Frau MATERIAL SUBMITTED TO SENATE SELECT COMMITTEE ON PRESIDENTIAL CAMPAIGN ACTIVITIES BY FORMER ACTING FBI DIRECTOR L. PATRICK GRAY, III In connection with his appearance before the captioned Committee, 8-3-73, former Acting Director Gray furnished the Committee with a packet of notes and memoranda relating to the FBI's investigation of the case entitled James Walter McCord, Jr., et al., Burglary of Democratic Party National Headquarters; Interception of Communications (Watergate). We have determined that the packet of 177 items was furnished to the Committee by Mr. Gray's attorney on 7-30-73. Mr. Gray resigned as Acting Director on 4-27-73. Since most of Mr. Gray's testimony concerned the FBI and his direction of its activities while serving as Acting Director, the notes and memoranda he furnished to the Committee are of official interest to the FBI. Consequently, through liaison established with the Committee staff, the Congressional Services Office arranged to review the material. The packet contained NO originals of any items. The packet had been renumbered by the Committee staff, 1 through 224. Most of the items were Xeroxed copies of official memoranda on the Watergate case or on Mr. Gray's confirmation hearings. Many of the memoranda appeared to have been made from FBI file copies as they contained the file and serial numbers. Most of the note items were handwritten by Mr. Gray, some for his personal use and many for the use of FBI officials. Of the 224 items, 56 were missing, and the Committee staff believes them to be misfiled or misplaced. (This is not surprising in Miew27 1974 of the unprofessional filing system used and the crush of staff members jammed into makeshift office space which formerly was a hearing room in the pasement of the New Senate Office Building.) All items not missing were reviewed. Those that were readily identifiable by file and serial numbers, as being on file in the FBI, are described in the attachment. No copies of these items were obtained. Copies were obtained of all other items as it was not possible to determine if they are on file with the FBI. These copies are attached to the original memorandum. Finally, numbers for the missing items are also listed.

The following observations are made based on the review of the material: (1) Mr. Gray apparently furnished the Committee only copies — not originals. (2) Most of the material he furnished appears to be on record in the FBI. The copies attached and the descriptions listed can be checked against the files in this regard. (3) The Committee staff has had several weeks to locate the missing material; none of the items have been located and probably will not be found. While Congressional Services Office will stay in touch with the Committee, it is not felt that this matter should be pressed.

RECOMMENDATION:

That this memorandum and the attached material be referred to the General Investigative Division for review and any action deemed appropriate.





On December 5, 1972, you raised with Mr. Kinley the question whether, in light of Judge Sirica's liberal attitude towards the scope of admissible evidence in the Vatorgate trial as reported in the newspapers, the TEI has not whatever responsibility it has to investigate charges of political substage which have been widely discussed in conjunction with the Watergate case.

The proposed memorandum from you to Mr. Petersen submitted herewith for your consideration is an outgrowth of meetings hiss Herwig and I had first with hir. Kinley and then with dessers. Cabhardt, Callagner, Bolz and Nurum.

In connection with this proposed inemorandum, the group considered whether to attach to it certain news articles, notably those from the Washington Post, which have discussed these alleged acts of political substates. It was decided that if we did this, we would run the rick of failing to forward to the figurants some article commissing some allegation wairs someone later will say usuald have been included in our prosentation to the Department. We recognize, newsyer, that her. Peterson may come back and act us to specify the news articles to which we are referring and, if this occurs, we will then make available to aim those articles which in our judgment contain all of the allegations of sabutage that have been made.



September 26, 1972, concerning the recovery of an electronic device from the telephone of Spencer Oliver on September 13, 1972.

The report contains virtually no useful information concerning who put that wiretapping device there. As you will see, it is entitled Unknown Subjects and the case is assigned to an agent other than the one assigned to the watergate; the Bureau is thus assuming that the watergate defendants are not involved. Yet the report contains no statements at all by Bureau personnel as to the existence or nature of their sweep of the Democratic headquarters in late June or early July as a basis for establishing that the device had to be installed after the sweep. If such statements have been taken, I would suspect that for self-preservation of their professional carcers, the makers of such statements claim that Oliver's telephone was checked. There is no record of this, i.e., the FBI did not list the telephones examined. Thus, all we will have at the most are statements concluding such an examination was made by virtue of the claim that all telephones were checked.

I believe that the device recovered is the original device on Cliver's telephone which permitted Baldwin to overhear the conversations he did. My reasons are as follows:

(1) The device recovered operated at 120 HHz. Baldwin was receiving at 118.9 MHz, well within the range of the device. The three devices in the possession of those arrested operated two at 110, one at 114 MHz, not at all as clearly within the range of the receiver at 118.9, particularly the two operating at 110.



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



THE JUDITH RODACK AFFIDAVIT

The HOBACK afficavit of March 10, 1973 (released by Senator Dayh on March 12, 1973) is less notable for what it says Than it is for what it does not say. The salient facts are as follows:

one else knew". With respect to the "first" interview at

any rate, the only one properly identified as an FBI interview, Mrs. HOBACK's assertion is simply and flatly a falsehood.

This interview was in fact arranged by an employee of the Committee to Re-Elect the President and was conducted in Mrs. HOBACK's residence with this employee present in a downstairs room. Thus at least one staff member of the Committee to Re-Elect the President knew of Mrs. HOBACK's July 18, 1972 interview with the FBI.

In the course of the interview with two FBI agents,
Mrs. HOBACK described her testimony before the Federal
Grand Jury on July 6, 1972, and a later debriefing at the
Committee offices by PARKINSON, O'BRIEN, and SLOAN.

knew of the July 18, 1972, interview. It is also pertinent to note that Mrs. HOBACK regularly commuted to and from the office with another Committee staff member who might logically have known that Mrs. HOBACK was engaged in some extraordinary activity during the evenings of both July 18 and July 25, 1972. After news of the affidavit of March 10, 1973, was published, the LOS ANGELES TIMES reported that Mrs. HOBACK had told other Committee employees about her confidential FBI contacts. A Committee spokesman, VAN SHUMWAY, asserted this as a fact but refused to name the sources: "We did not get the information that Mrs. HOBACK had gone to the

FBI from the FBI. That information came to us from persons within the Committee whom she had told . . . two persons that I know of.

Who (If Anyone) Compromised Confidentiality?

DEAN as the conduit is out of the question insofar as his access to FBI reports is concerned. He did have access to the July 18, 1972, interview report but not until October 12, 1972. (As noted already, there never was an FBI report of the July 25, 1972, interview by the Assistant U. S. Attorneys — which was, to repeat, initiated by and conducted by them.)



CONFIDENTIAL

As to the FBI itself as the conduit of information to Committee officials, and Mrs. HOBACK's assertion that she felt "kind of shattered", there are very strong indications that this is after-the-fact reasoning. Her behavior at the time indicated the exact opposite:

(1) On August 1, 1972, some four days after the allegedly "shattering" experience of July 27 or 28, Mrs. HOBACK was in contact with the FBI Washington Field Office by telephone to pass along an item of information about another Committee employee.

- (2) Again on August 2, 1972, Mrs. HOBACK telephoned the FBI Washington Field Office with an item of information about still another Committee employee. Mrs. HOBACK volunteered that she would keep the FBI posted on developments at the Committee.
- Office a third time, on August 31, 1972, to pass along the information that she had been contacted at home on the 27th by a reporter for the Long Island, N. Y., paper, NEWSDAY, concerning allegations that another Committee employee had given perjured testimony before the Grand Jury. Mrs. HOBACK reported that she had declined comment. She also reported to the FBI that she had observed a high Committee official lunching on August 30, 1972, with two newspaper columnists.



She stated it as her opinion that this official was the source of information that appeared under the columnists' by-line in the <u>WASHINGTON POST</u> of August 31, 1972 (on LIDDX's White House contacts).

It simply beggars belief that if Mrs. HOBACK had any sense on or after July 27-28, 1972, of heving been compromised by the FBI, she would continue volunteering information to the FBI as she did -- on her own initiative -- on August 1, August 2, and August 31, 1972.

This will not wash. All logic, and the facts of the record, point to the explanation suggested above as to the identity of the person or persons who informed Committee officials of "EBI interviews" and triggered the session of July 27 or 28 when PARKINSON quizzed Mrs. HOBACK as to her "having talked to the FBI".
