

Attached reports that according to the 2/12/73, "Newsweek" magazine, John W. Dean, Counsel to the President, withheld 2 notebooks from items seized in the office of E. Howard Hunt in the Executive Office Building in June, 1972. According to the article this material would have led the FBI to administration top people.

According to the attached teletype, during pretrial interviews, Assistant U. S. Attorney Silbert questioned Dean, Fred Fielding, and Bruce Kehrli (who actually removed Hunt's items from Hunt's office) and all denied having seen the notebooks allegedly withheld

by Dean.

Washington Field Office (WFO) requests authority to contact Dean on this matter. However, since Dean, Fielding and Kehrli, the individuals who presumably would have information about this matter previously denied any knowledge thereof, a reinterview of Dean by WFO at this time would appear to serve no useful purpose. In the event that Howard Hunt's attorney permits an interview by WFO of Hunt in the future and the matter of the allegedly missing notebooks is more specifically brought out, consideration will be given to having WFO reinterview Dean.

C., telephonically contacted the field office at 10:50 p.m., on 2/4/73, stating he had information indicating that John Dean, Counsel to the President, deliberately withheld papers of E. Howard Hunt from the FBI during the Watergate investigation. He requested to be contacted personally by 1:00 a.m., 2/5/73. Mr. Lowther was interviewed in person at 12:45 a.m. He stated he had no information linking Mr. Dean with any tampering with evidence from Hunt's safe and that earlier that evening while at the Marriott Twin Bridges Motel with a female date, he heard a news broadcast which was the first time he had heard that statement about Mr. Dean. He did state that a source of his, whom he would not identify, told him in October, 1972, that the Committee to Reelect the President was hiding funds in a bank located at 1701 Pennsylvania Avenue, N. W., Washington, D. C. (On 7/3/72, former Special Agent Warren L. Love, First National Bank, 1701 Pennsylvania Avenue, N. W., was interviewed concerning McCord but no pertinent information was obtained.) During interview, Mr. Lowther advised he is a former U. S. Attorney, Washington, D. C., and a former Administrative Aide to Chief Judge John J. Sirica, however, our files show only that he was appointed Assistant U. S. Attorney, Washington, D. C., in 1955. S]-111. Inspector RICHARD MARTINSON, United States Postal Service, telephonically furnished the following information:

He was in possession of three unused airline tickets which had been recovered from the crash scene of United Air Lines Flight 553 at Chicago. This was the December 8, 1972 crash in which Mrs. EVERETTE HOWARD HUNT died. The tickets must have been recovered by searchers at the scene and turned over to the Postal Service as undelivered mail. When the "dead letter" section of the Postal Service discovered that these were tickets and not mail, they were turned over to MARTINSON for disposition. When MARTINSON observed the name HUNT on all the tickets he decided to contact the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) because of a possible connection with the "Watergate" investigation.

The first ticket bore number 007 2400926982 6 and indicated passage for Mr. K. HUNT from Washington, D.C. to Miami, Florida on Eastern Air Lines (EAL) Flight number 175 departing December 21, 1972 at 10:50 a.m. There was no return flight information on the ticket.

The second ticket bore number 007 2740091634 0 and indicated passage for a group of three from Washington D.C. to Miami, Florida on EAL Flight number 177 departing December 15, 1972 at 12:55 p.m. The return flight from Miami to Washington National Airport was via EAL Flight 192 on December 29, 1972 departing at 12:05 p.m. The names on the group ticket were Mr. and Mrs. H. HUNT and MASTER D. HUNT.

ARTEAGA ARTILES said he does not know these persons by name or photograph. He was asked if he knew the names E. HOWARD HUNT or G. GORDON LIDDY and he advised he has never heard of these names.

ARTEAGA ARTILES said that since his arrival in the United States he has not participated in any type of political or revolutionary groups, whether pro-CASTRO or anti-CASTRO. He said that in 1970, while in Cuba, he was prosecuted for conspiring against the government in 1963. He said that at that time he was a member of the Movimiento de Liberacion Nacional (Movement of National Liberation), an anti-CASTRO group. He said that a member of that group was arrested in 1970 and must have furnished ARTEAGA ARTILES' name to Cuban authorities.

ARTEAGA ARTILES said that he has no idea how his name could appear in anyone's notebook, and said that he had not even heard of any persons breaking into the Democratic National Headquarters in Washington, D. C.

Tense attorneys in the Water- Lee Bailey, indicated he will gate bugging trial plan to question today a former FBI agent who has sworn one defendant - former security contacted for the job. coordinator for the Nixon reelection campaign -- hired him to eavesdrop on telephone calls at the Democratic National Committee.

One of the lawyers, Gerald Alch, said he intended to challenge most of the testimony from Alfred C. Baldwin 3d, who has been the prosecution's star witness in the political spy trial.

Baldwin testified earlier that he monitored about 200 delephone calls at the Watergate complex to learn what strategy the Democrats intended to use against the Republicans in last year's presidential campaign.

He said James W. McCord Jr., then in charge of security for the Committee to Reelect the President and one of the two remaining Watergate défendants, hired him and furnished him with a supply of sophisticated bugging equipment.

McCord was arrested last June 17 along with four other men inside the Democratic National Committee's beadquarters in the Watergate.

Five of the seven men ndicted in the bugging case have pleaded guilty as charged, leaving only McCord and former White House aide G. Gordon Liddy still on trial.



On January 24, 1973, CHERYL KATHLEEN FITZGERALD was interviewed at the residence of her first husband, Captain PETER LUCARELLI, Los Angeles Fire Department, and advised Bureau Agents of a conversation she had with her husband, ALLEN MICHAEL FITZGERALD on November 24, 1972 while he was in custody at A. I. C., Howard, Rhode Island. Details of the interview are set forth herein. Calif musical

On January 26, 1973, former Special Agent FRANCIS D. COOLEY, also known as "Spade" Cooley, telephonically contacted Supervisor NEAL MC GINNIS and advised MC GINNIS that he would be coming by the FBI office, 11000 Wilshire Boulevard, Los Angeles, California to drop off a tape which contains what COOLEY felt was perjury in the subject matter. COOLEY stated that he did not wish to be interviewed and would like the cassette to be returned to him when our interests have been served.

A review of COOLEY's tape indicated that COOLEY apparently had reviewed all the articles in the local newspapers printed concerning the subject matter. At the conclusion of the tape, he feels that perjury exists between Metropolitan Police Department and the testimony of ALFRED BALDWIN. COOLEY's entire premise for this analysis stems from his reading of the newspaper accounts and observing television broadcasts.

CODLEY is presently employed by Keliher Hardware Company, 1501 East Olympic Boulevard, Los Angeles, California 90021. A copy of COOLEY's tape is included in this report for Washington Field investigative assistance.

On January 26, 1973, Captain PETER LUCARELLI, Los Angeles Fire Department, first husband of CHERYL KATHLEEN FITZGERALD, advised that his wife had received a telephone call from an unknown female and that this female had advised her that her husband had allegedly written a letter to "Playboy Magazine" apprising them of his "inside story" regarding the "Watergate affair". LUCARELLI states that Playboy Magazine supposedly agreed in return for the whole FITZGERALD version of the Watergate affair they would furnish legal assistance in behalf of FITZGERALD.

C., Howard, Rhode Island, on November 27, 1972, he asked her if she recalled him telling her approximately three years ago of his meeting with a Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) Agent, JIM MC CORD, at the Century Plaza Hotel in Los Angeles. In asking her the question, he recalled that he had been introduced to MC CORD that day by Los Angeles Police Detective GENE SCHERRER. She told him that she did recall his having mentioned the meeting. He said that MC CORD was the same individual as the MC CORD who had been indicted in connection with the "Watergate" matter.

She advised that she and her husband had resided in Mexico from September 1970 through December 1971. She recalls that on one occasion when they had gene to eat in a hotel restaurant in Sonora, Mexico, in either October or November 1971, her husband left her at the table and walked to another table where he engaged in a conversation with an individual she now believes to have been FRANK STURGIS, another individual indicted in connection with the "Watergate" matter. She based this belief on having seen a photograph of STURGIS in Time Magazine.

During the time that she and her husband were living in Mexico, he was employed by Corona de Moreno and San Antonio Shores, which were real estate sales companies. She later learned that her husband was working for the San Diego Police Department, Narcotics Squad, for a time while they were in Mexico.

During her visit with her husband while he was in a custody, he told her that he had also been working for the

NIXON Campaign Committee while in Mexico. His job involved transferring funds between Mexico and the United States. He did not go into further detail in this regard and this is as much as she knows about his connection with the Campaign Committee. This was also the first time she had ever heard anything indicating that he had any such connection.

Upon returning to the United States in January 1972, they lived in Baltimore, Maryland and during this time her husband made reveral trips to the Mexican Embassy in Washington, D. C. The purpose of these trips is unknown to her.

She was told by her husband three years ago that he wrote a letter to KENNETH WXCLAWSON, who was a New York Times reporter at that time. She believes the letter contained information regarding narcotics and political affairs and was used by CLAWSON to "gain a position on the White House staff". She never saw the letter.

She advised that she did not write a letter recently to the New York Times but recalls that her husband told her on November 27, 1972, that he had written a letter to the New York Times.

On January 22, 1973, she received a telephone call from (FNU) HIRSCH, who said he was with the New York Times and he requested information regarding her husband's connection with the "Watergate" matter. She advised him that she did not have any knowledge on the subject.

She advised that she is being prosecuted on a charge of Interstate Transportation of Stolen Property in Rhode Island.

Dear Mr. Gray:

I noted Senator Byrd's announced opposition to your confirmation with a certain wry amusement, one of his reasons for opposition being the Bureau's alleged failure fully to investigate the Watergate Case.

From my own experience I am able fully and freely to testify that the Bureau left no grain of sand unturned in its investigation. My late wife and children were interrogated, blackmailed, threatened and har assed by Special Agents of the Bureau, chief among them SA Daniel Mahan who was even then notorious in the courts for his excessive zeal. My relatives, friends and acquaintances, however remote, were interviewed exhaustively and embarrassingly by FBI personnel across the country, their inquiries extending as far back as my primary school days. Threats and intimidation were not the least of the imestigative tools employed by SA's under your direction.

For whatever assistance the above might. be to you in realizing your professed desire of being confirmed in your present post, feel free to utilize it. Should the occasion arise during my projected appearance before the Ervin Sub-Committee I will be eager to make the thoroughness and savagery of the FBI's Watergate investigation a matter of public record.

Present, in addition to Mr. Gray, were Acting Associate Director Felt, Assistant Director Gebhardt, SAC McDermott of WFO, Special Agents N. S. Irwin and C. A. Nuzum and Mr. Kinley of the Acting Director's staff. Among the matters discussed relative to this investigation were the following: 1. Although prosecutive action of the Interception of Communications-Burglary crime has been completed, except for sentencing of the subjects, the case remains in a pending status and will remain pending for the foreseeable future. Contact has been made with Daniel Shultz, attorney for the four Miami defendants, and with William Bittman, Counsel for 190 Hunt, to determine whether these attorneys will permit their clients to be interviewed by FBI Agents. Each of the attorneys, as of 2/5/73, is considering this and close contact is being maintained with the attorneys for their decision. 2. As an outgrowth of the Watergate affair, there are presently pending two Election Laws investigations which we are conducting at the request of the Criminal Division. As is the usual practice in Election Laws cases, investigation is conducted only to the extent requested by the Department. With reference to the \$89,000 in Mexican bank drafts, we have contacted Robert Allen, President, Gulf Resources and Chemical Corporation, Houston, and his attorney Richard Haynes. Mr. Haynes declined to make Mr. Allen available for interview and has not allowed our Agents to review the books and records of Gulf or of Mr. Allen. Allen had made a \$100,000 contribution to the Committee to Reelect the President which he sent through Mexican attorney Manuel Ogarrio. Allen had claimed to have used a Gulf check to send the funds to Mexico but he had reimbursed his company from personal funds. Houston's report of its efforts to conduct this investigation is being forwarded to the Bureau for transmittal to the Criminal Division.

The Criminal Division also requested interview of Mr. Dwight Chapin seeking any knowledge he may have of the alleged publishing by Donald H. Segretti of false information relative to Senator Muskie's primary campaign. In accordance with our usual practice, when results of Mr. Chapin's interview are received from WFO, they will be transmitted to the Criminal Division with advice that no further investigation will be conducted concerning that matter without a written request from the Department.

We are also conducting investigation, at the request of the Criminal Division, relative to an alleged false financial statement of Mr. Walter T. Duncan, a prominent Texas businessman, who made a contribution to the Committee to Reelect the President in the form of a promissory note for \$305,000. The Committee to Reelect the President discounted that note at the First National Bank of Washington and transmitted a copy of Mr. Duncan's financial statement to the bank, which apparently was used by the bank in its decision to discount the note. It has been alleged that Mr. Duncan's financial statement was incomplete and false in certain aspects and we are running this out.

3. Mr. Gray expressed a desire to have Bureau files reviewed to determine if there is a precedent from prior investigations dealing with White House employees for interviews of White House personnel being conducted in the presence of the Legal Counsel to the President. It was recalled that prior FBI investigations which may shed some light on this were those involving General Harry Vaughn, Military Aide to President Truman; former Governor Sherman Adams, Assistant to President Eisenhower; Robert G. Baker, Assistant to President Johnson; and Walter Jenkins, also an Assistant to President Johnson.

The article in the current issue of Newsweek Magazine alleging that John W. Dean, Counsel to the President, withheld certain material from the FBI which had been contained in the effects of Howard Hunt in Hunt's office in the Executive Office Building when the burglary occurred, was discussed. NEW INQUIRY DUE FOR WATERGATE 7

U.S. Prosecutor Says Grand Jury Will Study Possible High-Level Involvement

> By SEYMOUR MAHERSH Special to The New York Times

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8—The Federal prosecutor in the Watergate case said today that all seven defendants would be ordered to appear before a grand jury in an attempt to "explore every conceivable avenue" of possible high-level producement.

Thus far, however, he added, the Government has been unable to develop any "hard evidence" implicating any other bublic official in the case.

In an interview, Earl J. Silbert, the principal assistant inited States attorney who prosecuted the case, said that becial attention would be paid in G. Gordon Liddy, described in the Government as the leader of the political intellicence operation that led to the bugging attempt on the Democratic national headquarters last year.

Liddy will be asked every question that we can think of that will relate directly or indirectly to his involvement in the Watergate case. Mr. Silbert said.

He said that the grand jury would be reconvened immediately after the sentencing of the seven defendants. Other sources at that the sentencing was not expected until early March. Mr. Silbert added that he planned to call only the defendants before the grand jury but would broaden the investigation if their testimony proved fruitful.

The interview, his first since the trial ended 10 days ago, hame amid criticism over what some have called the prosecution's failure to investigate ully whether higher-ups in the vixon Administration were involved in the affair.

Judge Not Satisfied

During the trial, which ended with the conviction of two delendants 'after five others bleaded guilty, Judge John J. Sirica repeatedly expressed dissatisfaction with the prosecution's limited questioning of some witnesses who were Mr. Liddy's colleagues at the committee for the re-election of the President.

Mr. Sirica, chief judge of the United States District Court gere, charged after the verdict that the trial had failed to get to the bottom of the case.

"I have not been satisfied, and I am still not satisfied, hat all of the pertinent facts that might be available have been produced before an American jury;" he said.

Meanwhile, Republican members of the Senate today named Senators Howard H. Baker Jr. of Tennessee, Edward J. Gurhey of Florida and Lowell P. Weicker Jr. of Connecticut to the Senate's special committee to investigate the Watergate bugging case and the separate colitical espionage and sarolage allegedly conducted by Donald H. Segretti on behalf of White House officials.

The Senate voted 77 to by yesterday to set up a sevenman Watergate inquiry panel led by four Demorats. The Republians have at least as much to gain in this investigation as the Democrats do," Mr. Baker told a reporter after his election was announced.

In the interview, Mr. Silbert, 36 years old, a 1960 graduate of Harvard Law School, said that the prosecution's reasoning in the Watergate case had been based, in part, on an old cliche: "A bird in the hand as worth two in the bush."

F.B.L. Inquiry Cited

He explained that he and his colleagues had decided to press the case against the seven men — five of whom were caught inside the Democratic headquarters — after concluding that the Federal Bureau of investigation had found "no hard evidence to indicate the involvement of others."

Neither Liddy nor E. Howard Hunt Jr., the other defendant who was said to have played a key role n teh intelligence operation, would cooperate with th prosecuton, Mr. Silbert said. Some critics have charged that the two men should have been granted immunity to facilitate their testimony before the Federal grand jury. But Mr. Silbert said that that had been ruled out because of recent Supreme Court decisions stating that any evidence against a possible defendant cannot come from or appear to be developed from leads given to a grand jury after such brants of immunity to a po-Hential defendant.

"We made the judgment to prosecute and convict them first," Mr. Silbert said "Then it's a matter of record."

He explained that explain trial were ordered by a higher court in the Watergate ase, the Government could still use all of the testimony diven against Liddy and Hunt But If the men had been allowed to appear first before the grand jury and granted immurity Mr. Silbert said, "There would have been long series of hearings to satisfy the court fin their trial that what we wanted to use against them did not come from what they said in the grand jury."

"We might have been ready to take this risk," the prosecutor added, "if we had had very strong evidence to indicate that there were other people involved. Our feeling was that if we lost Liddy and Hunt, we would come out with egg on

our faces."

Another concern, he said, was the possibility that the defendants, even if granted immunity, would refuse to testify before the grand jury and thus risk contempt proceedings. The defendants thus far have refused to discuss their activities with Federal investigators.

Other Government sources said that the defendants may decide to cooperate after sentencing, in the belief that their cooperation would help result a reduced prison terms.

Mr. Silbert noted that pending any further information— the reconvened grand jury would not consider any aspects of the alleged spying and saboage operations since the Justice Department has determined, based on available evidence, that Mr. Segretti's reported activities violated no laws. Dear Mr. Chairman:

Reference is made to your correspondence dated December 15, 1972, enclosing copies of two reports prepared by the staff of the house Committee on Banking and Currency dealing with the "Watergate Incident" and related matters, and requesting to be advised as to the status of several matters referred to in those reports which might involve violations of Federal law. In our view, the following matters were touched upon in the Committee's reports:

THE MEXICAN CHECKS: The Committee's staff suggests that the involvement of a Mexican national, Manuel Ogarrio, in making a sizable contribution to the reelection could involve violations of 18 U.S.C. 613. We have discussed this matter with the Internal Security Division, which has primary enforcement jurisdiction over Section 613, and they have advised that violations of that Section are unlikely here. In their view Section 613 does not prohibit all contributions involving foreign nationals, but only those in which the actual contributor falls within the narrow and technical definition of "foreign principal" or "agent of a foreign principal" contained in the Foreign Agents Registration From the facts presented in the Committee's reports and those developed through investigation conducted by this Department, it does not appear that Manuel Ogarrio fits within either of these definitions. Moreover, as indicated in the Committee's October 31 report, there is evidence that American national(s), and not Ogarrio, were responsible for the subject contribution. We are, however, presently conducting criminal investigations into several other aspects of this contribution, and its movement to Washington.

- TEXAS FUND RAISING ACTIVITIES: The Committee's report of September 12, reported that an aircraft owned by the Pennzoil Corporation had been used to convey political contributions raised in Texas from Houston to Washington. We have conducted appropriate investigation to determine whether the use of this plane involved a violation of 18 U.S.C. 610, which, as you know, prohibits corporations from contributing their assets to candidates for Federal office. This investigation determined that, although a Pennzoil plane was used to bring political contributions to Washington on April 5, 1972 each of the Pennzoil officials who transported the money, had company business in Washington on April 6. In our view, the presence of legitimate business purposes for the trip makes the fact that political contributions were also carried to Washington at the same time an insufficient basis to support a criminal charge.
- 3. THE \$25,000 ANDREAS CONTRIBUTION: An extensive investigation was conducted last fall to determine whether the failure of the Finance Committee to Re-Elect the President to report the \$25,000 cash contribution which was delivered to Kenneth Dahlberg in Miami could involve violations of the reporting and disclosure provisions of the 1971 Federal Election Campaign Act. The issue to be resolved was when the gift became effective as a matter of law. From the evidence developed, we were forced to conclude that, for criminal purposes at least, we could not prove that this contribution had been made after the April 7 effective date of the Act, and accordingly we have closed this matter.
- 4. THE \$114,000 DEPOSIT TO BERNARD BARKER'S ACCOUNT: This matter, too, was extensively investigated to determine whether the deposit of five checks to the checking account of Bernard Barker Associates at the Republic National Bank of Miami on or about April 19, 1972, constituted an "expenditure" that should have been reported pursuant to the Federal Election Campaign Act. The investigation disclosed that the deposit of these checks was insisted upon by the bank as a necessary prerequisite to their conversion into cash, and that the cash proceeds were subsequently returned to the Committee to Re-Elect in Washington. In view of these circumstances, we have concluded that their deposit did not constitute an "expenditure" reportable under the Act.

- 5. THE RIDGEDALE NATIONAL BANK CHARTER: After an examination of the reports submitted by your Committee and by the General Accounting Office concerning the award of a national bank charter to a group of businessmen headed by Dwayne Andreas and Kenneth Dahlberg, we have concluded that there is insufficient evidence of a connection between the award of this charter and the aforementioned political contribution made by Andreas to warrant the initiation of a criminal investigation by this Department either under the bribery statutes or under 18 U.S.C. 600 (promise of benefit for political activity).
- INNACCURATE REPORTS: Several instances where transactions reported by the Finance Committee to Re-Elect the President on reports filed with the Office of Federal Elections. General Accounting Office, did not conform to bank records are indicated in your Committee's report of October 31. While such errors could constitute technical violations of the reporting provisions of the Federal Election Campaign Act, the Office of Federal Elections has taken the position that such errors should not be referred to this Department as "apparent violations" of the Act until the offending committee has been advised of them and given an opportunity to rectify them. None of the matters referred to in your report have been referred for criminal action at this time. Should such a referral be made, we would, of course, make an appropriate review thereof.
- 7. BANK ACCOUNT MONITORING: The October 31 report alleges that agents of the Committee for the Re-Election of the President monitored the personal bank accounts of prominent Democrats, including some members of Congress, to insure that those accounts were not being used to conduct illegal campaign financing. However, these allegations do not indicate the violation of any Federal law.
- 8. PRE-APRIL 7 CONTRIBUTIONS: The Committee's report of October 31 speculated that \$1 million in contributions made prior to April 7 may have been funneled into the cash fund that was alleged to have been kept in a safe at the offices of the Finance Committee to Re-Elect the President in Washington. We are presently conducting appropriate inquiry to determine whether there have been any disbursements from this fund after April 7, 1972, that were not reported by the Finance Committee on reports filed with the Office of Federal Elections.

- 9. POSSIBLE GIFT TAX EVASION BY WALTER T. DUNCAN: In its report of October 31, the Committee's staff suggests that Texas businessman Walter T. Duncan may have violated Federal gift tax laws by failing to expressly direct that a \$305,000 contribution to the Nixon campaign, which he and his wife made in the fall of 1972, be broken up and treated as several \$6,000 contributions to various separate political committees. The report also reflects that at the time Duncan surrendered the personal note which represented the subject contribution to an agent of the Nixon campaign, that campaign agent furnished him with a list of several Republican committees to which the contribution was to be treated as have been made. Whatever merit there may be to the position of the Committee's staff in this regard is for the Internal Revenue Service to determine.
- 10. POSSIBLE VIOLATIONS OF 18 U.S.C. 1014: Finally, the report of October 31 sets forth facts indicating possible violations of 18 U.S.C. 1014 in connection with the alleged presentation of fraudulent financial statements to several banking institutions. Appropriate investigation is presently being conducted into these matters by this Department.

In conclusion, I would like to assure you and your Committee that this Department has, and will continue to vigorously pursue all evidentiary leads reflecting possible violations of Federal law. Should you receive any additional information on the matters we have closed which you feel should be considered by us, I would appreciate your bringing it to my attention.

I hope that the information provided herein will be helpful to you, and I will be glad to discuss these matters further with you at your convenience.

Watergate Testimony

To the Editor.
Your Feb. 1 editorial "Watergate Conviction" contains a complete distortion of the testimony of Hugh W. Sloan, Jr., as if relates to John N. Mitchell and Maurice H. Stans. It is obvious you had not read the testimony but apparently relied on earlier reports in the news columns of The Times, which were also wrong and distorted.

The transcript further shows that Mr. Sloan was told by Mr. Stans, after consultation with Mr. Mitchell, that Mr. Magruder had continuing and general authority with regard to campaign expenditures. Specific amounts were not discussed. Mr. Magruder had earlier testified that the money he authorized for Mr. Liddy was to be used for legitimate campaign purposes.

To say, as The Times did editorially, that Mr. Mitchell and Mr. Stans "personally approved" the disbursement of \$199,000 to carry out "political espionage" is an absolute perversion of Mr. Sloan's testimony and of the facts in this matter.

In a letter printed on this page today, an official of the Committee for the Re-election of the President makes the valid point that testimony in the Watergate trial did not establish that former Attorney General John N. Mitchell, campaign chairman, and former Secretary of of Commerce Maurice H. Stans, finance chairman, "personally approved" any specific espionage activity against the Democratic party. A reading of the actual transcript of the trial shows that the testimony of Hugh W. Sloan Jr., former treasurer of the committee, was less conclusive than had first appeared to us on the basis of news accounts. The Times regrets the erroneous statement in our editorial of Feb. 1.

During the trial, Jeb Stuart Magruder, who as deputy director of the committee was Mr. Mitchell's top assistant, testified that he had approved cash payments totaling \$199,000 to G. Gordon Liddy, who used part of the money to finance the illegal espionage at the Watergate. Mr. Liddy has now been convicted for his part in the affair.

Mr. Sloan stated that as treasurer he had no idea for what purpose he had been authorized by Mr. Magrader, to hand over the \$199,000 to Mr. Liddy. And he added, under the judge's questioning, that he had verified with Mr. Stans, and through him, with Mr. Mitchell, that Mr. Magrader was indeed authorized to approve the payments to Mr. Liddy.

Chief Judge John J. Sirica of the United States District Court, who presided at the trial, has expressed "great doubts" that Mr. Sloan "told us the entire truth," as be relterated yesterday. We also share the Judge's hope that the Senate will bring out the facts the trial never produced—thus revealing how high Inside the Administration the chain of responsibility for this sordid chapter in American political history really stretched.

Reference is made to my memorandum dated 2/6/73, and the Acting Director's routing slip attached thereto, relative to Mr. Gray's request to be advised (1) from review of previous FBI cases involving White House employees, is there a precedent for interviews of White House personnel being conducted in the presence of the Legal Counsel; (2) what investigative reports, if any, were furnished to the White House Legal Counsel, or anyone at the White House in those cases; and (3) what was done in the first week of the McCord investigation to seek access to Hunt's office and to obtain possession of the material which was contained therein. Results of research by the Accounting and Fraud Section concerning these items are set forth below.

PREVIOUS CASES INVOLVING WHITE HOUSE EMPLOYEES

Review was conducted of the following files relative to items 1 and 2 above:

REC-103 The Vaughan and Goldfine cases required only a limited number of interviews of White House people, the Baker case none, but the Jenkins case involved numerous interviews of White House personnel. Review of these investigative files did not reveal that any interviews were conducted in the presence of Legal Counsel to the White House or any other The review showed that in none of these were !! FBI investigative reports furnished to the Legal Counsel the White House or to anyone else at the White House.

In the Vaughan case, at the instructions of the Director, memoranda summarizing investigative findings deemed pertinent at the time were furnished to the Attorney General. Neither reports nor memoranda were furnished to the White House.

In the Goldfine case, which involved, in part, former Governor Sherman Adams, Assistant to President Eisenhower, the files show oral briefings were given by the Director to the Attorney General; written memoranda summarizing certain investigative findings were furnished to the Attorney General; and investigative reports were furnished to the Department, usually one copy each to the Attorney General, the Deputy Attorney General and the Assistant Attorney General, Criminal Division. Neither reports nor memoranda were furnished to the White House.

In the Baker case, the file shows on a number of occasions, the Director instructed that memoranda summarizing particular investigative findings be directed to the Assistant to the President. At various times these memoranda were directed to Bill D. Moyers, Walter W. Jenkins, Marvin Watson and Mrs. Mildred Stegall. Investigative reports were not furnished to the White House. The file further shows memoranda summarizing various investigative findings were directed to the Attorney General and later to the Acting Attorney General, and investigative reports were disseminated to the Assistant Attorney General, Criminal Division.

In the Walter Jenkins Special Inquiry case, at the conclusion of the investigation, a carefully prepared summary setting forth important material developed during our extensive investigation of Jenkins was furnished to the President and the Attorney General by the Director. Investigative reports were not furnished to the White House.

EFFORTS TO GAIN ACCESS TO HUNT'S OFFICE AND EFFECTS

On the afternoon of 6/17/72, search warrants were executed at the Watergate Hotel which allowed search of two rooms which were rented by the arrested subjects. As a result of that search, an envelope containing a personal check of Howard Hunt was located and two address books were found. One of these address books belonged to Bernard Barker and contained the letters HH, W. House, beside which letters was telephone number 202-456-2282. The prefix 456 was known to WFO as that of the White House. Review of WFO indices revealed a Special Inquiry investigation of Hunt in 1971 at which time he was being considered for a job as consultant at the White House.

In the late afternoon of 6/17/72, Mr. Alex P. Butterfield, Deputy Assistant to the President, was telephonically contacted by WFO and Mr. Butterfield advised that Hunt was known to him as having been a consultant on the White House staff, but he could not confirm whether Hunt was actively employed as he did not have access to personnel records. On the evening of 6/17/72, Hunt was contacted by Agents, admitted he was a consultant to the White House and declined to say anything further without advice of counsel. On Sunday, 6/18/72, Mr. Butterfield recontacted WFO and advised that Hunt had worked for Charles Colson, Special Counsel to the President.

On 6/19/72, WFO called the White House number 456-2282, asked to speak to Mr. Hunt and was informed by the answering female that Mr. Hunt had not come to his office that day. By teletype dated 6/19/72, WFO requested that through Bureau liaison, an interview of Mr. Colson be arranged concerning Hunt's employment.

On 6/22/72, then Assistant Director Bates and then SAC Kunkel met with Mr. Gray concerning the case to bring him up to date on the latest developments. At 10:25 am, that date, Mr. Gray advised Assistant Director Bates that contact was authorized with Mr. John Dean of the White House to discuss with him an interview of Colson and to discuss the obtaining of telephone toll call records involving Hunt from the White House. These instructions were telephonically relayed by Mr. Bates to SAC Kunkel. SA Angelo Lano, WFO case Agent, recalled on 2/8/73, that SAC Kunkel informed him that telephonic Bureau authority had been granted to interview Mr. Colson, the interview would take place in the office of John Dean and Mr. Dean would be present during interview.

On the afternoon of 6/22/72, Mr. Colson was interviewed in Mr. Dean's presence and he advised that Hunt was terminated as of 3/29/72, was not employed by Colson at any time thereafter but possibly David R. Young, Domestic Counsel staff member, might have "picked Hunt up." Mr. Colson was asked if Hunt had an office in the Executive Office-Building where telephone extension 2282 was located and Mr. Colson replied that he thought Hunt worked on the third floor at the building. They were placed in two cardboard boxes and on 6/20/72, Hunt's effects were transported from Mr. Kehrli's office to Mr. Dean's office.)

On the late afternoon of 6/26/72, Mr. Dean telephonically contacted SA Lano and advised him he had something to turn over to the FBI. On the morning of 6/27/72, SAs Daniel C. Mahan and Michael J. King were sent to meet with Mr. Dean and they received one box of Hunt's effects from Mr. Fielding and a second box from Mr. Dean.

The desirability of contacting Bittman was fully discussed by Frankenfield with Mr. Gebhardt, it being noted that Bittman is a good friend of the Bureau and has been known by Frankenfield since early 1964. Previously, on 1/16/73, Frankenfield talked with Assistant Attorney General Petersen concerning the same matter at which time Petersen voiced no objection to the Bureau's attempting an interview This was cleared with Assistant U. S. Attorney Silbert (Government prosecutor in the Watergate case) and our contact with Petersen was confirmed to him by letter 1/17/73.

Under the circumstances and in view of Frankenfield's long acquaintance with Bittman, it was believed to be a proper and logical step to attempt to interview Hunt for full details of his involvement in the Watergate and related incidents.

In accordance with instructions in Mr. Felt's memorandum to Mr. Gebhardt dated 2/21/73, there follows an analysis of the 2/21/73 "Washington Post" article written by Bob Woodward and Carl Bernstein captioned "Hunt Linked to Dita Beard Challenge." Mr. Gray desired to know those portions in the article which could have come from FBI sources and the identities of persons having access to that particular information. Items set forth below are numbered to correspond with points in Mr. Felt's memorandum.

(1) "'Sources close to the Watergate investigation said that Colson's testimony was given in a secret deposition to Federal investigators during the Watergate probe last year.' This testimony allegedly relates to his instruction to E. Howard Hunt, Jr., to proceed to Denver, Colorado, to interview ITT lobbyist Dita Beard."

 \mathcal{F} On 8/28/72, Mr. Colson furnished a deposition, lieu of grand jury appearance, to Assistant U. S. Attorneys (AUSAs) EarlySilbert and Donald Campbell. We do not have copies of that deposition and it is maintained in the U.S. Attorney's (USA) office. It was not introduced in court since Hunt pled guilty. On 8/29/72, Mr. Colson was interviewed by SAs Angelo Lano and Edward Leary, WFO, concerning Hunt's expense vouchers submitted while he was employed as a consultant to the White House, copies of which had been furnished to WFO on 8/7/72 by James Rodgers of the White House Personnel Office. Mr. Colson advised he did not personally review Hunt's expense vouchers and on only two occasions did he personally authorize Hunt to travel at the Government's expense. One of these occasions was in July, 1971, when Hunt traveled to Massachusetts to seek information concerning the Chappaquiddick Island incident involving Senator Edward Kennedy and the other was in March, 1972, when Hunt was sent to Denver, Colorado. in connection with the "ITT" case. Mr. Colson said he received reports of the work accomplished by Hunt regarding these two

trips. Since there was no indication that the ITT case or the Chappaquiddick Island incident had any relation to the Watergate matter, Mr. Colson was not questioned in detail concerning these two trips by Hunt.

It is not known whether information relative to this item is contained in the deposition which Colson gave in the civil damage suit instituted by the Democratic Party. WFO expects this week to gain access to and review the depositions in that suit, which have been filed with the Clerk of the Court, U. S. District Court, Washington, D. C., and are a matter of public record.

(2) "'The Federal investigators did not ask Colson the purpose of the interview.' Allegedly, according to Republican sources, the purpose of the interview was to discredit the controversial memorandum attributed to Mrs. Beard."

As set forth in Item 1 above, since there was no indication of any relationship to the Watergate case of the ITT matter and the Chappaquiddick Island incident, Mr. Colson was not questioned in detail concerning Hunt's activities in connection with these two trips.

(3) "'Republican sources said that Hunt wore an inexpensive wig during the interview with Mrs. Beard early in the week of March 19th.' The article goes on to point out that a similar wig was found in one of the rooms rented by the Watergate conspirators."

We do not have any information concerning the Hunt-Beard interview. We do know that among the materials seized pursuant to search warrant issued for the rooms at the Watergate Hotel rented by the arrested subjects, the Metropolitan Police Department report lists "item #96. I hair wig, Jerome Alexander label". During the Watergate trial, Metropolitan Police Officer Cherry testified concerning the search and the police report setting forth the items seized is a matter of public record. The police report is set out verbatim in SA Lano's report of 6/28/72.

(4) "On page A-21, column 1, the article goes on to describe events in the ITT controversy as obtained 'from

Federal and Republican sources.'" Mr. Gray wanted a check made to determine what information is available in the files to determine what portions of this story, if any, were known to the Bureau.

The article mentioned that the Washington office of ITT hired Intertel, a private investigative firm, to check into Mrs. Beard's background and the authenticity of the controversial memorandum. Our files show that on 3/10/72, Dr. Fred M. Miller, a retired SA document examiner, advised that he had been requested by ITT to conduct document examinations relative to Mrs. Beard's memorandum and he stated that he understood that Intertel had been retained by ITT to conduct investigation of the controversy on behalf of ITT. The files also show that on 3/27/72, former SA Fred Robinette, a vice-president of Intertel, said his organization had done work for ITT in connection with this case. The extent and purpose of investigation by that organization were not furnished to us and we do not know what the results of that investigation are.

(5) "The article goes on to point out that Robert F. Bennett, present President of the firm where Hunt was employed, told Hunt that the results of the INTERTEL findings should be passed on to Colson."

We have no information concerning this.

(6) "The article concludes with a quotation from a sworn deposition taken from Colson in the civil suit filed by the Democratic Party in connection with the Watergate breakin."

This relates to the deposition furnished by Mr. Colson in connection with the Democratic Party's damage suit against the Committee to Reelect the President, which deposition is a matter of public record having been filed with the Clerk of the Court, U. S. District Court, Washington, D. C. The quotation in the article attributed to Mr. Colson to the effect that Hunt reported to Colson for only a short time and thereafter while at the White House worked under someone else's supervision, is in accord with information Mr. Colson furnished us when he was initially interviewed on 6/22/72, by SAs Lano and Daniel C. Marchan, reported in SA Lano's report dated 6/28/72.

The information relating to interviews conducted by WFO is set forth in investigative reports, copies of which are maintained both in the WFO and at FBIHQ. In addition, because of the massive investigation conducted by the Miami office, copies of the reports were also designated for that office. Dissemination has been made of each report to the USA, Washington, D. C., and to Assistant Attorney General Petersen, Criminal Division.

As a matter of interest concerning the possible source of this article, the following information was received by SA Lano 2/21/73, from AUSA Campbell. Nr. Campbell advised that late yeaterday, 2/20/73, reporter Woodward contacted Mr. Campbell, said he had a source of information at the White House and "ran" the essence of the article past Mr. Campbell. Mr. Campbell told SA Lano he made no comment concerning Woodward's story.

4. Date of Grand Jury; Date of Indictment; Date of Trial

The Federal Grand Jury inquiry began on 6/23/72; the indictment was returned 9/15/72; and the trial began on 1/8/73.

5. Bank Records

Where the bank is cooperative, we will take a look at the records first. We do this because many times the bank records are of no value as far as the investigation is concerned and we are saved the time and the expense of going through the subpoena process.

Where there is an indication of positive information and the information is to be used, we will then proceed through the subpocha process.

For your information, the Department of Justice has not prohibited us from using this approach. In the last session of Congress, legislation was introduced making a subpoena mandatory before any information was furnished from bank records. The Department of Justice testified against this legislation and the legislation was not enacted. There is a movement among bankers to require a subpoena. This is not aimed at the FBI or investigators in general for that matter, but rather a fear on the part of some bankers that they will face a civil suit.

A two-week investigation by The Washington Post shows that Hunt's trip was part of an effort by Colson to discredit the Dita Beard memo. The work by Hunt and Colson led at least in part to Mrs. Beard's statement issued March 17, charging that the memo was a "forgery" and "a hoax."

That statement, issued simultaneously by David W. Fleming, Mrs. Beard's lawyer, and Senate Republican Leader Hugh Scott of Pennsylvania, came as a total surprise since it was the first time in a three-week-old controversy that Mrs. Beard's authorship of the memo had been directly denied.

The alleged memo was reported by syndicated columnist Jack Anderson more than two weeks before the denial. It linked the antitrust settlement to ITT's offer of a \$400,000 "guarantee" to help support last year's Republican National Convention.

From federal and Republican sources, the following sequence of events has been pieced together:

As the ITT controversy blossomed in March, 1972, the Washington office of ITT hired Intertel, a private investigations firm, to check into Mrs. Beard's background and the authenticity of the controversial memo.

Intertel, working with only a copy of the memo, was able to establish that it was probably prepared on a typewriter in Mrs. Beard's office, but that it would be difficult, if not impossible, to conclusively establish whether it was genuine or a forgery.

Bernard Goodrich, a spokesman for the ITT office, acknowledged last week that the Intertel investigation was inconclusive. "At no time did they give us a report to show it was forgery," Goodrich said.,

Intertel, regarded one of the best private investigative firms, also does work for billionaire Howard Hughes and corporations in his financial empire.

The Hughes interests are represented in Washington by Robert R. Mullen & Co., a public relations firm where Hunt was employed as a writer. Robert F. Bennett, president of the Mullen firm, to

learned from his contacts in the Hughes empire that Intertel was probing the Dita Beard memo.

According to one account, Bennett was told that Intertel had determined the memo was a forgery and that somehow word should be passed to the White House.

By another account, Bennett was told that Intertel's findings were inconclusive, meaning that the way was clear for someone to come forward and label the memo a forgery.

In any case, Bennett then told Hunt that the nature of the Intertel findings, whatever they were, should be passed to Colson.

During this period, the White House was growing increasingly concerned about the impact of the ITT allegations, and had launched a major effort to discredit columnist Jack Anderson and the memo.

At this point, Colson ordered Hunt to Denver to interview Mrs. Beard. "Colson didn't want anything to backfire, one Republican source said.

Meanwhile, Bennett was acting as a go-between between Colson and Fleming, Dita Beard's attorney, to arrange for the release of Mrs. Beard's March 17 statement calling the memo a "forgery."

Colson wanted to avoid any direct contact between the White House and Mrs. Beard or her representative as the controversy became more politically sensitive. One Republican source said that it was Colson who got Sen. Scott to read Mrs. Beard's statement on the Senate flooor.

Fleming said in several recent telephone interviews that Colson and Hunt were not involved in issuing the statement. He did, however, acknowledge that he talked with Bennett about the matter. Bennett said last week that he would have no commen on the subject.

Mrs. Beard's March 17 statement said: "I did not prepare it (the memo) and could not have." Without giving a reason for her assertion, Mrs. Beard continued: "I have done nothing to be ashamed of and my family and I— and in a greater sense the whole American government—are the victims of a cruel fraud."

Columnist Anderson testified before the Senate Judiciary Committee that Mrs. Beard confirmed the authenticity of the memo line-by-line with his associate, Britt Hume, during a Feb. 24 interview at her home.

In another sworn deposition taken in a civil sult filed by the Democratic Party in connection with the Watergate case, Colson said under oath that Hunt worked for him only for a few weeks in the

summer of 1971.

"Well, initially when he came to the White House staff he was reporting to me. That lasted only for a few weeks," Colson said. Following those few weeks, Colson said in that deposition, Hunt was "at that point not under my supervision" and worked elsewhere in the White House.

SA ROBERTS, Senior Resident Agent of the Lakeland RA, effectively conducted numerous detailed and penetrating_interviews with witness JACK BAUMAN of Winter Haven, Fla.

BAUMAN has been in poor health due to a heart condition and SA ROBERTS maintained contact with him during the course of pretrial activities in connection with this case. Various documents were turned over to SA ROBERTS by BAUMAN which included letters written to BAUMAN from former Whitehouse Consultant E. HOWARD HUNT, JR., and other important documentary evidence. During the course of the interviews, it was brought out that BAUMAN had made visits to Washington, D. C., which information led the investigation to an early attempt of conspiring to wiretap in the Miami, Florida area prior to and apparently during the Democratic Convention. As a result of information solicited from BAUMAN by SA ROBERTS, BAUMAN made a key identification of G. GORDON LIDDY, a former aide of President NIXON, as the person who was at the meeting at the Plaza Hotel which identification was the first identification of LIDDY as being GEORGE LEONARD. Further, the wealth of pertinent information obtained from BAUMAN by SA ROBERTS was testimony by BAUMAN which was thereafter stipulated during the course of trial on the part of the Defense.

investigation and contributed materially to the excellent results achieved by the Miami Office until 6/30/72, when he was hospitalized due to critical illness. SA Guilfoile thereupon assumed the task of being Case Agent in Miami, and according to SAC, Miami, skillfully directed the thrust of the investigation so that the direction of the inquiry always looked toward logical resolution of the case. The SAC points out that SA Guilfoile's investigative efforts were complicated by the activities of a publicity seeking State's Attorney who was endeavoring to conduct his own investigation, operating under a little known state law. Supervisor Wilson coordinated the overall investigative efforts of as many as 40 Agents at one time and maintained a constant flow of important information to Washington Field Office and to the Bureau, which materially contributed to the successful investigative results achieved.

SAC, Los Angeles, advises that Special Agents John M. O'Neill, Jr. and Richard H. As a result they successfully identified Hunt and Liddy, even though they normally traveled under aliases. SAC, Los Angeles, points out these Agents worked long hours on weekends to complete their investigation and as a result of their work five individuals and the records from three locations were subpoenaed for grand jury action. SAC points out these Agents gave an outstanding performance, giving of their time and energy unselfishly which directly contributed to the favorable results achieved.

SAC, Tampa, points out SA Roberts effectively conducted a number of detailed and penetrating interviews with Jack Bauman, who



Also Chapin should be queried concerning the content of the instructions which he gave to Segretti during their initial meeting. whether the handbills described in Chapin's second interview contained the false scheduling information which Chapin referred to in his first interview. Also determine whether Segretti indicated that he was responsible for the publication and distribution of the handbills in question and the purpose which Segretti hoped to achieve through such distribution. Advise FBIHQ of significant developments as they occur.

Chapin which this Division had requested for the purpose of ascertaining further information which Chapin might be able to provide concerning the publication by Donald H. Segretti of false scheduling information relative to the Presidential campaign of Senator Edmund Muskie. You will recall that in a previous interview, reported in the enclosures of your memorandum dated December 7, 1972 and captioned "James W. McCord, Jr., Burglary of the Democratic National Committee Headquarters", Chapin acknowledged being aware of the fact that Segretti had been responsible for the publication of such material.

In his second interview Chapin stated that he had no personal knowledge of where Segretti had published or distributed This material, other than that contained in a brief hand written note in which Segretti indicated that such material had been passed out by "Muskie people" during a Muskie rally. However, we note that in his first interview that Chapin stated that he had maintained contact with Segretti via telephone throughout Segretti's employment, and that during these telephone conversations he and Segretti "mutually exchanged information". In view of that fact that Chapin was apparently the person to whom Segretti reported, it is at least possible that Chapin possesses some information conterning the identities of persons employed by Segretti to assist him in these activities. Such information would be of substantial value to this Division in its efforts to determine whether Segretti's activities violated Section 612, or any other Federal statutes. 72200

Accordingly, the Bureau is requested to reinterview Chapin to ascertain whether Segretti ever imparted to him the identities of any persons or specific groups whose assistance he recruited in connection with these activities. In addition, the Bureau should

In the telegram of Scott he is evidently referring to the Watergate matter and states that John Erlichman and other Watergate witnesses and subject apparently interviewed in presence of attorneys in harmony with the spirit of Miranda. The telegram upon review indicates that no response is necessary and that Mr. Scott is just expressing his views. Inspector Mintz has stated that he has reviewed this telegram and advises the telegram is purely rhetorical and Scott appears to be complaining of an unfounded and pointless matter. Inspector Mintz recommends that no reply be made to this telegram (telegram attached). By way of background, Ralph D. Scott, a former Agent (entered on duty in 1939 and retired in 1964), in February of 1968 was appointed Director of the Arkansas State Police. He held this position until May 1, 1971. During his tenure as a Special Agent his services were satisfactory.



It is noted Scott retired from the Bureau in 1964, prior to the Miranda decision which was handed down in 1966. It is further noted that he served as Director of the Arkansas State Police (ASP) from 1968 to 1971, during which time a number of Civil Rights investigations involving officers of the ASP would have been conducted.

It appears Scottmay be referring to the General Bureau Policy on interviews where the purpose is to solicit information which may incriminate the interviewee which policy is followed in Civil Rights cases.

In Civil Rights cases if a subject, victim or other witness refuses to be interviewed except in the presence of an attorney, in accordance with Departmental policy the matter is referred to the Civil Rights Division of the Department. The Civil Rights Division determines if the advantages of interviewing such persons in the presence of their attorneys outweighs the disadvantages, and they are interviewed in the presence of their attorneys only on the specific instructions of the Department.

It is recommended that in view of the above no acknowledgment be made to the telegram of Scott.

At 6:10 p.m., last night, Mr. Gray called me and asked if we had received any requests from the Ervin Select Subcommittee for review of our files. I told him that I knew of none but to be perfectly sure I would contact Section Chief Richard E. Long of the Accounting and Fraud Section and SAC John McDermott of the Washington Field Office.

After contacting SAC McDermott and Section Chief Long, I called Mr. Gray back at approximately 6:20 and advised him that we had received no requests from the Ervin Select Subcommittee

I mentioned that we had received four requests, one from Senator Roman Hruska (R-Nebraska), who reviewed the entire file, and one from Senator John Tunney (D-California), who reviewed the results of four interviews (Tunney did not review, the entire file). We also received a request from Senator Frank Church (D-Idaho), who later rescinded the request, and from Senator Lowell Weicker (R-Connecticut).

Senator Weicker's request was received on the morning of 3/16/73 (at about 10:30 a.m.) and at 11:20 a.m. I received instructions from Mr. Gray as to the persons who had been designated to be allowed to review the file. Senator Weicker was not among those persons.
