WINSTON BURDETT SECURITY MATTER - C

In connection with the review of the voluminous file in the case entitled "GREGORY , Espionage-R," it was noted that one of the individuals mentioned by GREGORY as a probable espionage contact of her former supervisor, JACOB GOLOS, was never interviewed. Indications at the time the GREGORY case was opened were that he was overseas and not then available.

In her statement of November 8, 1945, informant GREGORY advised as follows: "There was another newspaperman named WINSTON BURDETT. I think that's broken up. My friend, Al (ANATOLD GROMOV), asked me about him because they had lost him. You see when these people went abroad GOLOS arranged to have people pick them up on the other side."

By letter dated November 16, 1945, addressed to New York the Bureau furnished brief background data concerning WINSTON BURDETT described as broadcaster and news analyst, who was stationed at various foreign posts during the war years and who was previously employed by the Brooklyn Eagle.

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In the report of Special Agent New York, New York, dated November 16, 1945, further biographical data regarding BURDETT is set forth including the fact that he took graduate work at Columbia University and the fact that his father, OWEN LaBURDETT, had formerly resided in New York City.

In view of the fact that effort was made to interview all of the subjects of this case and numerous individuals whose names were mentioned in the case have since been investigated and interviewed, it. is suggested that the present location and current activities of WINSTON BURDETT be ascertained and that consideration be given by the Bureau to interviewing this individual who apparently was closely associated with JACOB GOLOS at one time and probably was considered by GOLOS as a source of information.

New York will consider itself office of origin in this case in the event the Bureau authorizes investigation of WINSTON BURDETT.


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

The files of the Passport Division, Department of State, disclosed the following information regarding WINSTON MANSFIELD BURDETT:

WINSTON MANSFIELD BURDETT was granted Passport #317185 on June 23, 1936, at which time he stated he was born at Buffalo, Erie County, United States of America, on December 12, 1913, and that his permanent residence was No. 2 Grace Court, Brooklyn, New York. He stated that his father, OWEN LONG BURDETT, was born at Wakefield, Massachusetts, April 6, 1882, and was also residing at No. 2 Grace Court, Brooklyn.

BURLETT stated that he desired this passport to visit France and England for four months on vacation and intended to leave from New York via the SS "California" on July 1, 1936. He indicated that he had had no prior passport. BURLETT's father signed the passport application in this matter as an identifying witness.

WINSTON BURDETT was issued Passport #660915 on February 6, 1940, at which time BURDETT listed his permanent residence as #5 Montague Terrace, Brooklyn, New York. BURDETT stated he intended to visit Finland, Sweden, Norway and Germany as a newspaper correspondent for a period of ten months and he listed his occupation as a journalist. BURDETT advised he intended to leave the United States on February 3, 1940, sailing on the SS "Drottenholm." No individual signed the passport application in this instance as an identifying witness.

BURDETT in connection with this passport of February 6, 1940, advised in a letter dated January 24, 1940, to the Department of State, that he was applying for a passport to Europe as a special correspondent for the "Brooklyn Eagle." He stated that he had been assigned to write an extended series of feature articles on conditions in Finland, Sweden, and possibly elsewhere. The Eagle, according to BURDETT, had suggested that "I include the following four countries as those to which I will go or through which I may pass: Finland, Sweden, Norway and Germany. My length of stay should, we have agreed, be set as nine months although later developments might suggest an extension of my assignment beyond that time." BURDETT advised he intended to go first to Finland with passage through Sweden, sailing on February 3 on the SS Drottingholm of the Swedish-American Line. BURDETT advised that under the arrangement he had reached with Mr. POSEY (H. G. POSEY, Managing Editor of the Brooklyn Eagle), he would be compensated following his return on a space, or story-by-story, basis.

In connection with this application for a passport, on January 25, 1940, Mr. H. G. POSEY, Managing Editor of the Brooklyn Eagle, directed a letter to the Department of State, advising that EURDETT had been emw-ployed on the Eagle since October 8, 1934; that "for the past year-and-a-half, he has been associate editor of 'Trend', a section of the Sunday Eagle, which presents the week's news in digest form." Mr. POSEY also

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stated that Mr. BURDETT "who is being granted a leave of absence without pay, is a person of independent means. He will be compensated for all of his published material upon his return." On February 5, 1940, Mr. H. G. POSEY again directed a letter to the Department of State, advising at that time that the Eagle considered Mr. BURDETT to be the Eagle's bona fide representative in every sense of the term and "we are sorry that the nature of his assignment was not, apparently, sufficiently clarified in our earlier letter."

Further, on February 5, 1940, WINSTON BURIETT directed another letter to the Department of State, advising that he desired to clarify the nature of his assignment; that "first, that I am a salaried employee of the Brooklyn Eagle, and second, that I am on definite assignment as the Eagle's representative, to write a regular series of articles from Finland, Sweden, Norway and, should regulations permit, from Germany. Under the arrangement which Mr. POSEY and I have reached I shall be compensated on a commission basis, as that is specified in Departmental Order No. 811 which you forwarded to me; that is, on a space or article basis."

On May 21, 1940, Passport #660915 was amended for WINSTON BURDETT, who at that time listed his foreign address as Grand Hotel, Stockholm, Sweden. This action taken by the American Vice Consul, F. C. SIGMOND, at Stockholm, amended BURDETT's passport for "valid for one single journey to Esthonia, Latvia, Russia, Rumania, Bulgaria and Turkey. Traveling on a vessel or plane of a non-belligerent country, unless such vessel or plane is not reasonably available. War Correspondent."

On Jane 21, 1940, BURDETT'S passport #660915 was amended by the American Vice Consul, FREDERICK D. HUNT, at Bucharest, Rumania. This amendment was for its "validation for travel in the following countries in connection with my newspaper work: Rumania, Yugoslavia, Hungary, Italy, Bulgaria, Turkey, Greece, Spain, Portugal, and travel on vessels of neutral countries. At that time BURDETT listed his foreign address as Athecee Palace, Bucharest.

On December 11, 1940, BURDETT's passport #660915 was validated by the American Vice Consul, at Belgrade, J. L. CAINAN. This validation was for six months until June 6, 1941, for Yugoslavia, Germany, Holland, Belgium, France, Switzerland, Bulgaria, Turkey, U.S.S.R., and Italy, for newspaper work. At that time BURDETT listed his foreign address as c/o Hotel Srpski Kralj, Belgrade, Yugoslavia.

On January 28, 1941, BURDETT's passport #660915 was validated by the American Vice Consul at Belgrade, Yugoslavia, J. L. CAINAN. This validation was until June 6, 1941, for Yugoslavia, Holland, Belgium, Turkey and U.S.S.R. for newspaper work. At that time BURDETT listed his foreign address as the Hotel Srpski Kralj, Belgrade.

On April 18, 1941, Passport #231 was issued to WINSTON BURDETT at the American Consulate at Istanbul, Turkey. At that time BURDETT stated that since 1940 to the date of the issuance of this passport he had resided at Sweden, Yugoslavia, Rumania and Turkey; that his legal residence was No. 2 Grace Court, Brooklyn, New York. He stated that he was married On July 28, 1940, to IEA SCHIAVI who was born at Borgosesia, Italy, March 2, 1907, and who was not an American citizen. He stated that she was residing at Ankara Palas Hotel, Ankara, Turkey.

WINSTON EUROFIT stated that his father, OWEN LONG BURDETT, and his mother, ELIZABETH WHITE, were both residing at No. 2 Grace Court, Brooklyn, New York; that his father was born April 6, 1881, at Wakefield, Massachusetts, and his mother was born August 19, 1878, at San Francisco, California.

This particular passport listed as countries to be visited, Turkey, Russia, Iran, Iraq, Syria, Palestine, India, Burma and China for journalistic work.

On April 18, 1941, this particular passport was amended by the American Embassy, at Ankara, Turkey, to be valid to October 18, 1941, for residence in Turkey and Soviet Union, Iran, Iraq, Syria, Palestine, India, and British ports, Burma and China, for journalistic work.

On October 7, 1941, this passport was amended by the American Embassy at Ankara, Turkey, to be valid to February 6, 1942 - "Turkey for residence and Soviet Union, Iran, Iraq, Syria, Palestine, Egypt, India, and British ports, Burma and China for journalistic work."

On January 26, 1942, BURDETT executed an Application for Renewal of Passport, before the American Vice Consul at Tehran, Iran, and the passport was renewed to expire February 6, 1944. At that time BURDETT stated he represented the Columbia Broadcasting System. He listed his foreign address as Hotel Ferdowsi, Teheran.

On September 20, 1942, the American Consulate at Cairo, Egypt, extended EURDETT's passport for six months to be valid until March 30, 1943. At that time BURDETT listed his foreign address as Shepheard's Hotel, Cairo, Egypt.

On November 6, 1945, Passport #124-FS-113124 was issued to WINSTON BURDETT at Rome, Italy. At that time BURDETT stated he was then residing at 1 Via Toscana, Rome, Italy. He stated that he had resided in France and England from July, 1936, to August, 1936; Europe, Africa and Asia, from February, 1940, to the date of this most recent passport.

At that time he stated he was last married on July 1, 1945, to GIORGINA NATHAN, who was born at London, England, on and who was not an American citizen. At that time he stated that his parents were then residing at Brattleboro, Vermont.



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This passport was valid for travel to Great Britain, France, Spain, Portugal, Italy, Switzerland, Poland, Hungary, Roumania, Yugoslavia, Bulgaria, Greece, Albania, the USSR, Egypt, N. Africa, Palestine, Syria, and Turkey as a correspondent.

In connection with this passport, the files of the Department of State contained a communication dated November 3, 1945, from the Detachment "A", Public Relations Section, Mediterranean Theater of Operations, APO-512, to the U. S. Consul, at Rome, Italy. This communication stated that WINSTON BURDETT, accredited to that Theater, and representing the Columbia Broadcasting System, had been asked by his home office to cover a great deal of territory in Europe, Africa, and the Middle East. In view of that, the communication stated, "it was the desire of his office that the passport of Mr. BURDETT be validated for the following countries: Great Britain, France, Spain, Portugal, Italy, Switzerland, Poland, Hungary, Roumania, Yugoslavia, Bulgaria, Greece, Abania, the USSR, Egypt, N. Africa, Palestine, Syria and Turkey."

On March 23, 1946, this passport was amended by the American Consulate at Rome to include travel to necessary countries to the United States.

The files of the Passport Division, Department of State, disclosed that on March 1, 1948, THEODORE F. KOOP, Director of News Broadcasts, Columbia Broadcasting System, directed a letter to the Department of State, advising that the CBS was sending BURDETT to Europe as a foreign correspondent. In this letter it was stated that it was desired to get BURDETT's passport validated for Great Britain, France, Italy, Greece, Egypt, Palestine, Yugoslavia, Czechoslovakia, Romania, and Hungary. The files of the Passport Division disclosed that this passport was renewed on March 1, 1948.

Passport #2808-FS-279522 was issued on October 25, 1949, to WINSTON BURDETT by the American Consulate at Rome, Italy. At that time BURDETT stated he was residing at Via Veneto 7, Rome, Italy, and that his wife, GIORGINA NATHAN was also residing with him in Rome. BURDETT stated he was married on July 1, 1945, to GIORGINA NATHAN who was born February 24, 1921, in London, England. This passport was for "All countries" and his occupation was listed as journalist. The passport application listed as references: Mr. EDWARD R. MURROW, c/o CBS, 485 Madison Avenue, NYC, and Mr. T. WELLSCHURCH, c/o CBS, 485 Madison Avenue, New York City.

The files of Washington another government agency engaged in conducting personnel and intelligence investigations, disclosed that Mrs. LEA BURDETT, wife of WINSTON BURDETT, had been killed on April 24, 1942, near Miandoab, Iran. These files disclosed that Mrs. BURDETT at the time of being murdered was in an automobile driven by ASSATUR CRASGIAN, Chauffeur, Miss ZINANACHAYAN, an interpreter, a young Kurd, named SEYFADDIN, an uncle of SEYFADDIN, and a policeman. According to the files of

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
the chauffeur, ASSATUR GRASGIAN, in giving his explanation of the murder, stated that he felt that the Kurds, who had been responsible for the murder of Mrs. BURDETT, were after the young Kurd who was with Mrs. BURDETT's party and that robbery was not the motive for the murder.

Files of disclosed that Miss ZINA ACHAYAN, the interpreter who was with Mrs. BURDETT at the time of her murder, also thought that the Kurds who had caused Mrs. BURDETT's car to be halted and had then shot her were after the young Kurd who was with the party.

following the death of his wife. It was stated that Mr. BURDETT was convinced that the murder of his wife was not accidental but was deliberate. This belief of BURDETT's according to the files of was shared to a certain extent by the Soviet Consul General and the Governor General. It was stated that the fact that the young Kurd, SEYFADDIN, who was in the company of Mrs. BURDETT was not killed, although he alone was facing five marauding Kurds, might point to other motives than that of a tribal feud. Further it was stated that "a strange statement made by the murderer at the time of the preliminary investigation that 'no one had ordered him to shoot Mrs. BURDETT' was also significant."

It was stated that a representative of had spoken with the Soviet Consul General, who assured the representative that he would consult Russian Major General MELNIK to ascertain if the Red Army could conduct an investigation of the case independently of the Iranian authorities. The Soviet Consul General declared that he would in the interest of the security of the Red Army insist that the investigation of the murder be conducted with vigor and that if an alien hand were at work on the case it would be most assuredly uncovered.

The files of disclosed that WINSTON BURDETT had explained that his wife, IRA, had had political enemies arising out of her position as Head of the Anti-Fascist League in Iran. BURDETT stated that the latter organization was small but perhaps sufficiently annoying to the Axis powers in that strategic and vital area to warrant her assassination!



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of the Columbia Broadcasting System, Washington, D.C., advised following a check of the files maintained by CBS that they could locate no copy in Washington, D.C., of the radio program of WINSTON BURDETT for August 28, 1946.

With reference to Doctor STEFAN LITAUER and MIECZYSIAW WICHCZEK, mentioned above, the following background information is being set forth:

#### DOCTOR STEFAN LITAUER

The Diplomatic List for January, 1946, carried for the first time the name of STEFAN LITAUER, as the Polish Minister Plenipotentiary, Counselor of the Embassy. The December, 1946, issue of this Diplomatic List is the last issue to reflect this individual's name as the Polish Minister in the United States.

A news article which appeared in the Washington "Sunday Star" of December 9, 1945, by KATHARINE M. BROOKS, discussed the reopening of the Polish Embassy in Washington, D.C., with OSKAR/IANCE as the newly appointed Ambassador. Mention was made in this article of Doctor STEFAN LITAUER as the Minister Counselor. It was stated that LITAUER had had a career in the diplomatic service of his country for some years before entering the field of journalism. It was stated that he had been Chief of the London Bureau of the Polish News Agency for fifteen years until he had disagreed with the Polish Government in London when he resigned that post. It was stated he then became a member of the Staff of the London "News Chronicle" and was connected with the News Chronicle for some time, until the establishing of the present Polish Government when he accepted the post in the Embassy at Washington, D.C. It was claimed that LITAUER was a widower and that his only son, CAZIMIR, was then in the Polish Consular Service after serving with the Polish Army.

TOWNS AS

.in 1945, when LITAUER returned to Poland. Informant stated that LITAUER had formerly been connected with the London Government in Exile as Assistant to STANISLAW KOT, the former Polish Minister for Propaganda, in the London Government.

The informant mentioned that he did not know who had been responsible for LITAUER's switch to the present Polish government but that the latter remained in Warsaw from July, 1945, to the latter days of December, 1945, helping OSKAR LANCE, the newly appointed Polish Ambassador to the United States, in establishing the new Embassy in the United

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Washington remarked that LITAUER came to the United States with the title of Minister Plenipotentiary, and remained until December, 1946, when he was recalled to Poland.

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and that this attitude was caused not only by political convictions but by personal reasons.

Informant remarked that it was his opinion that LITAUER was recalled to Poland because his views were well known with respect to the "left wing groups" and because LITAUER did not enjoy close personal relations with the Polish Ambassador, at that time OSKAR IANCE. Washington mentioned that LITAUER at the present time is in Poland and is engaged in carrying on radio broadcasts regarding political matters and every day affairs.

MIECZYSIAW WIONCZEK

The files of the Foreign Agents Registration Section, Department of Justice, disclosed that MIRCZYSIAW WIONCZEK had registered on January 28, 1948, as an Agent for a foreign principal. At that time WIONCZEK listed his position as the American Representative of the Polish Press News Agency (Pappress), 50 Rockefeller Plaza, New York, New York.

At that time in describing the activities in which he was engaged in the interest of his foreign principal, WIONCZEK listed that as set forth in his original registration statement and in supplemental statements filed in behalf of the Polish Press News Agency, he served as the American Representative of this agency. He listed that he

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conducted a news and information service for the United States of America, Canada, Mexico, and Brazil Press, involving the receipt of press correspondence via mail and cable from the foreign principal and engaged in the preparation and distribution of such material for publication in the Press of the United States of America, Canada, Mexico, and Brazil, and the sending of news cables and mail correspondence to the foreign principal for publication in the Press of the Republic of Poland

An examination of the "Supplemental Registration Statement" executed by WIONCZEK on January 31, 1951, for the six months ending December 31, 1950, disclosed that WIONCZEK stated that his foreign principal was the Polish Press Agency (Pappress), the News Agency of the Government of the Polish Republic at Warsaw, Poland. At that time the activities of the registrant were listed as the sending of the news cables and mail correspondence to the foreign principal for publication in the Press of the Republic of Poland.

in 1945, at which time the latter was a newsman accredited to the Four Power Allied Command in Berlin, Germany. At that time he was also employed by a Polish Weekly, Przekroj, and by the Polish Press News Agency. The informant described this latter organization as the government owned and controlled Press Agency for the Republic of Poland. Informant stated that he had never known WICHCZEK to have been a member of the Communist Party during that period, and that during World War II WIONCZEK was engaged in the buying and selling of second-hand books on the black market. The informant remarked that after WIONCZEK received an appointment to the United States as Director of the Polish Press News Agency, he appeared to be eager to follow the Communist Party line in reporting activities in the United States. However, informant remarked that in the last few years WICKCZEK has taken a different viewpoint of affairs in this country and has impressed the informant as being definitely anti-Communist at this time. Informant added that in his opinion WICKCZEK would like to remain in the UnitedStates, rather than return to Poland if recalled. (U)

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Washington of known reliability, advised that he had known MIECZYSIAW WICKCZEK in Warsaw, Poland, during World War II at which time the latter was engaged in buying and selling of books on the black market. The informant remarked that to his knowledge WIONCZEK had no political affiliations during that era.

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SECHET

at that time considered WIONCZEK to be pro-Soviet in his viewpoint, however, the informant remarked that for the past three or four years WIONCZEK appeared to have formed a different concept of the meaning of political affairs in this country. As a censequence, according to the informant, WICKCZEK is at this time anti-Soviet and anti-Communist. The informant mentioned that in his opinion neither WIONCZEK nor his wife, TERESA, desire to return to Poland but prefer to remain in the United States


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DETAILS:

Confidential Informant of known reliability, advised on March 19, 1942, that WINSTON BURDETT supported the Communist leadership of the New York Newspaper Guild, and was either a member of the Communist Party or a close sympathizer.


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The records of Confidential Informant a former Government agency, reflected that in 1939, DORETTA TARMON gave the name of WINSTON EURDETT, 5 Montague Street, Brooklyn, New York, as a reference.

Confidential Informant of known reliability, advised on July 25, 1945, that DORETTA TARMON was a member of the Communist Party.

Confidential Informant of known reliability, advised on January 20, 1951, that DORETTA TARMON was a member of the Communist Party.

Copies of the publication, "New Masses" prior to August 26, 1947, reflected that DORETTA TARMON was a field director for this publication.



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advised that

had fought with the Abraham Lincoln Brigade in Spain, and that he had last heard from him during the late 1939's or 1940's from Yugoslavia.

received a letter from him sometime during 1939 or 1940 postmarked Geneva, Switzerland, at which time he indicated he was writing for some newspaper.

reflected that he was a Communist. also expressed the belief was a Communist.

Confidential Informant of known reliability, advised on September 28, 1945 that the notebook of IGNACY SAMUEL WITCZAK contained the name of BURDET, 2 Grace Court, Brooklyn, New York, MAin 4-5962.

IGOR GOUZENKO, former code clerk of the USSR Embassy in Ottowa, Canada, advised in 1945 that a Soviet espionage agent was studying at some university in Los Angeles under the name of IGNATZ WETCZAK. This unknown individual was subsequently determined to be using the name of IGNACY SAMUEL WITCZAK.

WITCZAK disappeared from the United States in November, 1945. In January, 1946, his wife, who was using the name of BUNIA WITCZAK, also disappeared.

advised on January 23, 1946 that he was an acquaintance of WINSTON BURDETT. He stated that the 'Latter formerly worked for the "Brooklyn Eagle".

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WINSTON BURDETT'S address, 2 Grace Court, Brooklyn, advised that WITCZAK did not see BURDETT.

house at 2 Grace Court, Brooklyn, advised that OWENGBURDETT and his wife resided at 2 Grace Court for three or four years prior to July, 1945, and that they moved to 10 Greene Street, Brattleboro, Vermont. He stated that the BURDETTS had a son whom he believed was a commentator working for the United States Army in Italy.

Confidential Informant of known reliability, advised that on October 4, 1945 the WITCZAKS had in their possession a letter dated December 15, 1941 from ELIZABETH W., BURDETT (Mrs. OWEN L., BURDETT) 2 Grace Court, Brooklyn, New York, to Mrs. BUNIA WITCZAK. In this letter, Mrs. BURDETT mentioned the "little visit" which she and her husband had with BUNIA WITCZAK.

She then mentioned that they were very worried because they had not heard from and inquired as to whether BUNIA had heard from him.

Confidential Informant of known reliability, advised that as of October 17, 1938, OWEN L. BURDETT and his wife, ELIZABETH, resided at 2 Grace Court, Brooklyn, and had formerly resided at 8409 Talbot Street, Kew Gardens, Long Island. OWEN BURDETT had been employed as an outside plant engineer by the New York Telephone Company for many years.

Confidential Informant of known reliability, advised on October 15, 1945 that OWEN BURDETT and his wife had quite a sizeable library of books on Russia, as well as many pro-Soviet publications.

Confidential Informant, of known reliability, advised that as of October, 1945 and February and March, 1946, WINSTON BURDETT'S address was care of Press Attache Office, United States Embassy #1, APO 512, Care of Postmaster, New York.

ELIZABETH TERRILL BENTLEY, a self-confessed former Soviet espionage agent who acted as a courier for the Soviet agent, JACOB GOLOS, executed a signed statement on November 30, 1945 in which she stated that sometime in the Summer of 1939 GOLOS told her that if she received any letters from Canada, they would be for him, and that she was to deliver them to him. These letters kept coming from Canada over a period of about six months.

Miss BENTLEY recalled that during the same period she received cablegrams from WINSTON BURDETT. GOLOS informed her that he had been in communication with BURDETT, but that he had told BURDETT to cable Miss BENTLEY whenever he changed his address.

Miss BENTLEY advised that BURDETT at that time was traveling in Europe, and that she recalled having received several cablegrams from him which indicated his location. She stated that she turned these cablegrams over to GOLOS as per instructions.

Miss BENTLEY had previously advised on November 10, 1945, that in either 1942, or 1943, she received mail from WINSTON BURDETT and several other people. This mail was in fact for GOLOS, and when these letters arrived, she turned them over to GOLOS. She stated that she never examined these letters, and is not familiar with their contents.

She further advised that GOLOS never apprised her of the nature of the correspondence he received from these individuals.

Miss BENTLEY stated that WINSTON BURDETT in 1945, was employed by one of the large broadcasting hook-ups, and she believed that he was a commentator located somewhere in Europe, being heard daily on the "News Around the World" program.

Confidential Informant of known reliability, advised in November, 1945, that BURDETT had recently been stationed in Italy, and on numerous occasions was known to have made the broadcasts which were critical of Allied and American military policies in Italy.

He had painted a dark picture of the economic and food situations in Italy, and had indicated that the type of policies applied by merican military authorities would never lend themselves to the improvement of Italian-American relations.

The informant also advised that during 1940 it was learned that MANFRED ZAPP of Transocean News Service sent a cable to Berlin requesting that WINSTON BURDETT, then a correspondent for Transradiopress in Sweden, and who was en route to Oslo, Norway, be extended the same courtesies by the German authorities as was being extended to correspondents of the Associated and United Press.

The following information concerning WINSTON BURDETT was obtained from the 1943 edition of "Current Biography", published by H. W. WILSON, New York City:

BURDETT was born on December 12, 1913 at Buffalo, New York. He attended Trinity School in New York City, and later went to Harvard University where he specialized in Romance Languages. He established a brilliant record at Harvard by completing his studies in three years, graduating Magna Cum Laude at the age of 19. He later, during the years 1933-1934, took post-graduate work in Italian at Columbia University, New York City.

Since his graduation from school, BURDETT'S entire career has been in the newspaper field. His first position was on the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" where he worked for six years as a reporter, columnist and associate editor of "Trend", the paper's Sunday supplement.

In his "Eagle" column, "The Sound Track", BURDETT aired his comments and reflections on the motion picture industry. He was chiefly interested in analysing and evaluating the Hollywood attitude toward contemporary issues and problems, particularly with regard to their awareness of social problems.

During his employment on the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle", BURDETT served his colleagues in a number of ways. He was chairman of the Grievance Committee of the local unit of the Newspaper Guild; delegate to the Guild's Representative Assembly; chairman of the Guild's Election Committee, and a member of the Strake Committee. According to his associates, he devoted considerable effort and ability to his activities of the Newspaper Guild.

Shortly after the outbreak of World War II, BURDETT was assigned to Sweden by the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" to cover the war at Scandinavia as a roving reporter. His work for the "Brooklyn Eagle" subsequently obtained for him contracts with Trans-Radio Press and the Columbia Broadcasting System.

In February, 1940, he sailed for the Finnish capital, whence he was to proceed to Sweden; originally, he was supposed to remain abroad for six months, depending upon developments. He planned to mail his eye-witness accounts to the "Eagle", thereby providing the newspaper with an exclusive feature. Subsequently, Trans-Radio Press made him head of its Scandinavian Staff, after which the Columbia Broadcasting System obtained him as one of its Foreign Correspondents and radio commentator.

Following his Scandinavian assignment, BURDETT went to Bucharest via Moscow. In Bucharest he met LEA SCHIANI, an Italian journalist from Milan, Italy, and married her. (While on a photographic assignment for "PM" in Northern Iran in April, 1942, Mrs. BURDETT was killed by a band of Kurds).

As Foreign Correspondent for the Columbia Broadcasting System, BURDETT used to broadcast to the United States every Sunday evening in a CBS roundup of Foreign Capitals. In October, 1940, however, he was given five days in which to leave Roumania. He was ordered out of the country by the Nazis because he had discovered and reported Nazi infiltration into Roumania. His reports of unrest in Italy, such as the 1941 riots in Milan and other Northern Italian cities, next led to his expulsion from Yugoskvia.

BURDETT covered the local situations in Ankara, Turkey, and Cairo, Egypt, for CBS before going to North Africa, prior to the American invasion. In North Africa he reported a great deal on the details of the Giroud-De Gaulle controversy. While BURDETT'S sympathies were obviously on the side of the Free French, he eagerly, according to his broadcast, hoped for a rapprochement between the two generals. He optimistically held General GIROUD'S speech in March, 1943, as, "The fine speech in favor of Democracy" and looked forward to the eventual union of French forces.

In the Summer of 1943, BURDETT covered the Allied invasion of Sicily, and in the Autumn of that year he was again broadcasting from Algiers.

BURDETT'S biographer concluded that little seems to be known of BURDETT as a person, probably because he has thought it both unnecessary and ostentatious to have himself publicized. His associates on the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" recall him as "a quiet sort of fellow, one whom you would never expect to say much." It is to be noted that a picture of BURDETT is obtainable, in the event the same is necessary, in the publication mentioned above.

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Confidential Informant of known reliability advised in 1946, that WINSTON BURDETT was originally employed by the Columbia Broadcasting System in 1941, while he was in Italy. Since that time he has been broadcasting news events and comments from European capitals chiefly centered around the Mediterranean area. At the present time, (1946), according to BURDETT broadcasts several times a week in a world-news roundup program from Cairo, Egypt.

Prior to this, considerable of BURDETT'S time had been spent at Ankara. Since the time of his original employment, BURDETT has not returned to the United States although it is expected that he will do so for routine purposes within the not too immediate future.

The informant further advised that they have never received any complaints concerning the substance of news comments and opinions as broadcast by BURDETT. He has confined himself chiefly to the obtaining of news features. He has also appeared quite sincere in his broadcast, although caustic at times when the occasion demanded it.

Amording to a news item appearing in the "New York Times" on April 27, 1942, Mrs. LEA SCHIANI BURDETT, wife of WINSTON BURDETT, and a correspondent for the New York newspaper, "PM", was shot and killed by a band of Kurds in Northern Iran on April 26, 1942. According to this same

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article, Mrs. BURDETT, of Italian birth, was about 32 years of age. She met BURDETT in Bucharest, Roumania, where she was writing for an Italian newspaper. They were married in Sofia, Bulgaria, in July, 1940. Because of alleged anti-Fascist sympathies, Mrs. BURDETT was expelled from Bucharest in 1940, at which time the Italian government cancelled her passport and visas.

In a news item of October 16, 1940 in the "New York Times", datelined Bucharest, Roumania, it was noted that BURDETT, a reporter for CBS, was ordered to leave Roumania in five days. His wife was included in the expulsion order.

A further news item appearing in the "New York Times" of January 31, 1941, datelined Berne, Switzerland, reported that BURDETT was barred from the use of the international telephone by decree of the Yugoslav Ministry because of his anti-Italian representations in reporting disorders in Northern Italy.

**57C-**Registrar's Office, Columbia University, advised that BURDETT took post-graduate studies in Italian from September, 1933 to June, 1934 at Columbia. At this time his address was 8409 Talbot Street, Kew Gardens, New York City. His father was named as OWEN L.BURDETT, of the same address.

> Confidential Informant of known reliability, who in 1945 was connected with the UNNRA, advised that WINSTON BURDETT was the Columbia Broadcasting System man in Rome.

> Confidential Informant of known reliability, advised that on March 26, 1947, ABRAM FLAXER, president of the United Public Workers of America, CIO, and Congressman RICHARD NIXON, appeared on a CBS radio program directed by this subject. This program dealt with the Government's Loyalty Program. FLAXER spoke in opposition to the Loyalty Program.

Confidential Informant of known reliability, advised in November, 1948 that HENRY STUART HUGHES, the grandson of the former Chief Justice of the United States Supreme Court, had had prepared for publication a manuscript concerned with international events which offered a philosophy which attempted to determine a solution to the conflict between the United States and the USSR.

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This manuscript, according to the informant, was marked principally by its efforts to rationalize foreign and international policy on the basis of the theories of KARL MARX. In the forward to this manuscript, HUGHES described himself as a Marxist.

The informant advised that certain personal contacts of HUGHES were to be solicited for review opinions to further the sale of the book. Stated that among these contacts of HUGHES, was WINSTON BURDETT, radio commentator for the Columbia Broadcasting System.

Confidential Informant of known reliability, advised that

The "Daily Worker" issue of April 28, 1949, page seven, column five, contained an article entitled, "CBS Reporters Find Polk Trial A Rigged Deal." This article stated that WINSTON BURDETT and ALEXANDER RENDRICK, of CBS, who covered the POLK murder trial in Salonika, Greece, corroborated the charge of the Free Greece radio that the trial was a rigged farce.

The correspondents were quoted as having cabled that "Communism rather than a certain Mr. STAKTOPOLOUS is on trial."

Confidential Informant of unknown reliability, advised that ALEXANDER KENDRICK was known to have associated with a number of Communist Party members in Philadelphia, and was considered to be in sympathy with the Communist Party cause.

Confidential Informant of known reliability, advised that KENDRICK had been a contributor to "New Masses", which publication was described by the House Committee on Un-American Activities on March 29, 1944, Pages 48 and 75, as a "nationally circulated weekly journal of the Communist Party."

The informant also advised that KENDRICK had written an article which appeared in the "PM" newspaper on September 4, 1947 in which he praised the "New Poland."

Another article by KENDRICK which appeared in "PM" on January 18, 1948 praised the Soviet Armenians.

A pamphlet entitled, "A Round Table Report by CBS World Correspondents Broadcast on January 1, 1950, 5:00 - 5:45 p.m., EST, Over the CBS" reflects that WINSTON BURDETT introduced himself on this broadcast by saying, "I am WINSTON BURDETT. My home is Brattleboro, Vermont. Present assignment and address: Rome, Italy, by way of the Balkans and the Middle East, India, Cairo, the Desert Campaign, North Africa, Anzio, the Fifth Army, and Washington, D. C."

Confidential Informant of known reliability, advised on April 20, 1951 that WINSTON BURDETT has been on the talent payroll of CBS since February, 1946, and that he is not an employee of CBS but is rather under contract to that company.

The informant advised that BURDETT is presently in New York City, and is listed as one of CBS' analysts and reporters.



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



The Informant suggested, in view of this fact, that the subject's broadcast possibly fid not emanate from New York City, but this program may have been broadcast from another Columbia Broadcasting System affiliated station.

August 28, 1951, contained the following information concerning the subject:

By report dated May 3, 1951 it is reflected that WINSTON BURDETT and his wife, GEORGINA, had resided in Apartment 12-D at 430 East 63rd Street, New York City, since May 1, 1951. His rental was indicated to be in the amount of \$4,000 per year. The subject had previously resided in a \$200 per month two-room suite at the Hotel Cladstone, 114 East 52nd Street, New York City, having moved to that address on April 16, 1951. Other previous addresses for the subject include Rome, Italy; London, England; and Washington, D.C. Details concerning these latter addresses, however, are not listed.

The subject is described in these credit files as being 42 or 43 years of age, married, and with no known dependents. It is reflected that he has been employed as a news commentator by the CBS, 485 Madison Avenue, New York City, since 1940 at an approximate income of \$10,000 per year.

BURDETT is well known in his profession as a foreign correspondent and news analyst, according to these credit records, and has broadcast over CBS for a number of years. He was formerly a foreign correspondent for over six years and prior to that time had been a correspondent in London and other cities abroad.

The records of the Credit Bureau of Greater New York further reflect that the subject and his wife have maintained a joint account in the Chemical Bank, 51st Street, New York City, since May, 1946.

On August 23, 1951 ELIZABETH TERRELL SENTLEY, a self-confessed former Soviet espionage agent, who acted as a courier for the Soviet agent JACOB GOLOS, advised SA that she had never met BURDETT either at Columbia University or as a contact of GOLOS. She related, however, that GOLOS was in contact with BURDETT and when BURDETT went abroad in the latter part of 1938 or

the early part of 1939, GOLOS arranged that BURDETT should maintain contact with him by sending communications to her under the name of ELIZABETH BENTON at 18 Grove Street, New York City, where she, RENTLEY, was residing at that time.

ELIZABETH BENTLEY advised that she subsequently received two or three cablegrams from BURDETT, which she then turned over to GOLOS. These cablegrams advised of BURDETT'S whereabouts in Europe. She stated that she is unable to recall the dates when these cablegrams were received, but believes they were received sometime between December, 1938 and December, 1940, during which period she remained at 18 Grove Street, New York City.

missed connections with his contact in Europe since she was later asked by GOLOS to telephone BURDETT'S mother at the latter's home in Brooklyn for the purpose of learning BURDETT'S whereabouts. GOLOS told BENTLEY that she was to tell BURDETT'S mother that she, BENTLEY, was a fellow member with BURDETT in the Newspaper Guild. BENTLEY said that she made such an inquiry and was given the subject's address by his mother.

The subject apparently made connections with his contacts in Europe, according to BENTLEY, since she did not hear from him after December, 1940.

ELIZABETH BENTLEY also recalled that GOLOS advised her at one time that BURDETT was married to a girl in Europe, possibly in Rumania. She added that GOLOS subsequently told her BURDETT'S wife met death under rather tragic circumstances. ELIZABETH BENTLEY said she was not aware of the nationality of BURDETT'S wife and she does not know the circumstances of her death.

ELIZABETH BENTLEY was unable to furnish additional information concerning the subject.

LOUIS F. BUDENZ, a former Communist Party functionary and Managing Editor of the "Daily Worker", an

East Coast daily Communist newspaper, advised SA on August 24, 1951, after viewing a photograph of the subject, that he was once introduced to WINSTON BURDETT but he is unable to recall the date or circumstances of this introduction. BUDENZ said that he is further unable to recall whether or not the subject was introduced to him as a Communist.

The Informant has no knowledge of BURDETT'S present political beliefs, but stated that the subject was one of the instigators of the strike against the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" in the late 1930s. BURDETT and his parents, according to the Informant, were very proud of their Communistic affiliations at the time they resided in Brocklyn.

#### BACKGROUND

By letter to the Director dated August 31, 1951, Burdett enclosed a signed copy of a loyalty questionnaire submitted to his employer, the Columbia Broadcasting Company and a copy of a cover letter which he sent to his chief at C.B.S., Mr. T. Wells Chunch, Editor-in-Chief of C.B.S. News, wherein he admitted membership in the Communist Party from August, 1937 to January, 1940. In his letter to the Director, Burdett stated "I shall, of course, be ready to answer any questions you may have regarding the circumstances, if that is required. And I shall naturally be at your disposal to furnish further information, should you so desire."

In view of the fact that Burdett has paved the way for an interview with him, which is desirable at this time, it is believed that the New York Office should be advised of the correspondence from Burdett and instructed to contact him immediately, at which time they should acknowledge his letter of August 31, and conduct an exhaustive interview to develop pertinent facts concerning his Communist Party activities, his relations with Golos, Elizabeth Bentley, Ignacy Samuel Witczak and wife Bunia and other pertinent data which he may furnish. It is believed that an oral acknowledgment of his letter is preferable to a written acknowledgment inasmuch as he may use a written acknowledgment for some self-serving purpose ORDED

#### BACK FROUND:

The 1943 edition of "Current Biography" reflects that Burdett was born 12-12-13 at Buffalo, New York. He attended Trinity School, New York City, and Harvard University. He studied Italian at Columbia University in 1933-34.

Since his graduation from school Burdett's career has been in the newspaper field. His first job was on the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle." He was later employed by Trans-Radio Press and by the Columbia Broadcasting System, working mostly in Europe.

### INFORMATION IN BUREAU FILES:

Burdett is the subject of a case entitled "Winston Mansfield Burdett, Espionage - R, Internal Security Act of 1950. (100-376050)

This case is pending and New York is the Office of Orgin.

Investigation is based upon information from Elizabeth T. Fentley that around 1939 Jacab Golos, her espionage superior, told her that he was in communication with Burdett and that he had told Burdett to advise Bentley whenever he changed addresses.

Investigation has reflected information at New York that Burdett supported the Communist leadership of the New York Newspaper Guild and was either a Party member or a close sympathizer.

Burdett's name was found in the notebook of espionage agent Ignacy Samuel/Witczak in 1945.

Miss Bentley also furnished information that Burdett, while traveling in Europe, had sent her several cablegrams indicating his location, and had also sent her mail, all of which she turned over to Golos.

The last report in MAEXED cases was receptued from Washington, dated 8-16-51, and reflected that government agencies contained no additional pertinent information concerning Burdett.



Dear Ted:

If I have delayed so long in filling out and sending to you the enclosed loyalty form, it is simply because this is, for me, an extremely unpleasant task. One naturally puts off the disagreeable; and in this case, it is more than that, it is plainly and painfully embarrassing.

In all events, here it is. I do not know what I should add to what I have set down in the questionnaire, except to say that the beliefs and practices of Communism, and the ends and methods of the Communist Party are as abhorrent to me as to anyone I know-having learned about them, myself, the foolish way. Even though the experience now seems part of a distant past, I still have to suppress a kind of guilt complex on the subject, and so it is with something like relief that I have put down the facts on paper.

I do not wish to tire you with an apology. At the same time I feel that I owe to you, personally, a more personal explanation. Looking back, it sometimes seems incredible to me now that I was once a Communist Party member. I was working at the time at the Brooklyn Daily Eagle; it was the period when the Newspaper Guild was breaking ground in the New York newspaper world; I myself joined—with zeal—in the work of Guild organization; and in this enterprise, obviously, the Communists played a very active part. To a young person, especially, Communist notions first present themselves in idealistic guise; and it was not until afterwards that I realized what the organization was. In fact, all about, and how dishonest it was, both morally and intellectually, in both its professions and its methods. Lord knows that recent history has made these things obvious to the most simple-minded. But in my case, at the time, they became obvious only after I had met them, at first hand.

As you know, this kind of experience is far from uncommon; others have gone over much the same path; it is, in fact, by now,

a rather banal story. I have really nothing to plead in my defense except, perhaps, that I was then many years younger than I am now, and that I came soon enough to abjure the ideas I had accepted.

There is just one further thing that I should like to say in this letter. I realize that this is going to involve no little embarrassment for you, and for this I am deeply sorry. Having worked for C.B.S. as well and as loyally as I know how, I would be less than loyal now if I should try to avoid the issue. And by that token, I wish to assure you that I shall respect whatever decision you may make in the matter.

Again, I regret the difficulties that all this may mean for you, both personally and as Editor-in-Chief.

1940. During this time, I was employed by the Brooklyn Daily Eagle, Brooklyn, N.Y.; and I was a member of the Brooklyn Eagle unit of the Communist Party. Into was a period in which the Newspaper della or new lock personnel of the New York daily newspapers; it was likewise a period that marked the ascendance of the Communists within the Guild organization. My own

party activities, like those of other party members at the Brobklyn Eagle, were directed to Guild and Guild shop matters, i.e., to organizing and expanding the Guild membership, handling of "grievances" and negotiating of Guild contracts with the Eagle management. The major effort of the Eagle Guild during this period (an effort in which the Communists played a leading part) was a three-month strike at the Eagle, from September to December 1937.

I quit the Communist Party for very simple reasons which must now seem all too obvious: because, belatedly, after joining it, I came to know the methods and true purposes of the party, and what, in short, it was all about. In a word, I found its ends repugnant, its atmosphere fanatical and stifling, and its methods shot through with intellectual fraud and dishonesty. These things have been learned before: I learned them the foolhardy way, through direct experience; but in any case I learned them thoroughly, and once and for all.



The Bureau should be advised of the results of this interview promptly.

By letter dated October 16, 1951 the Albany Office advised that the subject's parents, OWEN L. BURDETT and ELIZABETH BURDETT, are presently residing at RFD 3, Guilford. Center, Vermont, and inquiry in that vicinity does not indicate that they are engaged in Communist activity. The Albany letter further reflects that in 1945 the name BURDETT, 2 Grace Court, Brooklyn, New York, telephone MA 4-5962, was contained in the notebook of IGNACY SAMUEL WITCZAK, and that the BURDETTS: home, 10 Green Street, Brattleboro, Vermont, contained a sizable library of books on Russia, as well as the customary pro-Russian publications. This latter information has been heretofore reported in captioned case.

It was stated in the Albany Office letter that in view of the fact the subject's mother and father are known to thave been in contact with a known Soviet espionage agent "the Albany Office would initiate a full scale investigation of Mr. and Mrs. OWEN DORDETT, unless advised to the contrary by the New York Office within five days.

It is being pointed out that the subject, WINSTON BURDETT, was interviewed at the New York Office on September 20, 1951, at which time he admitted having been a member of the Communist Party under the Party name PAUL STRICKLAND, while employed at the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle," Brooklyn, New York, and active in the Newspaper Guild from August, 1937 to January, 1940. A report setting forth the results of this interview is presently being prepared in the New York Office and a copy is being designated for the Albany Office for information purposes.

During the course of the above interview BURDETT stated that his parents had no knowledge of his Communist Party activities and would have opposed them had they known he INDEXED - 55 was so engaged.



The subject is presently on a two week vacation visiting his parents' home in Brattleboro, Vermont. He stated that he would inquire of his parents during this visit as to their knowledge of the WITCZAKS and would immediately advise the New York Office of the results of this inquiry upon his return to New York City.

In view of the information set forth herein it is being left to the discretion of the Albany Office as to whether or not a full scale investigation concerning Mr. and Mrs. OWEN BURDETT should be initiated. It is suggested, however, the Albany Office will perhaps desire to hold this matter in abeyance until the results of future contacts with WINSTON BURDETT are learned since it is contemplated that the subject will be questioned in detail with respect to his parents' activities during the course of subsequent contacts with him.



DETAILS: At New York, New York

The title of this case is being marked changed to reflect the alias of PAUL STRICKLAND, which name the subject stated he used as a Communist Party member from August 1937 to January 1940.

By personal letter dated August 31, 1951, the subject expressed a willingness to cooperate in answering any questions with regard to his Communist Party, USA membership between August 1937 and January 1940. This letter is set forth as follows:

"August 31, 1951

"Mr. J. Edgar Hoover Director Federal Bureau of Investigation Washington, D. C.

"Dear Sir:

"I feel it my duty and my inclination to send to you the two documents which I here enclose. They are signed copies of a loyalty questionnaire submitted to my employer, the Columbia Broadcasting System, and of a covering letter which I sent to my chief at C.B.S., Mr. T. Wells Church, Editor-in-Chief of C.B.S. News.

"Both documents were submitted in March of this year, at a time when I was on assignment abroad. I am now working at the C.B.S. News Department in New York City.

"I shall, of course, be ready to answer any questions you may have regarding the circumstances, if that is required. And I shall naturally be at your disposal to furnish further information, should you so desire.

"Very truly yours,

The cover letter to Mr. T. WELLS CHURCH, Editor-in-Chief of C.B.S. News, as mentioned in the subject's personal letter, reads as follows:

"March 12, 1951

"Mr. T. Wells Church Editor-in-Chief, CBS News Columbia Broadcasting System, Inc. 485 Madison Avenue New York, N. Y.

"Dear Ted:

"If I have delayed so long in filling out and sending to you the enclosed loyalty form, it is simply because this is, for me, an extremely unpleasant task. One naturally puts off the disagreeable; and in this case, it is more than that, it is plainly and painfully embarrassing.

"In all events, here it is. I do not know what I should add to what I have set down in the questionnaire, except to say that the beliefs and practices of Communism, and the ends and methods of the Communist Party are as abhorrent to me as to anyone I know-having learned about them, myself, the foolish way. Even though the experience now seems part of a distant past, I still have to suppress a kind of guilt complex on the subject, and so it is with something like relief that I have put down the facts on paper.

If do not wish to tire you with an apology. At the same time I feel that I owe to you, personally, a more personal explanation. Looking back, it sometimes seems incredible to me now that I was once a Communist Party member. I was working at the time at the Brooklyn Daily Eagle; it was the period when the Newspaper Guild was breaking ground in the New York newspaper world; I myself joined- with zeal- in the work of Guild organization; and in this enterprise, obviously, the Communists played a very active part. To a young person, especially, Communist notions first present themselves in idealistic guise; and it was not until afterwards that I realized what the organization was, in fact, all about, and how dishonest it was, both morally and intellectually, in both its professions and its methods. Lord knows that recent history has made these things obvious to the most simple-minded. But in my case, at the time, they became obvious only after I had met them, at first hand.

"As you know, this kind of experience, is far from uncommon; others have gone over much the same path; it is, in fact, by now, a rather banal story. I have really nothing to plead in my defense except, perhaps, that I was then many years younger than I am now, and that I came soon enough to abjure the ideas I had accepted.

"There is just one further thing that I should like to say in this letter. I realize that this is going to involve no little embarrassment for you, and for this I am deeply sorry. Having worked for C.B.S. as well and as loyally as I know how, I would be less than loyal now if I should try to avoid the issue. And by that token, I wish to assure you that I shall respect whatever decision you may make in the matter.

"Again, I regret the difficulties that all this may mean for you, both personally and as Editor-in-Chief.

On the C.B.S. Loyalty Questionnaire executed by BURDETT on March 12, 1951 and as mentioned by him in his personal letter of August 31, 1951, the subject answered "yes" in response to the question "Are you now, or have you ever been, a member of the Communist Party, USA, or any Communist organization?"

Under the heading "Details or explanations, if any," BURDETT stated as follows:

"I am not now, and have never been in any way associated with any subversive organization, or with any of the organizations on the consolidated list on the back of this page, with the exception stated below.

August, 1937 to January, 1940. During this time, I was employed by the Brooklyn Daily Eagle, Brooklyn, N.Y.; and I was a member of the Brooklyn Eagle unit of the Communist Party. This was a period in which the Newspaper Guild of New York was organizing the personnel of the New York daily newspapers; it was likewise a period that marked the ascendance of the Communists within the Guild organization. My own party activities, like those of other party members at the Brooklyn Eagle, were directed to Guild and Guild shop matters, i.e., to organizing and expanding the Guild membership, handling of "grievances" and negotiating of Guild contracts with the Eagle management. The major effort of the Eagle Guild during this period (an effort in which the Communists played a leading part) was a three-month strike at the Eagle, from September to December 1937.

"I quit the Communist Party for very simple reasons which must now seem all too obvious: because, belatedly, after

"joining it, I came to know the methods and true purposes of the party, and what, in short, it was all about. In a word, I found its ends repugnant, its atmosphere fanatical and stifling, and its methods shot through with intellectual fraud and dishonesty. These things have been learned before: I learned them the foolhardy way, through direct experience; but in any case I learned them thoroughly, and once and for all."

# PERSONAL INTERVIEW WITH WINSTON BURDETT

In accordance with WINSTON BURDETT'S willingness to cooperate as expressed in his letter of August 31, 1951, he was interviewed at the New York Office by the writer and on September 20, 1951.

# Background:

A Service of

December 13, 1913 at Buffalo, New York, the son of OWEN LONG DECEMber, father, born in Massachusetts, and ELIZABETH WHITE SURDETT, mother, born in San Francisco, both of whom currently reside on R.F.D. No. 3 at Brattleboro, Vermont. He has one sister, MARJORIE BURDETT Mackenzie, who presently resides in Chicago, Illinois.

When he was approximately seven or eight years of age, he moved with his family to New York, where he attended public school in the Bronx and later Trinity School in Manhattan. BURDETT received a Bachelor of Arts degree from Harvard University in 1933. From 1933 to 1934 he was engaged in graduate study of Romance Languages at Columbia University, although he never was awarded a Master of Arts degree.

His wife is GIORGINA SURDETT, nee NATHAN, whom he married in Rome, Italy July 1, 1945, and who is a British citizen, having been born in London. He added, however, that her father is an Italian subject and her mother is an Austrian subject, and that they both currently resided in Italy.

The subject stated that he had previously been married to LEA SCHIAVI, who was killed in Iran in April 1942.

### Employments and Foreign Travel:

From September 1934 to February 1940 the subject was employed successively as a reporter, columnist, and Associate Editor by the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" newspaper at Brooklyn, New York. He stated that during the Summer of 1936, however, he vacationed in Europe during which period he was on a leave of absence from that newspaper.

In February 1940 BURDETT went abroad as a free-lance reporter and did work on assignment in the Scandinavian countries for the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" and Trans Radio Press until April 1940 at which time the Nazis invaded Norway. It was at this time he began free-lance reporting for the Columbia Broadcasting System, although it was not until August of that year in Rumania that he actually became a permanent and salaried employee of C.B.S.

In June 1940 he proceeded by way of passage through Russia to Bucharest, Rumania, where he remained until October 1940. The subject explained that while with C.B.S. abroad, he was assigned to various large cities as bases of operation, but the nature of his reportorial work necessitated his making frequent and temporary trips to other cities and adjacent countries on assignment.

BURDETT related that it was in July 1940 in Sofia, Bulgaria, that he married LEA SCHIAVI, an Italian journalist, whom he described as an ardent "anti-Fascist." He stated that in 1942 she was shot and killed by a young Kurd while en route from Soviet-controlled Northern Iran to Tabriz. BURDETT said that he was on assignment in New Delhi at this time. He related that his wife had gone to Northern Iran with a young Armenian girl friend as interpreter to cover a news story, and during the return trip their car was stopped by a band of Kurdestan tribesmen.

BURDETT stated that his wife was then shot by one of the young Kurds and she died while being rushed to a hospital

in Tabriz, which was approximately forty miles distant from the scene of the shooting. The subject asserted that it has always been a mystery to him as to why his wife was killed, explaining that robbery was apparently not the motive involved and that no other person in her party of five was injured. BURDETT said the Kurds were a band of tribesmen, who were willing at that time to commit various criminal acts, including murder, for anyone who desired to pay a price. For this reason, according to BURDETT, the services of the Kurds were frequently utilized by the representatives of various machines in Iran during the early 1940's.

BURDETT said he first suspected that pro-Fascist Italians in Iran had been responsible for her death due to the fact that she had been an outspoken and active anti-Fascist. He said that as a result of conversations with various fellow correspondents in the Middle East and with counter-intelligence agents, he later came to believe his wife's death was caused by the Russians. He said that he is now firmly convinced his wife, during the course of her assignment in Soviet-controlled Northern Iran, chanced to observe the Russians training Yugoslovian infiltration teams to be later used in politically undermining the Yugoslavian Government. When the Russians learned that she intended to publicize this matter, according to BURDETT, they apparently had her assassinated before she could return to Tabriz and file her news story.

The subject advised that upon hearing of his wife's death, he obtained a two-month leave of absence from his job with C.B.S. and proceeded from New Delhi to Iran in order to investigate his wife's death, but due to the reluctance and uncooperative attitude on the part of Iranian officials, he was completely unsuccessful in his efforts.

Continuing his places of assignment abroad, BURDETT advised that he left Bucharest in October 1940 for Belgrade, Yugoslavia, where he remained until March 1941. He then was assigned to Ankara, Turkey, from March 1941 to April 1942, but made trips during this period to Tehran between November 1941 and February 1942 and to New Delhi during March and April 1942.

It was following the completion of his assignment in New Delhi, according to BURDETT, that he went to Iran to investigate his wife's death, where he stayed until July of that year. From July 1942 to March 1943 he reported from Cairo, moving to Algiers for assignments between March 1943 and May 1944. He spent from May 1944 to March 1946 in Italy, during which period he went to France briefly to cover the Allied invasion of Western France.

Subsequent to March 1946 he returned to the United States, and after a three-month vacation was assigned to the CB.S. affiliated radio station in Washington, D. C. in June 1946, where he was employed until March 1948.

He again returned to Italy for assignment in Rome with C.B.S. from March 1948 to April 1951, during which time he also covered news events in Switzerland and Greece.

The subject returned to New York City in April 1951, where he is currently employed in the News Department of C.B.S. at 485 Madison Avenue, New York City. He currently resides at 430 East 63rd Street, New York City.

### Communist Party Activities:

WINSTON BURDETT stated that he joined the Brooklyn Eagle Unit of the Communist Party in August 1937 and was an active member until January 1940, having ceased his membership several weeks before leaving his employment with the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" in February of the latter year.

He said that his Party name was PAUL STRICKLAND, and although he is unable to recall the name of this particular section of the Communist Party, he believes it was called the S 41 or 41 S Section. The section was familiarly known within the Communist Party, however, as the Brooklyn Eagle Unit.

BURDETT stated that after becoming employed by the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle," he became extremely interested in the work of the Newspaper Guild, and it was this interest in union

activities that was largely responsible for his eventually becoming a Communist Party member. He pointed out that active participation in the Guild's activities at the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" and membership in the Communist Party was merely synonymous.

During the late 1930's, he stated, he held various menial positions in the Newspaper Guild, but in 1939 he begame Chairman of the Guild's Grievance Committee at the Brooklyn Daily Eagle." During the Guild's strike against that newspaper in 1939, according to the subject, he actively participated as a picket. BURDETT said that his primary responsibility as a Communist Party member was in the publication of the "Ragle Unit's Communist newspaper.

The subject stated that his leaving the Communist
Party was the result of a growing apprehension of his part
based on various inconsistancies of Communist Party doctrine
during the period of years he was a member. The one outstanding
event that caused him to doubt the Party's interests, according
to the subject, was the Hitler - Stalin Peace Pact in 1939.

BURDETT blames his original joining of the Communist Party on his zealous interest in Guild work, coupled with the foolhardiness of his youth. He said he now finds the principles of the Party to be repugnant, having discovered its methods, atmosphere, and ends to be dishonest and fraudulent, both morally and intellectually.

The subject further advised that the following individuals were employed at the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" and were members of the Communist Party unit at that newspaper during the years he, BURDETT, was a member of the same unit. BURDETT added, however, that he has no personal knowledge of these persons' activities subsequent to 1940, explaining that all or a portion of them could later have ceased their Communist Party membership for the same reasons he himself left the Party.

VICTOR WEINGARTEN......BURDETT stated that this individual was employed at the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" as a news room reporter.

VIOLET BROWN...... with aliases, VIOLET WEINGARTEN and
Mrs. VICTOR WEINGARTEN. The subject stated that
VIOLET BROWN was employed in the Editorial News
Room as a reporter and later married VICTOR WEINGARTEN

NAT EINHORN.......BURDETT described this individual as an Editorial Room Re-write man who was on general assignment news stories.

DAVID FORDON......This individual, according to BURDETT, was employed at the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" as a general assignment reporter.

MELVIN BARNETT (or BARNET)......This individual, BURDETT stated was employed as a general assignment reporter.

The following persons were named by the subject as individuals whom he knew to be Communist Party members, and these individuals were members of the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" unit of the Communist Party, except in those cases where so stated?

ALVAN BESSIE ..... BURDETT described BESSIE as one of his close friends while he was employed at the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" and stated that he was a member of the Communist Party, although he is not certain BESSIE was a member of the Brooklyn Eagle Unit. He stated, however, that he believed BESSIE was at one time a member of that particular unit. BURDETT said that although his joining of the Communist Party was not caused by any particular individual, ALVAH BESSIE was probably the most instrumental of any single person in recruiting him into the Communist Party. BURDETT said that although he is certain that ALVAH BESSIE was a member of the Communist Party, he cannot be sure BESSIE was a member of the Brooklyn Eagle Unit, since he left his employment at the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" prior to the time the subject became a member of the Brooklyn Ragle Unit of the Communist Party.

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GLADYS BENTLEY......This individual was described by BURDETT as having been employed in the Commercial Department of the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" and as having been active in the Newspaper Guild.

LARRY ADLER......BURDETT described ADLER as being in his late teens or early twenties while employed at the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" and as having been employed in the Commercial Department.

HERBERT COHN......This individual, according to the subject, was employed at the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" as a reporter and a movie reviewer.

described KAUFMAN as having been a very militant individual and as having been employed as a number one re-write man for the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle." He led discussions at meetings between representatives of the Newspaper Guild and the newspaper. BURDETT stated that KAUFMAN was not a member of the Brooklyn Eagle Unit of the Communist Party at the same time as he, but he knew him to be a Communist Party member.

LYLE DOWLING......The subject stated that DOWLING was
employed by the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" in 1937 in
an executive position, but DOWLING did not agree with
the newspaper's policies in publishing what he
considered to be a good newspaper. Due to this
friction between DOWLING and other executives of
the newspaper, he became interested and active in
the Newspaper Guild's strike against the paper.
BURDETT said that DOWLING was a member of the Brooklyn
Eagle Unit of the Communist Party at one time, but
was not a member at the same time as he, having left
the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" prior to the time the
subject became employed there.

CHARLES GRUTZNER......BURDETT described GRUTZNER as an individual who had been a reporter with the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" and one who was in the process of drapping

out of the Communist Party in 1939. BURDETT stated that he is positive GRUTZNER is no longer a Communist Party member.

The subject advised that he was at one time personally acquainted with DORETTA TARMON, although he did not enlarge upon this matter. It will be recalled that it has been previously reported DORETTA TARMON was a Communist Party member and gave the name WINSTON BURDETT, 5 Montague Street, Brooklyn, New York, as a reference in 1939.

# Contacts with Espionage Principals:

The subject stated that he has no knowledge of JACOB GOLOS or ELIZABETH BENTON. BURDETT was unable to identify a photograph of GOLOS. He said that he has heard of ELIZABETH BENTLEY as a result of his work in the field of journalism, but he has never met her.

BURDETT stated that while abroad he never advised any persons as to his whereabouts outside of the members of his immediate family. He further stated that he has never been acquainted with or contacted by Soviet or Russian Satellite officials in Europe or the United States.

It will be noted that it has been previously reported that ELIZABETH TERRELL BENTLEY, a self-confessed former Soviet espionage agent, who acted as a courier for the Soviet agent, JACOB GOLOS, advised she had never met BURDETT. She related, however, that GOLOS was in contact with BURDETT and when BURDETT went abroad in the latter part of 1938 or the early part of 1939, GOLOS arranged that BURDETT should maintain contact with him by sending communications to her under the name of ELIZABETH BENTON at 18 Grove Street, New York City, where she, BENTLEY, was residing at that time.

ELIZABETH BENTLEY advised that she subsequently received two or three cablegrams from BURDETT, which she then turned over to GOLOS. These cablegrams advised of BURDETT'S, whereabouts in Europe. She stated that she is unable to recall

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the dates when these cablegrams were received, but believes they were received sometime between December 1938 and December 1940, during which period she remained at 18 Grove Street, New York City.

missed connections with his contact in Europe since she was later asked by GOLOS to telephone BURDETT'S mother at the latter's home in Brooklyn for the purpose of learning BURDETT'S whereabouts. GOLOS told BENTLEY that she was to tell BURDETT'S mother that she, BENTLEY, was a fellow member with BURDETT in the Newspaper Guild. BENTLEY said that she made such an inquiry and was given the subject's address by his mother.

The subject apparently made connections with his contacts in Europe, according to BENTLEY, since she did not hear from him after December 1940.

BURDETT further denied knowing TGNACY WITCZAK or BUNIA WITCZAK and was unable to identify photographs of these individuals. It has been previously reported that Confidential Informant of known reliability, advised on September 28, 1945 that the notebook of IGNACY SAMUEL WITCZAK contained the name of BURDET, 2 Grace Court, Brooklyn, New York, MAin 4-5962.

WITCZAK disappeared from the United States in November 1945. In January 1946 his wife, who was using the name of BUNIA WITCZAK, also disappeared.

also received a letter from him sometime during 1939 or 1940 postmarked Geneva, Switzerland, at which time he indicated he was writing for some newspaper.

BURDETT identified a photograph of as being an individual whom he met in Bucharest in 1940 and whom he knew as Subject described as a self-styled journalist and ne'er-do-well who attempted to associate himself with a group of foreign correspondents in Bucharest. in Tabriz, which was approximately forty miles distant from the scene of the shooting. The subject asserted that it has always been a mystery to him as to why his wife was killed, explaining that robbery was apparently not the motive involved and that no other person in her party of five was injured. BURDETT said the Kurds were a band of tribesmen, who were willing at that time to commit various criminal acts, including murder, for anyone who desired to pay a price. For this reason, according to BURDETT, the services of the Kurds were frequently utilized by the representatives of various machines in Iran during the early 1940's.

Italians in Iran had been responsible for her death due to the fact that she had been an outspoken and active anti-Fascist. He said that as a result of conversations with various fellow correspondents in the Middle East and with Central Intelligence Agency representatives, he later came to believe his wife's death was caused by the Russians. He said that he is now firmly convinced his wife, during the course of her assignment in Soviet-controlled Northern Iran, chanced to observe the Russians training Yugoslovian infiltration teams to be later used in politically undermining the Yugoslavian Government. When the Russians learned that she intended to publicize this matter, according to BURDETT, they apparently had her assassinated before she could return to Tabriz and file her news story.

The subject advised that upon hearing of his wife's death, he obtained a two-month leave of absence from his job with C.B.S. and proceeded from New Delhi to Iran in order to investigate his wife's death, but due to the reluctance and uncooperative attitude on the part of Iranian officials, he was completely unsuccessful in his efforts.

Continuing his places of assignment abroad, BURDETT advised that he left Bucharest in October 1940 for Belgrade, Yugoslavia, where he remained until March 1941. He then was assigned to Ankara, Turkey, from March 1941 to April 1942, but made trips during this period to Tehran between November 1941 and February 1942 and to New Delhi during March and April 1942.

Investigation in this case is continuing and leads previously set forth in instant case, as contained in the report of SA dated 9/10/51 at New York, will be subsequently covered. It is being pointed out that BURDETT was extremely cooperative at all times, and it is the opinion of the interviewing agents that he did not appear to be knowingly withholding information during the course of the interview, with the exception of that incident involving HYMAN CHARNIAK and CHARLES LEWIS set out later herein.

"I am finally leaving this week on my vacation, which was twice postponed, and have wished to advise you of this in case you were expecting my 'phone call this week.

"I plan to be away for two weeks, and that will bring me back to New York for work on October 29th. I have wished to have a further talk with you, in any case, quite apart from the particular matter you mentioned.

"I shall 'phone you at your office as soon as I return."

The results of any recontacts with the subject will be promptly reported to the Bureau.

Concerning the names of those persons whom BURDETT knew as members of the Brooklyn Eagle Unit of the Communist Party.

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It is being pointed out that the subject specifically requested his identity not be revealed with reference to information concerning these individuals.

In addition to the names of those twelve persons whom BURDETT knew as Communist Party members, the subject also furnished the names of HYMAN SHARNIAK and CHARLES ZEWIS as persons whom he knew as fellow employees at the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" in the late 1930's. BURDETT said that both CHARNIAK and LEWIS, to his knowledge, are presently employed by the American Military Government in Germany. He related that in June or early July of this year, 1951, he was telephonically contacted at his CBS offices by a sister of CHARNIAK, whose name he is unable to recall. CHARNIAK's sister advised that some question had arisen as to her brother's former political activities in view of his present government position, and she requested that BURDETT recommend the name of an attorney to represent her brother in a hearing which was to be held concerning this matter.

BURDETT assumed that this hearing was to be held in Germany where CHARNIAK was then employed. Subject said he was reluctant to become involved in the matter and advised CHARNIAK's sister that he was unable to recommend an attorney since he had been in Europe a number of years and knew of none who were reliable in New York.

Subsequent to the telephone call from CHARNIAK's sister, CHARNIAK himself contacted BURDETT in late July and requested that he execute a testimonial statement concerning his, CHARNIAK's, political background during the period prior to World War II. Subject said he did not know the specific contents CHARNIAK desired in such a statement and he did not ask CHARNIAK for details concerning them, but again being reluctant to become involved in the matter, he declined to aid CHARNIAK in this regard.

Subject stated that he refused to aid CHARNIAK in view of the fact that he had not seen him since they had been employed together at the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" in 1940, and he advised CHARNIAK of this basis for his refusal. BURDETT said that although he did not discuss the details of the matter further with CHARNIAK, he assumed that CHARNIAK wanted him to misrepresent certain facts in a testimonial statement concerning CHARNIAK's former political activities.

BURDETT said he did not hear from CHARNIAK again after this meeting but he later learned that CHARLES LEWIS, heretofore mentioned, and also an AMG employee, did testify favorably in CHARNIAK's behalf during a hearing regarding the latter's former political activities. The subject was unable to furnish further information concerning this matter.


It is being pointed out that BURDETT did not at any time during the interview state CHARNIAK and LEWIS were Communist Party members. It was noted, however, that immediately after furnishing the names of twelve persons whom he knew as Communist Party members, the subject stated he also wished to furnish the names of CHARNIAK and LEWIS. He then related the foregoing matter concerning them. BURDETT was specifically asked at the conclusion of his statement concerning CHARNIAK and LEWIS as to whether or not they were Communist Party members.

The subject declined to answer, but stated he desired his comments concerning them stand as such.

It is being pointed out that it was noted there was no other reason for the subject to mention the names of CHARNIAK and LEWIS other than the fact that their names were furnished by him immediately after he had furnished the names of twelve Communist Party members. It is the opinion of the interviewing agents that BURDETT, although knowing CHARNIAK and LEWIS to have been Communist Party members at the "Brooklyn Eagle" in the late 1930's, was reluctant to state such a fact because he fears their status as government employees would eventually result in a public hearing involving his presence.

The procedures under Executive Order 9835, and the fact that his identity could be concealed in the event a loyalty hearing board convened, were then explained to the subject but he continued in his declination to state that CHARNIAK and LEWIS had ever been Communist Party members.







In his letter to the Director, Burdett stated. "I shall, of course, be ready to answer any questions you may have regarding the circumstances. Pursuant to Bureau instructions, Burdett was interviewed by the New York Office on September 20. 1951, at which time he admitted Communist Party membership under the Party name, Paul Strickland, while employed at the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" newspaper, and active in the Newspaper Guild from August, 1937, to January, 1940. He furnished the names of twelve, individuals who were members of his Communist Party cell. He denied knowing Jacob Golos or Elizabeth Bentley and stated he kept only members of his immediate family nosted as to his whereabouts abroad between January, 1940 and March, 1946. It may be noted that investigation had developed that Burdett was described in 1942 as a supporter of the Communist leadership in the New York Newspaper Guild and as either a member of the Communist Party or a close sympathizer.

He again met Miller and furnished latter his impression of Finland's reaction to the end of the war. Miller then instructed Burdett that his assignment was ended.

After covering the German invasion of Norway, Burdett applied for travel visas to Rumania via Russia and in June. 1940. prior to departure was again approached by Miller, who advised he would be contacted in Mascaw during a two-day layover. Burdett was contacted at his hotel in Moscow by a man and woman, Nos. 4 and 5, who advised him to write the Russian Consulate upon arrival in Bucharest. Burdett did so, but was never contacted in Bucharest. He left Bucharest with his wife for Belgrade in November, 1940, and was contacted by unidentified man No. 6 several weeks after arrival, who arranged a meeting with No. 7 contact. This meeting was held on the edge of Belgrade at night, and No. 7 instructed him to make acquaintances in Tugoslavian Ministry. A subsequent meeting was also arranged at this time, but Burdett stated he finally decided at this time to end activities after many months of deliberation and he did not appear for the second meeting with No. 7. Burdett was again contacted at his hotel in Belgrade by No. 6, whom he told that he no longer desired to act as an informer. Burdett stated he was never again approached in Belgrade.

In March, 1941, Burdett proceeded to Ankara and shortly after his arrival, was contacted by man No. 8 whom he also advised he no longer desired to operate. Burdett stated he has hever been contacted since that time and has never been associated with the Communical Party or Communical Party numbers.

Further interviews with Burdett have been arranged by the New York Office, which is making every effort to identify Burdett's described espionage contacts.

morals in Finland. Burdett then proceeded to the Finnish
Front, but the war ended shortly thereafter, and he returned
to Stockholm, March 13, 1940. He again met Miller and
furnished the latter his impression of Finland's reaction
to the end of the war. Miller then informed Burdett that
his assignment was ended.

After covering the German invasion of Norway, Burdett applied for travel visas to Rumania via Russia and in June, 1940, prior to departure, was again approached by Willer, who advised he would be contacted in Voscow during a two-day layover. Burdett was contacted at his hotel in Noscow by a man and woman, Nos. 4 and 5, who advised him to write the Russian Consulate upon arrival in Bucharest. Burdett did so, but was never contacted in Bucharest. He left Bucharest with his wife for Belgrade in November, 1940, and was contacted by unidentified man No. 6 several weeks after arrival, who arranged a meeting with No. 7 contact. This meeting was held on the edge of Belgrade at night, and No. 7 instructed him to make acquaintances in the Jugoslavian Ministry. A subsequent meeting was also arranged at this time, but Burdett stated he finally decided at this time to end activities after many months of deliberation and he did not appear for the second meeting with No. 7. Burdett was again contacted at his hotel in Belgrade by No. 6, whom he told he no longer desired to act as an informer. Burdett stated he was never again approached in Belgrade.

In March, 1941, Burdett proceeded to Ankara and shortly after his arrival, was contacted by man No. 8 whom he also advised he no longer desired to operate. Burdett stated he has never been contacted since that time and has never been associated with the Communist Party or Communist Party members.

Further interviews with Burdett have been arranged. All pertinent information will be forwarded to you.

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

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DETAILS:

In a personal letter to the New York Office dated October 15, 1951, the subject expressed a desire to be re-interviewed concerning a matter "quite apart from the particular matter" mentioned in his initial interview of September 20, 1951.

It will be noted that the subject had previously admitted being a Communist Party member under the name of PAUL STRICK AND while employed at the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" newspaper between July, 1937 and January, 1946, but had denied Communist Party activities or associations subsequent to the latter date. He further denied knowing any espionage principals.

In accordance with BURDETT'S request, he was re-interviewed at the New York Office by the writer and SA on November 1, 1951.

# INTERVIEW WITH SUBJECT

The subject stated he had falsely advised in his previous interview that he left the Communist Party in January, 1940, but actually continued to be a member when he left the United States in February, 1940. He further stated that he had been in contact, between January, 1940 and March, 1941, with persons engaged in activities directed towards collection of information for Russia.

He added that all other information furnished in his initial interview was true, to the best of his knowledge.

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#### Espicnage Contacts in the United States

BURDETT related it had been general knowledge among the employees at the "Brooklyn Eagle" in the latter part of 1939 that he was going abroad to do free lance reporting on the Finnish front. He said that sometime in January, 1940, several weeks before his departure, NAT EINHORN of the "Eagle", who was the leader of the Communist Party cell at that newspaper, telephoned him at his Montague Terrace address in Brooklyn and advised him that JOE NORTH of the "Daily Worker" wanted to speak with him. BURDETT stated that EINHORN did not say what NORTH wished to discuss with him, but he later learned in talking with EINHORN that EINHORN at the time of his call was aware of the matter NORTH wished to discuss.

Several days later, the subject went to NORTH'S apartment in the Greenwich Village section of New York City where he was told by NCRTH that a foreign assignment had been arranged for him in view of the fact that he was going abroad. NORTH did not furnish further details concerning this matter, but arranged a second meeting with BURDETT one or two days later.

The subject was unable to recall NORTH'S address in Greenwich Village, but remembers that it was West of Seventh Avenue and South of 14th Street in New York City.

At the second meeting, according to the subject, NORTH took him to a street-side contact with an unidentified man. The latter individual shall be referred to hereinafter as Man Number 1.

The meeting with Man Number 1 took place at night on Fourth Avenue off Union Square, New York City, and it is BURDETT'S vague recollection that the meeting was held in front of a restaurant or cafeteria, possibly a Childs Restaurant. Man Number 1 repeated that there was a foreign assignment for him although he did not advise the subject of the nature of this assignment. He cautioned



BURDETT at this time not to mention the matter to any of his fellow Communist Party members and asked him if he had received his passport as yet. The subject explained to Man Number 1 that he had not yet received his passport, but expected to receive it within a few days. Man Number 1 then made arrangements for another meet with the subject and NORTH several days later and instructed BURDETT to bring with him several copies of his photograph, a brief biography of himself and his Communist Party card to the

BURDETT stated that at the second meet, he furnished Man Number 1 with three or four copies of his photograph, a short biographical sketch he had written in longhand and his Communist Party card as requested.

This meeting, according to the subject, was again held at night on Fourth Avenue just off Union Square. BURDETT stated that he is unable to recall how many meets he had with Man Number 1, but believes there were three altogether although possibly only two, and JOE NORTH was present at all of these meetings. He related that it is his recollection his final meet with Man Number 1 took place only one or two days before his departure to Sweden.

At either the second or third meet, Man Number l furnished him with the amount of cash necessary to purchase a one-way steamship ticket from New York to Bergen, Norway. BURDETT said he is unable to remember the specific amount, however, but it was possibly four or five dollars in excess of the exact price of the steamship ticket. The subject was also given the name and address of a woman in the Greenwich Village section of New York City to whom he was to send a cable upon his arrival in Stockholm. This cable was to contain a congenial message and would serve as notice of his arrival in Stockholm.

BURDETT stated he is unable to recall the name of the woman and her address, but recalls that Man Number 1 wrote this information on a slip of paper and turned it over to him.

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TERRELLABENTLEY, a self-confessed former Soviet espionage agent who acted as a courier for the Soviet agent JACOB GOLOS, advised she had never met BURDETT.

She related, however, that GOLOS was in contact with BURDETT and when BURDETT went abroad in the latter part of 1938 or the early part of 1939, GOLOS arranged that BURDETT should maintain contact with him by sending communications to her under the name of ELIZABETH BENTON at 18 Grove Street, New York City, where she, BENTLEY, was residing at that time.

received two or three cablegrams from BURDETT, which she then turned over to GOLOS. These cablegrams advised of BURDETT'S whereabouts in Europe. She stated that she is unable to recall the dates when these cablegrams were received, but believes they were received sometime between December, 1938 and December, 1940, during which period she remained at the 18 Grove Street address.

ELIZABETH BENTLEY stated that BURDETT evidently missed connections with his contact in Europe since she was later asked by GCLOS to telephone BURDETT'S mother at the latter's home in Brooklyn for the purpose of learning BURDETT'S whereabouts. GCLOS told BENTLEY that she was to tell BURDETT'S mother that she, BENTLEY, was a fellow member with BURDETT in the Newspaper Guild. BENTLEY said that she made such an inquiry and was given the subject's address by his mother.

The subject apparently made connections with his contacts in Europe, according to BENTLEY, since she did not hear from him after December, 1940.

Miss BENTLEY also recalled that GOLOS advised her at one time that BURDETT was married to a girl in Europe, possibly in Rumania. She added that GCLOS subsequently told her BURDETT'S wife met death under rather tragic circumstances. She said she was not aware of the

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nationality of BURDETT'S wife and she does not know the circumstances of her death.

On November 15. 1951 ELIZABETH BENTLEY advised that she is unable to the writer and SA that she is unable to recall the specific number of cablegrams she received from the subject, but believes they were two or three in number. She added, however, that she cannot be certain of this and it is possible that she received only one cablegram from BURDETT.

With reference to the telephone call she made to BURDETT'S mother in Brocklyn, Miss BENTLEY was unable to furnish additional information in this regard.

Concerning the information she had previously furnished to the effect that GOLOS had advised her that the subject had married and his wife later met death under tragic circumstances, Miss BEN TLEY stated that she is positive this information was furnished to her by GCLOS or possibly another one of her espionage contacts. She added, however, that she is certain this information came to her as a result of her espionage activities and that she did not read it in the newspapers.

BURDETT stated that the name and address of ELIZABETH BENTON, 18 Grove Street, New York City, is not familiar to him, but he cannot honestly assert they are not the name and address given to him by Man Number 1. The subject stated that Man Number 1 did not advise him of the nature of his assignment at any of their meetings:

He described Man Number 1, to the best of his recollection, as follows:

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Middle-aged, past 40

Buila: Hair: Complexion: Medium Stout Sandy red Reddish

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Speech: Dress: Fluent English Wore hat and topcoat

The subject was unable to identify a photograph of JACOB GOLOS as being that of Man Number 1. He stated that he has never seen this individual subsequent to their two or three meetings in January, 1940.

BURDETT related that on the night or possibly two nights before his departure from New York, he had a meeting with a second unidentified man. This individual shall be referred to hereinafter as Man Number 2.

The subject stated that this meeting, which occurred late at night, had been arranged by Man Number 1 on the occasion of their last contact and took place on upper Broadway above 100th Street, but below Columbia University (116th Street), New York City, but he cannot recall the specific location. He believes, however, that this meeting also took place on the street in front of or near a Childs Restaurant.

After going to the prescribed street intersection on Broadway, the subject was approached by Man Number 2, who asked him if he was Mr. BURDETT. Upon replying in the affirmative, he was instructed by Man Number 2 to register at the Patricia Hotel after arriving in Stockholm, where he would be contacted by a "Mr. MILLER". This individual, according to the instructions, would come to BURDETT'S hotel and make reference to their mutual friend NAT EINHORN. BURDETT was to acknowledge that he had recently seen EINHORN in New York. This brief conversational exchange was to be the subject's only means of identifying MILLER.

BURDETT again was not advised as to the nature of his assignment, but was told by Man Number 2 that there would be no risk involved on his part. BURDETT said that Man Number 2 advised him he would be morely carrying out his work as a foreign correspondent. He related that "others" were undergoing a great deal of risk, but there would be none on his, the subject's, part.

BURDETT described Man Number 2 as follows:

Speech: Of undetermined foreign Mationality: extraction.

# Activities and Contacts Abroad

The subject stated that he departed from New York aboard ship on February 7, 1940. After disembarking at Bergen, Norway, he proceeded to Oslo to await clearance of his Swedish wise. of his Swedish visa. Approximately ten days later, he arrived in Stockholm, where he registered at the Patricia Hotel and sent a cablegram to the woman in New York City es per instructions.

BURDETT advised that two or three days after registering at the hotel, a man came to his room and stated that he was Mr. MILLER, but he made no reference to NAT EINHORN. MILLER will be referred to hereinafter as Man Number 3 or Mr. MILLER.

Mr. MILLER arranged a street-side meeting with the subject in downtown Stockholm to be held several days later and this was the first of either two or three of such meetings BURDETT had with Man Number 3 subsequent to the latter's first visit. He said that these meets were in nearly every case held late at night.

BURDETT related that very little took place at these meetings and recalled that they had walked the streets of Stockholm for as long as an hour or an hour and a half at a time with MILLER remaining silent for long periods. Man Number 3 broke the silence only at infrequent intervals to ask the subject questions concerning HAPPING CALLY TUC

his personal background, such as when he had joined the Communist Party, where he had attended school, and how many brothers or sisters he had. Subject related that Mr. MILLER appeared very suspicious and cautious at these meets and it was apparent that these questions were directed towards ascertaining his, BURDETT'S, positive identity.

At the latter of these meets, Man Number 3 gave the subject his assignment. BURDETT related that Mr. MILLER directed him to bring back a report of his observations with regard to Finnish public morale and the Finns! reactions to Russian bombings when he returned to Stockholm from the Finnish front. MILLER also arranged a future street-side meet with the subject, which was to be held on a specific date subsequent to his return from Helsinki.

BURDETT advised that he flew to Helsinki one or two days later, where he arranged a junket to the Northern front through the Finnish Press Office. This trip consumed several days and upon his return to Helsinki, he departed on another junket, this one being to the Southeastern front. After one or two days observing activities on the Southeastern front, all correspondents on the junket were suddenly and surprisingly ordered to return to Helsinki according to BURDETT. He stated that it was not until they arrived in Helsinki that they learned the Russo-Finnish War had abruptly ended. BURDETT rocalled that hostilities ceased on March 13, 1940.

Subject related that a week later he returned to Stockholm and one or two days after his arrival there A he held the pre-crranged street rendezvous. BURDETT recalled that he and MILLER attended a motion picture in downtown Stockholm on this occasion and after emerging from the theater, MILLER inquired as to the reaction of the Finnish people to the end of the war. BURDETT informed MILLER that, in his opinion, the cessation of hostilities had come unexpectedly and as a shock to the Finns since the Finnish people had apparently steeled themselves for a

long war in spite of the over-all effectiveness of the Russian bombings. The subject stated that Mr. MILLER then advised him his assignment was completed.

MILLER, according to the subject, gave no indication that he would attempt to recontact him in the future and left the impression upon departing that he would not see the subject again.

BURDETT described Man Number 3, with alias Mr. MILLER, as follows:

Ago: Height: Early 40s 5: 10" to 5: 11"

Build: Hair: Peculiarities: Strong, heavy-set, peasant-type Pull brown, dark in appearance

Square-headed with flat pugilistic face

Speech:

English with thick accent,

reticent

Travel:

Indicated he had once been in the United States, possibly

in New York.

Shortly after his last contact with Man Number 3, according to BURDETT, he returned to Finland with a large group of foreign correspondents for the purpose of covering the story of the Russian occupation. He related, however, that they were never allowed by the Russians to complete this junket and he subsequently returned to Stockholm by train.

The subject continued that not long after his return to Stockholm, the Germans invaded Norway and he covered the various military incidents surrounding the Nazi occupation of that country between the latter part of March and late May, 1940. He recalled that it was during this period, he became affiliated with Trans-Radio Press and that in May of that year he made his first broadcast for the Columbia Broadcasting System.

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The Scandanavian countries had virtually ceased to be a scene of international interest by June, 1940, according to the subject, and it was at this time that he decided to go to Rumania along with many of the other correspondents in that area.

He said that one or two days after he had applied for Russian and German visas, he was again contacted by Mr. MILLER who came to his hotel room in Stockholm. According to BURDETT, MILLER displayed a "searching" attitude on this occasion and said that he had heard the subject was going to Rumania. MILLER indicated by his comments that he was greatly pleased with this news. Subject related that MILLER'S comments also indicated that word of the subject's impending trip to Rumania had come to him directly from the Russian Embassy or Consulate in Stockholm.

During this meet, MILLER instructed BURDETT to register at the Hotel Moscava upon arriving in Moscow, where he would be contacted. MILLER gave the subject no further details as to how, when or by whom he would be contacted in Moscow.

BURDETT advised that he departed Stockholm during the first week in June, 1940, but upon arriving in Moscow all passengers en route to Rumania were registered by Intourist at the Hotel Metropole rather than at the Hotel Moscava for the two-day layover in that city.

The day after his arrival in Moscow, however, the subject was contacted by a man and a woman, Contacts Numbers 4 and 5, who came to his room in the Hotel Metropole. The woman did not speak during this brief visit BURDETT related, but Man Number 4 instructed him to write a letter to the Russian Consulate upon arriving in Bucharest. He directed that this letter was to contain the subject's request for a visa permitting him to cross Russia on his return to the United States via the Pacific Ocean. Man Number 4 further directed that this letter should contain BURDETT'S hotel and room number in Bucharest and would serve as notice of his arrival in that city.

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Subject said that after two days in Moscow, he flow to Odessa and took the train from there to Bucharest. He recalled that the Italians entered the war on June 10, 1940 and it was on this date that he arrived in Bucharest.

BURDETT advised that after registering at the Hotel Esplanade in Bucharest, he wrote a letter to the Russian Consulate requesting a visa as he had been instructed by Man Humber 4 in Moscow. He was never contacted after writing this letter, BURDETT stated, and he wrote a second letter a week later which also went unanswered by either a return communication or a personal contact.

The subject said he maintained his base of operations for reportorial work in Bucharest until mid-November, 1940, having spent a portion of that time in Sofia, Bulgaria, where he was married in July. BURDETT stated that efforts to contact him were never made by the Russians during his stay in Bucharest or during the time he was in Sofia.

In October, 1940 the subject departed with his wife from Bucharest for Bolgrade, Yugoslavia, where he registered at the Hotel Srpski Karalj.

He related that two or three days after arriving in Belgrade, a young man, who will be designated as Man Number 6, came to his hotel room. BURDETT described this individual as follows:

Ago:

Approximately 30, youthful appearance

Nationality: Speech:

Russian English with accent

Man Mumber 6, according to the subject, apparently had no knowledge of the fact that he had never been contacted in Bucharest. He furnished BURDETT with instructions for a contact with Man Mumber 7 several days later and then departed.

The subject related that this meet took place late at night several days later in a dimly-lit outlying suburb of Belgrade. He recalls that he rode to the end of a tram line and then walked a considerable distance in order to arrive at the specified street corner. BURDETT stated that due to the darkness, he was unable to obtain a clear view of Man Number 7, but advised that this individual was a tall person who carried a glove in either his right or left hand. He recalled the latter incident inasmuch as it had been the means of his identifying Man Number 7.

This contact addressed the subject by his true name and then mentioned the names of several lesser officials in the Yugoslavian Ministry, asking the subject if he was acquainted with them. BURDETT stated that he advised Man Number 7 he was not acquainted with these persons whereupon Man Number 7 directed him to take steps to meet these officials during the course of his reportorial assignments. Man Number 7 did not, however, instruct BURDETT to obtain information from these officials, but merely instructed him, the subject, to meet him again on the street a week later.

BURDETT said he never went to the latter arranged meet with Man Number 7. His decision not to carry out this assignment, the subject stated, was the culminating point of a long personal deliberation covering a period of approximately two years. He explained that a person's joining of the Communist Party was, in most cases, like his own, a long and gradual process. He advised further that due to the regimentation and the continual necessity on the part of each member to alternate his individual theories to coincide with Communist Party doctrines, a person's leaving of the Communist Party was an even longer and slower process.

BURDETT said that he is firmly convinced his apprehensions toward the Communist Party's aims and purposes were instigated as early as the Fall of 1939. It was not until he left the "Brooklyn Eagle" and had an

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opportunity to disassociate himself from the day-to-day Communist Party activities and discussions, however, that he was able to think for himself and allow his growing mental apprehensions to take their natural course. The subject said his personal observations abroad of the activation of Russian designs on European countries was a deciding factor in his decision to no longer be a member of the Communist Party or to furnish information to the Russians.

After failing to appear for the second meet with Man Number 7, the subject centinued, he was recontacted at his hotel by Nam Number 6 who asked why he had not appeared. BURDETT said that he told Man Number 6 that he no longer desired to serve in such an activity and explained to him that he, BURDETT, had arrived at a mental attitude whereby he would be of no further use to the Russians. He said that there appeared to be no marked reaction to this statement on the part of Man Number 6, but this was not strange since Man Number 6 obviously was only a messenger or courier of lesser rank. He said that Man Number 6 departed and he was never again contacted in Belgrade:

The subject continued that he left Belgrade in March, 1941 and proceeded to Ankara, Turkey for further assignments with the Columbia Broadcasting System. He resided with his wife at the Ankara Palace Hotel while in that city.

Sometime between four and six weeks after arriving in Ankara, a man, Contact Number 8, came to his hotel room. This individual, according to BURDETT, was extremely cautious in that he did not indicate whom he represented, but merely suggested the subject would be in a position to obtain a great deal of knowledge concerning Turkish Government affairs in view of his employment as a foreign correspondent.

BURDETT said he assumed Man Number & was from the official Russian Mission in Ankara, but he could not be certain of this and added that Man Number 8 made no

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mention of the fact that he, BURDETT, had failed to cooperate in Belgrade. He said that he repeated to Man Number 8 the same statements he had made to Contact Number 6 in Belgrade in October of the previous year when he declined to cooperate with them. According to BURDETT, Man Number 8 then appealed for him to reconsider whereupon the subject again stated he no longer was willing to serve as an "informer" since his views had changed radically in recent years.

BURDETT said Man Number 8 then departed and he was never again contacted in Ankara nor have any attempts ever been made anywhere else to recruit him for espionage activities since that time.

The subject further asserted that he has never had contact with the Communist Party or been associated with Communist Party members since the occurrence of the latter incident in Ankara.

# Information Concerning Mr. and Mrs. OWEN L. BURDETT

It has been previously reported that Confidential of known reliability, advised on September 28, 1945 that the notebook of IGNACY SAMUEL KITCZAK contained the name of BURDET, 2 Grace Court, Brooklyn, New York, MAin 4-5962.

WITCZAK disappeared from the United States in November, 1945. In January, 1946 his wife, who was using the name of BUNIA WITCZAK, also disappeared.

advised on January 23, 1946 that he was an acquaintance of WINSTON BURDETT. He stated that the latter formerly worked for the "Brooklyn Eagle",

WINSTON BURDETT'S address, 2 Grace Court, Brooklyn,

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NY 65-15665 advised that WITCZAK did not see BURDETT. in an interview on September 14, 1950, maintained that WITCZAK had never taken him into his confidence concerning espionage. 67C 67D at the residence of WINSTON BURDETT in Brooklyn. BUNIA WITCZAK arrived in New York, and stayed for a day or so at the BURDETT residence on the basis of his present knowledge of WITCZAK'S activities, may have been related to espionage activities. Confidential Informant of known reliability, advised that on October 4, 1945 the WITCZAKS had in their possession a letter dated December 15, 1941 from ELIZABETH W. BURDETT (Mrs. OWEN L. BURDETT), 2 Grace Court, Brooklyn, New York, to Mrs. BUNIA WITCZAK. In this letter, Mrs. BURDETT mentioned the "little visit" which she and her husband had with BUNIA WITCZAK. She then mentioned that they were very worried because they had not heard from and inquired as to whether BUNIA had beend **67C**and inquired as to whether BUNIA had heard from him.

WINSTON BURDETT, in his initial interview on September 20, 1951, admitted having known later was in contact with his parents in the United States. He denied, however, ever having known the WITCZAKS.

In his most recent interview, BURDETT said that he had recently returned from a visit with his parents in Brattleboro, Vermont and had inquired of his mother at that time as to whether or not she had ever been acquainted with persons by the name of WITCZAK, who possibly had been

Mrs. BURDETT advised that other than the fact that the BENSONS were friends of the she had no other knowledge of them.

mrs. BURDETT told her son that she has corresponded with as recently as last year, but that she never corresponded with the BENSONS. According to the subject, she added, however, that she still maintains the BENSONS' address in either New York City or California although she does not recall which address.

She further related to the subject that the BENSONS could possibly have stayed in their, the BURDETTS', apartment during the time they were in Vermont but it is her recollection that the BENSONS' stay in New York occurred prior to the time apartment.

Subject stated that he was unable to obtain additional information from his mether concerning this matter while on his recent visit with his parents in Brattleboro, Vermont.

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It will be recalled that Doctor IVAN BENSON was a mutual associate of the WITCZAKS and

of the University of Southern California, Los Angeles, advised that IVAN BENSON had been employed as a social professor in the Department of Journalism in the university since 1936. His legal address in 1945 was 2019 Dunsmuir Avenue, Los Angeles. He received a E.A. Degree from Stanford University in 1920 and an M.A. Degree at the University of Kansas in 1928.

reported that BENSON left the university on Cotober 10, 1942 to take a position with the Government. She is of the opinion that he was sent to Europe by the Government.

further advised that BENSON in 1945 was at the Veterans Hospital, Whipple, Arizona, suffering from tuberculosis.

With reference to the information that BENSON had been sent to Europe by the Government, it is to be noted that he was employed during the war in the Scandanavian Section of OWI.

Subject advised that his parents were never members of the Communist Party to his knowledge although they probably absorbed some of his "leftist idens" during the late 1930s. He related that they undoubtedly had shrewd suspicions that he was a Communist Party member during those years and he believed they worried about the fact although they never mentioned the matter to him.

### MISCELLAMEOUS

Confidential Informant of unknown reliability, advised that WINSTON BURDETT and his parents were very proud of their Communistic affiliations at the time they resided in Brooklyn, New York.

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

This Informant advised on October 8, 1951 that just prior to the Communist-dominated Newspaper Guild's strike against the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" in 1939, Mrs. BURDETT told the Informant that she and her husband had finally come around to the subject's way of thinking and joined the Communist Party.

Confidential Informant further related that Mrs. BURDETT participated in the picket lines and carried a placard during the strike against the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle".

On October 15, 1951 Confidential Informant of unknown reliability, advised that she also was present when Mrs. BURDETT made the statement that she and her husband had come around to the subject's way of thinking and joined the Communist Party.

Confidential Informant of known reliability, who has admitted being engaged in Soviet espionage activities in the United States, with occasional courier trips to France, during the 1930s, has no knowledge of the subject.

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



Forwarded herewith are eight copies of the report of dated 12/7/51 at New York, as requested in Butel to New York 11/20/51.

It will be noted in the accompanying report, a copy of which is being designated for the Albany Office, the subject's mother advised him she had no knowledge of IGNACY and BUNIA WITCZAK, but was acquainted with one IVAN DENSON and his wife, whom she and her husband had met through She related, however, that the BENSONS had never resided in the BURDETT apartment to her knowledge and denied that she had ever corresponded with the BENSONS.

Information has been previously reported in the captioned case to the effect that BUNIA WITCZAK, according to introduced to the BURDETTS as a friend and she stayed for a day or so at the BURDETT residence.

It was further noted that ELIZABETH WX BURDETT had corresponded with BUNIA WITCZAK in December, 1941 and confidential informants have advised that Mrs. BURDETT told them in 1939 she and her husband had joined the Communist Party. In view of this information, it is suggested that the Albany Office give further consideration to conducting a full scale investigation of the subject's parents, Mr. and Mrs.

In this regard, it is being pointed out that the WITCZAKS were possibly using the names of Doctor IVAN BENSON and his wife, who were mutual friends of the WITCZAKS while they were in contact with the BURDETTS in 1941.

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Letter to Director, FBI NY 65-15665

A review of the New York files concerning WITCZAK reflects that he occasionally used the aliases of friends. It is suggested that Albany also consider the possibility of specifically interviewing the BURDETTS in detail concerning the WITCZAKS and the BENSONS.

It is to be noted that Mrs. BURDETT recently advised her son she still maintains an address for the BENSONS in either California or New York City. In the event the BURDETTS should be interviewed, however, it should be noted that the subject has specifically requested that the matters of his Communist Party membership, his espionage activities, and the fact that he has talked to the representatives of the FBI not be mentioned to them.

A review of the New York file in the captioned case reflects that Albany is in possession of all pertinent information available to New York concerning Mr. and Mrs. OWEN BURDETT.

During the course of the interview with the subject, which was held in the New York Office from 3:00 p.m. to 6:15 p.m., November 1, 1951, the subject advised that he has never related his story of espionage activities to anyone else other than to his first wife, LEA, who was killed in Iran in 1942. BURDETT stated that LEA SCHIAVI was not a Communist, but was extremely opposed to Communism. She did not approve of his Communist Party membership and his attempted espionage assignment, but was aware during the course of their marriage that his interests in Communism and Russia were waning. She, therefore, was content to let him discover the error of his ways as time went on and never attempted to pursuade him one

BURDETT stated that as far as he knows, heither his present wife, GIORGINA, nor his parents have any knowledge of his past Communist Party membership and espionage contacts since he has never advised them of such.

Letter to Director, FBI NY 65-15665

Subject stated that the only times he has been in contact with Communist Party members since 1941 occurred once when he visited the newspaper plant at the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" after returning to the United States in 1946 and on several occasions when DORETTA TARMON attempted to contact him by telephone in Washington, D.C. and New York City after he returned from abroad.

BURDETT stated that he went to the "Eagle" to pay his respects to GEORGE CURRIE, under whom he had worked at that newspaper during the late 1930s. He said that he toured the newspaper's offices at this time and during the course of this tour saw several of those persons, whom he advised on 9/20/51 were members of the Communist Party when he was employed at that newspaper. Among those persons whom he observed as still being employed at the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" and who were Communist Party members in the late 1930s were GLADYS BENTLEY, VIOLET BROWN and HERBERT COHN. BURDETT stated that he did not converse with these people and they did not attempt to speak with him.

The subject stated that the only other exception to his having any contact with the Communist Party members since 1941 occurred while he was employed by the CBS affiliated radio station in Washington, D.C., during which period DORETTA TARMON attempted to contact him. BURDETT stated that DORETTA TARMON was at one time a very good friend of his, whom he knew as a Communist Party member while working at the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" and whom he had first met at CP Section Headquarters in Brooklyn. He said that he does not know what position she held in the CP during those years, but she was actually employed by the Party and was very active in its affairs.

TARMON before 1940 and even corresponded with her after he went abroad. He stated that he considered her to be such a close friend at one time that after he ceased to view the Communist Party and the Russians in a favorable light, he had hoped some day to attempt to explain his change of mind to here

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He stated that while he was with CBS in Washington, DORETTA TARMON called him two or three times on the telephone and later called him once at his CBS Office in New York. On each of these occasions, according to the subject, he gave her excuses for not meeting her. He said that she apparently soon came to realize these excuses were a form of reluctance on his part not to see her and she did not contact him again.

The subject stated that with the exception of these aforementioned instances, he has never had any contact with Communist Party members, representatives of the Russian Government, or any persons whom he thought to be engaged in espionage activities since he was last contacted in Ankara, Turkey, in April, 1941.

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

EURLETT was re-interviewed at the New York Office on January 2, 1952, by the writer and SA this time he furnished the additional information hereinafter set forth concerning his contacts.

BURDETT stated that JOE NORTH who brought him in contact with Man #1 at New York City in January 1940, greeted this individual with a salutation one would ordinarily use in greeting an older person with familiarity. Subject is unable to remember the exact term used by NORTH but believes he greeted Contact #1 with a phrase similar to "Hi, Pop." Subject was unable to furnish any additional identifying data with respect to Man #1.

# CONTACTS #4 and #5

It has been previously reported that the subject related he proceeded from Stockholm to Moscow during the first week in June 1940. The day after his arrival in Moscow, he was contacted at the Hotel Metropole by a man and a woman, Contacts #4 and #5, respectively.

BURDETT recalled that Man #4, who did nearly all of the talking during this period, jokingly referred to him as "The Eagle", obviously referring to his previous employment with the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle". Contact #4 also possibly referred, during the conversation, to NAT EINHORN of that newspaper, according to the subject, but he is unable to specifically remember if the man did so. BURDETT did recall, however, that the man mentioned the fact his, BURDETT'S, original instructions in Stockholm had been to register at the Hotel Moscava rather than at the Hotel Metropole where he was ushered by Intourist upon arrival in

The subject stated that Contact #5, the woman, exchanged pleasantries during the early part of the meet and did very little talking thereafter. It was BURDETT'S impression that she had been sent along merely as an observer. The meet with Contacts #4 and #5 lasted from one-half hour to an hour, he related, during which period he received instructions as to his future contact in Bucharest. No other conversations of a pertinent nature took place at this time, according to BURDETT. He stated that, judging from their conversation, it was his impression that neither Contact #4 nor Contact #5 had ever been in the United States.

Contact #6, the young man whom it has been previously reported visited BURDETT on two occasions at the Hotel Srpski Karalj, Belgrade, Yugoslavia, in October 1940, was described further by the subject as follows:

BURDETT related that Man #6 displayed little initiative during their two meetings and left the impression that he held a position of minor rank. It was felt by BURDETT that this individual was only carrying out instructions that had been specifically issued to him and he was probably incapable of exercising any prime decisions without consulting his superiors. Although he is unable to specifically recall the circumstances, it is the subject's recollection that Man #6 identified himself as holding an official position with the Russian Embassy in Belgrade. BURDETT further recalled that he asked Contact #6 why he had not been previously contacted in Bucharest as had been indicated by his instructions received earlier in Moscow. The subject stated that the young man merely shrugged his shoulders in answer and furnished no explanation concerning this matter.

# CONTACT #7

BURDETT related in an earlier interview that he was met at night by Contact #7 on the outskirts of Belgrade several days after receiving his instructions for this contact from Man #6: In his most recent interview, he described this individual as follows:

Subject related that, judging from the stylish attire of Man #7, he assumed this man was also from the Russian Embessy in Belgrade but of much higher rank than Contact #6. Man #7 gave the impression that he had travelled widely and possibly had visited the United States. BURDETT added, however, that he is now unable to recall what transpired during the meet that caused him to believe the man had possibly been in this country.

It may be noted that in his previous interview of November 1, 1951, BURDETT related that his meet with Contact #7 took place late at night in a dimly-lit, outlying suburb of Belgrade. He recalled that he rode to the end of a tram line and then walked a considerable distance in order to arrive at the specified street corner.

During the course of his most recent interview. BURDETT advised that he possibly was somewhat in error as to the specific circumstances he previously furnished surrounding the meet with Man #7. He pointed out that this meeting occurred nearly eleven years ago and lasted only a brief period of time, probably one-half hour at the most. Further, during his previous interview he had attempted in a short time to recall the details of a number of incidents with respect to his espionage contacts. For these reasons, he stated he was previously unable to describe the meet with Man #7 in detail. After giving this particular meeting further thought, however, he now recalls that it took place on the outskirts of Belgrade in the early evening, rather than late at night as stated earlier. To the best of his recollection, he boarded a bus or tram in the central business area of Belgrade which proceeded easterly towards the suburbs on Alexander (or Alexandra) Avenue. BURDETT explained that this avenue is the main thoroughfare leading east from the business section of Belgrade and was later renamed the Avenue of the Red Army by the Russians. He has no knowledge as to its present title under the TITO regime but stated that the Yugoslavian House of Parliament is located on this avenue. He left the bus or tram at a pre-arranged stop in an outlying residential area of the city, he continued, by which time it had become dark or nearly so.

BURDETT said that he had been advised earlier that Man #7 would be standing on a street corner and would be carrying a glove in either his right or left hand, which was to be the means of identification. BURDETT related that he apparently walked a considerable distance before arriving at instant intersection, but he is now unable to remember the exact distance or direction he walked from the point at which he disembarked from the public transport. He continued that, upon arriving at the specified street corner, he immediately identified Man #7 by means of the glove. Upon seeing BURDETT, Man #7 rounded the corner and proceeded up the street. BURDITT followed him as previously instructed and eventually overtock him, whereupon the man addressed BURDETT by his true name. Subject stated that he and Man #7 then walked leisurely about the neighborhood for approximately one-half hour as they conversed. The nature of this conversation has previously been reported to have involved Man #7's questioning of BURDETT with respect to his knowledge of Yugoslavian officials. When Man #7 had completed his talk, he departed the area and BURDETT returned to his hotel alone. He recalled that the next meet with Contact #7, which it has been reported never took place, was to have been in the vicinity of another stop on the same ous or tram line.



BURDETT stated that Man #8 came to his hotel room during the daylight hours as had Man #6 in Belgrade. This individual, however, appeared to be more definitely the professional type and apparently had travelled widely. The subject received the definite impression that Contact #8 had come from the official Russian Mission in Ankara and possibly introduced himself as a representative of the Embassy. At the conclusion of the interview with BURDETT he was shown numerous photographs of known and suspected Russian espionage operatives but was unable to identify any of his related eight espionage contacts. The subject was shown additional photographs on February 28, 1952, again with negative results. He stated, however, that in the future, should he recall any incidents or facts which might prove beneficial in identifying his contacts, he will voluntarily furnish such information.





In the event instant authorization is granted, it is being pointed out that the subject has requested his parents not be made cognizant of his admitted CP and espionage activities. For this reason it is suggested Albany be appropriately circumspect in its interviews of OWEN and ELIZABETHY BURDETT. During the course of specific inquiry concerning the WITCZAKS, however, it is also suggested Albany be alert for any information furnished by Mr. and Mrs. BURDETT which might prove indicative as to their own reported activities and for information which might be pertinent to the investigation of the subject.

For the information of the Albany Office, it will be recalled the subject's mother reportedly advised him in October 1951 that she had no knowledge of IGNACY and BUNIA WITCZAK but was acquainted with one IVAN BENSON and his wife, whom she and her husband had met through She related, however, that the BENSONS had never resided in the BURDETT apartment to her knowledge and denied that she had ever corresponded with the BENSONS. Information had previously been reported in the captioned case to the effect that BUNIA WITCZAK, according to introduced to the BURDETTS as a friend and she stayed for a day or so at the BURDETT residence in Brooklyn, NY. It will be further recalled that ELIZABETH W BURDETT had corresponded with BUNIA WITCZAK in December 1941. In view of this information, it was theorized in referenced NY letter to the Bureau dated 12/7/51 that the WITCZAKS were possibly using the names of Dr. IVAN BENSON and his wife, who are mutual friends , while they were in contact with the of the WITCZAKS and BURDETTS in 1941. This view was taken since the NY files reflected WITCZAK had occasionally used the aliases of his friends and acquaintances when receiving mail from his wife.

Further review of the NY files, however, now reveals that the aforementioned correspondence between ELIZABETH W. In view of the salutation in the above letter, it would appear Mrs. BURDETT actually knew Mrs. WITCZAK under the name of WITCZAK and not BENSON. It is also possible moreover that the BURDETTS knew the BENSONS aside from the WITCZAKS. It is requested, therefore, that, during the course of interview, Albany obtain the BENSONS' address, which Mrs. BURDETT reportedly continues to maintain.

It will be recalled that BURDETT had stated that JOE NERTH of the "Daily Worker", an East Coast Communist daily newspaper, introduced him to unidentified man #1 at New York City in January 1940, with whom BURDETT met several times. On April 16, 1952, BURDETT was interviewed by SAS in connection with another matter, at which time he was shown an additional photograph of JACOB GOLOS. He stated this was unidentified man #1 with whom he had two or three street meetings in New York City in January 1940. He said that he could furnish no additional data regarding this man who was previously reported as being unidentified man #1.

It will be recalled that ELIZABETH TERRELL BENTLEY, a self-confessed former Soviet espionage agent, acted as courier for the Soviet agent, JACOB GOLOS. She advised SA LESTER O. GALLAHER on August 23, 1951 that she had never met BURDETT. She said that GOLOS was in contact with the subject when BURDETT went abroad in late 1938 or early 1939, since GOLOS arranged for BURDETT to maintain contact with him by sending communications to her under the name of ELIZABETH BENTON at 18 Grove Street, New York City, where BENTLEY then lived.

She said that she later recalled receiving two or three cablegrams from BURDETT, exact number being unknown, which she gave to GOLOS. The cablegrams advised of BURDETT's whereabouts in Europe. She said she did not recall the dates when the cablegrams were received, but she believes she had received them between December 1938 and December 1940, during which period she lived at the 18 Grove Street address.

Also, ELIZABETH BENTLEY was previously reported as saying that BURDETT had evidently missed connections with his contacts in Europe since she was later asked by GOLOS to telephone BURDETT's mother in Brooklyn, New York in order to learn BURDETT's whereabouts. It will be recalled that at this time GOLOS told BENTLEY that she was to tell BURDETT's mother that she, BENTLEY, was a fellow member with BURDETT in the Newspaper Guild. BENTLEY said she made this inquiry and was given the subject's address by his mother.

Miss BENTLEY said that the subject apparently made connections with his contacts in Europe since she did not hear from him after December 1940.





BURDETT thought this might have been in the first part of 1940 or 1941. She related it to a time some two or three months

She stated that she was rather surprised at this call, that BENSON appeared to be ill at ease and to act peculiarly. She stated that she finally determined in hepown

mind that he had come to her perhaps for money or food or a place to stay, although he asked for none of these things. In any event, she told him it was not convenient for him to call at that time and he left. Mrs. BURDETT explained that because of his peculiar actions and because Mr. BURDETT was at business, and she was alone in the apartment, she did not wish to entertain this man. She stated that she was positive it was IVAN BENSON who called for she later met both him and his wife, at a Sunday supper. Mrs.; BURDETT corrected her recollection at this point, stating that she could not be sure BENSON was at the particular supper that she intended to describe, but that she had subsequently met him at and that the night in question, she had a clear recollection that she had met Mrs. BENSON and had talked to her to some extent. She stated that the supper must have been some time in the latter part of 1941, and that Mrs. BENSON told her that she had come from California to see her husband in New York City, and that she had left her children in California. She commented that BENSON had been ill, and Mrs. BURDETT received the impression that he was suffering from tuberculosis of some sort. She described Mrs. BENSON as in her thirties, thin, lanky, under-nourished, oval-faced and she had stringy greyish hair. She stated that Mrs. BENSON laugheddeasily. She also recalled that Mrs. BENSON spoke English well and appeared to have no accent of any type. Mrs. BURDETT could not recall Mrs. BENSON's first name.

She described IVAN BENSON as being in his late thirdes, she thought, spare in build, and as having a "loose, (unformed) face". She was unable to describe him further, except to comment that he looked ill and had no distinguishing marks, such as glasses, that she could recall.

Mrs. BURDETT referred to her address book and stated that the only address she had for IVAN BENSON was 213 East 58th Street, New York City. She thought that this address was the one she was given in 1940 or 1941 when she met these people.

Mrs. BURDETT insisted that she could not recall ever having met with IGNACY or BUNDANT WITCZAK. When it was pointed out to

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her that it appeared very clear that she must have some acquaintance with these people, however casual, Mrs. BURDETT volunteered that she might have met the WITCZAKs under some other name. She ostensibly racked her memory for items which would relate to such an acquaintanceship with negative results.

On the subsequent interview, Sept. 4, 1952, Mrs. BURDETT examined several photographs, among which were those of the WITCZAKs. She passed IGNACY WITCZAK's picture without any question, stating that she had never seen that man before. However, she admitted that BUNIA WITCZAK's picture depicted someone who was vaguely familiar to her. She was not told, of course, the identity of the persons whose photographs she was shown, and when she was asked if it could possily be Mrs. BENSON, since she had suggested that she might have known the WITCZAKs under the name of BENSON in the previous interview, she emphatically stated that it was not Mrs. BENSON.

The sum total of showing Mrs. BURDETT the pictures was that she immediately dismissed the picture of IGNACY WITCZAK, but found domething quite familiar about the picture of BUNIA WITCZAK without being able to identify the person portrayed.

Mrs. BURDETT stated in general conversation about her life in Brooklyn that she had, of course, met many people with "left-wing" sympathies, and she intimated that she had been taken in by them. She mentioned casually that she had registered with the American Labor Party for some years, and during the 1938-40 period, at one time she had done work for the Russian War Relief which led to her contacts with these "undescribed left-wing people".

At the second interview, the facts previously discussed were recapitulated briefly, but no significant change in the story of either Mr. or Mrs. BURDETT was noted.

Reference is made to the report of SA captioned as above, dated 9/9/52, which is enclosed.

Mr. and Mrs. OWEN BURDETT were interviewed by SA and SA on August 27, 1952 on September 4, 1952.

The consensus of the interviewing agents is that Mr. BURDETT knows very little about his wife's activities with reference to these matters, but that Mrs. BURDETT has some small knowledge at least of Communist or left-wing activities during the late 1930's and early 1940's.

Mrs. Burdett is quite intelligent and she professes to be hard of hearing which enables her to convers tly overlook the questions which might be embarrassi Both she and her husband, however, were very conterative and friendly and they seemed extremely eager try and satisfy the interviewing agents. of their freedom of complicity in this matter.

Mrs. BURDETT suggested that possibly she might have been the victim of untruthful stories spread by MARY BESSE, former wife of ALVAH BESSE, whom she described as erratic and given to spreading imaginary stories. BESSIE

In view of the fact that the connection between Mrs. BURDETT and BUNIA WITCZAK is a letter written by Mrs. BURDETT addressed to Mrs. WITCZAK, this interpretion of her possible involvement is not considered too seriously, but her efforts to avoid the issue are recited to reflect her concern. It is also felt that MRS. BURDETT is particularly concerned about the possible involvement of her son in these matters, although she did not mention him, nor, of course, was the son's name mentioned by interviewing agents.

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Mrs. BURDETT was most curious as to what her position might be if there appeared to be any complicity between her and the WITCZAKS. She was told that she could best decide that question, since she knew her own actions and that if she had not been guilty of any act that was illegal, she should have no hesitancy or fear in discussing that period of her life with Bureau agents.

The BURDETTs were left very clearly with the impression that ther interviews had not been satisfactory in explaining certain of the questions asked. Without divulging the source of information that Mrs. BURDETT apparently knew Mrs. WITCZAK, it was made clear to her that her attempt to explain it away was not acceptable in the light of information which was available to suggest that they knew each other well.

Both Mr. and Mrs. BURDETT were advised that they might again be reinterviewed in these matters and they expressed their desire to cooperate with the Bureau.

It is suggested that the New York Office may wish to furnish other pictures that may be shown to the BURDETTS, particularly some of those as described in New York letter to the Bureau dated March 27, 1952 in captioned matter. If the pictures of the BENSONs are available or other views of the WITCZAKS, these might serve to elicit the desired information from Mrs. BURDETT.

No further interviews will be conducted with the BURDETTs unless they get in touch with agents of the Albany Office, or unless this is requested by the Bureau or Office of Origin.
