The report of Special Agent Tierney has been reviewed at the Bureau. New York should correct this report in accordance with the following observations listed below: 1. Page 111 - The first paragraph on Page 111 states: *It is to be noted that Redmont has been employed by *U. S. News and World Report, Washington, D. C., and is stationed in Paris as Regional Filtor of this magazine. Inastuch as Redmont is no longer employed by the above magazine, this paragraph should be changed to show that when Redmont Property was interviewed on July 21, 1950, he was employed as stated above. The first sentence in paragraph 3 on Page 111 reads; Remington stated that in connection with his association with Helen (Elizabeth) Bentley, that she had made inquiry of him on South American matters.* The parenthesis in this sentence should appear after Bentley instead of after Elizabeth as stated. - 6. Page 130 The instructions contained in Item 5 are also applicable to paragraph 1 on Page 130.
- 7. Pages 133 & 13h Instructions contained in Items 5 and 6 above also apply to the paragraph on Page 133 which is continued to Page 13h, and the first paragraph on Page 13h.

The informantsmentioned in the third paragraph should be properly identified and the dates these informants furnished their information should be reported. The same instructions apply to paragraph 4 on Page 134, which contains information concerning Buckmaster.

8. Pages 165 & 166 - It is noted that five documents are listed on Pages 165 and 166; however, in referring to these items in the fifth paragraph on Page 166 of the report, it is stated:

"He a vised that Itom No 1, above listed, 'Ceneral Administrative From No. 2-25,' was in effect when he became Security Officer in August, 1942, and that the items above listed as 1 through 7 were promulgated by him."

It is believed that "I through 7" should be "I through 5."

9. Pa 6 204 - Paragraph 3 on Pa 3 204 states:

Whith regard to scourity regulations observably, Goldsmith stated that WhB in 1932 and 1933 was a new organization;"

It is beliaved that the years 1932 and 1933 should be 1942 and 1943.

10. Fage 212 - The first sentence in the second paragraph on Page 212 states:



"Mr. Eanks advised that he, Remington, or other members of the Committee, could, by examination of the documents, determine what material contained therein was innocuous, as no one person could reach such a conclusion as he would not be aware of all the facts which were considered in the preparation of various naterial!

It is believed that this sentence should read:

"Hr. Hanks advised that he, Remington, or other members of the Committee, could not, ..."

11. Pages 217 & 218 - The last sentence on Page 217 which is continued to Page 218 states:

"In this connection, Liss Eitchen advised that Remington never at any Jean on this process have for several months going to the Bureau of Standards several times to observe tests and make two trips to California one at Christmas time in 1942 and one September, 1943."

It is obvious that some material has been omitted from referenced report:

12. Page 253 - Page 253 reports that Donald M. Nelson, former head of the War Production Ecard was the suther of a book entitled, "Arsenal of Democracy."

"A review of this book reflected that the book contained information regarding synthetic rubber processes submitted during World War II to the War Production Board, including on Page 233 and 300 information concerning a gentleman from California! who believed he had found a new way to make rubber out of garbage. Welson did not identify this man by name in the book. He said the man began by convincing a radio commentator that he had the answer to the rubber problem and thereafter author Newhall called this commentator and requested that the commentator send the inventor to tell his story to the War Production Board..."

It is believed that Nelson's name should be substituted for Newhall's.



13. Page 270 - The first paragraph on Page 270 reports the testimony of Fertrand Fox when he appeared as a witness in the Remington perjury trial. The first paragraph reads:

"He stated Remington went out of his way to convince others of the fessibility of the vertical plan and recalled that Remington contacted Robert Lamb of the Toland Committee of the House of Representatives, when it became obvious that the Toland Committee of might pass the vertical plan, and he arranged for a meeting between Lamb and Hitch, but the Toland Committee was not persuaded to their ides"

It is believed that this paragraph should read to show that the Toland Committee might pass the horizontal plan instead of the vertical plan.

14. Page 272 - Paragraph 3 on Page 272 states:

"Remington's testimony of July 30, 1948 before the Senate."
Committee concerning his meeting with Bentley concerning the
type of material and the manner in which he furnished it to her
was then read to the witness but U. S. Attorney Saypol and he
additted that he or Remington were never told by any one from the
WFB to make Jublic the material described by Remington."

The word "but" in this paragraph should be changed to "by."

The Bureau is making this correction in its copies of referenced report and the offices receiving this letter should do likewise.

15. Page 281 - The word "date" appearing in line 3 on Page 281 should be "data."

The Bureau is making this correction in its copies and offices receiving this letter should do likewise.


16. Page 353 - The sources for the information contained in paragraphs 1 through 3 on Page 353 and the dates the information was furnished should be reported.

24. Page 389 - The information contained in paragraph 3 should be reported in a clear manner and the informants should be properly identified. The dates the informants furnished their information should also be set forth.

Paragraph 4 on Page 389 states:

"It is to be noted that apparently this telephone call occurred subsequent to the interview of Robbins W. Barstow, Jr., by Bureau agents."

This paragraph as set forth is meaningless inasmuch as the report has made no previous reference to any telephone call. If it is necessary to include the information contained in this paragraph, it should be reported so that it can be understood.

25. Page hol - The informants referred to in paragraph 2 should be properly identified and should include the dd.es they furnished their information.

26. Pages hil & hil2 - The sources for the information contained in the last paragraph on Page hil which is continued to Page hil2 should be properly identified and dates their information was received should be reported.

27. Page 138 - New York should advise whether "APGE" which appears in the last line of paragraph 1 and the fifth line of paragraph 2 is correct or whether it should be "AFGE" which is the abbreviation for American Federation of Government Employees.

Page 446 - Reference is made to paragraph 2 setting forth information concerning Rudolph F. Bertram which appears in , the personnel files of TVA. The second and third sentences of this paragraph state: paragraph states



These sentences should be clarified.

- 29. Page 454 Paragraph 2 on this page attributes certain information to Confidential Informant Knoxville T-1. It is noted that referenced report contains no Informant Page, therefore, New Tork should submit an Informant Page identifying T-1.
- 30. Page 468 New York should advise whether the year #1927# appearing in line 8 on this page is correct or whether it: should be #1937.#
- 31. Page 484 The source for the information contained in paragraph 3 should be properly identified and the date the source furnished the information should be reported.
- 32. Page 436 The informants who furnished the information contained in paragraph 3 should be properly identified and the dates their information was furnished should be reported.
- 33. Page 507 The sources for the information appearing that in paragraphs 2 and 3 and the dates the information was furnished ... should be reported.
- 34. Page 527 The sources for the information contained in paragraph I should be shown and the dates their information was furnished should be reported.
- 35. Page 544 Confidential Informant Knowville T-3 referred to in paragraph 3 should be identified on an Informant Page.

The words "this office" in line 4 of paragraph 3 should be "the Knoxville Office."

Both the Bulet and the summery report have been reviewed and the following corrections will be made in the summary subject to the Bureau's approvel. Before listing the corrections it is to be noted that in regard to those corrections which requested that information be stiributed to properly identified informents and which further requested the dates the informants furnished this information, it has not been possible in most instances to furnish the exact date inseruch as original sources do not reflect the exact date the information was given. For the Bureau's information the above information was renerted without attributing the information to properly identified Merely for the benefit of sumplying to a promerly designated prosecuting official any derogetory information concerning pertinent individuals connected with the investigation. No attempt was made to use T symbols inesmuch as these informants' identity could not be divul; ed to these officiels. It was felt that if it was necessary for any reason to ascertain the identity of these informants that this could be done through a review of the REFINGTON indices and the files itself and for the nurnose of expediency it was felt that it would not be necessary to identify them by symbol in the surmary report. She said that when she first went to work at WPB she was in an office on the third floor of the Social Security Building, but shortly thereafter she was changed to the office in Room 2709. There she was engaged as the stenographer for AUSTRIAN, although occasionally she did work for other persons. AUSTRIN'S office was in the same room and there was another desk in this room which was occupied by Program Planners in Washington for short periods of time. Chief among these was W. O. Heinne, now with International Latex, Dover, Delaware. Also in this room was a steel file cabinet, described above, which contained about two drawers of various reports of AUSTRIAN. The bottom two drawers contained various printed directives of WPB and related matter. This was the only file cabinet in the room.

Miss KITCHEN said that AUSTRIAN came to work there after she did and left in late February or early March, 1963. She said that a Mr. JEAN had submitted a process for making synthetic rubber, but she did not know the substance from which the rubber was to be made. She volunteered the information that it was not from garbage as she had been reading

in the newspapers regarding the REMINGTON triel. Miss KITCHEN, seid it was her opinion that the garbage formula as mentioned in this trial was not the JEAN process, although she could be wrong, because as a matter of fact, she does not know what the JEAN process started with.

Miss KITCHEN stated she did not know when work was started on the JEAN process, but guessed it might have been october or November, 1902.

the dissemination with regard to subject. To prepare the response to Olney the following action was the main Eatch Act file, 101-1185, the main Loyalty file,

121-6159, and the main Perjury file, 74-1379, were reviewed. addition, all references to Remington in the Silvermaster file, 65-56402, were reviewed since Remington was carried as a main subject in that case. Likewise, all cross references to Remington prior to July, 1950, were reviewed.

The review of cross references reflected no information which was disseminated pertinent to Olney's request in addition to that which was disseminated in connection with the Silvermaster case or the main file on Remington. However, those references to Remington in communications on other subjects of investigation which were disseminated were summarized and the summaries are attached as enclosure #1 for record purposes and future reference;)

Also attached as enclosure #2 are Photostats of serials (or pages thereof) which mentioned Remington in the officermaster files which serials were disseminated or which pertained to dissemination. These should be filed with this memorandum in 101-1185 for future reference purposes.

Attached as enclosure #3 are Photostats of pertinent pages of summaries on Soviet esplonage which were disseminated as mentioned

in the memorandum to Olney.

Attached as enclosure #4 are work sheets covering the review ? of material disseminated in the Loyalty and Perjury investigations on RECORDED-38 Remington.

It is noted that Remington left Government service on June 12, 1950. The attachment includes dissemination made to officials or divisions of the Department of Justice and disserination to other Government agencies and officials, in addition to that which was requested by you.

Tou will recall that Remington was first investigated under the Match Act, later was investigated in connection with the Nathun Cregory Silvermaster case arising out of allegations by Slizabeth Bentley, was later investigated under Executive order 9335 (Federal Suployees Loyalty Program), and subsequent to his leaving Covernment service was investigated for perjury. You will note that the attached memorandum is broken down into three main sections covering dissemination in the Hatch Act investigation, the Silvermaster investigation, and the Loyalty investigation. Reports in the perjury case were disseminated to the Criminal Division and the United States Attorney's Office in the Southern District of New York as they were received.

Reports in connection with that investigation were furnished as they were prepared to the Department of Justice and the United States Attorney's office, Southern District of New York.

A recent review of the Bureau files regarding William Walter Remington for the purpose of furnishing the Department a list of communications disseminated by the Bureau regarding Remington prior to the time he left Government sorvice. During the review the following personal history data and Government employment data regarding Remington was noted and is suggested it be placed in the files for possible future reference purposes:

Remington was born October 25, 1917, in New York City, to Frederick Remington and Lillian Sutterland. Several weeks following his birth, he moved to Ridgewood, New Jersey. While there he attended Kenilworth Grammar School until 1930 and Ridgewood Right School until 1931, when he graduated. In September, 1934, he entered Dartmouth College, Hanover, New Hampshire, and as of June, 1936, he had completed his freshman and sophomore years.

From September, 1936, to May 1, 1937, he was employed with the Tonnessee Valley Authority in Anoxville, Tennessee. For a portion of the Surper of 1937, he was employed with the Workers Education Committee in Enoxville, Tennessee. He returned to Dartmouth College in September 1937, and had completed his junior and senior years by June, 1939, at Which time he graduated. He empolled in Columbia University in Which time he graduated. He empolled in Columbia University in October, 1940, and obtained a masters Degree in Economics from that university in June, 1941. It is noted that from May, 1940, to July, 1941, Hemington was employed at the National Resources Planning Doord in Washington, D. C., but during a portion of this period, he was studying at Columbia University for his Doctorate, commuting between New York and Washington, D. C., for that purpose up to April, 1941.

Remington met Ann Moos Imandt in February, 1938. At the time Ann was a student at Bennington College in Vermont. They were married on Movember 23, 1938, in New York State. Two children were born to this marriage, namely, Bruce on March 15, 1942, and Galeyn on April 8, 1944. Ann Remington was awarded a final decree of divorce on Lecember 5, 1949, in the Circuit Court of Fairfax County, Virginia. Z



He attended elementary and high school in Ridgewood, New Jersey, where he resided of the In September, 1934, he entered Dartmouth College ... June, 1936, having completed freshman and sophomore work, he obtained employment with the Tennessee Valley Authority in Knoxville, Tennessee, where he remained until May, 1937. For a portion of the Summer of 1937, he was employed with the Workers Education Committee in Knoxville. He returned then to Dartmouth and graduated June, 1939. He had met Ann Moos Imanet in February, 1938, and they were married in November, 1938. In 1941, he received his Master's degree in economics from Dartmouth. He subsequently took a course at Columbia University in Washington. From May, 1940, to July, 1941, he was employed with the National Resources Planning Board, Washington, D.C. Subsequently, he worked for GPA; WPB; served in U.S. Navy; Office of War Mobilization and Reconversion; Council of Economic Advisors, Executive Office of the President; Office of International Trade, Department of Commerce. His resignation was accepted effective

Remington, while with the WPB, was familiar with information both on an over-all and plant by plant basis as to production goals, current output and inventories, as to airplane components, as to radar equipment and as to Naval craft and equipment. He was also familiar with many aspects of the Manhattan Project and was aware by advance notice of design changes in aircraft Naval vessels and equipment as well as contract cut backs and other program changes which would have repercussions on production schedules.

Elizabeth Bentley has advised that Jacob Golos deceased Soviet espionage agent, introduced her to William Remington and Ann Remington, his wife, in the early part of 1942. During the next 2 years, she met Remington by prearrangement approximately 15 times. Remington furnished her with information which he had secretly obtained from the WPB. This material was furnished by Bentley to Golos. Remington and his wife remained members of the

Holloman . Miss Gandy - Communist Party during this period and Bentley collected their dues. The relationship ceased during the Spring of 194' at the time he joined the U.S. Navy. During the foregoing period, Remington had introduced Bentley to Bernord Redmont with the idea that Redmont would also aid her by furnishing confidential Government information.

Ann Remington, subject's wife, advised Remington told her while in Knoxville in 1936-37, he became a member of the Communist Party. On 2 occasions, Ann Remington furnished Bernard Redmont with Farty dues for herself and the subject. Ann Remington further advised she knew of the activities of her husband and the relationship with Rentley.

Endocic Ravines, confessed Comintern agent, advised that during his activities both in Moscow and in Spain, he learned that a good contact of the Russians in the United States was an individual by the name of Remington.

The subject has admitted furnishing Bentley information but claims such was nonsecret public information and was furnished under impression she was a "P.M." newspaper reporter. He admitted furnishing her monies but claimed they were donations for the Joint Anti-Fascists Refugee Committee. He has denied all other allegations and statements by Bentley and his wife. However, neither Bentley or Remington's wife can identify sufficiently any specific piece of secret information conveyed by Remington through Fentley to Golos.

A summary report, the only report written under caption Espionaye, was disseminated to the Department 6-28-52. On 7-18-43, Remington was suspended pending a loyalty hearing from his employment with the Department of Commerce. On 0-22-48, the Fourth U.S. Civil Service Regional Loyalty Board ruled reasonable ground existed for belief Remington was disloyal. Remington appealed the decision. On 2-9-49, the Loyalty Review Poard advised reasonable grounds did not exist for belief Pemington disloyal. Remington returned to Commerce Department 2-14-49. On 6-2-50, Remington submitted his resignation on request effective 6-12-50. Remington was indicted by a Federal Grand Jury in the Southern District of New York on a one count perjury indictment on the basis of the statement before the Grand Jury that he was not a member of the Communist Party, 6-8-50. He was convicted and sentenced on 8-22-51. The Circuit Court of Appeals Second Circuit reversed the conviction

and remanded the case to the District Court for new trial because of an improper charge to the Jury. On 10-24-51, a new indictment was returned on five counts. On 3-24-52, the supreme Court rejected subject's appeal to quash the first indictment. On 1-27-53, Remington was convicted on two counts in the new indictment. On 12-24-53, his conviction was upheld by the Circuit Court of Appeals Second Circuit. On 2-8-54, the Supreme Court refused to review the conviction.

All references have been incorporated into subject's case file. The Department has advised Remington's refistration will not be requested under the Foreign Agents Registration Act of 1938, as amended by Section 20 (A) of the Internal Security Act of 1950. Subject on S.I.

Remington Dies Of Injuries in Prison Attack

Ex-U. S. Economist Was Serving 3-Year Term for Perjury

By the Associated Press

LEWISBURG, Pa., Nov. 24.-William W. Remington, former Commerce Department economist serving a three-year term for perjury, died today at the Federal Penitentiary here from injuries suffered in an attack at the prison.

Remington's death was announced by acting Warden Fred T. Wilkinson. He suffered head injuries Monday when hit on the head with a stocking-covered brick in his dormitory

squad room.

Mr. Wilkinson previously had said the identity of Remincton's assailant "is fairly well established" but he did not disclose whether it was another convict. nor give the reason for the attack.

Serving 3-Year Term.

Remington, 36, was sentenced to three years for falsifying that he had never been associated with Red organizations.

He denied giving secret Government data to Elizabeth Bentley for transmission to Russia,

and denied knowledge of a Young Communist League unit at Dartmouth College while he was a

student there.

Remington admitted turning over data to Miss Bentley, selfdescribed courier for a Red spv ring, but said he believed shewanted it for a book or magazine articles.

the was sentenced on February 4. 1953, and entered prison on

April 15, 1953.

Operation Performed.

Wilkinson issued Mr. statement:

"Inmate William Walter Remington died in the institution hospital at 7:38 a.m. today, November 24, 1954. On Tuesday afternoon an operation was performed by an outside surgical consultant and the institution medical officer.

"The investigation by the Federal Burcau of Investigation and prison officials is continuing and all information will be presented the U.S. Attorney."

Remington was confined in the same prison as Alger Hiss, former top State Department official, who has served 312 years for perjury. Hiss is scheduled to be released on parole

FBI Declines Comment.

In Philadelphia, Norman Mc-Cabe, special agent in charge of the Philadelphia FBI office. declined comment on Remington's death. He said a state-ment would be issued "when we have made an arrest."

Mr. Wilkinson had reported that Remington was found by his quarters' officer in a dazed condition on the second-floor stairway landing below his thirdfloor dormitory quarters. He said that part of the prison was occupied by a small number of prisoners, consisting of night workers in for the day, and by fanitors.

By FD 128 dated 4/28/53, the Newark Office designated the New York Office as origin in so far as maintenance of the Security Index Cards was concerned and the subject's SI Cards were submitted to the New York Office at that time.

The Newark Office file fails to reflect that a Security Flash Notice was ever placed against REMINGTON's identification record by any field division.

Inasmuch as page 1 of the 11/24/54 issue of the "Newark Evening News" reflected that REMINGTON died that date from injuries received on 11/22/54 while incarcerated in the Lewisburg, Pennsylvania Federal Prison, no further action is being taken by the Newark Office and the subject's case is being closed.

The New York Office should advise the Bureau that the subject's SI cards are being canceled, if such has not already been done.

The following is a translation of an article appearing in the November 28, 1954 issue of the "Neues Deutschland", Berlin, Germany:

FBI MURDERS ROOSEVELT MAN

It began with the Communists . . . / Shall this also be the Custom in West Germany and West Berlin? / Defeat the U.S.A. buddies of the Nazis on 5 December -- Vote List 5 for peace, unity and justice!

New York (By special correspondent). WILLIAM REMINGTON, high official in the U.S.A. Ministry of Commerce in the time of ROOSEVELT, was murdered on the instruction of the FBI (the U.S.A. Gestapo) in the penitentiary of Lewisburg in the State of Pennsylvania. His skull was crushed with a brick wrapped up in a stocking. Even though the name of the murderer has not been announced, no doubt exists in wide circles of Americans that the perpetrator of the murder was the FBI.

REMINGTON was submitted to the accusation of MC CARTHY for having refused to state that he was a Communist and was brought before an American court. Because he steadfastly refused to give false testimony and thereby serve the American authorities as a provocateur against the Communist Party of the U.S.A., he was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary. Now the FBI has taken vengeance for the reason that REMINGTON did not want to become their tool.

It begins with the persecution of the Communists. This we remember in Germany from the Fascist barbarism. This is indicated by the present terror trial against the Communist Party in West Germany. This shows the outlewing of the CP and the MC CARTHY terror in the U.S.A. A murder attempt was also made on STEVE NELSON, a well-known American labor leader, also a victim of the MC CARTHY inquisition, in the penitentiary in Pittsburg, which fortunetely did not succeed. Also against Comrade THOMPSON, member of the National Committee of the U.S.A., a murder attempt was made in the New York Federal Penitentiary. A provocateur put into the penitentiary on orders of the FBI delivered a severe head injury on THOMPSON by means of a lead pipe.

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This terror is directed against every person who regards truth more than his life. In a notorious prison of the U.S.A., the prison island of Alcatraz not fer from San Francisco, is the courageous and upright American MORTON SOBELL, who was accused, along with the murdered married couple ROSENBERG. He was sentenced to thirty years in the penitentiary because he refused to commit perjury against the HOSENBERGs. His wife reports to the public the anxietyarousing fact that officials of the U.S.A. Gestapo have been trying with all means they can think of to compel SOBELL to change his testimony in the ROSENBERG trial and to become a witness against the ROSENBERGs at this late time. The executioners of ETHEL and JULIUS ROSENBERG would like to wash themselves clean of the charge of murdering these two heroes. The danger exists for MORTON SOBELL, who courageously refused this shameful suggestion, will himself one day be murdered by the same methods as REMINGTON. A

The same danger is hanging over EUGENE DENNIS, for many years General Secretary of the CP U.S.A., as well as over the imprisoned bourgeois patriots like MORTON SOBELL. For them the same fate is considered as REMINGTON's because they refuse to capitulate before American reaction.

This alarming development in the U.S.A. should be a warning to many people in West Germany and West Berlin, where the criminal execution of the American way of life becomes more manifest from day to day. We expressly repeat -- it begins with a Communist, then in turn come the Social Democrats, then the labor union members, and finally the bourgeois politicians have to believe in it. The West Berlin population will have the opportunity on 5 December to put a decisive "no" against the policy of injustice, crime and war -- the policy of misery, if they give their vote to List No. 5, the list of unity, justice, welfare and peace.

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ACCESS TO FBI DATA

COMMISSION ON GOVERNMENT SECURITY

John Phillips, Security Control Officer, Department of Commerce, advised on 4/30/56 that the above Commission has requested to review the Commerce file of Walter Remington. Anticipating that Remington file would contain FBI data, if not FBI investigative reports, Phillips called Walter Yeagley in Department of Justice for a decision on whether or not Commerce could make available such data to Commission investigators. Yeagley was unable to give Phillips a final answer but was of the opinion that the third agency rule would apply, that is, Commerce would refer the Commission to the FBI.

On 4/27/56 General Counsel Philip Ray, Commerce, called Assistant Attorney General Tompkins on the same question. Tompkins was unable to give Ray an official decision, but was also of the opinion that the third agency rule would probably apply. Tompkins suggested that Commerce present the problem officially in writing to Tom Donegan at the White House, who would in turn present the problem to Justice.

Phillips pointed out that the President instructed all departments and agencies by letter dated 3/6/56 to "give the Commission every assistance within the restrictions imposed by the statute"; however, this did not resolve the question as to whether or not Commission investigators could review that portion of an individual file which contained FBI data. Many other agencies will soon be confronted with this problem since Commission investigators are now in many agencies reviewing procedures and are expected to soon request selective files. for review.

OBSERVATION:

The basic policy matter involved here is whether the Commission in examining agency cases should have access to FBI reports, and this is a decision to be made by the Department of Justice.

It is believed advisable, however, that the Bureau considerally whether the Commission should be permitted to review our reports in possession of other government agencies or whether the Commission

investigators should make their request direct to the FBI.

The Government Commission will undoubtedly focus its attention on Loyalty and Security of Government Employee cases although it will in all probability request material in other security-type cases. In this regard it should be noted that our Loyalty and Security. of Government Employee reports have been prepared in a manner suitable for dissemination and for the use of hearing boards. Our sources have been carefully concealed and it would not seem that any harm could be done by permitting the Commission investigators access to these reports at the agencies where they are found. In these types of cases it would serve little or no purpose and be time-consuming to have the agency refer to us the Commission's request under the so-called third agency rule. We may, therefore, want to take the position that we will not comment to the Department on the desirability of letting the Commission see these reports but will leave this decision entirely up to the Department. In the other types of security cases such as the Remington case, where there would be both FBI Loyalty and Security of Government Employee information as well as internal security and espionage data, we should undoubtedly review such reports to see whether we have any objection to their being released to the Commission by the agency where found. After review of our files and if we find there is an objection, we will mention it to the Department and leave the final decision up to them as to whether the reports should be produced.

In order to give us an opportunity to accomplish the above-described procedure, it would be best for all agencies to make known to the Department requests for files where our reports are involved. In Security of Government Employee cases we would have no objection to the Department's giving approval to the agency to release the reports. In the other types of cases we would be given an opportunity to review the files and voice an objection where necessary.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that Mr. Nichols discuss this matter with Deputy Attorney General Rogers so that a policy may be fixed with reference to this matter.

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
