well aware of the provisions of Title III of the United States Code, concerning interception of communications. His sales of Bell and Howell products are to law enforcement agencies exclusively, except for such equipment as the Kel Com model 247 B, such as the transceivers mentioned above, which attorneys for Bell and Howell have determined are outside the ambit of Title III. This determination was reached after Bell and Howell attorneys consulted with the United States Department of Justice, although MC CUIN is not positive of this. w

MC CUIN first met MC CORD in Washington, D.C., sometime in January, 1972. MC CORD expressed an interest to them and continues to express an interest in the Bell and Howell Tac II, a burglary alarm unit.

In conjunction with this interest in Tac II, MC CORD requested, by subsequent correspondence, the above list of items for his use as security measures at the Re-elect President Nixon Headquarters, 1701 Pennsylvania Avenue, Washington, D.C. MC CORD had expressed an interest in the later transfer of this equipment to Miami Beach, for use during the Republican National Convention, 1972, by security personnel. MC CUIN last contacted MC CORD when both happened to be in Miami Beach on June 6, 1972.4

MC CORD told MC CUIN all systems were working well.

MC CORD had indicated a desire to be able to contact Convention

Hall in Miami Beach from headquarters he wished to set-up

approximately two miles away at the Doral Beach Hotel. MC CUIN

thought that he would be able to do this by placing the leased

repeater atop the Doral Beach Hotel. MC CORD was staying at the

Doral Beach Hotel, Miami, Fla. MC CUIN received Federal Communications Commission (FCC), approval for use of the frequencies

assigned for the above transceivers. After this had been done, w

he leased MC CORD the repeater for use in conjunction with the transceivers. MC CUIN is quite certain the two frequencies designated for use to MC CORD are not used by anyone else in the United States. They are warning banned frequencies. w

Mr. FRANK JAMESON, Vice President, Special Operations Group, Bell and Howell Communications Company, 186 3rd Avenue, Waltham, Mass., has a complete record of transactions between MC CORD and MC CUIN. Actual transfer of money and equipment would have been at Waltham, Mass., pursuant to purchase orders MC CORD entered into with MC CUIN for the above items. MC CUIN recalled that MC CORD is a white male, approximately 40 years old. He stands 6', is of slender build, and has brown hair. He was well dressed on the occasion of his first meeting with MC CORD at an office in Washington, D.C. MC CUIN indicated this office was of a Secret Service official. MC CUIN was, however, under the impression that MC CORD was a former Secret Service agent. W

Mr. WILLIAM D. MC CUIN, 350 Strathmore Road, Havertown, Pa., telephonically contacted SA WILLIAM C. FIELDS, III, at the Philadelphia Office of the FBI and furnished the following information pursuant to an interview with MC CUIN on June 17, 1972: \(\times\)

He reviewed his files concerning MC CORD Associates, Inc., 414 Haverford Plaza, Suite 220, Rockville, Md., and discovered a letter from MC CUIN to MC CORD dated April 22, 1972, making a proposal for a shipment of items from Bell and Howell (B and H) Communications Company, Waltham, Mass. This letter was in response to another letter from MC CORD dated April 19, 1972, specifically asking for such a proposal. MC CUIN's son, THOMAS MC CUIN, recently moved to his new address at 13504 Attleboro Court, Apartment 22, Laurel, Md., (301), 953-7333, or (202) 737-2200, car #339. THOMAS MC CUIN has personally contacted MC CORD concerning Tac II Alarm System on several occasions. MC CUIN feels it is possible his son, TOM, furnished MC CORD a commercial catalog listing Bell and Howell Equipment available to private individuals. It is also possible THOMAS MC CUIN orally furnished MC CORD information concerning equipment available from his father. u

MC CUIN advised that his proposal letter dated April 22, 1972, to MC CORD included the following items which are part of Tac II Burglary Alarm System, who were not immediately accepted by MC CORD. w

The below listed items are still of interest of MC CORD, however, and he is planning to purchase them at a later date: w

- 1. One 727-20 decoder with a receiver.
- One 1-2 Vehicular Power Supply.
- 3. Five Key-Peep-hole Alarms. w

MC CUIN noted the repeater he leased to MC CORD was for the months of June, July, August, and September, 1972, at \$110 per month. The leasing date was April 19, 1972. u

MC CUIN neither sold nor rented any equipment to MC CORD other than that mentioned in the initial interview. MC CUIN specifically selected the frequencies to be used by the transceivers he sold to MC CORD. This selection was done at the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) Office in Washington, D.C. MC CORD played no roll in the selection of the frequencies other than to warn MC CUIN that these receivers were to be used in the Washington, D.C., San Diego, California, and Miami, Fla., area. MC CORD later called and said they would not be used in the San Diego, California area. MC CORD and MC CUIN were concerned that the frequencies were not occupied by other transmitters in those areas.

MC CUIN definitely did not manufactur, sell, lease, or in any other way convey electronic surveillance equipment to MC CORD other than that previously mentioned. He advised he does not have sufficient technical knowledge to manufactur such devices himself.

MC CUIN viewed a photograph of a person identified as MC CORD in the Philadelphia Newspaper. He advised that he did not recognize him as the person he met in Washington, D.C., in January, 1972, and whom he had been told may have been MC CORD. Several people were at that initial meeting which was called for the presentation of the Tac II Alarm System to certain Secret Service personnel. Among those people were FRANK JAMESON, a vice president of Bell and Howell Communications Company, and other Secret Service Agents. MC CUIN states it is possible MC CORD was at that meeting but that MC CUIN took no note of him. The meeting was in a very small office, and FRANK JAMESON was demonstrating the equipment. MC CUIN was standing outside the office. This was an office of a Secret Service Agent in the White House Office Building, Washington, D.C. MC CUIN was surprised to hear that the so-called bugging equipment allegedly found in the possession of MC CUIN and others with him, were on the same frequency as the transceivers he had sold.

The transceivers and the repeater were both on the same frequency commissioned with any conversation picked up by the "Bugs" could vertically be broadcast throughout the entire Washington, D.C. area. These "Bugging" devices would have been more effective at another frequency in MC CUIN's estimation.

MC CUIN reiterated he has not enough technical knowledge to produce such equipment himself. He did not provide this equipment to MC CUIN and neither did Bell and Howell. There is a company in Florida known as Tracer, and one in Long Island, name unrecalled, which MC CUIN thinks could possibly have been the sources for such equipment. These are by no means exclusive sources, and they are outlets for so-called bugging equipment throughout the United States.

WILLIAM D. MC CUIN, 350 Strathmore Road, Havertown, Pa., doing business as SIC, Inc., Post Office Box 803, Havertown, Pa., area code 215-1419-6555, was advised of the identities of the interviewing agents and informed he would be questioned regarding the burglary of the Democratic Party National Headquarters, Mashington, D.C., on June 17, 1972. He furnished the following information:

Mr. AL WONG, Chief of the Technical Security Division (TED), United States Secret Service, United States Treasury Department, is the individual who had called a meeting in Washington, D.C., and through whom MC CUIN had his first encounter with JAMES MALTER HC CORD. WONG had acked for a demonstration of the Bell and Howell (B and H) TAC II burglary alarm system. Mr. FRANK JAMESON came from B and H Headquarters, Waltham, Hass., to make the above presentation. The actual meeting was held in a very small office occupied by one of Mr. WOMG's assistants in the White House Office Building. Mr. WONG had apparently heard of the alarm system through the United States Marshals in Mashington, The Harshals had previously purchased such a system. HC CUIN could not recall who the people at the meeting were other than the fact that only four people could fit into the office for the propontation. Hr. MC CUIN and another individual were standing outside the office listening to the presentation. Mr. WOMS listened to a portion of it, but left early. MC CUT! was of the opinion that the only people at the presentation were United States Secret Service Agents. 4

During the meeting, one individual in the room asked many pointed questions of JAMESON. JAMESON told MC CUIN after the meeting that he had become quite irritated with this individual's questions and felt that he had been overly abrupt with him. He requested that MC CUIN find out the individual's name so that JAMESON could write a letter of apology, in which he would explain in more detail the TAC II alarm system. MC CUIN did not know who this individual was, but recalled that he telephoned one of three Secret Service agents whom he knows. These three Secret Service agents are

MC CORD after this incident. Whenever he called, an answering service would say that MC CORD is unavailable but would call back. When he finally reached MC CORD, he expressed an interest in the Bell and Howell TAC II alarm system. MC CUTM referred to his daybook and noted that his first contact with MC CORD was on January 26, 1972. He also determined through reference to his daybook that the meeting he attended at Secret Service Office in Mashington, D.C., at which MC CORD asked many pointed questions of JAMESON was sometime in November 1971, probably November 18th or November 30th.

MC CUIN reiterated that he provided no so called bugging equipment to MC CORD. Such equipment would have been available to MC CORD through a number of outlets in the United States. Among these outlets is R.B. Clifton Company, 11500 Northwest 7th Avenue, Miami, Fla. This company was formarly known as Tracer. Two California outlets of similar type equipment are S.A.C. in Las Angeles and Fargo International, also in Los Angeles. Fargo has a representative in the Mashington, D.C., area named GUS CEERDICK, his son, JIM CEERDICK is also a representative. A good possibility for supplying such equipment in the Washington, D.C., area is the Spy Shop, 14th and New York Avenues, Mashington, D.C. w

## III. THVESTIGATION AT PHILADELPHIA PAIKS

PH 139-115

Washington Field Office of the FBI advised the Philadelphia Division by teletype dated June 19, 1972, that \$100 bills, serial number 003642255 through 264 were found in the possession of JAMES W. HC CORD and his associates shortly after the burglary of the Democratic Party National Meadquarters. It was determined that these \$100 bills were dispersed to the Federal Reserve Bank, Philadelphia, Pa. W

On June 19, 1972, KEINETH F. WREN, Security Office, Third Federal Reserve, Philadelphia, Pa., advised that the above numbered \$100 bills were included in blocks of 2,000 \$100 bills that were distributed to the Girard Bank, Philadelphia, Pa., on April 3, 1972.

MICHAEL B. DAVIS, Security Officer, Girard Bank, advised that the above shipment was received by his bank and broken down into unrecorded lots. These may have been shipped to enjone of 60 Girard Pank branches and various savings and loan associations, trust companies, and possibly a few commercial establishments. He is unable to trace these bills beyond his main office.

On June 20, 1972, MICHAEL B. DAVIS was again contacted and he furnished several Girard Bank branches and other Philadelphia area banks which received shipments of \$100 bills on April 3, 1972. This list included 21 Girard Bank branches, 12 branchs at the Philadelphia Savings Fund Society, four Industrial Valley Bank branches, two Frankford Trust branches, two Germantown Savings Bank branches, and one branch of the Bryn Haur Trust Company.

HARRISON COOK. 2239 North Franklin Street, Thiladelphia, Pa., telephone number 215-765-5029, advised that he had no personal knowledge of the burglary of the Democratic Party National Headquarters, Washington, D. C., which occurred on June 17, 1972, and was not familiar with the name of JAMES WALTER MC CORD, JR., or any of the other. four individuals involved with this burglary. Mr. COOK stated that he has a son by the name of HIRAM HARRISON COOKE who is approximately age 40, and who has been with the U. S. Army for over 20 years. Mr. COOK said that although he has not seen his son HIRAM on over a year, specifically since March of 1971, he has been told by HIRAM that he had received some sort of specialized training in the U. S. Marine Corps Base at Quantico, Ve., although the details of this training were not made evident. In addition, Mr. COOK said that his son HIRAM at one time was stationed in Pangma and that his duties, along with being a military policeman, were to train certain individuals in that area in the use of weapons, etc. Mr. COOK said that he has not been close to his son for years in that he has travelled around to many U. S. Army bases on various essignments, and as such, cannot provide any specific information as to exactly what his activities or present whereabouts might be. .

Mr. COOK said that he has recently received his telephone bill from the Philadelphia Bell Telephone Company for the month of May 1972. On this bill is a \$17.00 charge for a trans-continental telephone call made on Mothers Day, May 14, 1972, to his phone number from Copenhagen, Denmark. Mr. COOK had no idea who may have made this call, and in fact, stated that he was home the entire day on Mothers Day and did not receive any long distance or trans-continental phone calls of any kind and assumed that it must be some mistake made by the phone company. An individual who declined to identify himself telephonically contacted the Philadelphia Division of the FEI and provided the following information: A

He stated that one of the individuals who had been identified as participating in the burglary of the Democratic Headquarters in Washington, D.C., as FRANK STURGIS, was, in fact, named FRANK FIORINI. FIORINI was said to have held a Captaincy in Castro's Revolutionary Army during Castro's overthrow of the Cuban Government. After Castro became the Cuban Premiere, FIORINI fell in disfavor and has recently been involved in dropping leaflets from airplanes concerning anti-Castro propaganda. The unknown individual could furnish no further information.

The Mark V Receiver is designed for the sole purpose of receiving the keyed signals from the Beeper and translating these silent pulses into audible tones which are indicative of the direction and distance of the Beeper. This receiver cannot be used for any other purpose and will not respond to any other transmitted signal. Crystal controlled. Needs no tuning. When keyed by the silent pulses from the Beeper, the receiver produces 2 to 3 short tones per second, which vary in pitch (frequency) between 600 and 2000 cycles, depending on the signal strength. At distances of less than 1 mile, there is a definite relationship between distance to the target car and the tone pitch. The closer the target, the higher the pitch. The tone keeps rising, right up to within 100 feet of the target. This is ideal for locating a target that is hidden in or behind a building. Beyond 1 mile, the distance is calculated by use of the range switch. Note the entire operation is by ear and there are no lights or meters to distract the attention of the driver.

The range switch limits reception of the Beeper to one mile while in the short range mode. The medium position of the switch limits reception of the Beeper to 2 or 3 miles. The long position completely opens the receiver sensitivity to .05 microvolts, allowing reception of the Beeper from 3 to 6 miles under ideal atmospheric conditions. It should be noted here that ideal atmospheric conditions usually do not prevail in the areas where Beepers are most generally used. Consequently, when atmospheric interference levels are at average or higher, little will be gained by using the long range position. But range in the medium position will still be 2 to 3 miles, even under poor atmospheric conditions. (see charts)

Two quick-change disguise antennas are used. One on each side of the car. These look like ordinary car antennas and can be removed or installed in one minute. The phase of one antenna is shifted 180 degrees inside the receiver. The null switch connects this one in conjunction with the other antenna, causing a null (hole in the receiving pattern) directly ahead of the operator car. (see charts) The null is easily identified by ear because of the change in tone signal. Getting a directional fix on a parked target car in this manner is an easy, fast operation that requires practically no prior experience by the operator. A null can also be gotten on moving vehicles under most conditions, but is not quite so easy. Due to fluctuating and reflecting signals, 2 or 3 null checks and a bit of calculating may be needed. This part becomes easier with practice. The important thing is, if the moving vehicle should be just temporarily, it can always be found again by the Beeper signal.



It will not discharge the vehicle battery, even if the vehicle is not driven for a month. Or, since the Beeper has a built-in voltage regulator, any other 12 to 24 volt battery may be plugged in for longer transmitting time. Internal mercury batteries will transmit at full power 4 to 6 days. When number 216 Eveready carbon batteries are used internally, they will transmit 48 hours. 56 hours at full power plus 12 hours at declining power.

The Mark V Resper is crystal controlled and sends short, unmodulated key pulses that are received and decoded by the Mark V Receiver. No other type receiver can decode the pulses. The receiver translates the pulses to tones that are indicative of distance and direction. (see receiver data)








# RECEIVING PATTERN OF THE MARK Y BEEPER RECEIVER

MISS MILLICENT (PENNY) PACEY ODEASON, 513 Gilnours Brive, Silver Spring, Karyland, telephone numbers 593-5459 and (unlisted number) 503-5581, telephonically contacted SA CHARLES W. HARVEY at the Washington Field Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (PBI) at 11:00 a.m., July 1, 1972. Miss GLEASON stated that she had conversed with STEVE ANDERSON. another security officer for the Committee for the Re-Election of the President, who had been interviewed by SAs HARVET and HARVEY W. JAHES on June 30, 1972, and that her purpose in calling was to make arrangements for a confidential interview concerning the burglary of the Democratic Mational Committee (DNC) which occurred at the Watergate Hotel, Washington, D. C. (WDC), on June 17, 1972. Miss GLEASON noted that she had been contacted by SAs HARVEY and JAMES on June 30, 1972. at the Security Office of the Committee for the Re-Election of the President, 1701 Pennsylvania Avenue, N.W., WDC, but that she did not feel confortable in furnishing information in the presence of the attorney whose presence was required when interviews were conducted on the premises of the aforementioned committee, u

Miss GLEASON stated that she was calling from home and that she would drive to downtown WDC where she would again telephone SA HARVEY.

At approximately 12:50 p.m. on July 1, 1972, Miss GLEASON again telephoned SA HARVEY and stated she was calling from a pay telephone at the corner of 13th Street and Pennsylvania Avenue, N.V., VDC. She expressed concern that she might have been followed by unknown persons associated with the aforementioned committee and that she desired that the interview be held farther away from WPO. 4

SA MARVEY then met Fiss CLEASON at the Drug Pair store located at 13th Street and Pennsylvania Avenue, M.W. and both then walked to the 1200 block of & Street, N.W., where they were picked up by SA PAUL P. MAGALLANES, in his personally

owned automobile and transported to the area of 8th and I Streets, N.W., WDC, where the interview began. After over two hours of interviewing, it became apparent that the volume of information being furnished by Miss GLEASON necessitated a more adequate environment and since she indicated that she did not desire to be seen at or near WPO, the remainder of the interview was conducted in Room 300 at the Holiday Inn located at 1900 Connecticut Avenue, N.W., WDC. This room was rented in the name of SA HARVEY. W

From the beginning of the interview, Miss GLEASON emphasized that she would surely be fired from her position as Security Officer for the Committee for the Re-Election of the President, hereinafter referred to as the Committee, should her superiors learn of her contact with the PEI. Miss GLEASON stated that she would attempt to furnish all information in her possession which might have any bearing whatsoever on the investigation of the burglary at the DNC. In this regard, she had in her possession her own handwritten notes concerning suspicious conduct by various personnel associated with the Committee. W

#### Miss GLEASON advised as follows:

She has been employed as a Security Officer by the Committee since Easter Monday, 1972. When she began her employment there, Mr. JAMES W. McCORD, Chief of Security for the Committee, informed her and other security officers that he and his group would not have anything to do with the Republican National Convention and that "other people" would handle that. However, as time passed, McCORD and his security officers became more and more involved in the security preparations for the convention until the entire situation was being controlled by McCORD. W

Concerning the events immediately preceeding the arrest of McCORD on June 17, 1972, and the events thereafter, Miss GLEASON furnished the following information in chronological order: (It should be noted that her memory of details of certain events was refreshed by discussing some of the more noteworthy and pertinent events, thus the information furnished hereinafter is not necessarily in chronological order.) w

On the night of June 16, 1972, she was in the third floor security office of the Committee attempting to straighten

things up. Sometime between 9:30 and 10:00 p.m., Mr. McCORD came in the office and jokingly remarked that he had dropped by to make sure they had plenty of work. McCORD's appearance was unusual in that his shirt sleeves were rolled up and he was not well dressed. He was usually dressed very well. McCORD stated that he had come by to pick up his raincoat. Upon leaving, he said words to the effect, "PENNY, I want to thank you for what you've done for our office." Her impression was that McCORD's remark seemed more like a "good-bye" than a "thank you". As he left, she noticed that his pockets were bulging with unknown items. She believed that MC CORD returned a "Bellboy" telephone alerting device. She left the office and went home at approximately 10:15 p.m. on that date (June 16, 1972). W

Previously, at approximately 4:00 p.m. on June 16. 1972, McCORD wanted to know who was going to work on which shift the next day and instructed security officer JACK ERNST. to be on the second floor (the space occupied by the finance committee). McCORD also wanted security officer GEORGE SHANKS to work on the 3rd floor with her (GLEASON). The reason for this was that earlier in the evening of June 16, 1972, McCORD had instructed security officer STEVE ANDERSON to go through the keys for the second floor finance office of the Committee and obtain one key for each file cabinet and deak on that floor. ANDERSON was supposed to give these keys to HUGH SLOAN or OORDON LIDDY on the next morning (June 17, 1972) in order that he (SLOAN or LIDDY) could go through the desks and file cabinets to either locate some papers for destruction or insure that some papers had already been destroyed. Since ANDERSON would not be available on the morning of June 17, 1972, the task of getting the keys to SLOAN or LIDDY was given to the aforementioned ANDERSON, however, did get the keys as instructed and left them for ERNST to pick up. In this regard, Kiss GLEASON stated that she believes McCORD told ANDERSON to give the keys to LIDDY and that ANDERSON believes that he was to give the keys: to SLOAN. In other words, it was not an "either or" situation. but ANDERSON was instructed to give the keys to one specific individual - SLOAN or LIDDY, which one not definitely known. She (Hiss GLEASON) has no idea what papers were involved in this situation but, to her knowledge, the desks and file cabinets were not inspected on June 17, 1972. w

On June 17, 1972, Miss GLEASON arrived at work with JACK ERNST at approximately 7:00 a.m. Someone, identity not recalled, came in and said that the DNC had been burglarized. She attached no significance to this statement at this time but thought it strange that GORDON LIDDY and POWRHLTROORE, JOHN MITCHELL's press man, were running around the office together inasmuch as she had never observed them together before. At approximately 9:30 a.m. - 10:00 a.m. on the same date "JEB"/KAGRUDER called from an unknown location and told one of the office girls to advise him concerning the UPI wire reports concerning the DNC break-in. w

At approximately 11:00 a.m. - noon, on the same date (June 17, 1972), she received a telephone call from Ers. McCORD who was on the verge of tears. Mrs. McCORD asked, "PENNY, do you know an attorney named RATLISS?" Ers. McCORD inquired about the name RATLISS, not RAFFERTY. (Fiss GLEASON noted that at this point she still did not connect the burglary of the DNC with Mrs. McCORD's call). When she informed Mrs. McCORD that the name was not familiar to her and that ROB ODLE was in the office, Mrs. McCORD stated that she wished to speak with ODLE. Thereupon, Miss GLEASON gave Mrs. McCORD ODLE's direct telephone number and Mrs. McCORD presumably called him. w

She (GLEASON) then ran upstairs to the fourth floor to see what was wrong and SYLVIA PANNARITES, ODLE's "secretary at that moment" said "everything's fine, go back downstairs". As she (GLEASON) was leaving ODLE's office, she heard ODLE instruct SYLVIA to get Assistant Attorney General SANTARELLI on the telephone. Miss GLEASON does not believe that ODLE is aware of the fact that she overheard this statement. She noted that SANTARELLI's wife, CONNIE, is employed by the Committee as head of personnel."

Hiss GLEASON then went back to her office on the third floor and ODLE came running in shortly thereafter and stated to her, "I want you to stay until midnight because calls will be coming in on the West Coast incident." She was still unaware of McCORD's arrest at this time and had no idea what ODLE meant by "the West Coast incident". She then thought that possibly JOHN MITCHELL or his bodyguard, STEVE KING, had been injured on the West Coast. She then went upstairs and found MARTHA DUNCAN (office manager), ODLE and SYLVIA PANNARITES in "JEB" MAGRUDER's office. A

She was still unable to find out what had happened and went back to her third floor office. MARTHA DUNCAN then came downstairs to the security office and stated to Miss GLEASON, "Are you shocked? Are you disillusioned." Miss GLEASON was still unaware of McCORD's arrest but answered "yes", even though she (Miss GLEASON) did not know what DUNCAN was talking about. W

By this time it was approximately 1:00 p.m. - 2:00 p.m. (June 17, 1972), and Miss GLEASON decided to contact JEAN COLEMAN, secretary to CLIFF MILLER who, according to Miss GLEASON, is one of the two men at the Committee who are close to the President. COLEMAN stated to Miss GLEASON, "PFENNI one of the men in the break-in at the DNC was Mr. McCORD. If RQB ODLE found out I told you, he'd fire me." M

On the same date (Sune 17, 1972), ODLE personally asked Miss GLEASON to get BOB MOUSTON (security supervisor under McCORD) on the telephone. ODLE also stated, "Does HOUSTON know?" Thereupon, Miss GLEASON replied in the negative. She then called HOUSTON and told him that ODLE wanted to talk to him. HOUSTON at that time asked Miss GLEASON "Did you call Mr. McCORD about the DNC break-in?" Since ODLE had instructed Miss GLEASON not to give out any information, she lied to HOUSTON and told him "yes" in response to his question.

During the afternoon hours on the same date (June 17, 1972), Kiss GLEASON received a telephone call from a man who said he was a friend of Kr. McCORD's and was on the District of Columbia police force. This individual then indicated that he wanted to come over to the Committee. She then told the caller to wait while she checked. At that time, ODLE, LIDDY and POWELL MOORE were in conference. She interrupted the conference and asked LIDDY what she should do about the man on the telephone and LIDDY replied that he did not want the man to come over. Fiss GLEASON then told ODLE about the caller and ODLE told her to pay no attention to LIDDY's orders and to have the caller come over. She then told ODLE that since he (ODLE) did not want anybody to know anything, she would tell security officer MIKE KASSE that he (ODLE) wanted him to check downstairs and that she would go to the lobby to meet the individual who had called . w

Thereupon, she went to the lobby and at approximately 4:00 p.m. (June 17, 1972), one GARY RITTENBENDER, an Intelligence Officer for the Metropolitan Police Department (MPD), WDC arrived. At that time, she realized that on Wednesday (June 14, 1972), she had been introduced to BITTENBENDER by McCORD in the security office of the Committee. McCORD had introduced BITTENBENDER to her as "one of your classmates" from Montgomery County Junior College. Miss GLEASON thought this was a peculiar introduction since she was unable to recall ever having seen BITTENBENDER before. W

Continuing with her recollection of BITTENBENDER's activities on the afternoon of June 17, 1972, Miss GLEASON advised that while she and BITTENBENDER were in the lobby, she observed GORDON LIDDY leave the building. She called upstairs to inform ODLE that she was bringing BITTENBENDER upstairs, but ODLE was talking on another telephone. w

She noted that she did not require BITTENBENDER to sign in or out on the register and that he was the socalled "mystery man" seen in the Committee.u

Concerning the "mystery man", she believes that ODLE was well aware of the identity of this individual and sent the FBI on a chase to locate the individual in order to create busy work and tie up Agents from investigating more substantive aspects of the case. w

BITTENBENDER told Miss GLEASON that he had coincidentially been in the MPD cellblock when McCORD was booked in and that he recognized McCORD. BITTENBENDER kept repeating, "It's a very interesting case." He also said, "Maybe things like this won't happen when political rights are given back to policemen." W

When they arrived in the security office, BITTENBENDER asked Miss GLEASON for a mug shot that

he had previously given McCORD. Miss GLEASON had no knowledge of this mug shot and, consequently, to her knowledge, BITTENBENDER never retrieved same. ODLE then came down to the security office, told Hiss GLEASON to leave, and thereafter talked with BITTENBENDER for approximately 15 minutes. She went to get a Coke and when she came back BITTENBENDER was gone. 4

Later, on June 17, 1972, she heard from an unrecalled individual that GORDON LIDDY had left his second floor office at 6:00 p.m. never to return. w

Miss GLEASON also recalled that during the day of June 17, 1972, Mrs. McCORD called her again and requested that Mr. McCORD's personal pictures and plaques be removed from the walls of the security office. She (GLEASON) removed these items and placed same in a file cabinet. Among the items were a key to the White House to McCORD from the U. S. Secret Service and an award presentation photograph showing RICHARD HELMS presenting an award to McCORD. This photograph bore the notation "With deep appreciation, DICK HELMS." The word deep was underlined. W

Miss GLEASON further advised that she departed the office at approximately 11:30 p.m. Saturday night, June 17, 1972, but that she was emotionally upset over the events of that day and was unable to sleep. At 2:00 a.m., June 18, 1972, she called the office inasmuch as she was concerned that the Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) had apparently tapped a recorded message into the telephone lines of the November Group, an advertising type agency for the Republican National Party, located in New York, New York. She called the office at that hour to determine if their lines had been similarly tapped and to find out what was happening. She spoke with ODLE and he was obviously quite drunk as were the other two people at the office at that time, MARTHA DUNCAN and SYLVIA PANNARITES. ODLE kept pleading with Miss GLEASON, "Penny don't leave us, we need you so much." She informed ODLE that she was not leaving and thereafter MARTHA DUNCAN got on the telephone and said, 'We can't talk now, we're waiting for MITCHELL to call." Miss GLEASON stated that ODLE and DUNCAN will lie for each other to protect themselves. w

Miss GLEASON recalled that since she was unable to sleep, she went to the Committee, arriving there at approximately 4:20 a.m., June 18, 1972. She learned later in the day from PANNARITES that ODLE, DUNCAN, and PANNARITES had left the office at approximately 4:00 a.m. w

BOB HOUSTON arrived at the office at 8:00 a.m., Sunday, June 16, 1972. He told Miss GLEASON that he had read about MC COED's arrest in the paper. HOUSTON immediately went to the file cabinet in the security office and began removing files. When Kiss GLEASON asked HOUSTON what he was doing, he replied, "We're going to remove some of Mr. MC CORD's personal files." HOUSTON also removed some tapes and commented that his (HOUSTON's) voice was on some of them. W

One file that was removed from the security office (possibly by HOUSTON, but Miss GLEASON did not observe this), concerned FEI teletypes. By memorandum, date not recalled but which was dated late May or early June, 1972, ROE ODLE advised "JEB" MAGRUDER that it would be nice if arrangments could be made for MC CORD to receive FEI daily teletypes like he (MC CORD) did when he was with CIA. In this same memo, ODLE asked MAGRUDER to talk to KLEINDIENST about the matter. This memo was labeled "Confidential-Sensitive." W

Concerning the items removed from the security office by BOB HOUSTON on June 18, 1972, Miss GLEASON continued as follows: w

Writings and he accomplished this without any direction as if the procedure were part of a prearranged plan. One of the tapes removed from the security office, presumably by HOUSTON, concerned SCOTT CAMILLE, head of the Vietnam Veterans Against the WAR (YVAW) and Cuban refugees. The content of this tape was, to her best recollection, as follows: "According to confidential sources they are teaching groups how to make home made bombs and are giving them firearms and artillery to use against the D.C. Police stationed in Miami." The same tape also contained information concerning the security arrangements at the Hotel Doral in Miami, Florida. M

This tape had been brought back to WDC by MC CORD when he was on one of his trips to Miami. Miss GLEASON said MC CORD went to Miami on two occasions:

- 1) In approximately mid-May, when he checked out of the Hotel Doral for security arrangements. w
- 2) Sometime during the approximate period of June 5-15, 1972. When MC CORD returned to WDC from this trip, he asked Miss GLEASON, "Penny, how would you like to go to Niami?" MC CORD apparently intended to send Miss GLEASON to Miami for the convention. On this same trip, MC CORD met with a Bell and Howell official in Miami concerning something to do with setting up radio communications for the convention. This trip lasted one or one and a half days. It was from this trip that MC CORD brought back to WDC the aforementioned tape concerning SCOTT CAMILLE and the Cuban refugees. M

When MC CORD returned from the previously mentioned trip number one, Miss GLEASON typed a rough draft memo concerning security arrangements for the convention. CONNIE SANTARELLI typed the final paper and took same over to the White House during the latter part of May. This memo went into the details concerning an "audio counter sweep" since it had been determined that Senator MC GOVERN and the MITCHELLs would be staying in the same hotel. The memo covered other security matters such as identification cards. It also stated that two Committee security officers were supposed to go to the DNC as observers. Miss GLEASON stated that she believed that the above was

significant because all of the above-mentioned security arrangements had been taken care of prior to MC CORD's arrest. Along this same line, she recalled that MC CORD was making special arrangements with WDC Police Chief JERRY WILSON to obtain Special Police Officer (SPO) Commissions for all Committee security officers. These commissions would entitle them to carry firearms. w

Concerning the other items missing from the security office and which were presumably taken by HOUSTON, Kiss GLEASON advised that also missing was a handwritten memo from MC CORD to BILL TIMHONS, Assistant to the President. This memo covered security procedures for the Hiami convention and dealt with such things as security officer contracts, walkie-talkies, and security details in general. A

Riss GLEASON also advised that she does not know what disposition HOUSTON made of any of the items he took out of the security office. She noted that the general assumption is that he burned the files but that she does not believe that this is necessarily so. HOUSTON only said he was taking the items "out of the office" and he allegedly took MC CORD's personal files to the office of Mc Cord Associates on June 18, 1972. W

She recalled that around the first of June, 1972, HOUSTON told her that MC CORD wanted the combination lock changed on one of the file cabinets in the security office. It was assumed, she believes, by MC CORD and HOUSTON that she had no knowledge of the contents of this file cabinet. She stated that this was not the case, that she knew most of the contents of the cabinet in question, and that to her knowledge there was no mention of the DNC in the files.

On June 19, 1972, HOUSTON removed a desweeper kit from the security office and she noticed that a walkietalkie type battery charger was also missing from the security office, presumably removed by HOUSTON.

Also, on June 19, 1972, HOUSTON made the statement, "We'll operate as normally as possible and all the people will be paid by RNC."

On June 21 or 22, 1972, HOUSTON told her that their office telephones had been tapped since June 19, 1972. She asked by whom, and he replied he did not know. w

It was possibly on this same date that ODLE, POWELL MOORE, and HOUSTON came in the security office and asked Miss GLEASON and STEVE ANDERSON to "please leave." The aforementioned three individuals then went into the security office for a closed door conference. w

When HOUSTON was interviewed by SA's DANIEL C. MAHAN and JOHN E. DENTON on approximately June 24, 1972, HOUSTON was "less than complete" with his information concerning tape recorders. She stated MC CORD had two new tape recorders but that an older, broken recorder was in the office but is now gone. The date and time this recorder was removed is unknown but it was there on the weekend of June 10-11, 1972. w

On June 28, 1972, Miss GLEASON learned that GEORGE DUBROSKY, security officer for the RNC, told STEVE ANDERSON that MC CORD telephoned the RNC for JIM CAUDILL, Security Supervisor for the RNC. She has no knowledge of the text of the call and assumes it was made on the same date (June 28, 1972). MC CORD reportedly, through this call, left a message for the security people to "hang loose" and "be cool."

On June 30, 1972, HOUSTON told her that he had talked with MC CORD but that HOUSTON did not divulge what was discussed nor when he actually talked with MC CORD. w

Also, on June 30, 1972, MAURINE DEVLIN, a receptionist for the finance committee on the second floor, told. Miss GLEASON that FBI agents had displayed some photographs to her and that she had recognized the photograph of BERNARD BARKER as being identical with an individual who had previously been in the finance committee. It is unknown to Miss GLEASON whether DEVLIN admitted this fact to the FBI agents. W

Miss GLEASON stated that she believes she observed some green or turquoise surgical gloves in a security office cabinet at one time but she was unable to recall when she observed this or the circumstances surrounding same. W

On June 30, 1972, STEVE ANDERSON told her to advise the interviewing agents that on an unrecalled occasion he observed a small camera, brand name possibly Renault, in GORDON LIDDY's cabinet. At another unrecalled time, ANDERSON observed a handgun in LIDDY's cabinet.

Miss GLEASON recalled that approximately one week prior to the burglary of the DNC, MC CORD had instructed security officers TOMNISE and STEVE ANDERSON in the operation of sweeping devices" in case the need arises and I'm not here." M

Miss GLEASON stated that she has not been able to figure out any connection between HC CORD and the other four individuals who were arrested with him on June 17, 1972, at DNC. She noted that some of the other persons arrested with MC CORD were Cuban, that she has taken many telephone calls from HC CORD, and that she cannot recall ever having heard a caller with a Spanish accent.

On June 30, 1972, JUDY HOBACK, Secretary to MAURICE STANS, told Miss GLEASON that STANS had instructed her not to give any of their records to ROB ODLE because "something might happen to the records" before PEI agents got a chance to examine them. HOBACK is the bookkeeper for the Committee and her superior is HUGH SLOAN.

Hiss GLEASON noted that she keeps a filing system for guest registers for the Committee and that a check of her files on June 30, 1972, disclosed that the registers for the days of June 17, 18, and 19, 1972, are missing. She noted the possibility that these may have been turned over to the FBI. w

In thinking back concerning the weekend of June 17-18, 1972, Miss GLEASON thought it was peculiar that FRED LARUE, BART PORTER, the NITCHELLS, and possibly "JEB" MAGRUDER, all happened to be at a celebrity party in California on that weekend. Also, DEVAN L. SHUMAY, Director of Public Affairs, was fishing on Chesapeake Bay. She noted that some of these people are usually in WDC on any given weekend. W

She noted that if MAGRUDER was in California on the weekend in question, then the above people who were in California on the pertinent weekend knew about the DNC break-in before the Committee people in WDC, because, as previously mentioned herein, NAGRUDER had called the Committee on June 17, 1972, concerning the UPI wire reports relating to the matter. w

Miss GLEASON also stated that MC CORD always went where he wanted when he wanted and if they (security personnel) went to the White House and mentioned MC CORD's name, they could "get anything we wanted."

On June 15, 1972, Kr. MC CORD instructed security officer TOK WISE to go to the Statler Hilton Hotel and buy some tear gas canisters. WISE returned with a box containing approximately thirty "Sheriff" tear gas canisters, black in color, and in plastic boxes. HC CORD pulled \$30 cash from his pocket and gave same to WISE for purchase of the canisters. During the week of June 26, 1972, Miss GLEASON looked in the box containing the aforementioned canisters and discovered that approximately seven or eight were missing. At the time when MC CORD told WISE to purchase the canisters, he (MC CORD) said that he wanted Miss GLEASON to have some of the canisters for her personal use. Miss GLEASON found this strange at that time inasmuch as she already had a "General ME-VII Chemical Baton Tear Gas Cartridge." She noted that the receipt reflecting WISE's purchase of the aforementioned "Sheriff" canisters is still somewhere in the security office and that there is no list of individuals who were issued the canisters. W

On June 17, 1972, while Miss GLEASON was at the Committee, MARTHA DUNCAN told Miss GLEASON, "GORDON LIDDY is going to be the one to fry." Miss GLEASON stated that she did not know what DUNCAN meant by this statement.

On June 19 or 20, 1972, BART PORTER's assistant, ROGER STONE, called the Committee headquarters and asked of PORTER's whereabouts in California, stating that it was a matter of life and death that he, STONE, get a hold of him. Mr. STONE then called again and pleaded with Miss GLEASON for Mr. PORTER's number in California. Miss GLEASON then gave Mr. STONE two numbers where PORTER could be reached in Beverly Hills, California. PORTER then called and asked to be connected to Mr. PRED LARUE who was staying at Mr. NITCHELL's apartment because CLIPF MILLER had some important information that had to be passed on. PORTER did not say what the information was. Mr. STONE then called and asked if Miss GLEASON had been advised by Mr. PORTER of the information. Miss GLEASON replied in the negative and STONE stated "I can't discuss it." w

On approximately Wednesday or Thursday, June 21 or 22, 1972, Mr. LARUE called and asked Miss GLEASON to get HUGH SLOAN. Miss GLEASON attempted to gain the whereabouts of Mr. SLOAN but was unsuccessful in her efforts. W

On June 20, 1972, Miss GLEASON and MARTHA DUNCAN got together at the Roger Smith Hotel and over drinks discussed what had happened at the Committee headquarters. . (At this point, Miss GLEASON stated that she, Miss GLEASON, and Miss DUNCAN do not particularly get along with each other as a matter of fact, are hostile toward each other. Therefore, she was surprised when Miss DUNCAN requested that they have a drink together.) While at the Roger Smith Hotel, Miss DUNCAN stated that the "higher echelon" told Miss DUNCAN to spy on Miss GLEASON. When Miss GLEASON asked why, Miss DUNCAN replied, "To see what you know." Miss DUNCAN then asked Miss GLEASON how well she knew Mr. MC CORD. (Here, Miss GLEASON stated that on the Saturday of the break-in, Mr. ODLE and Miss DUNCAN requested Miss GLEASON to go to Mr. MC CORD's house in order that Krs. MC CORD would have someone with her. Apparently Mr. ODLE and Miss DUNCAN assumed that Miss GLEASON was a close personal friend of the MC CORD family. Miss GLEASON stated that she had no transportation and, therefore, she could not go to the MC CORD house by herself. Upon learning the latter, Er. ODLE dropped the idea. Subsequent to this, Miss GLEASON learned that some close personal friend of Mrs. MC CORD stayed with her the Saturday of the break-in.) While at the Roger Smith Hotel, Miss DUNCAN asked Miss GLEASON, "Everybody has their price. Do you think Mr. MC CORD was paid off?" Miss DUNCAN further stated that "people upstairs" had told her not to talk about the incident and for her (DUNCAN) to spy on the security office. w

On possibly the evening of June 19 or 20, 1972, about 9:00 p.m., Mr. ODLE told Miss GLEASON to keep the switchboard open. Later on, Miss GLEASON went back to the press section of the Committee headquarters to get a Coke and overheard Miss DUNCAN say "Is it in JACK ANDERSON's column?" Miss DUNCAN was talking with Mr. ODLE and with Mr. SCHUMWAY. The following day JACK ANDERSON's column contained an article covering LAWRENCE O'BRIEN's expense voucher. Miss GLEASON state that Mr. ODLE did not say why he wanted the switchboard open. After reading the following day's "Washington Post", ODLE then told everyone to go home. W

On Wednesday, June 21, 1972, the previously mentioned GARY BITTENBENDER called and stated that "Everything's okay and that he's being taken care of."

Miss GLEASON heard noises on the telephone lines and assumed that the Conmittee telephones were being tapped. BITTENBENDER said he would be on vacation and would return on June 26, 1972. w

On Thursday, June 22, 1972, Kr. ODLE's Assistant, ANDY LAWRENCE, called Miss GLEASON and asked her to go to Mr. ODLE's office. (Here, Miss GLEASON stated that while she was having a drink with Miss DUNCAN at the Roger Smith Hotel, Hiss DUNCAN had told Hiss GLEASON that a HOWARD HUNT was very big at the White House and that everyone knew him.) When Miss GLEASON arrived at Mr. ODLE's office, Mr. ODLE asked her whether she knew a Mr. HOWARD HUNT. Miss GLEASON replied in the negative and Mr. ODLE asked her "Are you sure?" and Miss GLEASON said that she was. Mr. ODLE then asked Miss GLEASON if she or anyone else in the security office knew what was going on. (A

Miss GLEASON was the only security officer from the security office of the Committee to be questioned by Mr. ODLE about the incident. Miss GLEASON indicated however that Mr. HOUSTON may have also been questioned but that she was not certain. On June 26, 1972, Miss GLEASON and the staff from the Committee were advised that Committee lawyers would be present at the offices. Sometime during the week of June 26, 1972, someone, identity unrecalled, advised Miss GLEASON, "Don't talk too much because one of the FBI Agents is unfriendly to us." On the date Miss GLEASON was advised of the presence of the attorneys, Mr. HOUSTON told everyone in the security office that no one could talk with anyone from the FBI without a Committee attorney being present. Therefore, Miss GLEASON believed, she could say nothing in front of the attorney when she was contacted on June 30, 1972. M

On June 29, 1972, Miss GLEASON was instructed by Mr. ODLE to remove Mr. MC CORD's I.D. data sheet from the Committee records. The I.D. data sheet was described by Miss GLEASON as an 8 by 11 sheet of paper with Mr. MC CORD's personal data thereon after which Kr. MC CORD's picture was placed on a card issued to him by the Committee. This card identified him as a staff member. W

On June 29, 1972, at approximately 9:00 p.m., Miss GLEASON was at the Committee when a special delivery package arrived for Mr. GORDON LIDDY. The return address bore the name of the Department of the Treasury, the Office of Law Enforcement, New York City, New York. Miss GLEASON signed for the package and was instructed by JUDY HOBACK to place the package in the mail room inasmuch as Mr. LIDDY had been dismissed. A

Wiss GLEASON described JUDY HOBACK as being deeply affected by all of the strange things that have been
going on in the finance department of the Committee where
Mrs. HOBACK is head bookkeeper and with the strange goings
on in the Committee as a whole. Miss GLEASON further
described HOBACK as a fine up-standing, honest woman who
has much integrity and who is ready to burst because of the
strange behavior at the Committee. Miss GLEASON will have
a luncheon date with Mrs. HOBACK on July 3, 1972, which date
was suggested by Mrs. HOBACK and Miss GLEASON is of the
belief that Mrs. HOBACK will advise her of what has been
going on at the Committee subsequent to the Democratic

National Committee Headquarter's burglary. Miss GLEASON is further of the belief that Mrs. HOBACK should be interviewed by the FBI and will suggest to her that she do so without advising Mrs. HOBACK that she has already been interviewed by the FBI. W

Sometime after the burglary, date unrecalled, Miss GLEASON was advised by Mr. SCHUMWAY, "Don't worry about MC CORD, he'll be alright. I know what most of the facts are and I'm not at liberty to discuss them. We should have known (laughter) from the Bay of Pigs invasion."

Immediately following the burglary at the DNC, the attitude at the Committee was that the FBI was going to "whitewash" the entire investigation. According to Miss GLEASON, this line of reasoning was based upon the fact that President NIXON appointed Mr. KLEINDIENST as Attorney General and Mr. GRAY as Acting Director of the FBI. Along this same line, MIKE WILSON, driver for Mr. MITCHELL, once commented, "There wouldn't be any problem if the FBI had gotten there (to the scene of the burglary) before the D.C. police. The FBI would have covered it up." u

Miss GLEASON reiterated her opinion that Committee officials are sending FBI agents on fishing expeditions to keep them from getting to the truth. She also reiterated that ROB ODLE has not been entirely truthful with PBI agents who have interviewed him. She also said that persons associated with the Committee have discussed the fact that Attorney General KLEINDIENST and Mr. MITCHELL or Mr. GRAY (not certain which two) were at the same hotel in California immediately following the DNC burglary. She noted that these circumstances led some people to believe that the FBI would merely go through the formalities of an investigation while actually covering up the truth. W

The attitude presently prevailing at Committee Headquarters is one of serious concern. The feeling now is that the FBI is getting closer. The attitude is now one of panic, especially on the part of Committee officials such as Mr. ODLE. Some people, however, still are not completely convinced that the FBI is not merely covering up the investigation.

On July 2, 1972, Miss GLEASON telephonically advised SA PAUL P. MAGALLANES of the following: u

While being interviewed by SA MAGALLANES and HARVEY on July 1, 1972, she forgot to mention that while she was at the Roger Smith Hotel on June 20, 1972, with MARTHA DUNCAN, DUNCAN had advised Hiss GLEASON that Mrs. MC CORD had told Mr. ODLE, "Well it looks your project has failed." MARTHA DUNCAN then stated to Miss GLEASON, "I wonder why she would say something like that?" DUNCAN described Mrs. MC CORD's tone of voice as being calm and relaxed. DUNCAN did not indicate to Miss GLEASON whether she, DUNCAN, had listened to Mrs. MC CORD on Mr. ODLE's telephone extension, or whether Mr. ODLE related to DUNCAN what Mrs. MC CORD had told him. Miss GLEASON thought that it was strange that DUNCAN described Mrs. MC CORD's tone of voice as being calm and relaxed since Miss GLEASON had talked with Ers. MC CORD on the same date. June 17, 1972, on at least two occasions and Mrs. MC CORD was frantic, excited, frightened and very upset because her husband had been arrested. The above quote attributed to Mrs. MC CORD occurred on June 17, 1972, the same day of the burglary of the Democratic National Committee Headquarters. w

Miss GLEASON was assured by SAs MAGALIANES and HARVEY that the FBI is not covering up the Democratic National Committee burglary investigation and that the FBI thoroughly investigates each and every case which comes to its attention. She was further advised that all Special Agents are thoroughly investigated prior to their appointments as Special Agents of the FBI and that there has not been one incident of the FBI "covering up" an investigation.

(2) Investigation at Maryland National Bank regarding McCord Associates indicates 4/12/72, cash deposit of \$10,000 in \$100 bills made by James Walter McCord, Jr., and on 5/31/72, \$10,000 cash deposit made. On 6/12/72, \$10,000 cash deposit made; bank employee receiving this deposit could not identify McCord. Serial numbers of money not recorded. w

(3) Kathleen Chenow, former secretary to David Young, appeared before Federal Grand Jury, 7/7/72. Her statement was same as given to Bureau Agents;

Recheck of telephone records being made to identify these calls. W

(4) Donald Santarelli, Associate Deputy
Attorney General, interviewed and denied receiving phone call from Robert Odle on 6/17/72;
stated his wife had called the Committee, 6/18/72.
He said he only had one conversation with Odle around this date wherein Odle inquired for recommendation to replace McCord. Santarelli denied knowing anything about case other than what he had read in the newspapers.

(5) Secretary to Maurice Stans advised Stans departed Washington, D.C. (WDC), on extended trip early 7/7/72; does not have itinerary; however, when he contacts his office for messages this weekend, she would have Stans personally contact our Washington Field Office. When this call received, appropriate lead will be set out to interview Stans if located outside WDC.

Attached sets forth signed statement of Kenneth H. Dahlberg who was interviewed in the investigation relating to the burglary of Democratic National Committee Headquarters, 6/17/72. W

Mr. Dahlberg, after being advised of his rights by Agents of our Minneapolis Office, related he is Regional Chairman of the Finance Committee to Re-elect the President and as such he had fund raising responsibility for seven upper midwest states. Dahlberg related in April, 1972, and a considerable time before this date, he was in Boca Raton, Florida, (where he maintains a winter home), and while there engaged in raising funds to re-elect the President accumulating \$25,000 in cash. wanting to carry this amount of money, he obtained cashiers check from First National Bank and Trust Company, Boca Raton, made payable to himself, which check he turned over to Maurice H. Stans, Chairman of the Finance Committee to Re-elect the President. Other individuals were in the room with he and Stans at time he turned it over to him but has no recollection who might have observed the transaction. He did not obtain a receipt for the check and has no knowledge whatsoever what happened to it after its turnover. He stated he did not know how this check got into the possession of Bernard Barker who was unknown to him.

Dahlberg states he has no knowledge concerning the burglary and emphatically stated he had nothing whatsoever to do with it. He stated from national magazines he had seen the names and photographs of men reported to have been involved in the burglary and none of them were

known to him. w

I am also Regional Chairman of the Finance Committee to Re-Elect the President. As Regional Chairman I have the fund-raising responsibilities for seven upper midwest states, including Kinnesota, North Dakota, South Dakota, Iowa, Wisconsin, Kansas and Nebraska. The Finance Committee to Re-Elect the President is a subsidiary to the Committee to Re-Elect the President, which committee is political in nature, whereas the finance committee is fund raising. w

I maintain a residence in Wayzata, Minnesota, and a winter home in Boca Raton, Florida. On April 10, 1972, and for a considerable time before this date I was in Boca Raton,

D-

Florida. While in Boca Raton, Plorida, I was engaged in raising funds to re-elect the President. I had accumulated a large amount of cash as a result of my fund raising activities and not wanting to travel to Eashington, D. C. with such a large amount of cash, I obtained a Cashiers Check in the amount of \$25,000.00. This check was obtained at the Pirst Bank and Trust Company, Boca Eaton, Florida. The check was made payable to myself, and to the best of my recollection it was dated April 10, 1972. I have no account at the First Bank and Trust Company and my only reason for obtaining the Cashiers Check at this bank is that it is close to my residence.

On April 10, 1972, I flew from Boca Raton, Florida, to Washington, D.C. and on the following morning I attended a meeting of the State Chairmen of the Finance Committee to Re-Elect the President which was held in the office of this are the Mashington, Hiller Motel Washington, Hiller Motel Washington, or The Washington, Hiller Motel Worthwest, Washington, D. C. During a recess of this meeting I endorsed the Cashiers Check in the amount of \$25,000.60 and turned it over to REURICE H. STAKS who is chairman of this finance committee. There were other individuals in the room at the time I gave this check to Hr. STAKS, but I have no recollection of who might have observed this transaction. I did not obtain a receipt for this check.

I have no knowledge whatenever what happened to this Cashlers Check after I turned it over to STAHS. I do not know how this check got into the possession of BEENAED PARILER since this man is unknown to me. W

I have no knowledge concerning the burglary of the Depocratic National Ecadquarters in Vashington, D. C., and I wish to emphatically state that I had nothing whatsoever to do with this matter. In national magazines I have seen the names and photographs of the men reported to have been involved in the burglary and none of these men are known to me. w

Mr. ISRAEL J. KAPSTEIN, 63 Dexterdale Road, Providence, Rhode Island, advised that he is a retired Professor of Creative Writing at Brown University, Providence, Rhode Island. \( \infty \)

He advised that EVERETT HOWARD HUNT was one of his students and graduated in the Class of 1941. He knew HUNT as HOWARD HUNT. HUNT was an exceptionally talented student in the Creative Writing class.

Since his graduation from Brown, HUNT has kept in touch with him by letter and they have also taked on the phone many times. Mr. KAPSTEIN stated that he has maintained such a relationship with other students. Mr. KAPSTEIN advised that he understood that HUNT has had a career in the State Department and had recently retired. He believed that in his last letter from HUNT, HUNT had mentioned he was working for the Republican National Committee in Washington. He did not know what his duties were but assumed they were in the writing field - possibly public relations.

Mr. KAPSTEIN advised that he did not know JAMES WALTER MC CORD, also known as Edward Martin; BERMARD L. BARKER, also known as Frank Carter; VIRGILIO R. ### DESCRIPTION

This extends the range to that of the radio receiver. Plugging in the inductor cuts off the normal loudspeaker, making reception in quiet areas both private and inconspicuous.

Either a stock plastic eartip (as supplied) or a custom fitted hearing aid type may be used to conduct sound into the ear canal, and seal against sound leakage to surrounding areas.







R-5 - Eyeglass Model. Receiver is built into either eyeglass temple piece with a clear plastic canal eartip entering the ear.




R-1 - Behind-the-Ear Model. Fits behind either ear with a clear plastic canal eartip entering the ear (similar to a modern hearing aid).



MC CORD indicated a concern to the safety of the President and is seeking information concerning radicals which may attempt disruptive tactics during personal appearances of the president.

WILEY states that he subsequently had contacts with MC CORD in approximately April, 1972, during which time WILEY was attempting to have his name placed on a local ballot as a congressional candidate and he was attempting to determine whether the committee could assist in this effort, and he was advised that the committee would not become involved with candidates on a local level. WILEY states that he was also planning a monthlong trip to Vietnam and he had conversations with MC CORD as recently as late May, 1972, in an effort to determine if the committee would sponsor part of the expenses of this trip and also if WILEY could conduct any research or furnish analysis of his observations to the committee upon his return.

WILEY advised that he does not know the exact responsibilities of MC CORD with the committee and he does not know whether MC CORD's business is being utilized by the committee. For the re-election of the President. Accordingly, WILEY stated that he had no prior information concerning the break-in of the Democratic National Committee Headquarters and he first learned of the arrest of MC CORD through an article in the "STARS AND STRIPES" which WILEY read while in Vietnam. WILEY states that he was quite shocked to learn of MC CORD's arrest and does not know the reason for MC CORD's involvement in the break-in. He further states that he is not familiar with any of the other individuals who were arrested with MC CORD. u
