Police Chief With a Big Opportunity

The appointment of W. Cleon Skousen as chief of police gives Salt Lake City a brighter opportunity of raising the standard of its police department to a higher professional level than it has had in many, many

Mr. Skousen is an eminently well-qualified man. He is trained in law. He served 16 years in the FBI, most of it in doing organizational and administrative workwhich is what the local police department

most urgently needs. He reorganized or helped reorganize no less than 10 police departments on the Pacific Coast. Many of them were reorganized to eliminate just such problems as Salt Lake

City faces.

He is held in tremendous respect by the West Coast officers with whom he worked. One highly-placed Los Angeles police official, consulted on the Salt, Lake, situation said, in effect, (Why, don't you know you have the best organizational man in the country right there in Utah-Cleon Skou-

So there's no doubt about his professional competence. Nor is there about his moral character. If ever a man entered a job of chief of police clothed in the armor of imporruptibility, it would seem to be Mr. Skouken.

Ad this gives the city a splendid opportunity. But it is only an opportunity, noth-

It will be an opportunity largely wasted unless the city commission and all others concerned do their parts

And this means:

Give the chief enough professionally (trained administrative assistants to let him do the job. Few, if any men, are big enough to do it alone when the department has fallen into such a state of internal jealousies and "politics."

Give the chief enough money and manspower to do the job. This means enough fibreathing room both in manpower and finances to let him conduct a really adeyquate training program.

Give the chief enough freedom to do the job. No man and this has been proven again and again in Salt Lake City's history. -can run that department with five or even one commissioner constantly juggling his elbow. The City Commission is charged with setting policies for the department. The chief is charged with administering those policies. For once, let us see if that, distinction can't be honored sc

Give the chief the public confidence to do the job. Confidence cannot be turned on and off like a light switch. It must be earned, gradually, and it is lost only gradually. Still, Salt Lake citizens owe it to themselves as well as to Mr. Skousen to wipe the slate clean of old resentments and disrespect concerning the police department and, after a reasonable time for adjustment and training, judge him and his department by their current performance, not whistory

Mr. Skousen is no stranger to this city or state. He needs no assurance of the basic goodness and friendliness of the people. here. Nor does he need reminding that this city demands a higher standard of civic up-rightness than is often expected elsewhere. Salt Lake City and most other Utah cities have avoided major corruption by not allowing the so-called "minor" rackets to get a good foothold here. The new chief understands that and can be expected to continue this vigilance.

The Descret News pledges its support in every effort to keep this city scrupulously clean and wishes Mr. Skousen signal/success in building the sort of police department we think our cify deserves.



The following is the annual efficiency report submitted on the above agent. SKOUSEN makes a splendid personal appearance; he dresses in a neat and conservative manner; has a liable personality; and, gets along well with others. He is mature, intelligent and makes an excellent Bureau representative with public officials and law enforcement officers. He is cooperative, industrious and possessed of considerable initiative. He applies himself well and uses sufficient force and aggressiveness in the discharge of his responsibilities.

His dictation is rated as excellent. In Moot Court and in Federal Grand Jury proceedings his ability to testify has been rated as excellent. SKOUSEN has an above average knowledge of Bureau firearms and his capable of operating alone on dangerous assignments. He has not been used on physical or technical surveillances, but I feel he would perform satisfactorily on such assignments. He has a good knowledge of typing, but cannot take shorthand.

Agent drives a car in a satisfactory manner. Agent SKOUSEN organizes his work well, proceeds on his own responsibility, and by application of initiative and good judgment is successful in bringing cases to a logical conclusion. His reports are written well as to form and substance and reflect proper marshalling of facts prior to dictation. His work requires minimum supervision. SKOUSEN has been assigned to Selective Service matters, where he has performed an average volume of work. He has also worked on Black Market activities in this Field Division and did a commendable job. This Agent has made numerous speeches during his assignment here, for which he has received letters of commendation. SKOUSEN is above average in speaking ability. He is also a qualified firearms instructor. I have not used SKOUSEN in a supervisory or administrative capacity during the rating period, however, I believe he definitely possesses this ability. JUVENILE DELINQUENCY

Recently Special Agent W. CLEON SKOUSEN had occasion to interview JOHN M. ZOOK, Los Angeles County Probation Officer. ZOOK has been with the department for twenty-five years and has worked his way through every position in it and now heads his department. During the conversation ZOOK expressed his admiration for the FBI but indicated there were certain policies which he could not understand, and he referred specifically to the Los Angeles conference on juvenile delinquency control sponsored by the FBI for law enforcement officials some months ago. ZOOK stated he was not invited to the conference and had made inquiries concerning his attendance and was informed that it was exclusively for law enforcement officials.

It was pointed out to Mr. ZOOK that there are many divergent views among police officials concerning the proper method of handling juveniles and this Bureau has undertaken a nation-wide program in connection with its police training schools to furnish a uniform and scientific approach to the handling of juvenile delinquents by police officers, and the conference to which he referred was designed to root out a number of general misconceptions concerning the problem and it was a meeting where officers could get together and speak frankly among themselves to lay the foundation for a practical; workable juvenile delinquency control program. He was reminded that in such conferences there were frequently controversial questions, and when asked directly if he did not agree that it was desirable and essential to have such conferences restricted to officers for whom the subject matter under discussion was specifically prepared, ZOOK immediately replied that he saw the Bureau's viewpoint on this matter.

He expressed the opinion that whe adults are ninety—mine per cent responsible for the crime among youth and he would like to see the blame placed where it belongs. He was asked what was the basis for his assumption, and he replied he had based his conclusion on Fthe Mactital the Bureau was more concerned with youthful delinquency than adult delinquency from frequent press releases by the Bureau. It was pointed out to him that had these releases been analyzed he would have noted that consistently the Director has emphasized that parents and adults generally are to blame for the rising delinquency rates among children. It was pointed out that juvenile delinquency has increased, and in this he agreed, and it was pointed out that from experience it has been found that many communities which are complacent toward the subject of adult delinquency frequently become aroused to take some action in this regard when

the rising trends in juvenile crime are publicized. ZOOK replied that the placing of emphasis on the juvenile situation to correct adult delinquency had not occurred to him. At this time Mr. ZOOK stated that he really owed the Bureau an apology as he was actually in full harmony with the FBI program and that he had gained some misconceptions concerning it because he was not fully aware of it.

He advised he had recently returned from the Buffalo meeting of the National Association of Probation Officers and was surprised to learn the high regard eastern cities have for the California probation plan, where all officers are under Civil Service and there is but one probation officer for every county, with no duplication by cities or towns within the county. In this state all deputy probation officers must be college graduates. He advised he has recently obtained salary raises for his staff, which makes them the best paid probation staff in the country. A comprehensive training program is afforded members of his staff, as well as some inservice training.

Angeles is in laying the foundation for a new division of delinquency prevention which is headed by STEPHEN J. KEATING with thirty-six officers assigned to it. He pointed out that the greatest success has been attained by establishing close contact with the leaders of juvenile gangs and preventing outbreaks similar to the "zoot-suit" ricts of a few years ago by calling in the gang leaders and threatening to send them all to one of the county camps to live together for several months if they were not able to live together in their neighborhoods. He advised there have been no gang clashes recently, and the probation officers have the confidence of many youngsters who consider themselves as professional hoodlums.

Recently the probation office had 300 youngsters spend a day at one of the county camps on a picnic and it was very difficult to get them to participate in group activities, as they were inclined to play double solitaire or checkers and they did not know how to enjoy themselves in group games like average youngsters. Finally they succeeded in getting them into the spirit of games, and when it came time to go home, they were anxious to remain at the camp.

ZOOK advises that the National Probation Association has complimented Los Angeles as having been one of the pioneers in developing better probation techniques during the past few years. He is anxious to continue experimenting in order to find the most economical method of rehabilitating youth, and so far he has found that "less theory and more work" is the best formula for crime prevention.

His department has recently prepared a pamphlet entitled "What Happens to Your Boy" which is for parents of youngsters taken to the county camps for violation of probation. This is to show the facilities of the camp and the type of training each boy receives and was designed to combat the whispering campaign among parents to the effect that their boys have their heads shaved, are whipped severely twice a day, associate with a lot of criminals, etc., at the camps. He said that the boys themselves tell many wild stories about the camps, and he is presently making up a short 16 mm colored motion picture film to be shown to each boy immediately after being placed on probation. This will explain the probation setup and will be an effort to impress the boy with the necessity of staying in line and working closely with the probation office.

Agent SKOUSEN spent over two hours with Mr. ZOOK, and I believe that he was most effective in presenting the Bureau's ideas and in winning over a good friend for this organization. It is suggested that a letter of commendation be directed to him for the manner in which this was handled.

CIRCULAR NO. 3959

TO ALL EMPLOYEES:

Subject: Affidavit regarding membership in organizations which assert the right to strike against the Government.

Appropriation bills for the fiscal year 1947 provide that no part of the appropriation shall be used to pay the salary or wages of any person who engages in a strike against the Government of the United States or who is a member of an organization of Government employees that asserts the right to strike against the Government of the United States. It is provided that for the purpose of this legislation an affidavit shall be considered prima facie evidence that the person making the affidavit has not contrary to the provisions of this law engaged in a strike against the Government of the United States and is not a member of an organization of Government employees that asserts the right to strike against the Government of the United States.

All employees must execute the affidavit on the other side of this circular. When you have signed the affidavit it should be returned promptly to your immediate supervisor who will forward it is through regular channels (for noting against payroll records) to the Administrative Assistant to the Attorney General.

Certifying Officers shall not release salary checks until this affidavit has been prepared and forwarded.



SUBJECT: Inspection of the Butte Division

Reference is made to the telephone call from Mr. McCabe at the Bureau on February 8th, 1949, concerning the inspection of the resident agency at Billings, Montana, and the questions which have been raised in connection with delinquencies found there.

Concerning the inspection of the Identification Orders at Billings, I specifically recall inspecting these and examining them closely because they were unusually voluminous. They were bound together with an Acco fastener and were located with a number of other items, including the file of Wanted Flyers, in the second or third drawer of the cabinet assigned to Agent Vincent Garvey. I inquired of Agent Garvey why he had retained many obsolete and cancelled IO's and he went into some detail to explain that a number of the officers in that territory have taken considerable interest in certain IO subjects and that when they have inquired from time to time concerning their status, he liked to be able to advise them specifically of the date of cancellation without having to inquire of the headquarters office in Butte. Agent Garvey pointed out that it was his opinion that it was advantageous to retain these cancelled IO's in order to be able to intelligently answer inquiries and not merely assume they were cancelled just because he didn't have a copy on file. This discussion extended over several minutes and the writer is of the opinion that Agent Garvey will recall this conversation which resulted from the examination of the IO file. The writer specifically recalls advising Agent Garvey that the retention of obsolete and cancelled IO's is contrary to established Bureau procedure.

Concerning the number of dictaphone records on hand at the time of the inspection, I wish to state that the tabulation of these records was made jointly by Agent Garvey and the writer and that when the total number had been ascertained, the writer asked Agent Garvey why this large number was maintained in this residency. Agent Garvey stated that they had accumulated over a considerable period of time and that they were far in excess of their current needs. The writer asked Agent Garvey how many records he estimated were necessary and he advised that approximately sixty percent of those on hand could be sent back to Butte. No question arose as to the total number then on hand since this figure had been determined and accepted by both Agent Garvey and the writer during the tabulation process. The writer did not make any specific recommendation as to the number of records to be sent back but merely pointed out in the inspection report that an excessive number of unused dictaphone records were maintained at this residency.

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This employee entered on duty 10-24-35 as a Messenger and on 6-17-40 he was appointed a Special Agent in Grade CAF-9, \$3200 per annum. On 2-1-43 he was reallocated to CAF-12, \$4600 per annum, and as a result of four uniform promotions and four basic salary increases, his salary was increased to GS-12, \$7200 per annum. He is now being considered for reallocation to GS-13, \$7600 per annum.

On 4-4-41 he was assigned to the Chief Clerk's Office as a supervisor and on 6-25-41 he was placed in charge of the Communications Section. By letter dated 10-14-41 the Director advised him he was pleased to note the fine compliment which had been paid to this Agent as a Bureau representative when he addressed the Missouri Press Association. By memorandum dated 11-28-41 Mr. Nichols expressed his dissatisfaction with the manner in which this Agent handled a telephone call with 'Howard Hiatt. As a result of the mishandling of two radiograms, he was censured by letter dated 1-20-42 for not properly instructing all employees in the Communication Section. On 6-7-43 he was designated Personnel Assistant of the Communications and Records Section.

In a memorandum dated 9-2-43, to the Director, Mr. Laughlin said he was made available to the Staff of the House Appropriations 75 Committee to conduct a survey and inquiry into the Central Administrative board and teletype facilities operated by the Central Administrative.

Services of the Office for Emergency Management for the use of the various war agencies; that he made a very complete survey of those facilities and by reason of his experience in such matter satisfied connection with his regular Bureau assignment, he was able to be of very definite assistance to the Committee; that his findings had been set out in a concise report and his services in that connection could be considered entirely satisfactory. Barnett, Membership Secretary, YMCA, Washington, D. C. commended the talk given by Agent Skousen before the staff conference. By letter dated 10-19-45 he was awarded his Ten Year Service Award Key. letter dated 10-25-45 he was commended for the fine work he performed in a survey of the Department of Justice. In January, 1946 he was recommended for possible development as an SAC. On 5-23-46 the SAC of the Portland Office advised that Skousen handled the subjects of "Public Relations" and Juvenile Delinquency" at the state-wide school of Police Administration, held in Portland May 6th to 9th and at the conclusion of his discussion, many of the officers present commended him very highly. On 7-17-46 he was one of the Agents recommended by his SAC as capable of performing supervisory and administrative duties and possibly capable of developing further with such training to eventually become an ASAC or SAC. By Letter dated 8-28-46 he was commended for the excellent manner in which he conducted an interview with Mr. John M. Zook, Los Angeles County Probation Officer.

On 3-31-48 he was rated EXCELLENT. By letter dated 5-18-48 he was commended for the fine work performed by him in connection with the preparation of the Los Angeles Crime Survey Report. On 6-30-48 the SAC of the Salt Lake City Office advised that the Thirty-third Annual Convention, California Division, International Association for Identification, Reno, Nevada, was held on June 16-19, 1948 and the address given by Agent Skousen was very well received and the Resident Agents at Reno had heard many very complimentary remarks concerning it. On 12-21-48 Inspector Gurnea advised he assisted him during the Butte and Salt Lake City inspections and he was above average in intelligence, he was analytical, industrious and thoroughly dependable. He received his assignments with a minimum of detailed instructions, completed them quickly, thoroughly and accurately. He was above average.

He was calm by nature but he was aggressive and had tremendous drive to accomplish a great deal with a minimum of effort. He presented a very satisfactory personal appearance and had a good personality. He was entirely devoted to the Bureau's service and gave freely of

his own personal time to further the Bureau's work. He undoubtedly possessed administrative ability but his services were much more valuable to the Bureau in the field in which he now operated.

RECOMMENDATION: Inasmuch as he meets all of the requirements for reallocation to GS-13, it is recommended he be reallocated to GS-13, \$7600 per annum.
